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Farm Workers Get Natural Resources Advice on Social Security Credits

Farm workers who spend most of their working lifetime harvesting crops for others should make sure that they have a harvest of their own when old-age or disability comes along, and for their families in case of death. Their social security should be tended as if it were an important farm crop.

Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City Social Security Office, reminds farm workers that they should be looking after their social security by paying the social security tax and making sure they get credit for all of their covered farm work. This is true whether their boss is the farm owner or crew leader.

Farm work comes under social security and must be reported if the worker is paid \$150 during the year or if he works 20 days or more for time pay for one farmer or crew leader. If you work under a crew leader, he is the employer, and he must make the reports unless the farm owner agrees in writing to be the employer.

Farm workers should realize that this tax buys future retirement checks and protection for their families. Farm workers should check with their employers and make sure that the employer is reporting their wages for social security credit.

A representative of the Social Security Administration will be in Tawas City at the Iosco County Building Thursday, January 12, at 10:30 a. m. to take claims for benefits or furnish information.

Visit New Plant of National Milling & Evaporating Co.

January 1, 1960—A representative of the Herald visited the new plant of the National Milling and Evaporating Company constructed during the past few months at East Tawas. He was shown through the place by General Manager Temple Emery and was agreeably surprised at the magnitude of the industry. The main building is 100 by 323 feet and equipped with modern dry kilns and milling machinery. Frost proof storage has been provided for more than 100,000 bushels of potatoes. Other vegetables to be processed will be squash, carrots, onions and chicory. Mr. Emery was recently awarded a contract for 40,000 cans of dried potatoes for use of British troops and Africa.
