Superintendent Says—

### State Not Keeping Pace With Education Costs

Although there has been a 37 percent increase in operational costs at Tawas Area School since 1953, state aid payments have been increased only three percent in the past seven years, reports Supt. Reynold Mick.

According to statistics reported to the board of education last week, the per child income in 1953 was \$230.21, as compared to \$315.70 in 1960-61. (Figure does not include federal money.)

An analysis of the per child income figure showed that state aid payments amounted to \$164.72 in 1953. By 1960-61, the figure was \$169.79, or approximately a three percent increase.

Local tax contribution per child for operational expense was \$56.20 in 1953, while now this figure is \$132.89. Tawas Area School receives a local tax of eight mills for operating expense.

The per child increase locally was brought about through the district's increased valuation and through a change in tax assessing by the county. Instead of using the county's equalized figure, as was the case in 1953, millage is now spread on the higher state equalized figure.

Total operational costs in 1953 at Tawas Area School, the first year of its reorganization, was \$248,167.79. This total had increased to \$487,766 in 1960.

Enrollment at Tawas Area has increased from 1,078 in 1953 to 1,546 in 1960-61.

According to Mr. Mick's analysis of costs, major expenditure increases were in instruction and operation.

"The only conclusion that could be made after reviewing these figures is that the state is not keeping pace with the rising costs of education," said the superintendent.

### Discuss Purchase of Fire Equipment

Possibility of the purchase of a new fire truck and other fire fighting equipment was discussed at Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council. Representing the fire department at the meeting were Chief Ray Klinger and Fred Lusk.

Although no action was taken, a committee was appointed to investigate prices on such equipment. Councilmen serving on the committee are Rex Kochenderfer, Clarence McKenzie and Floyd Upton.

## Hosbach Asks Reduction of Time for City Tax Collection

Tawas City may revamp its tax collection program, if discussion at Monday night's city council meeting is followed with appropriate action.

City Treasurer John Hosbach asked the council to consider a proposal whereby summer taxes (city) would be collected from July 1 through August 20, instead of the present policy of collecting until September 20.

He said that the county allows only a month and 20 days for payment of taxes, December 1 through January 20. After that date, the penalty goes into effect.

### Motion to Quash Kidnap Charges to be Heard

A hearing on a motion to quash kidnaping charges against Matthew Buder and John N. Bogart will be heard Thursday, January 19, before Justice of the Peace A. J. Goulet at East Tawas.

Charges against the two Flint men were filed last August after the men allegedly attempted to perform a "citizens arrest" here on Jerome F. O'Rourke, former Genesee County prosecutor.

The warrant, signed by former Isoco prosecutor, Paul Harvey, charges Buder and Bogart with kidnaping, conspiring to kidnap, or in the alternative, attempted kidnaping. O'Rourke filed a formal complaint against the two men in September.

Bogart and Buder had asked Justice Goulet for several adjournments in his court here in order to appear in Genesee County Circuit Court on other charges.

Goulet said that Buder, an attorney, charged in his petition to quash proceedings that the delay in appearance was longer than Michigan statutes allowed for justice court.

According to word from Lansing, the Michigan attorney general's office will represent the state at Thursday's hearing, scheduled to be held at the Isoco County Building at 2:00 p. m.

## Tawas City's Finances Said Improved Over Recent Years

With about 2½ months to go in its current fiscal year, Tawas City is in better financial condition than it has been at this time of year in recent history.

Although all columns in its 1960-61 budget will probably be overdrawn at the end of the fiscal year on March 31, revenue during the 12 months will be higher than anticipated.

At the start of fiscal 1960, the city had approximately \$18,000 in accounts payable. According to a report read by Treasurer John Hosbach at Monday night's council meeting, this amount has been reduced to about \$8,000.

The 1960 budget, as set up by the finance committee last spring, was \$90,600. Expenditures were estimated at \$89,525, which will be slightly higher than expected.

Expenditures amounted to \$84,688.89 during the first 296 days of the year. At present, the city has approximately \$5,000 to take care of wages and salaries for the remainder of the year.

It was estimated that approximately \$8,500 in revenues was yet to be received.

Because of its higher population according to the 1960 census, payment of sales tax money was higher this year. This was one of the reasons attributed to the city's improved financial condition.

Columns in the budget which will end the year in the "red" include new street construction, street maintenance, insurance and cemetery. Fire and police protection are running about as anticipated.

### Cold Weather Needed for Rink

"We have tried to build a skating rink, but the weather was against us again last week," states Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works for Tawas City. City crews flooded the tennis court in the city park five mornings during the past week. Each afternoon, the weather turned mild and ice disappeared.

The city had hoped to build its rink on ice near the park dock, as it has done in past years, but offshore winds have made this impossible.

"We are going to try to flood the tennis court again this week. If the weather holds, we should be successful," said Bublitz.

### Insurance Agents Met Here Last Week

Tri County Association of Insurance Agents held its January meeting last Wednesday night at the Holland Hotel. Twenty agents attended.

Arthur Cincaid, Saginaw, member of the Michigan Inspection Bureau, was principal speaker. Peter Munroe, attorney for the Michigan State Accident Fund, also appeared on the program.

Members attending were from Tawas City, East Tawas, Oscoda, Harrisville, Mio, West Branch, Lewiston, AuGros, Standish, Rose City and Whittemore.

### Investigate Theft of Truck at Hale

Theft of a rack truck at Hale last Thursday is being investigated by the Isoco County Sheriff's Department. The truck, stolen from the Wilson service station, was owned by Charles Dane of Long Lake.

Constable Joseph Bannister told sheriff's officers that the truck had been serviced Wednesday and parked near the station. It was found missing the next morning.

In other business, Kenneth Conn, local insurance agent, was present and asked for consideration in handling some of the city's insurance business.

The city is to advertise in the Michigan Municipal Magazine for the purchase of used Christmas decorations or displays from other cities. This move was suggested by the Tawas City Businessmen's Association. Alderman Cecil Cable said that it may be possible to purchase such decorations at a reduced rate at this time of year.

Plans for the new city hall have been completed by the architect and the city is to ask for construction bids February 15. Bids are to be opened March 1.

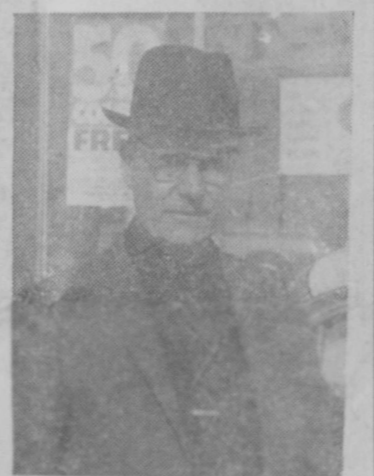
Construction on the new city hall is to start the first of March, weather permitting. It is expected that construction will be completed by June.

## Funeral Services Friday for Veteran NEM Auto Dealer

Orville Leslie, 68, one of Northeastern Michigan's pioneer automobile dealers, died Monday, January 16, at Tawas Hospital. He suffered a heart attack January 4 and had been confined to the hospital since that time.

Born July 14, 1892, at Whittemore, the son of the late Thomas and Harriett Leslie, in his early years, Mr. Leslie had worked with his father and brothers in the operation of a sawmill at Whittemore.

Mr. Leslie established a Ford dealership at Prescott in 1910. Later, he established a dealer-

ship at Whittemore and operated both businesses.

On September 12, 1912, he married Miss Dora Ellsworth at West Branch. She has taken an active part in the operation of the dealership.

In 1933, Mr. Leslie came to Tawas City where he and his sons took over the Ford dealership originally established here by Henry Kane and later operated by W. C. Roach.

The Leslies constructed the building housing their dealership on US-23 in 1937.

His interest in deer hunting and the outdoors led to the purchase of a large tract of property in Baldwin Township. For years, the Leslie hunting camp was one of the most productive areas for deer hunting in this section of the state.

Besides his wife, Mr. Leslie is survived by three sons, Ben of East Tawas, Orville Leroy and Otto Leonard "Larry" of Tawas City; five grandchildren; four brothers, William, James and George of Tawas City and Roy of Whittemore; one sister, Mrs. Anna Paddock of Tawas City.

Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon, 2 o'clock, at the Tawas City Baptist Church. The Rev. Alfred P. Miller will officiate. Burial will be in the Whittemore Saints Cemetery.

The body is at Jacques Funeral Home, Tawas City, and will lie in state at the church from 1:00 to 2:00 p. m. on Friday.

## Good Weather for Tawas Skate Meet

Cold weather moved into the Tawas area just in time Saturday to help local winter sports officials stage a highly-successful speed skating meet on Tawas Bay, just off the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock at the East Tawas State Park.

Well over 150 skaters were in competition in the one-day event, arranged by William Grebe and his committee.

Although Detroit area skaters dug in for most of the first place trophies, donated by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, all areas of the Lower Peninsula were well represented among the winners.

Competition was close in a number of divisions due to good skating conditions.

Of no little help was the East Tawas Department of Public Works, which provided a newly-acquired ice shaving machine and a rotary broom attachment on a tractor to sweep way ice slivers chopped out by the blades on turns.

## Housing Suit Moves to Federal Court

Conspiracy, fraud and the setting up of "dummy" corporations in connection with housing construction at Wurtsmith and Kinchee Air Force Bases are charged in a new lawsuit filed in federal court at Bay City.

The lawsuit, brought by Hulbert Associates, Fort Lauderdale, Florida, sub-contractor to the general contractor, J. W. Bateson Company, Dallas, Texas, was originally filed in Isoco Circuit Court. It was removed to the United States District Court on petition of the defendant Bateson firm.

Hulbert maintains Bateson misrepresented facts with intent to persuade the Florida firm to enter into contracts "impossible to perform without great pecuniary loss."

Hulbert said that because of the alleged misrepresentation, the firm entered into a subcontract of \$220,939 at Kinchee and \$383,098 at Wurtsmith. It claims losses aggregating approximately \$291,392 at Wurtsmith and \$110,570 at Kinchee. In addition, Hulbert said Bateson owes \$92,424 to that firm.

Hulbert asks for a decision awarding the firm losses derived from the alleged fraud, conspiracy and contract breaches and seeks injunctive process until the court rules.

Bateson also faces similar charges in Isoco County Circuit Court from a Flint firm, Catsman Company, Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller had ordered that a \$1,000,000 surety bond be posted by Bateson before he would lift a temporary restraining injunction against the firm, allowing it to close its government contracts.

Judge Miller said this week that there is a possibility that all cases against Bateson might be consolidated in the United States District Court.

## Need Members to Serve With CCC Committees

All members of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce will have the opportunity to serve on committees of their choosing, according to a plan presented by President Bruce Myles.

At last Wednesday night's meeting of the board of directors, Myles said that letters are to be sent to the membership asking for participation on chamber committees.

"In order to accomplish aims of the organization, active participation by the members will be needed on committees," Myles stated.

Committees to be organized include industrial, finance and budget, harbor, building and grounds, membership, program planning, publicity, fishing, hunting and yachting, to name a few.

Myles said that an industrial committee was very important to the area and that one should be reorganized immediately.

He also suggested that a resort owners committee be reorganized. This unit of the chamber was very active several years ago and Myles said that a new committee would prove to be very beneficial to the interest of resort owners.

In other business, it was the consensus of opinion that the board of directors did not have authority, nor did it deem it advisable, to overrule policies adopted by the Silver Valley Winter Sports Committee.

## Finance Program is Feature of P-TA

The P-TA program on school costs, held Monday evening at Tawas Area High School, revealed that 1,600,000 students are being educated in Michigan at a cost of three-quarter billion dollars this year.

Tawas Area enrollment last year was 1,471 students, this year there are over 1,500 students on the register. The state paid per student in 1959-60, \$183.63; taxpayers paid \$156.24; federal-state funds, \$13.42; building debt retirement, \$29.44; other sources added \$2.26, making the total funds per student at \$384.99. Harold Hammond pointed out that this amount is about \$2 in costs a day to educate a student.

Mrs. George Prescott presided over the program, posing questions to Mr. Hammond and Mrs. D. A. Evans concerning where school money comes from and how it is spent, what millage is and how property is evaluated and equalized. Reynold Mick and Russell Rollin served as resource persons.

During the business meeting, Stuart White answered the question, "What is involved in using TV classrooms?"

Mrs. Milton Barkman reported that the question concerning classes in social dancing had been referred to the student council and the student body was not interested.

Mrs. Ray Cross, mother vice president, referred a question to the board, "Is there a means other than the one we use at the present time that would work better for release time religious education?"

The only business for the February banquet meeting will be the nominating committee report. Appointed to this committee were Robert Brookbank, chairman for parents; Mrs. George Shawl, past president; Mr. Mick, teachers and administration.

Kindergarten mothers were in charge of refreshments.

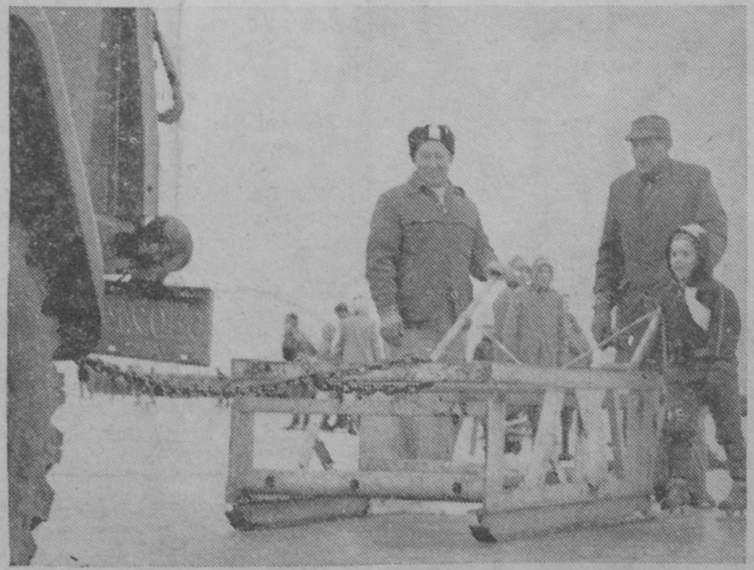
Committee appointments were announced last week by the Tawas City Businessmen's Association.

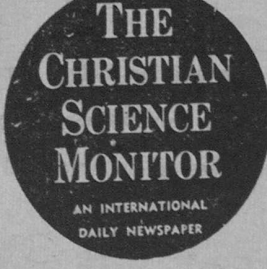

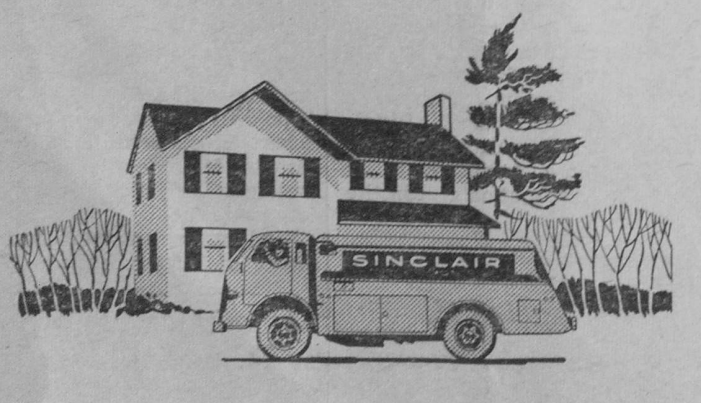

Thirty-five years ago, Nazel El Nassara, meaning "Village of the Nazarenes," was poor, backward and miserable. This village in Egypt had no schools, no social center, no means of help. It was utterly neglected by all.

A true shining light—a small church, with a young devoted pastor—brought hope to that village and neighborhood. Vital preaching, praying, Bible reading and a teaching ministry awakened the community to meet its needs through the power of the living Christ.

The village, now having 2,400 persons living in it, has become a dynamic center of useful service. It has given to Egypt more than 100 pastors, doctors, chemists, teachers and engineers, plus scores of efficient businessmen and leading officials.

Lately, it started a Laubach literacy campaign, which swept over the place and neighborhood, with a Bible team as follow-up.

What a blessing is the church in a needy world!

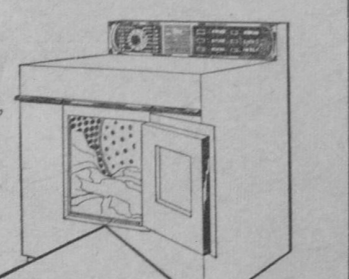

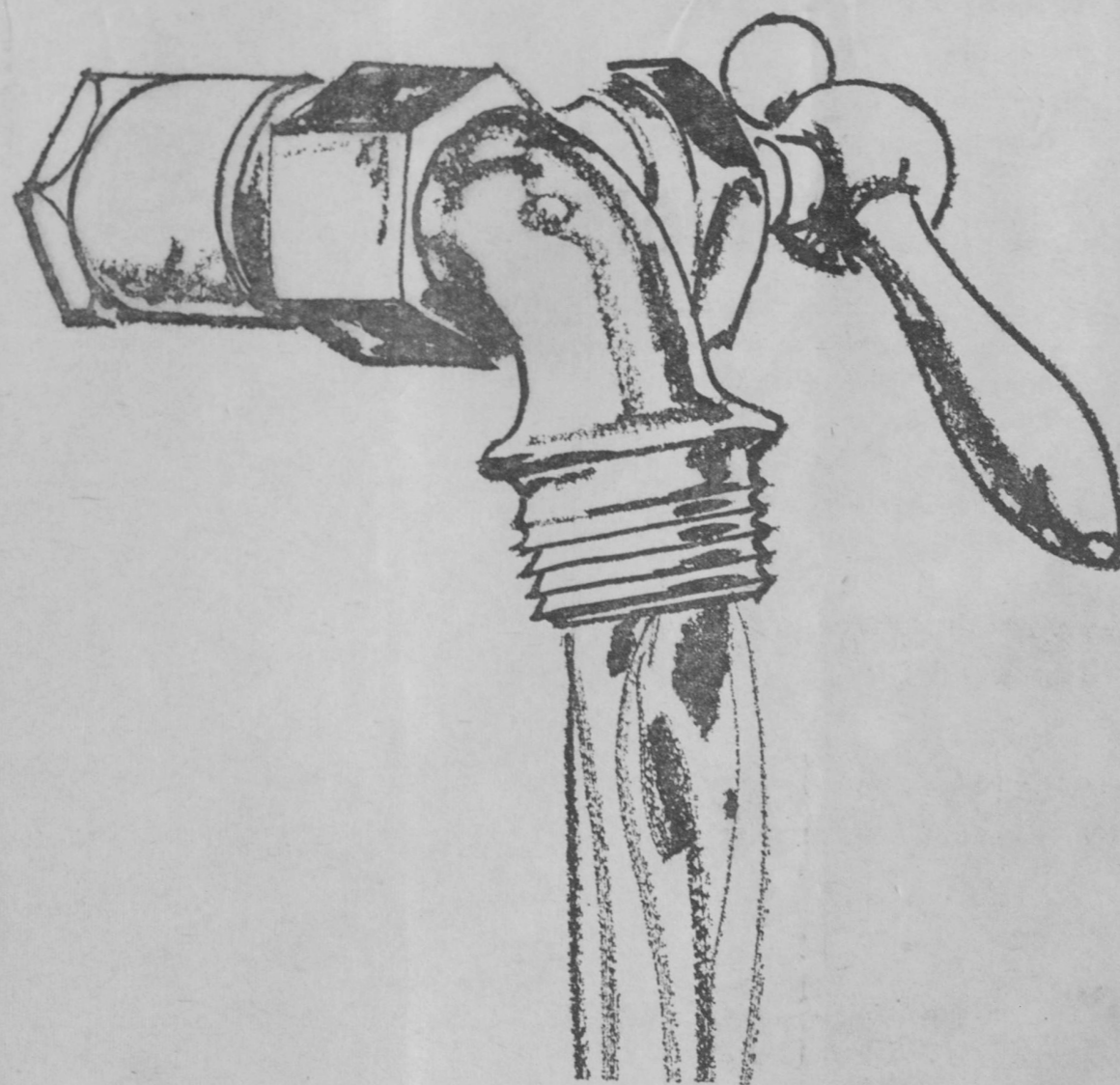

### Civil War Centennial Starts--

## Iosco Men Were Included in the Ranks of Union Blue

With a four-year observance of the centennial of the Civil War (1861-1865) now in progress, by proclamation of President Dwight D. Eisenhower, Iosco citizens may be interested to know that this county had a small part in that internecine strife.

The decennial census of 1860 had shown only 175 inhabitants here, clustered about the fishing village of AuSable and the Whitmore sawmill at Tawas City. When President Lincoln, in 1862, issued a call for registration of all men of military age in the North, there were 52 persons so qualified in Iosco County.

This listing was made by the supervisors of the two townships in the county—AuSable (or Sauble, as it was then designated) and Tawas. Oddly, it seems, each township had a registration of 26 men. County records show that Patrick Murphy, the Sauble supervisor, was paid 50 cents for his labors in registration, while Gideon O. Whittemore, the Tawas supervisor, received 52 cents. The journal of proceedings in the county clerk's office fails to show why a discrimination was made for payment for similar services rendered.

It would be interesting if this registration list could be reproduced today, but diligent search of the county clerk's records have failed to produce it. Likewise, no such record has been found at Lansing.

However, around the turn of the century, when Aaron T. Bliss of Saginaw was governor of Michigan, a compilation of the names of Michigan's 90,000 men who served in the Civil War was made. From these books have been gleaned the names of the following men, credited to Iosco

County, and the services they rendered:

George P. Vorce and Henry B. Vorce, father and son, ages 40 and 18, Tawas City. Enlisted in Company I, 24th Infantry, August 30, 1864. Joined their regiment at Weldon Railroad, Virginia, two weeks later. Mustered out at Detroit June 30, 1865. Henry Vorce was a substitute for George C. Jones. (Was he an Iosco man?) The Vorcees were farmers living in what is now termed the "ghost community of the plains," in the Huron National Forest.

Charles F. Adams, 37, drafted from Tawas September 29, 1864, and assigned to Company F, 15th Infantry. Discharged at Washington, D. C., May 30, 1865.

Andrew Oliver, 26, drafted from Tawas November 10, 1864, and assigned to Company F, 15th Infantry. Was made a sergeant June 17, 1865. Mustered out at Little Rock, Arkansas, August 13, 1865.

William Holloway, 35, drafted from Tawas September 29, 1864, and assigned to Company B, 23rd Infantry. Joined regiment at Johnsonville, Tennessee, November 12, 1864. Died January 4, 1865, and buried at National Cemetery at Chattanooga, Tennessee. Benjamin Beebe, 24, Sauble. Enlisted in Company E, 23rd Infantry, August 14, 1862. Joined regiment September 12, 1862. Made corporal November 1, 1864. Mustered out at Salisbury, North Carolina, June 28, 1865.

Richard Benaway, 27, Sauble. Enlisted in Company E, 23rd Infantry, August 5, 1862. Joined regiment September 12, 1862. Made corporal November 24, 1864. Mustered out at Salisbury, North Carolina, June 28, 1865.

Ethan G. Clark, 34, Sauble. Enlisted in Company E, 23rd Infantry, August 14, 1862. Joined regiment September 12, 1862. Mus-

tered out at Salisbury, North Carolina, June 28, 1865.

Zenas J. Colby, 34, drafted from Tawas September 29, 1864. Assigned to Company H, 23rd Infantry. Joined regiment at Johnsonville, Tennessee, November 12, 1864. Died at Washington, D. C., February 25, 1865.

Charles Gering, 21, Saginaw. Enlisted in Company E, 23rd Infantry, August 11, 1862, at Sauble. Joined regiment September 12, 1862. Mustered out at Salisbury, North Carolina, June 28, 1865.

Edward Oates, 44, drafted from Tawas September 29, 1864. Assigned to Company C, 23rd Infantry. Joined regiment at Johnsonville, Tennessee, November 12, 1864. Mustered out at Salisbury, North Carolina, June 28, 1865.

John Earl, 28, entered service in Company E, 23rd Infantry, at organization as first lieutenant August 1, 1862, at Saginaw, and commissioned the same day. Mustered out September 12, 1862, and died of disease at Frankfort, Kentucky, October 13, 1862. Although the record gives Earl's address as Harrisville, he was the supervisor of Sauble Township in 1861 and he resided at AuSable as early as 1857, when Iosco County was organized, and was elected a justice of the peace in Sauble Township.

Years later, in 1884 to be exact, Civil War veterans of the north end of the county organized a Grand Army of the Republic post there and honored Mr. Earl by giving it his name. Incidentally, one of the charter members of the post was Charles Gering, a member of Earl's regiment.

This, then, is a brief and incomplete record of the Iosco contingent of "Blair's boys in blue, who ne'er looked back," written a century after their service.

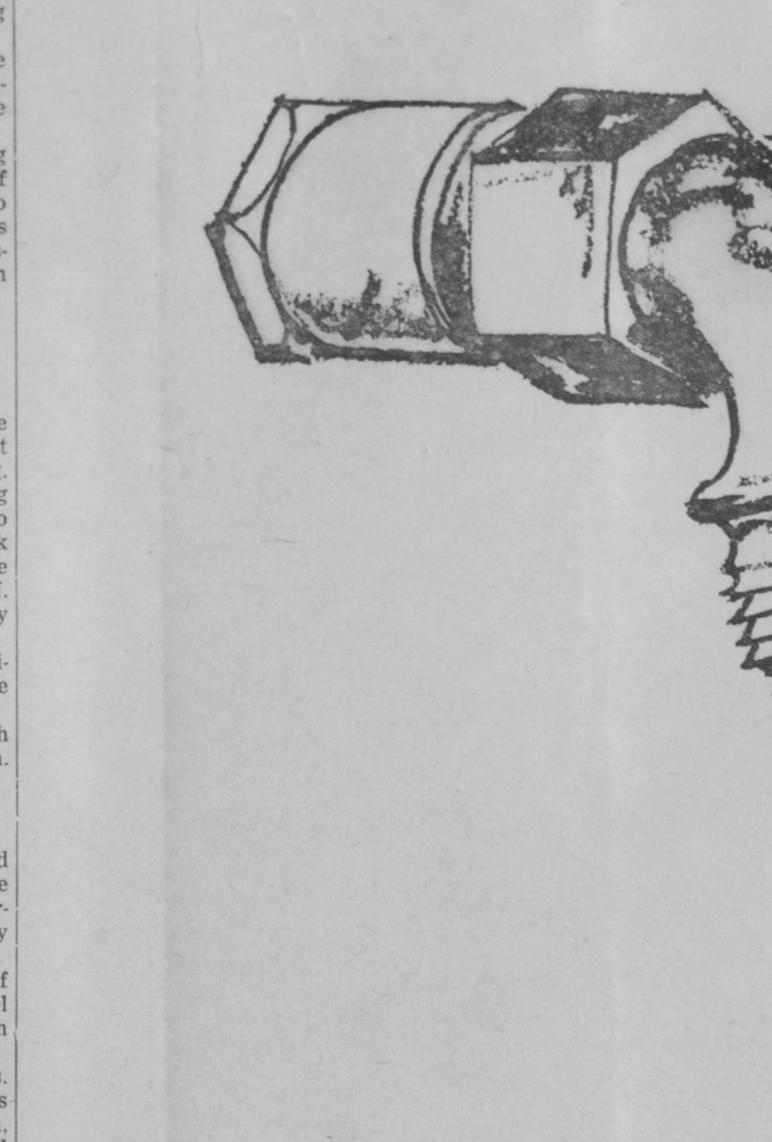

'60 Amendments Provide for Cash Disability Payments

The 1960 amendments to the Social Security Act provide for payment of cash disability benefits to qualified disabled workers regardless of age, according to Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City Social Security office. Dependents of these disabled workers may also be entitled, he added.
In order to qualify for social security disability payments, a worker must have a disability of longer-lasting and indefinite duration which prevents him from doing any substantial gainful work. He must also have worked under social security for at least five out of the 10 years before his disability began.
Mr. Ellifritz urged everyone who thinks he might be eligible for disability benefits to contact his social security office as soon as possible or a representative, who will be in Tawas City at the Iosco County Building Thursday, January 26, at 10:30 a. m.

Registration Dates Announced for CMU Adult Ed. Program

Oscoda Area Schools Adult Education Center has announced registration dates for the 14 high school courses and nine college level courses from Central Michigan University, to be offered this spring semester.
The courses are available for all qualified persons in this area, including base personnel, dependents and civilians, including present high school students.
Pre-installment for all base personnel will be conducted at the base education office from the present time through January 23.
Registration for high school courses for all persons other than military personnel shall take place at Oscoda High School January 23-24, 7:00-9:00 p. m.
Registration for CMU courses for all persons shall take place at the Oscoda High School January 26, 7:00-9:00 p. m.
The actual cost for the high school courses is \$20 per one-half Carnegie unit, plus \$1 maintenance fee and any necessary tests and materials. (A Carnegie unit is defined as equal to a full year's study in a particular subject.)
The cost for all the CMU courses shall be \$14 per semester hour.
Those teaching the courses must be certified by the Michigan Department of Public Instruction and meet accreditation standards of the Oscoda Area High School.
Classes will meet twice a week and be two hours long. Total course time will be 60 hours.
To meet the standard for graduation set by the Oscoda Area Adult Education Center, a student must have 16 Carnegie units and complete at least four of these in the program. Accredited high schools, military service schools, USAFI and other correspondence courses, and through group study classes conducted on base.

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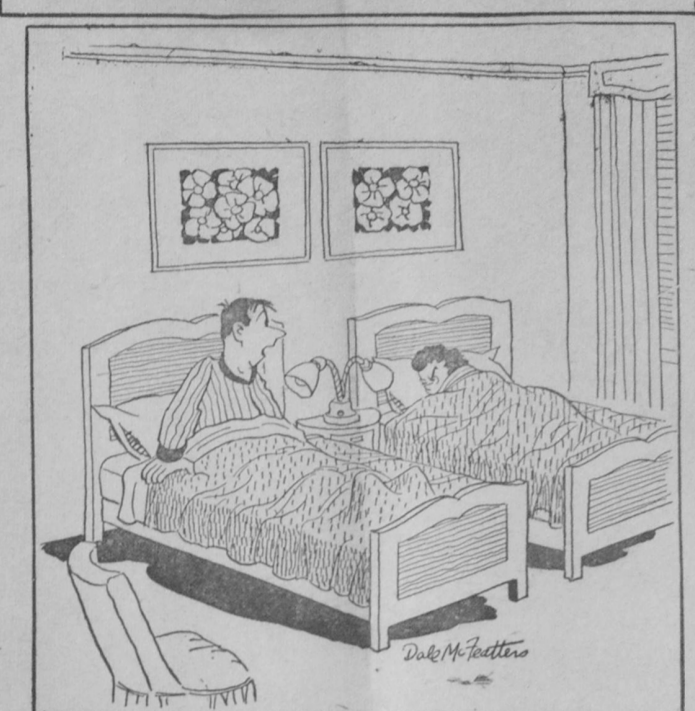
