Buses Make Initial Run Next Tuesday

Buses will make their regular runs to pick up pupils for Tawas area public and parochial schools Tuesday, September 4. Buses will leave the high school at 12 o'clock noon to return pupils home. Full day sessions start on Wednesday.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary supervisor, announces that kindergarten will not be in session until Wednesday. Any kindergarten

ten pupil who has not been registered for this term should be registered September 4 between the hours of 9:00 to 11:30 a. m.

There will only be minor changes over last year's bus routes and these are listed below:

1. High school pupils in the Bay Drive area of Tawas City will ride bus number four in the morning and buses numbered six and 12 at night. Bus number four will make this pickup after 8:30 a. m. in this area.

2. Pupils around Miner's Grove will ride in bus number eight and bus number 16. Both buses will come to M-55 by way of the Wilber Road.

Fifth and sixth grade pupils from the west side of Tawas City and between Tawas City and Alabaster will be picked up as the buses go to Alabaster as in former years.

All children in grades kindergarten through four living in Whitney Township, Alabaster Township and along US-23 as far as Cholger's Service Station in Tawas City will attend the East Tawas unit.

Fifth - Sixth Grades Start at Alabaster

Although construction on the new 10-room Tawas City elementary unit will be nearly completed by next week, school officials said that some grades would be attending school in temporary locations.

"Completion of the new unit is indefinite enough to plan to have the fifth and sixth grades at the Alabaster unit and the seventh grade at the high school building," Supt. Reynold Mick stated last Friday.

In addition to kindergarten, first, second and third grades, the fourth grade will also start school in the new unit.

School custodians are to begin work this Thursday on moving desks and equipment into rooms which have been completed.

Mick said that although additional rooms would be ready by the first week of school, considerable work remains for the custodians in preparing the building for occupancy.

"We do not anticipate any inconvenience in class schedules, inasmuch as the Alabaster unit has been used by the fifth and sixth grades for several years and it is all ready for occupancy," stated Mick.

The superintendent said that it may be necessary to have youngsters carry their lunches until the kitchen is ready for use in the new unit.

S. G. Siglin, retired Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company employee, will observe his 90th birthday anniversary Thursday.

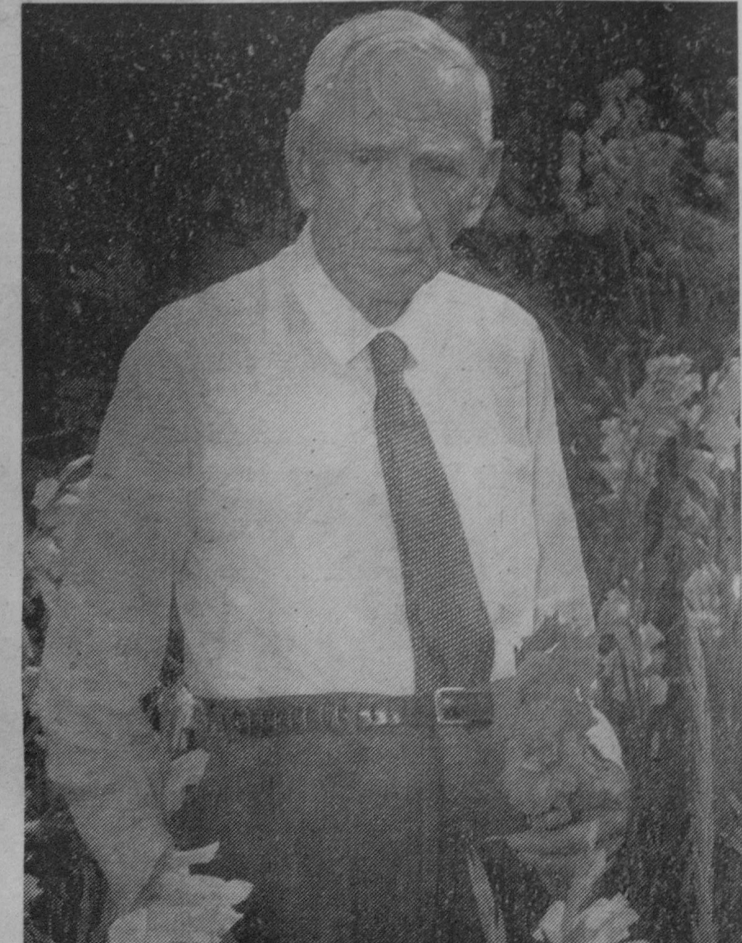
He and his wife, Anna, 84, make their home at 418 Church Street, East Tawas.

Police Officers Seek 'Hot' Clue in Ice House B&E

City police and sheriff's department officers are investigating a breaking and entering which took place early Saturday morning at Marion's Dairy Bar, East Tawas. It is fairly certain that the loot will not be recovered.

Approximately 800 pounds of ice was stolen in the break-in. Also found missing was a pair of ice tongs.

Owner Clarence Krueger said that the dairy bar and ice house had been closed at 11:00 p. m. Friday. Krueger's son, William, arrived at 3:40 a. m. on the Greyhound bus and found the door open on the ice house.

Investigation by City Patrolman Donald Docking and Deputy Sheriff Francis J. Block revealed that a lock had been forced open. They believe that the thieves used the ice to cool their drinks.

Alabaster School Goes on Block

Tawas Area Board of Education has authorized advertising for bids on the sale of the Alabaster school unit. Bids are to be opened at the October 8 meeting.

The building, located on a one-half acre site, is to be surplus property once the new Tawas City elementary unit is completed. It will be used at the start of the fall term until such time as fifth and sixth grades are moved into the new unit.

At a recent meeting of the board of education, it was stated that the Isoco-Arenac Regional Library was interested in the building as its headquarters.

Also to be sold is a house owned by the district at Alabaster, located on United States Gypsum Company property, along with one-half acre of land at the old Watts unit.

The accident occurred on Cranberry Pike Road. Pamela received lacerations of the arms and legs.

"This is an added safety factor for the protection of players and wearing of mouthpieces will be strictly enforced by game officials," states Herbert Esott, head coach at Tawas Area High School.


"It is one more step by the MHSAA to improve football competition and prevent injuries," he stated.

Since announcement of the new ruling earlier this year, dentists of the Tawas area have cooperated with the coaching staff in making preparations for the fall season.

Public Schools See 5,848 Enrollment

An estimated 5,848 youngsters will be returning to their classroom studies Tuesday, September 4, in Isoco County's four school districts.

According to estimates received by William Tracy, Isoco intermediate school district superintendent, Oscoda Area School will again lead in total enrollment with about 3,000 youngsters.

Preschool registration at Tawas Area High School finds some 658 youngsters enrolled, with an estimated 800 in grades kindergarten through six.

Hale Area School will have a total enrollment of about 460 pupils, while Whittemore-Prescott Area School will have an estimated 930 students in all grades.

The count at Tawas Area High School as of Friday morning was as follows: Grade 12, 98; 11th grade, 109; 10th grade, 132; ninth grade, 129; eighth grade, 104; seventh grade, 88.

Milwaukee Boat Wins World's Championship

Tawas Bay Yacht Club closed its sailing season last week-end by playing host to the world's championship National design regatta. Six states were represented on the Tawas Bay course.

John Christianson of South Shore Yacht Club, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, won top honors in the race. He is a four-time past world's champion.

Other winners were Kenneth Gustafson, Illiana Yacht Club, Chicago, Illinois, second place; Biff Steel, Leland Yacht Club, Winetka, Illinois, third place; Al Meade, Leland Yacht Club, Flint, fourth place; William Steel, Leland Yacht Club, Winetka, Illinois.

Seven races were held during the three days under variable weather conditions, ranging from heavy to light seas and four different wind directions.

There were 23 one design boats entered in the regatta, representing Wisconsin, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, Maryland and Michigan.

Four local boats entered finished well down in the standings. Skippers were Richard Haglund, Gerald Spencer, Willard and Thomas Dillon.

Christianson's winning boat was the latest approved National design. It had a fiberglass hull and took advantage of all new ideas allowed in the class.

"Many of us really appreciated the type of sailing you have on Tawas Bay," stated Stanley Martin, National design president of Chicago. "In most of our races, we can throw a rock from shore to shore."

Entertainment provided visitors by the yacht club included a banquet Saturday night. Commodore Charles C. Kurtzrock was toastmaster.

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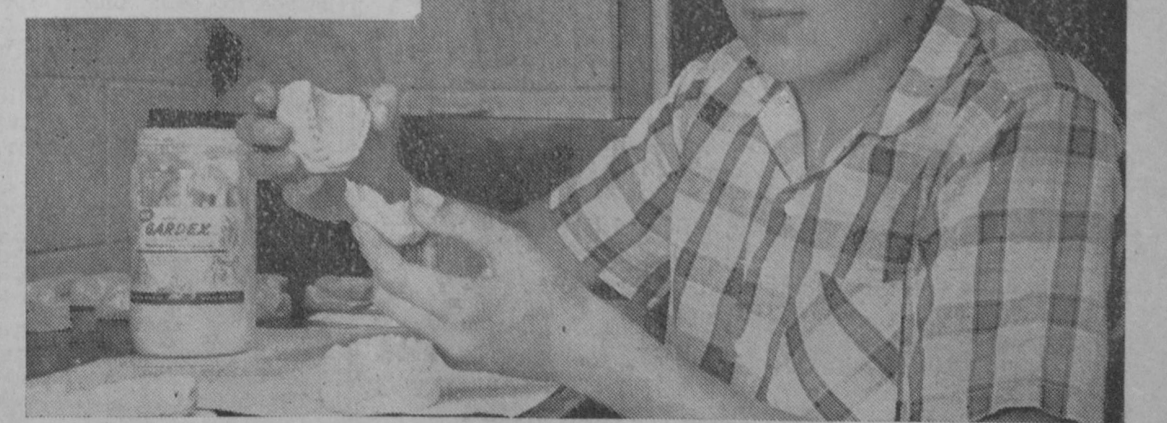

New Freeways Are Problems to Iosco Businessmen

(Part II of a series dealing with the current status of our vast tourist industry.)

Learning to live with the new freeways in Michigan is a problem shared by both the businessman located near an interchange and the one located in an area not serviced by the freeways. The freeways are here, now, carrying more traffic than the old roads used to carry. Increased traffic is fine if the cars are going to turn off and travel along Lake Huron on US-23; disastrous if they continue at 70 miles per hour into Upper Michigan and Canada or southward to Detroit.

Two methods can be used to make these cars stop in Iosco County: (1) Be assured that a good percentage of the travelers in these cars know about the attractions, beauty, facilities and hospitality that is offered them before the cars get on the big roads, and (2) make an effort to attract the cars off the big road as they approach the county.

Most people are on the big roads for a specific reason. They were motivated by something or someone; were invited somewhere, or it was recommended to them. Most of these travelers are not on the big roads just to travel on multi-lane highways. This is an important point to focus on as we try to get them off the big road and onto US-23.

Travelers who stop in Iosco County are doing so because they are reacting to advertising, to a publicity story or photograph or a personal recommendation by a friend. They stop on occasion for necessary travel services; such as, gas, food or lodging. They stop also because of a previous satisfying experience at a resort, restaurant, motel, hotel or attraction in your county and are "repeat guests."

The Michigan system of tourist advertising is the most efficient in the nation (a fact that comes from out-of-state). The Michigan Tourist Council in Lansing spends tax revenue dollars in a national campaign to call attention to our Water Wonderland attractions. The East Michigan Tourist Association spends a combination of private and public funds to attract people from their homes and onto the highways of Eastern Michigan. The community chambers of commerce in the county spend funds to attract travelers from their homes and while on the highway, to visit their respective community areas.

Individual businessmen and women (though not all of them) spend funds to attract travelers to their establishments. The system is well coordinated with little, if any, duplication of advertising funds spent.

In order for prospective Iosco County visitors to know about the attractions (natural and man-made), the facilities and the hospitality that you have, they must be reached by advertising messages in their homes before they leave on their trip—point of origin advertising it is called. The Michigan system is dedicated to this objective.

Advertising funds produce inquiries (people interested in a Michigan trip). Well prepared literature like the EMTA's "Playtime Country Guide" and the individual community and resort folders are sent in answer to these inquiries. That Michigan has had up to now, successful tourist business, is proof of this system's effectiveness. The literature is our personal "invitation"

to these vacation planners to visit Michigan and Iosco County. Our literature does a real job for us.

But, as more people take vacations in the USA, it takes more advertising dollars and increased quality and quantity of literature to attract even the same number of tourists to the state, to our region and to the county each year. We must meet this competitive challenge and get more inquiries and produce more literature to send to interested vacation planners. Once they receive their personal invitation to visit Iosco County in our year-around "playtime country," they are going to come and in increasing numbers.

We're going to get more inquiries on Michigan next year as a result of the increased appropriation to the Michigan Tourist Council this year. Will we be able to answer these inquiries adequately? We will if the EMTA has increased support to expand the quality and quantity of its literature. We will if the chambers of commerce receive increased support to publish more and improved folders and maps. We will if individual operators will produce and use more of their folders.

These are the methods we can use to assure an increased number of people knowing about our attraction, our facilities and our warm and friendly hospitality.

For those people who have been invited to travel in Michigan but with no specific plans, we can do something that will get them off the big roads as they approach the Northeastern Michigan and Iosco County. The highways must be properly signed by the Michigan State Highway Department, all of the highways. People locally and with the EMTA are working towards improving this signing by the officials responsible. Iosco County communities can maintain road signs in the vicinity of the big roads, designed to attract auto travelers off the freeways and headed to the Lake Huron shore route. These signs must be simple in design and must not become eyesores, requiring regular maintenance. The best signs are even landscaped with flowers and shrubbery. Efforts should go into few quality, community - sponsored signs, not into many small, poorly received signs that rapidly become highway litter and chase people away rather than attract them.

Finally, Iosco County folks, no matter what their occupation is,

should be salesmen and women for the county, even the kids. Iosco County needs to be sold to the public. Be proud to live in the county and say so to whomever will listen; by voice, by letter and by advertising message. Being proud of your community and area is the most important factor in making them successful tourist areas.

We can learn to live with the new freeway. It is going to cost us more of our hard-earned dollars in advertising and more elbow grease, but it must be done if there is going to be a tomorrow for our tourist industry.

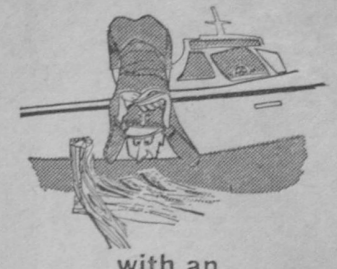

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perhaps one of the most enjoyed, recent, water sports is that of water skiing. Larger motors and faster boats have added to the thrill which has such an attraction to both young and old alike. Our last desire is to become a wet blanket in the face of this enthusiasm, nevertheless we who are interested in water safety cannot overlook the possibility of accidental drowning or injury through careless operation of the towing boat or lack of proper communications between the skier and the boat. Recognizing this, many states are legislating regulations requiring the towing boat to have two people aboard, one to operate the boat and the other to keep watch on the skier or skiers. Even where such a law is not enforced, the idea is highly recommended as a safety precaution. Then, there are the too-frequent cases of where the skier is so sure of his ability to ski and swim that the thought of wearing a life vest, jacket or belt seems repugnant. Or maybe it is "chicken" to wear any safety device. We had the experience not long ago of picking up a very exhausted skier who had flipped in deep water without knowledge of the towing boat or benefit of a life belt. A practice that seems to evade suitable explanation is that of boats towing skiers through groups of bathers or swimmers or anchored fishing boats. Such feats of "derring-do" may create great satisfaction to the boat operator or the skier, but how positive can they be that they will not run down a surfacing swimmer. Last summer, we saw the result of such an accident. It was not pretty at all. Let us give the impression we are against skiers and their boats, please know that we have great admiration for water skiers, adept and otherwise. Fortunately, the great majority are most careful and considerate of others.

Our plea is to the thoughtless few who would not hurt a fly but get so carried away with the sport they forget the all-important matter of safety on the water.

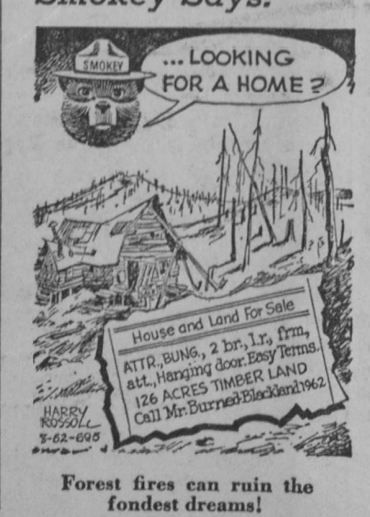

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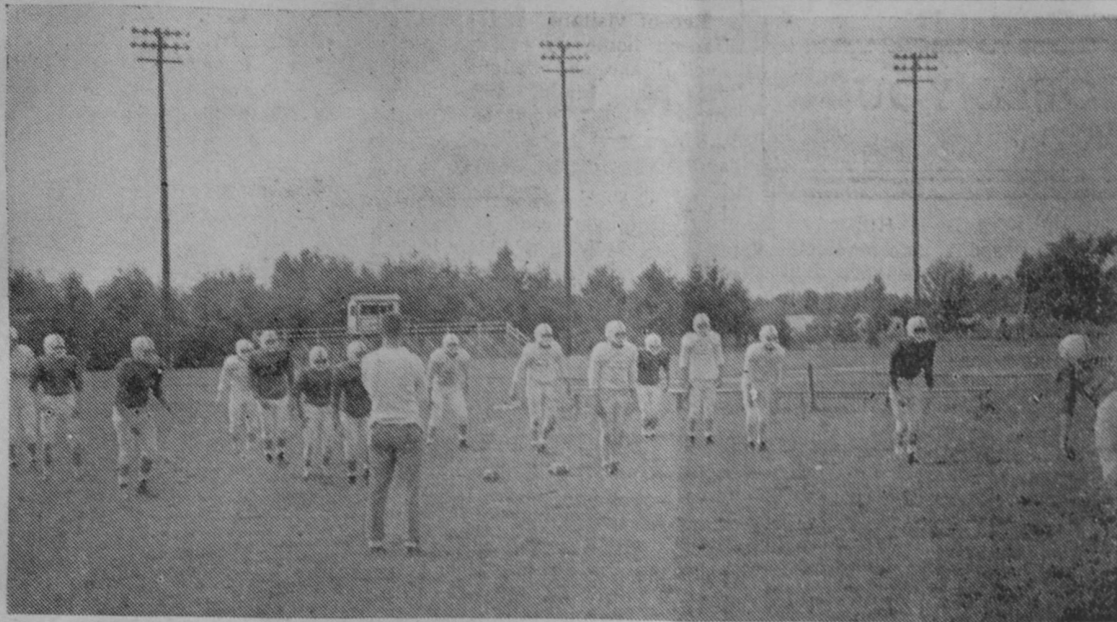

The polling place for the August 30 referendum on marketing quotas for the 1963 crop of wheat is announced by Burton A. Partlo, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. Wheat quota ballots may be cast from 8:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m. on Thursday, August 30, at the Iosco County ASCS Office, Room 203, Federal Building, East Tawas.
Eligible wheat producers in Iosco County should be sure to cast their ballots in this referendum. Growers eligible to vote will be those who produce more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1963 in any of the 39 commercial wheat states.
However, any producers who signed applications under the feed wheat provision permitting them to grow wheat for use as feed on the farm for 1962 will not be eligible to vote in the referendum on quotas for the 1963 crop.
Official notices of individual farm allotments for the 1963 wheat crop have been mailed to farmers and should be received in advance of the August 30 referendum. Growers who vote in the wheat-quota referendum will be the ones who make the decision about the kind of program to be in effect for the 1963 wheat crop. All eligible voters are urged to cast their ballots.

Contracts Awarded for Hot Lunch Program Supplies

Contracts for furnishing supplies in Tawas Area School's hot lunch program were awarded Monday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education.

Bids received for furnishing gasoline and fuel oil were read, but no action will be taken until the next regular meeting in accordance with past policy of the board. It was necessary to let food bids in order to start the school term.

Nelkie Dairy was successful bidder in furnishing milk and other dairy products in the school's lunch program. The firm's bid was 5 1/2 cents per half-pint of white milk, 20 cents per pound for cottage cheese, 85 cents and 45 cents per dozen for two sizes of ice cream bars.

Only other bid received was from Brink's, distributor of Dean's milk. Its bid was 5.7 cents per one-half pint carton of white milk, 18 cents per pound of cottage cheese and ice cream bars at 83 and 45 cents per dozen.

The school uses approximately 175,000 one-half pints of milk per year.

Michigan Bakery, Stanley Stasik, distributor, was successful bidder in furnishing bread, hamburger buns and tea rolls in the lunch program. Other bids were received from Hamilton's Tawas Bakery, Rainbow Bakery and Gase Bakery.

Standard Oil Company, Carl Helmer, distributor, was low bidder for furnishing approximately 30,000 gallons of gasoline for school vehicles. Helmer entered a bid of 14.2 cents per gallon.
