## Indian Ceremonials Open With Parade Saturday

Opening its summer season Saturday night will be the Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials, located nine miles west of the Tawas on the Plank Road.

One of the area's most popular tourist attractions and a show unique in the national entertainment field, the ceremonials feature real American Indians in colorful costumes.

Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials, which goes into its fourth year of operation, holds evening performances daily throughout the season on a huge island stage built on Chapel Lake. The huge stadium there seats more than 1,000 persons and is equipped with a large parking lot.

This year's opening will be preceded Saturday afternoon by an Indian parade on US-23 through the Tawas, turning on Newman Street at East Tawas and continuing to the Federal Building.

The Rev. O. James Crews, director-manager of Chapel Lake Indian Ceremonials, said Monday that many new acts are included in this year's presentation.

Included will be a Navaho fire dance which never before has been seen by the public, along with a rainbow dance, mother's lullaby and many other featured attractions.

Ten different tribes of American Indians are represented at Chapel Lake, including Chippewa, Ottawa, Delaware, Sioux, Pueblo, Kiowa, Pottawatomi, Ojibwa, Pawnee, Mohawk and Cherokee.

## Tawas Man Gets Prison Term Monday

A prison sentence of 1 1/2 to 15 years was meted to a Tawas City man Monday afternoon by Circuit Court Judge Allan C. Miller.

Allen Steinhurst, 20, entered a plea of guilty to breaking and entering in the nighttime when arraigned before Judge Miller earlier in the day.

Steinhurst admitted his part in the June 16 breaking and entering of Cable's Hardware and Whitfield's Store, both in Tawas City.

Co-defendant in this case, Joseph E. Smith, 33, Detroit, is to be arraigned before Judge Miller Wednesday on the same charge.

The two men were arrested the same day as the breaking and entering occurred after police learned that several of the stolen articles were found at Steinhurst's home.

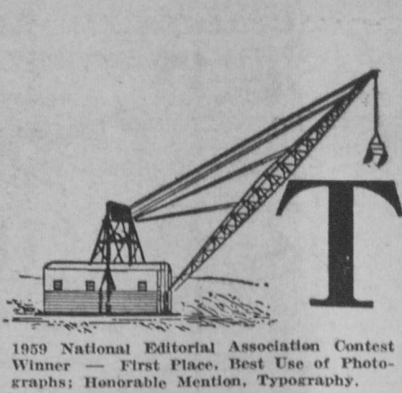
Stolen from the hardware was a transistor radio, a pair of jersey gloves, two screw drivers and \$19.77 in change. The burglars had used a wrecking bar to batter the combination of an office safe but entry was not gained. Two sport shirts, a belt and about \$1.98 in pennies were stolen from Whitfield's.

In passing sentence, Judge Miller told Steinhurst that "you are making it awfully tough on yourself for the rest of your life. I hope that within the walls of the prison there will be an opportunity for you to acquire a skill."

## Set Court Hearing on NG Dock Claims

A hearing to set terms of a decree and establish procedure for nuisance damage claims against National Gypsum Company is to be held July 31 in Isosco County Circuit Court.

This date was set at a preliminary hearing held Monday before Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller. The decree is in accordance with a Michigan Supreme Court opinion of last September.

The supreme court, in its ruling nearly 10 months ago, had established precedent regarding use of submerged lands between the shore line and navigable depths of water.

Allowing the continued use of National's Port Gypsum facilities south of Tawas City, the ruling opened the way for cottage owners whose water front property may be impaired to collect damages in court.

The high court remanded the two cases involved to be conducted by Isosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller. He is the successor to former circuit judge, Herman Dehnke, who issued the original ruling.

The company obtains gypsum rock inland and must convey it over the shallow water of Saginaw Bay to reach ore ships of deep draft. It built a permanent dock extending 1,076 feet into the bay and dredged more than a mile of channel from deep water of the bay to the dock and alongside the dock. Dredging was completed after a favorable court decision by Judge Dehnke.

The former judge ruled that, although National Gypsum Company should be permitted to proceed with carrying out its plan at its own risk, he set forth certain obligations under which it would be allowed.

One restriction was court retention of jurisdiction for purposes of granting an injunction and assumption of liability by the gypsum company for payment of damages to the property owners.

The supreme court decision climaxed a four-year court battle between the company and bay shore property owners, headed by Dr. Malvern F. Obrecht, Arthur L. Johnson and the Rev. Fr. Robert Neuman, along with the Michigan Department of Conservation.

Property owners were represented in court Monday by James T. Brooker, Bay City attorney.

The store was constructed in 1950 by Mr. and Mrs. Clarence King, owners. Prior to that, Mr. King had operated a mobile meat market here.

The store was expanded in 1955 and a second addition was constructed during 1960. An independent market, the store features a large parking lot.

Last fall, another addition was made to the building. This houses the King's new Blue Dot Coin-Op Laundry, which opened for business in November.

The Kings celebrate the occasion with many special prices, appearing in an advertisement on another page of this week's issue.

## State Admits Mistake in Treating Lake Near Hale

Red-faced state conservation department officials at Lansing said Saturday that West Londo Lake near Hale would be restocked with fish.

The department stated that fish in the lake were poisoned by mistake and that legal-sized bass and northern pike are to be planted to provide for local anglers and tourists.

M. J. DeBoer, supervisor of field management for the department's fish division, said the lake was poisoned by mistake just before last week's opening of bass season.

The lake was one of several scheduled for cleaning out and restocking.

Samplings indicated that pike, bass and panfish all were stunted from overcrowding.

A hearing on the proposal to treat the lake was scheduled for July 2.

But a field team from the institute of fisheries research in Ann Arbor was in this area of the state July 14.

The lake was on the treatment list. Without checking to see if the hearing had been held, the team went ahead and treated the lake.

"Needless to say," DeBoer said, "We are sorry it happened. We will restock the lake as quickly as possible with as many legal-sized bass and pike as we can get."

The department will also clean up the dead fish and add fertilizer to the lake to get it in condition for restocking, DeBoer promised.

## Tawas Voters to Name School Trustees July 10

Voters of Tawas Area School District will name two trustees to the board of education at the July 10 annual election.

Two vacancies on the board were created by the expiration of terms of veteran members, Stuart White and Waldo Curry.

Mr. White, who had served as president of the board since January 1957, withdrew his name from nomination two weeks ago and announced he was retiring.

Curry, a Tawas Township farmer, is one of four persons who have qualified to have their names placed on the ballot.

Other candidates are Merton Killey, Bruce Myles and James Campbell.

Both Killey and Campbell are residents of East Tawas. The former is a consumer salesman for Standard Oil Company. Campbell is an executive vice president for the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

Myles, the lone Tawas City candidate, is associated with his father and brother in the Myles Insurance Agency. He is also president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

In addition to naming two trustees, electors will decide on a three-mill tax proposition for a period of five years which would finance construction of new classrooms on a pay-as-you-go plan.

## Fire Truck Dealer Says He'll Sue ET

A representative of Central Fire Truck Corporation, St. Louis, Missouri, has threatened to institute court action against the City of East Tawas.

In a letter to The Tawas Herald Tuesday, H. J. Moore of Bay City said that his proposed legal action was based on what he terms "differences" between original quotations and what newspaper reports show the city allowed for purchase of fire apparatus.

Moore said that his court action was also being based upon "discrimination against Central Fire Truck Corporation."

Last week, East Tawas Council awarded a contract to Howe Fire Equipment Company, Anderson, Indiana, to furnish fire apparatus at a cost of \$17,432.73.

Moore said he appeared before the East Tawas Council on May 1 to submit sealed bids. Five fire apparatus companies had entered bids but all were rejected when it was learned by the city that four pages containing specifications had not been sent to the bidders.

"We have been awaiting receipt of new specifications and had no information that any action had been taken until reading about the contract having been placed with the Howe Company," said Moore.

"Any city has the right to reject any or all bids, or invite so and so manufacturers to bid. We were invited originally and find now we are the victims of some undisclosed caprice," stated Moore.

"We have had similar experience with City of Tawas City officials," stated Moore. "After submitting the low bid as per their specifications, they placed an order for the apparatus at a price of \$748.73 above our low bid."

Mayor C. V. Miller told the Herald Tuesday morning that Moore's proposed court action was "all new" to him.

He said, however, that the city has the right to reject any or all bids and that the council had acted within the limits of the law.

## Former Tawas Waitress Dies; Five Injured

An 18-year-old former Tawas resident, Linda Bailer, received fatal injuries in an auto collision Sunday night at the intersection of Mt. Morris and Elms Roads in Mt. Morris Township, Genesee County.

Five other Tawas young people were also injured in the same car and are at McLaren Hospital, Flint.

They are the driver, Ruth A. Blust, 17, Tawas City, who has a head cut, other head injuries, multiple bruises and scratches, and her passengers:

Walter O'Dell, 18, and Geraldine Redfield, 15, both of Tawas City, head and back injuries; Brian Westcott, 17, Tawas City, body bruises and scratches; Charles Kajawa, 21, East Tawas, head and chest injuries.

The six young people had attended stock car racing that evening at Fenton and were on their way to return Miss Bailer to her home at 7266 West Stanley Road, Flushing, before returning to Tawas.

Flint state police said that Miss Blust ran a stop sign and was struck broadside by a car driven by Edward Springsteen of Coos Bay, Oregon. A passenger, Claudia J. Springsteen, five years old, was treated at Hurley Hospital for head bruises.

All passengers in the car driven by Miss Blust were thrown out by the impact and O'Dell and Kajawa were pinned underneath the overturned vehicle.

Miss Bailer, who was a waitress at the Mid Way Drive-In last summer, died Monday of a crushed skull.

Funeral services for the victim are to be held at Rose City.

# Oscoda Church Ceremony Sunday

Solemn blessing of the new Sacred Heart Church, Oscoda, will be performed Sunday by the Rev. Fr. Henry P. DuRussel, pastor, in the presence of the Most Rev. Stephen S. Woznicki, D. D., bishop of Saginaw.

Blessing of the church is to be held at 12 o'clock noon following Mass. A dinner is to follow at the parish hall.

Taking part in the ceremony will be many parish priests of the Saginaw Diocese.

Work on the \$250,000 church was started in May 1960. It is located on a 10-acre site between US-23 and Lake Huron in Oscoda. Designed by Brysselbout-Starke and Hacker, Bay City architects, general contractor for construction was the Thunder Bay Construction Company, owned by Harry Skiba.

Site of the new church, which overlooks Lake Huron, offered a rare opportunity for the architect to design a church which departs from contemporary architectural forms.

The new church is cruciform in plan with the sanctuary located at the crossing. The sanctuary is flooded with natural light by means of a skylight.

The church has two distinct naves, one running west toward the narthex and the highway, with the other extending east-

ward toward the lake, which is plainly visible through a floor-to-ceiling glass wall.

The center aisle of the nave,

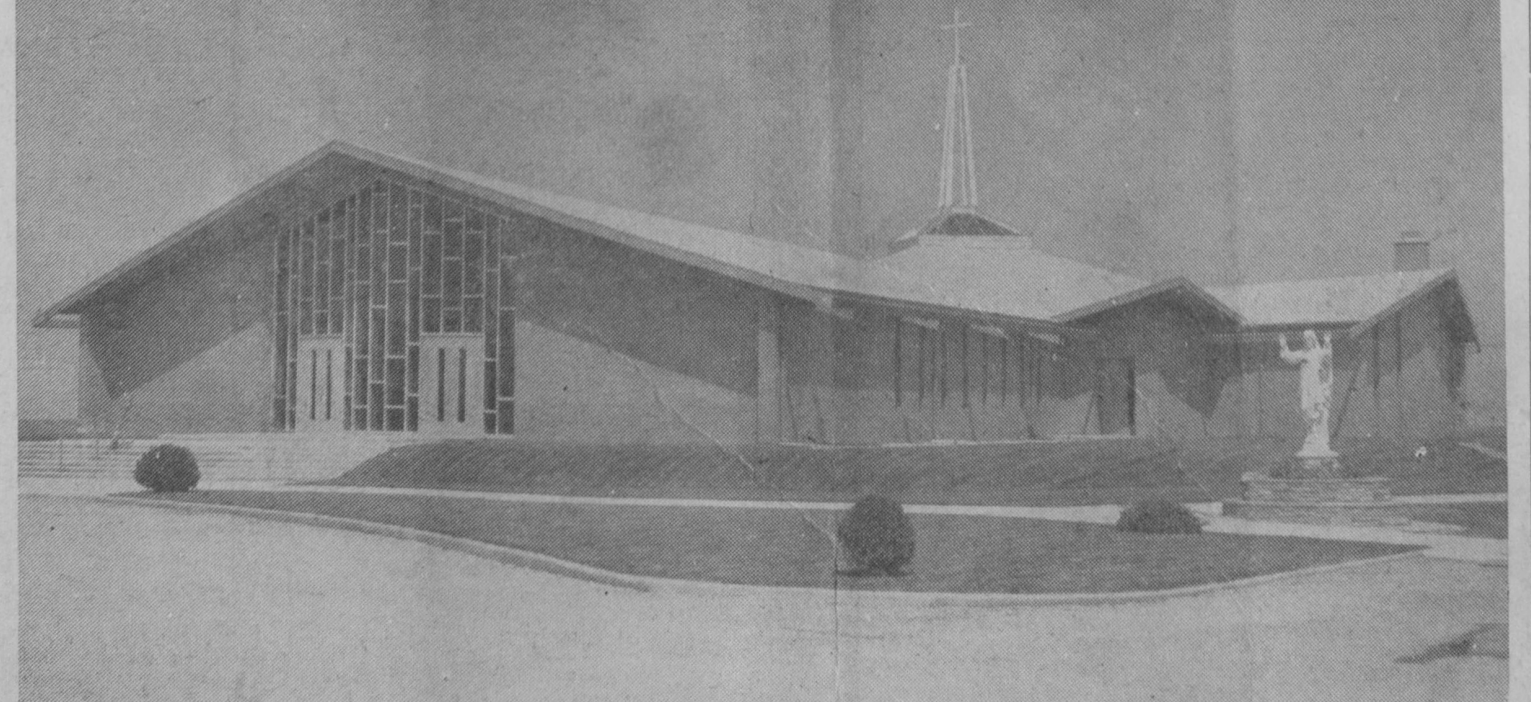
which contains a railed-in baptistry, gradually tapers from the full width of the narthex to normal aisle width at the sanctuary.

In the center is the slightly raised chancel or altar area.

The narthex is dominated by a glass facade stretching from floor

to ceiling, overlooking the broad grass island and planting space separating the parking areas.

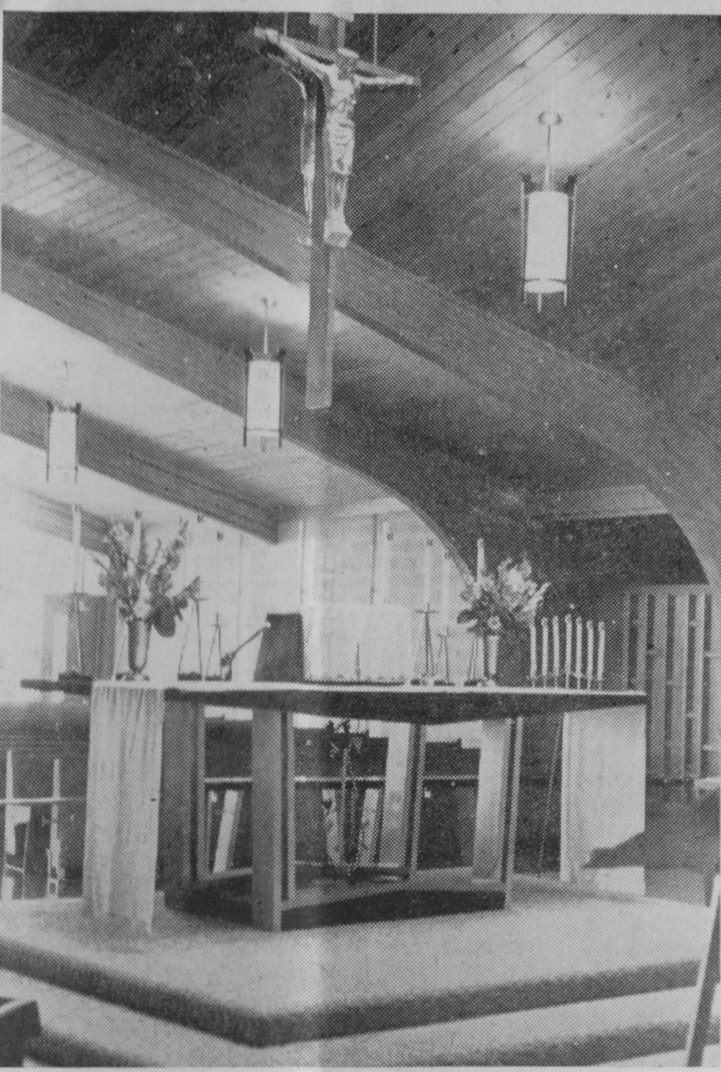

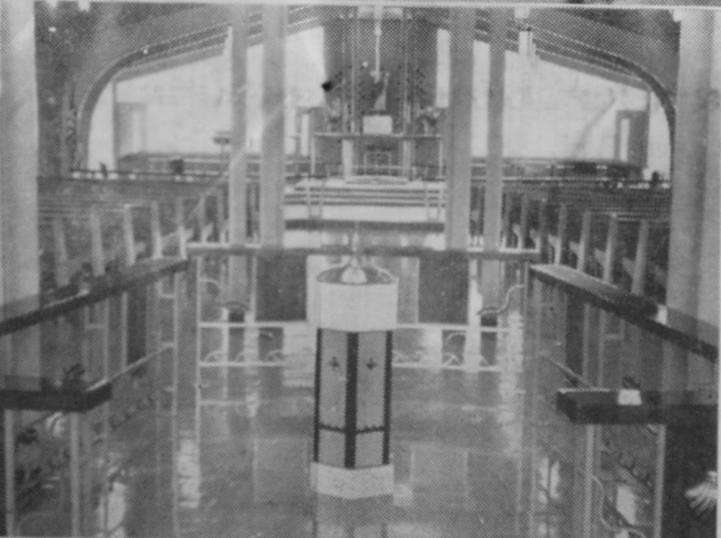
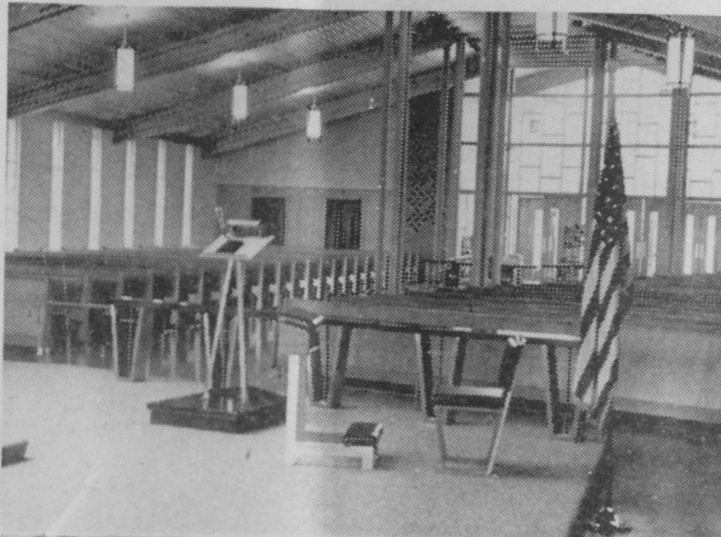

CONSTITUTIONAL CLASH President Lincoln Answers Justice Taney's Challenge

WASHINGTON, July 4—President Lincoln today answered an appeal by Chief Justice Roger B. Taney of the U.S. Supreme Court for an explanation of the executive order suspending the writ of habeas corpus when "public safety" was involved.

Mr. Lincoln's reply was not made directly to Justice Taney, but was incorporated in a message to the 37th congress.

The House and Senate opened its session today amid fanfare and a wartime setting.

Washington Troops Pass in Review The president, cabinet members and Gen. Winfield Scott, head of the army, reviewed a parade of 20,000 troops in Pennsylvania av. before the session opened.

Another 60,000 troops, off duty for the holiday, thronged streets and saloons in the capital.

In his explanation of the habeas corpus order, Mr. Lincoln asserted that "it was not believed that any law was violated."

State of Rebellion Held to Exist He recalled that soon after the first call for militia, he felt he must authorize the commanding general, at his discretion, to suspend the privilege of the writ as applied to "such individuals as he might deem dangerous to the public safety."

"This authority has been exercised but very sparingly," Mr. Lincoln continued, adding:

"The provision of the Constitution that 'The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended unless when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it' is equivalent to a provision—that such privilege may be suspended when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety does require it."

A state of rebellion exists at the present and the suspension order is justified, the president concluded.

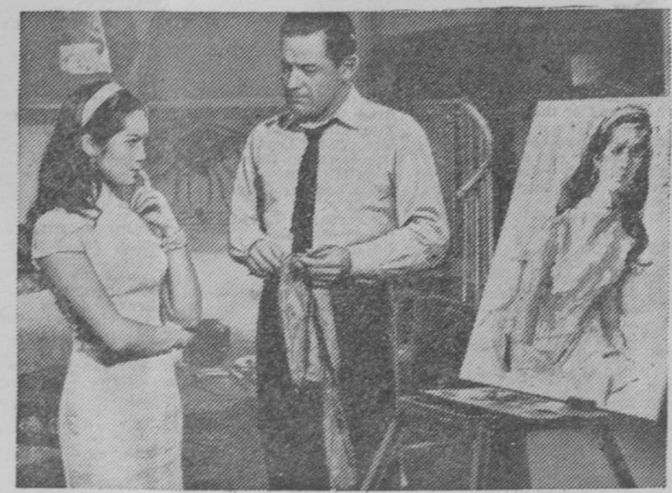

No one should have more than one social security number, yet it is possible to have more than one card under different names. Mr. Ellifritz pointed out that in the interest of having all earnings properly credited to the proper account number, the Social Security Administration needs to know about changes in names whether it is because of marriage, divorce or other reasons. Women who marry and fail to report this change may experience delay when it is time to figure the social security benefits due them.

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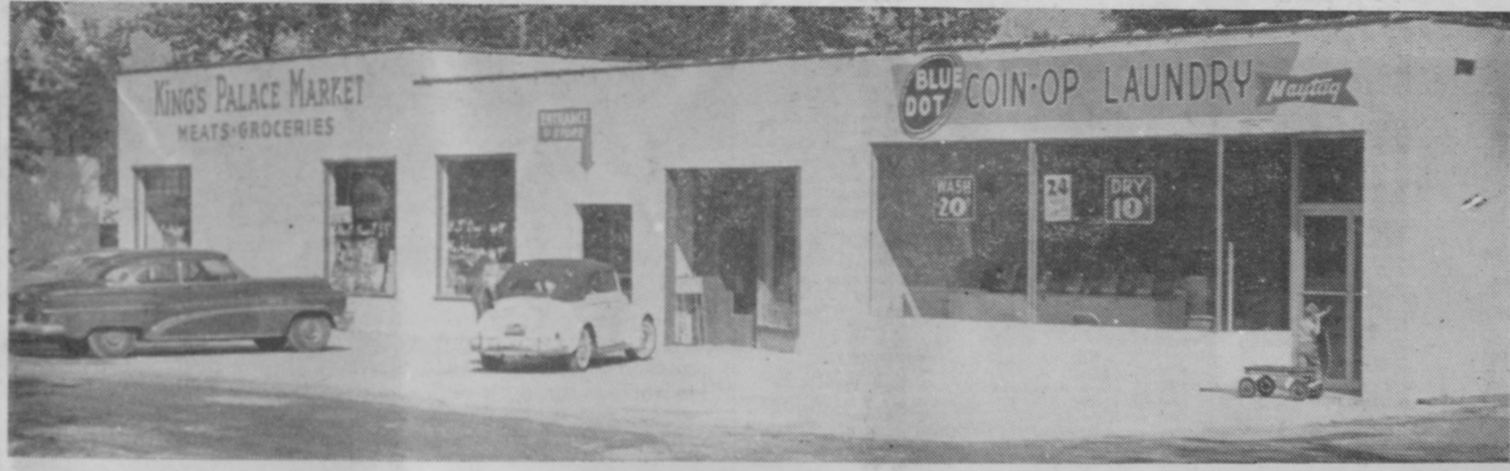

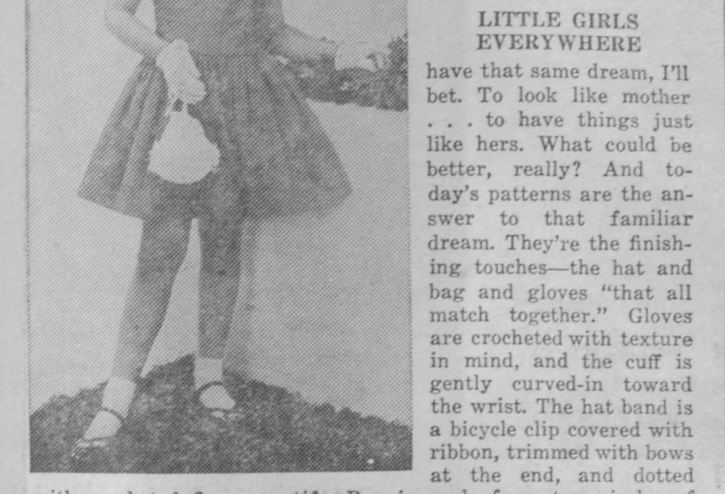

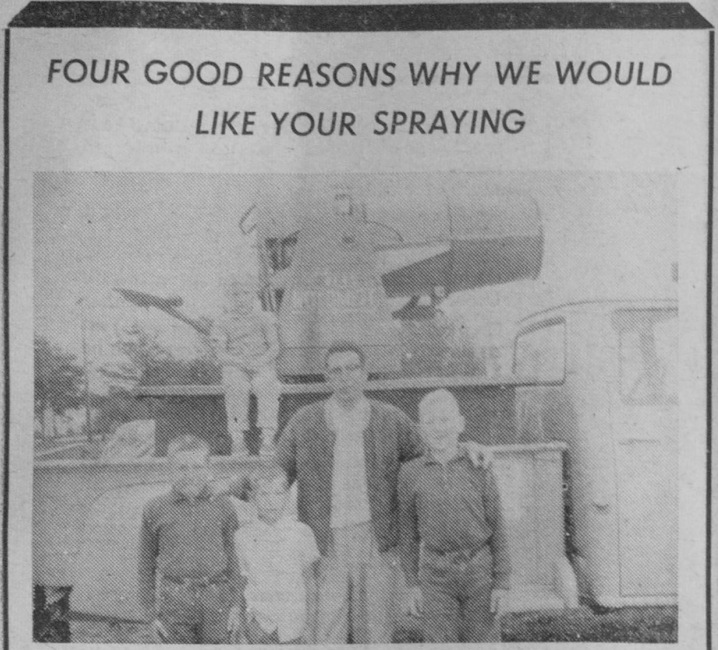

**Gustafson Chosen to Organize Iosco 'Ham' Operators**

Vaino W. Gustafson, WBDXL, Tawas City, has been selected to set up an organization of Iosco County amateur radio operators prepared to furnish organized emergency communications in time of disaster, it was announced today by Communications Manager F. E. Handy of the American Radio Relay League, national association of radio amateurs.

Mr. Gustafson's assignment, which carries the title of emergency coordinator, is to band together members of the amateur radio service in his community to perfect arrangements for emergency radio communication by hams in the event of natural disasters or other emergencies. In addition to use of normal station equipment working from commercial power, amateur stations use self-powered radio transmitting and receiving equipment as needed. Mr. Gustafson as ARRL emergency coordinator will call local meetings of amateurs, establish common operating procedures and arrange regular drill periods when the hams' personal

stations may be mobilized under simulated emergency conditions. His duties also include liaison planning with the local chapter of the American Red Cross and other relief agencies. Liaison will be established also with local protective services, fire and police departments, and civil defense communications will receive much attention.

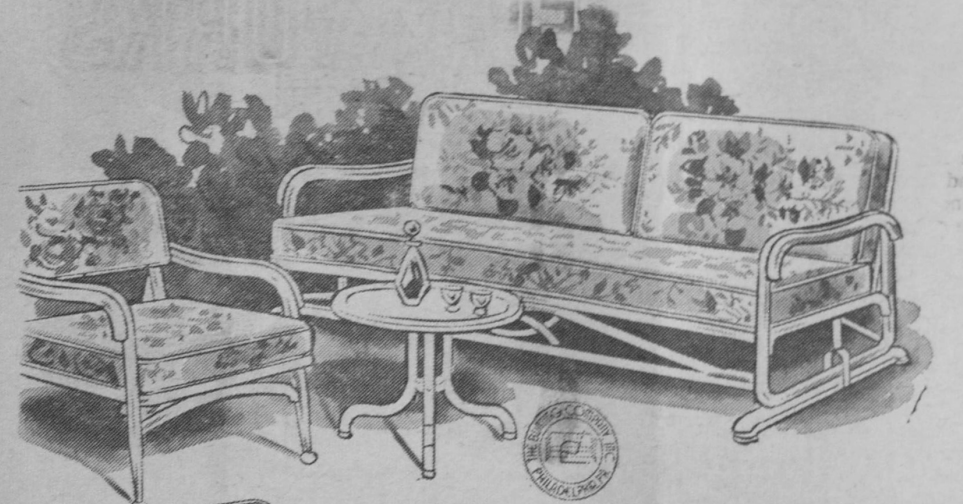

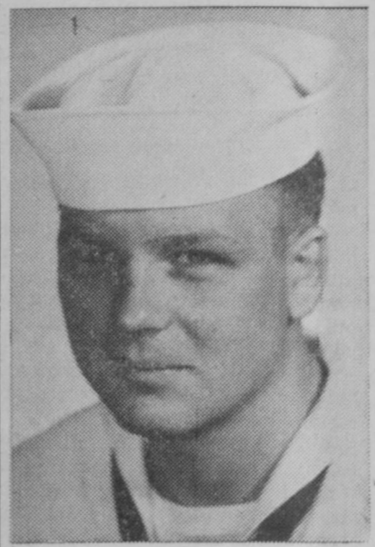

Muskellunge are also found in tempting numbers in the Torch Lake chain and the Indian - Cheboygan river system. They are occasionally landed in more than 20 other waters, including western Michigan lakes directly connected to Lake Michigan and a few inland lakes. Most of these fish are caught in early summer when they are concentrated in weedy, stub-filled bays of lakes and along edges of river channels. Trolling brings best returns with large muskie lures, bucktails, and spinner combinations and common baits such as flatfish, pikie minnows, and dare-devils.

Fr. Durussel, present pastor, arrived in 1953, and giant steps were taken toward realization of purchasing the new site, construction of a parish hall, convent and now the modern new church.
