Judge Miller Sends Iosco Kidnap Case Back to Justice Ct.

Kidnap charges against John N. Bogart of Flint were thrown out of Iosco County Circuit Court Tuesday by Judge Allan C. Miller. Tuesday's hearing was a pre-trial on six motions filed by Bogart, acting in his own behalf, to dismiss or quash charges.

Bogart and A. Matthew Buder allegedly attempted a "citizen's arrest" August 1960 on former Genesee County Prosecuting Attorney Jerome F. O'Rourke, at his cottage near East Tawas.

Since that time, there have been numerous delays and legal maneuvering. Trial by jury for the two men was to have been held November 7.

"It has been a comedy of errors and we might as well go back to justice court and start out right," said Judge Miller as he brought down the gavel. He also remanded the case against Buder to justice court.

Bogart, in one of his motions, claimed that he was denied due process of law because of an "unwarranted five-month delay from the date of his arrest to the date of preliminary examination."

The state had made several amendments to the information during the more than one year the case has been on the docket. When it was found that an affidavit which was filed Tuesday to correct a return was still wrong, the judge indicated that he was "sick and tired of it all."

Robert Goussey, assistant attorney general who is handling the prosecution, said he would move to dismiss charges against both men and start over again.

Everett Tells Need of Medical Care Facility

The people of Iosco County will be given an opportunity to provide an adequate medical care facility for its older citizens. A special bond vote will be held December 11.

"Immediate need for such a unit is really acute," states Clarence Everett, chairman of the board of supervisors' welfare committee.

"The lack of proper means of caring for the aged is causing not only a heavy drain on county funds, but a great hardship to older citizens."

"The demands of our present-day economy with its spiraling cost of living has made it impossible for a great many older people to meet the tremendous expense of necessary physical care," stated Everett.

Sponsored locally by the Twentieth Century Club and nationally by the United States Committee for UNICEF, the United Nations Children's Fund Halloween program will be carried out at the same time in some 10,000 other communities.

Last year, American youngsters participating in the biggest project ever carried out by children to help children, collected \$1,500,000.

Each penny received by the trick or treaters wearing the UNICEF black and orange tag can mean five glasses of milk for a needy child overseas, or the BCG vaccine to protect him from tuberculosis. A nickel's worth of UNICEF penicillin will cure a child of yaws, a crippling tropical disease.

The junior citizens of Tawas City participating in Trick or Treat for UNICEF will meet at their respective churches. They will canvass the neighborhood in small groups escorted by young adults who are volunteering their time. After the collections, all will meet back at the churches where money is counted.

UNICEF is not a give away program. Assisting governments match the aid they receive at least two and a half times.

After the collection, all children in the community are invited to a Halloween party at the Tawas City unit gymnasium.

In addition to treats, prizes will be awarded for the best costumes and there will also be door prizes. This part of the program is sponsored by the Tawas City Businessmen's Association in conjunction with the Twentieth Century Club.

Board Approves Plans for New Tawas Elementary Unit

Final plans for a new six-classroom addition at the Tawas City unit, which was included in a five-year construction program recently approved by voters, were approved Monday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education.

According to Supt. Reynold Mick, the board of education is to receive bids for construction of the new building November 21. He indicated that the board would examine bids several days before announcing the successful contractor.

Attending Monday night's meeting were representatives of the Bay City architectural firm of Brysselbout, Starke and Hacker.

Paul Brysselbout and Erwin Hacker discussed general plans for the new \$120,000 structure. The plans had received tentative approval in September.

Superintendent Mick said Tuesday that the November bid letting would allow the successful contractor plenty of time to make plans for an early start on work in the spring.

School officials hope to have the new elementary facilities ready for use by the start of the 1962 fall term.

In addition to classrooms, the new unit would have a central heating plant, kitchen and toilet facilities. It would be of brick veneer construction.

As the first stage in a five-year pay-as-you-go plan, the program also includes completion of an eventual 10-room Tawas City elementary unit by the addition of

four more classrooms. This unit would be connected to the gymnasium and present classroom structure. The latter would have matching brick veneer on the north end.

Also included in the second stage, which would be accom-

plished by 1963-64, would be construction of a general purpose room and kitchen at the East Tawas unit.

The third stage would provide for the construction of a junior high school unit and classroom addition at the high school.

Dr. Metcalf Moves Up to New Position

Dr. Thomas B. Metcalf, Gulf Coast Junior College's director of community services, resigned his position on October 16 to assume the role of director of instruction for Polk County, Florida. Dr. Richard Morley, Gulf Coast president, announced recently.

The new director of instruction is the son of Mrs. Annie R. Metcalf, 505 Mathews Street, Tawas City. He is a graduate of Tawas City High School.

In announcing Dr. Metcalf's

resignation, Dr. Morley stated that "Gulf Coast Junior College is losing one of its most valuable members, but we could not stand in the way of such an excellent opportunity for Dr. Metcalf."

In his new position, Dr. Metcalf will assume instructional responsibilities for 10 communities, 77 schools and approximately 43,212 students. He assumed his duties October 17.

Appointed to the Gulf Coast faculty in the fall of 1958, Dr. Metcalf has served three years as director of community services and two years as director of the evening college.

Dr. Metcalf has a varied background in teacher education. He has received a bachelor of science degree from Central Michigan University and a master and doctor of education degree from George Peabody College, where he majored in administration of higher education.

His experience includes high school teaching, supervising teaching at a state university, public relations, college instruction and administration.

Prior to accepting a position with Gulf Coast, Dr. Metcalf was an associate professor of education and director of student teaching at the College of William and Mary, Williamsburg, Virginia.

In addition to his work at Gulf Coast, he served as training officer for the 9917th Air Reserve Squadron, in which he held the rank of captain. He also was a director of the Bay County Unit, American Cancer Society, and a member of the board of directors for the Kiwanis Club of Panama City, Florida.

He lives with his wife, Mary Alice, at 210 South Cove Lane, Panama City.

AGED OSCODA MAN STRUCK BY AUTO

An 80-year-old Oscoda man, George E. Colbath, was rushed to Tawas Hospital Friday after being struck by a car on US-23 in AuSable Township.

Driver Fred Masley of Wurtsmith Air Force Base told officers he saw Colbath start to cross the highway, but thought he was going to wait for traffic to pass. He applied his brakes and skidded 75 feet before hitting the elderly man.

Colbath sustained a broken right leg and abrasions about the body. He was transferred to a Detroit hospital Monday.

TC City Hall Has 'New Look'

Remodeling and redecoration of the newly-enlarged business office and council chamber at the Tawas City City Hall is now nearing completion.

City government has taken over the room formerly occupied by the Tawas City branch library, which moved recently to its new location in the Buch Building.

The city's business office, where residents may pay water and sewer bills, has been moved from a room at the rear of the building to a new location at the front entrance.

A partition separating the old council room from the former library location was removed recently. The main chamber, now measuring 16 by 46 feet, has been repainted, a new counter installed at the front entrance and office furniture moved toward the front of the building.

Although the council will meet in the same location as before, removal of the partition separating the two rooms will allow a larger number of persons to attend.

Actually, this room was designed and used as a meeting place for the council when the building was constructed in the 1920s. When it was necessary to find a new location for the library in 1946, the room was divided by a partition and the council occupied quarters at the rear.

The room formerly occupied by the city office will be used for justice court, meetings of the volunteer fire department and other groups.

Chief of Police George Ruth's

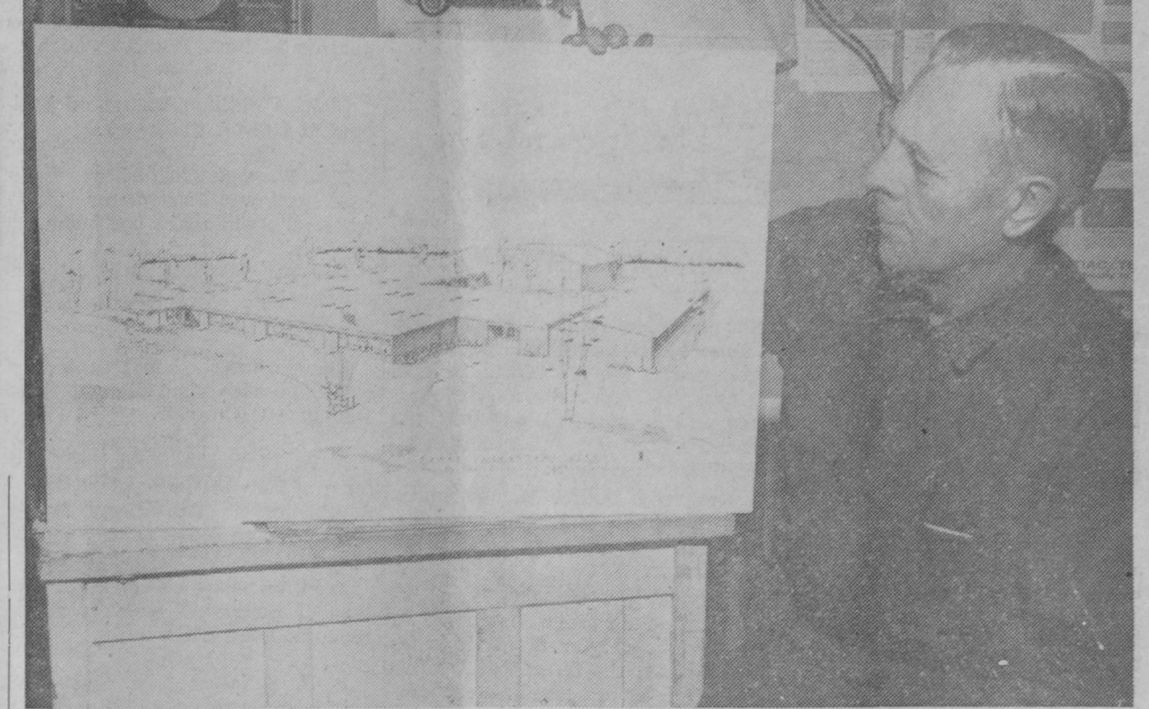
office will remain at its present location near the vault.

A concrete block wall which was used as a corridor in the fire hall was removed recently to allow parking of three fire trucks in the building. The city recently purchased a new fire truck and needed the additional space.

Arrangements were made Mon-

day to purchase a large aerial map from the United States Forestry Department which shows Tawas City, East Tawas and the surrounding area. This map will be placed on the wall of the city business office.

Reginald Biblitz, superintendent of public works, announced new office hours Monday. The

Annual Audit Shows City in Good Financial Shape

According to a year-end audit of city books compiled by Wagar, Lunt and Oehring, certified public accountants of Saginaw, Tawas City finished fiscal 1961-62 in good financial condition. The year ended March 10.

With a budget of \$93,570 for the year and revenues totaling \$91,844.46, the city had expenditures amounting to \$92,993.33.

Although this amounts to a deficit spending of \$1,148.87, the city actually reduced accounts payable from \$19,000 at the start of the year to \$12,000 by March 10. Real and personal property taxes collected by City Treasurer John Hosbach amounted to \$32,560.53. Other large revenue items

included \$12,336.64 from sales tax, \$19,192.55 from Michigan highway funds and \$9,538.65 from trunkline maintenance contract.

Other revenues included traffic fines, intangible tax, liquor license fees, sale of cemetery lots and transfers.

Largest single expenditure included \$17,341.20 for local street maintenance and city equipment and \$16,728.66 for city hall and garage.

New street construction amounted to \$7,679.22 and street maintenance was \$7,043.78. Expenditure for city disposal grounds was \$6,090.05.

Both the police and fire departments operated under their budgets during the year. With a budget of \$7,000 for 1961-62, the police department had expenditures totaling \$6,667.40. It returned traffic fines of \$2,165.25. The fire department had a budget of \$5,875 and actual expenditures amounted to \$2,212.40.

Separate audits of the water and sewer departments showed that both finished the year in the black.

Total operating revenues collected by the water department, under Supt. of Public Works Reginald Biblitz, amounted to \$36,477.05. It has expenses of \$30,211.26, or a net income of \$6,265.79 before depreciation of equipment. The water fund had total cash assets of \$6,402.10, accounts receivable of \$15,816.67. Assets of property, plant and equipment, less an allowance for depreciation, amounted to \$150,624.31, making total assets of \$172,843.08.

Total liabilities and the city's equity in the water department is \$172,843.08.

Cost of water purchased from East Tawas during the year amounted to \$16,125.98.

The sewer department had operating revenues of \$13,022.23 and operating expenses of \$8,280.09, showing a net income of \$4,742.14 before provision for depreciation. Other charges included \$8,009.27, representing contribution to the debt retirement fund and contribution to the general fund.

Total assets of the sewer fund, \$172,843.08.

He was a member of the Brotherhood of Railway Engineers and Firemen. An active member of the Iosco County Democratic Party, Mr. Vaughan had taken a keen interest in local and state politics most of his life.

\$1,500,000 Program For Development of College Announced

A development program for \$1,500,000 for the Sisters of St. Joseph was announced Friday by Reverend Mother Mary Vincentia, S.S.J., superior general of the Sisters of St. Joseph. The appeal is to be presented to the friends of the Sisters in all areas where they serve throughout the State of Michigan.

Plans are presently being made

for the renovation of the Motherhouse at Nazareth in order to accommodate the Postulants, the Novices, the Junior Sisters, the aging and infirm Sisters and the construction of another dormitory at Nazareth College.

Reverend Mother M. Vincentia has appointed Sister M. Verence, viceregent general, as campaign moderator.

This is the first time in 72 years that the order has made a general appeal for funds. It is intended that the friends of the Sisters will be organized where possible on a parochial basis in order to carry the present need personally to their neighbors.

Over a period of years, a large section of the Motherhouse has had to be placed at the disposal of the students at Nazareth College to provide housing, classrooms and laboratories.

During this same time, the number of Sisters in the order has increased tremendously, thereby causing overcrowded conditions at the Motherhouse. At present, the Postulants must be housed a distance away and many of the Senior Sisters must reside in convents far distant from their rightful place at Nazareth.

The Venerable Charles D. Braidwood, archdeacon of the diocese of Michigan, will be the celebrant at Holy Communion services October 29 at St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Hale, 9:00 a. m., and Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, 11:00 a. m.

Archdeacon Braidwood, who resides at Lapeer, was born in Dryden in 1911. He graduated from the University of Michigan in 1934 with a bachelor of arts degree and received his master of arts in 1938. His Sacrae Theologiae Baccalaureus was obtained from the Episcopal Theological School, Cambridge, Massachusetts, in 1942. Bishop Creighton ordained him into the priesthood in 1942.

Archdeacon Braidwood is chaplain for Lapeer State Home and Training School. He served as vicar of the following churches: St. John, Otter Lake, 1942-57; St. John, Dryden, 1951-57; St. Dunstan's, Davison, 1953-57, and St. Alfred, Lake Orion, 1954-57, before his retirement in January of 1961.

He was elected to the executive council in 1945 and 1957. He became a member of the department of missions in 1945 and dean of central convocation from 1946-48. He is a standing committee member as of 1954. Among his other affiliations are chairman of the delegation to synod for three terms, delegate to general convention in 1961, a fellow of the Michigan Child Guidance Institute. He also received a citation from the Diocesan Department of Christian Social Relations in work as a member of the Lapeer County Social Welfare Board.

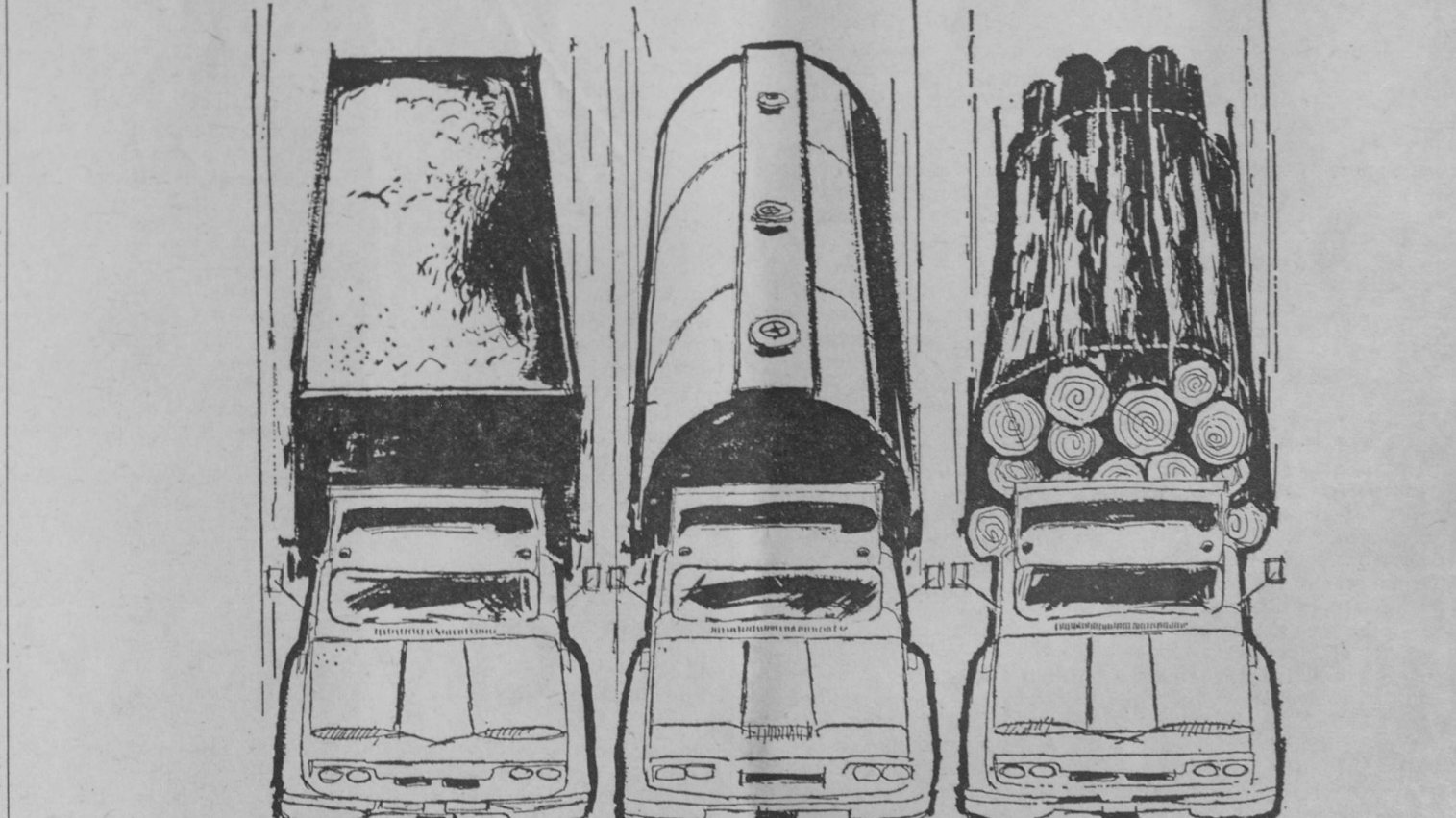

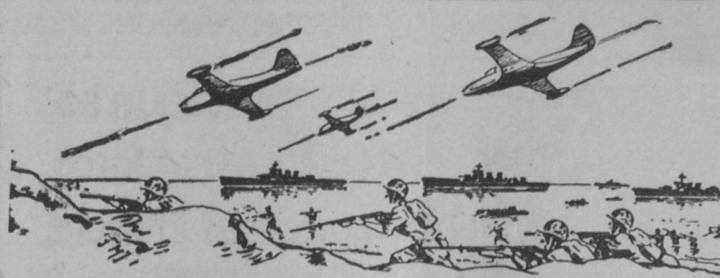

Advice For Veterans

OUTPATIENT DENTAL TREATMENT

For veterans of all wars and peacetime service.

War-time veterans must have been separated or discharged under conditions other than dishonorable before they may be considered for outpatient treatment under "applicable conditions" as listed below.

1. Those whose dental conditions or disabilities are service connected and compensable in degree may apply at any time and receive as many treatments for these conditions or disabilities as are needed.

2. Those whose dental conditions or disabilities are service connected, but not compensable in degree, and which are shown to have been in existence at time of discharge or release from active service must apply for outpatient dental care within one year after discharge or release. They may receive treatment only on a one-time completion basis, acceptable within the limitations of good professional standards.

3. Those whose service connected noncompensable dental conditions or disabilities resulted from combat wounds or service injuries may apply at any time and receive as many treatments as are needed for these dental conditions or disabilities.
4. Former prisoners of war with service connected noncompensable dental conditions or disabilities may apply at any time and receive as many dental treatments as are needed for these dental conditions or disabilities.

5. Those having non-service-connected dental conditions or disabilities which are found to be directly related to and aggravating a service-connected condition or disability may apply at any time and receive as many dental treatments as are needed to alleviate the aggravation of the service-connected condition or disability.
6. Disabled veterans of World War II, or of Korea, who are receiving training under vocational rehabilitation and who need dental treatment in order to prevent interruption of their training may apply for treatment as needed.
7. Spanish-American War veterans who need dental treatment may apply for and receive this type of treatment as needed.

Peace-time veterans and six-month enlistees must have been separated or discharged under conditions other than dishonorable for a disability incurred or aggravated in line of duty, or they must be receiving compensation for a service-connected disability before they may be considered for outpatient dental treatment under "applicable conditions" as listed above. The VA may provide the treatment at any of its field stations equipped and manned to do the work or it may authorize approved private dentists in the veteran's hometown to provide the treatment.

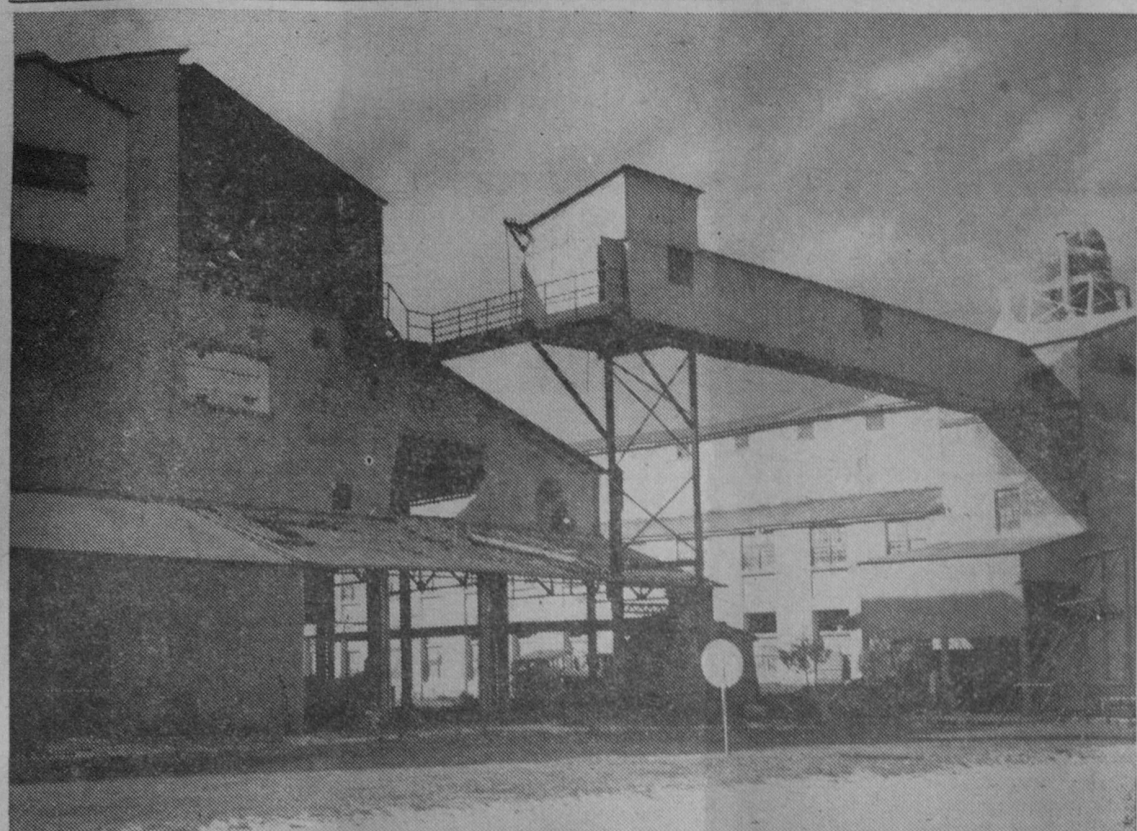

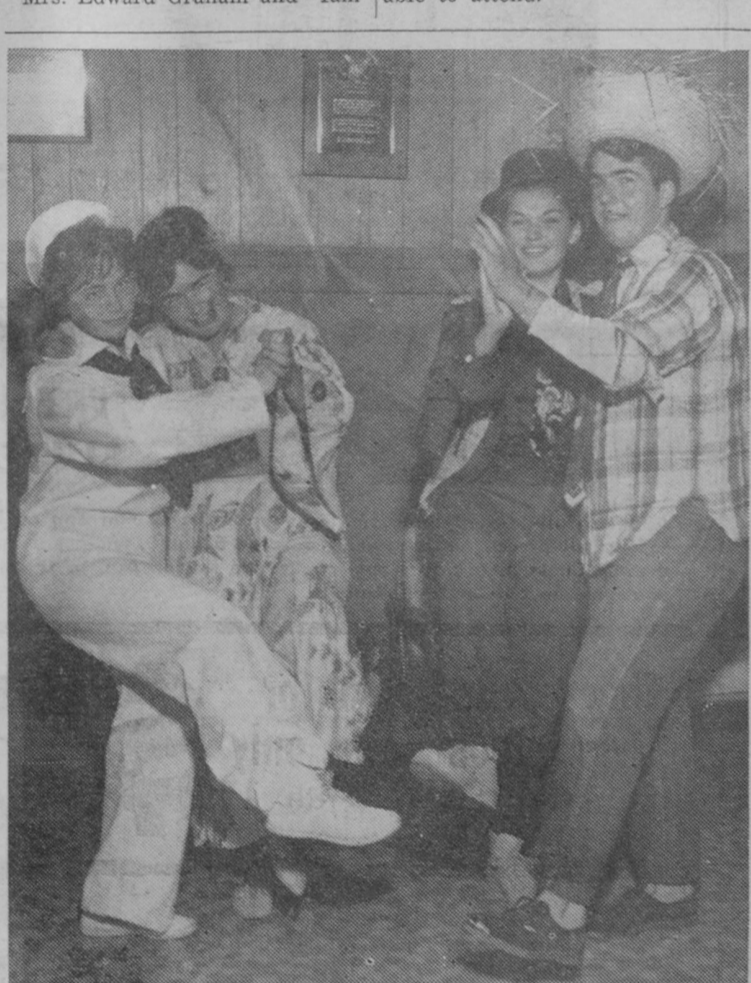

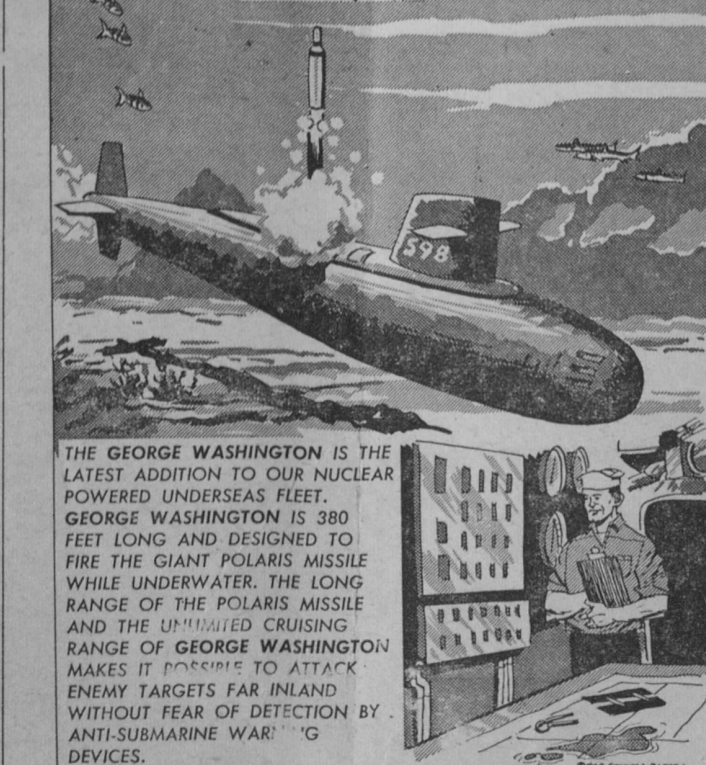

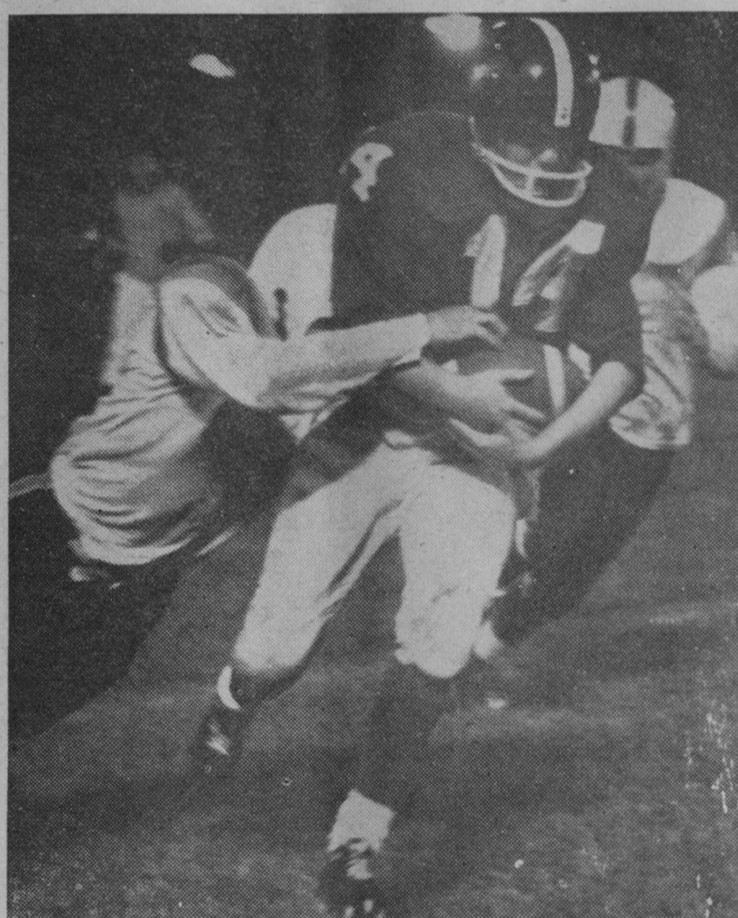
