If the car lands upright, a pock-

et of air remains inside, more than enough to last the 10 to 15 minutes it takes the car to fill. When the water stops rising, the pressure inside is about equal to the outside pressure. The motorist then takes a deep breath, opens the door, pushes out and up to the surface. The air pocket renains after the door is open. The procedure is approximately

the same when a car lands on its side or top. The air bubble will rise to the highest point in the


