Tawas City Opens Bids on New Fire Apparatus

Bids on a proposed new fire truck to serve Tawas City, Alabaster and Tawas Townships were opened at a meeting of the Tawas City Council Monday night.

Five bids on fire apparatus, ranging in price from \$10,235.60 to \$13,986.30, and on truck chassis, from a low of \$3,980 to \$5,985, were received.

A special committee of volunteer firemen is to meet with the council's purchasing committee next Monday night to review specifications and to make recommendations on the possible purchase of equipment.

Members of the council's purchasing committee are Earl Davis, Arthur Wegner and Cecil Cabbie. Representing the firemen will be Assistant Chief James Lansky, Reginald Bublitz and Alton Long.

Because of the great differences in equipment of the five fire apparatus companies, bids were to be effective for 30 days to allow time for reviewing specifications before any action is taken.

Fire apparatus bids were received from the following firms: American Fire Equipment Company, \$10,984.30; Central Fire Equipment Company, \$10,235.60; W. S. Darley Company, \$11,094; Howe Fire Apparatus Company, \$11,900; John Bean Company, \$13,986.30.

Truck chassis bids were received from three local firms:

Ottawa Equipment Company entered four bids on International trucks, \$3,980, \$5,325, \$5,490 and \$5,985. McKay Sales Company entered a bid of \$4,400 on a Chevrolet truck chassis, while Orville Leslie and Sons had a bid of \$4,300 on a Ford truck. All three firms had alternate bids on tip-up cabs.

Last week, Harry Holmes of West Branch, representative for the John Bean Company of Lansing, brought a fire truck to Tawas City for demonstration purposes.

Manufactured at the company's Lansing factory, the truck is on display at the city hall and, while here, is available for use by the fire department. All volunteer firemen have been checked out in its operation.

At the last meeting, Mayor George Tuttle announced a proposed fire protection contract between the city, Tawas and Alabaster Townships.

Under the plan, cost of operating the fire department would be shared by the three units.

The new truck was included in the proposal. The present Tawas Township truck would be used under the new set-up and the old Tawas City truck would be converted to a tanker.

Tawas City presently furnishes fire protection to the two townships and Tawas Township houses its fire truck at the city hall.

A meeting was to have been

held last night (Tuesday) by the Tawas Township Board to consider the proposition.

East Tawas Council and Architect Study Low City Hall Bids

Review of two low bids for construction of a new city hall at East Tawas is under way today by the city council and architect, Schulwitz and Virgo, Saginaw.

Tentative action of the council Monday night to award the contract to a Bay City firm was delayed Tuesday in order to study alternates submitted by the two low bidders.

Low bidders on the construction were the Gregory Company of Bay City and Eckstein Construction Company, Tawas City.

City Clerk Fred Lomas reported Tuesday morning that approximate cost of the city hall would be \$34,000.

The Bay City firm was actual low bidder on the project, but because of 14 alternates in construction as submitted by the two construction firms, it was felt that more study should be made before letting the contract.

In other business, the council refused to give permission to the department of conservation to eliminate parking on Newman Street in the state park.

Newman Street extends to the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock on Tawas Bay and the state wished removal of public parking there. The conservation department had planned to establish its booth at the park entrance to collect fees under the new windshield sticker act.

A three-year franchise for Tawas Taxi Company was approved by the council. The franchise is effective July 1 when the old agreement terminates. The city garage and fire hall is to be painted in the near future.

A building application submitted by Clifford Lonsbury for remodeling dwelling was approved.

THREE EAST TAWAS MEN HURT IN M-65 CRASH

Three East Tawas men were injured Friday night when their tractor-trailer on M-65 in Whittemore.

Taken to Tawas Hospital were Michael F. Preville, 22; Steven Peterson, 23, and Herbert Thayer, 23. Preville, the driver, was treated and released. The other two men were held at the hospital.

Investigating officers said that Preville had just completed a U-turn and crashed into the rear of a truck owned by George Grabow. The truck was legally parked along the edge of the highway, said officers.

Teachers' Salary Base is Increased

As a conclusion to its findings Monday night, the Tawas Area Board of Education has raised the base salary of teachers in the school system from \$3,960 to \$4,100.

Effective next school term, this will be the base salary paid to teachers with a bachelor degree with no teaching experience.

The new schedule will mean a salary increase of \$140 for all teachers.

Actual base salary during the 1960-61 school year was \$3,850, but an additional \$100 was paid to all teachers because of the increased number of pupils in the system.

At the same time, the board has eliminated additional compensation to new teachers for having military service or for being the head of a family. Contracts of those teachers presently in the system will retain these clauses.

Otherwise, the salary schedule for teachers will remain the same as last year. Under this schedule, teachers are paid according to the number of years employment at Tawas Area, the number of years of teaching experience and the number of credit hours a

teacher has received beyond the bachelor degree.

On receipt of his master degree, an additional \$400 is paid to a teacher.

Under this system, the highest salary that could be earned by a teacher with a master degree, who has the maximum of 12 years teaching experience and is a military veteran would be \$6,050.

Highest salary for a new teacher coming into the system with a master degree, 12 years teaching experience and children of school age would be \$5,850.

Supt. Reynold Mick reported Tuesday morning that he was now in the process of handing out contracts to teachers for consideration of employment here during the 1961-62 school term.

Braves Lose in Tourney Opener

Tawas Area High School was eliminated Tuesday night in opening action of the class B district tournament at Standish, losing to West Branch 63-53.

The Braves trailed all the way, but outscored the winners, 15-10, in the final quarter.

Rollin topped Tawas scoring with 18 points. Ehinger paced West Branch with 23 points.

City Denies Application for New Garage

A building application submitted by Byron Brooks for construction of a 40 by 60 garage-type building at Brooks Auto Parts was rejected this week by Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz for reason of non-compliance with city building regulations.

Bublitz told the city council Monday night that the structure did not comply with zoning regulations for a residential area.

He said the proposed building, according to plans submitted, was too close to the front and side boundaries of the lot.

Bublitz brought his action to the attention of the council which authorized City Attorney Jerry Cotter to make a report at its next meeting.

Lee is Promoted by Power Company

L. A. Vaupre, division manager of Consumers Power Company, Bay City, announced today that effective March 1, Kenneth W. Lee of the Tawas area has been promoted to line crew foreman.

Mr. Lee has been employed by the company since September 1946 in the electrical distribution department here.

He is married and the father of three children. Lee and his family live at 516 Maple Street, Tawas City.

Barrett's Complete Remodeling Work

Work on remodeling and redecorating its boys' department was recently completed by Barrett's Youth Center, East Tawas.

Gilbert Barrett, owner, reports that self-serve shelving, a large display area and an enlarged boy scout trading post has been completed.

The boy scout trading post stocks clothing, equipment and books for scouting activities in Iosco County.

With the enlargement of the department, the store is now able to serve both boys and girls from infants through size 14.

State Police Get New Blue Shirts

Michigan State Police will shortly be outfitted with dark blue wool and dacron shirts and a contrasting light blue-gray tie, the first change in the uniform since 1947.

The change is being made because of the increased wearability of the shirts, making them less expensive in the long run, and because they give the officer a better military appearance than the light blue poplin shirt and navy blue tie now in use.

Prior to 1947, state police officers wore white shirts with the blouse during the winter months and a navy blue wool shirt without the blouse for summer.

These were replaced in that year by the light blue poplin shirt, which has been worn with and without the blouse.

Main Topic at Whittemore—

Drilling Started for Oil

Whittemore residents are bubbling over with excitement—exploration for oil is now under way in their back yard.

Drilling for oil and sale of oil leases are the current topics of conversations along this farm community's main street.

In the hardware, grocery store, hotel and restaurant—all conversations turn to progress reports on the first drilling rig being set up southwest of town, the news of latest "hold-outs" who have leased oil rights to their property and, of course, rumors.

Whittemore sits smack in the center of the most active oil leasing boom in the history of Iosco County. The going rate for oil leases is now \$1 per acre. When the activity started last spring, land was being leased for 50 cents an acre.

Residents of the community have their eyes glued to activities in section 29 of Burleigh Township. Here, C. J. Simpson, an independent oil operator from Dallas, Texas, is setting up a rotary well drilling rig. Land has been cleared and slush pits dug on the site.

Seismograph crews for Simpson recently completed work here in the search for oil and gas. The firm has been taking oil and gas leases in Iosco, Arenac, Ogemaw and Alcona Counties since the early part of 1960 and has been successful in acquiring an excess of 100,000 acres in North-eastern Michigan.

Simpson, who has general offices at Jackson, entered in a partnership venture with Sinclair Oil Company and Leonard Refinery to jointly expend a substantial amount of money for the purposes of doing geophysical work here.

Simpson has agreed to drill a minimum of eight test wells prior to September 1, 1961.

Charles Schubart of AuGres is Simpson's representative in this area. Several Whittemore men are obtaining oil leases for the firm.

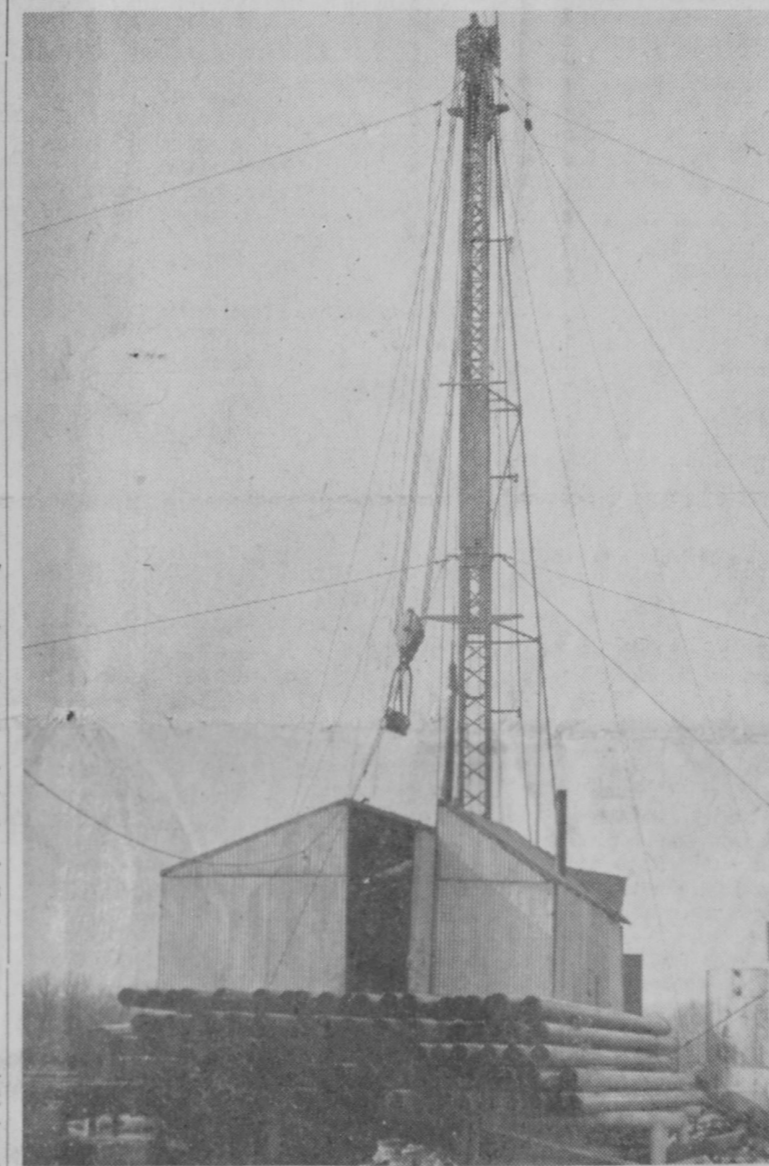
One agent, Orval Jay Fuerst, said this week that Simpson had oil leases on 90 percent of the property in Burleigh Township and activity now centered around leasing vacant land within the city limits.

Oil and gas lease forms are standard and provide for one-eighth of all oil and gas produced plus free gas for home and buildings on premises. It also provides an annual rental until oil or gas is produced.

"I've already ordered a barrel of detergent soap to clean the crud off my floors," quipped hotel owner, Stanley Osinski. "This community would welcome a good oil producer—think what a few oil-soaked drillers could do for our business."

Albert H. Buch, Iosco County register of deeds at Tawas City, reported today that the last time he had totaled figures, more than 13,074 acres of land had been leased for oil and gas rights in Iosco County. He said the total was more than doubled by this time.

Buch said that Iosco's oil activity

Hospital Urges Support of Red Cross Blood Bank

Tawas Hospital issued an urgent appeal to people of Iosco County to contribute funds to the American Red Cross in order to keep the chapter-sponsored blood bank operating.

Answering a call for donors last October, some 284 generous residents of the county, including many airmen from Wurtsmith Air Force Base, donated blood for the use of county residents.

To date, about 182 pints of blood have been used. Cost of operating the blood bank in Iosco is about nine cents per person, or an approximate total of \$1,600. Out of this figure are paid trained registered nurses to draw the blood, bottles for collecting, storage and transportation.

Another large item is the cost of shipping blood via bus to the hospital when it is needed.

Blood collected through the

American Red Cross is distributed to the patient without charge. All Iosco residents are covered by this program, regardless of where they are hospitalized.

Just by telling authorities that their county belongs to the blood bank program, all the blood used by them will be replaced on a pint-for-pint basis.

Local residents have benefited greatly during the past six months from the program. Two hunters will be forever grateful and, probably to some extent, owe their lives to the fact that the hospital was able to give blood to them so quickly.

"Our doctors and hospital personnel greatly appreciate what you as a community have done in donating blood and we feel certain that you will help financially to keep our local Red Cross Blood Bank operating another year," a hospital spokesman stated.

Wurtsmith to Outline Plans for Nuclear Disaster Control

A briefing to acquaint area civilians with problems concerning nuclear disaster control is scheduled to be held today (Wednesday) at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda.

For the United States Air Force to maintain the constant state of preparedness necessary to world peace, air force planes must sometimes carry or transport nuclear weapons and materials.

The possibility of an accident involving nuclear materials cannot be overlooked," states Col. John H. Hudson, base commander.

Although it is practically impossible for a nuclear weapon to be detonated accidentally, the conventional explosive charge that acts as a trigger may explode and scatter nuclear particles when the weapon is engulfed in flame.

"Although the air force has a training program designed to pre-

pare air force bases to successfully cope with peacetime nuclear accidents, such accidents have, and may again, occur outside an air force installation.

"In such case the air force needs the cooperation and assistance of certain civilian agencies in allaying panic and handling the accident," said Colonel Hudson.

Today's briefing of key civilians in this area starts at 1:00 p. m. and is to run until 5 o'clock.

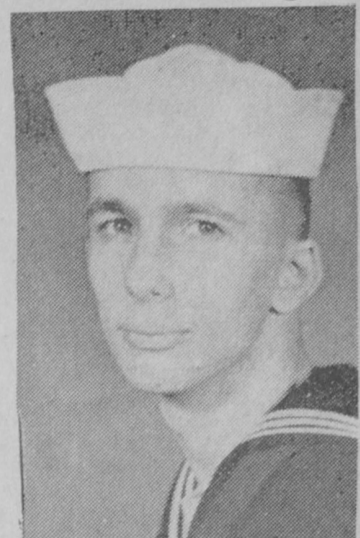

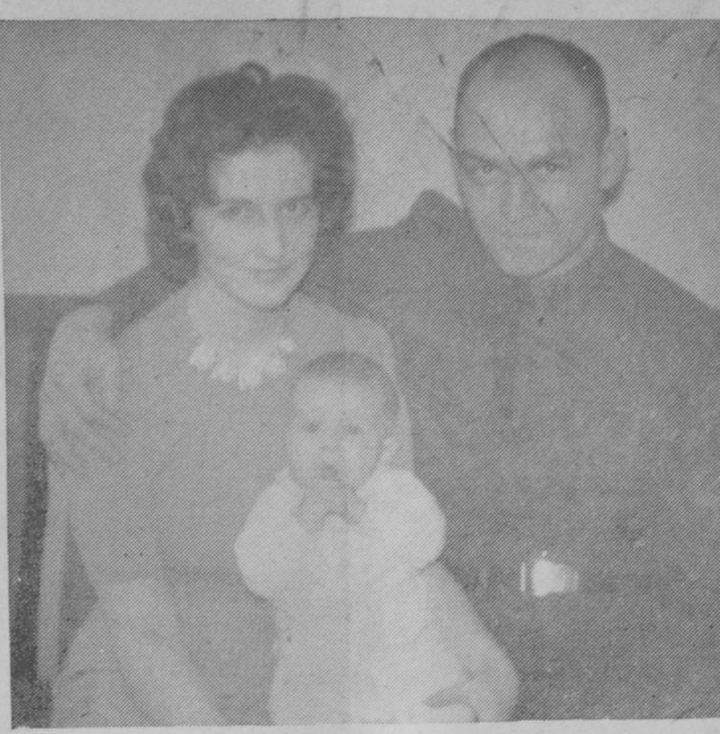

Tawas Area JV took a 62-21 decision over the visiting junior varsity. The locals jumped off to a 20-1 lead in the first stanza and were never headed.

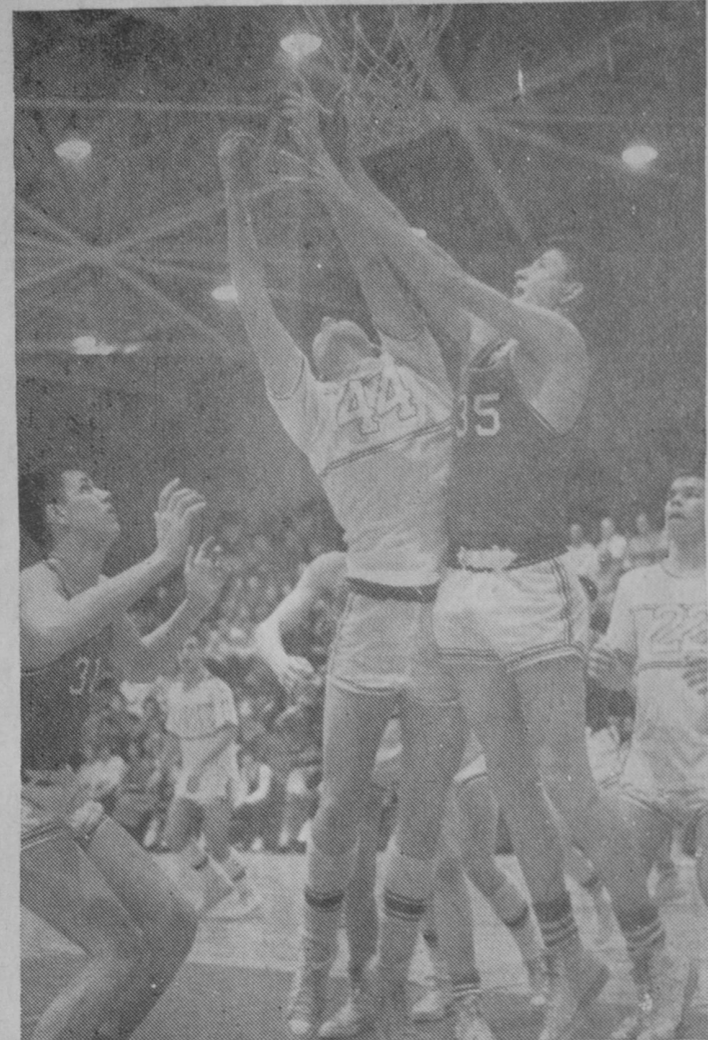
Colvin topped Tawas with 16 points, followed by DeWyse with 13. Covite had 10 points for Beaverton.

Supervisors' Proceedings

FEBRUARY SESSION
February 15, 1961

Pursuant to January adjournment, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by the chairman who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Ashton, Bellville, Blust, Brabant, Burgess, Everett, Gerard, Little, Long, Oates, Rodman, McKenzie, Smith, Stephan, Pollard, Webb, Werth, White, Kochenderfer. Absent: None.

Communications were read and referred to the proper committee by the chairman.

The clerk informed the board that he had at hand three sealed bids for the purchase of a second automobile for the sheriff's department and one sealed bid for the placement of gasoline tank installations at the Iosco County Airport.

The chairman set the opening of the bids as a special order of business for 1:30 p. m.

The clerk requested approval of the January minutes as published. Upon motion by Stephan supported by Brabant, the minutes were unanimously approved as published.

Mr. Davenport presented the board with individual detailed reports on the conference he attended at Washington, D. C., on education and problems of the aged.

The remainder of the morning was taken up with a spirited discussion of the new tax proposals recently presented to the legislature by the governor of Michigan.

Upon motion supported and prevailing, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session.

Mr. Werth for the welfare committee reported that he had been informed that applicants of our welfare department were making statements that surplus food for the unemployed was being distributed by adjacent counties.

The report caused considerable discussion as to whether it was rumor or fact and also what standards were being used to screen applicants regarding partial unemployment, total unemployment and so forth. The matter was referred to the welfare committee.

Mr. Little called attention to a Michigan Statute which provides that prisoners in the county jail can be made to do work on township, county and city roads. The matter was held open.

At 1:30 p. m., the bid was opened for the installation of gasoline tanks at the county airport and the bid was ordered placed on file in the clerk's office.

The bids on the police car were opened and referred to the finance committee.

Miss Edna Otis addressed the board stating that she knew of their interest in historical places in Iosco County. She gave a most interesting talk and presented the board with a list of these historical places of interest for future references. The board gave Miss Otis a round of applause for her interest and knowledge exhibited by her command of the history of this county. The written list was turned over to the finance committee.

Mr. Oates reported briefly on his attendance at the tax conference in Lansing.

Mr. Werth also reported that he was in attendance and expressed his concern about the state assessing personal property, his feeling being that the next

step could lead to assessment of real property.

Mr. Everett remarked that he felt that the personal property tax was one of the most vicious and most inequitable taxes that we have.

The whole matter was referred to the judiciary committee for further action.

Mr. Little read the following report of the finance committee. Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

Referring to the auditor's report January 1 - December 31, 1959, recommendations noted.

The finance committee has made a study of these recommendations and has made suitable moves to correct them.

Mr. Oates reported that the special nursing home committee was still making further studies and had recently visited Lansing to check such construction in that locality.

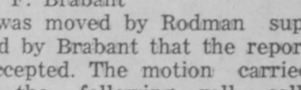

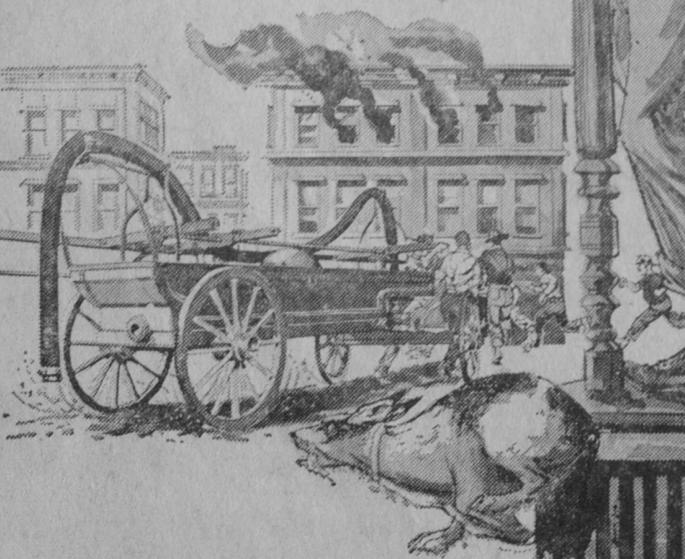

When Confederates fired on Ft. Sumter, the original of this hand-drawn, hand-pumped fire wagon served Lansing. 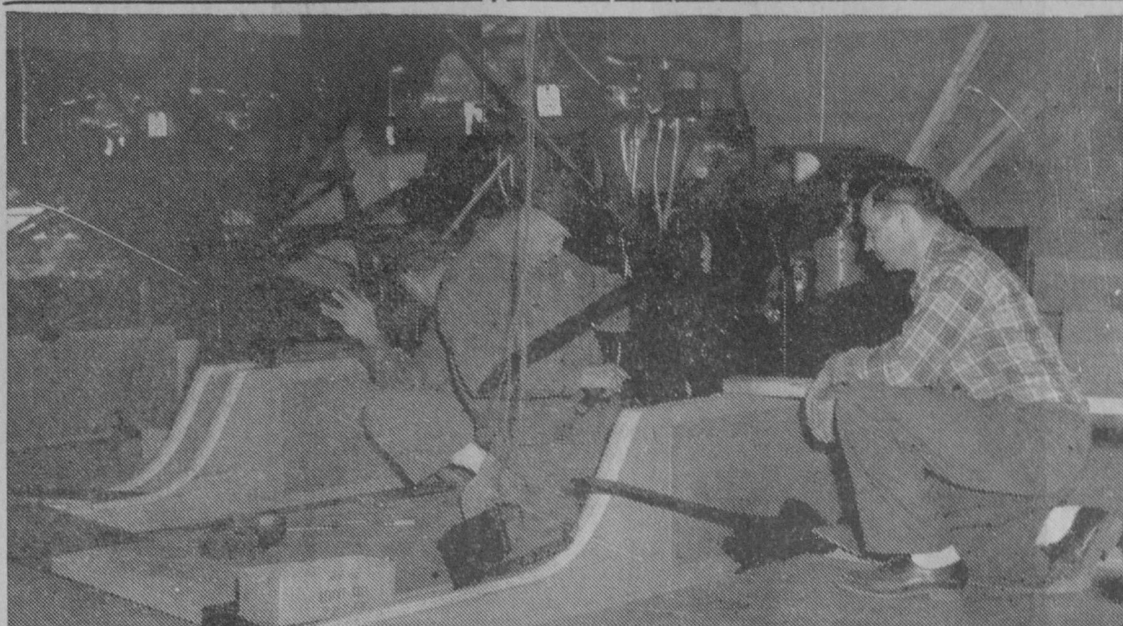

up January 7 and drilling was started five days later. By Friday of last week, drilling had gone through the Dundee zone and, at 3,384 feet, was approaching the sour zone.
Driller Earl Ross of Standish said they were having some trouble with cave-ins, which was slowing progress on the well. Working around the clock, the

firm plans to drill to a depth of 8,000 feet.

Two miles east of the Thompson area was the site of one of the last wells drilled in Iosco County. Drilled by J. C. Arthur for the Pabst Petroleum Development Company, it was plugged and abandoned on September 29, 1937, after drilling to a depth of 3,647 feet.

Only drilling activity in the Tawas area was in the spring of 1927. The Iosco County Oil Company, consisting of Charles A. Coryell Sr., L. G. McKay Sr., the late H. N. Butler and others, contracted with an Ohio operator to sink a 3,000-foot hole near East Tawas. The well was drilled to a depth greater than 3,000 feet but was finally discontinued as a dry hole.

Although several dry holes have been drilled in Iosco County in the search for oil, it is believed that the area has the proper geological formations and sedimentary depositions which could accumulate oil.

On the average, for every discovery made, an oil company drills about eight dry holes. Cost of each hole is more than \$40,000.

Farmers Interested in Grain Adjustment Should Notify ASC

Farmers in Iosco County who may be interested in a possible feed grain production adjustment program in 1961 are urged to call at the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, according to Burton A. Partlo, chairman of the ASC county committee. The request is made to farmers at this time because farm feed grain and other crop acreage information will be needed for any feed grain program that may be authorized for the coming crop season.

Farmers who supply feed grain and other acreage figures at this time will not be obligated to participate in a feed grain program if one becomes available, but will be eligible to participate. However, a program can be quickly put into operation if the necessary farm acreage information is on file at the county office. Mr. Partlo asks farmers' cooperation in providing information that will be needed before a program can be put into effect.

Interested farmers are asked to bring to the county ASC office their records of the acreage of cropland used for field corn, grain sorghums, oats, barley and other crops for the two crop years, 1959 and 1960. The report should be on the basis of the acreage planted and the use made of the crop produced. Accurate information must be obtained immediately for possible establishment of farm feed grain base acreages.

Since Iosco County is classed as a minor feed grain producing area, only interested farmers are being asked to make reports. In counties classed as major food grain producing areas, acreage reports are being obtained for all farms.

Selective Service Names Registrar at Oscoda Area School

If you are not at home when you should register, you may go to the local board serving the area where you are. If you give an address in your home county, your registration card will be forwarded to the local board there. College students, especially, should not delay registration. There is usually a local board in the college town to which they may report.

Likewise, if you should lose your registration certificate when you are away from home, you may go to the nearest local board and sign an application for a new one, which will be mailed to you by your own local board.

Also, if you are separated from military service, and do not return to your home county, you should report to the nearest local board.

Michigan Bell's Primary School Tax Largest in Its History

Michigan Bell Telephone Company announced its payment to the state primary school fund in 1960 was the largest single property tax payment in the company's history.

Amounting to a record \$14,857,665, an increase of nearly a million dollars over 1959, the payment again placed Michigan Bell as the top contributor to the fund.

T. C. Maher, manager here for the company, reported that \$26,023 of the total tax payment was allocated to two local public school systems.

Of this amount, the Oscoda school district received \$11,666. Other allocations were \$14,357 to the consolidated Tawas-East Tawas district.

Schools throughout Iosco County received from Michigan Bell's payment a total of \$36,676. Payments were based on the county school census of 5,247 and the following local school census figures: Oscoda, 1,669, and Tawas-East Tawas, 2,054.

The tax payment amounted to \$6.99 for each of the 2,124,139 students in the state between the ages of five and 19 who were on the census rolls for the 1959-60 school year.

The state primary school fund receives payments not only from Michigan Bell, but also from other telephone companies, and from the telegraph, railroad, Railway Express, Pullman and railway car loaning companies.
