### 1962 Income Tax Forms Available December 17

R. I. Nixon, Detroit district director of Internal Revenue Service, announced today that copies of the 1962 Federal Income Tax Forms will be available at the Detroit Internal Revenue Office and at Michigan's 35 local offices on Monday, December 17. Tax practitioners and other bulk users of tax forms can pick up forms at all offices on December 17 and where mail delivery has been requested, the bulk shipments will be received shortly thereafter.

Mr. Nixon said that the release date was two weeks later than normal because of the late adjournment of congress. Printing of the tax forms could not begin until the middle of October rather than the end of September starting date of 1961. Some of the forms are printed on the same presses that print the top-priority congressional record with the remainder being printed in commercial printing houses throughout the country. Despite the three weeks delay in the printing start-up, delivery dates are only two weeks late. When printing is completed on the 1962 tax forms, a total of more than one billion pieces of paper will have been produced and approximately eight million pounds of paper plus 60,000 pounds of ink will have been used.

Mr. Nixon emphasized that there will be no delay in the delivery of forms to individuals in the regular mail program. Taxpayers will receive their forms January 2 as usual.

**ABOUT HOLLY**

The popularity of holly as a Christmas decoration is not merely because the plant retains its prickly green leaves and bright red berries after winter's cold has withered other forest greenery.

Before the Christmas, Romans sent gifts of holly to friends to mark the December festival of Saturn. The early Germans used holly in an observance which marked the return of the sun from its southward pilgrimage.

In medieval times, holly was used as a remedy to treat a variety of aches and ailments. Some early American Indians even attached twigs of holly to their shields, in the belief that some special powers within the holly would make them more formidable in battle.

Holly, like mistletoe, is surrounded by legends and superstitions, dating back to pagan rites and rituals. We moderns attach no particular significance to our use of holly as a Christmas decoration—other than that it is "traditional" and "pretty." Yet, we use so much more holly than our ancestors used that today the plant has all but disappeared in some sections of the country.

## Legal Action Threatens Dam Construction

Establishment of a special assessment district to finance cost of constructing a Tawas Lake dam proceeds, in spite of a letter last week which threatened legal action by a group of property owners.

In a letter to the Iosco Board of Supervisors, Attorney T. George Sternberg of Bay City asked the board to withhold any further action until he could meet with members.

Sternberg said he represented 30 or more property owners in the Tawas Lake area who are opposed to construction of such a dam.

Petitioners objecting to the proposed dam, signed by 50 persons, were filed by Mrs. Peter Beckett.

No action was taken by the board until receipt of an opinion from Prosecuting Attorney William McCready.

Drain Commissioner E. H. (Bert) Stickey reported at the meeting that the county may be forced to start condemnation proceedings against one property owner in order to obtain property for the proposed dam.

Stickey said that one parcel of land had been donated for the dam site but no answer had been received on negotiations on a parcel from another property owner.

The board is awaiting an opinion from the prosecuting attorney before considering any action on condemnation proceedings.

In other business, the board authorized hiring Jessie M. Bolen and Nyle C. Burger as new managers of the county-operated Old Orchard Park. The two men are to succeed Howard Becker, who resigned effective December 1.

They are operating the park under Becker's contract until a new one is prepared by the prosecuting attorney.

The board authorized expenditures of up to \$460 for grading and graveling the approach to a new hangar at the county airport.

No action was taken on a recommendation by Supervisor Clarence McKenzie of East Tawas, who suggested writing a letter to State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie in regard to repairing shoulders of M-55 from Tawas to Hemlock Baptist Church.

McKenzie said that more than 20 cars had become mired in mud along M-55 during the past week.

Clerk George Prescott and Register of Deeds Albert Buch were authorized to attend winter conferences.

Authorization was given to purchase the Short property adjacent to the county jail. The county had held an option to purchase the property for \$13,500.

A total of \$5,500 had been set aside for this expenditure, \$3,000 from Old Orchard Park receipts and \$2,500 from the sale of old airport property. The remainder is to be paid from the general fund.

A transfer of \$8,000 was made from the general fund to the social welfare department.

The board passed a resolution authorizing the Iosco Road Commission to borrow \$80,000 to pay the county's share of constructing the new Oscoda-Ausable River bridge. This money is to be re-

authorized as the county's share of blacktopping at the airport.

Supervisor Henry Oates resigned from the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library Board and Supervisor McKenzie of East Tawas was appointed to fill his vacancy, which expires next April.

A contract to provide a new police car for the sheriff's department was awarded to William Look and Sons, East Tawas, low bidder.

## LOLLIPOP COOKIES

<i>1½ cups sifted confectioners' sugar</i>	<i>2½ cups unsifted* enriched flour</i>
<i>1 cup butter</i>	<i>1 teaspoon soda</i>
<i>1 egg</i>	<i>1 teaspoon cream of tartar</i>
<i>1 teaspoon vanilla</i>	<i>2 oz. semi-sweet chocolate morsels, melted</i>

Sprinkle with sugar, place on lightly greased baking sheet. Bake 7 to 8 min. Makes 5 to 6 doz. cookies.

¼ teaspoon grated lemon rind  
½ basic dough

### ENGLISH CHRISTMAS BREAD

1½ cups boiling water  
 ½ cup sugar  
 2 teaspoons salt  
 ½ cup butter  
 ½ teaspoon nutmeg  
 1 teaspoon allspice  
 1 teaspoon caraway seed  
 ¾ cup warm water (110-115°)  
 2 pkgs. active dry yeast  
 1 egg, room temperature  
 5¼ to 5¾ cups sifted all purpose flour  
 ½ cup washed, dried currants  
 ½ cup white or dark raisins  
 ½ cup finely cut-up citron

Measure boiling water into a large bowl with sugar, salt, butter and spices. Add yeast to warm water. Let stand 3-5 min. Stir to dissolve. Add egg. When water-sugar mixture cools to lukewarm, add half the flour, then the yeast mixture. Beat until smooth. Add half the remaining flour, mixing well. Blend in the cut-up fruits with more flour until sides of bowl are cleaned. (Dough will be soft).

Turn dough onto lightly floured board. Gently knead about 50 strokes, until smooth. Place dough in greased bowl, turning once. Cover with foil and a dry cloth. Let rise in warm place until doubled, 1 to 1½ hours.

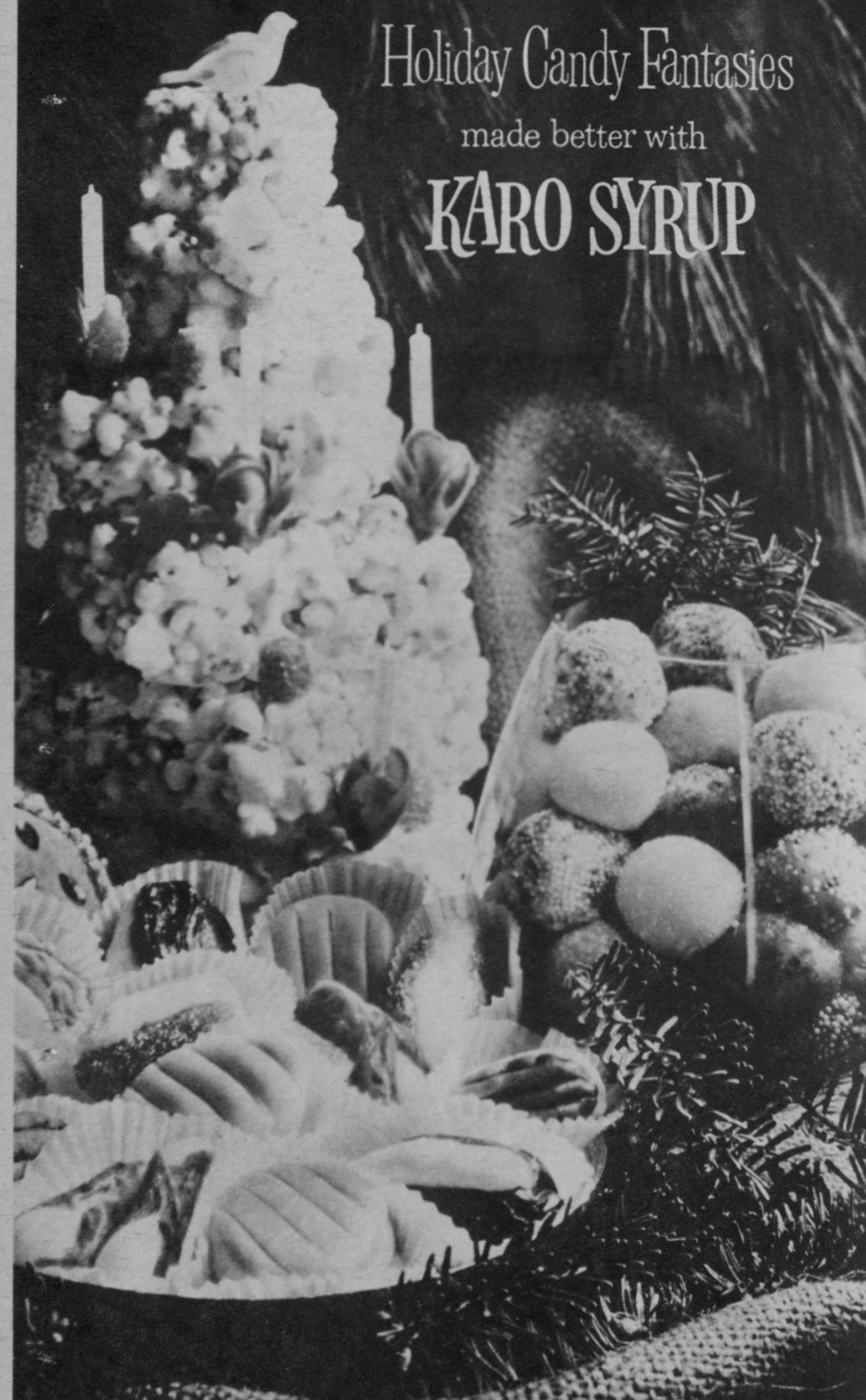
Grease a large baking sheet. Punch down dough. Turn out. Divide in two. Shape each half into round ball; place on baking sheet so balls don't touch. Let rise until almost doubled, about 1 hour. Bake in preheated 375° oven, 30-40 min., until well browned. Remove to rack; frost lightly if desired. Makes 3 round loaves. If desired use part of dough to fill 9 x 9 x 2-inch pan to make a square loaf, use remaining dough for rolls.

Sift together confectioners' sugar and cream of tartar; add egg white and flavoring. Beat with electric beater or rotary beater until frosting holds its shape. Cover with damp cloth when not in use.

#### \*\*Chocolate Frosting

¼ cup evaporated milk      (½ cup) semi-sweet chocolate morsels  
 1/16 teaspoon salt      ½ teaspoon vanilla  
 ½ 6oz. package

Combine evaporated milk and salt in saucepan, stirring constantly. Bring just to a boil. Remove from heat. Add semi-sweet chocolate morsels; stir until blended. Add vanilla.

#### HOLIDAY LEBKUCHEN

¼ cup honey      2¼ cups all-purpose flour  
 1¼ cups sugar      2 teaspoons cinnamon  
 2 tablespoons water      1 teaspoon cloves  
 ¼ cup orange juice      1 teaspoon cardamom  
 2 eggs, well beaten      1 teaspoon baking soda  
 1 cup chopped nuts      1 teaspoon baking powder  
 ½ cup mixed candied fruit  
 1 12-oz. jumbo package (2 cups) semi-sweet chocolate morsels

Combine honey, sugar and water in saucepan. Place over medium heat; bring to boil. Remove from heat; cool. Stir in orange juice, eggs, nuts, candied fruit and semi-sweet chocolate morsels. Mix together thoroughly flour, spices, baking soda and baking powder. Stir into honey mixture. Store dough in a tightly covered dish for 3 days at room temperature to ripen. Turn into greased and floured 15 x 10 x 1-inch pan. Bake in slow oven (325°F.) 35 to 40 minutes. Glaze with \*Orange Glaze while warm. Cut into 3 x 1-inch bars. Decorate with candied fruit. Yield: Approximately 4 dozen.

#### \*Orange Glaze

1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar      juice  
 2 tablespoons orange      2 tablespoons water  
 ½ teaspoon vanilla      ½ teaspoon vanilla

Combine all ingredients. Blend until smooth.
