



EDITORIAL-

IMPORTANT SCHOOL ISSUES

Next week's annual school election is of prime importance to voters of Tawas Area School District.

Two new trustees will be named to the board of education and electors will decide on a proposed three-mill tax levy for five years to finance construction of needed classrooms.

Although this editorial will first take into consideration the tax levy proposal, both issues are of equal importance

Much has been said in recent weeks about the need for additional classrooms to handle the ever expanding enrollment of Tawas Area School District. The matter has been covered fully in recent news articles, but there is need to set forth the importance of this proposal.

There is no question that classrooms of Tawas Area School District are overcrowded, particularly in the elementary grades. Although the influx of Wurtsmith personnel has had some effect on school population, it is not the real reason for overcrowded conditions. The major cause is due to the area's normal growth in recent years, as shown by the 1960 census . . . taken some months prior to the actual impact of base expansion.

Existing school facilities in Tawas Area are able to handle 1,504 children without crowding. During the 1960-61 school year, there were 1,545 children (an increase of 10 percent) crowded into these facilities. By 1969-70, the best possible estimates will see an enrollment of 1,873 children, or a 35 percent overcrowded condition.

The need for additional classroom space is evident when one takes the above figures into consideration.

As to the method of financing such an expansion program, it is our opinion that the proposed "pay-as-you-go plan" is the best by far . . . and it will deliver immediate results. In the long run, when one considers that the district is faced with a real need for expanding school facilities, the three-mill tax levy would eliminate high interest rates which go along with a long term obligation bond issue.

Some may argue that finance should be spread over a longer period of time, but the fact that the pay-as-you-go plan will deliver immediate results at a 63 percent savings more than offsets the reasoning behind this theory.

Therefore, this newspaper urges a favorable vote on the question of raising the debt limit and establishment of a sinking fund (three-mill tax levy over a period of five Alpena. years) to finance this construction on the pay-as-you-go




Existing school facilities in Tawas Area are able to handle 1,405 children without crowding. During the 1960-61 school year there were 1,545 children -- an increase of 10 percent -- crowded into these facilities, which are literally bursting at the seams. By 1969-70, the best possible estimates will see an enrollment of 1,873 children, or a 35 percent overcrowded condition.


First Stage . . 1962



THE FIRST STAGE would be to erect a sixclassroom and kitchen unit adjacent to the existing Tawas City gymnasium. This would

be done in 1962, provided approval of the project is given by voters July 10.

Second Stage . . 1963-1964



THE SECOND STAGE would provide for the construction of a general purpose room and kitchen at the East Tawas unit and the completion of the Tawas City elementary unit by the addition of four more classrooms. This would completely cover the anticipated needs of the elementary grades and would

result in all of them attending these two units. The seventh and eighth grades would go to the Alabaster unit, leading toward the ultimate goal of a separate junior high school. The general purpose room at the East Tawas unit would also provide that community with a greatly-needed auditorium.

Third Stage . . 1965-1966

THE THIRD STAGE would provide for the construction of a junior high school unit and the complete separation of the junior and

senior high schools. This will allow abandonment of the Alabaster unit, which will have outlived its usefulness by that time.

Facts Prove Pay-As-You-Go Plan WOULD SAVE MONEY!

FACTS PROVE that under the Pay-As-You-Go Plan worked out by the board and committee, the projects listed above would be immediately possible at the least cost to the taxpayers of the district. It has been proven that a 25-year bond issue would result in an interest cost of 63 percent, or enough money to construct 13 additional classrooms. The three-mill tax would raise \$78,000 the first year. This would enable the construction proj

ect (First Stage) to get under way by 1962. The second year another \$78,000 (more if new construction continues at the present pace) and would provide funds for the Second Stage. The next three years would bring the total amount available to in excess of \$390,000 which, it is believed, will more than cover the cost of the proposed program, without heavy interest charges being paid.

BEVERLY, Va.—July 11—Evacuation by Southern forces of the strategic Western Virginia mountains appeared certain today after a decisive Union victory at nearby Rich Mountain.

Three brigades of Federal troops

commanded by Maj. Gen. George B. McClellan drove a Confederate unit of some 4,000 men into retreat after two days of fighting amid the crags of the Rich and Cheat

Correspondents gathered in this drowsy hamlet, serenely surrounded by the blue-tinted peaks of the soaring mountains, had their choice of two versions of the

In a typically Napoleonic dispatch, McClellan declared:
"We have annihilated two armies, commanded by edu-cated and experienced soldiers, intrenched in mountain fastnesses fortified at their But from captured rebels and the hill folk who glumly observed
