## U of M Says Tawas School Overcrowded

That Tawas Area High School; is "rapidly becoming filled to or beyond its capacity," was emphasized in a report received this week from the University of Michigan's Bureau of School

In his report accrediting the school for another two years, G. Sutherland Hayden said that "it seems doubtful that it (the building) was designed to hold many more than 600 pupils and the present enrollment has reached

"It would certainly be good if plans and appropriations would provide additional space before crowding becomes sufficiently acute to weaken your educational

"The biology program is already being hampered by a shortage of laboratory space. Classes of 36 and 37 are too large for the teaching of almost any subject, but are especially so for proper instruction in laboratory work."

Hayden recently visited the school and checked minimum requirements established by the university's bureau of school services. These included curriculum, program, physical equipment, administrative staff, faculty, salaries, teaching loads, custodial and clerical help.

According to Principal Ernest Jordan, Tawas schools have been accredited since 1915. Hayden commended the school for the general behavior and ap-


