



- .3. Sew two waistband strips together along one long edge and both short edges, about 1/8 inch from each edge.
- Insert skirt ¼ inch into waistband. Extend LEFT end of band 11/2 inches; RIGHT end, 41/2 inches. Stitch through waistband and skirt 1/8 inch from lower edge of waistband.
- 5. Form front opening by splitting skirt from waist to hem, midway between side seams.
- 6. To attach belt buckle to LEFT band-fold back excess, and hand-stitch.

Union Victory at Philippi

GRAFTON, Va.-June 3-Union forces under Col. B. F. Kelley today scored a decided-although relatively minor-victory over Confederate troops at Philippi, 30 miles south of here. Details of the encounter vary.

Federal sources said the Rebel force numbered some 2,000 and that 15 of these were killed in the gunfire; but Confederate spokes-men put the total force at less than 1,000.

At any rate, it was a total rout. Southern troops, under the com-mand of Col. G. A. Porterfield of the Virginia Volunteers, were awakened in the foggy pre-dawn hours by Union artillery fire, and managed to escape before Kelley's encirclement maneuver could be

IRONICALLY, the only Union casualty was Col. Kelley. He suffered

Kelley's attack followed his movement from Wheeling toward Grafton, where Confederate troops had burned Baltimore & Ohio railroad bridges across the Monongahela river, cutting a major line of communication between Washington and the west. Aided by several Ohio regiments, Kelley drove off the Rebels, rebuilt the bridges, and launched his assault on Philippi, to which the Confederate forces had withdrawn.

Direct Distance Dialing to Begin Here on Sunday


