

U of M Says Tawas School Overcrowded

That Tawas Area High School is "rapidly becoming filled to or beyond its capacity," was emphasized in a report received this week from the University of Michigan's Bureau of School Services.

In his report accrediting the school for another two years, G. Sutherland Hayden said that "it seems doubtful that it (the building) was designed to hold many more than 600 pupils, and the present enrollment has reached 681."

"It would certainly be good if plans and appropriations would provide additional space before crowding becomes sufficiently acute to weaken your educational program."

"The biology program is already being hampered by a shortage of laboratory space. Classes of 36 and 37 are too large for the teaching of almost any subject, but are especially so for proper instruction in laboratory work."

Hayden recently visited the school and checked minimum requirements established by the university's bureau of school services. These included curriculum, program, physical equipment, administrative staff, faculty, salaries, teaching loads, custodial and clerical help.

According to Principal Ernest Jordan, Tawas schools have been accredited since 1915.

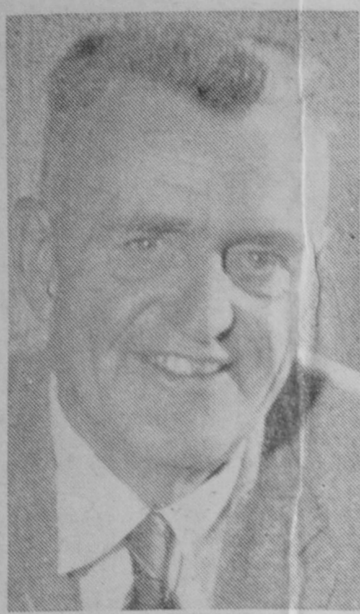
Hayden commended the school for the general behavior and appearance of its students.

Since the last accreditation visit two years ago, the business education curriculum has been extended to include a second year of shorthand. Also commended was the hiring of a full-time guidance counselor, along with improvements to the school library.

Other recommendations included hiring a full-time librarian. He stressed the need for "additional weeding of the library book collection." This is being planned, he noted.

Hayden also recommended that the school obtain basic office machines for its instruction in business education. This would include a calculator, adding machine, duplicator, dictation equipment and at least two electric typewriters.

He suggested that this equipment could be rented at a reasonable cost.

George Myles is Con-Con Candidate for 'Senate' Seat

George W. Myles, a Tawas City insurance agent since 1946 and well known throughout Northeastern Michigan, announced Saturday that he would be a Republican candidate for delegate to the constitutional convention this fall.

Myles, urged by many friends of this area to "throw his hat in the ring," will be a candidate for the 28th Senatorial District nomination at the July 25 primary election.

He is the second person from this area who has announced his candidacy for one of two con-con posts. Herman Dehnke of Harrisville, retired circuit judge, is a candidate in the Alpena Representative District.

The native Tawas citizen was 10th District supervisor of census during 1960, with headquarters at Bay City.

Myles, 54, married and the father of five children, served as Tawas City mayor from 1950 to 1957. He served as chief clerk for WPA in six Northeastern Michigan counties from 1935 to 1938 and was superintendent of public works here from 1938 to 1946.

He served four years as chairman of the Iosco County Polio Campaign, president of the Tawas Hospital Board for four years, past president of the Tawas Kiwanis Club, past president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, past president of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association and served six years as secretary of the Tawas City Board of Education.

He is a member of Tawas City Lodge, F and AM; Tawas Kiwanis Club, and Tawas Bay Yacht Club, of which he is treasurer.

Wurtsmith Gets First B-52H Bomber Tuesday

The first B-52H Stratofortress to be assigned to an operational unit in the Strategic Air Command arrived at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, Tuesday, as a member of the 524th Bombardment Squadron.

The aircraft was flown in by Col. John H. Kunkel Jr., who was met by Brig. Gen. Harold E. Humfeld, 40th Air Division commander; Col. John H. Hudson, 379th Combat Support Group commander, and key officers of the 40th Air Division, 379th Bombardment Wing and the 379th Combat Support Group.

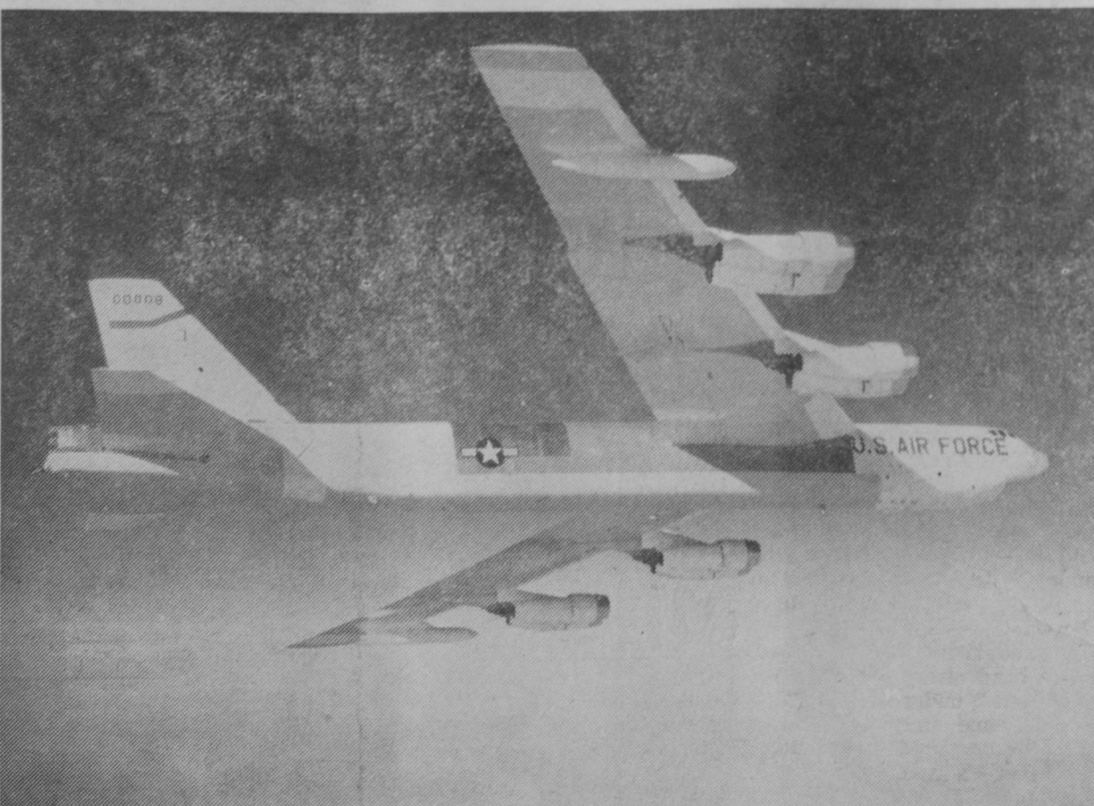

Two days later, the same bomber will be christened "The State of Michigan" during special ceremonies on May 11.

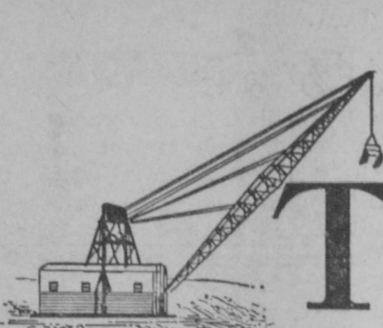

Millage Proposal for New Elementary Unit Discussed

Steps are to be taken by Tawas Area School to place a millage proposal before district voters July 10 to finance construction of additional elementary classrooms.

This action came on recommendation of a Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association committee, businessmen and residents who met Monday night with the board of education.

The group discussed matters of financing this construction and it was the consensus of opinion that

elementary needs were of first importance to the school district.

As a result, it was recommended that a 10-room building be erected at the Tawas City unit, to be used by fifth and sixth grades of the entire area, plus facilities for either fourth or seventh grade overflow.

The group favored financing on a pay-as-you-go basis. First step would be to develop a sinking fund, then follow up by raising necessary funds and construction

of the building. In addition to favoring constructing elementary grades first, the group recommended the isolation of junior high department from grades nine through 12.

The architect has recommended discontinuing use of the Alabaster unit once the long-term program is completed. Reasons for this discontinuance were listed as transportation, limited size of the site and the cost necessary to put the building in first-class condition.

The group is to meet again with the board next Tuesday, 7:30 p. m., to further study the best ways of acquainting the people with needs of the district before the time of election.

In other business, the board accepted the low bid of Bob's Electric for installing an electrical panel at the Alabaster unit. The bid was \$1,420.

The board authorized the purchase of stack ovens for the lunchroom from Kirckman Brothers, Bay City. The firm's low bid was \$1,020.

Spring Flower Show Saturday

Tawas City Garden club will present its annual spring flower show at Tawas Area High School Saturday, May 13. Theme of this year's show is "Wonders of May."

Exhibits will be accepted from 8:30 to 11:30 a. m. and the show will be open to the public from 2:30 to 9:30 p. m.

Printed rules and regulations governing exhibits are available. There are 51 classifications listed.

The show will consist of six sections. Sections A and B will include arrangements, the latter open only to exhibitors who have never won a ribbon award in a flower show.

Section C is for junior entries and is open to pupils in grades one through eight.

Section D, which consists of potted plants, is the largest category in the show with 26 classifications listed. This includes specimen branches of flowering trees

and shrubs. One stem or stalk is to be exhibited, unless otherwise indicated.

Section F consists of tray exhibits.

All classes are open to the public and all entries are free.

First, second and third place ribbons are to be awarded in each class. The Lemke trophy will be awarded to the member of Tawas City Garden Club having the most points.

All horticultural specimens must be grown by the exhibitor.

All houseplants must have been in possession of exhibitor for three months. Flowers used in arrangement classes need not be grown by the exhibitor.

Dog Poisoning Under Investigation by Police

Tawas City Police Chief George Ruth is investigating a dog poisoning case at the Leslie Apartments on Mathews Street. Two dogs owned by apartment dwellers were poisoned on two different days early last week.

No complaints had been received in regard to the dogs and both owners stated that their pets were not allowed to run loose and were usually confined to the building at night.

Dr. E. B. Cavell, veterinarian, said that symptoms indicated that the dogs had died of strychnine "suffocation." He said that apparently the poison had been spread on toast or bread and left where the dogs would find it.

He shuddered to think of what might have happened if the "toast" had gotten into the hands of a small child.

Chief Ruth asks that anyone who

may have information regarding the poisoning of the dogs to please notify him. Your attention is directed to the "Letters to the Editor" column in which one of the dog owners directs a letter to the person responsible for the poisoning.

National Hospital Week is being observed May 7-13 at Tawas Hospital with a general open house for the public today and Thursday from 3:00 to 4:00 p. m.

Tea will be served to visitors at 4:00 p. m. both days and school youngsters are invited to attend Thursday afternoon.

Earlier this week, employees, Gray Ladies and members of the Tawas Hospital Auxiliary were honored at teas. Doctors were to be honored Wednesday morning.

All residents of the area are urged to attend this event, which lacks but a few days of coinciding with the ninth anniversary of the opening of Tawas Hospital.

Nine years ago next month, the doors of the then uncompleted hospital were literally "blown open" by a tornado which struck the area. Equipment and supplies were quickly unpacked and the facility was pressed into service to treat victims of the storm.

Operated by the Sisters of St. Joseph, Tawas Hospital today stands on the threshold of starting its 10th year of service to the Northeastern Michigan area.

The extent of this service is reflected by statistics compiled last year. During 1960, some 2,152 patients were admitted to Tawas Hospital and 570 babies were born there. Some 52,342 meals were prepared by the kitchen staff, laboratory tests amounted to 26,900 and there were 1,976 X-rays.

Of particular interest to the Tawas area is the fact that the hospital is one of its principal employers. Approximately 100 full and part-time persons work there, receiving salaries which totaled more than \$223,000 during 1960.

Nearly all of this money received by employees flows back again into the community for the purchase of food, clothing and other necessities.

In addition, the hospital spends between \$14,000 and \$15,000 for supplies from local stores.

In this manner, the hospital has been a help to the community in more ways than for the relief of pain and sickness.

Mail Box Improvement Week Set for May 15-20; Time for Painting

The annual Mail Box Improvement Program will be observed this year during the week of May 15-20 and will as heretofore include mail boxes on rural routes with collections and delivery service.

The post office department wishes to encourage patrons to provide suitable mail receptacles erected and maintained for easy and safe accessibility; presenting a neat appearance and affording protection to the mail. Boxes that are not properly erected or not maintained in good serviceable condition retard the delivery of mail and expose it to the weather. Boxes which are no longer serviceable must be replaced.

Patrons of rural routes are required to provide mail boxes of the standard approved type. Names of the box owners should be inscribed on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches or on the door if boxes are grouped. The box number may be inscribed on the box if desired. Boxes and supports should be kept painted.

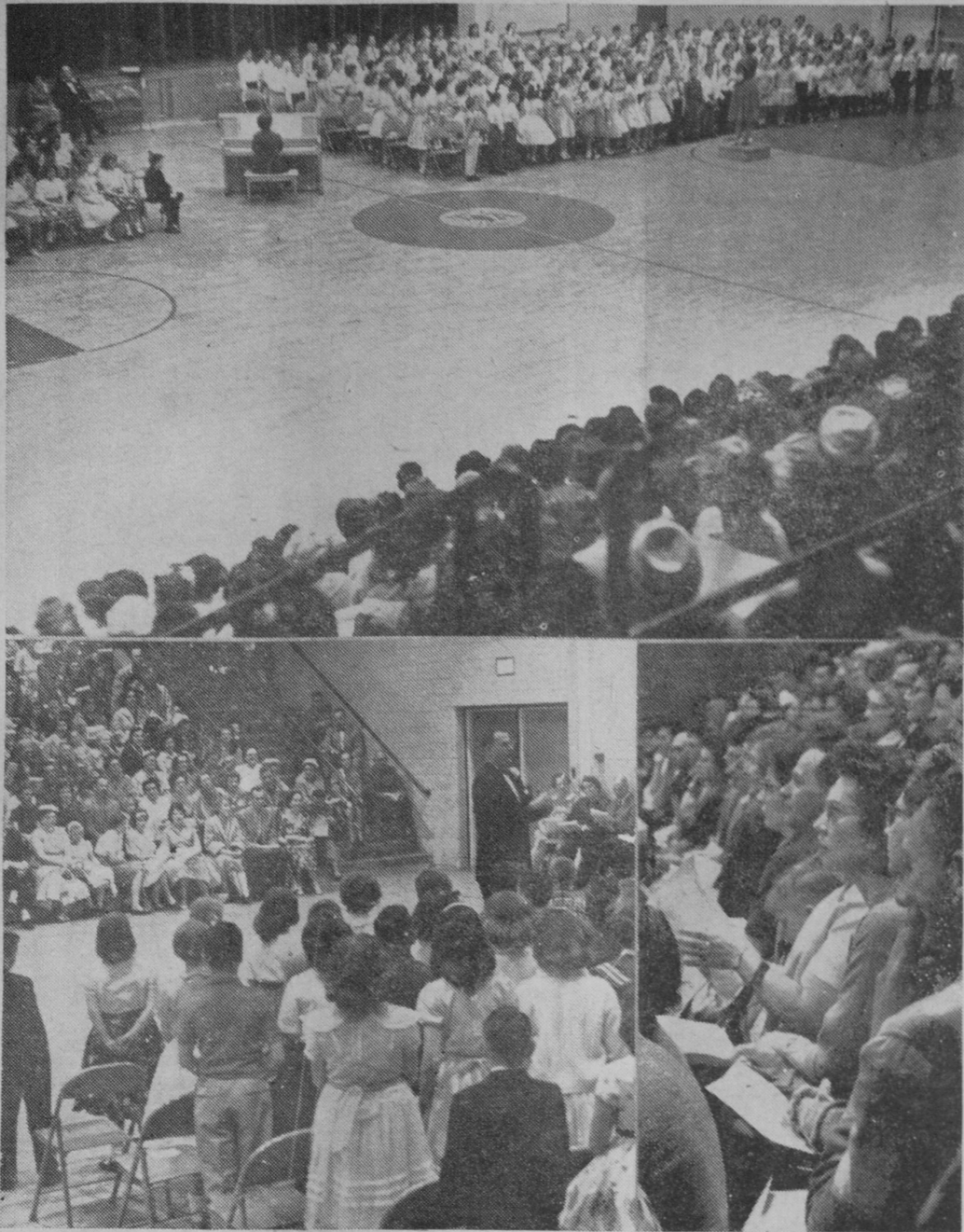

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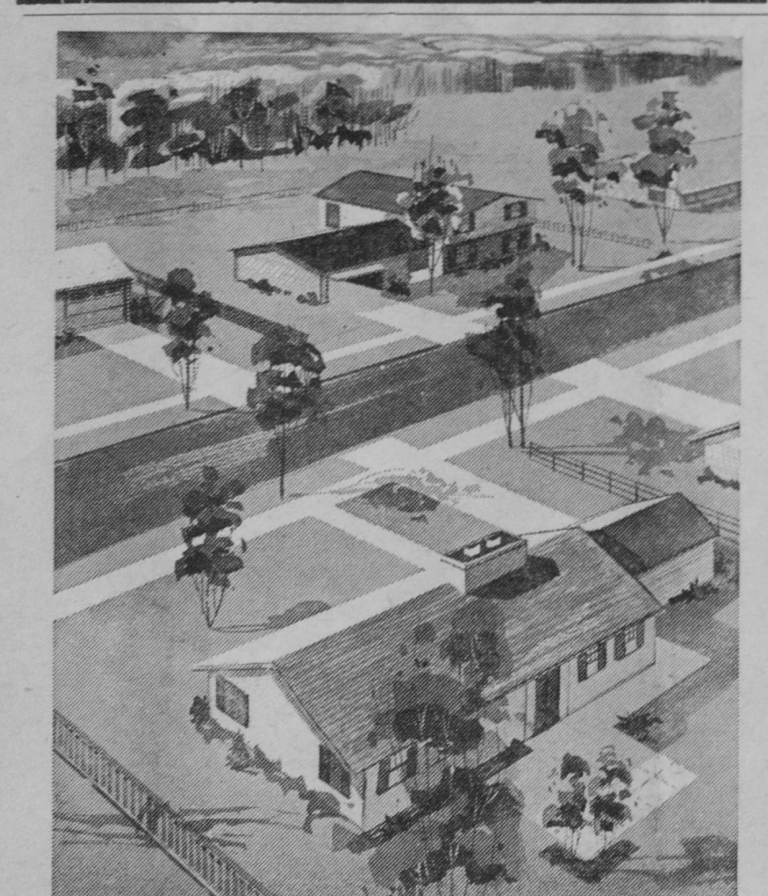

(Events exactly 100 years ago this week in the Civil War—told in the language and style of today.)

Victoria Terms Britain "Neutral" in Rebellion

Forbids Aid to Either Side

LONDON—May 13—Queen Victoria today told the world that England would remain neutral in the war between the states in America.

Noting "certain hostilities between the government of the United States of America and certain states styling themselves as the Confederate States of America," the Queen proclaimed a "royal determination to maintain a strict and impartial neutrality in the contest between the contending parties."

Her majesty's decision was arrived at with full agreement of Prince Albert, her consort, according to court circles.

THE FAR-REACHING decision capped a month of international intrigue in which Federal envoys to the court of the Queen sought to steer Britain clear of any direct aid to the rebelling Confederate forces.

Secretary of State Seward earlier had given Lord John Russell, secretary of state for Great Britain, a thinly-disguised protest over his meeting with representatives of the Confederate government.

In this message, Seward advised Britain that privateers would be treated as pirates and that suppliers of aid to the privateers would, in effect, be treated as accomplices of the pirates—clear warning to Britain to steer clear of the infant Confederate Navy.

Subjects of the Queen also were forbidden to supply munitions; to convey men or arms to either side in the war, or to in any other way aid either force.

Big Riot in St. Louis

ST. LOUIS, Mo.—May 10—At least 20 persons were killed today, and several more gravely wounded, when Union troops opened fire on a mob in the downtown area of this city.

The troops were under command of Capt. Nathaniel Lyon, assigned in February as officer-in-charge of the St. Louis arsenal.

Lyon's forces raided a nearby encampment of state militia, forced the militiamen to surrender, and were parading them through the streets of downtown St. Louis when onlookers began throwing rocks.

The stones were met by gunfire and the 20 fell under the hail of Union bullets.

St. Louis is a troubled city today. Missouri Gov. Claiborne Jackson has branded President Lincoln's call last week for troops as "unconstitutional" and "revolutionary." The southern sympathies of the state militia—the group Capt. Lyon captured—are frequently and loudly proclaimed.
