

IOSCO-ARENAC COUNTY REGIONAL LIBRARY received delivery Tuesday on its new \$10,995 bookmobile. The custom-built body on an International truck chassis was manufactured by the Gerstenschlager Company of Wooster, Ohio. Interior dimensions of the new vehicle are 16 feet long, seven feet wide and seven feet high. It is capable of carrying 2,400 books. Features of the unit include oak shelving, automatic gas heat, a complete battery-operated electrical plant with charger, fluorescent lights. The floor has a vinyl covering. William Groff Sr., who is bookmobile driver, is shown in the picture at bottom. Mrs. Quinton Sproule and Mrs. Clarence McMullen are bookmobile librarians. The unit visits communities in the two counties which do not have libraries. Mr. Groff, who drove the unit here from Ohio, said that the bookmobile averages about 1,200 miles a month in its travels. It replaces one which was purchased 10 years ago.—Tawas Herald Photo.

Initial plans for observing East Tawas' centennial in 1962 are to be made at a meeting Wednesday night at the community building. Mayor C. V. Miller said that it was to be a general meeting to determine who is interested in assisting with the program and to establish the length of time for the observance.

Also to be discussed is the possibility of hiring a professional promoter to stage the program. Wallace Lafferty of Rogers Production Company is to attend the meeting.

Miss Edna Otis was recently appointed by the mayor to act as

general chairman of the centennial. Lyle Mooney will represent the businessmen. Miller said he hoped that all local organizations would cooperate in the centennial observance by having representatives at the meeting. "This is an area project and we want everyone to have a part in it," he said.

The mayor indicated that tentative dates for the observance may be set Wednesday night.

R. J. Goldie, Retired Auto Official, Dies

Rowland J. Goldie, 78, who entered the automotive field in 1907 and was a retired vice president of Timken-Detroit Axle Company, died Monday at Henry Ford Hospital, Detroit.

Goldie, since his retirement, had lived at Indian Lake. He worked with the Oakland Motor Car Company, the Chalmers Motor Company, the Columbia Axle Company, the Ruggles Motor Truck Company and the Nice Ball Bearing Company before joining Timken-Detroit.

He was a director of the Rockwell Standard Corporation at his death.

Surviving are his wife, Lula; a daughter, Mrs. Homer Mitchell, Yale, and two grandchildren.

Services will be held at 3:00 p. m. Thursday in the Jacques Funeral Home, Tawas City. Burial will be at Tawas City Cemetery.

Use Contract Under Study; Talk Thursday

A new use contract between the United States Forest Service and Tawas Chamber of Commerce for operation of the Silver Valley Winter Sports Park in Huron National Forest is to be discussed at a meeting Thursday night.

At a meeting of the Silver Valley Winter Sports Committee Monday night, proposed changes in the contract were presented to members by Chairman L. G. (Ladd) McKay.

The chairman had appointed a three-man committee to study the contract as presented recently by the forestry service and reported back to the general membership. Included on the committee were James Campbell, John Pinter and O. E. Ostrander.

McKay said Monday night that the committee had found 97 percent of the contract to "their liking." He said that most of the clauses were already being performed by the winter sports committee.

One change which the committee hopes to include in the contract is that it covers a period from April 1 through November 30, instead of through October 31.

Under terms of the contract, the permittee would be required to pay an annual charge of \$1 per acre for 128 acres. The permittee would also pay one percent of the total cost of maintenance and 1 1/2 percent of the total revenue from the park.

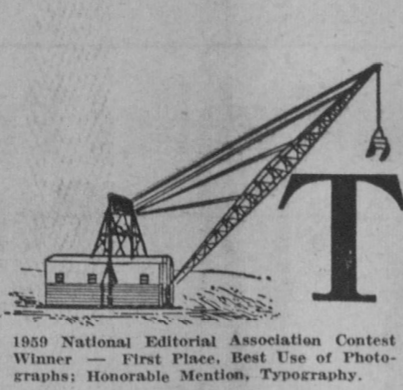
The winter sports committee believes that the latter charges can be canceled out by its maintenance work on the park. The \$1 (See CONTRACT, page 10.)

Roadmen Pinpoint Parking Ban on US-23 in Tawas City

Tawas City is faced with an acute parking problem was strongly emphasized by state highway department representatives at a meeting held last night at Tawas Area High School.

The meeting was called for the purpose of giving local officials and interested citizens a complete picture of existing and future traffic conditions and their relationship to parking in Tawas City.

Attending were several state highway department district traffic engineers, who were attending a three-day conference at Lincoln.

Traffic Engineer William Marvin told an assembly of about 125 businessmen and civic leaders that anticipated removal of parking through Tawas City would be the advent of opening new highways which connect with US-23.

At present, US-23 has four lanes through Tawas City. Parking is presently allowed in the outer lanes from Mathews to Whittemore Streets and in the north lane east of Whittemore Street.

In 1963-64, US-23 is to be widened and re-surfaced through the community.

Marvin said that new and wider highways would induce more people to come into an area. He emphasized that the only time the state removes parking is when existing facilities can no longer carry traffic.

The highway department representative gave an illustrated talk on highways and streets and how removal of parking removes congestion.

Marvin stated that, according to recent surveys, traffic through Tawas City has reached 82 percent of the saturation point for vehicular traffic, or 620 cars traveling in either direction every hour. When vehicular traffic reaches that density, parking in the outer lanes of US-23 would be removed.

Marvin said that prohibition of parking here may come in two years or it may come in five.

"Many things can be done to help traffic problems before prohibition of parking gets here," he stated.

Marvin said the meeting was called in advance of any move by the state so that the city and those persons interested in parking may make arrangements for additional parking. He indicated that the highway department's engineering staff at Lansing could possibly help with the problem.

He said that removal of parking in a community was one of the

most difficult transitions to make, for both the highway department and community.

The meeting was sponsored by the Tawas Kiwanis Club. Donald Watson was chairman.

Visiting Firemen Test City's \$17,000 Truck

Tawas City received delivery on its new \$17,000 fire truck Saturday afternoon. Accompanying the new equipment were company representatives and firemen from Bay City, who conducted underwriters' tests at the city park dock.

The new 500-gallon-per-minute pumper was ordered by the city council in May of this year. The truck carries 600 gallons of water in its tank. Six lines can be operated through the pump at one time, including two 2 1/2-inch hoses, two one-inch lines and two high pressure hoses.

The pump produces up to 800 pounds of pressure for fog use. In addition to city officials and members of the volunteer fire department, the new equipment was inspected by businessmen and residents of the community.

Tawas City recently entered into a new contract to provide fire protection to Tawas and Alabaster Townships. The area

covered contains approximately 55 square miles.

The city had been under contract with Tawas Township to furnish fire protection since 1949. That year, the township purchased a new fire truck and it was maintained and operated by the city fire department. Alabaster Township then contracted with Tawas to provide protection.

Last spring, a new contract was prepared in which the three local governmental units pay a proportionate share of the cost of maintaining the fire department. The city purchased the new truck and also the township fire truck.

These two units, along with the city's 1939 truck which has been converted into a tanker, is stored at the fire hall with the new equipment.

In order to allow additional room for the new truck, a partition was removed from the fire hall.

In addition to the new truck, the city also received its annual delivery of new hose.

Watson was chairman. Seated throughout the audience were 38 highway department employees. Also taking part was Gerald J. McCarthy, chief of design.

No Definite Plans Yet for US-23

According to a representative of a state agency, no definite plans have been prepared or a route chosen as yet for widening US-23 under the recent 20-year needs study announced by the state highway department.

When it was noted that the proposed route of the new highway would cut through the new Iosco County Airport northeast of East Tawas, Donald Watson, who is chairman of Tawas Chamber of Commerce's airport committee, communicated with the Michigan Department of Aeronautics.

In reply, William E. Hamlen, writing for L. C. Andrews, assistant director of engineering, said: "We have checked with the Michigan State Highway Department and in their 20-year study of needs they determined that a four-lane US-23 would be necessary at some future date.

"No route has been chosen or survey made for a location, so any pictures or drawings which have been released by anyone were not intended to give any specific location for a highway.

"It was merely issued to better illustrate the fact that the present right-of-way of US-23 might not be adaptable for widening."

'Local Roads are a Local Problem'

"John Q. Public feels that he can improve our county local roads, but seldom does. In 1959, Michigan's county road commissions spent in excess of 18.6 million dollars to maintain 62,361 miles of local roads."

So stated W. D. (Mike) Nunn of East Tawas, president of the County Road Association of Michigan, at a recent convention of the association.

Nunn, a member of the Iosco Road Commission, said that one of the chief problems today is that local roads are just what the name implies—a local problem. He said it was a cold hard fact to be reiterated again and again in state laws.

"It is not for me or for us (road commissioners) as individuals to either justify or refute these laws by which we are governed," said Nunn. "The fact is that public participation in local roads has

Board Happy---County's Park a Money-Maker

A season-end report on activities at the county-operated Old Orchard Park west of Oscoda indicates that it is a money-maker for Iosco.

Frank Wilkuski, chairman of the conservation committee, reported to the Iosco County Board of Supervisors last week that total receipts to date during 1961 had been \$8,823.60. After expenses, the park netted the county \$4,838.50.

Wilkuski said that the park was a profitable operation and its facilities should be expanded. He said that anticipated revenue at the end of the year is expected to reach \$10,000.

As an example of its use and importance to the area, some 1,500 persons used the park over the July 4 holiday.

Wilkuski said that an additional trailer camp should be constructed soon. He said that a 20-unit addition could be made without too much expense.

The conservation committee chairman said that a master plan was being set up for the park. He said that several roads needed grading and recommended installation of flood lights near the store. A children's playground was added this year.

The report stated that Consumers Power Company officials had inspected the park several times this year and were amazed at the improvements and its good arrangement. The park was developed by the power company and later leased to the county.

The board went on record as commending the work of Howard Becker for his management of the park.

In other business conducted Wednesday, the board approved expenses of Richard Nelson to attend the probation officers conference to be held at Grand Rapids.

The board authorized Clerk George Prescott to send a check of \$500 to the educational division of the state association of supervisors representing dues for this year. This organization and the Michigan Institute of Local Government recently merged.

Huron Development Company's low bid of \$6,840 for construction of a building at the new county airport was accepted by the board. Henry Oates, chairman of the

aeronautics committee, reported that the runway had been seeded with grass. It was recently damaged by automobiles.

Clarence Everett recommended that the board get in touch with its bonding attorneys in order to make plans for financing a proposed medical care facility for the county. The board authorized setting up an appointment with Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone of Detroit.

L. G. (Ladd) McKay and O. E. Ostrander addressed the board and requested an additional appropriation this year to Silver Valley. The winter sports area presently receives \$300 from the county. The request was referred to the finance committee.

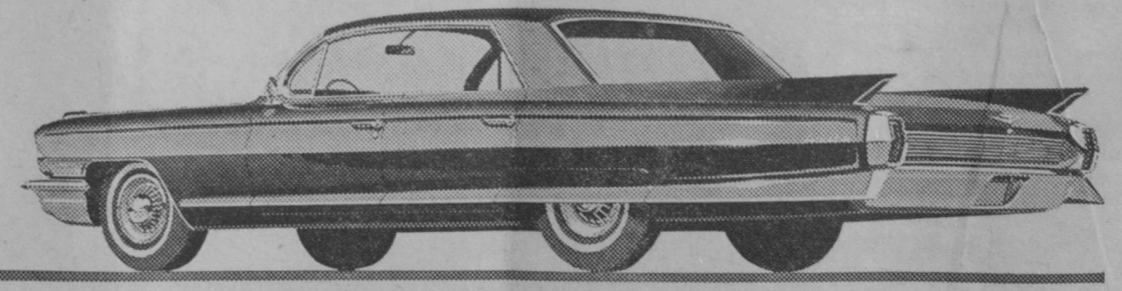

when we were finished photographing, I gave this toy to my nephew. He's six years old. And he adored it. I told him Blake's poem and he listened, said okay, but that was for a tiger—he wanted one for a lion. And I said okay, I'd write him a lion poem. So I went home and wrote the following:

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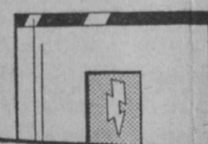

CREEKS COOL TO COOPER

South's Wooing of Indians A Bitter Failure So Far

RICHMOND, Va.—Oct. 1—Col. Douglas H. Cooper, chief of Indian operations for the Confederate government, has drawn a blank so far in his romance with the powerful Creek tribe.

At least two-thirds of the tribe members—including the majority of elders and leaders—have spurned the South's efforts to win their support in the fight against the North.

The majority of Creeks, who inhabit vast tracts of land in Alabama, Georgia and Northern Florida, appeared not to have been swayed by Cooper's dramatic wooing through the recent appointment of two Creeks to Southern Army commissions.

Instead, they are sticking with their pro-North former chief, Hopoethleyohola, a long-time enemy of the two new Indian officers, D. N. Mc Intosh and his brother Chitty.

THE Mc INTOSHES are in nominal command of the Creeks but the loyalty of most tribesmen to Hopoethleyohola is unshakable.

The elder chief ordered the killing of the Mc Intosh's father, William, in Georgia in 1825, after a dispute over the senior Mc Intosh's agreement to the Indian Springs treaty.

He took over upon the convenient death of Mc Intosh and led the Creeks until ousted by the revengeful sons of the slain chief.

The general opinion is that Hopoethleyohola, in his refusal to join with the pro-Mc Intosh forces, is motivated not by Northern or Southern sentiments, but by a simple desire to stay alive.

Sources close to both sides believe the aging chief is most re-

luctant to join the Mc Intoshes, who have hated him ardently for 36 years, in any association, especially one involving weapons.

HOWEVER, all is not darkness for Cooper's Indian recruiters, according to word in from Kansas. Chief John Ross of the Cherokees, most powerful and most civilized of the tribes being enlisted by the South, met a few days ago with Gen. Albert Pike to sign a treaty pledging support to the Confederates.

Under terms of this agreement, the Cherokees would be placed under arms but would be used only in defense of their Indian territory lands.

Ross's stand was a switch. Last June he refused to sign any treaty, insisting on remaining neutral.

Aides of Gen. Pike indicated that the decisive Southern victory Aug. 10 at Wilson's Creek, Mo., helped Ross change his mind.

Only three other tribes—Choctaw, Chickasaw and Seminole—have played any role in the current hostilities. Some members of the five tribes are slave-owners, but in virtually all cases the slaves live as equals to their masters, and the turbulent slavery issue appears not to have disturbed the red man.

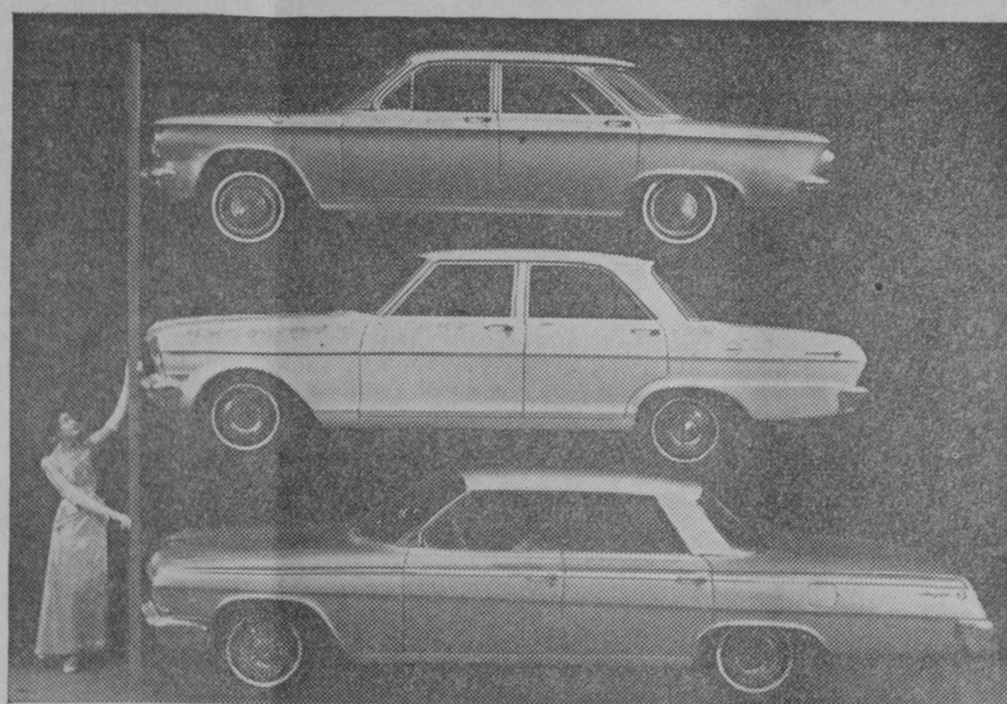

62-Year-Old Men May Now Apply for Social Security

The age at which men can apply for social security payments has been changed to 62, according to Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City Social Security office.

Until now, men had to be at least 65 before they could make application for payment unless they were disabled. For several years, women have been able to claim their social security payments at a reduced amount when they were 62. Men now have the same opportunity. Mr. Ellifritz stated that a man's payment at 62 would be reduced because he would be getting paid three years earlier. By reducing the amount of payments at age 62, he will get about the same total payments as he would by waiting until 65. A claim must be made before any payments can begin.

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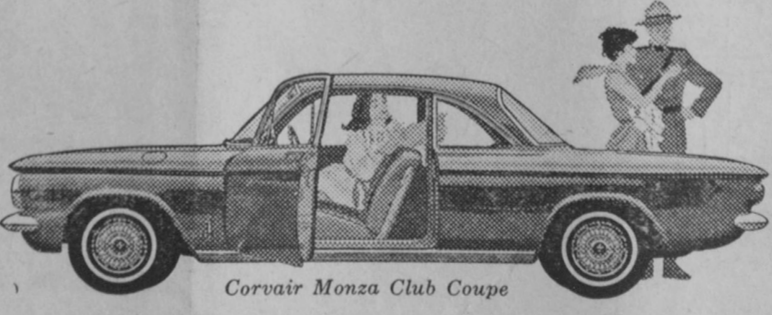

STATE POLICE FILM FEATURES FIREMEN'S AUXILIARY MEET

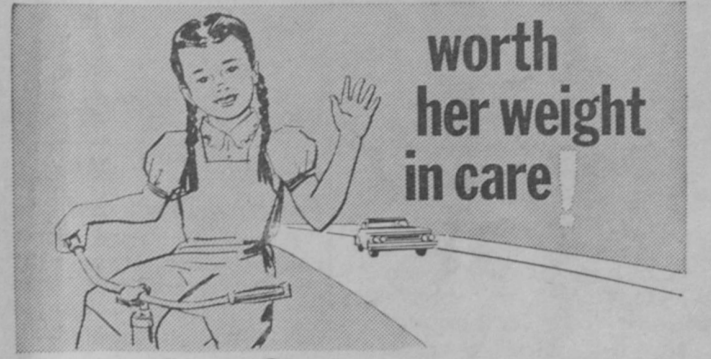

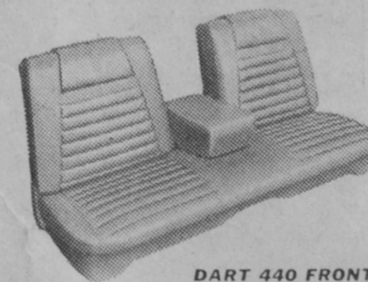

Braves Defeat Spartans 13-0

Striking for two touchdowns in the first half Friday night, the Tawas Area Braves went on to win their second game of the season when they defeated the Pinconning Spartans, 13-0.

In spite of the close score, the Braves dominated the game throughout. Racking up a total of 275 yards offensively, the Braves' defense effectively bottled Halfback Al Charboneau, Spartan standout, and Piny was able to gain only 122 yards.

Although Tawas fans have little reason for getting overly optimistic this early in the season, for the Braves are young and have a tough schedule facing them, things are apparently looking up in football here.

Coach Herb Escott's charges have proven to themselves that they can overcome costly mistakes and still score—and they are hitting hard.

One of the key plays of the night for Tawas proved to be an incomplete pass in the first quarter. The first time the Braves got their hands on the ball, End Lewis Werth caught End Mike Sass all alone behind the Spartan defense. Werth's pass sailed out of reach, but Pinconning was forced to play an "honest" defense because of this aerial threat. Before the night was over, Werth connected in two key plays.

Tawas scored the next time it gained control of the ball. With a first down on Pinconning's 33-yard stripe, after a Tawas player had partially blocked a punt, the Braves scored in spite of three costly 15-yard penalties marked off against them.

On the first play, Fullback Ed Coller bulldozed his way through the center of Piny's line for 10 yards. The play was nullified, however, by an offensive holding penalty called against the Braves. After a pass attempt by Quarter-

back Jim Mick went incomplete, Coller picked up three yards, but another 15-yard penalty for holding put Tawas on the 50-yard line with second down and 40 to go for a first down.

Another key play of the touchdown series came next when Werth passed to Halfback Ernie Lixey in the left flat which was good for 20 yards. Mick then zeroed in on Lixey again in the left flat for another 12 yards. With fourth down and five to go for a first down, Coller smashed up the middle for the first down.

On the next play, Lixey ran for 10 yards, but another offensive holding penalty of 15 yards put Tawas back on the 25-yard stripe and the Braves had to start all over again.

On the first play, Mick recovered his own fumble and lost three yards. Werth again came to the rescue by hitting Sass on the seven-yard stripe with an 18-yard pass.

Mick then sent his hard-charging fullback, Coller, through the center of Pinconning's line. The Braves opened a big hole in the Spartan defense and Coller went through untouched for a six-pointer. The try for PAT was blocked and Tawas held a 6-0 lead at the end of the first period.

After Tawas kicked off, Pinconning could get nowhere as the Braves' defense stopped Charboneau, who lost one yard in one carry and was dropped for a loss of 12 when he attempted to pass. On fourth down, Tawas blocked another punt and the Braves gained control of the ball on the Piny 18. On the first play, Mick was tripped up in the backfield for a loss of six yards.

Fullback Coller then went to work on the middle of the Spartan line. Cracking through for 20 yards on the second play from scrimmage, Coller again powered his way through the same hole

for four yards and another TD. The night's scoring was concluded when Coller's boot for PAT sailed between the posts.

Although the Braves did not score again, the real game clincher came after halftime. The Braves received the kick-off and then proceeded to control the ball during the entire third quarter.

During the third period, Coller, Halfbacks Jim Herriman and Lixey ground out yardage from the Braves 18-yard line to Piny's eight in 25 plays. Quarterback Mick mixed his plays well during the series, but when he attempted one pass while deep in Piny territory, he was thrown for a loss and the drive never regained its momentum.

The deepest penetration into Tawas territory by the Spartans saw them with the ball on the 18-yard stripe in the last minute of the third quarter. The fourth quarter saw the Spartans shake Charboneau loose and he picked up most of Pinconning's yardage in the late stages of the game. The final whistle saw Tawas in possession of the ball on the Spartan 12.

Leading ground gainer of the night was Coller, who averaged six yards in 11 carries for 67 yards. His longest carries were 20 and 15 yards.

Herriman picked up 58 yards and averaged 4.6 yards in 13 carries. He had the longest breakaway with a 22-yard run. Lixey, in 11 carries, picked up 43 yards and had an average of 3.9 yards. Included were a 17 and 10-yard carry. Helmer picked up 13 yards in four carries.

Tawas played without the services of senior halfback, Dick Zaharias, who dislocated his shoulder during practice last week. He will be out of action for at least three games.

Barring further injuries, which would hurt Tawas' chances because of its lack of depth, the Braves will be in good condition when they meet West Branch here Friday night. The Orioles, a team which has lost to Tawas only once in the history of football here, has been defeated twice thus far this season.

Because of the traditional rivalry between these two schools, however, current records will have little meaning as both schools can be expected to be "up" for the game.

This will be the sixth annual homecoming game and it also marks Tawas Area's first home game of the season. The high school band, under the direction of Edward Rima, will perform during halftime.

(Continued from page 1.) per acre payment to the government is a fixed charge and cannot be canceled through cost of maintenance.

Under the contract's fire clause, should any of the buildings be destroyed by fire, the permittee would be required to replace the structures. Because of the danger of forest fires in late fall, over which it has no control, the committee hopes to change the contract to a four-month period instead of five.

The committee hopes that if the forestry service builds any new buildings in the area under its "Operation Recreation" program, it will locate them in the winter sports park. Improvements are presently being made to the picnic grounds. A new well was drilled in the winter sports park, along with a new roof on the toboggan area chalet.

A work detail is to be held October 8 at the park. Sand is to be removed from toboggan slides, grass cut on the skating rink and ski slopes and a new well is to be located near the skating rink.

Anyone who works on the detail is eligible to receive credit of \$1 per hour toward the purchase of annual ski tow tickets.

(Continued from page 1.) created a thing so complex, so immense, that it usually defies analysis, let alone correction.

"The present citizen approach, to put it mildly, is a paradox," said Nunn. "It is such a paradox that most taxpayers just complain and leave whatever improvements of local roads to whom they term as experts."

Nunn cited the fact that nearly 29 million dollars was spent by county road commissions on local roads in 1959. This amount built 1,014 miles of local roads and 12 structures, in addition to maintaining the entire local road system.

During 1960, township boards raised slightly in excess of 7.3 million dollars for local use. Of the 1,161 townships in Michigan, 980 townships participated in raising local funds for highway work.

"The average amount raised by those participating amounted to about \$7,500 per township. Each county should raise considerably more per year for local roads," he stated.

The 23,200 miles of county primary roads connect the principal centers of traffic interest in the county with one another and with the state trunklines. Although they comprise only one quarter of the total county road mileage, they carry 60 percent of the traffic.

He said that within the next 20 years, local roads will be in dire need of new construction. "Possibly the constitutional convention will weigh the problem of local roads and come up with an answer for a different means of financing local roads systems."

Nunn said the public should realize that the road commission cannot build all local roads up to trunkline standards and the law clearly limits the amount of highway funds that can be spent on local roads.

Nunn said that it was the job of road commissioners to sell and resell taxpayers and supervisors with the fact that financing local roads is a local problem.
