





Taxpayers can use the form 10-40-A of their wages, subject to withholding, are less than \$10,000. Up to \$200 can be shown on the 1040-A if it was from interest, dividends or wages not subject to withholding. However, if any combination of income adds up to \$10,000 or more, taxpayers cannot use the form 1040-A.
