is today one of Northeastern Michigan's oldest war veterans. The chipper 89-year-old Tawas Cityan, retired hardware and farm implement dealer, explained that in December 1898, he took a rowboat out in Havana harbor and snapped several pictures of the once proud battleship. These snapshots, along with scenes in Cuba showing members of his outfit, form a collection of more than 250 pictures which he has accumulated concerning the Spanish-American War. Events of today and recent past years make Mr. Braddock's collection even more interesting. Included are snapshots showing Cuban refugees, Morro Castle, other buildings which are still in use, and one of Maj. Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, a corps commander during the brief war with Spain, but more famous for his part in the American Civil War. To explain Mr. Braddock's role as an infantry private and later a corporal in the 1898 campaign, it is necessary to recall some of the events which led to that war. Although Cuba had been in a state of political turbulence for years, it had remained loyal to Spain while other Latin American countries had revolted against Spanish rule. Spain however, exploited the economy of the island mercilessly, forcing Cubans to buy Spanish goods at prices far above the world market. Cruel administrative methods of Spain in Cuba is listed by Webster's as the chief cause of the war. Under these conditions, Cuban rebels took to the field on February 24, 1895, against Spain. At first, nothing much came of the revolution, other than the sensational news coverage given to non-existent battles which whipped up public sentiment in the United States for intervention in Cuba. By early 1896, the rebels had achieved such success in guerrilla tactics that Madrid decided on firmer steps and sent Gen. Don Valeriano Weyler Nicolau to Cuba. He declared martial law, imprisoned thousands of Cubans and was promptly dubbed "The Butcher" by the American press. With a heavy hand, Weyler executed rebels who set fire to sugar cane fields. He was eventually removed by the Spanish government and his policies rescinded. Several crises arose between the United States government and Spain during this time. Anti-Spanish relations crystallized in the United States when the Battleship Maine exploded in Havana Harbor on February 15, 1898. (See MAINE, page 10.)

Contractors interested in the project may obtain plans from the architect. Saginaw Man Hurt in Blast

A Saginaw man was hospitalized here Saturday night for first and second degree burns which he received in an explosion of gas fumes at his Sand Lake cabin. State police from East Tawas learned of the accident when notified by officials of Tawas Hospital. Still undergoing treatment for burns to the face, head, hands and chest is Philip Fletcher, 51. His son-in-law, Benjamin Henderson, 28, Flint, was treated for burns to the hands and released. Henderson told police that he and Fletcher had stopped at the cabin Saturday morning and found that the water pump and plumbing were frozen. The men placed a propane gas heater in the bottom of a pump pit, lighted it and then went on their way to Harrisville. On their return Saturday night, they found that the heater was not burning. Fletcher climbed down in the four-foot pit and struck a match to re-light the heater. The cabin was filled with gas fumes and the resulting explosion set Fletcher's clothing on fire. Henderson pulled his father-in-law out of the pit and, in so doing, was burned on the hands. He took the injured man to Tawas Hospital by car.

Point Property Now a State Park

Federal surplus lands at Tawas Point, Iosco County, were added to Michigan's state parks system this week, marking the second time in little more than two months that an important Great Lakes shoreline area has been acquired for public recreation in this state. Late last November, the state gained title to the choice 60-acre Sturgeon Point tract in Alcona County. The Tawas Point site, formerly owned by the United States Coast Guard, was purchased through the General Services Administration with a special legislative appropriation of \$29,250, one-half its appraised price. It was named last year by the United States National Parks Service as one of Michigan's top 40 Great Lakes shoreline areas remaining for public recreation. Situated at the tip of a peninsula separating Tawas Bay and Lake Huron, the 175-acre Tawas Point site has some 13,750 feet of shoreline. Both sides of the point boast sandy beaches well suited for sunbathing and swimming. The peninsula, itself, is widely known by ornithologists as a fine habitat for shore birds and a popular passing point for migrating birds. This will be taken into account when development plans are laid out. The newly-acquired tract will be managed, at first, as part of nearby East Tawas State Park where facilities have been over-taxed for several years. This will mean a saving in overhead costs, parks officials point out. Later, when funds are avail-

Mr. Bigelow has been ill for the past two weeks and confined at Tawas Hospital. Malenfant, who was born and raised in Tawas City, has been a barber for 23 years. He began his trade with Charles Westendorf at East Tawas. After working at Detroit for some time, he saw three years of service with the United States Army, during which time he barbered at an army hospital. After World War II, he returned to the barber business at Royal Oak and Perndale and later in Arizona. He returned to East Tawas in 1959 and his last place of employment was the Holland Hotel barber shop.

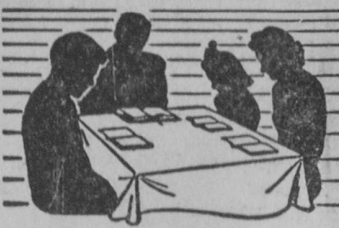

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Supervisors' Proceedings

JANUARY SESSION

January 18, 1961

Pursuant to December adjournment, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by the chairman who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Bellville, Blust, Brabant, Burgess, Gerard, Little, Long, Rodman, McKenzie, Smith, Stephan, Pollard, Webb, Werth, White, Kochenderfer. Absent: Ashton, Everett and Oates.

Chairman Long requested a discussion of a meeting scheduled for today, January 18, at AuGres, Michigan, at which time the AuGres River drainage project was to be discussed and voted upon. Since this county, as well as Ogemaw and Arenac Counties, is involved and liable for special tax levy in case the project is commenced, he asked that board members express opinions as to the benefits this county might gain from the project. Mr. Burgess, appointed by this board to represent Iosco County along with Drain Commissioner Stickney and to vote at today's meeting, asked many questions in an effort to learn exactly if this county would gain by the proposed drain and if the expenditure would be warranted.

Mr. Werth suggested that a previous motion passed by this board to place the nursing home proposal on the April ballot be rescinded. He stated that he did not think this was the proper time to ask the people to support a bond issue for a nursing home.

Mr. Werth asked that a study be made as to the source of funds for extra appropriations that have been made and will be made in 1961. Referred to the finance committee.

Mr. White moved that the previous action of this board be rescinded for the placing on the ballot in April of the nursing home proposal. The motion was supported by Blust and carried unanimously.

It was moved by Stephan supported by Brabant that the minutes of the December meeting be approved as published. Carried unanimously.

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they could now proceed with the purchase since provision had been made in the 1961 budget. Mr. Buch presented the following annual report for the business of his office for 1960. Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

The report was referred to the finance committee. Mr. Stickney presented the annual report of the business of the drain commissioner's office. Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

1. No drains left unfinished during 1960.
2. No drains begun during 1960.
3. See No. 1 and 2 above.
4. In May 1960, an application for laying out and designating a drainage district in Woodland Beach and Avalon Beach Subdivisions in Baldwin Township was received, said application bearing the signatures of fifteen (15) property owners in the above subdivisions. Field examination of the areas affected satisfied this office that establishment of a drainage district was both feasible and necessary. Scott Engineering Company, Alpena, Michigan, was engaged to complete the survey and engineering data required. Due to earlier commitments the Scott engineers were unable to complete the work until late in October. Estimated cost of the Lakeview Drain was \$12,000.00. It was necessary to obtain a permit to construct said drain from the Michigan State Highway Department, as most of the drain line proposed lies within the R-W of US-23. This permit was received dated November 30, 1960, and extending to March 1, 1961. It is therefore apparent that an extension of the construction period will be necessary, when other processing is completed. This latter will be expedited as soon as possible and the probate court petitioned for a board of determination.

In July 1960, an application for laying out and designating a drainage district in Crescent Beach Subdivisions in Baldwin Township, was received, bearing signatures of ten (10) property owners in the above subdivision. Complete engineering data and estimate of cost has not yet been received, but this office intends to complete processing of both the Crescent Drain and the Lakeview Drain at about the same date, so that should the boards of determination decide in favor of construction, a substantial savings in cost of the two drains can be anticipated by advertising for bids on both drains as one item.

It is anticipated that a drainage assessment will be necessarily levied on the Alabaster-Whitney Drain District during 1961. Suit for replacement of a bridge over said drain has been instituted in the Arenac County Circuit Court. The drain commissioner is advised that such suit will in all probability be decided in favor of the plaintiff as the bridge in question was inadequate at the time of construction (in which determination your drain commissioner must concur). The bridge collapsed in 1960 and prevents ingress to the SE-4 of Sec. 9, T20N, R7E in Whitney Township, Arenac County. In view of existing percentages of assessments for said drain, the Iosco County section of the Alabaster-Whitney Drain will probably bear 31 percent of the cost of the bridge, Arenac 66 percent and Ogemaw three percent.

The AuGres Water Management Commission proposition will hold its second meeting at the Reno Township Hall at 1:30 p. m. January 18, 1961. Iosco members will vote for non-continuance of the proposition, with Ogemaw tentatively pledged to vote with Iosco.

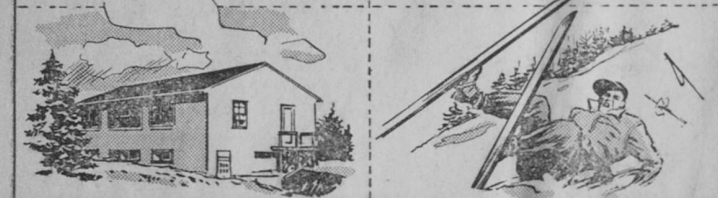

Even now, 63 years later, the cause of the explosion aboard the Maine has never been finally established. The blast killed 260 men and officers and the pride of the Atlantic Squadron rested on the bottom of the harbor.

Said Theodore Roosevelt: "The Maine was sunk by an act of dirty treachery by the Spanish."

Congress, on April 19, recognized the independence of Cuba and asserted that we would not acquire Cuba for ourselves. It issued an ultimatum to Spain to withdraw within three days and President McKinley signed the proclamation on April 20.

Congress authorized raising a volunteer force of 200,000 to bolster a regular army of some 30,000 men.

Mr. Braddock, a native of Ithaca and then living in Chicago, was one of those who answered the call to arms and enlisted for one year in Company C, Second Illinois National Guard.

Mustered at Springfield, men of the National Guard had the choice of returning home or continuing on to Jacksonville, Florida, for training.

The Spanish-American War, at first, promised to be little more than a naval exercise. Commodore Dewey sank the Spanish Pacific fleet in Manila Bay, but the Caribbean fleet escaped the trap set by Admiral William T. Sampson's North Atlantic Squadron.

On June 22, 1898, Americans landed in Cuba east of Santiago Harbor and on July 3, Admiral Cervera decided to run the American blockade. As a result, every Spanish ship was disabled. Santiago surrendered on July 17.

By the time Company C arrived in Havana, the brief war had ended with the Treaty of Paris. However, the United States soon found itself embroiled in open fight with these same Cuban rebels.

Mr. Braddock served as a railway train mail guard and had the opportunity to visit Morro Castle and the Rocojidos in Havana, a walled prison which, to this day, is infamous as a place for execution of political prisoners, first by the Spaniards and later by the Cubans.

"The weather was delightful in Cuba and we got along fine with the Cuban people," he commented. "Thousands of people were suffering from malnutrition and disease and many of our soldiers contributed their rations to help these people."

Receive \$28,732 in License Fees From Trucking Concerns

George A. Prescott, branch manager of the secretary of state's office in Iosco County, announced Monday that he had received two checks totaling \$28,732 from the purchase of license plates from two Michigan trucking companies.

A check for \$12,732 was received Monday from Henry Vroom and Son, Incorporated, truckers for the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company. Earlier, a check for \$16,000 had been received from Jefferson Truck Lines.

Prescott said that substantial checks for truck licenses were also received from Consumers Power Company and Michigan Bell Telephone Company.

The branch manager said that about two-thirds of the money collected for truck license plates is returned to the county.

Prescott warned motorists to avoid the last minute rush to buy auto license plate tags. He said that the deadline for purchase of the tags was February 28 and sales were below normal as of Monday.

"This means that many owners will try to purchase licenses at the same time and long lines of applicants will be the result," he stated.

Men of the Strategic Air Command live under war-time conditions so the rest of the nation might live in peace. Brig. Gen. Harold E. Humfeld said Friday night at the start of the annual Silver Valley Winter Sports Carnival.

General Humfeld, 40th Air Division commander, with headquarters at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, was principal speaker and honored guest at Friday night's perch fry at the Holiday Hotel, traditional kick-off for winter sports carnival festivities here.

Prior to the general's address, guests were introduced by Winter Sports Chairman L. G. (Ladd) McKay and Harold Gould.

McKay introduced his red-shirted members of the Silver Valley Winter Sports Committee, while Gould introduced Bob Reynolds of WJR-Radio, Detroit, who has attended carnival festivities here for the past nine years; Col. John H. Hudson, base commander at Wurtsmith; visiting newsmen, and others.

The committee departed from its usual custom of holding a "stag" fish fry and this year, wives of those attending were invited.

Calling his address "Aero-Space Power and Peace Insurance," General Humfeld said that SAC personnel have three things in common:

Unparalleled responsibilities, job entailing educational training requirements not found in other military organizations and representing an investment of billions, and a singular sense of duty stemming from dedication to the command's mission.

Telling his audience that Wurtsmith would have a population, including dependents, of more than 10,000 persons at the end of 1961, General Humfeld invited residents of Northeastern Michigan "to open up your hearts and your homes to these wonderful people."

He predicted that a year from now more than 800 families would be looking for housing over and above the available housing on base. He said this represents a challenge to the community and the base.

He stressed the mutual benefits of base-community relationships. "They take a lot of co-operation and understanding on both sides," he said.

Tawas State Police Investigate 2,135 Complaints in '60

Michigan State Police at East Tawas investigated a total of 2,135 complaints received during 1960, it was reported this week by Sgt. Frank Roti, post commander.

Of this figure, 192 complaints were from other state police posts which requested supplementary investigation in this area.

Traffic arrests during 1960 numbered 1,855, which included offenses ranging from negligent homicide to drunk driving. There were 214 other patrol arrests and 192 complaint arrests.

Troopers from East Tawas gave 5,949 verbal warnings to errant drivers, which meant that about one out of every four drivers who were stopped for violations received a traffic summons.

Property inspections during the year numbered 2,679, inspection of liquor establishments totaled 882 and troopers assisted 648 motorists on the road.

The 13 men assigned to East Tawas, including 10 troopers, one detective, one corporal and a sergeant, averaged 9.38 duty hours per man per day during 1960. Patrol cars traveled 273,848 miles. The post is open 20 out of every 24-hour day.

The area handled by the East Tawas post includes all of Iosco County and parts of Arenac and Alcona from Standish to Harrisville.

Roti said that activity during 1960 showed a slight increase over the previous year.
