## Year's First P-TA Meet Had Good Attendance

First meeting of the Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association held Monday night was attended by about 240 enthusiastic supporters.

During the business meeting, it was decided that, in the future, minutes of previous meetings, committee reports, announcements, etc., would be presented in mimeograph form to members as they enter the meeting.

To further shorten the business portion of the meeting, the committee revising the by-laws was given permission to eliminate contradictions and to empower the executive board to act on all business matters.

Decisions of the executive board would be accepted or rejected at the next regular meeting.

The finance committee was directed to set aside \$250 for adult education, the main item being provision for attending out-of-town meetings and workshops by various members.

It was voted that, henceforth, meetings would start at 8:00 p. m. and terminate at 9:30 p. m.

Preceding the program, introductions were carried out to acquaint those present with officers and committee chairmen of the P-TA organization, high school and elementary faculty of the Tawas Area School and members of the board of education.

Program chairman, Mrs. George Prescott, presented three speakers.

Supt. Reynold Mick gave an interesting talk, accompanied with diagrams, to show the population increase in the district. He emphasized the increase in the lower grades, requiring increased facilities and for which voters recently approved money to finance construction of necessary classrooms.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary director, invited anyone who wished to discuss student problems to contact her and she would arrange an appointment.

## Area Voters Name Dehnke and Hubbs Con-Con Delegates

At noon Tuesday, October 3, Secretary of State James M. Hare will wield the gavel in Lansing's Civic Center and the constitutional convention will be in session.

Named as convention delegates by voters of this area last Tuesday were Herman Dehnke of Harrisville and Lewis T. Hubbs of Gladwin.

Dehnke, retired circuit judge from the 23rd circuit, will represent the Alpena Representative District and Hubbs will represent the 28th Senatorial District.

Dehnke carried the three-county district by a 4,287 to 1,325 majority over Democrat John H. Mack of Alpena. Iosco voters gave Dehnke a 1,425-294 margin. Hubbs won 6,936 to 2,253 over Hubert C. Evans, Democrat of Gladwin.

By law, Secretary of State Hare is charged with the responsibility of convening the constitutional convention. It is his responsibility to see to it that the delegates are properly sworn in and to conduct the voting for the president, chairman, and other convention officers.

## Ordinance Establishes New Revolving Fund

Adoption of Ordinance Number 154, authorizing the establishment of a local improvement and capital purchase revolving fund, was approved by the Tawas City Council Monday night.

This ordinance provides for the use of money in the fund for local improvement and capital purchase. It also provides a means for reimbursement to the fund.

The revolving fund consists presently of approximately \$34,000, which the city received as a federal grant for construction of additions to its sewer disposal plant. Prior to receipt of the grant, voters approved a bond issue for construction of the additions.

It was the opinion of the council and Mayor George Tuttle that the money should be used for such civic improvement as construction of new sewers, etc.

The money would be repaid to the revolving fund through establishment of special assessment districts.

This plan has been discussed for some months and has received the enthusiastic support of the council. It will provide the means of financing small improvement projects needed by the city.

It is expected that sewer revenues and assessed millage will pay the interest and bonded indebtedness on the disposal plant.

In the event that such revenues do not produce the necessary funds, the city council is authorized to use any part of the federal grant that it deems necessary for such purposes.

Complete text of the new ordinance which establishes the revolving fund is printed on page 9 of this newspaper.

Mayor George Tuttle announced Monday night that Tawas City's new fire truck would arrive Saturday afternoon. A demonstration of the new equipment is scheduled for 1 o'clock at the city park.

In other business, Councilman Howard Hatton requested that the city police department make more efforts toward controlling speed of traffic on US-23 south of the river bridge.

He said that motorists were traveling at a high rate of speed in that area and were causing a dangerous hazard. He cited the fact that numerous accidents had occurred recently in that area.

Hatton also suggested that the city request state police to locate its radar control car in that area for a period of time.

## Talk on Highway Slated Next Tuesday

Importance of a good representation of civic and business leaders, as well as active participation by private citizens at next Tuesday night's meeting at which proposed changes to US-23 will be outlined, was stressed today.

Representatives of the state highway department are to explain proposed road changes here starting at 8:00 p. m. at the Tawas Area High School. The session is being sponsored by the Tawas Kiwanis Club.

Donald Watson, who heads the Kiwanis Club's committee for the meeting, urges people to write questions pertaining to US-23 which will be asked at the meeting.

Attending will be four engineers from the department, along with state officials.

Recently, the state announced changes in the route and appearance of US-23 through Arenac, Iosco, Alcona and Alpena Counties.

US-23 is to become a divided-limited access highway sometime during the next 20 years, according to a recent needs study conducted by the state.

## Two Power Company Employees Promoted

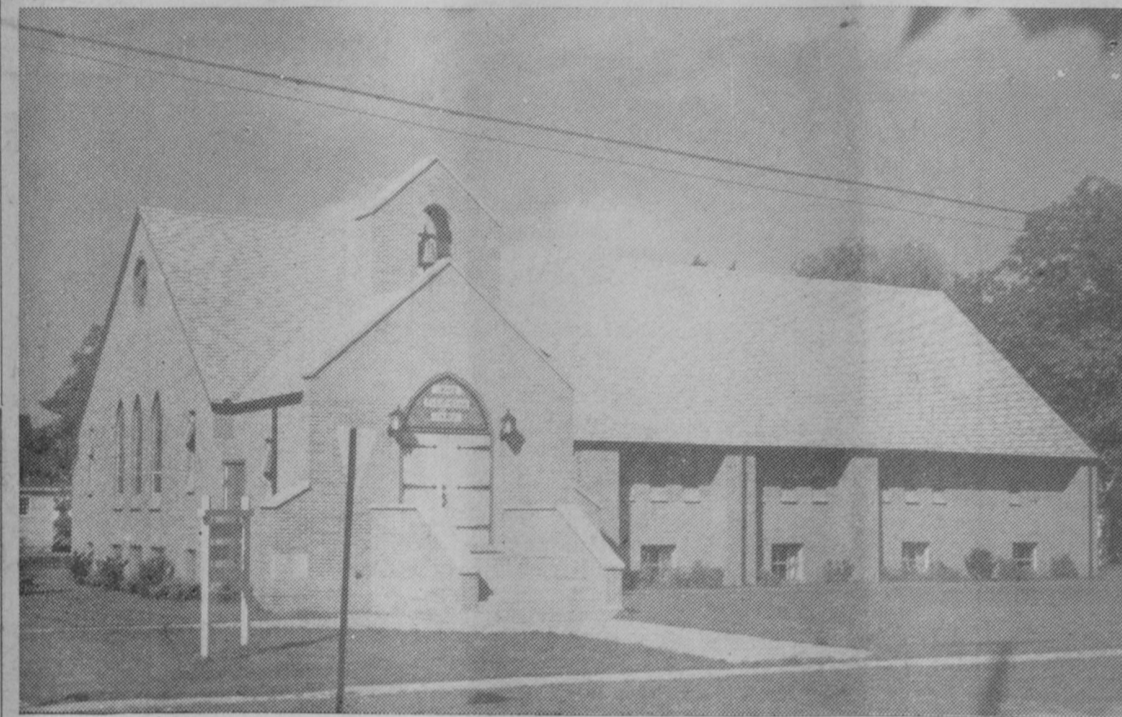
Promotions of two East Tawas employees of Consumers Power Company and the transfer of one of them to Bay City were announced by Division Manager Louis A. Vaupre.

## Grace Lutheran Church to Observe 75th Anniversary

Seventy-fifth anniversary of the founding of Grace Lutheran Church, East Tawas, will be observed with special services and programs this Saturday and Sunday.

The Rev. Edward H. Peterson, who was vice pastor here when the new church was built, will preach during the regular 11:15 a. m. service.

A special service of thanksgiving will be held Sunday night at 7:30 o'clock. The public is invited to attend. The Rev. Reuben E. Norling, who was born at Oscoda and who is now president of the Eastern Michigan District of Augustana Lutheran Church, will deliver the sermon.

It is hoped that the Rev. Robert Nelson, former pastor of the church and now of Flint, will be able to attend the anniversary observance.

The anniversary observance starts Saturday night with a smorgasbord in the church basement. Following the meal, which is described as being typical of the old days, will be a historical program patterned after the "This Is Your Life" television show.

Pastor Lindholm is now in the process of recording voices of some of the older members of the congregation for use in the program. Slides will be shown and old pictures of confirmation classes and pastors will be on display. For the first time since 1940, Sunday morning's church service will be conducted in Swedish. The Rev. Martin W. Gustafson, who was pastor here from 1941 to 1945, will have charge of the service. An old-fashioned reed-type organ will be used.

## Finances, Hall and Fire Truck are Discussed

Discussion of city finances, particularly toward the large surplus of approximately \$26,000 which is expected at the close of fiscal 1961 (October 1), concerned most of Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council.

Some members of the council and Mayor C. V. Miller still have not come to an agreement on a proposed city hall which has been "hanging fire" for many months.

Mayor Miller suggested Monday night that approximately \$17,400 be taken from this surplus money and use it to pay for a new fire truck which the city ordered and is to be delivered later this month.

He said that by using this method, approximately \$5,762 in finance charges could be saved over the presently proposed method of borrowing the money to pay for the fire truck over a 10-year period.

Miller also stated that by using the money, it would reduce the city's surplus to near the legal limit.

The council, however, decided to take no action at present on the mayor's proposal.

Majority of the council members are of the opinion that the surplus money should be placed in a city hall building fund.

This has been one of the "sticky" points between two factions of opinion for months.

In other business, Supt. of Public Works Paul Ropert was authorized to purchase 20 tons of rock salt to be used on city streets this winter.

Building permits approved included: Alois Fisher, concrete drive; James DeRosier, repairs; Charles Rouiller, build car port for Robert Langlois; Jack Cury, garage; Joseph Barkman, repairs; Donald Hanewald, repairs; Henry Flodquist, repairs.

A fence for K. Berkeley Smith was denied because of nonconformity with the city ordinance.

## Leslie's Ford Dealership Sold to West Branch Man

Sale of the Orville Leslie and Sons Ford-Mercury dealership in Tawas City was announced last week by Mrs. Orville Leslie Sr.

Taking over the dealership effective September 16 was William Inglis, who also owns the West Branch Ford agency.

The Leslie family is one of the pioneer automobile dealers in Northeastern Michigan. The late Orville Leslie started his first agency at Prescott in 1910, covering parts of Arenac, Ogemaw and Iosco Counties.

Their agency was the first in that area and came when Henry Ford first began to build his automobiles on a large scale.

In 1933, Mr. and Mrs. Leslie opened a dealership at Whittemore and a year later purchased the Tawas City dealership which had been founded by Henry Kane, pioneer Ford dealer here, and later operated by W. C. (Roxey) Roach.

The purchase by Mr. Inglis includes the Tawas City dealership only. The Oscoda Mercury agency is still owned by the three Leslie sons, Ben, Larry and Orville Jr. (Buck). The dealership is operated by Ben Leslie.

Mrs. Leslie, the former Dora Ellsworth, has played an active part in the dealership since 1912, when she and Mr. Leslie were married. Mr. Leslie died in January of this year.

"During our long association with Ford dealerships, we have had many loyal friends in the Northeastern Michigan area," said Mrs. Leslie. "We sincerely appreciate this patronage over the years and extend our best wishes to the new owner."

# New \$2.7 Million School is Pride of Oscoda Area

Oscoda Area High School students, faculty and administration are now enjoying facilities of one of the state's newest and most unique high school buildings.

Major work on the new 2.7 million dollar building was completed in time for the start of the fall term two weeks ago. Except for equipment yet to be installed in the shop area and in some classrooms, only minor "touch-up" work remains to be completed.

Although formal dedication of the new building is still three months away, parents of a proud community turned out nearly en masse Monday night for the open house meeting of the Oscoda Area Parent-Teacher Association.

It is understandable that parents appreciated their initial inspection of the new building for, starting right at the modernistic front entrance of the structure, visitors to the new Oscoda Area High School have the opportunity to view the latest philosophy in school architecture and planning.

"Literally thousands of people visited the school during construction," states Supt. Robert Richardson. "Interest in its progress has not been limited to a local point of view. Educators and school board members from throughout the state have paid it a visit."

Modern and functional in every detail, the school was one of two Michigan plans selected from more than 600 competitors in the American Association of School Administrators' competition at Atlantic City in 1959. The administration and board of education had spent more than three years in its planning stages.

In April of 1959, the people of Oscoda passed, by a seven to one majority, a bond issue of \$985,000 to be added to a federal entitlement of \$1,044,000 for the construction of a new high school.

This entitlement was received through the impact on Oscoda schools caused by the expansion and resulting population increase at nearby Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

Three bond issues voted by the people included one for a \$150,000 auditorium, one for a \$265,000 swimming pool and \$550,000 for a cafeteria, college-size gymnasium, equipment and parts of the building which were not paid under the federal entitlement.

Located on an 80-acre wooded site west of Oscoda on River Road, some 1,000 students from grades seven through 12 attend school there now and an additional 200 are expected before the year is over.

The building was designed by Eberle M. Smith Associates, Incorporated, Detroit, and general contractor for construction was Edward Davison and Son Builders, Incorporated, Tawas City.

Although the trend in constructing school buildings during recent years has been toward the campus style of architecture, the Oscoda Board of Education and Superintendent Richardson adopted a new viewpoint for this school.

As a result of this philosophy, the new Oscoda school has 50 percent less outside wall space than any comparable structure in the country.

Another break from traditional school architecture is that glassed-in corridor areas are located outside the building and forced ventilation is incorporated in its design.

With a minimum of outside walls, the center of school activities is located in the exact center of the building, called the "common."

hall-cafeteria, principal's and superintendent's offices, health clinic, counseling department, library and kitchen.

Extending from the hub are four wings: The north wing containing the science, vocational and commercial departments; in the south wing, the physical education department; academic classrooms are contained in the east wing, while the music department and auditorium are located in the west wing.

Some of the features of the new building include a 30-station language laboratory, a 658-seat auditorium, a 2,000-seat gymnasium and a swimming pool built to olympic specifications with high and low diving boards.

Laboratory areas in the science department are separate from lecture areas. The industrial arts department includes facilities for both wood and metal workings.

Particular "pride and joy" of Mr. Richardson is the auditorium. Facilities here include probably the only professionally lighted stage in this section of Michigan, plus dressing rooms for both boys and girls. Aisles of the auditorium are carpeted and it is equipped with comfortable theater-type seats.

Oscoda's swimming pool, one of the few in Northern Michigan, is one of the favorite features of the new building for students. Under Coach Richard Hanley, Oscoda will have a swimming team this year, but all students are eligible to receive instruction and use the pool.

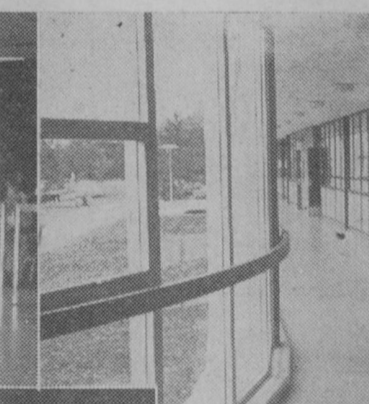
The school also plans swimming instruction in its adult education program, in addition to family night participation.



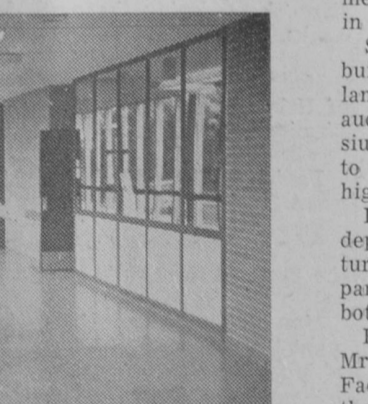

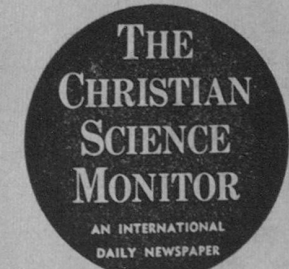

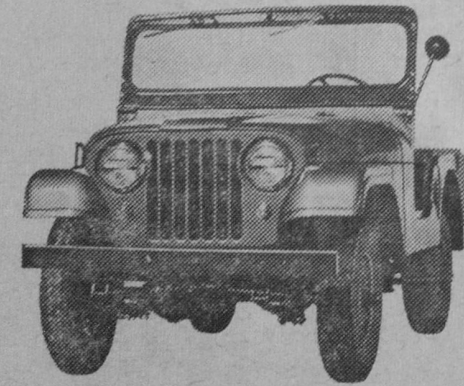

1900, money was budgeted each year to maintain the stables.

Before the church had a resident pastor, the congregation was visited about once a month by a traveling preacher from Bay City, who made the trip here by railroad train.

Christian teaching was conducted in these devout Lutheran households, however, during the absence of a regular preacher. A book published in Sweden in 1889, entitled "Den Helssamma Laran," was used in the home services. It included Scripture readings and a sermon for each Sunday in the year, all printed in the Swedish language.

"Many of the older members of the congregation say their fathers

used for services and meetings of the congregation until 1955, when the new church was completed.

Oldest surviving member of the church is John Burgeson of Baldwin Township. Mr. Burgeson will be 99 years old in December.

## 100 Years Ago This Week...in THE CIVIL WAR

(Events exactly 100 years ago this week that led to the Civil War—told in the language and style of today.)

### 'Irish Brigade' Falls At Lexington, Mo.

Confederates Under Gen. Price  
Crush 3,500 After 2-Day Siege

LEXINGTON, Mo.—Sept. 20—A numerically superior Southern force today defeated the Illinois "Irish Brigade" and other Federal units after an epic two-day siege.

Rebel troops totalling some 18,000, commanded by Gen. Sterling Price, forced the surrender of the 3,500-man Union garrison on the grounds of Masonic College, in the heart of this sunny Missouri River town.

Southern losses were listed as 25 killed and 72 wounded. The Union forces listed 39 dead and 120 wounded, according to the commanding officer, Col. James A. Mulligan.

Price's men captured five big guns, 3,000 hand weapons, 750 horses and stores with a value estimated at \$100,000.

They also seized some \$800,000 in cash and gold that the Union troops had removed from the Lexington bank 10 days ago.

All of the Union troops were paroled at once, with the exception of the 31-year old Col. Mulligan.

He and his wife, who had been in Lexington during the battle, were seen leaving town for the South in Gen. Price's private carriage. Presumably, he was to be held for exchange.

FROM BOTH sides in the battle came accounts of harrowing attacks, courageous defense and, for Union troops, a crippling hunger and thirst.

Mulligan moved his men into the Masonic College, converting a nearby house into a headquarters and hospital, as soon as their arrival here.

His "Irish Brigade" and support units moved Aug. 30 from Jefferson City, Mo., with 40 rounds of ammunition per man and three days rations, with orders to march to Tipton, Mo.

There, they were to join the cavalry regiment commanded by Col. Thomas A. Marshall, with the two units proceeding to Lexington to capture it.

MULLIGAN'S troops searched for Marshall for ten days before finding them—already in Lexington. Word reached that Price with his huge force was approaching rapidly from Warrensburg, 34 miles away.

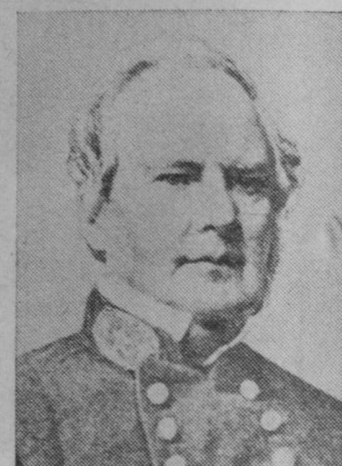
Union craftsmen set up a foundry within the college, dug up its grounds to provide a sod fort 12 feet high and 12 feet thick, and dug in to wait for Price.

The 18,000-man Southern wedge struck the town at 9 a.m. the morning of Sept. 18 and the siege was on.

Rebel riflemen captured the makeshift hospital. From perches on the roof and in windows, they rained a hail of lead on the Northern defenders.

By this time Mulligan's men were without water and with little food. Fighting resumed at dawn yesterday, with the Union's position worsening.

This morning, Mulligan polled his six officers on the possibility of surrender. Four voted to give in, and the capitulation was arranged.

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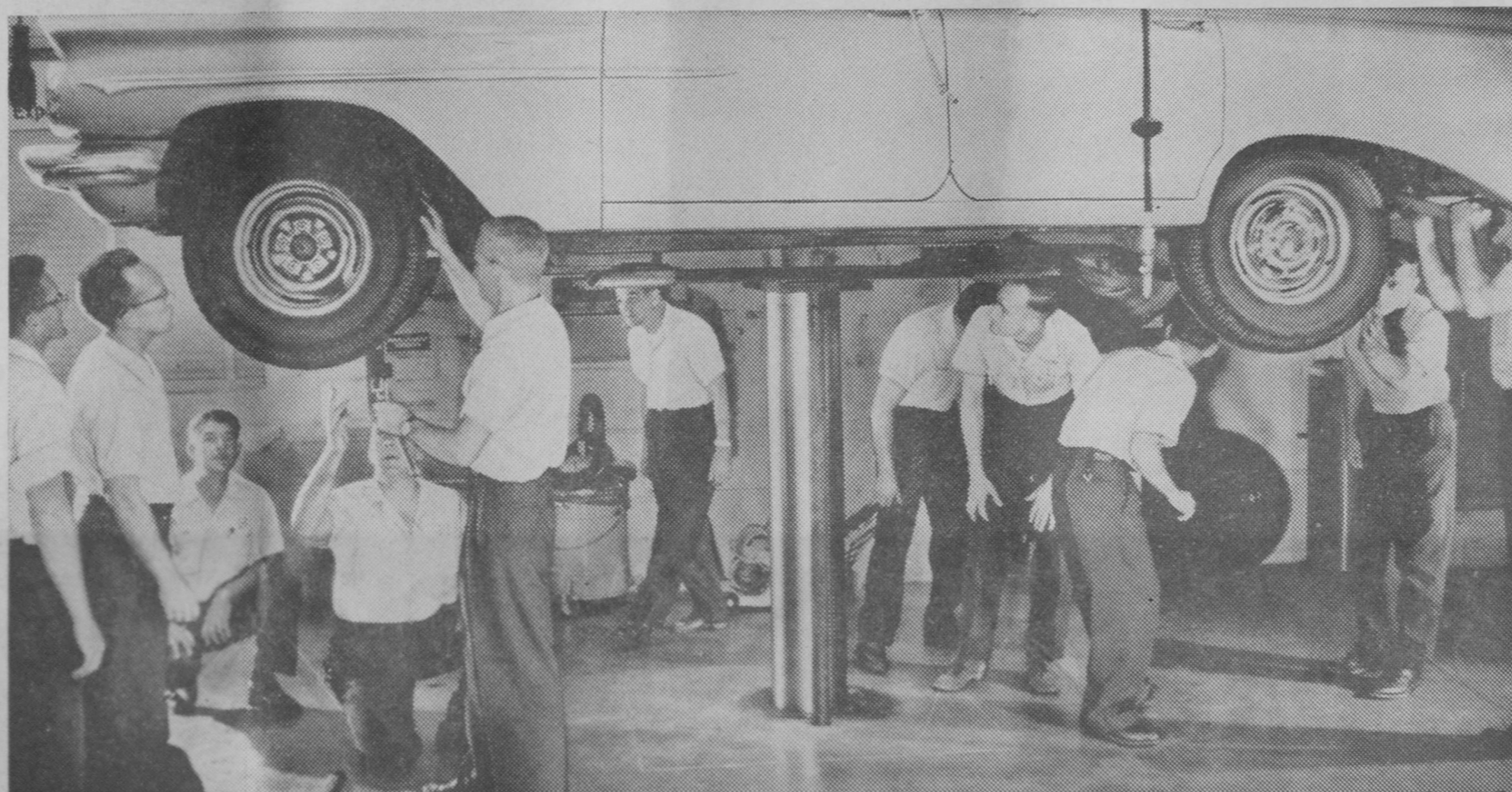

## HOW TO SPOT TROUBLE:

Shell instructor Billy Reynolds reveals 10 trouble signals he tells Shell dealers to watch for. You should know about them too. They may help you spot trouble before it starts.

MORE than 12,000 Shell dealers go to Shell's 123 training centers every year. Classes cover the gamut of station operation. But trouble-spotting gets special emphasis. Here are 10 trouble signals that Billy Reynolds, one of Shell's chief instructors, stresses.

If you notice any of them in your car, tell your Shell dealer. His advice may help you head off a big repair job.

**1. Mushy brakes.** When your car is standing still, push your brake pedal down with a firm, steady pressure. If the pedal feels soft and sinks all the way to the floor board, you've got trouble that should be fixed right away. Could be a leaking wheel cylinder. Or, more likely, a leaky master brake cylinder. A well-trained Shell dealer can track down brake troubles quickly.

**2. Wandering wheels.** If your front tires show more wear on one side of the tread than the other, your wheel alignment is probably at fault.

NOTE: an out-of-line wheel drags at an angle to the line of travel—can increase tire wear up to 50 per cent.

Be sure to discuss rigors of uneven tire wear with your Shell dealer.

**3. Jiggly front end.** Put your foot on

either bumper, and shove down hard. If your car bobs up and down for a long time, ask your Shell service man to check your shock absorbers.

**4. Decrepit tail pipe.** If your tail pipe is rusted through in spots, it should be replaced. Same thing for your muffler. A worn-out exhaust system can make your car roar like a wounded hippo. **10. Oil-streaked sidewalls.** It may take a bit of back bending, but it's worth the effort to check the side of your tires you seldom see—the side facing in. Look for signs of leaking fluid on the tire walls. Could be a leaking brake cylinder, or faulty oil seals on the rear wheels. Both can be serious.

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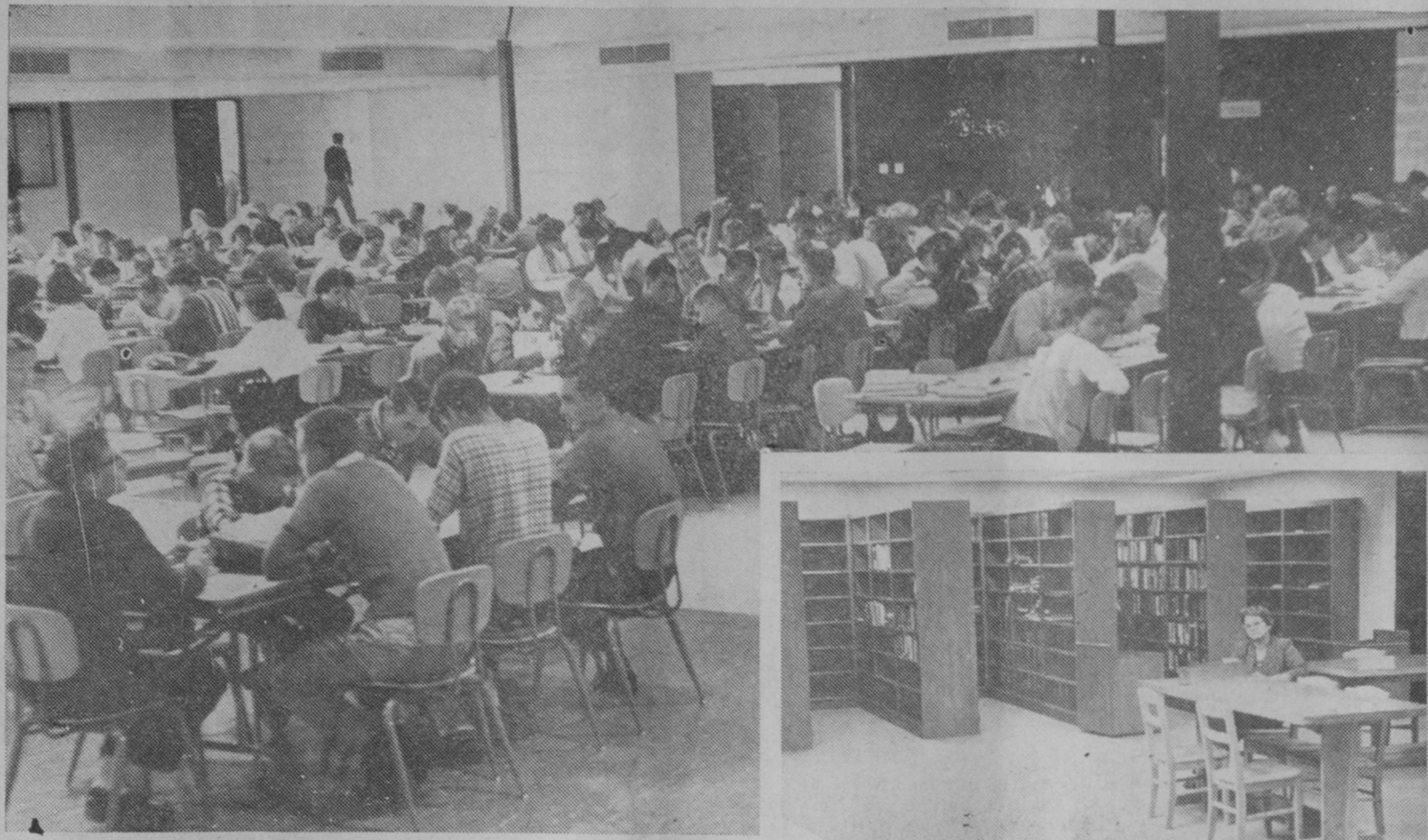

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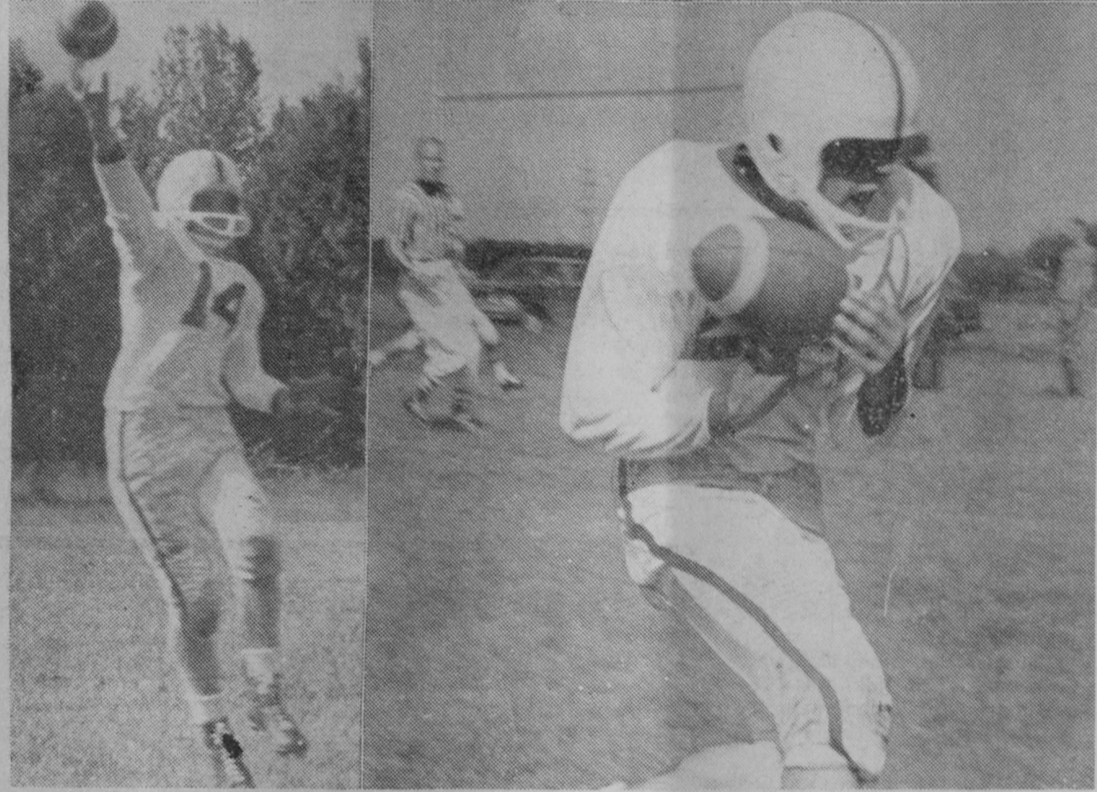

## Hale Eagles, TA JVs Battle To 6-6 Tie

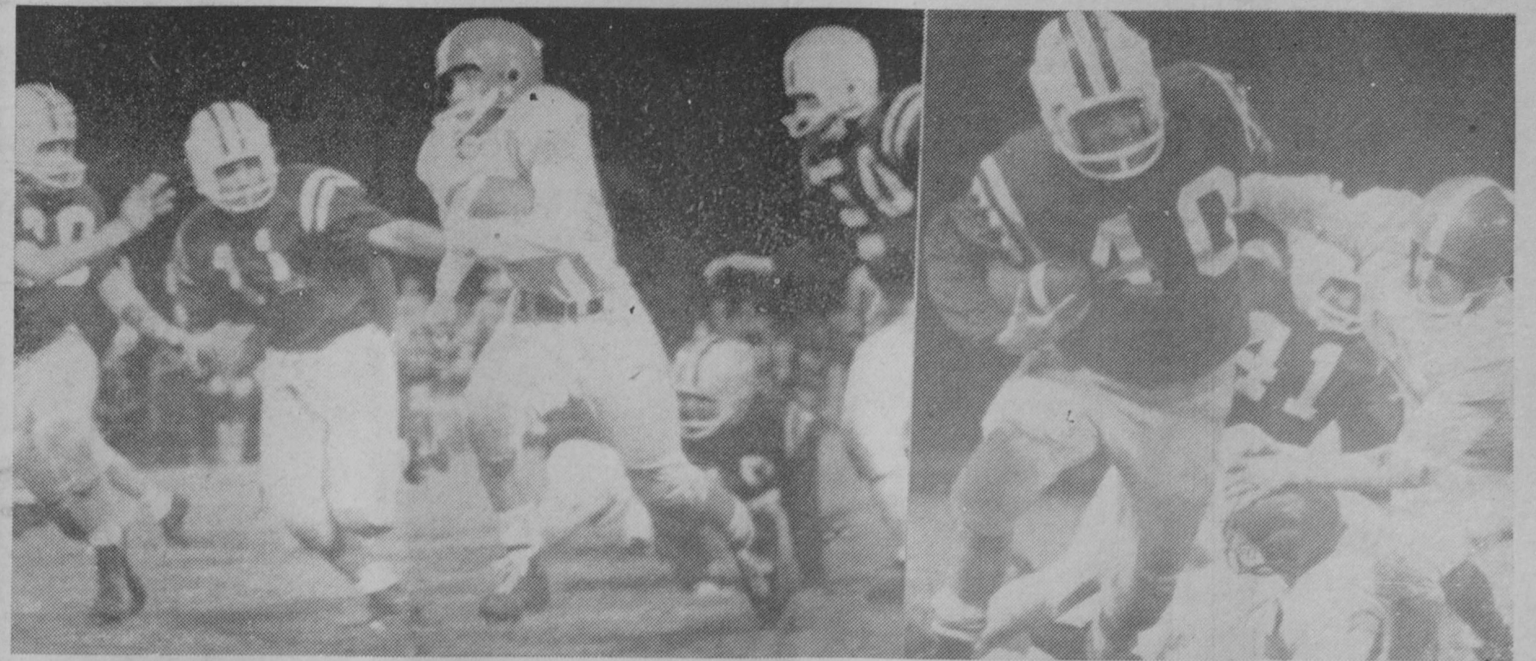
Hale Area Eagles and Tawas Junior Braves battled to 6-6 tie last Saturday night under the lights here.

For the first time in the history of football here, a Tawas Area team rolled to victory in the season's opening game.

Tawas Area's 25-7 win over Alcona Community School's Tigers Saturday was doubly sweet. The Braves had their day of revenge for a 26-6 shellacking the Tigers administered to them in last season's opening game.

Saturday afternoon's clash was a non-league meeting. The Braves play at Pinconning Friday night in their first conference game of 1961.

**NAVY HAS OPENED SCHOOL INCENTIVE PROGRAM TO VETS**  
Robert C. An Ordinance authorizing the establishment of a "Local Improvement and Capital Purchase Revolving Fund"; Providing for the use of monies in the fund and the reimbursement of monies used therefrom; and other matters relating to the creation of the fund and its use.  
**THE CITY OF TAWAS CITY ORDAINS:**  
Section 1. Definitions. For the purposes of this ordinance unless the context otherwise indicates:  
a. "Local Improvement" means any public improvement, the expense of which, in whole or in part, the City Council had determined shall be defrayed by special assessments upon the property specially benefited;  
b. "Capital Purchase" means the purchase of personal or real property for the joint use by the city and other units of government, which shall be used for the mutual benefit of the city and other units of government, the cost of which shall be repaid in accordance with contract existing between the city and other units of government;  
c. "Local Improvement and Capital Purchase Revolving Fund" means the fund established by this ordinance, together with such additions as made from time to time by the City Council.  
Section 2. A Local Improvement and Capital Purchase Revolving Fund is hereby established to provide funds to advance the cost, either in whole or in part, of any local improvement or capital purchase.  
Section 3. Funds for the Local Improvement and Capital Purchase Fund may be provided by any or all of the following means:  
a. Miscellaneous Revenues;  
b. Grants received from any source, the use of which is not limited by law, charter or ordinance;  
c. Funds raised by general taxation which are not otherwise pledged, encumbered or limited in use by law, charter or ordinance;  
d. Bonds;  
Section 4. The "Local Improvement and Capital Purchase Fund" established by this ordinance shall be a separate depository account of the city. The use of the fund shall be limited, except as herein-after provided, to the definitions contained in Section 1. a. and b. above. Monies advanced from the fund shall be repaid by collection of special assessment on property specially benefited as determined by the Board of Special Assessors and from payments received by the city from other units of government pursuant to contract and by appropriations made by the City Council to repay the fund for capital purchases financed by said fund.  
Section 5. The initial deposit for the fund established by the Ordinance consists of \$34,600.00 obtained by a Grant from the Federal Government in 1960 for the construction of the Tawas City Sewage Disposal Plant. It is expected the sewer revenues and assessed millage will pay the interest and bonded indebtedness on the Disposal Plant. However, in the event that such revenues and millages do not produce the funds necessary to pay the interest and retire the bond at the time said interest and bonds are due, the City Council is hereby authorized to use any part of the Federal Grant that it deems necessary for such purposes.  
Section 6. This Ordinance shall take effect upon publication in The Tawas Herald.

Electric Utilities Assure State of Ample Electricity

Michigan's electric utilities, individually and through cooperation with each other, assure the state of ample electric power now and in the future.

Executives of the state's two largest power companies, Detroit Edison and Consumers Power, commented on the local power situation in connection with a nationwide report issued last week.

"Michigan fits solidly into a national pattern of continuous planning and building for an always abundant electric power supply," said Alphonse H. Aymond Jr., chairman of the board for Consumers Power.

Detroit Edison president, Walker L. Cislser, emphasized that America's investor-owned electric power companies, in Michigan and throughout the nation, have demonstrated historically their ability to furnish all electricity needed—at all times and in all places. "Certainly this shows that vast expenditures on federal power programs are unnecessary," Cislser said.

The nationwide report which prompted comment by the two Michigan utility leaders was compiled by the Edison Electric Institute and released at a press conference at New York City. It detailed expansion and integration plans of the investor-owned power industry through the year 1970.

The report estimated that in 1970, expenditures for new construction will be at the rate of 6.4 billion dollars per year, with a total plant investment of 88 billion dollars as compared to 46 billion dollars in 1960. The present rate of investment expenditure, 3.3 billion dollars in 1960, is the highest for any industry in the United States, including communications, transportation and steel. It represents 10 percent of all construction expenditure for American business as a whole.

Both Aymond and Cislser emphasized the importance of a investor-owned power companies as economic stabilizers. They voiced confidence that their companies would continue to "deserve the reputation for good service which they enjoy as strong contributors to the industrial and economic well-being of Michigan."

The two companies with a total of 6,740,000 kilowatts of electric generating capability could provide five percent of all national power needs.
