



#### losco Lake, One of Five to Receive Plantings of Pike

Five inland lakes were recently planted with 1,250 adult northern pike under the conservation department's continuing program to revitalize fishing in waters where problems have developed.

The plantings totaled 600 pike in West Londo Lake, Iosco County; 150 in Stone Lake, Cass County, and 500 in Austin, West and Long Lakes, Kalamazoo County. Austin Lake received 250 pike while West and Long Lakes got 150 and 100, respectively.

The fish were netted from the Kawkawlin River in Bay County during spring spawning runs. They were captured and replanted before spawning to boost pike production in the lakes this

All five lakes were chemically treated by the department in recent years to eliminate overcrowed conditions which had led to serious stunting among fish populations.

Other fish plantings have been made in the lakes since the treatments as part of the program to




