

Annual Iosco Co. Fair Starts Next Wednesday

Exhibits, harness racing, mid-way, square dancing, games and contests will feature the annual Iosco County Fair which will be held at Hale next week, Wednesday through Saturday.

According to Thurman Scofield, secretary-manager, exhibits will be assembled from 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. Wednesday.

Thursday's activities will be devoted to judging exhibits from 9:00 a. m. to 1:00 p. m. Midway activities are scheduled to open at 4:00 p. m. Thursday and run through Saturday.

On Thursday morning, there will be a pig scramble in which both boys and girls may participate.

There will be three days of harness racing. A traditional part of an agricultural fair, prize money for the 1961 events will total \$12,000.

A 4-H program will begin at 8:00 p. m. Friday with a dress revue and entertainment being furnished by 4-Hers.

A gymkhana for sports cars will be held Friday afternoon at the grandstand.

Saturday's program will include games and contests for all ages starting at 10:00 a. m.; a parade at 12:30 p. m. and a square dance from 9:00 to 12:00 p. m. sponsored by the Western Square Dance Club.

Plainfield Township's new hall will be used by the fair for the first time. The new facility will add greatly to the fair for exhibitions and attractions.

The fair premium list includes sections for exhibition of livestock, poultry, farm produce, flowers and plants, home economics, domestic arts, antiques and conservation.

In addition, there will be exhibitions by 4-H Club members. Premiums will be awarded to 4-H members in the following sections: Clothing, conservation appreciation, forest conservation, wildlife conservation, dairy, entomology, flower garden, foods, food preservation, handicraft, home improvement, junior leadership, knitting, beef, sheep, swine.

Cooperation of Boat Owners Pleases Mayor

Full cooperation from boat owners in complying with East Tawas' water front ordinance was reported to the city council Monday night. In addition to governing operation of watercraft near the shore, the ordinance prohibits dumping of garbage and refuse into the bay.

Mayor C. V. Miller stated Tuesday that he was very pleased with this report and emphasized the need for continued vigilance on the part of boat owners to preserve present adequate sanitary conditions in the bay.

The city council is to ask permission from the waterways commission to post a copy of its ordinance on the dock.

In other business, the council discussed the proposed food handling ordinance and improvements to Wood Street.

Plat of Haddix and Burnhardt Subdivision was approved by the council. This was part of the Dimmick Addition to East Tawas and has been re-subdivided. Approval had been pending for about two years.

Building permits approved were Girard Schiell, garage; Wayne Vaughan, patio; Carl Babcock, remove building and make addition; O. E. Ostrander, garage.

Applications for remodeling were approved for Grace Quattlebaum, Emil Frisch, Carl Helmer, James DeRosia and Elmer Carpenter.

Subdivision Hearing Set for Wednesday

Hearing on a petition to vacate a portion of Huron Gardens Subdivision will be heard in Iosco County Circuit Court Wednesday.

Date for the hearing was set at a pre-trial held last Tuesday before Visiting Judge Philip Glennie, who presides by appointment.

Iosco Judge Allan C. Miller has disqualified himself from hearing the cause. He had acted as city attorney for Tawas City when the subdivision was accepted.

Saginaw Man Sought by Police

A warrant has been issued by Prosecuting Attorney William McCready charging a Saginaw man with theft of a 30 horsepower outboard motor owned by O. S. Rose of Tawas City.

Through investigation of City Police Chief George Ruth, it was learned that the motor, stolen last Wednesday from Rose's boat at the Tawas River mouth, had been pawned at Saginaw.

The motor was recovered Monday by Chief Ruth and Under Sheriff Leon Putnam of the Iosco County Sheriff's Department. The two officers were unable to locate the whereabouts of Norman Lewis, who allegedly stole the motor and whose name was signed on the pawn ticket.

The Saginaw man has been identified by the pawnbroker through pictures obtained from the Saginaw Police Department.

Tax Levy Proposal to be Resubmitted to Voters

Electors of Tawas Area School District will again vote on a three-mill tax proposition for financing construction of needed elementary classrooms on a pay-as-you-go plan.

At a special meeting last Wednesday night, the board of education decided to resubmit the question to voters at a special election August 24.

The board also reorganized for the coming year. William Look Sr. was named president to replace Stuart White, who decided he would not run for re-election.

Other officers named were Leonard Sarki, president pro tem; Harold Hammond, treasurer; Walter Niles, secretary; Joseph Dimmick, secretary pro tem.

The two other board members are Waldo Curry and Bruce Myles, who were elected last week.

The three-mill tax levy for a period of five years was turned down at last Monday's annual election.

The first proposition, on which all registered electors could vote, asked to raise the district's debt limit. This lost by only 10 votes, 429 to 439.

The second proposition, a three-mill tax levy on which only taxpayers were to receive ballots, lost by a margin of six votes, 535 to 529.

Only 1,112 persons went to the polls in the election. East Tawas had a turnout of 487 votes, 410 electors voted at Tawas City, 147 cast ballots at the Tawas Township Hall and 68 persons voted at the Alabaster Township Hall.

Myles Runs for Con-Con Slot in July 25 Election

A background of a quarter of a century in government and 15 years in business is offered by George W. Myles of Tawas City as qualifications for the Republican nomination for delegate to the Constitutional Convention from the 29th Senatorial District in the July 25 primary.

For the past 15 years, Mr. Myles has been engaged in the insurance business in Tawas City. Previous to that, he served eight years as superintendent of public works and seven years as mayor of that city. He also served six years on the board of education and on the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.

In 1960, Mr. Myles was supervisor of census for the 10th congressional district.

A lifelong resident of Tawas City, Myles is married and has five children. Two of his sons are presently associated with him in business.

"I feel that my background of public affairs, including city, school and county government, and in business will enable me to be of service to the people of the district and the State of Michigan as a delegate to the Constitutional Convention," Myles said.

State Approves 6 Picnic Tables at Tawas Point

Michigan Conservation Commission has authorized placement of six picnic tables and six trash barrels on state-owned property at Tawas Point for the remainder of the summer. The tables are to be placed there Saturday.

At last Wednesday's meeting of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, it was learned that a group of East Tawas businessmen had approached the department of conservation asking the state to make the recently acquired point property available for day use.

Idea of the businessmen was to utilize the property for picnic and bathing purposes. Tawas Point has frontage on both Lake Huron and Tawas Bay.

The property was purchased from the federal government last winter for use as a future state park.

At present, the East Tawas State Park is overcrowded and the businessmen were of the opinion that additional facilities at the point would relieve the congestion.

It was stated at last week's meeting that the department had agreed to open the park for limited use if garbage pick-ups could be obtained.

Tuesday's action was taken after Baldwin Township agreed to furnish twice-a-week garbage pick-ups at the point property. No grills are to be installed due to the lack of supervision.

William Kusey, ranger at the East Tawas park, said that the department was presently working on a master plan for development of the Tawas Point property.

National Gypsum Expands at Alpena

National Gypsum Company plans to invest \$72,000,000 in the next 14 years to double the capacity of its huge Huron Portland Cement mill at Alpena, Chairman Melvin H. Baker disclosed today.

The Alpena mill, with a present annual capacity of 12 million barrels, is believed to be the world's largest cement plant.

President H. Ripley Schemm of National's Huron Division announced that the company will build a new cement distributing plant at Waukegan, Illinois. Construction is expected to begin soon on the plant which will have a storage capacity of 150,000 barrels.

It will be the Huron's 13th distributing plant and will be built on water front property leased from the Waukegan Port District. The property is adjacent to National Gypsum's quarter-mile-long Waukegan gypsum products plant built in 1959.

Engineer Reports— Bridge Work Would Cost City \$83,100

A report from Spicer Engineering Company, Saginaw, has revealed that replacement of three bridges over Tawas River would cost Tawas City approximately \$83,100.

The engineering firm came up with this amount after making a field inspection and study of bridges located at Mathews Street, Whittemore Street and First Street.

A copy of the report was given to each councilman present at Monday night's session by Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz. No official discussion or action was taken.

Spicer recommended that the Mathews Street bridge be widened from 20 feet, two inches, to 30 feet in order to allow for the free flow of traffic. The report stated that a design check proved that present trusses could not carry minimum design loading and widening the existing structure is not feasible.

Cost of building a new superstructure, substructure and approaches, leaving existing abutments to act as back walls, would be \$30,267.

Spicer recommended that the Whittemore bridge be removed as the substructure is an obstruction to the stream flow, the existing roadway is too narrow for two lanes of traffic and existing structural members are not capable of supporting the present highway loadings. Cost of replacement would be \$33,870.

It was also recommended that the First Street bridge be removed as the substructure is cracked and is undermined, the concrete deck needs replacing and the existing roadway is too narrow for two traffic lanes. Cost of replacing this bridge, using structural steel beam stringers which are in good shape, would be \$18,963.

Board OK's Establishment of Tawas Lake Tax District

Establishment of a special assessment district to finance the cost of engineering and eventual construction of a dam to control the level of Tawas Lake was authorized by the board of supervisors at its meeting Tuesday.

Although the board had given its approval to such a district some months ago, County Drain Commissioner Bert Stickney, it was stated, had been uncertain as to the method of financing preliminary engineering costs.

Former prosecuting attorney, Paul Harvey, who represents the Tawas Lake Area Association, addressed the board and urged adoption of a resolution calling for the special tax district. Drain Commissioner Stickney is to present this prior to the October session.

Harvey reported that Scott Engineering Company of Alpena had been retained as engineers for the project. Services of this firm would be approximately \$2,000. All costs involved would be charged to the special assessment district.

Supervisor L. S. Little pointed out that it would be important to determine the townships and taxpayers to be affected by such a district. It was stated that the drain commissioner would have a full report on this when assessment rolls are presented.

Also discussed was the recent bill, House Bill No. 132, which was signed into law during the last session of the legislature by Gov. John B. Swainson. State Rep. James Mielock was instrumental in pushing this legislation and it originated in Iosco County during discussion on the much debated dam on Tawas Lake.

According to Harvey, the revised law "does not" differ substantially from the old one, but it does spell out certain legal procedures for establishment of an assessment district for financing construction.

Under the law, maintenance and upkeep of such a dam is chargeable to the special assessment district.

Decision to go ahead with establishment of a special assessment district received a unanimous vote from the supervisors during a call from the chair.

Legal level of Tawas Lake was established several years ago by former circuit judge, Herman Dehnke.

Submit Electrical Code to Attorney for Study

According to action taken by the city council Monday night, Tawas City will soon adopt an electrical ordinance similar to the one now in effect at East Tawas.

Following presentation of East Tawas' electrical code by Arthur Wegner, ordinance committee chairman, a discussion followed between councilmen, Mayor George Tuttle, City Attorney Jerry Cotter and two visitors, Ronald Korthals and John St. James.

Korthals is the electrical inspector at East Tawas and has been asked to serve in the same capacity here. St. James is a licensed electrical contractor.

During the discussion, Korthals said that because of the increased use of electricity in homes, a hazardous condition exists because of the overloading of circuits. He said that progressive communities are going along with a means of rigid inspection of new electrical wiring in order to lessen the danger to homeowners.

"Whether this city needs such an ordinance at present may be a question but it will need one in a very short time," stated Korthals.

The proposed ordinance would provide for the licensing of electrical contractors under existing state laws. All electrical work would require a permit and inspection, but would not prohibit a homeowner from doing his own wiring, should he choose to do so. He would be required to obtain a permit, however, and have his work inspected.

The sample ordinance was turned over to City Attorney Cotter for study. One paragraph would be added to the East Tawas ordinance. This would provide that all electrical wiring would require a permit and inspection, regardless of the cost.

Under the proposed ordinance, unlicensed electrical contractors here would have a year to obtain a state license which requires an examination.

In other business, the council heard a complaint from Paul Chevis of Bay Drive, who questioned the legality of renting a home in a class A residential district for a short period of time.

Chevis stated that a house is being rented in his neighborhood on a week-to-week basis and believed this to be contrary to the zoning ordinance. His complaint was to the effect that a nuisance was being created by boisterous parties at a late hour.

City Attorney Cotter said that such a condition was not covered under the zoning ordinance but could be handled under the city's nuisance ordinance if a complaint was made through justice court.

The city is to write to the Michigan Municipal League in an effort to obtain information concerning the problem.

Bruce Myles, president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, addressed the council and asked that the city credit its \$100 donation to the East Michigan Tourist Association to the chamber's ad in the Playtime Guide. Both cities are benefited by the chamber's ad and Myles felt that the donation to EMTA could be put to better use by assisting the chamber. The council is to check with EMTA regarding this matter.

Two building permits were approved by Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz during the past week. One permit approved was for Mrs. Clara E. Eich, Third Avenue, construct 36 by 40 home and 16 by 20 garage. Estimated cost was \$18,000. Another permit was for Matthew E. Hoag, 924 Lake, 25 by 34 garage, \$900.

"From all reports, this regatta promises to be one of the finest week-ends of sailing during the entire summer," states Commodore Charles C. Kurtzbeck.

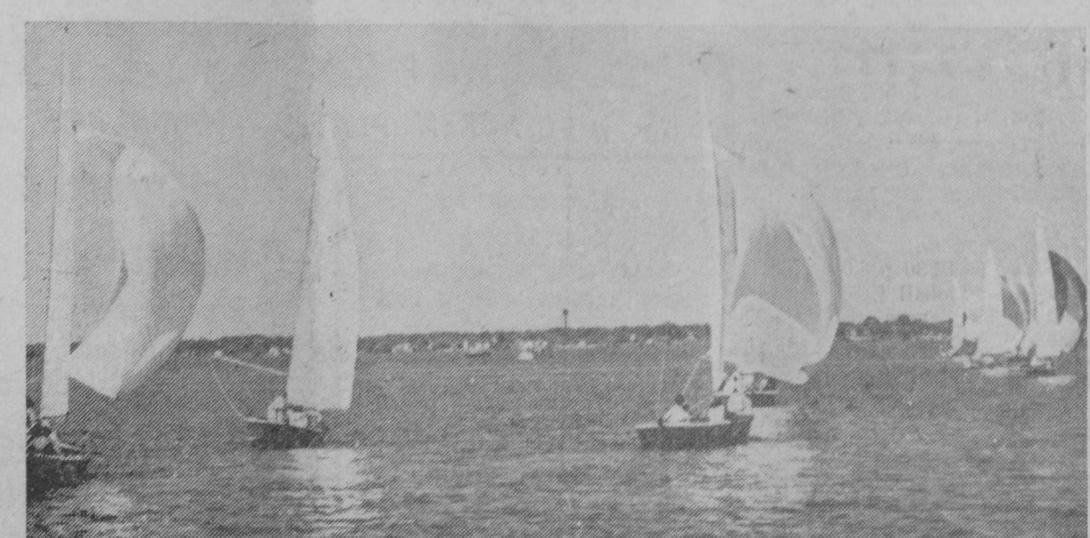

As a special feature for spectators, former players are urged to bring old pictures of teams, old scorebooks and newspaper articles which might be of interest to those attending.

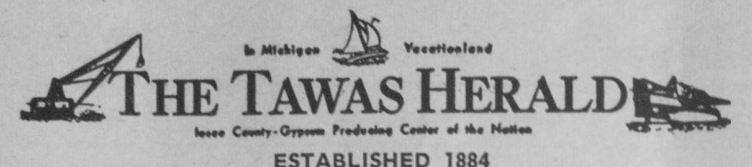

But whatever they are, the results of Monday's voting reveal either an electorate that is unaware of the facts of life or else who just don't give a darn about the education of our children.

I am inclined toward the observation that if the local tax body cannot or will not take care of its own obligations, then control will pass into the hands of the state and ultimately the federal government. And THEN there will be some taxes to gripe about. The farther away the governing body is from a local situation, the more opportunity there is for graft and inefficiency.

I would like to commend our school board and the administration in the Tawas Area for the excellent school system that they have provided us thus far without EXCESSIVE TAXATION. I hope that they will keep hitting this thing until enough concerned people see that the needed funds are provided.

(Events exactly 100 years ago this week in the Civil War—told in the language and style of today.)

Confederates Defeat Federals at Bull Run

Green Union Forces in Full Rout; Terror-Stricken Troops Clog Streets

WASHINGTON—July 21—The nation's capital was stunned today by the utter defeat of Federal troops by Confederate forces at Bull Run, a sleepy, gentle creek near Manassas Junction, some 25 miles southwest of here.

It was the first major setback for Union troops since the war with the secessionists began. Washington's usual Sunday evening peace was shattered as panic-stricken units of the routed forces filled the streets.

"We have lost the day—and it's a damned bad loss," cried one Union cavalry officer to a crowd of curious correspondents.

EARLY casualty figures were staggering. First reports put Federal losses at 7,450 men.

McDowell, it was reliably reported, took two days to coax his amateur army to the scene.

Then he roused them at 2 a. m., groggy and scared, to launch the ill-fated offensive.

BATTLEFIELD reports were strong in praise of one Confederate officer, Col. Thomas J. Jackson, whose troops held firm under a vicious pounding.

Officials conceded that the Union "missing" figure includes hundreds of raw, three-month recruits who simply ran from the conflict, shedding field packs and arms as they bolted.

Manassas is a strategic rail junction considered "the gateway to Richmond" by Union leaders.

THE DAY began as a picnic for scores of Congressmen and other politicians who went with their giggling ladies by coach to Manassas to watch the action.

These well-horsed sightseers, dripping wet with the bad news, were among the first to reach here after the rout.

President Lincoln is reported to have told one: "Congratulations; you have beaten the Army back." The chief executive, crushed by the stampeding of his troops, reportedly has ordered a major reorganization of the Army of the Potomac.

Leaders of this Army are widely reported to have been reluctant to mount the attack with their untrained units, but local pressure for a show of strength against Southern forces has been strong.

WHAT HAPPENED? Answers vary widely in this chaotic city tonight, but it appears that Federal troops under Irvin McDowell fell back under

Social Security Changes Give Earlier Benefits

The new amendments to the social security law, signed by President J. F. Kennedy last week, give men early benefit rights similar to those women have had since 1956.

The change applies to men between 62 and 65 years of age and is designed especially to help those who are unable to find employment because of their age or poor health.

A man now 62 to 65 years of age can start receiving benefits with the month of August. But if he retires before he reaches age 65, the monthly amount of benefit paid to him is reduced.

Dependent widowers and the dependent fathers of workers who have died also can get benefits at age 62. Their benefits, like those of widows and dependent mothers, are not reduced.

For men who retire early, the amount by which their benefits will be reduced depends on the number of months for which they will receive benefits while still under 65.

A worker who retires and claims his benefits as soon as he reaches 62 will qualify for 80 percent of the amount that would be payable to him at age 65 based on his average earnings up until his retirement.

If he waits until he is 63, he will get 86 2/3 percent of his full benefit; and if he waits until 64, the amount will be 93 1/3 percent.

The reductions are figured so that a person may expect to receive, on the average, about the same amount if he takes reduced benefits beginning before he is 65, or waits until 65.

Members of the immediate family of a retired worker can get dependent benefits if the worker retires at 62 or if he waits. Eligible dependents include a wife 62 or older, or a wife at any age if she has in her care, children who are eligible for benefits.

The child of a retired worker is eligible if he is under age 18, or if he has been totally disabled since childhood.

The committee on finance of the senate, in recommending this change in the law, said, "The provision of benefits at age 62 for men will help to alleviate the hardship faced by that group of men, because of ill health, automation, or other technological change, are forced into premature retirement before age 65."

Tawas City faces about the same situation as that encountered by the county in recent years.
