

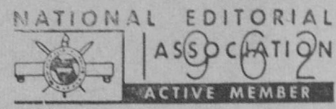

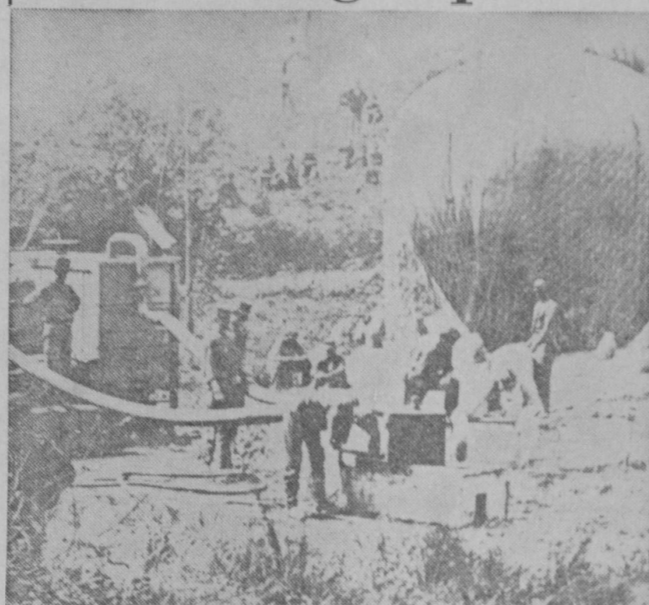

**TARGET: "STAR OF SOUTH"**

**Fierce Naval Battle On For New Orleans, La.**

**Farragut's Forces Hammer Away At Defending River Bastions**

NEW ORLEANS, La.—April 24—A massive land and sea battle is under way with the City of New Orleans, star of the South, the Union objective.

At dawn today, a fleet of 20 Union warships commanded by Capt. David G. Farragut stepped up its week-old attack on forts and ships defending New Orleans, and the battle began in earnest.

Primary targets for the Union gunners were Forts Jackson and St. Phillip, which command the major approaches to the historic, rich metropolis.

IN THE past week Farragut's guns have sailed more than 15,000 rounds against the forts, but their guns still were active at the beginning of today's hostilities.

Farragut's flagship, the U.S.S. *Hartford*, was damaged and run aground after being rammed by a Confederate fire-ship, but was refloated in time to participate in the climax of the action.

A major loss to the Union was the sleek warship U.S.S. *Varuna*, a 10-gunner noted for speed and mobility. She was mortally damaged by guns of the Southern sidewheeler *Mower*.

During today's pre-dawn conflict the skies were as bright as daylight. Southern forces on shore lit huge bonfires to illuminate the Northern fleet, and throughout the battle, Rebel fire-barges moved in ghostly fashion in and

around the towering invading ships.

The pounding of the guns reached a peak about 4 a.m. when, in a daring move, Farragut led his fleet into a channel blasted through a protective boom below the forts.

LEADING a brief counter-attack was the Confederate ram *Manassas*, secure in heavy armor plate. She rammed the first of the Union ships, but was hastily beaten off and finally was run aground.

After sinking the *Varuna*, the *Moore* bowed to concentrated fire of smaller Federal ships, and finally was run aground and sunk with a loss of 60 dead and 20 wounded.

Farragut then regrouped his battered forces into assault formation and headed upriver toward New Orleans, which is being defended by Confederate Maj. Gen. Mansfield Lovell and his 3,000 troops.

A Union force estimated at 18,000, under command of Maj. Gen. Benjamin F. Butler, reportedly is en route to New Orleans to bolster Farragut's sea attack with a land assault.

**LIFE PRESERVING EQUIPMENT**

Now and then one reads a real saga of the sea in which someone survives shipwreck by merely clinging to floating debris. Countless lives have been saved in this manner but unfortunately countless other lives have been unnecessarily lost because no provision was made in the way of life preserving equipment, or if it was available, it was not used.

The boat owner operating his craft on federal waterways is required by law to provide life saving equipment for each person aboard. Many states are now requiring similar regulations on inland waterways not under the jurisdiction of the United States Coast Guard.

Every conscientious manufacturer of life saving devices submits samples of his product to the coast guard and if approved, he is authorized to stamp or affix a tag indicating that such device is so approved and lists a coast guard approval number. On federal waterways, coast guard boarding officers will not credit life preservers as meeting legal requirements if not identified as approved by the coast guard.

Boats in classes A, one and two (under 40 feet in length) are required to have on hand for each person aboard, either a coast guard approved life preserver, buoyant cushion, ring buoy or buoyant vest. Vessels in class three (40 feet to 65 feet) require devices aboard to be life preservers or ring buoys (not buoyant cushions or vests).

Equipment not recognized as meeting legal requirements for pleasure boats include ski belts, jackets of the type worn by racing drivers, or the inflatable jackets used by the military.

Aside from having a sufficient number of approved life saving devices aboard it is important that

they be maintained in good condition. After immersion in water, they should be thoroughly dried, never stowed wet. Devices showing signs of deterioration should be discarded.

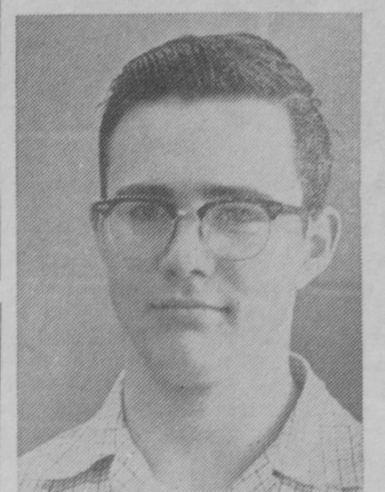

# NEM Baseball League Organizes for '62 Season

Though there are two less clubs in the Northeastern Michigan Baseball League as of the present, an enthusiastic group met at Standish last Thursday night to start the league on its way into its 43rd year.

Elected president for the third consecutive year was Fred Jones of Prescott. Clare Herriman of Tawas City was named vice president

and F. E. Perlberg of Standish was elected secretary-treasurer.

The league will again operate in split divisions. There will be eight clubs in the National Division, although one member, Hale, was not represented. However, it was reported with foundation that the club would be in action this year and a schedule providing a place for Hale was approved.

Other clubs in this division include Comins, East Tawas, Melita, Prescott, Skidway Lake, Tawas City and West Branch. The last named team was also missing at the meeting, but assured officials that the community would be represented in the league for 1962.

There may be two vacancies in the American Division. Sterling is not certain it will be able to foster a club this year, although the town has not given up hope; Beaver has chosen to go with the City Federation in Bay County. One of the vacancies has been taken up by Pinconning, approved by the directors at Thursday night's meeting. Crump, a member last year, will not sponsor a team anywhere.

Definite members of the American Division are Beaverton, Gladwin, Pinconning, Rhodes, Standish and Worth. All were represented at the meeting.

The various clubs were favor-

able to the plan of waiting until the next meeting, April 26, before closing the door to new members, so any team that will definitely carry on during the coming season is welcome to make its appearance at the courthouse in Standish at 8 o'clock Thursday night, April 26.

Several new changes were made in the constitution. Leading off was the matter of adding \$10 to the membership fee for all-star tickets. In the past, each team was provided with 20 tickets to be sold and the returns turned over to the league treasury. Several teams failed to make this return each year. Now the teams will have paid for the tickets in advance and each will be on their own to get money back through definite sales efforts. If satisfactory, it will be made a permanent change.

Teams withdrawing from the league at the end of 1962 will forfeit their entry fee balance if the team does not become a member of the league when the next schedule gets under way in 1963. After 1963, any team dropping out of the league at the end of the season and not entering the following spring will automatically forfeit fees.

On a ballot voted by the directors, Melita was selected to host the 1962 all-star game. Worth will be host team in 1963, East Tawas in 1964, Standish during 1965 and Comins, 1966. The 1962 all-star game will be played July 4.

The National Division elected to start its season May 6, the American to determine its opening date, depending on the possibility of Sterling continuing and possibly other entries.

At the April 26 meeting, the list of players, umpires and officers will be presented and the schedules approved.

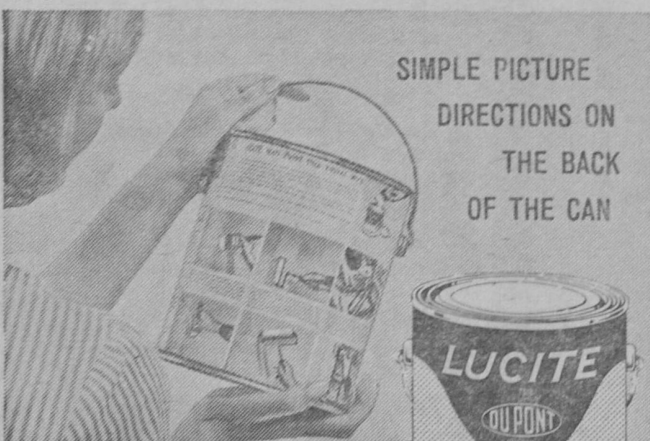

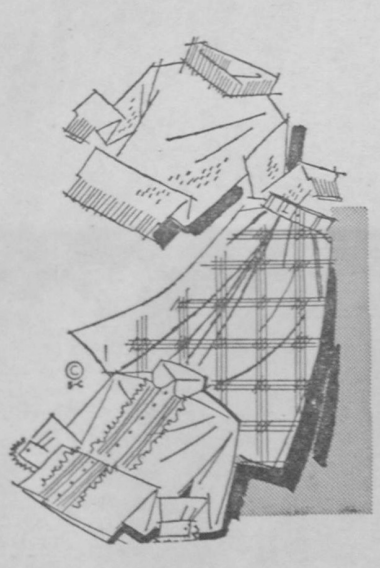

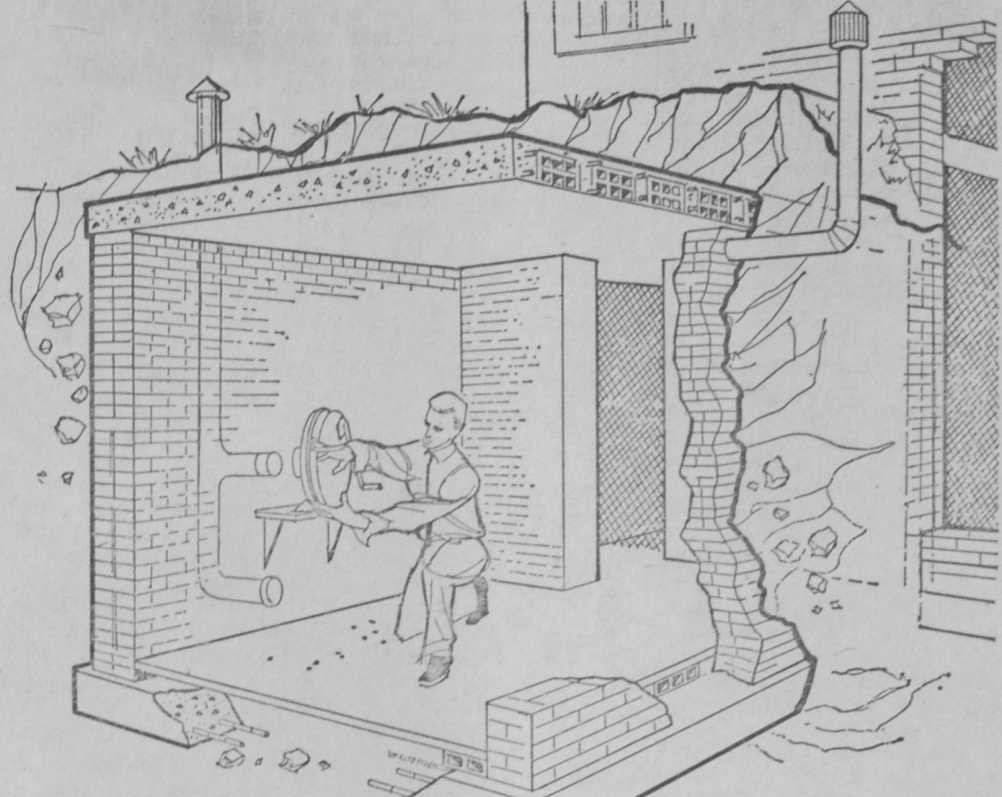
