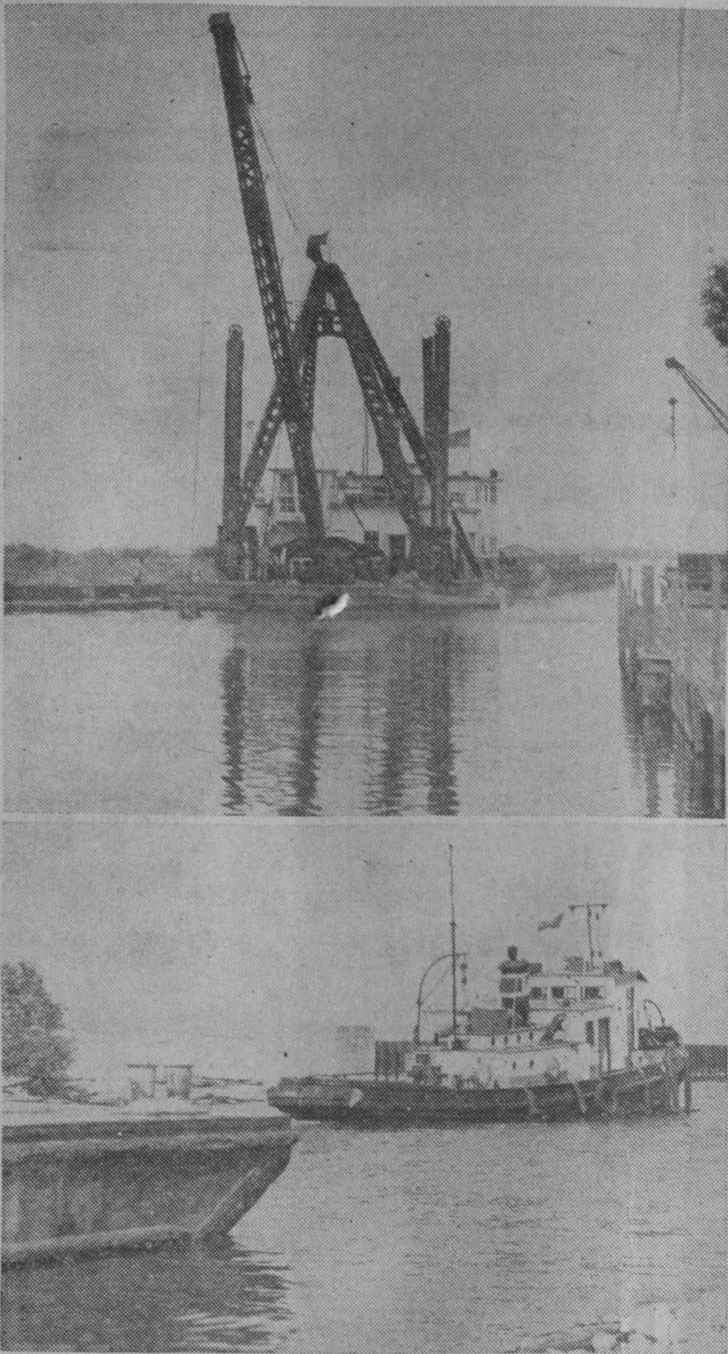

SCHOOL ELECTION NEXT MONDAY

Barking Dogs and Price Signs Still Council Topics

Monday night's regular meeting of the Tawas City Council was a near repeat of the meeting two weeks ago. Principal discussion centered around barking dogs and resort signs situated on the highway right-of-way. In answer to a question posed by William Groff, a Mathews Street resident, City Attorney Jerry Cotter said that barking or howling dogs which annoy neighbors are subject to the city's nuisance ordinance. At the last meeting, Groff complained that he was unable to sleep nights because of the noise made by his neighbor's dogs. Cotter stated that Groff could make formal complaint before a local justice of the peace and set machinery in motion to enforce the nuisance ordinance. The case would then be reviewed by Cotter before setting a justice court trial.

Hot Rods Turn County Airport Into Drag Strip

State and county law enforcement agencies are seeking the identity of "hot-rodgers" who used the new Iosco County Airport for a drag strip. Supervisor Henry Oates, chairman of the county board of supervisors' aeronautical committee, said that deep ruts in the shape of an oval track were left in the landing strip by the car owners. Although no estimate has been made as yet, it is believed that damage to the property will amount to several hundreds of dollars. Considerable work has been done on the new airfield during the past year. The field was cleared of trees and stumps and grass seed was planted. The county had decided not to use the field this year in order to allow growth of a good turf for landing strips.

2 Men Survive Ordeal on Bay Monday Night

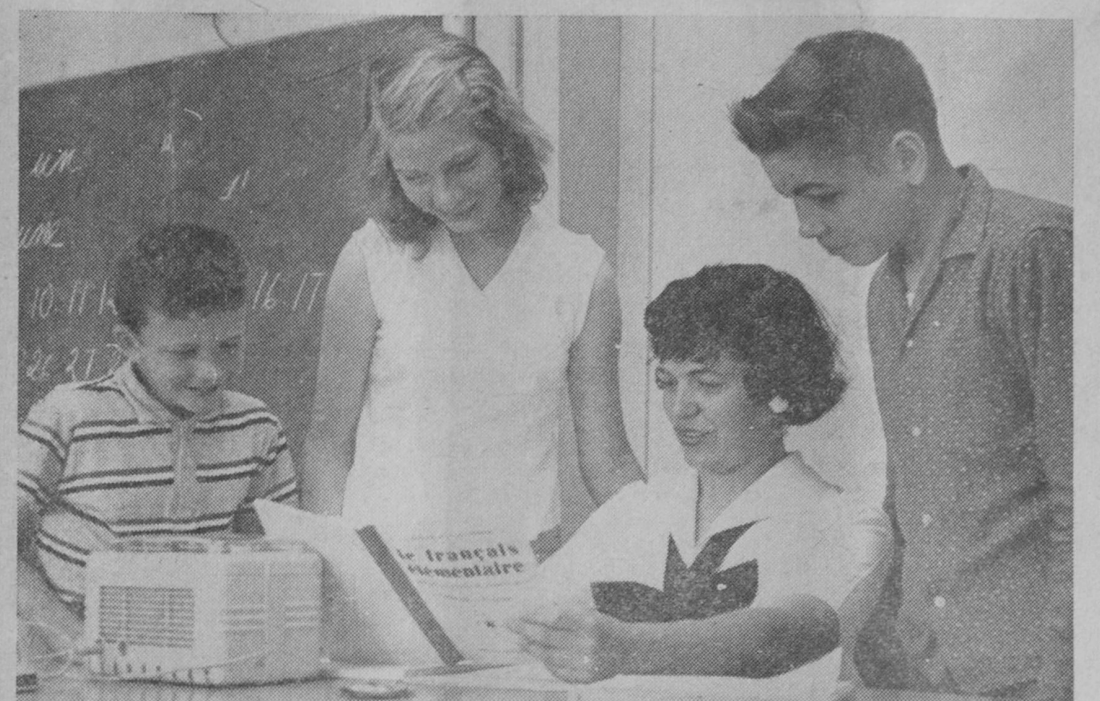
Two men were rescued early Tuesday morning after spending more than five hours in the chilled waters of Saginaw Bay near Charity Islands. Treated for exposure at Standish Hospital were Gerald W. Brown, 32, Route No. 2, Gladwin, and Robert Wiltse, 52, 208 Church Street, Standish. The two men were in a 22-foot cabin cruiser enroute to Tawas when they hit a channel buoy north of the Charity Island light. The crash occurred about midnight. After the impact, the boat started to take on water rapidly and the two men grabbed life jackets and jumped into the water. Brown swam to the channel buoy and climbed on top. Wiltse treaded water for several hours and at daylight swam to another buoy and clung to it. Neither man knew the other had survived the ordeal until their rescue. The two men were spotted about 5:30 a. m. by Greg Hart of St. Charles, who was headed toward Bay Port in his cruiser. The two men were taken to Point Lookout where they were transferred to the hospital by ambulance. After examination, Brown was released. He sustained bruises and a scratched forehead in the crash. Wiltse was admitted for treatment of exposure. Officers said his condition was not critical. (See ORDEAL, page 10.)

Voters to Name Two Trustees; Tax Levy Vote

Importance of the July 10 annual school election was stressed this week by the Tawas Area Board of Education. In addition to naming two new trustees to the board, voters will decide on the question of constructing new classroom additions on a much-discussed pay-as-you-go plan. Two vacancies exist on the board of education due to the expiration of terms of Stuart White and Waldo Curry. Mr. White withdrew his name from nomination while Mr. Curry will be a candidate to succeed himself. Three other candidates are listed on the ballot. They are Merton Killey, Bruce Myles and James Campbell. Killey is a salesman for Standard Oil Company, Campbell is an executive vice president of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway while Myles is associated with the Myles Insurance Agency and is president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce. Voters will receive two ballots on the question of financing construction of new classrooms. All registered electors are eligible to vote on the question of raising the debt limit. The second ballot asks approval of a three-mill tax levy for a period of five years. Only taxpayers are eligible to vote on the latter.

The tax levy proposition, if successful, would establish a sinking fund for construction of classrooms over a period of five years. This construction would be completed in a program of three stages. This plan was worked out by the board of education, a Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association study committee and local residents. The first stage would be to erect a six-classroom unit adjacent to the existing Tawas City gymnasium. This would be done in 1962. The second stage would provide for the construction of a general purpose room and kitchen at the East Tawas unit and the completion of the 10-room Tawas City elementary unit by the addition of four more classrooms. This could be accomplished by 1963-1964. The third stage would provide for the construction of a junior high school unit and classroom additions at the high school. The three-mill tax levy would raise approximately \$390,000 over a period of five years. Need for the additional classrooms has been brought on by enrollment increases of past recent years. Total enrollment in grades kindergarten through six during 1960-61 is 854, or 236 more than the enrollment for those grades in 1952-53, when the district consolidated. By 1970, enrollment in these grades will reach 924, according to all available estimates. Grades seven through 12 have seen an increase from 460 in 1952-53 to 691 in 1961. By 1970, the total will have reached 949. As an example of the tax increase under the proposed three-mill levy, if a property owner's tax was \$100, the increase would be \$8.50. A \$50 tax would be increased to \$17. Residents of Tawas City and East Tawas pay taxes twice a year, but only once toward schools. The summer tax goes to the two cities. The winter tax, upon which the preceding example is based, includes county and school taxes.

Several Hundred Attend Oscoda Church Blessing

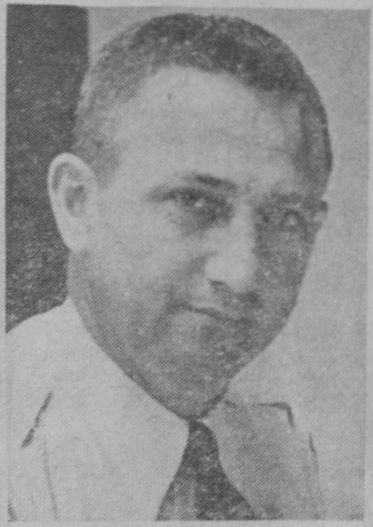

Saginaw Man Dies in Iosco Accident

A 53-year-old Saginaw man was killed Saturday afternoon when a road grader backed over him at an Indian Lake Road construction site near Floyd Lake. Hilmar J. Hall, vice president of Saginaw Lumber Company, was watching road construction work from a bank alongside the roadway just moments before his body was noticed on the road after the road grader backed over it. An autopsy Saturday night revealed that Hall was not stricken before the machine, driven by Kenneth Blake, 508 Alice Street, passed over him. Construction on the road was being done by the Iosco County Road Commission, of which Blake is an employee. He was not held. The victim was a lifelong Saginaw resident. He was a member of the Saginaw Elks Club, Pioneer Club and Foreyer Club. He was also former general manager of Saginaw Sash and Door.

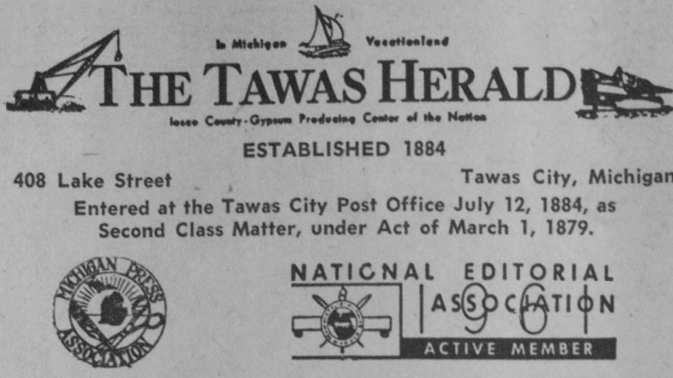
Dock Complaints Draw Warning from Council

East Tawas will take steps to notify visitors of that community's ordinance prohibiting the dumping of refuse into Tawas Bay. At Monday night's meeting of the city council, Mayor C. V. Miller was authorized to purchase 500 copies of the city's water front ordinance. In addition to regulating water skiing and boating, this ordinance prohibits the dumping of garbage and other refuse into the bay. It was stated at the meeting that several complaints had been received concerning pleasure boats at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock. Garbage was being dumped into the water from these boats and toilets were not locked while docked. Copies of the ordinance are to be distributed to pleasure craft owners when they register at the harbor master's office. In other business, the council stated that in the future, any complaints or other matters concerning the dock would be referred to the Waterways Commission Committee. Carl Babcock is chairman. The city council reaffirmed its stand on its recent action toward moving justice court offices out of the city hall. The council recommended such action several weeks ago when it deemed that its temporary location was not large enough to handle these offices. It was reported that Frank Berzhinski, who succeeded Justice of the Peace A. J. Goulet Tuesday, had rented office space on Newman Street. No action was taken on a proposed food handling ordinance for the city. Only four council-

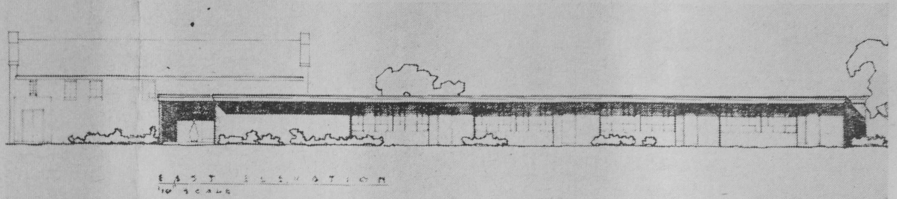

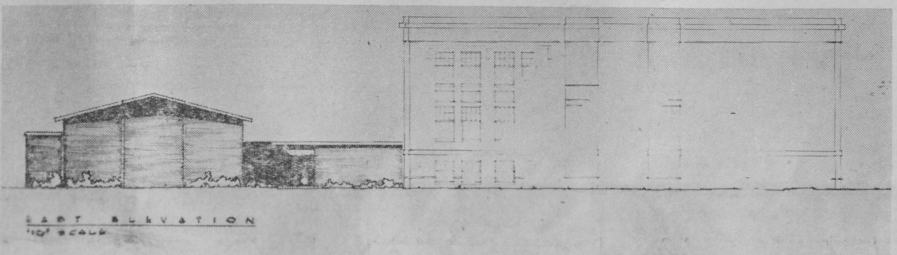

result in all of them attending these two units. The seventh and eighth grades would go to the Alabaster unit, leading toward the ultimate goal of a separate junior high school. The general purpose room at the East Tawas unit would also provide that community with a greatly-needed auditorium.

Third Stage . . 1965-1966

THE THIRD STAGE would provide for the construction of a junior high school unit and the complete separation of the junior and

senior high schools. This will allow abandonment of the Alabaster unit, which will have outlived its usefulness by that time.

Facts Prove Pay-As-You-Go Plan WOULD SAVE MONEY!

FACTS PROVE that under the Pay-As-You-Go Plan worked out by the board and committee, the projects listed above would be immediately possible at the least cost to the taxpayers of the district. It has been proven that a 25-year bond issue would result in an interest cost of 63 percent, or enough money to construct 13 additional classrooms. The three-mill tax would raise \$78,000 the first year. This would enable the construction proj-

ect (First Stage) to get under way by 1962. The second year another \$78,000 (more if new construction continues at the present pace) and would provide funds for the Second Stage. The next three years would bring the total amount available to in excess of \$390,000 which, it is believed, will more than cover the cost of the proposed program, without heavy interest charges being paid.

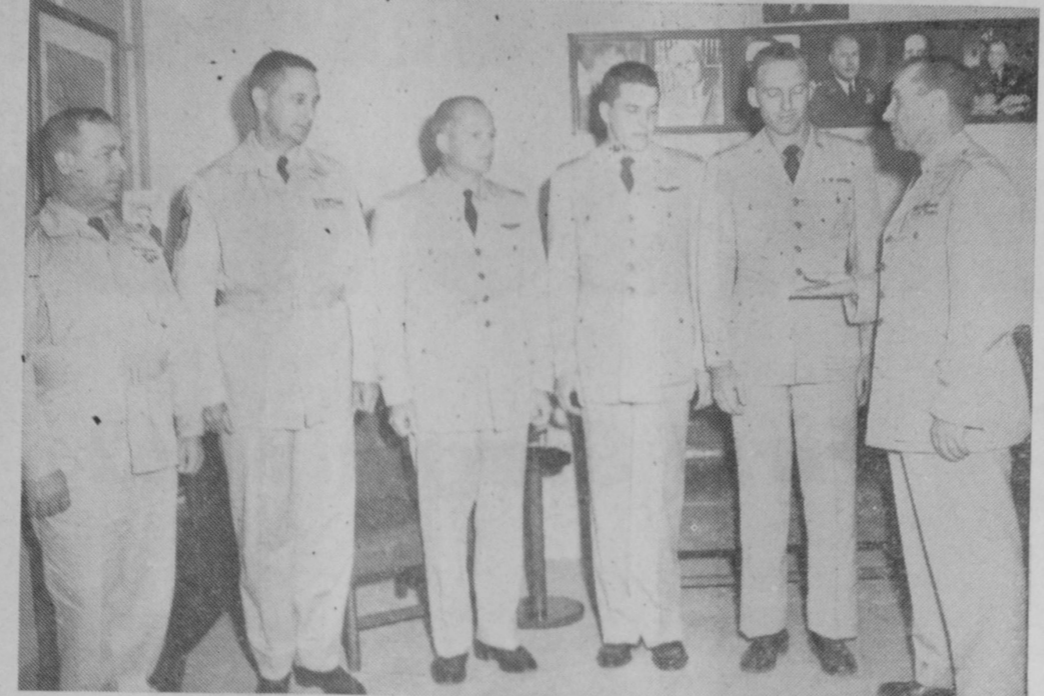

100 Years Ago This Week...in THE CIVIL WAR

(Events exactly 100 years ago this week in the Civil War—told in the language and style of today.)

AT RICH MOUNTAIN

Union Forces Claim W. Virginia Victory

BEVERLY, Va.—July 11—Evacuation by Southern forces of the strategic Western Virginia mountains appeared certain today after a decisive Union victory at nearby Rich Mountain.

Three brigades of Federal troops commanded by Maj. Gen. George B. McClellan drove a Confederate unit of some 4,000 men into retreat after two days of fighting amid the crags of the Rich and Cheat Ranges.

Correspondents gathered in this drowsy hamlet, serenely surrounded by the blue-tinted peaks of the soaring mountains, had their choice of two versions of the actions.

In a typically Napoleonic dispatch, McClellan declared:

"We have annihilated two armies, commanded by educated and experienced soldiers, entrenched in mountain fastnesses fortified at their leisure."

But from captured rebels and the hill folk who glumly observed the skirmishes came another account.

THESE witnesses appeared puzzled over McClellan's slowness in advancing on what they considered to be obviously vulnerable positions.

And they were perplexed at the manner with which Southern forces were withdrawn, apparently in anticipation of assaults that never actually materialized.

Observers agreed that apparently, both sides vastly overestimated the strength of their opponents.

The consensus is that McClellan advanced with unnecessary caution, and that the Rebels retreated with unnecessary haste.

McClellan is reliably reported to have estimated, on the eve of battle, the enemy's strength at more than 10,000.

But the Rich Mountain regiments, commanded by Brig. Gen. Robert Selden Garnett, a 42-year-old former Union army officer, never numbered even one-half of that figure.

ONE KEY to McClellan's faulty information was seen in the dismal failure of Garnett to recruit reinforcements for his units.

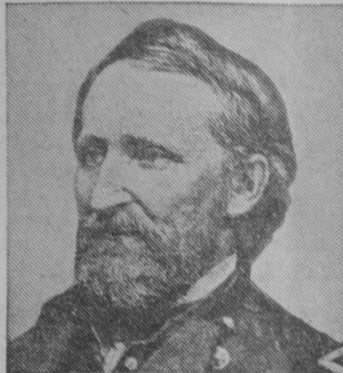
With Gen. Henry A. Wise, Garnett had been ordered by Gen. Robert E. Lee into the area not only to defend the key rail centers there, but to enlist the mountaineers.

In a report to Lee July 1, Garnett forlornly advised that he was able to recruit only 23 men during a full week's effort.

West Virginians, Garnett told Lee, "are thoroughly imbued with an ignorant and bigoted Union sentiment."

It appeared likely that McClellan's intelligence agents advised him that Garnett's original force of 4,000 would be greatly swollen by volunteers and reinforcements.

But what really happened was that there were virtually no vol-

unteers and the only reinforcements, the 44th Virginia regiment, were sent by Lee too late to do Garnett any good. It joined him the day of the defeat but did not take part in the fighting.

DISPATCHES specifically favored one of McClellan's three brigadiers, Gen. W. S. Rosecrans. At daybreak today, Rosecrans took a unit of 2,000 men and a troop of horse on a withering 10-hour march through the mountains to seize a key point known as Hart's farm.

The youthful son of the farm owner served as guide.

In a message received by McClellan in his Roaring Creek command post, Rosecrans reported he had taken the position held by Lt. Col. John Pegram, suffering losses of 12 killed and 49 wounded. The retreating Pegram left 20 wounded on the field and surrendered 83 men, including many sick with non-combat ailments.

ONE BAFFLING incident will long be remembered by veterans of both sides in the Rich Mountain battle.

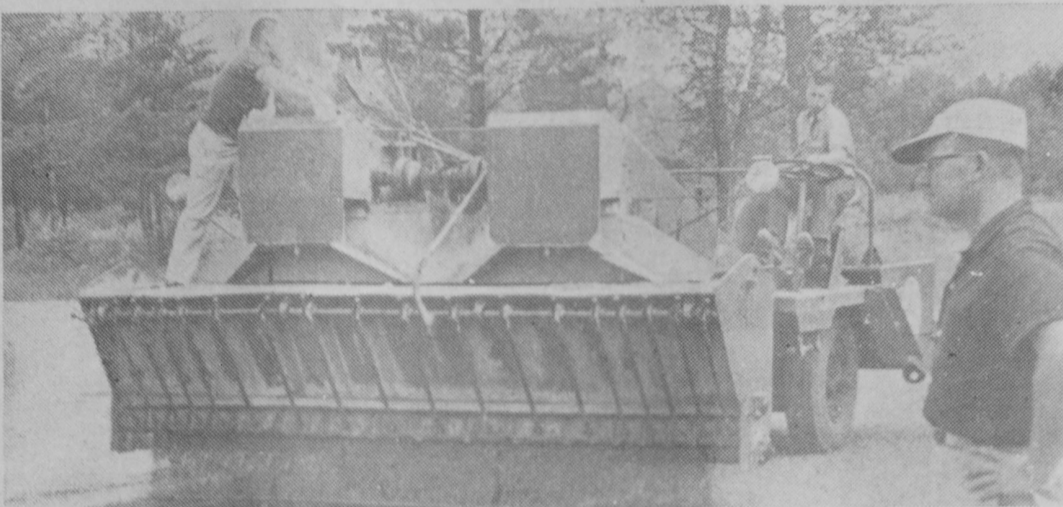
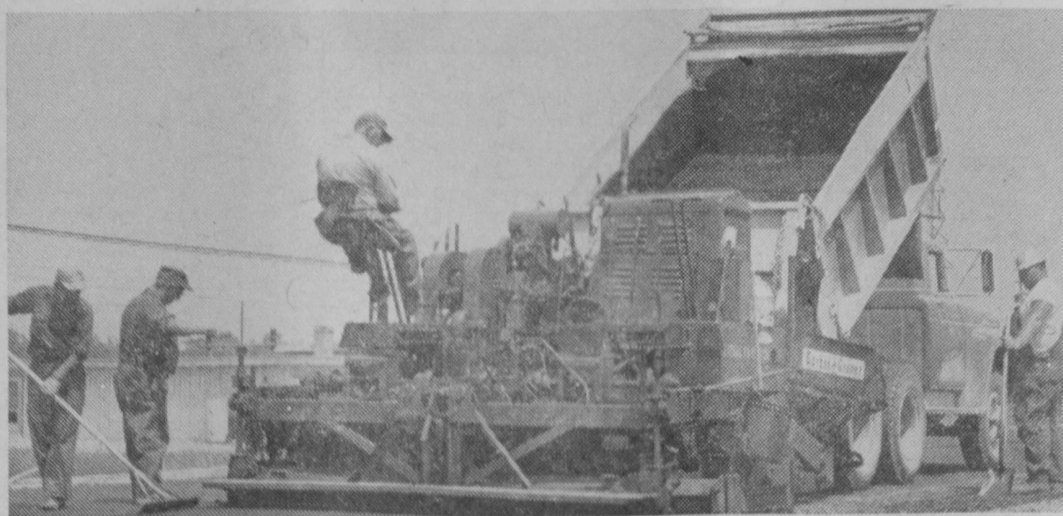
