



"Y" Intersection at Lumbermen's Monument to be Eliminated

Many Improvements This Year—

Monument Draws Thousands

Lumbermen's Monument, tourist attraction—just as it has been since its erection in 1932. By actual count, some 6,200 persons viewed the monument

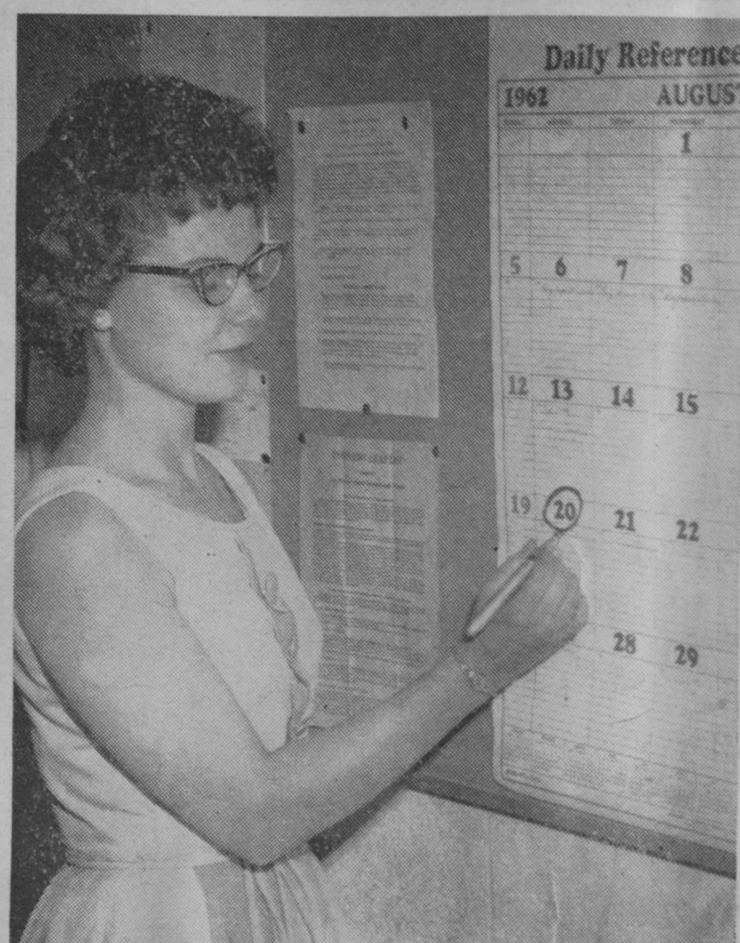
on July 1, a Sunday preceding the start of the tourist season in this area. According to Ranger Joseph Blake of East Tawas, a total of 160,000 persons would be a conservative estimate of those who last year viewed the giant figures

depicting the timber cruiser, sawyer and riverman of the lumbering era. Many improvements have been made on the grounds surrounding the memorial during the past year and others are now on the drafting boards of the United States Forestry Department, which has charge of maintaining the area. Since last April 21, new camping sites have been constructed near Monument Store, along with a 56-car parking lot, new rest-rooms, picnic area, roads and fireplaces. Engineering is now being completed on the revamping of the network of roads leading to the monument. In cooperation with the Iosco County Road Commission, the forest service plans to eliminate the present "Y" intersection which leads around the monument. Plans are to continue Monument Road on a direct line to River Road, with a three-way stop at the intersection. The present "blind" intersection has been blamed by police as one of the contributing factors in many auto accidents occurring there during past years. There has been one fatality at the intersection. Parking is to be removed along River Road, since construction of the new parking lot and a pedestrian walk is to be painted on the highway. In addition to these improvements, Blake said that there will be a complete redesigning of signs in the area to facilitate movement of visitors. The forestry department also plans to improve its 10-mile tour of the Huron National Forest, showing the multiple use of forests for recreation, timber, wildlife and water conservation. The expanded tour will direct visitors over the paved forest highway, fire lines, logging roads and a sand trail. Signs will indicate species of trees in the area along with other information concerning the forest. As an example of the present use by tourists, Blake said that it cost the forestry department \$2,600 last year for sanitary clean-up. "The majority of visitors are thoughtful in the use of rest-rooms and other facilities, but there are many who actually destroy public property. Replacement of damaged facilities and thoughtless littering of the area with trash is a drain on tax dollars," said Blake. Floyd Hall, forestry aide, has charge of the campground and is

stationed there on Saturday and Sunday to answer questions of visitors. Blake and Assistant Ranger James T. Hunt have over-all charge of the monument grounds.

Tawas Students Register August 20 for Fall Term

Registration for Tawas Area Junior and Senior High School students will be August 20-24, according to Principal Ernest W. Jordan Jr. This year, as usual, there will be no special days for each grade. Students may register on any day convenient to them, regardless of grade. Office hours are from 9:00 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. All students are expected to register during this time. If any student is unable to do so because of work or being out-of-town, he is requested to call the high school office and notify those on duty that he will be in attendance this coming school year. "Please register as soon as possible for if the class you desired is filled, you may have to substitute another one in its place," said Jordan. The principal most urgently requests that all fees be paid when registering. Fees established by the board of education are as follows: Book deposit, \$5 per family; art, \$3; shop, \$5; mechanical drawing, \$2. There are some special fees (band and chorus) which the student pays on entry into class. The only refundable fees are book, chorus and band. Workbooks to be used in high school will be paid for during the first full day's session. Any new students in the area are urged to call the office of the elementary principal or high school principal immediately.

To Receive Bids on New Parsonage

Grace Lutheran Church, East Tawas, will receive bids August 30 to erect a new parsonage on the corner of Lincoln and Newman Streets, adjacent to the church. Plans have been prepared by the architectural firm of Oeming and Waters of Saginaw. At a special, recent meeting, the congregation gave unanimous approval for the erection of the new home for the pastor. The church board plans to offer for sale or to have torn down the present parsonage on the site.

Tawas City Boy Hurt in Crash

A 12-year-old Tawas City boy, Walter Clements, received scalp lacerations, a fractured ankle and bruises Friday morning when he drove his bicycle into the path of an automobile 1 1/2 miles south of Hale. Investigating officers said that Clements, along with two other boys on bicycles, were headed south on M-65. A car driven by Edward B. Getman, Saginaw, also headed south, passed a car and then honked his horn when he saw the three bicyclists in the right-hand lane. Officers said the boy turned sharply to the left and was struck by the oncoming car. He was carried approximately 150 feet on the front end of the auto before it stopped.

Carolyn Evans Returns from Philippine Islands

Miss Carolyn Evans of East Tawas returned home last Thursday after a year of study in the Philippine Islands. Her return route of two months duration took her completely around the world. A 1959 graduate of Tawas Area High School, Carolyn is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. Arthur Evans of 500 West Bay Street. Miss Evans and four other college students were sponsored during their junior year at the University of the Philippines by the Methodist Board of Missions. The students were not supported financially but the mission obtained admission to the university. One of her fellow students was Miss Loretta Carney of Midland, who had also attended Albion College. On May 30, 1961, the two girls left Albion for Honolulu, Hawaii, and arrived at Quezon City, capital of the Philippine Islands on June 5. With a double major in English and history, Miss Evans concentrated on Oriental studies during her 12 months in the Philippines, particularly in the field of history and philosophy. She was also enrolled in a creative writing course. Although her college studies occupied considerable time, Miss Evans had the opportunity to learn much about the Philippine people during trips around the Island of Luzon. As a house guest of her native student friends, she said, "I found the people so warm-hearted, hospitable and generous in every way—they made you feel right at home." Although English is the official language used in schools, Miss Evans found some language barriers due to the fact that there are about 87 languages and local dialects in the 2,000-mile island system. "I learned a few words and phrases of Tagalog, the national language, and before I left I had a fair understanding of the native tongue," she stated. She said that the culture of the Philippines had been influenced greatly by the Chinese, Spanish and Americans. The islands had been a protectorate of the United States from 1898 to 1946, when independence was achieved. She said that the present generation of the Philippines is much concerned with education, improving living conditions and economics, although she noted many conflicting ideals. Miss Evans won her tuition at the university by playing second clarinet in the school orchestra. She also was a member of the Quezon City Philharmonic Orchestra, conducted by a graduate of the Rochester School of Music. After completing her junior year at the university, Miss Evans left May 31 on her return to the United States. The return trip was by way of Hong Kong, Singapore, Saigon, Cambodia, Thailand, Egypt, Italy, France, India and Luzon. (See PHILIPPINES, page 12.)

Burglars Caught in Act of Looting Cabin; Make Escape in Wooded Area

Sheriff's officers from Alcona and Iosco Counties, state police troopers and police dogs scoured a wooded area near Five Channels Dam two days last week for a man and woman caught in the act of burglarizing a cabin. The couple was caught by Donald Schlink, who operates a caretaking services in Iosco and Alcona Counties. He told police that as he approached Wednesday evening for a weekly inspection of a cabin near the dam, he found a pickup truck backed up to the cabin's door. As Schlink got out of his car to investigate, a man appeared at the cabin door carrying a rifle. Schlink said he pulled out an empty pistol and faked the burglar into dropping the rifle. The woman appeared a second later and attempted to retrieve the rifle, but she, too, was threatened back by Schlink and his empty pistol. Schlink, who was making his inspection trip with his wife and children, did not know what to do with the couple. He took out the rotor of the truck's distributor and then drove off to contact the sheriff. Sheriff's officers and state police troopers were dispatched to the cabin, but the couple had fled into the woods by that time. The truck was impounded at the Iosco County Jail. Registration of the vehicle was traced to a Bay City address. The search was called off Friday as police believe that the couple made their way out-of-state. Warrants have been issued charging Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Black of Bay City with breaking and entering in the daytime. This area has been plagued over the past few years with numerous cabin burglaries, many of which were completely looted of furnishings. The pickup in this case was loaded with food, clothing, firearms and whiskey.

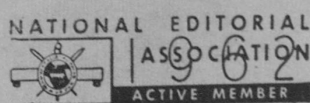

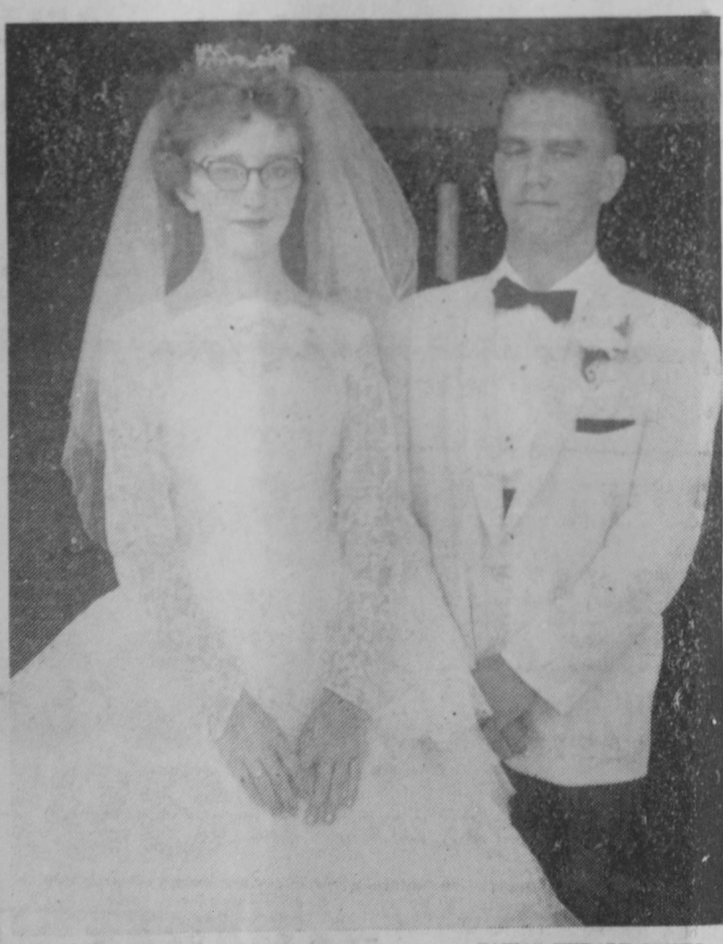

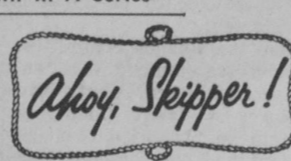

TRAILER CARE

By this time, many small boat owners have used their trailer to transfer and launch their boat quite a few times and midseason maintenance is in order. Here are a few suggestions of things to take care of at this time.
 To minimize the possibility of a flat tire carefully inspect each tire for indications of cuts or accidental damage. Check the air

pressure and add air if below proper pressure. If there is indication of unusual tire wear, look for a bent axle or overloading. Correct either condition to prevent tires wearing out prematurely. This might also be a good time to invest in a spare wheel and tire against the possibility of a flat far from home or a gas station.
 While you are working with the wheels and tires it is a good idea to remove the wheels and repack the wheel bearings with fresh and proper grease. Each time you submerge the trailer wheels in water, you may expose the wheel bearings and lubricant to deterioration inviting subsequent bearing failure.
 Most modern boat trailers are

equipped with tail and stop lights and turn signals. These, too, are subject to corrosion from submersion in water. Remove the various bulbs and coat the base and sockets with light oil or vaseline and this will eliminate the problem of bulbs rusting in their sockets. Naturally, burned out bulbs should be replaced at this time.
 Look over your towing hitch both on the car and the trailer for signs of looseness or excessive wear. Be sure that the electrical plug for your trailer lights makes good contact. Repair any broken welds on the trailer frame.
 Deserving of attention is your loading winch and cable. If the winch ratchet or pawl gives indications of unexpected release, re-

pair or replace it. Frayed cables should be replaced. A little oil on the winch working parts, boat rollers and on the towing hitch will be helpful.
 Check cradle padding for wear. Never let the boat rest on bare wood or metal. Check your tie-downs. If they look worn or weak get new ones.

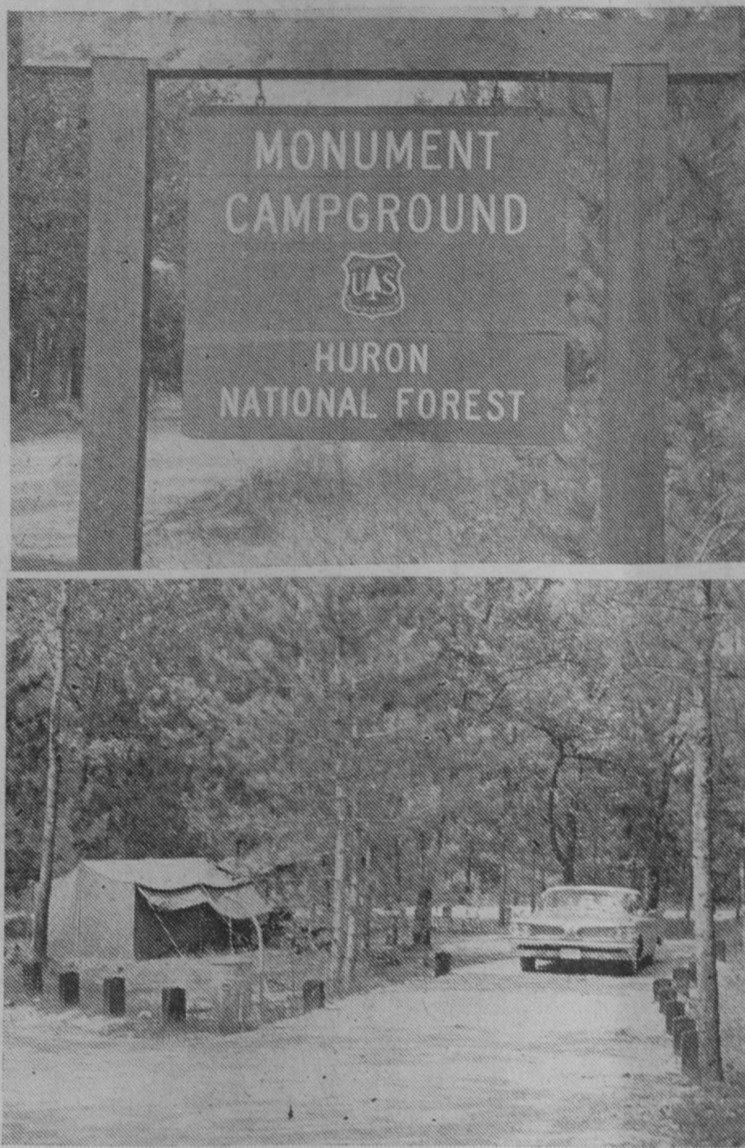
