

# MacDonald Promoted to Captain by MSP

Lt. James K. MacDonald, assistant first district commander of the Michigan State Police, East Lansing, has been promoted to captain and becomes fourth district commander at Jackson effective July 15.

MacDonald is well known in the Tawas and Northeastern Michigan, having served as a trooper, later a corporal and then sergeant in command of the East Tawas post. He married the former Miss Winifred Klenow of East Tawas.

As fourth district commander, MacDonald succeeds Capt. Forest H. White, who retired after 30 years of service.

MacDonald joined the state police October 16, 1935, and served at Mt. Pleasant, East Lansing and East Tawas until April 1, 1942, when he was assigned to the special investigation squad.

On September 16, 1944, he was transferred back to the uniform division and assigned to Cheboygan. He was promoted to corporal August 15, 1948, and again assigned to the East Tawas post.

He was promoted to sergeant June 17, 1951, and given command of the Grand Haven post, where he remained until April 8, 1952, when he was transferred to command the East Tawas post. He transferred to command of the Flint post March 21, 1954.

Four persons were injured in two separate crashes over the week-end and four persons escaped injury in a two-car crash, according to reports by state police.

Russell Bankey, 32, Grand Haven, was injured Friday afternoon when the driver of a car in which he was a passenger lost control of his vehicle.

Oliver W. Bowman, 29, told officers he pulled out to pass a truck then saw another car coming toward him. He lost control as he attempted to pull back behind the truck. His car struck the right shoulder, crossed the highway and rolled over.

Three persons were injured Friday night in Sherman Township near National City.

Taken to Tawas Hospital by ambulance were Bernard A. Head, 24, driver, and his passengers, Jack L. and Dennis E. Lucas, also of Standish.

Head was ticketed for reckless driving. He said he did not remember what happened to cause his car to smash into a ditch. Lucas said that Head was driving fast, but did not know what happened to cause the crash.

Four persons escaped injury in a rear end collision south of Tawas City Saturday afternoon. A car driven by Juanita M. Turner of Royal Oak was struck from behind by a car driven by Bruce E. Everson, 17, Stark, Ohio. Everson was ticketed for violating the basic speed law.

Passengers escaping injury were Claude Turner, 34, and Joseph Parnella, 68. The latter was in Everson's car.

## Charity Island is Harbor of Refuge

Charity Island in Saginaw Bay again proved to be a harbor of refuge for a boat operator in distress last week.

Donald Johnson, 42, Royal Oak, was picked up by the coast guard's 40-foot patrol boat from Tawas Point last Thursday morning.

He had left Point Lookout the day before to go fishing. Johnson's outboard motor lost its prop, leaving him stranded in the bay. He paddled the craft to Charity Island where he spent the night.

Coast guardsmen and state police spent the night searching the shore for him after he was reported overdue, but it was not until the next morning that they were able to check the island.

He suffered no ill effects during his unscheduled overnight stay in the middle of the bay.

# Bay City Couple Stranded 36 Hours on Saginaw Bay

A Bay City grocer and his wife, who had been the subjects of an intensive sea and air search since late Sunday, were spotted Monday noon by a United States Coast Guard search plane about 5 1/2 miles off shore from Alabaster in Saginaw Bay.

A coast guard patrol boat brought Mr. and Mrs. Edward Uhrich and their 22-foot disabled cruiser to the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas about 2:00 p. m. Monday.

The Bay City couple had been stranded more than 36 hours on Saginaw Bay after the engine of their cruiser had conked out Saturday night. They anchored their craft in the bay and awaited help.

The Uhrichs had left Bay City at 8:30 o'clock Saturday night to attend sailboat races the next morning on Tawas Bay. They had postponed their trip several hours because of high winds and choppy seas Saturday afternoon.

They were accompanied by another cruiser operated by Richard Schlieff, also of Bay City.

"All of a sudden our engine conked out and the lights went off," said Uhrich, as he tied his cruiser to the moorings here.

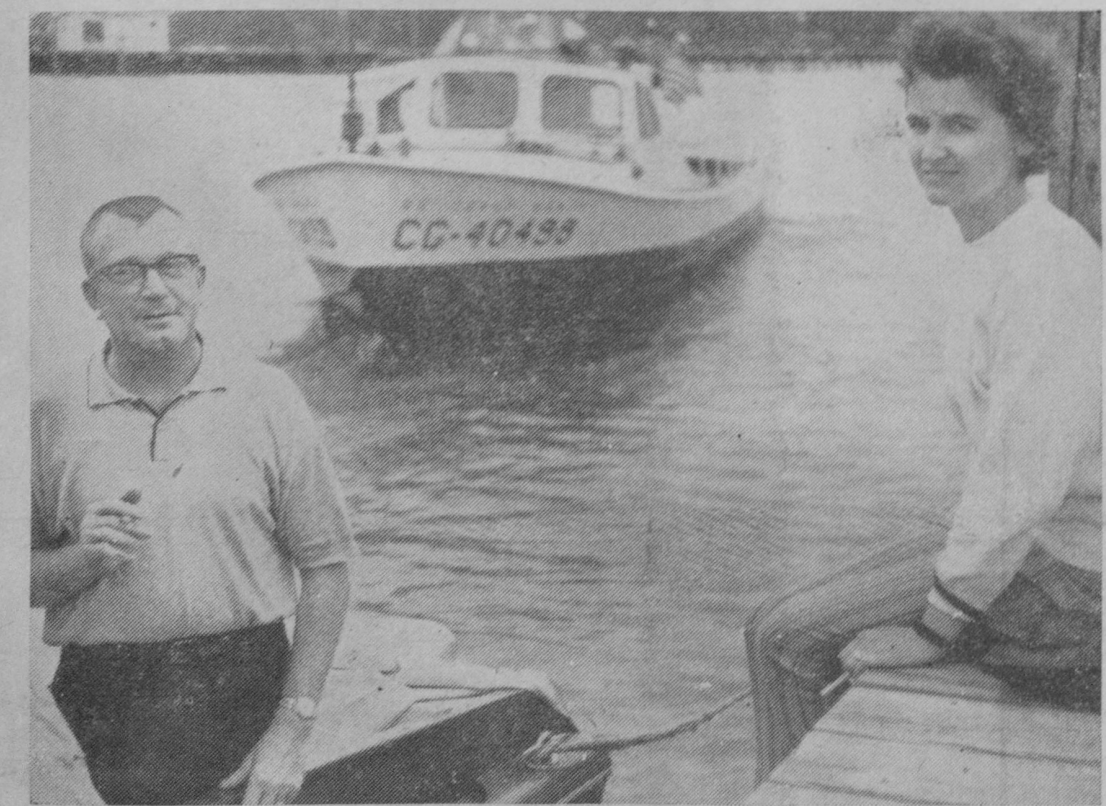
Although the Uhrichs had radio contact with the Schlieff craft prior to the engine breakdown, the battery went dead and the two-way radio would not operate.

"I shouted a couple of 'May Days' over the radio, but I guess they were not heard," said Uhrich.

Schlieff did not notice that the Uhrichs had experienced trouble and continued on to Tawas for the sailing activities. When his friends failed to make their appearance at the Tawas Bay Yacht Club harbor, Schlieff assumed they had turned about and returned to Bay City.

The Uhrichs were not reported missing until Schlieff returned to Bay City Sunday afternoon. On his arrival there, he discovered that the Uhrichs had not returned.

# Tawas Area's TAX LEVY DEFEATED

Voters of Tawas Area School District turned down a millage proposition for financing construction of needed elementary classrooms on a pay-as-you-go plan at Monday's annual school election. Both propositions lost by close margins.

District voters had been asked to approve a three-mill tax levy for a period of five years which would have raised approximately \$390,000 for the construction.

The first proposition, on which all registered electors could vote, asked to raise the district's debt limit. This lost by only 10 votes, 529 to 539.

The second proposition, a three-mill tax levy on which only taxpayers received ballots, lost by a margin of six votes, 535 to 529.

At the same time, voters re-elected Waldo Curry to the board of education. The veteran board member received a total of 622 votes to outpoll all other candidates.

The other seat on the board was won by Bruce Myles, who garnered 576 votes. James Campbell was next in line with 435 votes and Merton J. Killey had 391.

Official canvass of the votes is to be held during a special meeting of the board of education tonight (Wednesday).

An estimated 1,112 persons went to the polls. East Tawas had a turnout of 487 voters, 410 electors went to the polls in Tawas City, 147 voted at the Tawas Township Hall and 68 persons cast their ballots at the Alabaster Township Hall.

Tawas City electors gave substantial margins in favor of both propositions, No. 1 winning here by a 258 to 148 margin and No. 2 had 230 yes votes and 141 no votes.

Both propositions were rejected at East Tawas. The first lost by a 281 to 171 margin, while the second lost, 289 to 193.

Tabulations at the Tawas Township poll showed the propositions lost by a very slim majorities, No. 1 failed, 76-65, and No. 2 lost, 73-72.

The opposite was true at Alabaster, where Proposition No. 1 received 35 yes votes to 32 no votes and No. 2 received 34 yes votes to 32 no votes.

The race for the two seats on the board of education saw Curry piling up substantial totals in all precincts. He received 284 votes in Tawas City, 202 at East Tawas, 89 in Tawas Township and 47 at Alabaster.

Myles received an outstanding margin in his home precinct of Tawas City and outpollled all candidates in Alabaster. Tawas City gave him 310 votes, he received 151 at East Tawas, 65 at Tawas Township Hall and 50 at Alabaster.

Campbell made a good showing with 271 votes at East Tawas, 99 in Tawas City, 48 at Tawas Township Hall and 17 at Alabaster.

Killey received 56 votes in Tawas City, 260 in East Tawas, 60 in Tawas Township and 15 at Alabaster.

## Two Juveniles Admit Joy Ride in Speed Boats

Two 16-year-old boys, who took two speed boats from Tawas Bay Yacht Club for an early morning joy ride June 27, have been apprehended by Michigan State Police after extensive investigation.

Petitions have been filed on the two boys in Iosco County Probate Court. One is from Tawas City and the other is a Saginaw resident.

Police first learned of the incident when a 23-foot speed boat owned by Charles A. Pinkerton of Forest Glen Drive, East Tawas, was found adrift off Lixey's Dock. The craft was valued at \$8,500.

The boat had been docked at Tawas Bay Yacht Club's small craft harbor near the United States Coast Guard boathouse. The gasoline tank was empty when it was found and Pinkerton told police that it had enough fuel for about 1 1/2 hours of running time when he checked it the previous day.

Police said that a plank smashed in the hull of the craft was probably caused when it struck a solid object in the water.

Further investigation disclosed that a 16-foot outboard motor boat, owned by Fred Besancon of Detroit and also docked at the yacht club harbor, had been damaged.

# Former Bomber Pilot Guides One of Area's Top Industries

Thirteen years ago, a former air force bomber pilot and his father-in-law opened a new plant in an empty factory building on the banks of the AuGres River. Today, with four additions to the original building behind them, Bopp-Busch Manufacturing Company has grown steadily to become one of the area's principal employers.

Chester C. Busch, who piloted B-24s on bombing missions over Europe during World War II, came north deer hunting shortly after the war. He saw the empty building formerly occupied by the AuGres Tool and Die Company and immediately became interested in its possibilities.

Busch and A. J. Bopp, who formerly headed Bopp Steel Corporation of Dearborn, decided to locate their new stamping and assembly plant here. Busch, who resides with his family at Tawas Point, became president and general manager of the firm. Mr. Bopp is chairman of the board.

Established in December 1948 with one stamping order and a great deal of tenacity, the plant the modern factory which it purchased at AuGres, the company has gradually expanded over the years and now employs on the average of 50 persons.

The equipment then slits the wide rolls into whatever widths are required for jobs on hand.

"This slitting machinery makes our operation more economical because of the reduction in steel inventory," said Busch. "It has also aided us in taking on new business through its great versatility."

At its tool and die plant in Tawas City, located on Industrial Avenue, Bopp-Busch builds and maintains dies and fixtures for its plant at AuGres and also serves other manufacturing plants in the Tawas area.

Its operation at AuGres also has a direct effect on employment in the Tawas area. Many of the parts stamped at the Bopp-Busch plant are plated at Tawas Plating Company, located near the tool and die plant in Tawas City.

Four of the original five employees of the firm back in 1948, William Goodrow, Phillip Musser, Katie Schutte and Harold Freeling, have remained with the company since its founding.

Julian B. Hayes, 17, of the 379th Food Service Squadron, was treated by an Omer physician for a cut head.

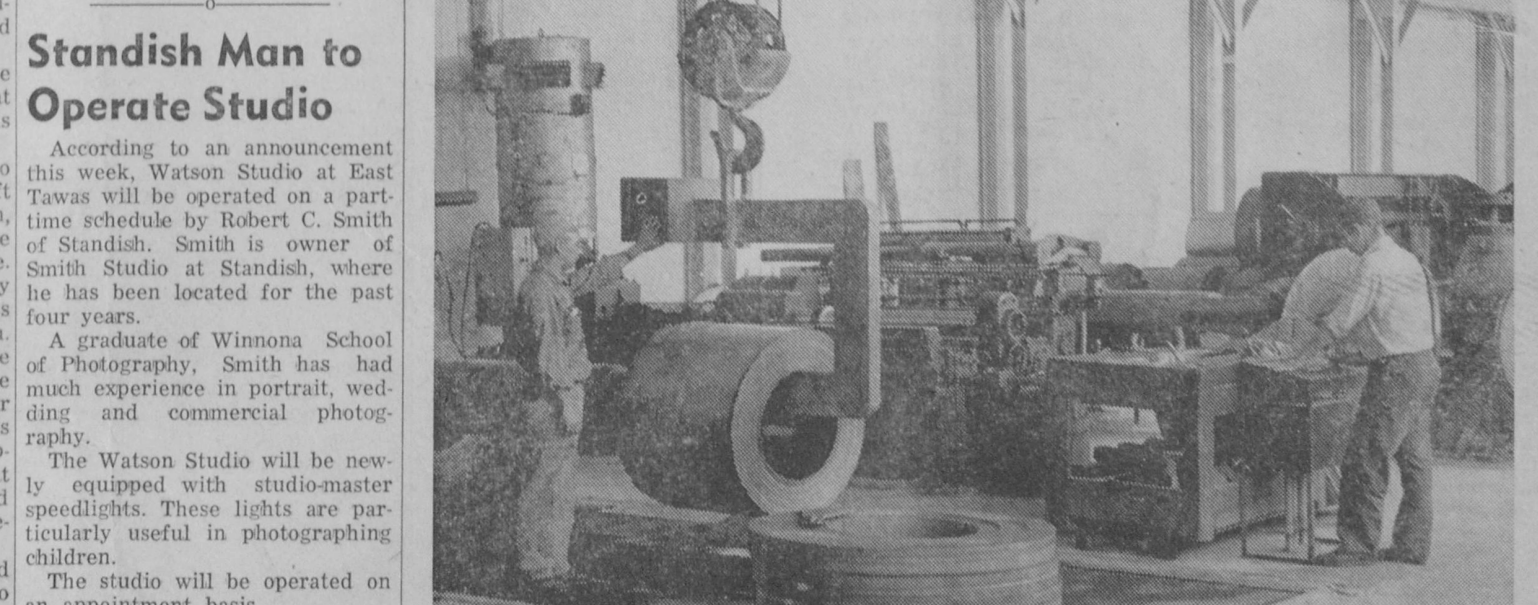

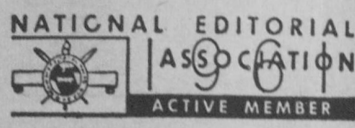

17 Drown During July 4 Holidays

Seventeen drownings over the fourth of July holiday period have brought water fatalities in the state this year to 91 as of July 5, according to the Michigan State Police.

In addition, 66 persons have suffered injuries and there have been 165 reportable water accidents. In 41 of the accidents, there was property damage only. The data is reported by all police agencies.

The deaths included 28 swimmers or waders, 16 boat passengers, 28 who fell from a bridge, dock, pier or bank, eight boat operators, one skin diver, seven who fell through the ice and three who attempted to rescue another.

State police again warned that beginning with July 4, water sports activities get into high gear with the possibility of a much heavier increase in deaths if ordinary safety precautions are not taken.

(Events exactly 100 years ago this week in the Civil War—told in the language and style of today.)

## Father and Son



WASHINGTON, D.C.—July 15—Spurred by last week's Senate action pegging \$500,000,000 for a beefed-up Army, Union recruiting specialists are going full steam ahead. A typical poster above shows a father and son preparing to leave for war together.

### Robert S. Garnett Killed; 1st General to Die in War

LEADSVILLE, Va.—July 13—Brig. Gen. Robert S. Garnett of the Confederate army was killed in action at nearby Corrick's Ford today.

Garnett, 42, was the first general on either side to die since the beginning of the war between the states. He fell, a Union cannonball in his back, during final mop-up action in the battle for Rich Mountain.

Garnett, a West Point graduate and former Union army officer, was promoted to brigadier general only a few days ago by Gen. Robert E. Lee.

HE WAS SENT into Western Virginia with orders to save this strategic area from efforts of superior-force Union troops under Gen. George M. McClellan to seize it.

A stern, forbidding man, Garnett had an enviable record in the Union army.

Tragedy marked his career. While stationed at Fort Simcoe, in the Washington territory wilderness, he returned from a patrol against hostile Indians to find his wife and children dead.

#### Defeated By McClellan

Garnett had commanded the garrison of some 4,000 Rebels that abandoned their posts in Rich and Cheat mountains in the face of a vastly superior force led by McClellan.

Earlier today, Garnett learned that some 500 men under command of Lt. Col. John Pegram, cut off from the main Southern army, had surrendered at Rich Mountain.

GARNETT was at that time under hectic attack on Laurel Hill. He began a retreat and, while personally supervising the crossing of his men at a ford, was struck by a Union mine ball.

He died as Northern troops surged into his position. With Garnett's death went the last vestige of Southern resistance to McClellan's advancing regiments.

Remaining units of the 4,000-man force took off in full retreat toward the Shenandoah Valley. The ill-fated campaign cost the Rebels at least 700 men.

### Union Army Numbers 225,000

WASHINGTON, D.C.—July 14—The Union army's strength as of today has grown to 225,000, according to Secretary of War Cameron. Of these, 64 volunteer regiments of 900 men, plus 1,200 regulars, are deployed in and around Washington.

### ROTC Cadets in Officer Training Corps at Fort Riley

Cadets Kenneth M. Lixey, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mervin M. Lixey of East Tawas, and Kenneth J. Myles, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Myles of Tawas City, are receiving six weeks of training at the Reserve Officer Training Corps, ROTC, summer camp at Fort Riley, Kansas. The training is scheduled to be concluded July 28.

During this training, the cadets are receiving practical experience and instruction in tactical, technical and administrative subjects, with special emphasis placed on the duties of a second lieutenant in an infantry unit.

Both Cadets Lixey and Myles are students at Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant, and 19-58 graduates of Tawas Area High School.

A six-month intensive training course in nuclear theory ended June 22 for a select group of navy-men at the Naval Submarine Base, New London, Connecticut.

Among those completing the basic nuclear power class was Ronald B. Chaney, machinist's mate first class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert O. Chaney of Tawas City.

The task of the Submarine School's nuclear power department is to train officer and enlisted students in the theoretical knowledge, construction and operation of submarine nuclear power plants. Training includes advanced mathematics and physics, nuclear systems and electronics.

Students completing the course are now undergoing a second six-month training phase in plant operation at land-based nuclear reactors before being assigned to a nuclear navy vessel.

### 'What If?' .. An Important Question to Prevention

The memory of the fire on the aircraft carrier, Constellation, still burns brightly. A three-year project, 90 percent complete; then a fork lift truck sheared off the valve of a 500-gallon tank of jet fuel, the fuel flows down an elevator shaft where a welder is at work... then rivers of flame, pouring every which way. And when it is all over, 46 dead, 100 million dollars up in smoke, a year's solid work by thousands of men, rubbed out.

In almost every catastrophe, there is a simple thing or two that could have been done to prevent the fateful chain reaction, or stop it short of its terrible climax. If that tank valve had been protected. If the fuel had been stored in a different place. If one person had foreseen the possibility and done something about it, we would be 46 lives and 100 million dollars ahead of where we are today.

It is far easier looking back than looking ahead. But if we would keep trying to look ahead, think ahead and always with that big question, "what if...?" in our minds, who knows what we might save ourselves, or save others.

If we would only think to snuff

out the spark, tighten up the loose bolt, adjust the guard, read the instructions on the label, slow up at the blind corner, put the aspirin out of the baby's reach. Beforehand, it is quick and easy; afterwards, it is beyond all human reach, all human knowledge—beyond every power we have ever known, or will know.

Beforehand, the little things are sometimes hard to see—but they are seldom completely invisible; and even if they are, they can still be visualized with a little imagination, with a little double-checking sparked by that important question, "What if...?" (Reprinted from Between the Lines.)

As he had supposed. An immediate search was started by coast guard stations at Tawas Point and Bay City.

Assisting in the search of the shore line were Michigan State Police from East Tawas, Iosco and Arenac County Sheriff's Departments.

"We were not worried at any time," said Uhrich. "We knew that sooner or later we would be spotted by another boat or a search plane."

They had provisioned their boat with a supply of canned food before starting on the trip.

Despite the fact that several cruisers passed the disabled craft Sunday, the plight of the Bay City couple went unnoticed.

"We tried to attract the at-

tentation of passing boats by waving life jackets and a flag," stated Mrs. Uhrich. They even removed a mirror from the lavatory wall and tried to use the reflected sun rays to attract attention, but to no avail.

"We had talked of bringing some signal flares along with us in case of an accident, but they were in Schlieff's boat," said Uhrich.

After being anchored for 1 1/2 days in the same location, a coast guard amphibious patrol plane from Traverse City spotted the disabled craft off Alabaster. Other coast guard vessels in the area were immediately dispatched by radio to that area and the Uhrichs were towed to Tawas.

The Uhrichs were to make repairs to their cruiser here and return to Bay City later Monday.

"I don't know if I want to make the return trip by boat or not after that week-end," stated Mrs. Uhrich.

Editorial— PROPOSITION SHOULD BE RE-SUBMITTED

With a very narrow margin of defeat in Monday's tax levy proposition, publishers of this newspaper are of the opinion that the Tawas Area Board of Education should re-submit the propositions to voters in the very near future...

Only 1,112 persons showed enough interest to vote. This was a rather poor showing. No one can say that he did not know that July 10 was the day for the annual school election.

Defeat of this pay-as-you-go proposition is a great disappointment to those interested in the welfare of our children and schools. It is not the first time that school propositions have failed, however.

When one looks at present-day inadequate facilities for elementary grades here, and then examines statistics which show that junior and senior high school facilities are bulging at the seams at present and will overflow in the next five years, it can be seen that there is a REAL NEED for this expansion program.

Every elector who voted "no" on the two propositions should re-examine his reasons for so doing. Perhaps, he should visit elementary buildings in the district and see for himself. School enrollment figures as published by the board are correct. All one has to do is visualize the number of youngsters crowded into these classrooms.

The proposition would also have furnished a much needed general purpose room and kitchen facilities at the East Tawas unit.

Until someone figures out a way to get something for nothing, and this is an impossibility, we still are of the opinion that the five-year tax levy of three mills is the best possible method financing this particular construction.

Classrooms are needed now and the saving in interest rates under this plan, rather than a long-term bonding proposition, far outweighs any argument about letting the next generation pay for schools.

What is needed now is about 25 or 30 influential persons in each community, who are interested in the welfare of schools and the education of their youngsters, to step forward and help the board of education to put this proposition across.
