Shattuck Has Long Career in Banking

In November 1910, a young man fresh out of Hale High School went to work at the Hale Exchange Bank. Today, he is vice president and cashier of Peoples State Bank of East Tawas and observes more than a half a century in the banking business.

Grant N. Shattuck, who started as a \$35-a-month clerk for Bell, Niggeman and Company, recalls that banks of those olden days were operated on a less hurried schedule than they are today.

"The back door of the bank was hardly ever locked during the day and we always closed up at 11 o'clock when the train was due in at the Hale depot. Everybody turned out to see who was getting on or off the train," he recalled.

Those were the days before adding machines and postings were made by hand. One of his daily jobs was to polish the globes of kerosene oil lamps.

The first bank at Hale was established by S. B. Yawger. Later, it was purchased by William Bell of Rose City and John P. Niggeman of Crossville.

Born at Sylvania, Ohio, he moved to Hale with his parents in 1901.

Shattuck had actually held two other jobs before starting his banking career. He was a storekeeper for the construction firm which built Cooke Dam, first on the AuSable River, and later was a clerk at the Brown Hardware in Hale.

He also taught school for six months, walking 4 1/2 miles each day to the little one-room school north of Hale. Earning \$35 a month, his first salary went toward purchasing a cow for his mother.

Shattuck remembers one morning in 1911 when he and Dwight Arthur, the other clerk at the Hale Exchange Bank, saw a truck pull to a stop in front of a vacant building directly across the street.

"A tall fellow and another man unloaded a desk and a safe and carried them into the building. We smiled when we learned that Ealy, McKay and Company of East Tawas was establishing another bank in town. We never thought they'd make a go of it."

Some weeks later, Shattuck went to work for the tall man mentioned above at his new bank. With the exception of time out for military service during World War I, he has been associated with L. G. McKay in the banking business ever since that time.

Ealy, McKay and Company purchased interests in Bell, Niggeman and Company in the old bank and built a new building for their Hale branch. This building still stands today at Hale.

During his 15 years at the Hale bank, he handled auction sales on nearly every farm in the western part of Iosco County.

He recalls the time, many years ago, when he learned of Iosco County's only bank robbery. "I was walking to work one morning when Marshal John Love stopped me at the four corners in Hale. He told me the bank at Whittemore had been robbed and that I had better not open for business. The robbers were on their way to Hale, according to Mr. Love, but they never did show up."

Mr. Shattuck was cashier at the Hale branch until 1926. On October 31, notification was received that the Ealy banks at Caro and in the Thumb failed, thus automatically closing the three banks in Iosco County.

He worked for the First National Bank at Bay City for about six months and then, on June 14, 19-

Harold J. Hughes, Clare Republican, and Herbert C. Evans, Gladwin Democrat, were elected in Monday's primary election as party candidates in the 28th Senatorial District.

A runoff is to be held December 11 between the two nominees to fill the senate vacancy caused by the October 24 death of Senator Charles T. Prescott of Prescott.

Hughes' nomination to the Republican ticket, beating out six other candidates, is considered tantamount to election in the strong Republican district.

With voting very light in the 10 counties, four candidates were in the running right up until the time final figures were tabulated.

Hughes, with 1,691 votes, bested his nearest opponent, Lewis T. Hubbs, the 28th District's constitutional convention delegate, by 210 votes. Hughes had a total of 1,691 votes as compared to 1,481 for Hubbs.

Running a strong third place was Herbert J. Smith Jr., operator of an abstract business at Houghton Lake and former Roscommon County clerk, with 1,424 votes.

George W. Myles, former Tawas City mayor, ran 532 votes behind the front runner. Myles had a total of 1,109 votes, picking up the majority in Iosco County.

Some 416 persons went to the polls in Tawas City, giving Myles 256 votes. At East Tawas, Myles received a total of 162 votes out of 408 cast.

Only 1,566 of Iosco County's 6,000 registered voters went to the polls. Myles' total county vote was 770, as compared to the 827 he received in the constitutional convention delegate election.

Other Republican candidates fared as follows in the district: Orlo J. MacMurray of Gladwin, a native of Tawas City, received 406 votes; John Degroot of Osceola received 168 votes and Miller H. Durham of Hersey had 210.

Iosco voters gave MacMurray 147 votes and Degroot 66.

In winning the Republican nomination, Hughes held margins in only two counties, Clare with 708 and Osceola with 279. Smith carried substantial margins in Crawford, Roscommon and Ogemaw Counties and held a slight edge in Osceola.

Hubbs carried Arenac and Gladwin Counties (where he defeated MacMurray, in the latter, 607-91).

Evans won the Democratic nomination with victories in Roscommon, Arenac, Alcona, Gladwin, Osceola and Clare Counties. Martin J. Blumenthal of West Branch was second with a total of 353 votes and Duane E. Streeter of East Tawas had 296 votes.

Open Bids on New TA Elementary Unit Tuesday

Bids for constructing a new six-classroom addition at the Tawas City unit were to be opened Tuesday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education.

Cost of the addition, estimated by the architectural firm of Bryselhout, Starke and Hacker, was \$120,000.

School officials hope to have the new elementary facilities ready for use by the start of the 1962 fall term.

In addition to classrooms, the new unit would have a central heating plant, kitchen and toilet facilities. It would be of brick veneer construction.

This construction was approved by voters as the first phase in a five-year pay-as-you-go program for the school.

The next step would be to construct a general purpose room and kitchen at the East Tawas unit and add four more classrooms at the Tawas City unit. This phase would be completed by 1963-64.

The third phase would provide for the construction of a junior high school unit and classroom addition at the high school.

10 Students Face Disciplinary Action

Ten students of Tawas Area High School were given unexcused absences as disciplinary action for failing to obtain permission to go hunting last week.

This action was in compliance with orders from the board of education, which ordered the administration to make an example of those students who failed to apply for permission and then skipped school for reasons of hunting.

It also applied to those students who were ineligible to be absent because of failing grades, regardless of whether or not parents signed a hunting permit.

According to Principal Ernest Jordan, 165 high school students were absent Wednesday and 21 junior high students were out of school.

This total compared to 45 students in both high school and junior high on Monday.

Disciplinary action will be in the form of lower marks for offenders. Skipping school is to be treated as the usual unexcused absence and the student would receive zero for the day, or five Es for each day missed.

Those students who wished to be absent during the first week of hunting made application at the principal's office. A hunting permit was sent home for the signature of parents. It indicated whether the student had passing grades and the number of days he had been absent thus far this school year.

Christmas Club Checks Mailed Out Last Week

Christmas Club checks totaling \$36,011.25 were mailed out to 445 members last week by Peoples State Bank of East Tawas.

This figure is slightly lower than the amount mailed to 450 members last year.

Membership in the club may be obtained by opening a Christmas savings account at the bank.

Hunter Escapes Serious Injury in Freak Accident

A 24-year-old Wyandotte man escaped serious injury Saturday afternoon in a freak gun accident in Section 10, Osceola Township.

Treated by an Osceola physician was Lawrence O. Cooley Jr., who was struck in the right thigh by fragments from an exploding .32 caliber rifle cartridge.

Investigating state police officers said that Cooley's hunting companion, Julius M. Buchko, 23, also of Wyandotte, was in the process of unloading his rifle when the accident occurred.

One of the cartridges apparently struck a rock and exploded, showering Cooley with fragments. Although the Osceola physician had to remove several fragments from Cooley's leg, he was not seriously injured.

Two Lost Hunters Spent Thursday Night in Swamp

"Boy, am I glad to see you Show me the way out... I'm lost."

"You're lost? So am I!"

With that little exchange of conversation, two lost deer hunters spent last Thursday night in a swamp north of Wurtsmith Air Force Base in Alcona County.

It was late Thursday evening when Clayton VanDerveen, an airman at Wurtsmith, finally came to the conclusion that he could not find his way out of the dense underbrush.

His calls for help were finally answered by Rufus Morrison, 58-year-old Harrisville hunter. After about an hour shouting ("I'm over this way... stay where you are"), the men found each other.

But, to VanDerveen's despair, Morrison was also lost and, because it was already dark, it was impossible to pick out a familiar landmark.

The two men spent the night in the woods huddled over a fire, which was started with a great deal of difficulty because of the damp weather.

In the meantime, a search party was organized by Sheriff Martin Gehres of Alcona County. Morrison was long overdue at his home. Apparently, VanDerveen was not missed at the base.

Michigan State Police from East Tawas joined the search Friday morning and a light plane from Wurtsmith was pressed into service. The two men found their own way out of the brush, however, when it became light enough for them to get their bearings.

Hunter Population Low in Iosco Area According to Sales

Hunter population in the Iosco County area during the first week of the 1961 deer season reached an all-time low, according to estimates of local businessmen. This was the same situation as reported in other sections of the state.

Although the area apparently has a fairly good deer kill, businessmen report that receipts were much lower than the past two years.

First hunter to report bagging a buck was Francis Dorey of Wilber Township. Dorey shot his buck about 7:00 a. m. and brought it to the Herald office about 9 o'clock.

As of Monday, the area escaped any serious hunting accident and only a few hunters were reported lost. Hunter registrations at the Michigan State Police Post, East Tawas, were lower than in any recent year.

Counterfeiter Jokes About Bogus Money Passed Here

"Oh, they just laughed and handed me the change after I told them I had printed the \$20 bill this morning."

So said a 27-year-old St. Clair Shores man, who brazenly left a trail of bogus \$20 bills from Bay City to Alpena last Wednesday.

While being questioned here, William P. Vicary, who was nabbed with about \$46,000 of counterfeit bills in his possession, told United States Secret Service agents that many of his victims questioned the "feel" of the bills when he paid for a small purchase.

Vicary's spending spree included the passing of more than 20 bills in the Tawas-Osceola area.

Thanks to an observant Tawas City service station operator, Vicary was apprehended before he could pass the major portion of his worthless paper.

"The bill just did not feel right to me. It didn't have any body to it."

And because of this feeling, gas station operator James Sheehan jotted down the license number of Vicary's car. It was this alertness that triggered the search.

Sheehan said the man stopped Wednesday at his Tawas City gas station, dressed in hunting clothes and paid for his gasoline purchase with one of the new \$20 bills.

"I became suspicious even before he handed me the bill," said Sheehan. "There was just something about him that caused me to look at the license plate on his car. He saw me studying his license, but did not say anything."

When Vicary pulled away, Sheehan immediately called state police at East Tawas and Detective LeRoy McCluer picked up the bill and took it to Peoples State Bank where bank officials put it under scrutiny.

It could not be determined immediately if the bill was counterfeit and police checked with the secret service at Detroit.

Confirmation that the bill was counterfeit, however, came when Edgar Jenkins, an East Tawas gift shop operator, stopped at Sheehan's gasoline station to make a purchase.

He was going to pay with a \$20

number, G35698629B. Vicary had passed the bill at the gift shop on his way north.

The bills were compared later and both had the same serial number. State police immediately put (See BOGUS MONEY, page 8.)

Another Letter Urges City Fluoride Treatment

A letter from the Tawas Kiwanis Club urging investigation into fluoride treatment for the city's water supply was read before Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council.

According to Gordon Dunham, secretary, Dr. Earl Hasty, district health director, had recommended such measures during a recent address before the group.

A similar request had been made recently by the Tawas City Businessmen's Association.

The information is to be turned over to the Tawas City Water Board for presentation to the City of East Tawas, which furnishes water for both communities.

In other business, a discussion was held on Christmas decorations for US-23. It was recommended that the same decorations be used as last year between the dates December 6 and January 6.

Councilman Howard Hatton recommended that the council investigate the possibility of constructing a cyclone fence around the city's standpipe in back of the city hall.

Citing the possibility of a lawsuit if someone was injured while climbing the tower, Hatton also pointed out that signs painted on the tank were an eyesore to the community.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz is to investigate costs of such a fence or other means of keeping unauthorized persons off the tower, and report before next week's meeting of the water board.

One building application approved during the past week was for Alvin Cholger, 516 Mathews Street, enclose back porch, \$150.

Whittemore-Prescott Bands in Concert

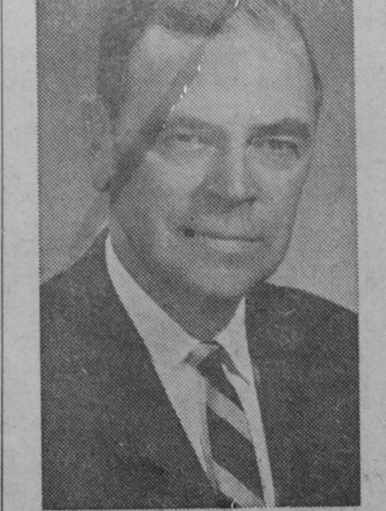
Members of the Whittemore-Prescott Area Junior Band presented a concert at the Monday evening meeting of the Whittemore-Prescott Band Boosters Club.

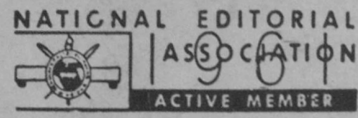

A blue jersey dress with black accessories was selected by the bride's mother for the occasion.

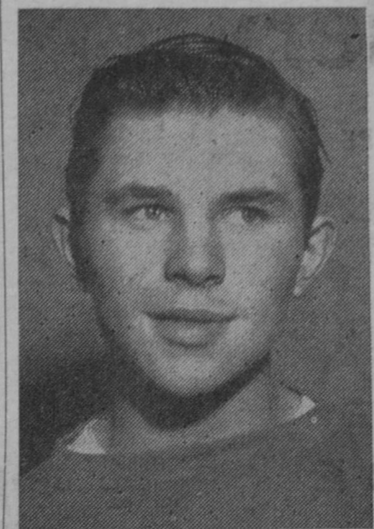



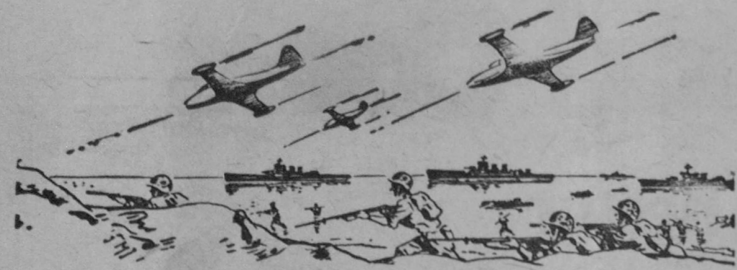

Advice For Veterans

COMPENSATION FOR SERVICE CONNECTED DISABILITIES
For veterans of Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, Korean Conflict period and peacetime service.

Administered by: The Veterans Administration.
Eligibility: Veterans who are disabled by injury or disease incurred in or aggravated by active service in line of duty during wartime or peacetime service and discharged or separated under other than dishonorable conditions.

Nature of benefits for wartime disabilities: Veterans found eligible for wartime disability compensation are entitled to monthly payments ranging from \$19 to \$225, depending on the degree of disability, with specific rates to \$450. Veterans whose service-connected disabilities are rated at 50 percent or more are entitled to additional compensation for dependents. The

rates for 50 percent or more are payable at the same ratio that the degree of disability bears to 100 percent.

Chronic disease presumption: Generally, a wartime veteran who develops a chronic disease to a degree of 10 percent or more disability within one year of release or separation from service may be presumed to be service connected for disability compensation. In the case of active tuberculosis, the law provides a three-year presumptive period; and, in the case of multiple sclerosis, a two-year period.

Nature of benefit for peacetime disabilities: Peacetime servicemen and six-month enlistees found eligible for peacetime disability compensation are entitled to monthly payments at 80 percent of the wartime rate. These range from \$15 to \$180, depending on the degree of disability, plus statutory awards for amputations, blindness, etc., up to a maximum of \$360. Where the disability resulted from extra hazardous peacetime service, such as simulated warfare, they may be entitled to wartime rates. Those rated 50 percent or more disabled may be entitled to additional compensation for a wife, minor children or dependent parents.

PENSION FOR AGE OR NON-SERVICE-CONNECTED DISABILITIES

For veterans of Spanish-American War group.
Administered by: The Veterans Administration.

Eligibility: Veterans of the Spanish-American War who have attained age 62 or are at least 10 percent disabled and who had 70 or 90 days of service, with discharge under other than dishonorable conditions, or who were discharged sooner for a line-of-duty disability.

Nature of benefit: For 90-day service and disability discharge cases, the monthly pension rate is \$101.59 and for regular aid and attendance, \$135.45. For 70-day service cases, the monthly pension rate is \$67.73 and for regular aid and attendance, \$88.04.

Where to apply: Any VA office.

SIX MONTHS' DEATH GRATUITY

For survivors of those who die while on active duty: Active duty for training or inactive duty training or within 120 days after separation from service-connected causes.

Administered by: Service departments of the armed forces.
Eligibility: Generally, veteran's death must have occurred while the veteran was on active duty, active duty for training or inactive duty training. However, the gratuity also is payable if a service member or former service member dies of a service-connected cause within 120 days after discharge or release from active duty or active duty for training, under other than dishonorable conditions.

In the case of inactive duty training, the gratuity is payable if death occurs within 120 days and is the result of injury received during that training.
Six months' death gratuity is not payable if death is the result of lawful punishment for crime or military offense, except when inflicted by a hostile force.

To whom paid: Veteran's spouse, child or children, or if designated by the deceased, to parents, brothers or sisters.
Nature of benefit: A sum equal to six months' pay of the deceased, including special incentive, hazards and basic pay, but not allowances. However, regardless of the monthly pay of the deceased, the sum shall not be less than \$800 or more than \$3,000.

Where to apply: Normally the gratuity is paid as soon as possible by the command to which the deceased was attached. However, if it is not received within a reasonable time, application should be made to the service department of the armed forces concerned.

Aviation Cadet Assigned to Texas AFB

Cadet Simons, a 1958 graduate of Tawas Area High School, attended Michigan State University, East Lansing, from 1958 to 1961.

Cadets in the navigator program receive basic, radar and celestial navigation training in T-29 aircraft, the air force "flying classroom." Students are awarded navigator wings and commissioned second lieutenants upon completing 38 weeks of training at James Connally AFB.

They are assigned for advanced training to man positions in Strategic Air Command, Tactical Air Command or as operational navigators with Materiel Air Transport Service.

477 Removed from Public Assistance Rolls in 1961

Dr. Ralf Peckham, state director of vocational rehabilitation, pointed out that on a state-wide basis during the fiscal year, 1960-61, there were 477 vocational rehabilitation clients removed from the public assistance rolls. This group had 1,942 people depending upon them for support.

The cost of public assistance for the 477 welfare recipients was approximately \$416,000. Dr. Peckham also points out that the annual earned wages of this group after rehabilitation closure were approximately \$1,276,000.

Miss Anne Gray of the Alpena sub-office, Traverse City District Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, states that there are two cases in Iosco County rehabilitated from the welfare rolls. These two rehabilitants had two people directly depending upon them for support.

Miss Gray said that an estimated amount of \$1,212 in county public assistance funds were saved by finding jobs for these two vocational rehabilitation clients. She estimates that the cost for their rehabilitations was approximately \$2,522. The same two rehabilitants were earning the equivalent of \$7,540 in wages at the time of their rehabilitation closures.

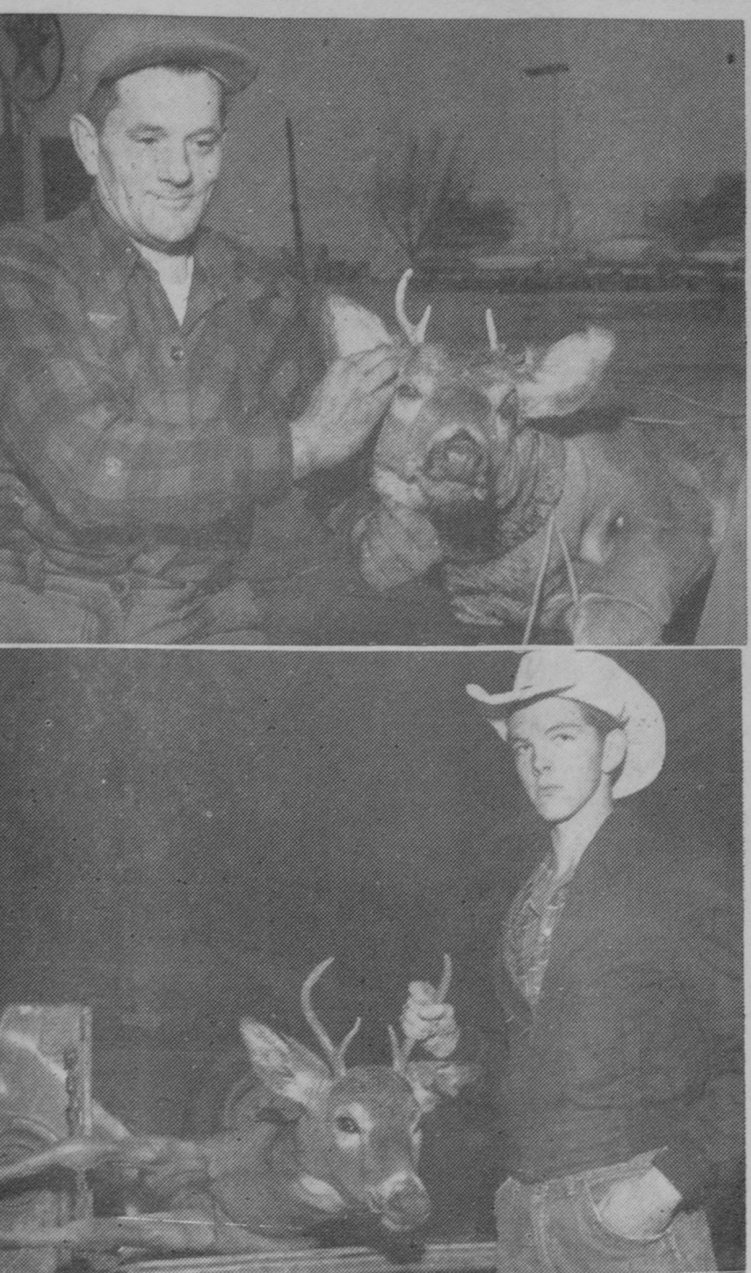

100 Years Ago This Week... in THE CIVIL WAR

(Events exactly 100 years ago this week in the Civil War—told in the language and style of today.)

"Old Brains" Halleck Takes Fremont Post

ST. LOUIS, Mo.—Nov. 23—Maj. Gen. Henry W. Halleck, known fondly—and not so fondly—as "Old Brains" to his army associates—has arrived here to take command of Federal forces in the west.

He replaces Maj. Gen. John Charles Fremont, controversial frebball who was fired by President Lincoln after a dizzying series of orders and hints of scandal in his administration. Halleck is author of "Elements of Military Art and Science," a bible in the Army, and has had a career far more diversified than that of most Army officers.

He was graduated from West Point in 1839, third in a class of 31, as an officer in the corps of engineers. Before heading for the military academy, he had been graduated from Schenectady (N.Y.) college with honors, picking up a Phi Beta Kappa key while there. He is a native of Westerville, N.Y.

DURING the Mexican War, Halleck served in California in relative tranquility. Six years ago he took up the study of law and quit the Army, becoming a mining expert along the way; one of the architects of the California constitution and an officer in the state militia there.

He re-entered service soon after the outbreak of hostilities. He is privately considered to be an excellent administrator, but weak on combat technique.

At any rate, military observers here hope Halleck is an able administrator, since the erratic Fremont left him a king sized mess to step into.

Fremont's downfall began with his unprecedented issuance, three months ago, of a declaration of total martial law in Missouri.

Under terms of this manifesto, Fremont:

—Set up an imaginary line to split Missouri in two.

—Ruled that anyone in the northern part of the state convicted of aiding non-Union forces would be summarily shot.

Look joined the firm in 1930 and later became assistant cashier.

During his more than 34 years with the bank, Mr. Shattuck has seen its assets grow from a capital of \$25,000 and \$5,000 surplus in 1927 to a capital structure today of more than \$650,000, with footings of more than \$8,000,000.

He was promoted to vice president of the bank in 1942 and has never missed a meeting of the board of directors.

Physical growth of the bank during this time saw construction of modern new quarters at East

Tawas in 1951 and, 10 years later, saw the opening of a new Tawas City branch last April.

An avid fan of amateur baseball in this area for many years, Mr. Shattuck was always on hand to watch local independent teams in action. In his younger days he played outfield for several area teams and later umpired. He makes it a point to attend the annual old-timers' game each year in Tawas City.

His interest in sports also included sponsorship of Peoples State Bank bowling teams. A team composed of Shattuck, Dr. J. J. Austin, Edward Sietoff, the late Charles Moeller, Harold Gould and Dr. John D. LeClair won the major league bowling championship at Tawas City Recreation three seasons.

One of his favorite hobbies today is photography. Since he first became interested in cameras about 1947, he has taken more than 2,000 color slides and has presented programs before church groups and other organizations.

On June 4, 1918, he married the former Miss Helen Nichols at Hale. She passed away in September 1955. A former school teacher, Mrs. Shattuck was well known for her interest and her fine influence among young people, for her activity in church and other religious educational work.

"The best investment I ever made was the \$25 for our wedding. It included payment for the marriage license, minister and our wedding trip," he stated.

62-65 Age Group Ask This Question; 'Should I Wait?'

The principle illustrated by this chart holds true regardless of the actual amount of the benefit involved, and regardless of whether the man was just age 62 or only one month under age 65.

The Michigan Farm Bureau's annual meeting presented a welcome opportunity to discuss the future of the important agricultural sector of Michigan's economy. The future of Michigan agriculture is bright. Markets for Michigan farm products are expanding, opportunities are increasing.

The achieving of potential, however, will not be automatic. It will take planning and coordinated effort with other areas of endeavor. A growing farm market is dependent on a general growing economy.

Not only industrial workers but farmers, too, have a stake in the success of programs to attract new industry, reduce unemployment and generally stimulate economic growth in Michigan. Unemployed workers do not constitute ideal customers for Michigan farm products. However, programs to aid the unemployed also aid farmers; without insurance payments to the unemployed, their purchasing power would be even further diminished.

Programs to stimulate business and industrial employment, therefore, are programs vital to the farmer and deserve their support. Achieving the kind of agricultural progress Michigan wants depends upon the growth in well-being of all groups in the state—farmers, industrial workers and business. It will require the cooperation of all groups in both private and public affairs.

out a bulletin for the suspect, giving his description and the car's license number. Alpena city police closed the net hours later on a downtown street. He had two loaded pistols in his possession. "If it had not been for Sheehan's alertness, Vicary might not have been apprehended. . . he could have just disappeared leaving a trail of bogus money," said one of the secret service agents. "Equipped with the license number and his description, it was relatively easy for police to close the net on him."

In the meantime, police were chasing down the bogus bills as they were being reported by area merchants and at banks.

Secret service agents said that it would be up to the federal court to decide on what to do with the \$460 in real money that Vicary had in his possession, also a large amount of items which he had purchased and then stashed in his car.

One of the victims in the counterfeit bill caper turned out to be Sgt. Frank Roti, commander of the state police post at East Tawas.

He cashed his Christmas Club check at the Peoples State Bank Wednesday and later he was pressed to compare one of his "good bills" with one of the bogus bills.

When he pulled out his wallet, Roti found that he had picked up one of the counterfeit bills. The bank redeemed the bill.
