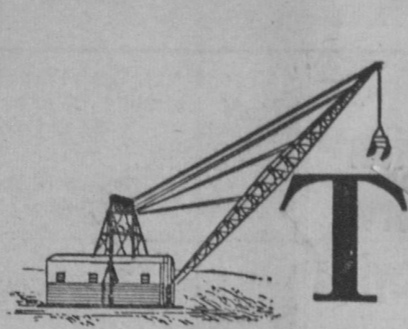

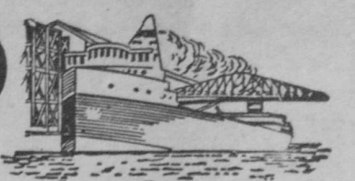

Senate Primary OK'd; Election Tuesday

US Justice Stays State Supreme Court's Order

All candidates who filed and were certified to run for the Michigan State Senate will find their names on paper ballots and on voting machines when the polls open for the primary election Tuesday, August 7.

Following the order issued in Littleton, New Hampshire, by United States Supreme Court Justice Potter Stewart, Secretary of State James M. Hare sent the following telegram to all county clerks:

"United States Supreme Court has stayed Michigan court order cancelling primary for state senator. Primary election for state senator will be held on August 7. Make certain this office and names of candidates certified to you appear on all ballots and machines. Instruct all boards to count and report votes cast for this office."

Hare reassured voters that the names of all state senatorial candidates who had been certified by the board of canvassers would also appear on all absentee voters' ballots.

Hare said he and the elections staff would abide by Justice Stewart's order and would do everything possible to expedite the holding of the senatorial primary as spelled out by the statutes.

"However," Hare said, "we must not forget that reapportionment of the Michigan Senate is now a legal matter and it needs to be pursued in the courts. And we who are responsible for elections in Michigan will carry out their decisions in the future as we have in the past."

Baldwin Voters Decide on Primary Proposal

Baldwin Township voters will go to the polls in a special election next Tuesday to decide on the question of holding a primary election to select party candidates for township offices.

This question was brought up earlier this year when petitions signed by 75 residents were presented to the township board.

A spokesman for the board said that the 75 signatures represented the necessary 10 percent of total registered voters needed to place the question on the ballot.

Three Races on GOP's Side of Primary Ballot

Three races are listed on the Republican side of the August 7 primary ballot while Democratic candidates have no interparty opposition.

Of local interest is the two-way race between Harold B. Hughes, incumbent, and Herbert J. Smith Jr. for candidacy as Republican state senator from the 28th District.

There is a three-way race for Republican representative in the state legislature from the Alpena District. James P. Mielock of Whittemore, incumbent, is opposed by James A. McQuarrie and Walter W. Weinkauff.

The other race is between three men seeking Republican candidacy as lieutenant governor. They are Rockwell T. Gust Jr., Clarence A. Reid and John H. Stahlin.

There are no races at the county level. Republican candidates are: William H. McCready, prosecuting attorney; Ivan O'Farrell, sheriff; George A. Prescott, county clerk; Grace L. Miller, treasurer; Albert H. Buch, register of deeds; E. H. Stickney, drain commissioner; Edward D. Jacques and E. John Moffatt, coroners; Arthur J. Aulerich, road commissioner.

There is no candidate listed for county surveyor.

Republican candidates for state and congressional offices without opposition are: George Romney, governor; Alvin M. Bentley, congressman at large; Elford A. Cederberg, 10th District representative in congress.

State and congressional candidates on the Democratic ticket are: John B. Swainson, governor; T. John Lesinski, lieutenant governor; Neil Staebler, congressman at large; Hubert C. Evans, 10th District representative in congress; Carroll E. Jones, 28th District state senator.

There is no Democratic candidate listed for state representative in the Alpena District, nor are there any county Democratic candidates listed.

Voters are reminded that a ballot cannot be "split." If votes are cast on more than one party ticket, the ballot will be rejected.

Ferguson Announces Sale of Mystery Ridge

Announcement is made this week of the sale of Mystery Ridge, located between East Tawas and Oscoda on US-23.

Douglas Ferguson, former owner, reports that the tourist attraction has been sold to Mrs. Cathryn Weller, Miss Fay Price and Mrs. Weller's son, Vincent Jr., of Saginaw.

Mystery Ridge, opened two years ago by Ferguson, is a tourist attraction with a number of exhibits which defy gravity.

Shelton is New CO of 445th FIS Sqdn.

The 445th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron, Air Defense Command, at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, welcomed its new commander informally last Thursday.

Lt. Col. William E. Shelton, 40-year-old former operations officer of the 49th FIS at Griffis Air Force Base, Rome, New York, succeeds to a vacancy caused by the plane crash death June 28 of Lt. Col. Sam C. Wilkerson.

His command includes 465 officers and enlisted men of the 445th and the supersonic F-101B "Voodoo" fighter-interceptors the squadron flies.

A native of Sacramento, California, he moved with his family to Chattanooga, Tennessee, when he was six years old and was graduated from Chattanooga's Central High School in 1940.

A veteran of 20 years in service, he wears the air medal and cluster and has a total of almost seven years overseas, including a World War II tour in China-Burma-India in 1945-46, Paraguay in 1948-49 and Japan, 1955-56.

He was with the Air Tactical School at Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida, from 1950-55, and spent 1956-58 at the University of Maryland. He had earlier attended the Army Command and General Staff College at Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas, in 1954.

He is married to the former Juanita Dalton, and the couple has three children, William E. Jr., 12; Stephen, 10, and Thomas, eight.

Lt. Col. Shelton's right hand man will be Maj. George J. Mattes, 41, 44th operations officer, a veteran of 16 years in service and a new graduate from the Air Command and Staff College. (See NEW CO, page 12.)

Sheriff Alford W. May of Mio, who investigated, reported that Leslie's motor scooter struck the front wheel of a car driven by Mrs. Archie Oliver of McKinley.

The collision occurred on a curve in the road.

The Tawas Cityan sustained a concussion, fractured left arm, severe face lacerations and possible internal injuries when the impact of the crash drove him through the car's windshield.

Mrs. Oliver sustained arm lacerations.

Ex-Railroader Operates Steamer—

Kids Enjoy Rides on O A & S

"Things just haven't been the same since the railroads took off the steamers," was the comment Saturday of the president, general manager and locomotive engineer of the Oscoda-AuSable and Southern Railroad.

At this point, it should be explained that the O A & S is a new "line" operating south of Oscoda. Its tracks may not be the standard four feet, 8 1/2 inches in width, but to steam locomotive enthusiasts who have seen it, it is a working replica of the real thing.

J. Gilbert Dobson of Bay City, owner of the line, purchased a miniature locomotive built to scale, tracks and other equipment last year and constructed his line around the Oscoda warehouse and office of Dobson World Wide Movers.

It may sound unusual for a trucker to have such an interest in steam locomotives, but not to Mr. Dobson. He was a fireman and engineer on the Michigan Central Railroad for 26 years.

During those years as a railroader, he acquired a love for steamers which could never be replaced by the exhaust fumes

from diesels—trucks or locomotives.

Last Saturday, Dobson donated the use of his railroad to the Oscoda Kiwanis Club and several hundred youngsters and oldsters, too, enjoyed train rides on the O A & S.

Dobson, naturally, was engineer during the train rides. Because of the fact that the midge locomotive carries a steam head of 125 pounds pressure, a qualified engineer is required to operate it.

The Bay Cityan arrived here early Saturday morning to make preparations for the day. A wood fire was built in the locomotive's fire box, coke was added later to make a hotter fire and, before long, steam in the boiler was up to the required pressure.

A broken steam line caused some delay until minor repairs were made by Dobson and William "Scotty" Morrison of Oscoda, a steam engine expert.

Dobson's circular track includes two crossings, a tunnel, a down-grade running along a pond in back of the warehouse and a rather steep grade running

around a curve and up to the station platform and ticket office.

Easing back on the throttle, Dobson asked one of his passengers as the train rolled into the station, "Could you hear her

'talk' on that last grade?" He referred to the locomotive's laboring chug-a-chug as it pulled its two passenger cars around a curve.

"We plan to continue operating and maintaining one of the most honest and efficient auto parts stores in Northeastern Michigan," the owners stated.

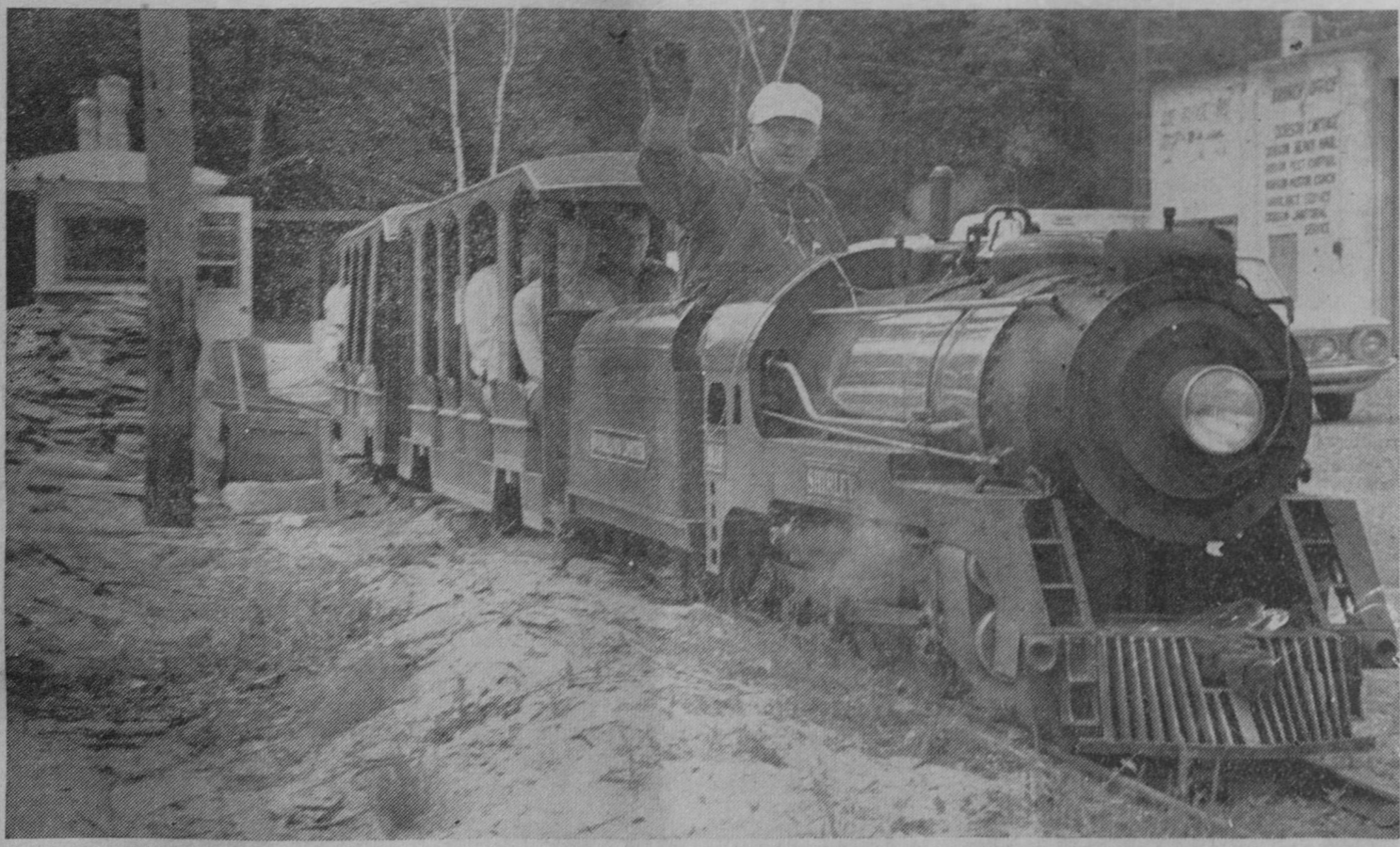
Thunberg, who has managed Johnson Auto Supply since 1946, is married to the former Dorothy Rempert Johnson. They have three children and live at East Tawas.

After attending Augustana College for two years, Thunberg became a member of the Michigan State Police. Then, after spending 2 1/2 years in India with the United States Army, he made his

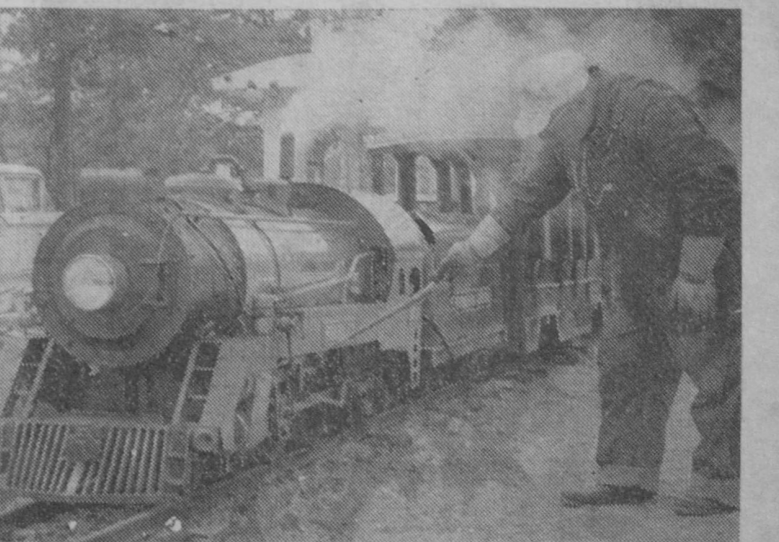
Tawas Lake Association to Select New Officers

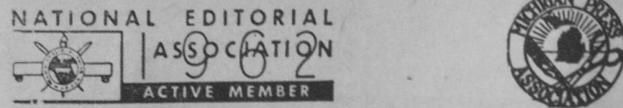

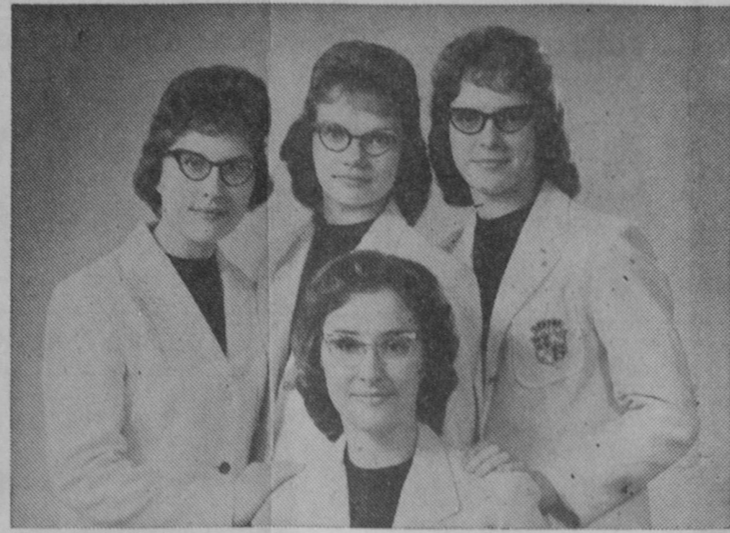

To The Editor:

Our founding fathers, 187 years ago, gave the answer to Governor Swainson's clever plea for support of the Michigan Supreme Court's split decision on senate re-appointment. If he likes comparisons, he should try Michigan's two senators with Alaska and Hawaii's four senators representing less than half the population of Wayne County; or compare New York with New Mexico or Texas with Rhode Island. This part of our federal checks and balances has never been tampered with.

When the constitution of this greatest of all republics was first read by the British statesman Pitt, he said: "It will be the wonder and admiration of future generations and a model for future governments." It has not only been a model for other governments, but has been a model for each of our United States. I don't think the judgment of four labor picked justices can improve on the work of our nation's master builders.

Michigan has done rather well for over 100 years under our present form and only lost face with the nation since the domination of labor boss rule in Lansing. Our state government is honey-combed with labor shop

stewards whose administration of important state functions has largely contributed to our fiscal mess.

Voters of Michigan are reaping the harvest of their own sowing; fortunately the remedy still rests in their votes. The acceptance of the offer of an outstanding administrator to serve as governor should be accepted overwhelmingly at the November polls. George Romney is the answer to the present domination of a few power hungry labor bosses.

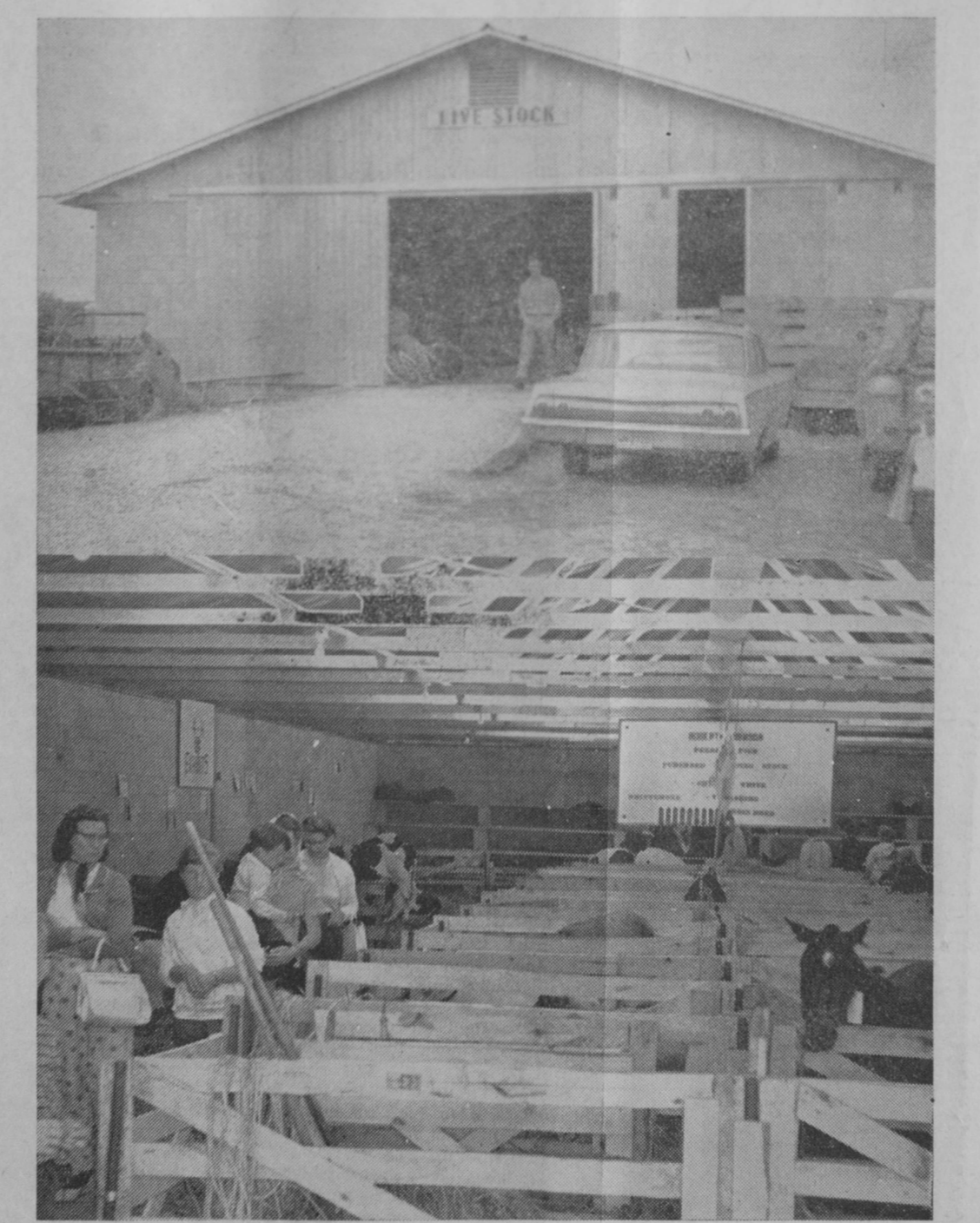

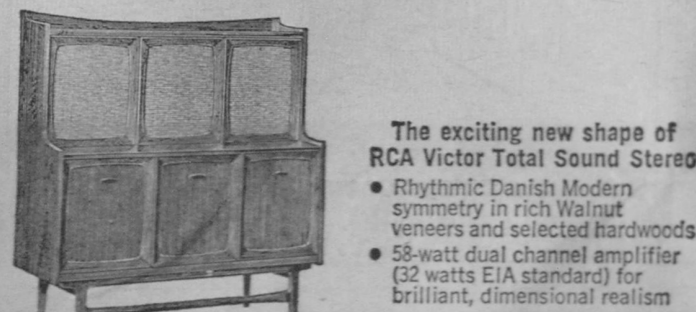

23rd In A Series— Ahoy, Skipper! MAN OVERBOARD. How many owners of large or small boats react promptly and correctly at the cry, man overboard? Precious time can be lost while recovering from the first reaction of shock or panic. But this can be avoided if the boat owner and his regular crew on occasion will conduct an emergency drill. Simulate a man overboard condition by having someone in swimming attire jump overboard without previous warning to the man at the wheel. At the alarm, toss a life ring, preserver or buoyant cushion in the general direction of the person in the water. This will assist him or her to float and will help more readily locate their approximate location. The helm should be put hard over the speed maintained so that the boat will circle and return to the point of pickup in less time than by stopping and reversing.

Circling is also preferred in the dark when it may be difficult to locate somebody in the water. Approach a person in the water cautiously with your bow toward them. Keep your propeller turning so as to control your boat, but be alert to stop the prop in case the person in the water is in danger of injury. Use of a boarding ladder is recommended, if available. Practice this procedure several times until you become proficient in returning and picking up the person overboard. Your drill can also well include checking how long it takes a person to locate life preservers and put on properly. Experiment with the procedure of promptly getting your anchor down and set. And how convenient are your fire extinguishers? Can they be reached in a minimum of time or are they so located that an engine fire or galley fire would prevent you from reaching them. And do you know how to operate them? The above suggested practice routine will help you establish a pattern of what to do in an emergency when time is important. It may be worth someone's life if the occasion ever occurs on your boat of man overboard. BRING 'EM BACK ABOVE.
