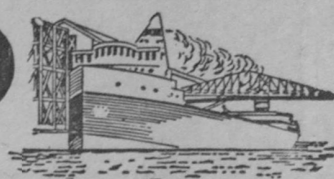

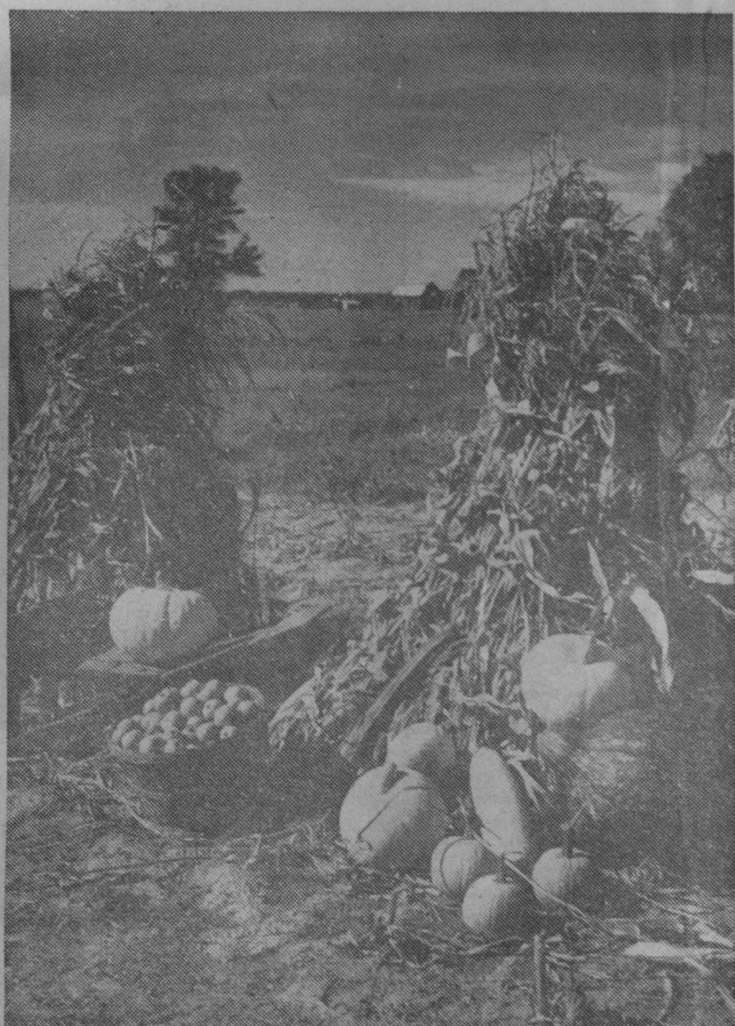

City OK's Planning Board; Parking Protest Discussed

Initial steps to form a city planning commission, to be composed of residents from all walks of life in this community, were taken by the Tawas City Council at Monday night's regular meeting.

At the same time, the council adopted a resolution condemning actions of the state highway department and authorized City Attorney Jerry Cotter to check into the city's legal rights with respect to parking on US-23.

Acting at the requests of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association, the council authorized Mayor George Tuttle to name a chairman of the new commission.

Following a lengthy discussion on the merits of forming such an organization, along with many verbal blasts against the highway department, Mayor Tuttle named Hugo J. Keiser Jr., druggist, to head up the new commission.

Keiser and the mayor are to meet soon to select a list of commission candidates for council approval.

Twelve businessmen attended the meeting with Keiser and Kenneth Conn, local insurance agent, acting as spokesmen.

According to a resolution adopted by the businessmen's association last Thursday, Keiser asked for action on the three requests from the group. All received unanimous approval from the council.

Although formation of a planning commission had been discussed previously, the blast against the highway department was touched off following a meeting here last week at which Lansing officials said that parking on US-23 through Tawas City would be removed in the near future.

Stating that the meeting had been called "for the purported reason to discuss improvements to US-23," Keiser said that the meeting was a complete farce, as far as he was concerned.

Keiser said that many persons from Oscoda and East Tawas who had attended the meeting, with a view toward asking questions concerning US-23, were cut off short when they asked questions of highway officials.

"They (the highway department) are attempting to chip each community off separately until Tawas City, Oscoda and East Tawas are without parking on US-23," said Keiser. "The result of such an impact on a community is not being taken into consideration."

Stating that the businessmen and city had built one parking lot to alleviate the problem somewhat, Keiser charged that, to his knowledge, the highway department had made no official contact with the city in reference to prohibiting parking on US-23.

Keiser said that the highway department should work hand-in-hand with the councils of the communities involved.

"If we sit on our duffs, they will steamroller over us—I would like to see how much fight we have," said Keiser.

"In view of the proposed removal of parking on US-23, we asked the highway engineers last week

for information concerning the department's recent long-range needs study which indicated that Tawas City would be bypassed. They said there was no such thing

planned. We tried to pin them down to when US-23 would reach the saturation point for traffic and parking would be removed. (See PROTEST, page 10.)

Former Isosco Resident—

'Steve' Nisbet Named State Con-Con President

Michigan's Constitutional Convention, which convened yesterday at Lansing, took on a new meaning for residents of Isosco County and Northeastern Michigan—Republican delegates Monday picked Stephen S. Nisbet of Fremont for the prestigious job of constitutional convention president.

Chosen on the 17th ballot by a caucus, Nisbet, 66, spent his youth in this community and graduated from Tawas City High School in 1911. Later, he taught school at Whittemore and Maple Ridge.

His father and grandfather were prominent lumbermen here years ago, operating the Wenonah sawmill and salt block.

A retired vice president of Gerber Products Company, Nisbet was formally elected Tuesday when all 144 delegates convened at the opening session of the historic convention to rewrite Michigan's 55-year-old constitution.

Nisbet, first advanced as a possible president Saturday at the first day of the two-day GOP caucus, was a compromise candidate. Delegates were split on the two leading candidates, former state senator, Edward Hutchinson, Fennville, and George Romney, president of American Motors.

While apparently a "dark horse" choice of delegates, Nisbet is well known throughout the state.

His background is jammed full of educational, organizational and civic activities. A former chairman of the state board of education, he graduated from Alma College in 1919 and the University of Michigan in 1930 with a master degree in education.

In 1925, he became superintendent of schools in Fremont and held that post until 1945 when he joined Gerber, the baby food manufacturing people.

He was appointed to the state board of education in 1943 and

held the post until last July. For the last six years, he was president of the board. He has honorary degrees from four Michigan colleges, is a former president of the Michigan Education Association and has been active in the Michigan Chamber of Commerce.

Nisbet was on the GOP platform-drafting committee at the party's national convention in 1960.

He officiated at football and basketball games throughout the state, has been associated with boy scout work, the American Legion, the Masons and Congregational Church.

In 1920, he married Dorcas Sammons and they have three children, Barbara, Stephen Jr. and Richard, all teachers.

Judge Smith Cites Need for Medi-Care Facility

"The need for the proposed medi-care facility, as proposed by the board of supervisors and your committee, is becoming more and more acute."

So stated Judge H. Read Smith in a letter this week to Clarence Everett, chairman of the board of supervisors' medi-care committee.

"Growth of the community and the trend towards the aging of its population has created numerous situations that have and are causing considerable unhappy and unsatisfactory care and treatment

of many chronically ill and aged citizens," said Judge Smith.

"Very soon this condition will become far more serious a problem, as some of our present meager private facilities for such care and treatment will be lost because of unsatisfactory physical facilities.

"It will not be more than a few months before this county will have no place to care for these causes," said Judge Smith. "The time is long past when this community can sweep these problems under the carpet, so to speak, and expect the state to cover up our neglect by committing such citizens to state mental institutions, as has been done in the past."

Representatives of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone are to meet with the board of supervisors' welfare committee October 9 to discuss details of financing the proposed medi-care facility.

NEM is Retained, but Not for Sports; New Loop in '62

Northeastern Michigan Conference schools are to continue their present organization next year, but its main purpose will be of an educational nature and will not concern athletic participation between schools.

Earlier this year, Class B schools of the loop announced that they were dropping out of the long-established conference effective in 1962. A new conference, the Northern Michigan B League, is being organized among these schools.

Decision to retain the NEM Conference name was decided at a meeting of school administrators held last Wednesday night at West Branch.

Elected president of the NEM was Elwin Hulce, superintendent of schools at Roscommon.

It was announced that October 26 is the date for "college night" at Pinconning.

Two Men Get Prison Terms

Two men received prison sentences when appearing before Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller last week.

Sentenced to serve not less than two nor more than 10 years in Southern Michigan Prison was Phillip Comas Jr., who was convicted of stabbing a fellow airman last spring at Oscoda.

Joseph E. Smith received a sentence of not less than 4 1/2 years nor more than 15 for breaking and entering in the nighttime. Smith and Allen Steinhurst, who was sentenced earlier by Judge Miller, were convicted of breaking and entering Cabble's Hardware and Whitfield Department Store.

Fiscal 1961 Ends—

East Tawas Talks Finances

Discussing city finances was one of the principal topics at Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council. September 30 marked the end of the city's fiscal year.

Although the year-end audit of books has not been received as yet, it is believed that the city will end fiscal 1961 with a surplus of approximately \$29,443.

Of this figure, \$10,000 is to be transferred to the city hall building fund. A surplus of \$4,423.85 remaining in the street fund is to be transferred to next year's street fund.

There was also a balance of \$413.11 in the cemetery fund and \$167.31 in the recreation fund. This money is to be transferred to the same funds next year.

Remainder of the surplus is to go into the hydrant rental and fire department fund to finance cost of the city's new fire apparatus, which will soon be delivered.

Chamber Sets Talk on '23-Area Future

Discussion concerning prohibition of parking on US-23 here in the not too distant future has come in for considerable comment since last Tuesday night's meeting between area residents and representatives of the state highway department.

It was stated at last Thursday's meeting of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association that many businessmen of the Tawas area are concerned with the announced policy of the highway department.

Department representatives stated at last Tuesday night's meeting that parking in the outer lanes of US-23 would be eliminated here in the not too distant future.

Bruce Myles, president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, reports that many businessmen of the eastern section of Isosco County feel that this policy will not only affect Tawas City but will apply to many communities along US-23.

Traffic Engineer William Marvin stated last week that traffic through Tawas City has reached 82 percent of the saturation point for vehicular traffic, or 620 cars traveling in either direction every hour.

When vehicular traffic reaches that density, parking in the outer lanes of US-23 would be removed, he said.

A special meeting of the board of directors of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce has been called for Wednesday night. The future of US-23 will be discussed, along with talk on an "area future land

use" program.

Myles said Monday that he had collected considerable data concerning city, county and township planning programs now in use by various communities of the state.

Myles said that the chamber of commerce is directly interested in the future of the area. He intimated that there was need for a county-wide zoning program, stating, for instance, that there had been no provisions made for industrial zoning.

TC Library to Open in New Quarters Saturday

Completing the move to its new location Saturday in the Buch Building will be the Tawas City Branch of the Isosco-Arenac Regional Library.

The library had been located in the former council chamber of the city hall, but last month the city authorized renting of the Buch Building for new quarters.

The new library, measuring about 21 by 35 feet with two additional rooms for storage, is about one-third larger than the old quarters.

A number of volunteers from the Tawas City Garden Club and Twentieth Century Club assisted Miss Arlene Leslie, librarian, in arranging books in their proper order following the move.

Ten new sections of shelving were constructed for the library by William Leslie. The regional library financed this cost.

Miss Leonora Hass, director of the regional library, said Monday that she is in hopes that some local organization will sponsor a campaign to raise funds for the purchase of additional chairs, tables and drapes for the library.

"The move was unexpected at this time and, due to the cost of equipping the Oscoda branch, the regional library is without funds to provide such items for the Tawas City Library," she stated.

The regional library director said that Oscoda residents had provided \$3,000 to assist with furnishing the library in that community.

Tawas A. Board Hires Two New Faculty Members

Tawas Area Board of Education approved the hiring of two part-time teachers at its meeting held last Tuesday night. The meeting was to have been held Monday night but was held one day later due to a schedule conflict.

Mrs. William Tracy has been hired to fill in the balance of the year as girls physical education instructor. She replaces Mrs. Charles Lemon, who resigned. Mrs. Lemon will continue as the Girls Athletic Association director.

Mrs. Lyle Berry has been hired to teach five classes of algebra starting Monday of this week. Advanced algebra, geometry and senior mathematics is being taught by John R. Forsten. Mr. Forsten had been handling all mathematics classes, but enrollment increases necessitated the hiring of a part-time teacher.

The board decided to continue the policy of serving white milk in the school's hot lunch program. There had been a number of requests to serve chocolate milk to students, but Dr. Earl Hasty, district health director, advised against this practice.

Dr. Hasty reported that chocolate milk has a tendency to cause decay in the teeth of children.

Principal Ernest Jordan Jr. has reported that milk consumption in the hot lunch program is lower than in previous years. He said, however, that participation in the hot lunch program is higher than ever.

Three Permits OK'd by Tawas City DPW

Three building applications, approved by the department of public works during the past week, were read at Monday night's council meeting by Supt. Reginald Bublitz.

Applications approved included: Martin Ristow, 118 Ninth Avenue, install aluminum siding, \$734.44; Mrs. M. E. Wilson, 627 Lake, construct new 24 by 24 garage, remodel home, \$2,000; Richard J. Pfeiffer, 225 Beech, move house on lot, remodel and enlarge, \$1,500.

In other business, a request was received from Zion Lutheran Church requesting city participation and permission to repair sidewalk in front of its property.

City Treasurer John Hosbach read his semi-annual financing report. Police Chief George Ruth gave his report for August.

Bublitz reported that Tawas City had used 69,917,110 gallons of water during 1961 up to September 30. Some 32,737,000 gallons had been received by the sewer department. Total pumpage of water at the East Tawas filtration plant amounted to 163,240,200 gallons during the first nine months of 1961.

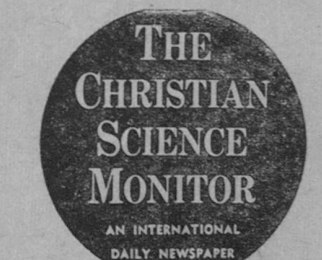

Payments for Wheat Acreage Retired is Not Automatic

Payments for acreage retired from production of 1962-crop wheat are not automatic. If the farm operator is interested in price support or payments for retired acreage, he must sign up prior to the closing date for the mandatory minimum diversion as well as for the additional voluntary diversion of wheat acreage and devote such acreage to approved conservation practices.

Such farmers may have thought that when congress made the mandatory 10 percent reduction in the national wheat marketing quotas, they automatically became eligible for payments. However, each farmer growing wheat must sign up for conservation practices on the mandatory diverted acres if he wishes to comply with the law regarding the wheat stabilization program for the 1962 crop and receive payment. So for his best interests, a farmer should be sure to plan participation sign-up.

Farmers who normally grow more than 15 acres of wheat and who hold allotments for more than 15 acres normally will be able to sign up for program participation, have their retired acreage payment computed and immediately receive an advance payment of up to one-half of the value of their total participation figured at the minimum rate. The advance payment will be by sight draft.

Farmers who grew 15 acres or less of wheat for harvest in any one of the years 1959, 1960 or 1961 can sign up for diversion payments, but because there are a variety of computations involved, the local ASC committees will make the calculations as soon as possible so each farmer will receive the kind of payment requested and it will be mailed.

Sign up period for the 1962 wheat stabilization program will be from September 22, 1961, through December 1, 1961.

"Cump" Sherman Named Chief in Cumberland

Lincoln Writes Marching Orders

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Oct. 8—Brig. Gen. William Tecumseh Sherman, 41, former Ohio banker, today was named commander of the strategic Cumberland department of the Union Army.

With the appointment, President Lincoln sent the bearded, fast-talking Sherman an explicit—and staggering—assignment.

He was given basic responsibility for the implementation of President Lincoln's orders last week for the immediate seizure of a key railroad near Cumberland Gap, the gateway to the west through the Appalachians.

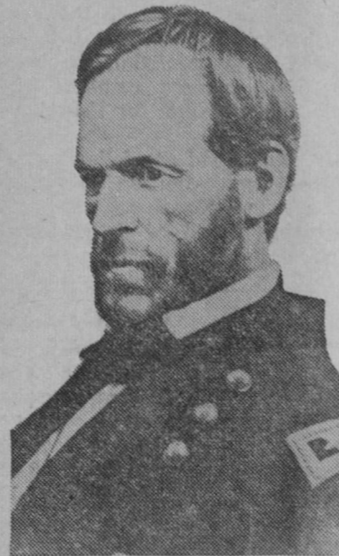
In this directive, his first since the disastrous operation order that led to the North's rout at Bull Run in July, Mr. Lincoln insisted on an end to the lethargy that has seized most Union units in recent weeks.

GEN. Sherman has been commanding some 8,000 men in and around Muldraugh's Hill, some 40 miles south of Louisville, Ky.

In his assault on the railroad—capture of which would cripple fast transportation between Virginia and Tennessee—Sherman will be joined by about 5,000 troops now stationed near Lexington, Ky., under command of Gen. George H. Thomas.

Also moving to join Sherman were smaller units from Fort Holt, Ky., and Cairo, Ill. After these forces are grouped near Louisville, other troops from Cincinnati were to team up with the new Army for the march on the Gap, which is about 90 miles southeast of Lexington.

Opposing the aggressors will be firmly entrenched Confederate troops, estimated at from 5,000 to 6,500 in strength, headed by Con-

federate Gen. Felix Zollicoffer. Also in the general area, and presumably mobile enough to join Zollicoffer, were outfits with a total force of some 7,000, under direction of Gen. Simon Buckner.

SHERMAN—known as "Cump" to boyhood friends in Lancaster, Ohio, because of his distinctive middle name—was graduated from West Point in 1840 and served in the Mexican War.

He quit the Army in 1853 and made a brief and unhappy excursion into the banking field. Later, he served as chief of a military school in Louisiana. He was president of a street railway in St. Louis at the time he re-entered the Federal Army as a colonel last May. He was promoted to his present rank after the fighting at Bull Run.

Over 65 and Still Working? May be Eligible for Benefits

Are you 65 or older and still working? It is possible that you and your family may be eligible to receive some social security benefits even though you continue to work after you are 65.

Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City Social Security Office, states that, because of recent changes in the social security law, there are approximately one million persons 65 or older who would be able to collect some payment despite their earnings.

Before 1961, a person eligible for social security benefits could not receive any benefits if his total earnings for the year amounted to more than \$2,080 and if during the year, he either earned over \$100 a month wages

or rendered substantial services in self-employment in each month.

Beginning with 1961, the amount a person can get in benefits when he works after he files a social security application depends on his yearly earnings and on the amount of benefits payable to him and his family. A person who earns \$1,200 or less during the year can get all his benefits. This is the same provision as was in effect before 1961. Also a person can get a social security check for any month of the year in which he neither earns wages of more than \$100 nor renders substantial services in self-employment. This is true despite the amount of his total yearly earnings. A person 72 or older can re-

ceive all benefits due on his past wages regardless how much he works and earns.

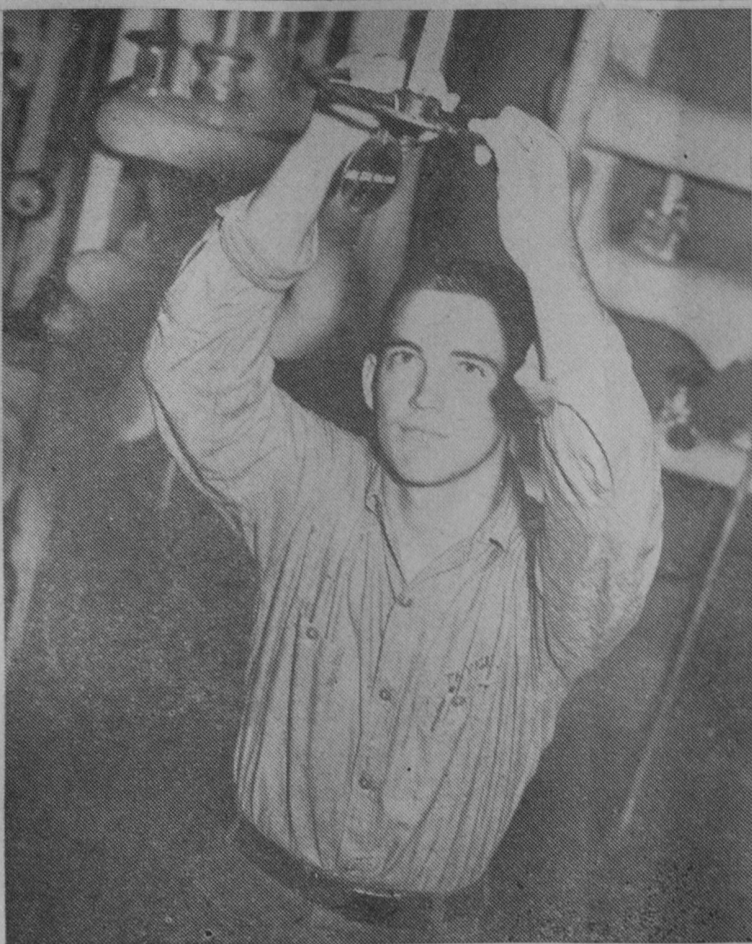

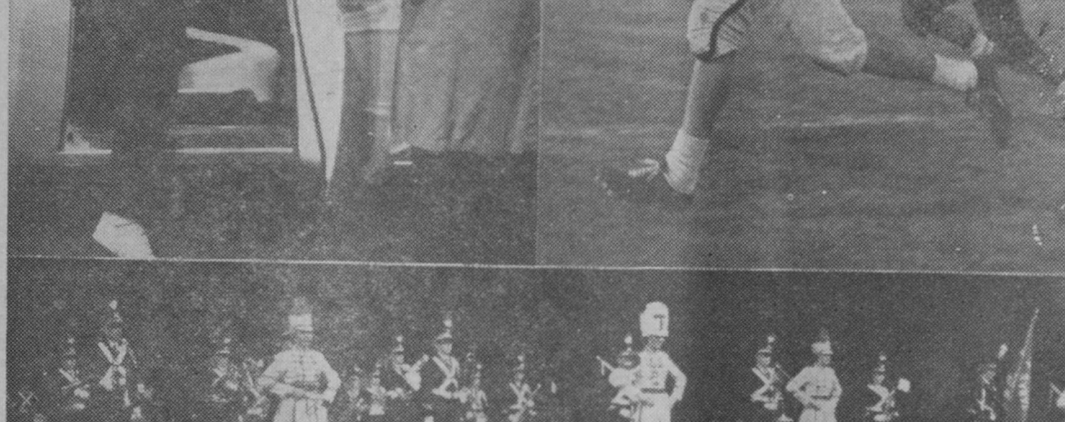
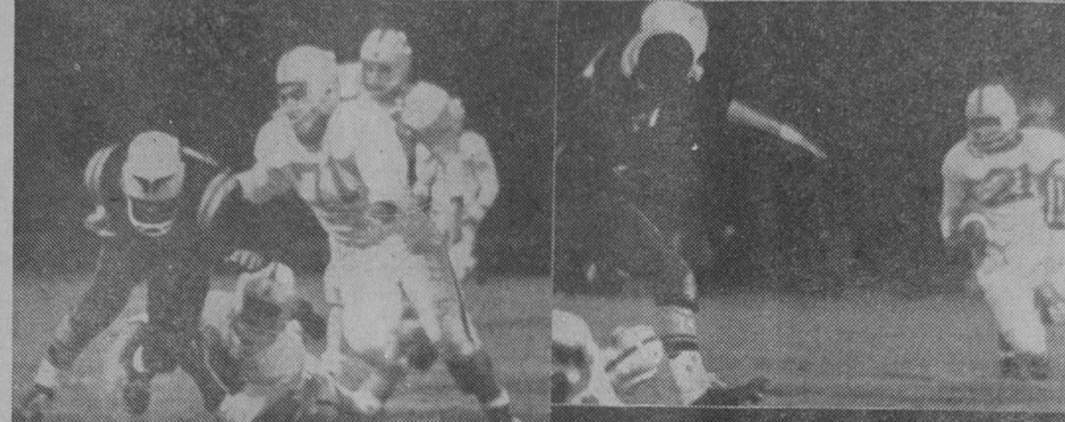
Rolling to their third win in a row, the Cards struck for touchdowns in the first, second and fourth quarters. The home team scored its lone TD in the third period.

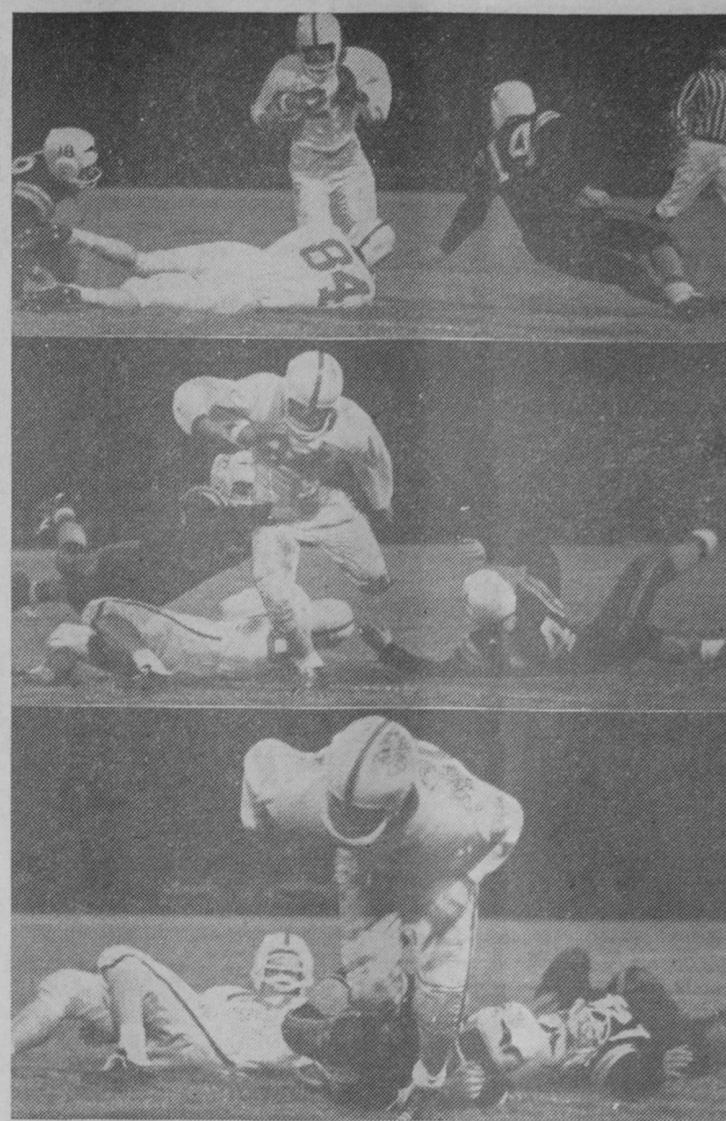
Bruce Spitsen ran the Cards' lone PAT of the night.

The Owls struck again in the opening stanza as John Kopp reeled off a seven-yard run to make it 14-0 with Richardson's second placement.

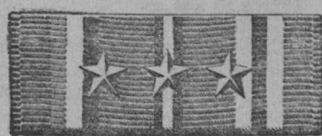

Run Roughshod Over West Branch

Displaying impressive power in the second half, Tawas Area Braves ran roughshod over the West Branch Orioles, 31-0, in last Friday night's homecoming game here.

For Tawas, the victory could not have been sweeter in the first of a three-game home stand. One of the largest crowds ever to attend a gridiron clash here saw the Braves avenge a 13-6 loss to the Branchers last year.

The thus far unscored-against Braves will now take on two of the NEM Conference's top grid schools in successive weeks. Standish-Sterling High School will be here this Friday night and on the following Friday night the Flying Gs of Gladwin will come to town.

In racking up their third win of the season, which already bettered last year's won-loss margin, the Braves had 319 yards combined rushing and passing to overwhelm the Orioles' 121-yard effort.

Tawas, scoring mid-way in the first period, did not put the game away, however, until the second half. The Braves offense seemed to stall after the initial touchdown and did not get moving again until after intermission.

West Branch, boasting a hefty line but poor speed in the backfield, moved well in the early stages of the first period but were finally forced to punt out of their own territory.

The first time Tawas got its hands on the ball saw the Braves start a touchdown drive. Leading the way during the series was Halfback Jim Herriman, who picked up 25 yards in four carries and Fullback Ed Collier sprinted 21 yards around right end to hit paydirt. The try for PAT was too short and Tawas led 6-0 at the end of the first quarter.

After halftime homecoming festivities, during which Queen Sharon Siller and her court were introduced and Tawas Area High School Band staged another fine performance, partisan fans saw

the Tawas backfield come to life again.

After Collier returned the kickoff 26 yards to the Tawas 36, the big fullback and Halfback Herriman combined to move the ball through and around the Oriole line to the West Branch 16. From there, Halfback Ernie Lixey raced around right end into the end zone. The PAT was missed and Tawas led 12-0.

The kickoff saw West Branch returning the ball to their own 48, but in two plays, lost possession when Tackle Neil Mochty speared an Oriole pass which had been deflected by Tackle Bill Western.

In three plays, Collier and Lixey moved the Braves to the West Branch 26. Quarterback Jim Mick hit End Lewis Werth with a "stand up and go pass" which was good for nine yards and Herriman raced 21 yards around end to put the ball on the West Branch six. Lixey again went the distance for his second TD of the night and, after Collier booted from placement, Tawas led 18-0.

Just before the end of the third period, West Branch started to move but Werth intercepted another Oriole pass on the Tawas 44 and the Braves took over the ball.

Herriman, Collier, Lixey and Jim LeViere then went to work to move the ball in 10 plays to the West Branch five-yard stripe where LeViere powered his way over right guard for a touchdown. The PAT attempt was missed and Tawas held a 25-0 lead.

Tawas scored its final touchdown of the night with its second string backfield. Don Humphrey, outstanding defensive linebacker, moved into the quarterback slot and hit End Steve Ferguson with a 25-yard pass which put the ball on the West Branch 28. After two incomplete passes, two ground plays which picked up seven yards and a 15-yard clipping penalty against the Orioles, Humphrey hit Halfback Brian Helmer with an

aerial. The Tawas speedsters caught the ball on the run and raced into the end zone. The placement was missed and Tawas won, 31-0, after West Branch had one play from scrimmage.

Leading ground gainer of the night was Herriman who averaged eight yards in 14 carries. Lixey was next with 63 yards in nine carries. Collier had a 4.5-yard average in 11 carries. LeViere and Bob Smith each averaged four yards, the former in five carries and the latter in two.

Tawas has 13 first downs to six for the Orioles. The Braves had three penalties and 35 yards marked off against them. West Branch had four penalties for a 20-yard deficit. Collier punted three times for a 40-yard average. Tawas fumbled three times and lost the ball once. West Branch did not fumble during the night.

they bypassed that question."

Mayor Tuttle, stating he would like to "give the devil his dues," thought that the highway department would have met with the council to outline its plans for US-23 had last week's meeting not been called by other local organizations.

"They did just what they were asked to do," said Tuttle, explaining that the meeting had been called for the purpose of discussing US-23 through Tawas City. "As far as they were concerned, it was a city meeting and not an area meeting," said Tuttle.

Keiser pointed out, however, that the businessmen's association and council had written letters to the highway department about five months ago concerning its announced plans for US-23 through Tawas City. He said they had never been answered.

Conn said that if removal of parking on US-23 is in the offing, the city should make plans for development for the people who would be put out of business. "The time has come to take the bull by the horns and take action," he stated.

City Treasurer John Hoshbach asked what the businessmen's plans were to get more parking or prevent the state from taking parking off US-23.

Councilman Howard Hutton said that removal of parking would not only affect the one block between Mathews and Whittemore Streets but would result in prohibition along the entire route.

Conn said he was in favor of forming a planning committee. He said its main function would be to make recommendations to the council as to what the committee believes is proper for the city to do concerning particular problems. "Without research and study," said Conn, "it could not arrive at a solution."

Keiser said that if additional parking lots were obtained at this time, the city could not get its equity out if the area was bypassed in 15 years.

Conn stated that the city would have to establish a plan for future needs. He said that if the city did not have such a plan, the highway department would proceed according to its own plans.

"Until such time as Tawas City, East Tawas and Oscoda have a long-range plan that coordinates with the highway department, other efforts will be a waste of time and money," said Conn. He said that the city should not wait until the state stops parking before it starts to think about such a plan.

He said, too, that functions of the planning commission should not be confined to problems of US-23.

Bruce Myles, president of the chamber of commerce, said that Bay City had acquired the services of a land use consultant with its planning. "If you have a plan, the highway department will coordinate with you. If not, it is just too bad," he stated.

Councilman Cecil Cable said

that immediate steps should be taken to acquire off-street parking. He said that parking space should be purchased collectively, not individually.

John N. Brugger, grocer, said that the area's business growth through increased parking facilities would help finance such a plan over a long period of time.

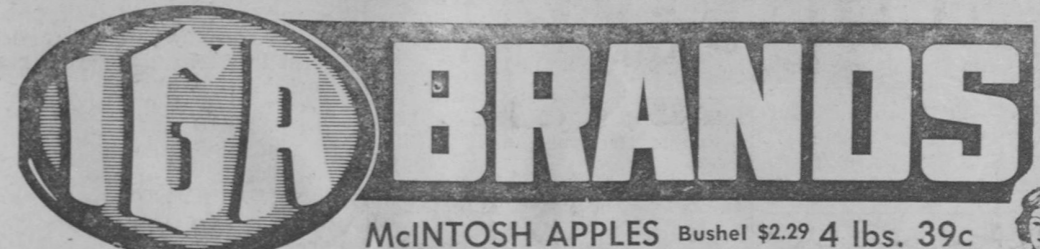

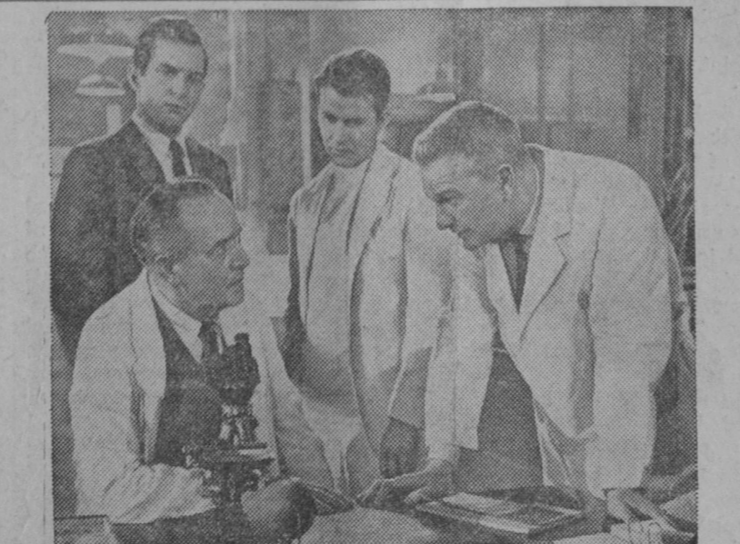
