Road Construction Method is Unique

Using a technique that bears some resemblance to a cook book recipe for mixing batter, the Iosco County Road Commission is now rebuilding two miles of Bissonette Road eight miles northwest of Oscoda.

As an experiment in an entirely new concept in road building, instead of using aggregate for a base, the road commission is using a mixture of asphalt emulsion and sand to stabilize the roadbed.

Rodney Meade, county road commission engineer, said this was the first time this method of asphalt stabilization has ever been used in the state.

After the roadway has been brought to grade, asphalt is sprayed on top of a layer of sand. Road graders are then used to mix the sand and asphalt together and the mixture is compacted.

Following a day of curing for the first layer, another layer of sand is spread on top of the roadbed and asphalt emulsion is again sprayed on top. Road graders then go to work mixing the asphalt and sand to a smooth consistency and the mixture is compacted by multi-wheel trailers.

This stabilized four-inch layer then receives an asphalt seal coat and gravel making the roadbed about five inches thick.

Meade estimates that a road can be built at a cost of about \$10,000 per mile using this method.

She's Happy—Purse is Found

Mrs. Ella Striz of Detroit is one person who will tell you that the majority of people are honest.

Mrs. Striz, who with her husband, Harry, and four children were visiting last week with her mother, Mrs. Geza Nemeth of Tawas City, lost a coin purse which contained about \$30.

Evidently the purse fell out of the family car while it was parked along US-23. It contained no identification papers other than the name and address of the Strizes' baby sitter.

Although she felt that the purse would never be recovered, Mrs. Striz inquired at the state police post. She was told that a Tawas City resident had found a purse similar to the one she had lost.

Fred A. Rempert of Seventh Avenue had found the purse and reported it to local law enforcement agencies. In addition, he called the Herald office to check the possibility of someone advertising a lost purse.

Mrs. Striz identified the purse and, because of the honesty of Mr. Rempert, the family's vacation was not spoiled.

Working in close cooperation with the county is Joseph Kelly of Bituminous Materials Company, Bay City.

Kelly said that sand found in the Oscoda area compacts very well and has good bearing strength. The first two layers of the roadbed contains only about three percent asphalt content.

"We were rather amazed to find that the first layer had been compacted by the normal flow of vehicular traffic," said Kelly. "The process was not as messy as one would think."

This method of road building has undergone extensive testing in the laboratories of the Indiana Highway Department. Meade visited the Indiana laboratory in order to become acquainted with the method.

Success of the project depends on how well the road holds up during heavy frosts this winter.

Although ditches have been dug along the road, drainage will depend a great deal upon absorption of runoff water by loose sand.

The road runs along the north bank of the AuSable River in an area covered with jack pine.

December Bid Letting—

Board Talks Over Plans

Plans for a new six-classroom addition at the Tawas City unit, which was included in a five-year construction program recently approved by voters, is to be let for bids sometime in December.

Attending a meeting Monday night of the Tawas Area Board of Education were representatives of the Bay City architectural firm of Brysselbout, Starke and Hacker.

Paul Brysselbout and Erwin Hacker told members of the board that plans for the new structure would be completed by December.

The board and architects discussed general plans for the new \$120,000 structure. In addition to classrooms, it would have a new heating plant, kitchen and toilet facilities.

Supt. Reynold Mick said that a December bid letting would allow the successful contractor plenty of time to make plans for an early start on work in the spring.

School officials hope to have the new elementary facilities ready for use by the start of the 1962 fall term.

In other business, Barbara Durant was hired as a secretary at the East Tawas unit.

The board authorized holding a typing class at 8:00 a. m. This would allow participation by those students who presently have a schedule conflict with other subjects.

Conservation Dept. Completes Stocking of West Londo Lake

Fish division of the Michigan Department of Conservation completed the restocking of West Londo Lake near Hale Tuesday afternoon with about 200 large mouth bass.

A week ago Thursday, the department had planted 6,000 fingerling bass in the lake and the previous week had stocked it with 320 large mouth bass 8.1 inches in length.

Of the latter, five died overnight and an additional 12 were reported to have died the next day.

The department had poisoned the lake by mistake in June, a week before the opening of bass season.

The department is testing delayed mortality of the poison by putting rainbow trout in a live cage in the lake.

A Detroit area employee of Michigan Bell Telephone Company, assigned to special work in Oscoda, was credited by police Saturday with saving the life of a 14-month-old boy who nearly drowned in a laundry tub.

Police said that JoJo Morrison, son Alie and Mrs. Robert Morrison, 4093 AuSable Drive, had fallen into a laundry tub filled with water.

Mrs. Morrison rushed outside with the unconscious toddler and her cries for help were heard by George Pozniak, 26, 858 Seward, Detroit, and Robert Slaven, 34, Garden City.

The two men were working on a telephone line near the Morrison home.

Pozniak applied mouth-to-mouth respiration to the boy and revived him.

The Oscoda-AuSable Township Fire Department rescue squad and Township Police Chief Robert Foster rushed to the scene. The boy was given oxygen and then treated by a local physician.

Former TC Barber Renews Acquaintances

Renewing old acquaintances here last week was George W. Lightheart, 39, who operated a barber shop here many years ago.

Mr. Lightheart operated a shop in the building now occupied by Howard Hatten. He had succeeded former barber, Marshall Smith.

In 1906, Mr. Lightheart moved to Jackson. After barbering there for a number of years, he moved to Rives Junction. He retired from the trade last January 21.

Pastor Breaks Tradition in Ceremony for New School

Ground breaking ceremonies for the new \$100,000 Christian day school of Zion Lutheran Church were conducted in a rather unique way Sunday.

Departing from using the traditional nickel plated shovel, the Rev. Walter C. Pieper, pastor, sat at the controls of a dragline and broke sod adjacent to the church.

While the pastor was showing his finesse at the operating levers (he received instructions only Saturday evening from Harold Katterman, owner), members of his congregation lined the sidewalk to watch the long-awaited ceremony.

Ground breaking was preceded by a special church service and a luncheon was served following the ceremony by church women. Serving tables were set out under trees near the old school building.

Construction of a new school building has been in the planning stages for several years, although the building committee started to campaign in earnest only about two years ago to raise finances for the structure.

The new 65 by 96 concrete block and brick building is to be located adjacent to the church at the corner of Second Street and Seventh Avenue.

Plans for the new structure were approved last week by the Michigan Department of Education.

The new school building will contain two classrooms, a 32 by 65 multipurpose room, office, rest rooms and kitchen.

The church and school will be connected by an anteroom which will also serve as an overflow area for church services during summer months.

A new radiant heating plant to be included in the project will serve both buildings.

Included in plans will be remodeling of the church steeple, which was removed several years ago.

The new building was designed by Leslie E. Cnaan of East Tawas.

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Hearing Set on Revised Zoning Ordinance in TC

A public hearing to air objections, if any, on a proposed amendment to the city zoning ordinance will be held Monday, October 2, 8:00 p. m., at the council room of the Tawas City Hall.

The proposed amendment was approved by the city council at its meeting last week. Official notification of the hearing is printed on page 9 of this newspaper.

The amendment is designed to define one and two-family dwellings in class A residential districts.

Under the proposed amendment, a one-family dwelling is defined as a building designed or occupied exclusively by one family but excluding any dwelling which is rented or leased out for terms of one month or less, primarily for the purpose of vacationing.

A two-family dwelling is one designed or occupied exclusively by two families living independently of each other but excluding any dwelling which is rented or leased out for terms of one month or less, primarily for the purpose of vacationing.

In other words, under terms of the new provisions of the ordinance, renting a one or two-family home in a class A residential district for a period of less than a month (for vacation purposes) would be prohibited.

This proposed change grew out of objections voiced by residents of the Bay Drive area at recent meetings of the city council.

Residents of that class A district objected to rental of a house on the bay shore for periods of less than a month. They claimed it was a commercial venture in a residential district.

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First P-TA Meeting Has 'Get Acquainted' Theme

Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association will hold its first meeting of the fall season at Tawas Area High School cafeteria Monday, September 18, 8:00 p. m.

General theme of the meeting is a get-acquainted one with introduction of new members of the faculty and of the board of education.

Supt. Reynold Mick will discuss the population explosion of the "little people" and the resultant need of more facilities, which has already been approved by the voters.

An earlier meeting time, a consideration of the budget and a talk by Ernest Jordan Jr., high school principal, on problems of truancy will round out the program.

Attempts are being made to eliminate unnecessary time on business, reading of minutes, etc., in order to give more time to the program.

"We cordially invite all who have the interests of our children at heart to come and help make our meetings worthwhile," states Clyde Soper, president.

US Construction to Set New Record --- Baker

The United States construction industry will set a new record of about 57 billion dollars this year, one of its leading spokesmen predicted Tuesday.

"By about 1965," he added, "the basic annual demand will rise to around 1.7 million new homes a year. And this should move up to two million a year by 1970."

To keep National Gypsum abreast of this rising demand for building materials, Mr. Baker said that it "now appears that we will need to invest some 250 million dollars in new and expanded facilities in the next decade."

He explained that "this large sum of money is mentioned because it is the minimum amount of money estimated to be generated by the company from depletion, depreciation and retained earnings."

He said his company is looking forward to a demand "for at least 6 1/2 million new housing units in the five-year period ending at the close of 1965."

He noted that "the 6 1/2 million total averages out to 1.3 million new homes a year."

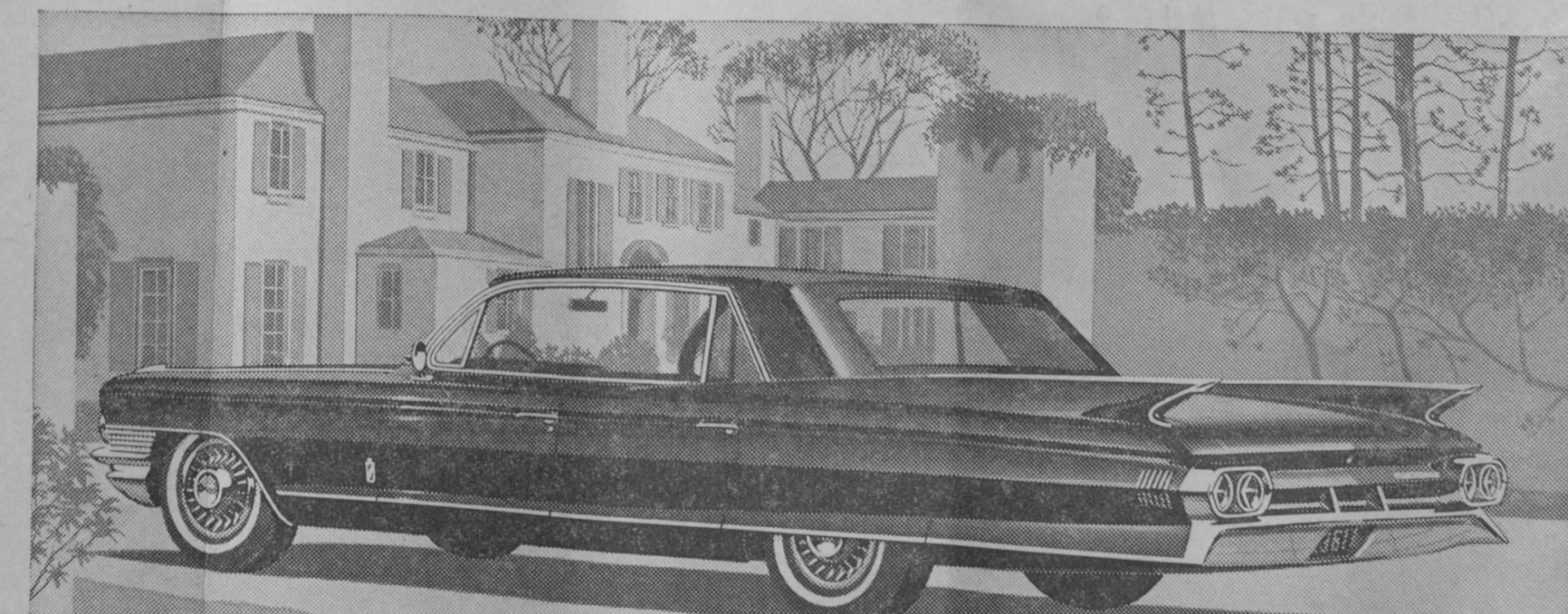

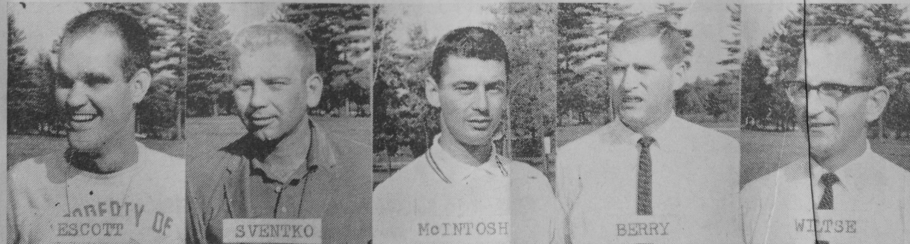

Full Speed Ahead in Gunboat Construction

Crash Program Rocks St. Louis

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 17—Construction of a fleet of armored river gunboats for Union troops is proceeding at an astonishing pace, a tour of facilities here indicates.

At least 4,000 workers in shipyards, machine shops, foundries and sawmills—all under the direction of master boat-builder James B. Eads—are going full blast 24 hours a day on the top-priority projects.

First products of the crash program are pegged for the use of soldiers under Maj. Gen. John Charles Fremont, Union commander of forces in the West.

Fremont is awaiting delivery of 38 mortar boats and eight steam tugs to move them. Also under way is the conversion of two sturdy river craft, the *New Era*, a ferry, and the *Submarine*, a snag-boat, which are to be commissioned and re-christened the *Essex* and *Benton*, respectively.

EADS, one of the nation's leading experts on river traffic and steamboat construction, said that final plans have been made for the building of seven massive gunboats for early delivery to the Union's fast-growing river fleet.

Specifications call for these craft to be 175 feet long, 51½ feet wide and to draw no more than 6 feet of water.

The boats will carry 13 heavy guns each, be plated with 2½ inch iron, and have a minimum speed of nine miles an hour, the nautical engineer said.

Tentatively, they have been named St. Louis, Carondelet, Cincinnati, Louisville, Mound City, Cairo and Pittsburgh.

SIDES OF the craft are to be sloped at an angle of about 35 degrees and front and rear casements also will slant.

Stern-wheels will be entirely protected by the rear casement and front casements will shield three bow guns.

Also in the works are plans to convert the snag-boat BENTON into a unique twin-hulled vessel some 200 feet long and seventy-five feet of beam, to carry 16 guns, including seven 32-pounders and seven army 42-pounders.

Acquisition of the *Benton* was arranged by Fremont and its ul-

imate destination is thought to be Cairo.

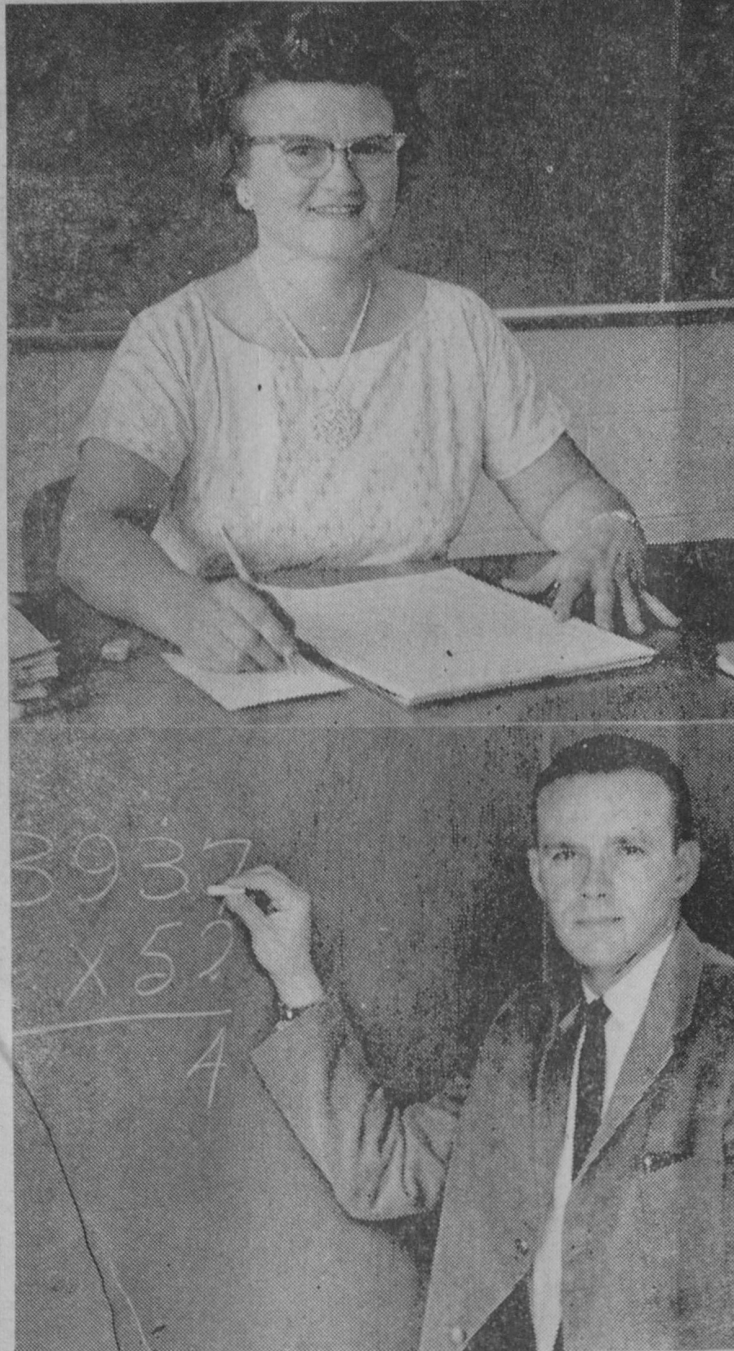
Eads was called by Washington shortly after Fort Sumter to confer with Navy Secretary Gideon Welles and his chief aide, Capt. Gustavus Fox, about the possibility of fast construction of a river fleet that would give the North command of the West's vital navigable waters.

HIS WHIRLWIND approach to the problem brought a sharp change in the economy of St. Louis, where rolling-mills and forges had lain idle as men enlisted or left the state in search of employment.

The 4,000-man work force was assembled—and on the job—within two weeks after Eads and the Navy department agreed on contracts for the challenging project.

As of today, the contracts call for delivery of the gun-boats not later than Oct. 10. If Eads meets the deadline, he will have launched a fleet including eight steam boats aggregating 5,000 tons—within 100 days of laying the first keel.

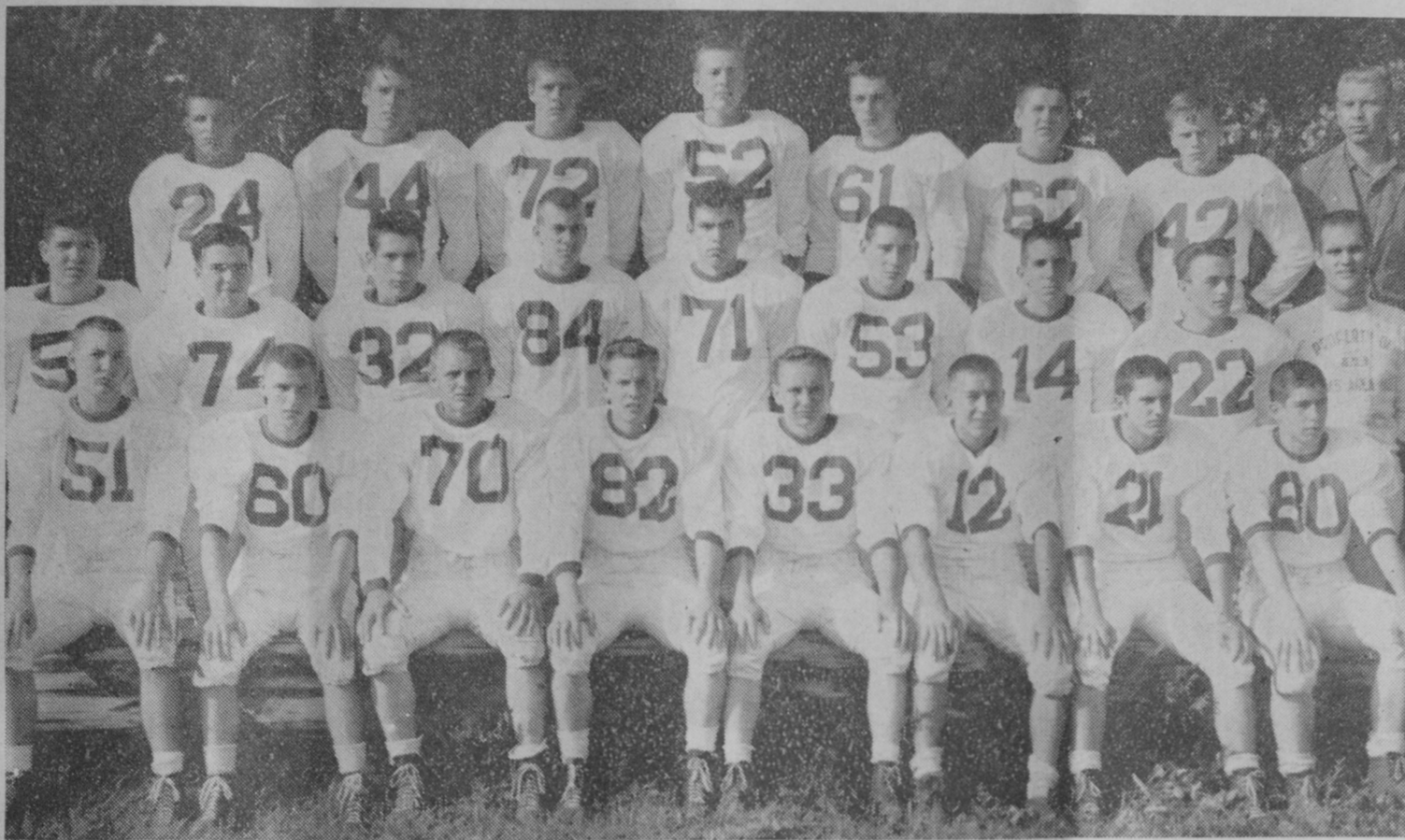

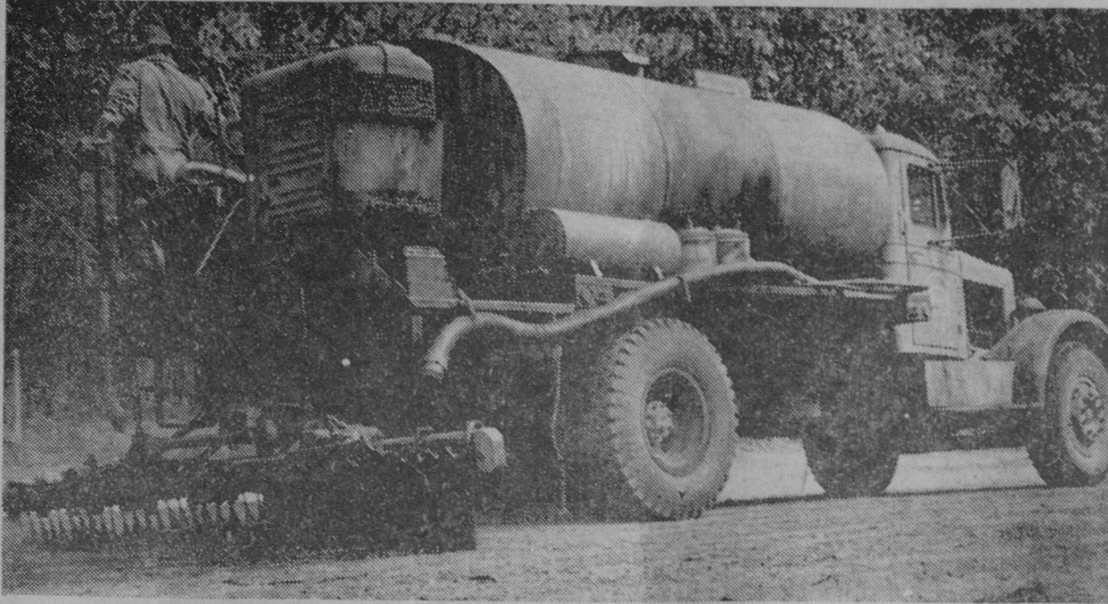

Geese Force B-52H Bomber to Make Unscheduled Stop

A Wurtsmith Air Force Base B-52H Stratofortress made an emergency landing Monday night at K. I. Sawyer AFB near Marquette after hitting a flock of geese over Lake Superior. None of the nine persons aboard the SAC bomber were injured.

Crew members were Maj. Richard C. Armstrong, pilot; Capt. Vernon L. Peterson, co-pilot; Maj. David Rinzler, radar navigator; 1-Lt. Vance A. Zartman, navigator; 1-Lt. Robert E. Hunter, electronics warfare officer; Maj. Donavon B. Manifold, instructor pilot; Maj. L. N. Anneson, instructor navigator; Capt. Robert Reid, instructor electronics warfare officer.

According to Major Armstrong, the aircraft was approaching a low-level bomb run over Ironwood when the incident occurred.

He told air force officials that the aircraft's speed was about 350 miles per hour at about 3,000 feet when the crew members heard what sounded like an explosion, followed by a strong blast of air carrying parts of birds into the cockpit.

The co-pilot, Captain Peterson, was raised in his seat against the safety belt by the sudden air rush. The aircraft cabin was not pressurized at the low altitude.

Major Armstrong said that particles of the five or six birds were blown into the cockpit through holes ripped in the right center of the fuselage. A large dent was later noted on the plane's left side.

The aircraft left Wurtsmith at 5:00 p. m. Monday and had performed high altitude bomb runs as part of routine training exercises.

The incident occurred at 8:15 p. m. some four miles south of Grand Portage, Ontario, Canada, and northeast of Duluth, Minnesota.

Major Armstrong said the accident impaired visibility so that the flight was terminated and an emergency landing was made at K. I. Sawyer.

No explosive weapons were aboard the B-52H jet.

Contractors for Consumers Power Company recently completed a major remodeling and modernization of that firm's local office at the corner of Wheeler and Lake Streets.

Interior of the 90 by 50 concrete block building has been completely remodeled with birch paneling on walls of the 22 by 50-foot sales area and accounting department.

The accounting department area has been expanded to facilitate record handling. Customer records are maintained there for all of Iosco and Alcona Counties and parts of Arenac and Ogemaw.

Two new offices were constructed, one for Area Manager Gordon Huck, who has headed the local area since 1952, and another for Harold Hammond, new business and farm supervisor.

These offices have drop ceilings of insulating panels and fluorescent light fixtures which are flush with the ceiling. Offices and sales area of the building are completely air-conditioned.

The engineering department, remodeled last fall, has facilities for five engineers and a supervisor. A new Oxalid blue print machine is located there. This department has its own air-conditioning system.

Storage for new and used appliances is located at the rear of the building. An appliance repair department is also located there.

A new parking lot with black-top surface was constructed on the west side of the building for company and customer parking.

Exterior of the building has been painted with a new special type plastic base paint.

At one time, all of Consumers Power Company's operations were directed out of this building. A new service center was constructed in Baldwin Township last year. Construction and tree-trimming crews operated out of the latter building and a pole yard, transformer dock and radio room are located there.

Consumers Power Company purchased the Tawas City building from James H. Leslie in 1953. Prior to that, it had leased the building for several years after being located originally in the Case Building.

Prime contractor for the remodeling work was O. S. Rose Builders, Incorporated, Tawas City.

Some 15 persons are employed at the local office. In addition to Area Manager Huck and Mr. Hammond, the records department includes Mrs. Mark Wood, Mrs. Steven Masich, Mrs. Georgena Johnson and Larry O'Neill; engineering, Max Beach, Ben Wilson, Clarence Pierson, Albert Paulson and Richard Adamski.

Ben Brewer is the sales representative. Arnold Petherick and Gilbert Bell are in appliance service and Hugh Spencer heads the engineering department, working between Tawas and Midland.

Funeral services were held Monday, September 11, for Raymond Covey, who died Friday, September 8, at his home in Oscoda following a heart attack.

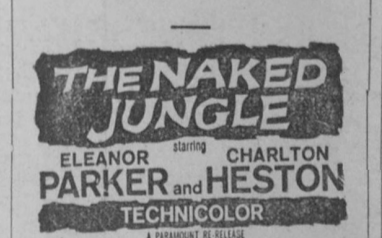
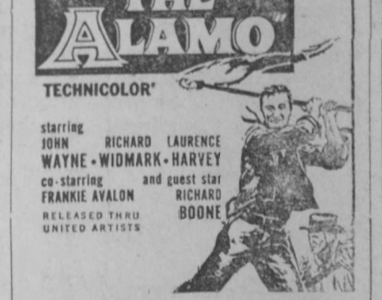
