## Swain Wins Speedway Trophy Race Saturday

Donald Swain, veteran stock car driver of National City, drove his "No. 79" to victory in the 61-lap feature race at Saturday night's

season finale at the Whittemore Speedway.

With a field of 11 cars entered in the trophy race, Swain took over the lead on the west turn of the 14th lap and was never headed.

A crowd of nearly 1,000 persons saw the 35-year-old truck driver win his third season-end trophy race in succession at the Whittemore track.

His nearest challenger was Harry Flanagan of Whittemore, who was in second place nearly a full lap behind.

A strong bid for top racing honors was made by Jake Zettle of West Branch but he lost a wheel about mid-way in the race and fell several laps behind after a pit stop.

Rick Zettle of West Branch probably the winningest driver this year at Whittemore, was forced to scratch his car in the feature race because of mechanical difficulties.

Behind Flanagan in third place was Bob Kingen, West Branch; Ray Laney, Standish, fourth place, and Charles Engle, Tawas City, fifth place.

Kingen won a heat race and annexed the Australian pursuit. Other heat winners during the night were Norm Dorey, Whittemore, and Jake Zettle.

## Con-Con Vote Next Tuesday

Michigan will soon elect its delegates to the constitutional convention, first such gathering since 1908 when the state's present constitution was written.

A special election will be held for this purpose Tuesday, September 12, and many observers predict continued apathy by voters toward this important ballot. Most believe, however, that the turnout will be larger than the recent primary which selected con-con candidates.

In this area, voters will name one delegate to represent the Alpena Representative District and another for the 28th Senatorial District.

Two Republicans and two Democrats vie for the two seats to represent this section of Northeastern Michigan.

Herman Dehnke of Harrisville, Republican, will be opposed by John J. Mack of Alpena, Democrat, for the Alpena Representative District seat.

Two Gladwin residents will oppose each other for the senatorial district slot. Lewis T. Hubbs, Republican, will meet Hubert C. Hugh Evans, Democrat.

Dehnke, one-time school teacher and former prosecuting attorney of Alcona County, had a long and distinguished career on the circuit court benches of Iosco, Alcona and Oscoda Counties. He retired from the judgeship in 1959.

Mack is an Alpena attorney while Hubbs and Evans are both Gladwin businessmen.

Polls for the election will be open to voters during the regular hours from 7:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m.

## Chamber's Annual Campaign Starts

Annual membership drive of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce is scheduled to start Thursday morning, September 7, with a kick-off breakfast at Kohlmann's Restaurant, East Tawas.

Plans for the drive were discussed at a special meeting of the board of directors last Wednesday night. All directors and members are urged to attend the kick-off which starts at 7 o'clock.

The board reminded potential members that dues must be paid on or before December 31 in order to obtain any advertising for the next year.

A financial report revealed that \$3,218.50 had been paid by 92 members thus far.

In other business Wednesday night, a financial report of the recent arts and craft exhibit revealed that 47 entries had paid fees of \$92. Expenses amounted to \$39.24, leaving a balance of \$52.76 for the general fund of the chamber to be on reserve for next year's exhibit.

Mrs. Herbert Hertzler, who had charge of arrangements, was commended by the board of directors for her splendid work on this project.

The chamber has invited the Northern Michigan Road Commissioner Association to hold its next convention here in 1962.

The chamber office has received many inquiries concerning Silver Valley during the past month. Office Secretary Lucy Toka reports that the East Detroit Lutheran Caravan is again looking forward toward its annual visit next January. Another group

states that it plans to bring from 50 to 100 skiers here this year. "Many others have stopped at the office to obtain facts concerning the area and Silver Valley in order to plan winter vacations," states Miss Toka.

## Highway Men to Explain Area US-23 Changes to Public

An explanation of proposed changes on US-23 will be outlined by representatives of the Michigan Highway Department at a meeting September 26, 8:00 p. m., to be held at Tawas Area High School.


Sponsored by the Tawas Kiwanis Club, all residents of the area are invited to attend.

Donald Watson, who heads the Kiwanis Club's committee for the meeting, urges everyone to write questions pertaining to US-23 which will be asked at the meeting.

Attending will be four engineers from the department along with state officials.

Recently, the state announced a drastic change in the route and appearance of US-23 through Arenac, Iosco, Alcona and Alpena Counties.

US-23 is to become a divided-limited access highway sometime during the next 20 years, according to a recent needs study conducted by the state.



## Farmers and Merchants Bank Plans New Building at Hale

Farmers and Merchants State Bank at Hale has requested proposals this week from contractors on a proposed new bank building to be erected on a new site at North Washington Street, Hale.

The bank has branches at Whittemore and Rose City. The new building will house its main office facilities.

Bank Architect S. R. Bragg of the Ann Arbor architectural firm of S. R. Bragg and Associates states that construction will commence in October with completion early in 1962.

The site, a large corner lot of 177 feet by 268 feet, will allow the building to be set back with a spacious lawn area in front and a

large parking lot in the rear. Access to the parking lot will be by both a driveway off Washington Street and another entrance off the side street.

Drive to the parking area has been arranged to serve a future drive-in window at the building. Two entrances will allow customers to enter either from Washington Street or the parking lot.

Entering the main entrance, one will pass through a glass vestibule and enter the public lobby which will have a cathedral-type ceiling. Redwood beams will be exposed and the ceiling will be unique in that its structural material provides not only a finished surface with acoustical and insulating qualities, but also serves as a structural roof.

The outside or front wall will be all glass with one side wall of light red brick and the other of walnut paneling. The far side of the room will have the tellers' cages with a mural above.

Bank counters and other furnishings of contemporary design will be well set off by light colored travertine terrazzo floor. The executive office will also be on the front with two glass walls. Its location allows the officer to have visual observation of the work areas, both entrances and the vault door, as well as being close to the public lobby.

The money vault is at the other end of the lobby and will accommodate money storage chests and

safe deposit boxes. The intent is to keep the vault door open while a decorative grille will prevent unauthorized entry during working hours.

Adjoining the vault are coupon booths for the use of the bank's safe deposit customers.

Ample office space is provided for other officers and the bookkeeping department adjoining the tellers' cages. Off the bookkeeping department, a board of directors room is planned which will serve as a conference room or, when needed, it will accommodate the overflow of the bank's bookkeeping department.

Lounge and rest rooms will provide facilities for lunches, coffee breaks and employee comfort. Air-conditioning equipment is located in a small basement room along with other utilities.

Design of the one story building with sloping roof was evolved by Architect Bragg, working closely with bank officers. A northern style architecture was requested which would reflect the characteristics of the north country.

The exterior will present a striking effect with the white glistening sloping roof, formed of white marble chips on composition roofing; the turquoise color trim at the roof edges, together with the exposed redwood beams and the light red, Norman size brick walls.

White porcelain aluminum lettering on the building will be over the night depository which will be easily visible from the street. The ground planting of low evergreens around the building will make a smooth transition to the spacious lawn.

Large glass windows on the street side will not only give proper lighting within the building but will help illuminate the wall mural

over the tellers' windows. The mural will be the focal point within the building as well as from the exterior. This feature evolved when the bank officers expressed the desire to pictorialize vacation land aspects of this area.

Hunting and fishing scenes on bank checks suggested the theme for this picture which will be 30 feet wide by six feet high. It will be painted in color by a well-known artist. Floodlighting from a light trough below will allow this picture to be seen easily both day and night.

J. Morley Stevenson, vice president and cashier of the bank, said that plans for the new building had been approved by the state banking commission.

## Residents Warned of Begus Painters

Area residents were warned this week that fraudulent roof painters were operating in Michigan.

According to Consumers Protection Bulletin III prepared by attorney general's office, two men are sought at Ionia under a John Doe warrant for obtaining money under false pretenses.

Prosecuting Attorney William McCready of Iosco County said that the men seek out elderly householders and charge upwards of \$200 for spraying worthless material on roofs.

The men were described as "gypsies" and are traveling around the state by family motor caravan.

Anyone who has information concerning such a fraudulent operation in this area should notify local law enforcement agencies immediately.

## Coach Hopes for Fewer Mistakes

With a year or more of varsity seasoning under the belts of 13 of his charges, Coach Herbert Escott is counting on his Tawas Area Braves to make fewer mistakes this season.

Escott hopes that many of the costly clipping and off-sides penalties called against his Braves last year, which were probably caused by inexperience, will be a thing of the past.

Right now, with 10 days to go before the opening kick-off against Alcona Community School, Escott figures his Braves are about a week ahead of last year's team at this time.

The head coach hastens to point out the Tawas fans should not get their hopes high for a big winner, however.

"If we win four or five games out of the nine on our schedule this season, we will be very happy," was his comment. "Much depends on the outcome of our opening game."

The Braves won only two games last year. After a disastrous start against Alcona, losing by 26 points, most of the senior members of the Braves were grounded. Escott and Assistant Coach Steven Sventko then began concentrating on the sophomores and junior members of the squad in a rebuilding job.

The latter players, numbering six, are the "seasoned seniors" of this year's unit and Escott said this week that he was not kidding anyone when he admits that the remainder of his team is still about a year away.

"If attitude, spirit and willingness to work have anything to do with what is to come at Tawas Area, we have it this year," said Escott. "Our biggest job, however, is drilling the fundamentals of football into these boys. Without this, we will still make the same mistakes as last year."

The Braves seem to be going into the season with the same spirit which saw them give Gladwin such a scare at the tail-end of the season last year.

One of the big cogs for Tawas in that game, Bud St. James, who was an all-state tackle selection in one Detroit newspaper poll, is missing through graduation.

In spite of its record last year, the Braves had a good defensive team. Only two teams were able to score more than one touchdown against Tawas. Escott is still looking for two defensive backs to replace Jim Campbell, who graduated, and Herm Rollin, who will not be playing this year due to a shoulder injury this summer.

As it looks now during preseason practice, if it is possible to assess a team this early, Tawas will have a well-balanced line and fairly good power in its backfield. Speed in the latter is lacking, however.

Among the six senior lettermen returning are Halfback Dick Zaharias, End Lewis Werth, Tackle Neil Mochty, Center Charles Miller, End Mike Sass and Quarterback Don Humphrey.

Junior letter winners returning are Quarterback Jim Mick, Tackle (See BRAVES, page 7.)

Will Speak on 'Frontiers of Faith' At Baptist Church



The Rev. Lena A. Keans, retired American Baptist missionary to India, will speak September 10, 3:00 p. m., at the First Baptist Church, Tawas City, on the general theme "Frontiers of Faith."

Miss Keans returned to the United States in June 1959, to retire after almost 40 years' service as a missionary in India. She was appointed in 1920 by the Woman's American Baptist Foreign Mission Society and served since 1922 in Narasapurpet, in the Guntur District of the South India mission field. American Baptist missionaries serve in three fields in India: Assam, Bengal-Orissa and South India.

Miss Keans was principal at the Hird Memorial High School in Narasapurpet. In addition to her administrative duties at the school, she has been active in evangelistic work among women. During part of her final term of service, Miss Keans also supervised the work of the mission in the Narasapurpet area.

Canadian born, Miss Keans studied at Provincial Normal College in Nova Scotia and Gordon College in Boston, Massachusetts. She holds N. S. and B. A. degrees from Acadia University in Canada and an M. A. degree from the Hartford Seminary, Hartford, Connecticut, and also has done graduate work at Yale Divinity School. In 1945, after 25 years of mission service, Miss Keans was ordained by her home church, the Park Memorial Baptist of Springfield, Massachusetts.



## Grant Forces Occupy Vital Paducah, Ky.

### Polk, Former Episcopal Bishop, Opposes Illinoisian in Campaign

PADUCAH, Ky.—Sept. 6—Kentucky's long-fought-for neutrality ended decisively today when this strategic town was occupied by Union forces under Brig. Gen. Ulysses S. Grant.

Grant, an Illinoisian recently assigned to command Northern troops headquartered at nearby Cairo, Ill., seized Paducah a scant six hours before the scheduled arrival of Confederate units under Maj. Gen. Leonidas Polk, a former Episcopal bishop, who was advancing from the south.

Paducah was considered a prize by both sides because of its location at the mouths of the Tennessee and Cumberland rivers.

ACCOMPANIED by two gunboats, Grant and his force left Cairo yesterday and moved into Fort Holt, ten miles downriver from Paducah.

He moved onto his objectives this morning and took undisputed possession.

Maj. Gen. John Charles Fremont, commander of Union forces in the west, immediately ordered Grant back to Cairo and posted C. F. Smith, a new brigadier-general, to the occupation of Paducah. Smith brought two regiments with him from Fremont's St. Louis headquarters.

THE TWO opposing leaders in the Kentucky campaign—Grant and Polk—are graduates of the U. S. Military Academy at West Point.

But the similarity stops there. The careers of the two have been widely divergent since.

Grant served with the regular army in California, then drifted back to Illinois where he worked with little success as a farmer and helper in his father's harness and leathergoods shop in Galena.

While Grant was floating around the country, Polk was serving as a priest in the Episcopal church. After leaving West Point in 1827, Polk began studying theology and was ordained in 1831, becoming a missionary bishop of the Southwest seven years later.

IN 1841 he was made Bishop of Louisiana and in 1860 founded the University of the South at Sewanee.

Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederate states and a West Point classmate of Polk, conferred the bishop a major-general's rank after the outbreak of hostilities and he was commissioned last June.

## Johnston Named Commander Of Rebel Troops in West

RICHMOND, Va.—Sept. 10—Gen. Albert S. Johnston was named commander of all Confederate troops in the West today by Jefferson Davis, president of the provisional Confederate States.

A professional soldier of wide reputation and admiration, Johnston has been serving as the second highest-ranking officer in the Southern army, being outranked only by Gen. Samuel Cooper, adjutant and inspector general.

He was expected to join Maj. Gen. Leonidas Polk at once in Kentucky, scene of the most fluid action in the West in recent days.





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### Navy NESEP Now Has Openings for Enlistees

Upon receipt of a baccalaureate degree, individuals will be ordered to Officer Candidate School or Naval School Pre-Flight, and upon successful completion thereof, if otherwise qualified, shall be commissioned in the regular navy in a category commensurate with the needs of the service. former NESEP student will be considered for graduate education. Graduates of this program must serve on active duty for a minimum period of four years from receipt of original commission, unless sooner released by the secretary of the navy.

A local optometrist warns that bricks can't replace eyes.

Dr. E. C. Silverthorn Sr. of the Michigan Optometric Association said that great emphasis has been placed in recent years on the buildings and physical assets of schools, without noticing that schools also need children that are physically and mentally alert, in order to learn.

"The public often thinks that a new school is the answer to our great education problems, but it goes beyond this," he said. "For instance, did you know that more than half the children who are slow learners or readers have vision problems?"

Dr. Silverthorn said that a great many children have vision deficiencies that handicap them in their schoolwork.

"What good does it do to give them beautiful school buildings and carefully engineered equipment—all designed to speedup performance, when vision problems exist that make it impossible to achieve quantity and quality in learning?"
