## Turns Berry Patch Into Paying Hobby

After eight years of testing, three varieties of blueberries have been developed to withstand the rigors of Northeastern Michigan winters.

During that time, some 37 different varieties have been grown by Joseph P. Czaika of Alabaster Township, who is the Northeastern Michigan grower for Michigan State University's South Haven Experiment Station.

In charge of the testing project is Stanley Johnson, MSU professor, who breeds the different plants at South Haven and then ships them here for testing.

Today, Czaika has 1,000 blueberry bushes on his 1 1/2 acre farm south of Tawas City. During the past summer, between three and four tons of blueberries were produced on this plot. The picking season ended last Saturday.

Although blueberry cultivation north of Saginaw is difficult because of winter kill to plants, Czaika hopes to interest others in growing the types which have proven successful in his operation.

Czaika explains that there is an abundance of good blueberry-growing soil here and conditions are especially favorable near Lake Huron where frost danger is lessened.

"An acid-type soil is required for good blueberry growing, preferably light gray sand with hard pan or clay below the surface," said Czaika.

An employee of United States Gypsum Company, Czaika's interest in growing blueberries started out as a hobby. The extra money gained in this venture is helping to assure a college education for his children.

Several years ago, he purchased 20 acres of wild land just west of US-23. "Everyone thought we were a little barmy when we started to clear it off and dig drainage ditches... it was swampy and really not much good for anything," said Czaika.

The entire family pitched in with the project and, in the meantime, they also constructed their own home.

It has taken many years of hard work, but Czaika hopes to (See BLUEBERRIES, page 12.)

The second prize, a check from the Tawas City Businessmen's Association, went to Mrs. Harold Peterson for her pastel portrait, "Lisa." An honorable mention was given Mrs. William Krumm, now of Newport, Arkansas, for her oil painting, "Cypress by the Sea."

"Much credit is due Miss Lucy Toska, secretary of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, for weeks of effort in publicity and registration," stated Mrs. Herbert Hertzler, who was co-chairman of the event.

## Tawas Lake Dam Up for Discussion Sept. 19

Principal discussion during next month's meeting of the Isoco County Board of Supervisors will center around the proposed dam to control water level of Tawas Lake.

As the result of last Wednesday's session, members of the board stated they wanted definite answers as to the proposed dam location and its cost before any action could be taken.

Action on the proposed meeting was moved by Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda and seconded by Supervisor Robert LaVoy of Baldwin Township.

Attending the meeting will be Drain Commissioner Bert Stickney, Prosecuting Attorney William McCready, representatives of Scott Engineering, representatives of the Tawas Lake Association and any others interested.

The proposed Tawas Lake Dam has been a point of controversy here for a number of years. After establishment of the legal level in circuit court, the Tawas Lake Association filed petitions about four years ago for construction of the dam.

The board authorized Scott Engineering Company of Alpena to prepare plans for the proposed structure, to be financed by a special assessment district.

A large delegation of property owners attended last week's meeting and urged the board to proceed with methods to bring the lake to its legal level.

In other business last week, a study is to be made on establishing the legal level of Chain Lakes in Plainfield Township.

On recommendation of its aeronautics committee, the board adopted a resolution seeking to enter into agreement with the Michigan Department of Aeronautics, the Isoco Road Commission and Baldwin Township for construction of a new hard-surfaced road to serve the county airport.

Cost of the 1 1/2 miles of construction would be \$25,000. County participation would be \$6,500, to include money received from sale of the old airport.

The board accepted a bid from James DeRosia for purchase of the two remaining parcels of property at the old airport. DeRosia's bid of \$510 was the only one received.

According to a report from Wilbur Roach, airport manager, 54 transit aircraft registered at the airport during July.

The board accepted resignation of Mrs. Leola Frank as member of the Isoco-Arenac Regional Library. Appointed to fill the vacancy was Miss Lela Osgerby of

National City, who won in a 10-5 roll call over the other nominee, Richard Egli.

Resignation of Howard Becker as manager of Old Orchard Park was accepted. His application for a maintenance job at the park was tabled.

## American Flag is Gift to Miss Otis

Miss Edna M. Otis of East Tawas received an impressive gift recently from Michigan Attorney General Frank J. Kelley. Kelley met Miss Otis at the East Tawas Centennial June 30. She was general chairman of the event and Kelley was the official representative of the State of Michigan.

Riding together in the parade, Kelley made Miss Otis a promise and he made good that promise last week. Miss Otis received an United States flag and with it an affidavit certifying that the flag had flown over the State Capitol Building. The affidavit read:

"Presented to: Miss Edna M. Otis, a distinguished Michigan Lady."

In his letter, Kelley said that only his recent illness prevented him from presenting the flag in person. "For that reason," Kelley said, "I thought it best that I send you the flag rather than wait any longer."

## Bert N. Johnson Died Last Week

Real estate salesman, Bert N. Johnson, 69 years of age, died Thursday at Tawas Hospital following a heart attack. He was born September 21, 1892, in Wayland, New York.

He was a well-known fisherman on the AuSable River and was very active in the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Mr. Johnson is survived by one sister, Mrs. Emma Paul of Detroit.

Funeral services were conducted from Jacques Funeral Home with the Rev. Alfred Miller officiating. The body was taken to Detroit for cremation.

## Tawas School Registration Continues Through Friday

Registration for Tawas Area Junior and Senior High School students started Monday and will continue until Friday.

Before the week is over, between 475 and 480 high school students are expected to be registered for the fall term, reports Principal Ernest W. Jordan Jr.

Office hours are from 9:00 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. and there are no special days for each grade. Students may register on any day convenient to them.

The fall term is slated to open here Tuesday, September 4, when students report to school at 9:00 a. m. There will be no school in the afternoon, but there will be a general teachers meeting starting at 1:15 p. m.

The full schedule for students starts Wednesday, September 5. Supt. Reynold Mick said that bus routes will show only very minor changes from last year.

Plans for opening of the new Tawas City elementary unit are still indefinite, according to the superintendent. He said that four rooms would definitely be ready for the opening day of school and by Friday of this week, it will be known if the remaining six rooms will be ready for occupancy.

According to Principal Jordan, all positions on the high school faculty have been filled. There is still one vacancy in the elementary grades. A third grade teacher at the East Tawas unit is yet to be hired.

New teachers in the junior and senior high school include Wesley Dudgeon, Latin; Mrs. Edward Rima, French; Mrs. Gordon Dunham, junior high; Miss Judy Gillies, English and chorus.

## W-P Area School Term Starts Sept. 4

School will open at Whittemore - Prescott Area Schools Tuesday morning, September 4, for a half day. Teachers' meetings will be held Friday, August 31. Kindergarten will begin Wednesday, September 5. Students who attended Whittemore - Prescott School last year do not need to register before school starts.

The high school office will be open on weekdays from August 20 to September 4 to register new students or for consultation with former students. Sylvester Wojcicki, who was formerly principal of the Prescott Elementary School, has been employed by the board of education as high school principal.

## Alabaster Postmaster Retires

Mrs. Harry Bolen retired Friday after serving nearly 25 years as Alabaster postmaster. With her retirement, the community clustered around United States Gypsum Company's installation will be served by a new designation—the Alabaster rural station.

Although the office will be operated as usual, administration will be handled by the Tawas City post office. Mrs. Hope Rescoe will be clerk in charge.

While sorting mail for the last time in her small but neat post office overlooking Saginaw Bay,

Mrs. Bolen recalled that she had succeeded Edwin Benson as Alabaster postmaster in 1938. In those days, the office was located in the company store.

Many changes have taken place since then. The store burned to the ground years ago and the post office was moved to a converted residential dwelling. Mail was once brought in by the Erie and Michigan Railway, but that, too, has disappeared with time.

Mrs. Bolen, and her husband, who is an employee of the gypsum company, have lived at Alabaster for 40 years. Their nine children are all grown and away from home now, but Mrs. Bolen recalls that she used to bring the three younger children to the office while she was on duty.

To this day, office hours have remained from 8:30 a. m. to 5:00 p. m.

There are no records available to indicate the length of time that Alabaster has had a post office. According to tradition, however, the postal service has close ties with that community. One story relates the information that the gypsum deposit was discovered in the 1850s by a mail carrier who came upon it during one of his trips between Bay City and Alpena. He carried samples of the rock back with him, leading to the development of the quarry.

By 1865, the quarry was in operation and the post office was probably established shortly after. At one time, Alabaster had a population of several hundred persons, along with two stores, a hotel and boarding houses.

Mrs. John Erickson, one of Mrs.

Bolen's postal patrons, recalled Friday morning that 66 USG employees lived at a boarding house where she was once employed.

Today, as in the past, United States Gypsum Company is the principal patron. In addition, there are 21 other boxes in the office, the majority belonging to company employees.

"We have been getting a lot of calls for 'last day' cancellations, but the office will continue under the name of Alabaster," stated Mrs. Bolen.

Although the Bolen home is only about a block away from the post office, the retiring postmaster said she was going to miss the daily contacts with all the friends she has made over the years.

## Midland Man Struck by Auto on US-23

A 75-year-old Midland man, Joseph Hudson, received head lacerations and a leg fracture Sunday afternoon when he was struck by a car on US-23.

Hudson stopped his car near the Beech Street-US-23 intersection, walked around in front of the vehicle and stepped into the path of a car driven by Bobby R. Sutherland, 27, Royal Oak.

Hudson's wife, Helen, told investigating sheriff's department officers that her husband had parked his car with the intent of going down to the edge of Tawas Bay with his two dogs. The dogs were killed as Hudson stepped out on the pavement.



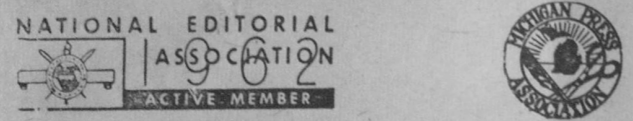

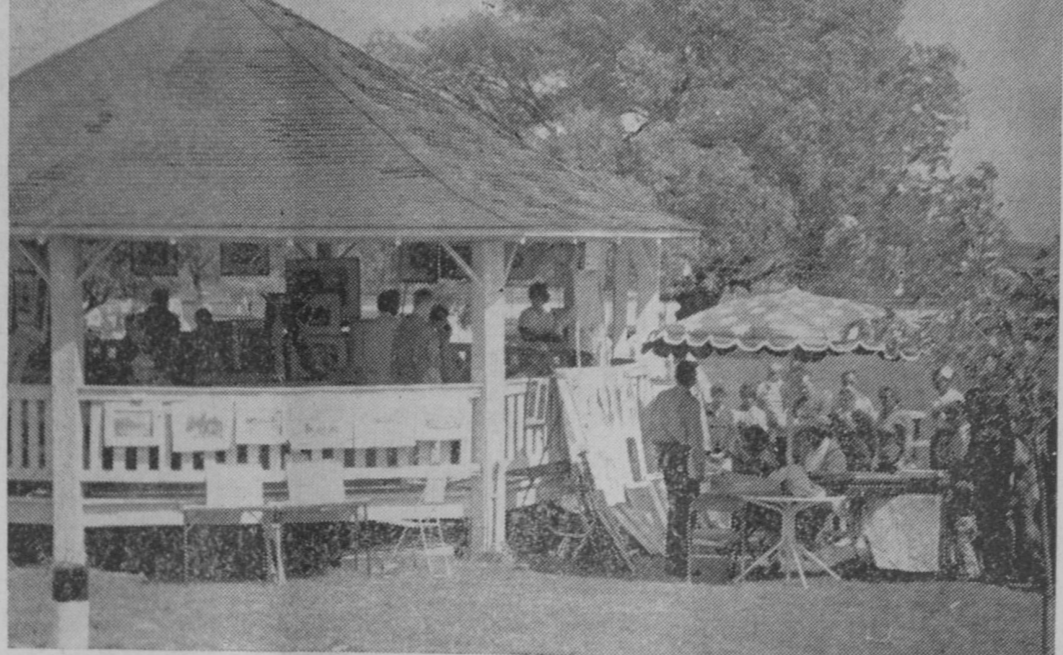

### Better Fishing--With A Thermometer



Summer's "dog days" slow the pace of fishing but where there's a will to seek out those big ones, there's a way. Fishermen in the "know"—after picking a likely area—use thermometers to locate water temperatures preferred by fish. In fishing rainbow, brown, and brook trout, thermometers are lowered to the lake bottom for a reading. Angling for these trout is generally best where the bottom temperature is 50-55° Fahrenheit. If the bottom temperature is colder than 50°, you should move closer to shore; if not that cold, move into deeper water. Another way, used mostly on non-trout species, is to lower thermometers to the desired fishing depth, rather than to the bottom. In this case, the suggested temperatures for best fishing results are: largemouth bass, 70-75°; smallmouth bass, northern pike and muskellunge, 65-70°; lake trout, 55-60°; yellow perch 60-65° (65-70° in shallow lakes); bluegill, 65-70° at 10 to 20 feet of depth. At dusk, bluegills come up to 75° or even warmer water.—Mich. Dept. of Conservation

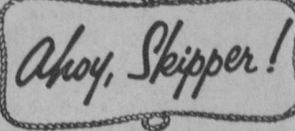

### THE NAUTICAL LITTERBUG

If we could drain any of our popular lakes and rivers dry, we are sure we would be horrified at the sunken evidence of litterbug activity of many of our boating enthusiasts. Evidently, many of us without serious thought consign things to the "deep six" regardless of whether they will sink out of sight or not.

Aside from the unsightly appearance caused by throwing on the water discarded cartons, bags, paper dishes and what-have-you, we wonder how many people are aware of the serious damage the careless tossing overboard of an empty bottle, beer can or even an insignificant piece of wood can cause. The impact of such a floating object with the hull of a fast moving boat is terrific and it is not unlikely that a sizeable hole in the hull may result, followed by sinking.

And bottles and tin cans, even though they sink, frequently are a hazard to the bathers and swimmers in shallow waters.

It does seem little to ask of all boatmen to provide a paper bag or carton aboard for accumulating such material and dispose of it ashore at docks and marinas where trash barrels are provided for such purposes.

A courteous gesture that we witnessed all too infrequently is the boatman who takes the trouble to lift a piece of driftwood out of the water or in a couple of noted instances put a line on a large timber and towed it ashore. Their thoughtfulness cannot be fully appreciated unless we, ourselves, have suffered damage to our boat from floating objects.

Another practice, fortunately not so prolific but nonetheless irritating, is the do-it-yourself individual who changes his own engine oil, then because it is too much bother to walk down the dock to shore to dispose of the drained oil, surreptitiously pours it over the side hoping the current will carry it away from his boat. If smart enough to realize his own boat may suffer, he waits to get out on the lake before tossing it overboard.

Let's preserve our fine waterways. Let's think, before we throw.

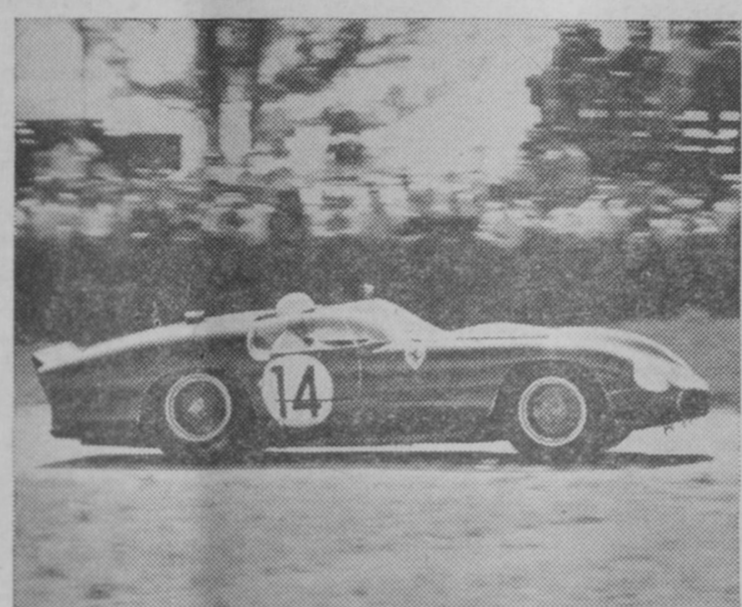

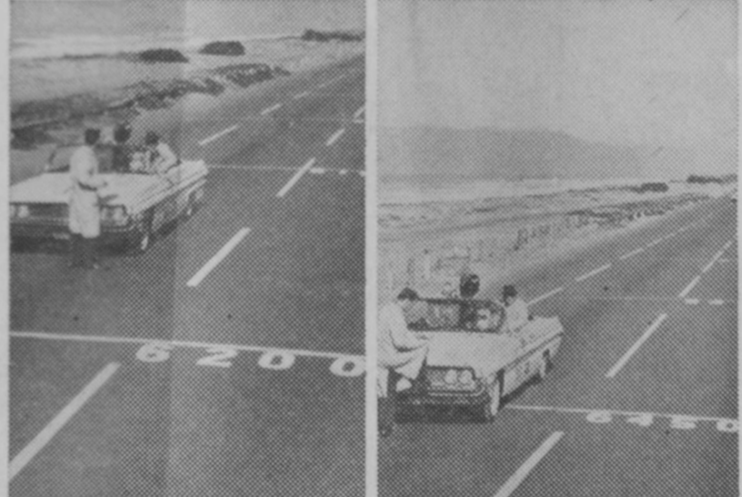

A Tawas Cityan, who has been studying in Europe the past summer, writes from Vienna, Austria, that he is slated to return to the United States about September 15.

Kenneth J. Myles, son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Myles, is one of 57 students entered in the Hope College Vienna Summer School program.

In addition to the regular academic offering at summer school, Myles spent four days behind the "Iron Curtain" in Prague, Czechoslovakia.

Writing of his impressions in the communist country, Myles noted the feeling of being in one large army camp. "Everywhere one goes there are public address systems blaring... there are military personnel all over the city and during our trip, we could see various training camps."

He said there was much evidence of a food shortage in Prague and there were long food lines. "Meat and fruit are in very short supply, but at our hotel we received meat and fruit at every meal. They were obviously trying to impress us."

"I also took some pictures of the only statue of Stalin left in Czechoslovakia," writes Myles. "It is slated to be torn down, but was still standing while I was there."

"I met a delegate to the Moscow Peace Conference. He was an American and was telling me how wonderful everything was in the communist countries. When you meet a person like that, you won't believe it."

## Three Braves Attend Conditioning Camp

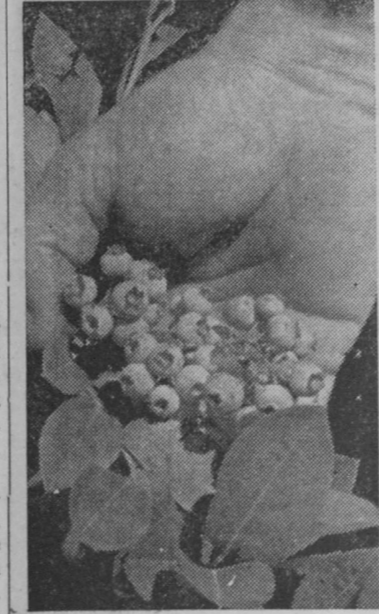
Three members of the Tawas Area Braves varsity football squad are attending a preseason conditioning and recreational program at Camp Michigam, West Branch.

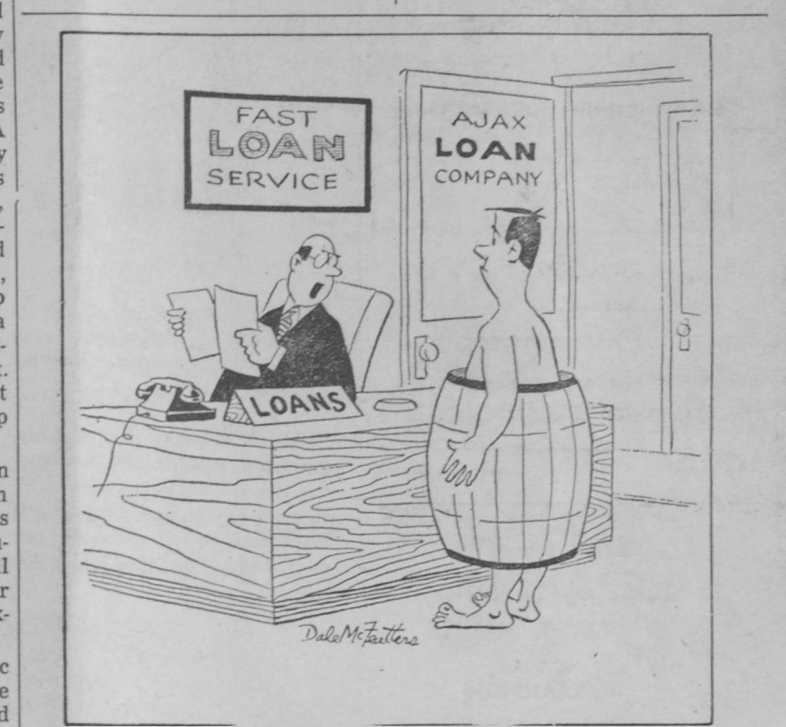
perintendent of the company's eastern region, bulk power supply, said the pond level will be lowered gradually for six days, at the rate of a foot a day, to permit important repairs to the concrete walls and piers on the upstream side of the dam. The pond level will be restored to normal by October 1, he said.

During the same period, repairs to the concrete retaining walls on the downstream side of the dam will be completed, he said.

Dates for the draw-down and repairs were set after consultation with the state conservation department and a number of sportsmen's groups, Mr. Ingell said.

"Doing the work at this time of year will minimize possible inconvenience to vacationers and fishermen."

"Levels will be restored in plenty of time for the AuSable Valley canoe race October 5-7," he added.
