## War Dead Honored in Memorial Day Services

Traditional Memorial Day services were held Tuesday morning in communities of Iosco County honoring the nation's honored dead of five wars.

Services also commemorated the centennial of the American Civil War, for whose veterans Memorial Day was first established.

It was a day for honoring heroes of the past, as pointed out by the Rev. Walter Pieper, pastor of Zion Lutheran Church, who delivered the memorial address at Tawas City Cemetery.

As the roll call of dead was read by Earl Davis, adjutant of the day, it was noted that Tawas City Cemetery was the final resting place for 27 "Boys in Blue" of the 1861-1865 war.

The Spanish-American War of 1898-1899 had one veteran taking part. Veterans of World War I and World War II, along with those of the Korean conflict, also participated.

In the line of march were the Tawas Area High School Band, boy scouts, girl scouts and brownies.

Honorary officer of the day was Ernest Burtzloff, a veteran of World War I and past commander of Jesse C. Hodder American Legion Post, under whose auspices the services were held.

Intermediate Girl Scout Jacqueline Davis recited the poem, "American Answer;" and Judy Short, junior high girl scout, recited "In Flanders Field." Boy Scout Jack Mills presented the "Gettysburg Address."

Following the services, members of the American Legion decorated the graves with American flags and wreaths.

## Last Days of School Term Approaching for Iosco County

Two Iosco schools will officially close for summer vacation this week while two others will end the 1960-61 term next week, according to an announcement today by Russell A. Rollin, county superintendent of schools.

Hale Area and Whittemore-Prescott Area Schools will close Friday, June 2. One week later, Friday, June 9, Oscoda and Tawas Area Schools will close for the summer.

## Red Cross Bloodmobile to Visit Iosco Co. Next Week

Louis C. Awalt, chairman of the Iosco Blood Bank, and Judge Alan C. Miller, chairman of the Iosco County Red Cross Chapter, announced today that the bloodmobile will visit this county next week.

It will be located at Christ Episcopal Church on Monday, June 5, from 2:00 to 8:00 p. m. On Tuesday, it will move to Wurtsmith

Air Force Base from 8:30 a. m. to 2:30 p. m.

Volunteers may make appointments with Mrs. Helen Tuttle, FOrEst 2-3236, or Horton Robinson at Wurtsmith, SE 9-3611, Extension 2219.

Women volunteers are needed to assist at the bloodmobile centers on both days. These volunteers are to register donors, take

temperatures, work in the donor room, dispatch bottles and assist in the canteen.

Awalt said that it takes from 45 minutes to an hour of a donor's time to give blood and can be given by all between the ages of 21 and 59.

"Giving blood is easy and painless," said Awalt. "Proof of this by experience brings nine out of 10 donors back another time." Blood can be given as many as five times in a year.

"Blood will always be available to Iosco County residents as long as we have the blood bank program active in the county," said Judge Miller. "This is possible on an exchange agreement. All the patient has to do is tell the hospital that Iosco County is participating in the Red Cross Blood Bank Program."

There is never a charge made for blood received from the Red Cross. The hospital, however, does have to charge a fee for administering it. It is not necessary for blood recipients to arrange for blood replacement donors.

"There is, however, a need for Iosco people to volunteer as blood donors each time the bloodmobile visits our communities," said Judge Miller.

## Graduation Week Starts This Sunday

Baccalaureate services for the class of 1961 will be held Sunday, June 4, at Tawas Area High School Auditorium.

Principal Ernest Jordan said this year's class consists of 111 students.

The Rev. Paul Sutton, rector of Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, will deliver the sermon, Scripture reading and prayer.

The invocation will be given by Kirk Wendt and Christine Moehring will deliver the benediction.

Participating in the procession and recessional will be Tawas Area High School Band. The high school choir will sing "Testament of Nations."

Activities during the last week of school will find review for examinations starting June 5. Final examinations will start Tuesday afternoon and last all day Wednesday.

There will be no school for grades seven, eight, nine, 10 and 11 on Thursday. Teachers will be correcting examination papers on that day and seniors will be preparing for commencement exercises that night.

Students will report to school Friday to receive report cards.

## Millage Remains the Same; Create Three New Funds

Although city millage will remain the same as the current year, during fiscal 1961-62 millage spread on tax rolls by the City of East Tawas will be changed somewhat.

Mayor C. V. Miller, reported Monday that three new funds have been added this year. These include a special assessment revolving fund, one-tenth of a mill; police protection, one-tenth of a mill; and cemetery fund, four-tenths of a mill.

Other funds will bring total millage up to 19½. These funds include contingent, 44; general street, four; hydrant rental, 3.75; street lighting, 2.25; sanitary service, 1.75; recreation, 5; maintenance of public buildings, one, and fire protection, 1.25.

With a total valuation of \$2,700,950, East Tawas will have a general operating expense of \$118,000. Part of this is to be raised by taxation while the remainder comes from other sources.

Taxes raised in July of this year will not be used until after October 1, which is the start of the new fiscal year.

## East Tawas Plans Centennial in 1962

Plans for celebrating the 100th anniversary of the founding of East Tawas are to be made soon by the East Tawas Council, reports Mayor C. V. Miller.

East Tawas will be 100 years old next year and tentative plans call for a celebration in late June.

Mayor Miller said that the council had been reminded recently of the impending birthday of the city by Miss Edna Otis.

"We have not had a chance to discuss plans as yet but action will be taken soon by the council," said the mayor.

The community's sister city, Tawas City, observed its centennial in 1954 while Iosco County marked its 100th year with an observance in 1957.

Both of these observances featured parades and lengthy centennial programs.

## Largo Springs Project Nears Completion; 'Bee' Sunday

"It was a bigger job than we anticipated, but by the end of this week Largo Springs should be ready again for enjoyment of the public."

Speaking was Howard Brubaker, who had charge of a group of volunteers who assisted the Oscoda Park Commission Sunday in rebuilding a stairway down the steep bank of the AuSable River.

Between 60 and 75 persons answered a call for help issued by the park commission and Brubaker said that about 30 persons worked the entire day on the project.

"We were very pleased with the response and anyone who wishes to volunteer his services this week may do so," said Brubaker.

The park commission plans to hold another work bee this Sunday to finish work which may be left uncompleted during the week.

By Sunday night, the crew of volunteers had nearly completed the new stairway leading to the springs. "It was heavy work to carry oak planking down the steep bank and actual construction consumed more time than we anticipated," said Brubaker.

Only one section of the stairway remains to be completed. Volunteer workers also reconstructed the dam at the base of

the hill which collects water from several of the springs. More work remains on this project before it is completed.

"Many area residents stopped at the site of Largo Springs and donated money to the park commission to help with this project," said Brubaker. "The commission will appreciate any donations as the material for this project is quite expensive," he stated.

Brubaker gave special thanks to Donald Gerhardt, owner of the Whispering Pines, who had a crew of 18 men working on the project.

## Three Escape Injury in Crash Sunday

Three Tawas men escaped injury Sunday afternoon when their car struck a parked vehicle owned by Mark Defibaugh on Tawas Beach Road.

Dale L. Wheatley, 19, driver, told officers he lost control of his vehicle on a curve and struck the Defibaugh car which was parked in a driveway.

Wheatley was ticketed for reckless driving. He and his two passengers, Darryl L. Leslie and Brian H. Westcott, were uninjured.

## Tawas Hospital Expansion Urged

Expansion of facilities of Tawas Hospital, which was urged last week by the hospital's medical staff, is to be discussed at the annual meeting of the Tawas Hospital Board, according to George W. Myles, president.

In a letter to the board last week, Dr. Norman Payea, vice chief of staff, said that the medical staff had gone on record as unanimously urging the governing board, the administration and hospital board to take immediate preliminary steps for completion of an extension of the size and facilities of the hospital.

"As you know, we have been very pressed for room at the hospital and recently have averaged more than 100 percent occupancy," stated Dr. Payea.

"This is unpleasant for the patient and inhibits the best of medical care from being adequately carried out. Further action and information on this subject will be forthcoming," he stated.

## Iosco Airport OK'd for Funds

Iosco County has been approved by the Michigan Department of Aeronautics to receive funds on a matching basis for improvements at the county airport.

According to a letter received by Henry Oates, airport committee chairman of the board of supervisors, the commission has allocated \$6,000 for improvements here.

With the \$6,000 in county money presently deposited with the state, it will mean that \$12,000 will be expended on power lines, telephone line, well and a small administration building.

L. C. Andrews, assistant director of engineering, will be in charge of the project for the department, stated James D. Ramsey, director.

The airport was seeded May 20. Mr. Oates expects that it will be in operation late this year.

Jay Woods, Harrison contractor, is presently installing metal markers and a wind sock.

## Plan Completion of 'Enchanted Forest' Project in 1962

Work toward completion of a dream of many years is finally being realized by a talented sculptress.

When Mr. and Mrs. Albert Chaney left Tawas City in 1954, they sold their home and about 200 feet of US-23 frontage to the Walter Schuhmachers.

The property was to have been the site of what Mrs. Chaney hoped would someday prove to be one of the area's biggest tourist attractions . . . "The Enchanted Forest."

Such a project had been her dream since 1943, when the Chaney's first purchased the property and established a sign business following World War II.

She had studied at Cranbrook Institute before coming to Tawas City and, during her spare time here, created several pieces of sculpture for commercial use. These signs include a Hereford bull at King's Market, a fish at the Graystone, an Indian in front of a restaurant north of East Tawas, to name a few.

Her idea for the Enchanted Forest was to have groups of concrete statuary depicting scenes from children's stories and Greek mythology. She had started work on some of the statues but had to abandon her plans when the family decided to move.

"I hope you can carry on with the idea of the Enchanted Forest," was what Mrs. Chaney told the Schuhmachers when they purchased the property.

"My husband could not see how it would be possible for us to ever complete the project," said Mrs. Schuhmacher. "We knew absolutely nothing about the art of sculpturing and all we had was Orpheus, a sign and a few other random pieces of Mrs. Chaney's work."

Orpheus, whose lyre according to Greek mythology could charm beasts and make trees and rocks

move, has been standing atop his pedestal for several years. He has weathered winters in naked splendor—the serenity of his stone face unchanged, except for a missing patch of paint here and there.

During the years, countless letters have been exchanged between Mrs. Schuhmacher and Mrs. Chaney . . . always with the idea that someday Mrs. Chaney would return to Tawas City and complete her work.

After much discussion and planning over the years, Mrs. Chaney finally returned to Tawas City last month to assist the Schuhmachers with the project. Activity there drew immediate attention of area residents, who have shown great interest in the project.

"I expect to be here and see the Enchanted Forest through to completion," said Mrs. Chaney. Her husband, who is employed by a mobile home company, will commute between Tawas City and his work.

The entire project is not expected to be completed until July 1962, but a few groupings will be ready by July 4 of this year.

Although the Schuhmachers do not wish to reveal all of their plans, the Enchanted Forest will include, among other groupings, a story book setting, a Japanese garden and a midsummer night's dream.

When the project is completed next year, admission will be charged to enter the "forest," which comprises an area of about four acres. There will be no charge this year, however.

In addition to work on this ambitious project, the Schuhmachers and Mrs. Chaney are producing small lawn statuary to sell to the public. These figures, which will go on sale soon, will help to finance part of the project. Several items were displayed at the re-

cent show of the Tawas City Garden Club.

In the meantime, Mr. Schuhmacher is trying his hand with the tools of the sculptor. He is putting the finishing touches on a concrete statue of "Humpty Dumpty" which will be included

in the storybook setting. All of the youngsters in the neighborhood think that "Humpty's the most."

In a few more weeks, Orpheus will have some new stone friends and a dream will be partially realized.

## Kiwanis Vehicle Safety Check Begins Today

The board was informed by the health committee that Dr. Hasty, director of District Health Unit No. 2, was seeking a \$2,000.00 per year increase in salary of which Iosco County's share would be 41 percent. Referred to the finance committee.

Mr. Long addressed the board stating that he wished the drain committee to meet with Rod Meade, road commission engineer, for the purpose of making some recommendation as to a procedure to follow in trying to correct the Townline Drain. Mr. Long stated that one individual stated that he would properly relocate the Townline Drain if a meeting was arranged for 1:30 p. m.

Upon motion supported and prevailing, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session.

Mr. Oates introduced Mr. Peckham, state airport engineer, who reported to the board that work was progressing nicely on the

new airport and that final approval would soon be granted for the contracting work to date.

### 'Little Giant' Mourned

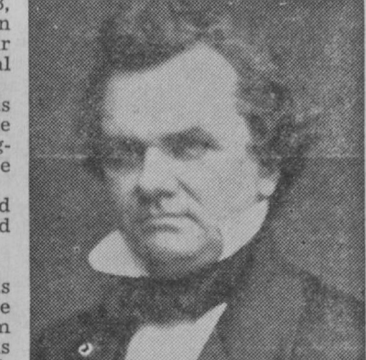
# Stephen A. Douglas Dies in Chicago

CHICAGO, Ill.—June 3—The "Little Giant" is dead.

Sen. Stephen Arnold Douglas, 48, died at his Oakenwald estate, on the shores of Lake Michigan, four miles south of Chicago's central area, at 9 p. m. today.

With him to the last was his wife, Adele Cutts Douglas. She reported that among Mr. Douglas' last words was this advice for his sons:

"Tell them to obey the laws and the constitution of the United States."

A SCANT few hours before his death, Douglas had roused a huge audience in Chicago's Wigwam with the injunction that "... it is the duty of every American citizen to rally around the flag of his country."

Douglas, although traditionally at odds with President Lincoln politically, has been a key advisor of the chief executive during the Civil War developments.

On Sunday, April 14, he conferred at the White House on the Ft. Sumter crisis at the instigation of Congressman George Ashmun of Massachusetts, who had presided over the Chicago Republican convention last year at which Lincoln was nominated.

The next day Douglas issued a statement saying that "while I am unalterably opposed to the administration in all political issues, I am prepared to fully sustain the President in the exercise of all his constitutional functions, to preserve the Union, maintain the government, and defend the capital."

Douglas added that he and the president "spoke of the present and future without any reference to the past."

Plans are being made for the burial of Mr. Douglas on his wooded estate. Public buildings here, in Springfield, the state capital, and in Washington were to be draped in tribute to the death of the intense, incisive senator from Illinois.

IT WAS A WARM, friendly meeting, from all accounts—a meeting at which Mr. Lincoln's presidential tally last November of 1,866,000 votes against Douglas' 1,375,000 apparently was forgotten.

### Union Victory at Philippi

GRAFTON, Va.—June 3—Union forces under Col. B. F. Kelley today scored a decided—although relatively minor—victory over Confederate troops at Philippi, 30 miles south of here.

Details of the encounter vary. Federal sources said the Rebel force numbered some 2,000 and that 15 of these were killed in the gunfire; but Confederate spokesmen put the total force at less than 1,000.

At any rate, it was a total rout. Southern troops, under the command of Col. G. A. Porterfield of the Virginia Volunteers, were awakened in the foggy pre-dawn hours by Union artillery fire, and managed to escape before Kelley's encirclement maneuver could be effected.

IRONICALLY, the only Union casualty was Col. Kelley. He suffered a pistol wound in the chest.

Kelley's attack followed his movement from Wheeling toward Grafton, where Confederate troops had burned Baltimore and Ohio railroad bridges across the Monongahela river, cutting a major line of communication between Washington and the west.

Aided by several Ohio regiments, Kelley drove off the Rebels, rebuilt the bridges, and launched his assault on Philippi, to which the Confederate forces had withdrawn.

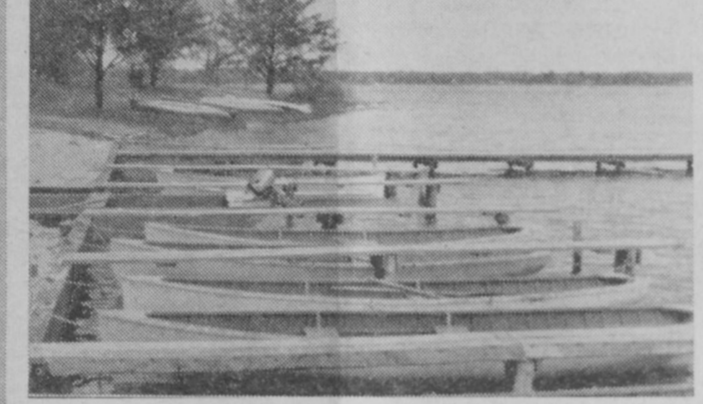

### 'Lost Humans - Yes, Lost Animals - No'

Persons who find "lost" fawns in the woods should leave them right where they are, warns Conservation Officer Arthur G. Leitz. During the past week, two spotted fawns were brought to the

residence of Officer Leitz. In both cases, the finders said that "the helpless fawns were wandering around without any mother."

"These fawns were not lost," said Leitz. "The old doe was probably close by—now we are faced with the problem of what to do with them."

In all his years as a conservation officer, Leitz said he had never seen a lost fawn. "I have heard of lost humans, but never a lost animal," he commented.

Leitz warned that people who pick up and transport fawns or molest them in anyway will face prosecution. "We warn people every year that fawns should not be handled," said Leitz. "We are getting tired of having people bring in 'lost' fawns."

### Points Out Forest Fire Danger

Two forest fires over the past week-end pointed out the need for careful use of fires in wooded areas. This was the warning issued Monday by Fire Warden Bert MacGregor of the Michigan Department of Conservation.

"This past spring has been very dry and, in spite of Sunday's rain, the wooded areas are in a dangerous condition," MacGregor stated.

Two fires in Plainfield Township on Saturday and Monday burned five acres of wooded land. One fire was caused by lightning while the other was attributed to careless use of a bonfire.

A total of 17 forest fires have been reported in Iosco County thus far this year and about 90 acres of land have been burned.

"In several instances, the fires could have reached far greater proportions had we not been notified in time," he stated.

MacGregor commended the volunteer fire departments of Iosco County for their assistance in fighting brush and grass fires. He said that no burning permits were being issued during the day. The wind usually diminishes in the evening and lessens the chance for a fire to get out of control.

All of the Iosco purchases were hereforas. Finley reports that total receipts for the 36 bulls amounted to \$12,610, with an average of \$350 for each bull.

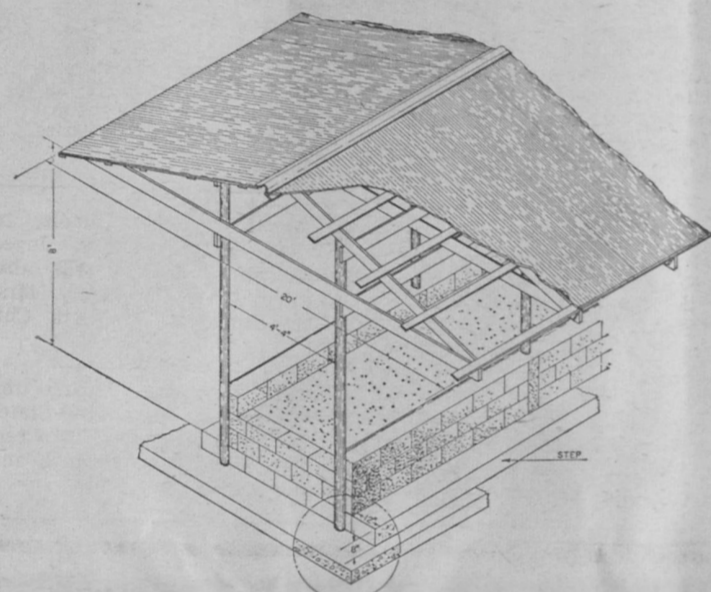

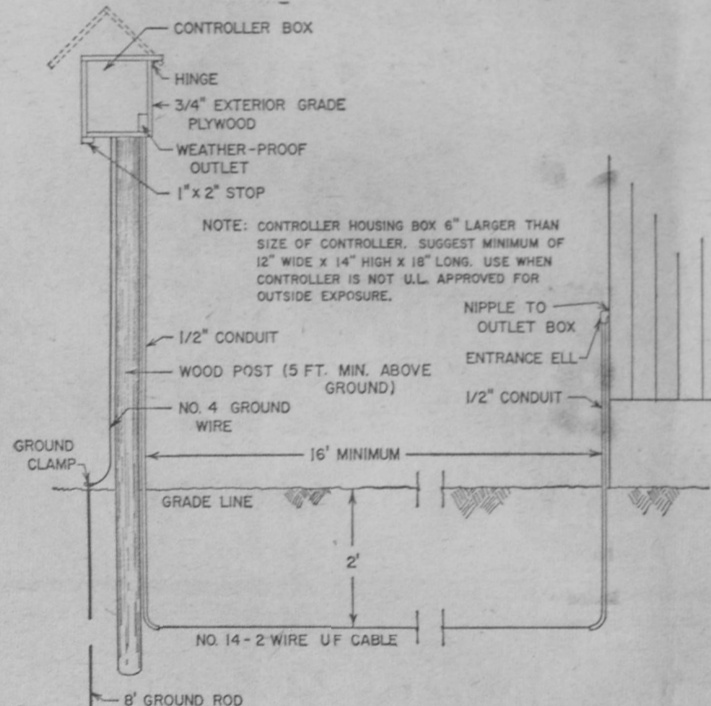

# Tawas Area Braves Win NEM Baseball Championship

Divisional winners Tawas Area and Houghton Lake high schools met Wednesday at West Branch for the baseball championship of the Northeastern Michigan Conference. Tawas Area Braves won their third straight title, 1-0, in 11 innings.

For Coach Bill McIntosh's nine, it was the school's third undefeated season in a row in NEM play. The only loss suffered in a string of 29 wins came May 20 when the Braves lost in the semifinals of the Mt. Pleasant invitational tournament.



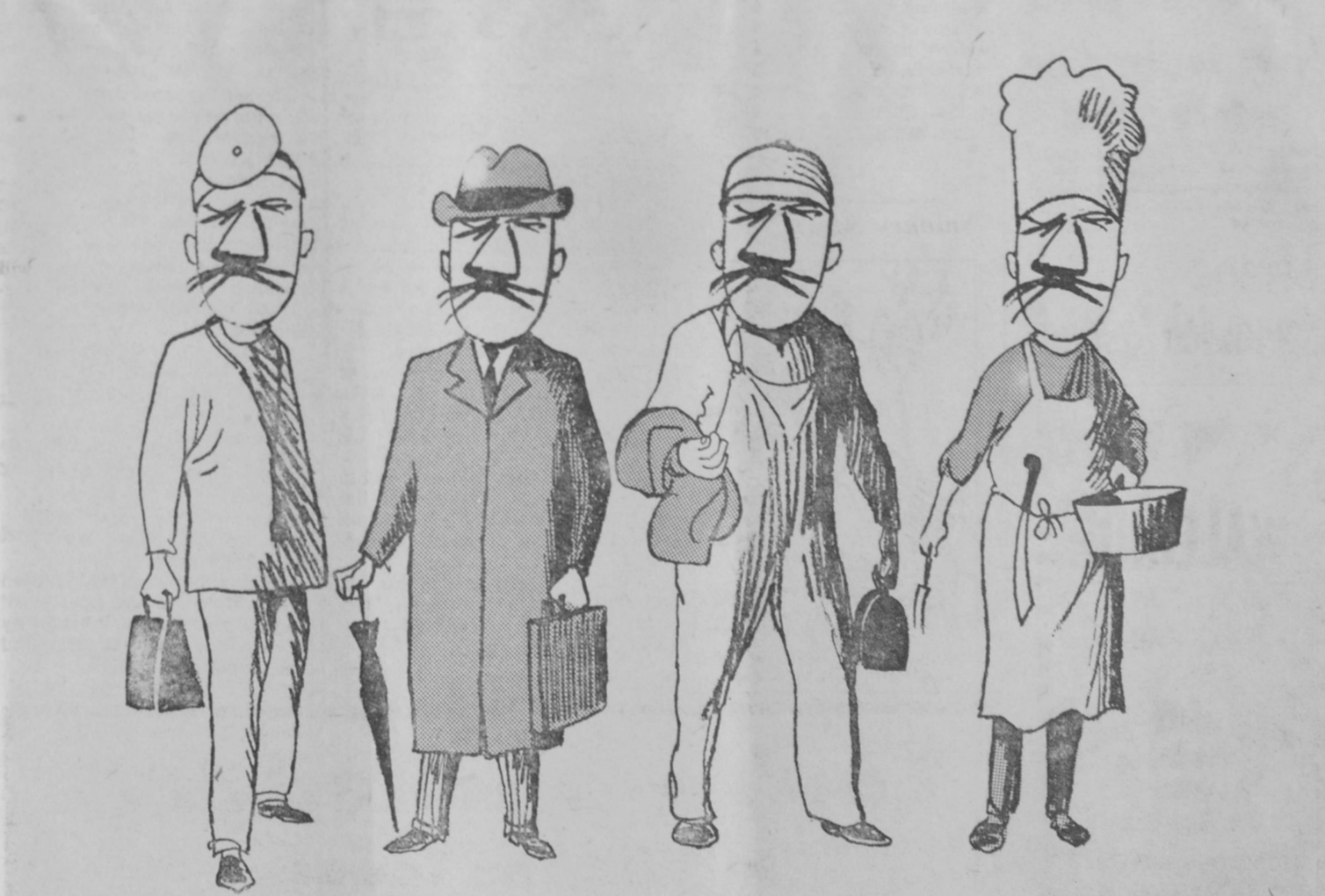

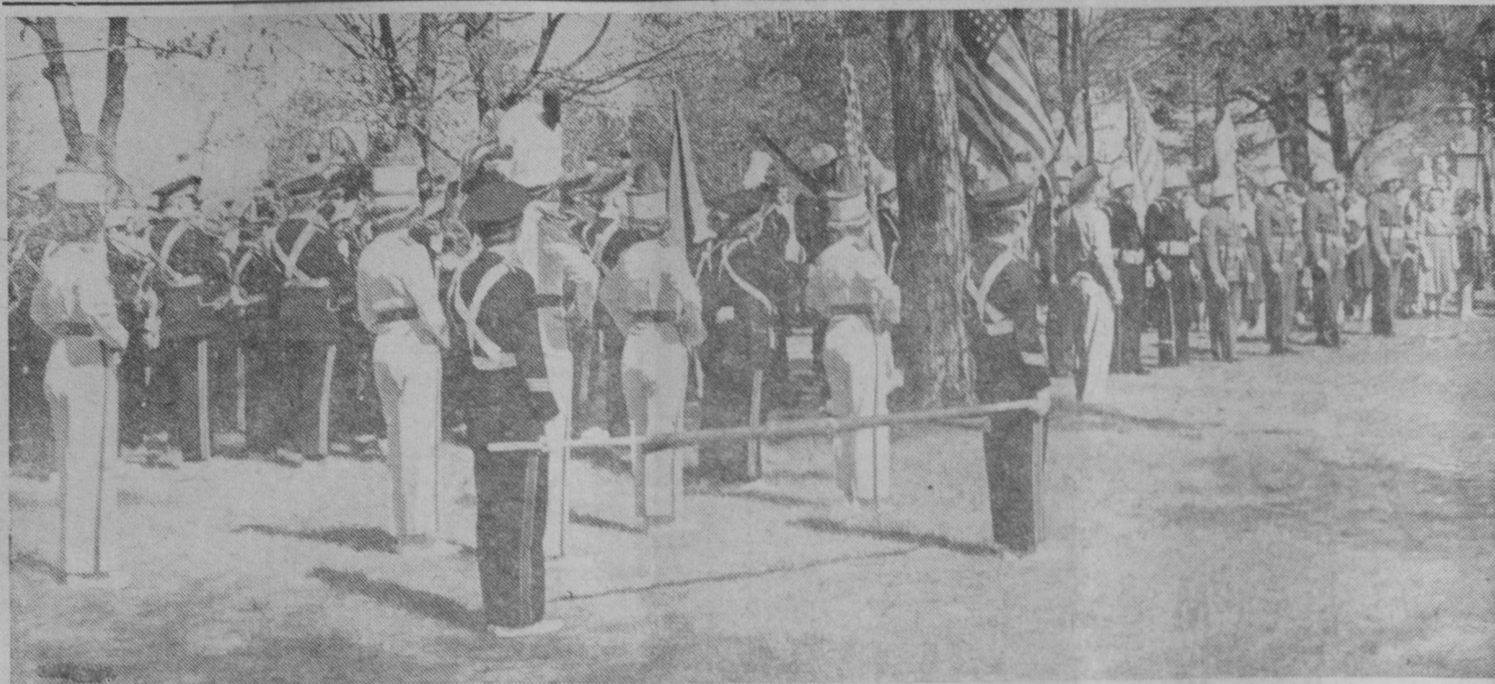

### Direct Distance Dialing to Begin Here on Sunday

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company today began the final countdown for the simultaneous introduction of nationwide Direct Distance Dialing here and in 37 other Saginaw Valley communities.

In addition to these, the following communities served by independent connecting telephone companies will be able to make direct long distance calls through the new equipment: Augres, Brant, Harbor Beach, Hemlock, Merrill, Omer, Pigeon and Twinning.

After 2:01 a. m. Sunday, users in these communities will be able to make most of their own station calls direct to the millions of telephones coast to coast... and in Canada and reach them about as fast as calling a next-door neighbor.
