

Auditor General Reports on Iosco County Finance

Auditor General Billie S. Farnum has released a report of the annual audit of the records and accounts of Iosco County. This report was made and submitted to the board of supervisors under the requirements of the Uniform Accounting Act.

The report covers the results of an examination of the records and accounts of all Iosco County officers and offices for the 1961 calendar year. It indicates that all

recorded receipts of the various county offices were fully accounted for and that the required county accounting records of the several offices were maintained in a satisfactory manner, with certain exceptions as indicated in the report.

The following matters were the subject of special audit comments, exceptions and recommendations:

1. The auditors inability to locate a surety bond for the county superintendent of schools was directed to the attention of the county board of education.
 2. The attention of the chairman of the county board of supervisors was directed to the improper practice of making travel expense advances (for conventions and other out of county travel) to members of the board of supervisors.
 3. Improper sales by members of the county road commission to their own agency and certain unsatisfactory accounting records and procedures were directed to the attention of the superintendent of the county road commission.
 4. A lack of diagnosis on certain medical orders was directed to the attention of the director of county social welfare department.
- All county departmental exceptions and recommendations were also directed to the attention of the chairman of the board of supervisors in a separate letter from the auditor general.
- It was also requested that action be taken to clear all audit exceptions and report to the auditor general on the action taken.

District Health Unit to Start TB Testing in Jan.

Starting in January, District Health Department No. 2 plans to offer tuberculin skin testing to all school children and school employees in the four-county district.

Dr. E. A. Hasty and the county nurses will soon visit the various schools and work out schedules for the above program. Although the number of cases of tuberculosis is gradually declining in Michigan, there should never be any complacency of the general public concerning this disease. Through the tuberculin skin test, tuberculosis cases can be found not only among children and school personnel but also among their associates. Discovery and prompt treatment of active cases can arrest the disease and also prevent its spread to others.

Before actual testing is started, Dr. Hasty plans to conduct a tuberculosis education program in the schools including movie films, literature and talks by health department personnel. "We hope to create enough interest in the school children, the various school organizations including the student council, the P-TA and faculty members to obtain 100 percent participation in this program," stated Dr. Hasty.

Hale Boy Scout Troop Receives Special Award

Boy Scout Troop No. 90, Hale, has been awarded a special certificate of appreciation for its participation in the 1962 "Mountain to Conquer" Christmas Seal campaign.

The certificate, signed by Lloyd Humberger, president of the Michigan Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association, and J. Irvin Nichols, executive director of the state Christmas Seal agency, commends the scouts "for outstanding service in improving community health in the fight against tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases."

A letter to Scoutmaster Jack Sausaman accompanying the certificate states: "Our association is grateful for the help offered by boy scouts throughout Michigan and the nation. We trust that this assistance will continue, and that the time will come when the people of Michigan will be able to say that the battle to conquer the mountain of TB infection has been won."

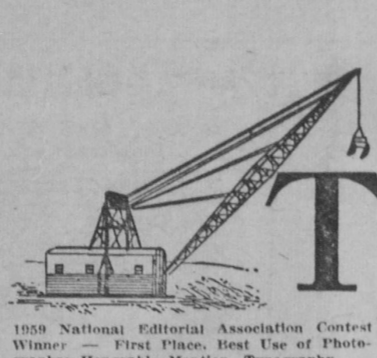
Gun Board OKs 17 Applications

Fire Wipes Out Two Tawas City Stores

Loss Estimated at \$85,000 in Early AM Blaze

An \$85,000 fire wiped out two Tawas City business places early last Thursday morning. The blaze was considered as Tawas City's worst in recent years and nearly 40 firemen from three departments battled flames for three hours.

Completely destroyed was Tuttle Hardware and Whitfield's Store. Both buildings were owned by George Whitfield, who estimated his loss at \$50,000. Tuttle's \$35,000 stock was a complete loss.

With the timely assistance of East Tawas firemen, the Tawas City Fire Department prevented the spread of flames to nearby Cabbie Hardware and Iosco Hotel. At one time, the entire north side of US-23 west of the hotel was threatened.

The fire was discovered at midnight by Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz and Edwin Habermehl, who were on their way home after a bowling match. Dense smoke was pouring out of the hardware building when Bublitz and Assistant Fire Chief James Lansky turned in the alarm and drove two fire trucks to the scene.

Firemen entered the building through a rear door, but flames were apparently confined to a space between two false ceilings. The blaze started in the center of the building and Tuttle later believed it was caused by a faulty light fixture which was used for a night light.

Because of the dense smoke and heat, firemen were forced out of the building and were unable to reach flames between the two ceilings. Attempts to break down the ceiling with a high-pressure hose were unsuccessful.

About one-half hour after its discovery, flames broke through the ceiling and the building was turned into an inferno as flames were fed by a large quantity of paint, thinner and other combustibles in the store.

East Tawas Fire Department responded quickly to a call for assistance and the two departments

poured thousands of gallons of water from two hydrants into water into the hardware building. Fire then ate its way through the roof of Whitfield's Store and completely gutted the interior.

Cabbie's roof broke into flames when sparks showered the entire business district west of Tuttle's. A strong wind from the northeast prevented flames from reaching the Iosco Hotel, but that building was scorched on the west side.

As late at 1:30 a. m., fate of buildings adjoining the two burning structures was still in doubt. Firemen, hampered by below freezing temperatures, pumped

considerable damage by fire. Whitfield also lost his stock in that blaze through smoke damage.

The building was then completely remodeled. Tuttle Hardware was considered as one of the finest in the area.

The site of these two burned out buildings marks the demarcation point for the worst fire ever to hit Tawas City's business district. In July 1919, the entire block from the corner of Mathews Street to the Iosco Hotel was wiped out.

Following that fire, the building occupied by Tuttle was constructed by the late Benjamin Sawyer. At various times during its more than 40 years of existence, the building had been occupied by a roller skating rink, billiard parlor, restaurant and grocery. Raymond Tuttle, late father of the present hardware owner, established an electric supply store in one-half of the building during the 1930s and it was later expanded to a hardware.

Whitfield purchased the building from Mr. Sawyer in 1944 and three years later constructed the smaller building which housed his store.

Keiser Named President of TC Businessmen

Hugo J. Keiser Jr. was elected president of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association recently and will take over his new office effective January 1. He succeeds Vernon Pugh, who has held that office for the past year.

Other officers for the coming year are Cecil Cabbie, vice president; Herbert Hertzler, treasurer, and William Tracy, secretary.

The association meets every Thursday noon at Vic and Zel's Restaurant.

In taking over as president of the group, Keiser urges greater participation by retail merchants. He said the organization would continue to give its full support to the Tawas Chamber of Commerce and needed the support of all local businessmen to further this aim.

Seek to Enlist New Members in C of C

President-elect Ralph Western and his new board of directors of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce held the group's final meeting of the year last Wednesday night.

The Great Story



HE CHOSE the quiet, inelegant atmosphere of a stable. History does not record, but we might safely assume that this stable was not the most pleasant of surroundings. It was a crude shelter for animals and as such certainly not suitable accommodations for human beings. Crowded as Bethlehem was at the time, it is safe to assume that other travelers had turned their backs upon the dank atmosphere of the stable and chose instead the chill of the night air. But the traveler from Galilee was forced to seek some form of shelter for a wife who was with child. Joseph, a carpenter by trade, nonetheless was a proud man. We must wonder how difficult it was for him to be practical and accept the fact that poor shelter was better than no shelter at all.



RARELY do we find in the writings since that time reference to the idea that the stable was dirty and unkempt. Instead, the manger scenes that have become so popular depict the stable always clean and beautiful. This is quite proper, for it is all so true that the greatness of the event which took place is such that there is room for no more than beauty in the eyes of the beholder. The precious few who shared in the Miracle of Bethlehem were made to realize the momentous event that was taking place. The child, wrapped "in swaddling clothes and laid in a manger" was such a glorious sight to behold that an ethereal beauty touched the whole surroundings. The dirty, unkempt stable, because it was the only shelter available to the weary travelers, was transformed into a holy piece of ground.



IN THE LIGHT of the star they came, three wise men from the East. No ordinary men were they, nor poor travelers. They had not come with the thousands to register in accordance with the wishes of Herod. These men owed no allegiance to Herod, nor to one another. Each man was a king in his own right. The bond between them was a bright and shining star which told of the fulfillment of prophecy. So it was they came, following the light of the star until it came to rest above the stable in Bethlehem. Humbly bearing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh, they came forward, these kings, to kneel reverently before the manger and pay homage to the newborn babe they believed to be the "king of kings."



SHEPHERDS came down from the hillside, where an angel had appeared to tell them of the great happening at Bethlehem. Bearing their simple gifts, these humble men came to kneel in the shadows of the quiet stable, side by side with the three kings from the East. As the magic star had guided the kings across many lands, the messenger of God appeared on the near hillside and instructed men of simple faith to come forth and acknowledge the birth of the Saviour. And, this is right, for He is the King of kings and the King of men; He is the King of the near and the King of the far. Generations as yet unborn shall be amazed at the vastness of His kingdom.

THERE IS one most impressive fact to consider when we think about the Story of Christmas. Let us call it the importance—or the sacredness—of truth. Is it not surprising that a story so old, so oft-repeated, and many times translated from tongue to tongue continues to remain the same? Centuries of telling and re-telling have not altered a single matter of site or situation. Many of the customs and traditions associated with the observance of Christmas may change with the times, often differ greatly from one country to another; yet the Story of Christmas is forever the same. It needs no embellishment. In humble surroundings Jesus Christ was born unto the world. Until He died on the Cross of Calvary His life upon earth was one of humility, faith, obedience and highest example.

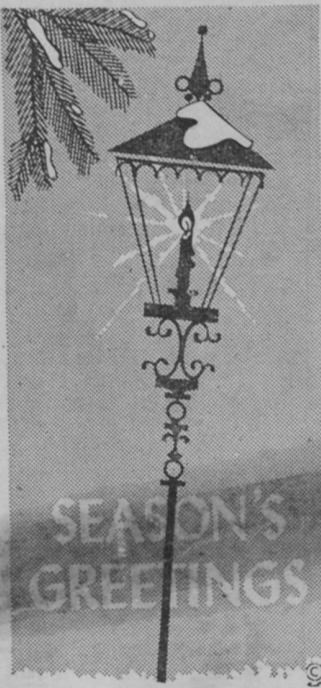

Picked at random, here are paragraphs about Christmas that have appeared in weekly newspapers:

The Page News and Courier, Luray, Virginia:

Once again this Christmas season Christians everywhere will rejoice within their hearts as they commemorate the birth of Him whose teachings of humility, faith, responsibility and love hold the answer to most of the world's problems.

A sublimation of human nature which resulted in fewer actions being motivated by greed, jealousy, and a Christ of selfish gain would make it mandatory for nations to observe a code of honor in their dealings just as responsible individuals must. It is not too much to believe that the spiritual force that created the marvel of the human mind will show the way to the wisdom and strength necessary to make this a better world—one of peace founded on fair dealing and trust between all peoples.

Reams of paper are covered yearly with attempts to put into words the exact meaning of Christmas. Stripped of its commercialism, Christmas means joy, peace and love. It is the joy of a child on receiving a long-desired, oft-promised sled or puppy. It is the joy of a father glimpsing his squirming, redfaced first-born. It is the joyous relaxation a mother experiences as she first holds her baby. It is the exultation we all feel as we think of the tiny Babe, nestled in His Mother's arms, bringing hope to the world.

Christmas means peace. It is the quiet contentment of a family circle gathered around a fireplace, or a Christmas tree or a lowly manger. May your Christmas be one of joy, of peace and of love.

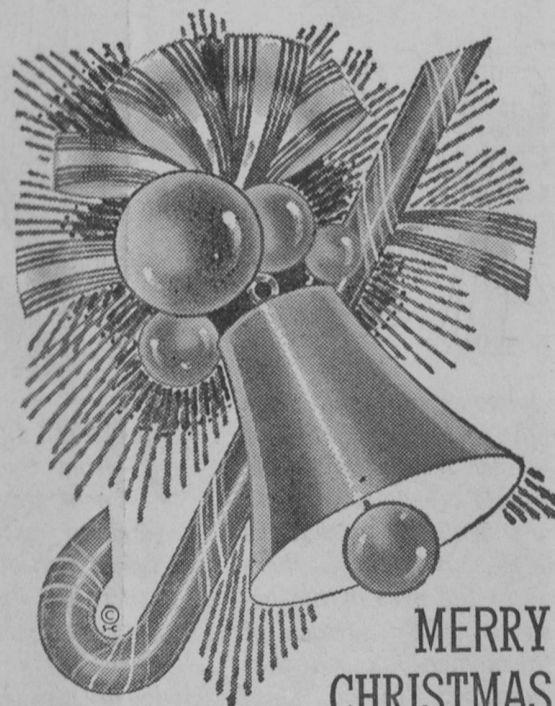

From inside each house, they are answered, also in song, but the doors do not open—until they reach the chosen house, where the doors are thrown open and lodging, or posada is granted.

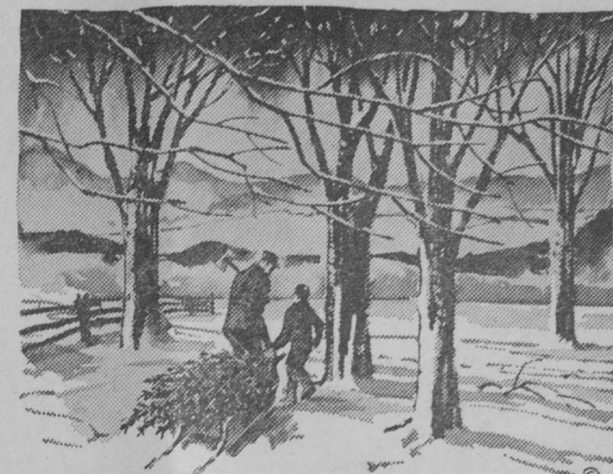

The pinata is an earthenware vessel filled with candies and sweets and then decorated gaily in the shape of some animal—an elephant, duck, rabbit, pony, etc. The pinata is suspended from the ceiling. Each guest is blindfolded in turn and given a stout pole with which to break open the pinata—while the other guests attempt to keep the pinata swinging out of reach. The person lucky enough to break the pinata is showered with all the sweets and goodies inside the clay jug.

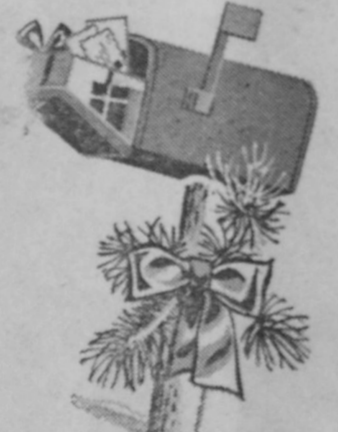

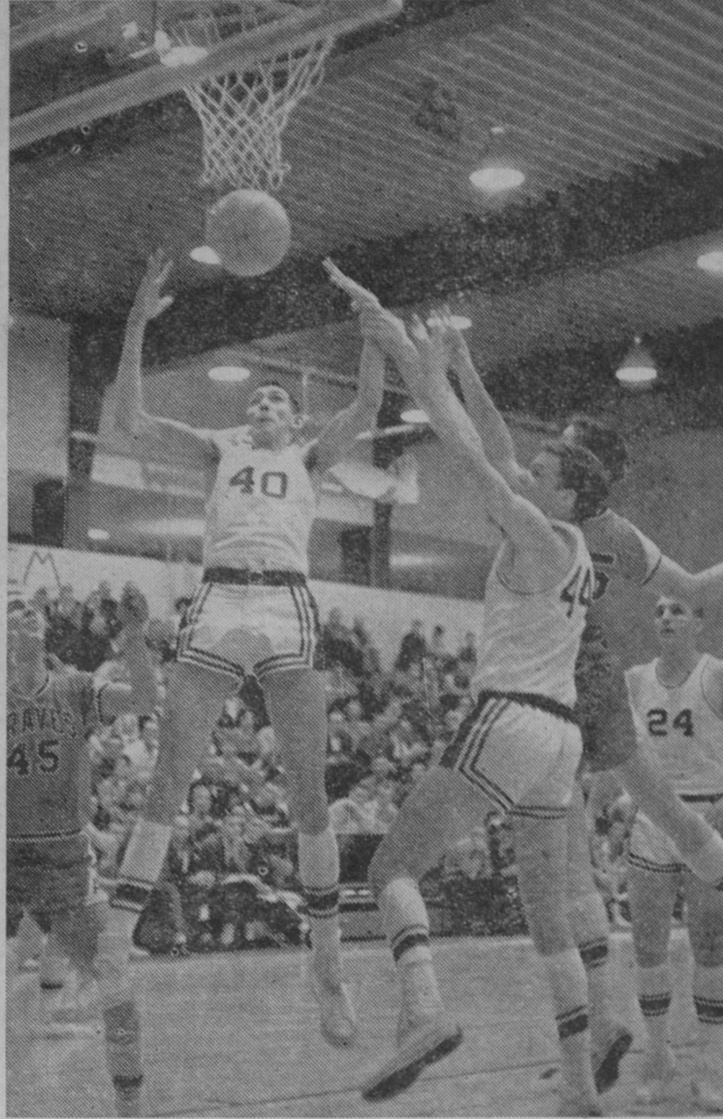
About 1,400 fans who jammed Oscoda's gymnasium saw a great team effort by the Owls as they gained revenge for last fall's gridiron loss to Tawas.

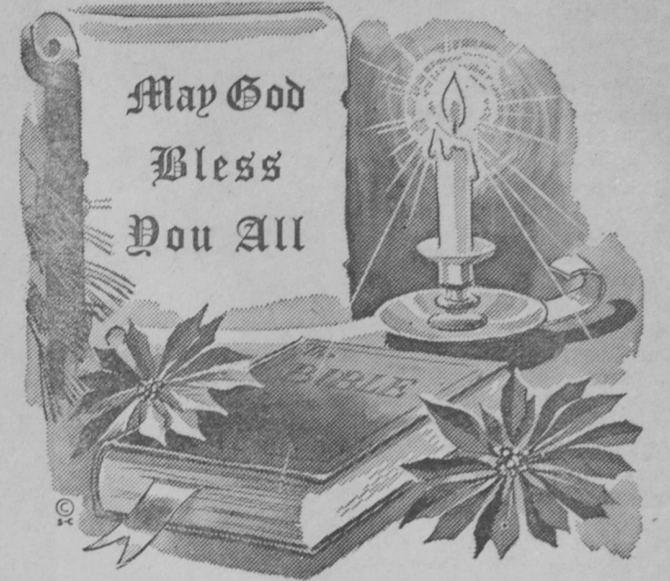

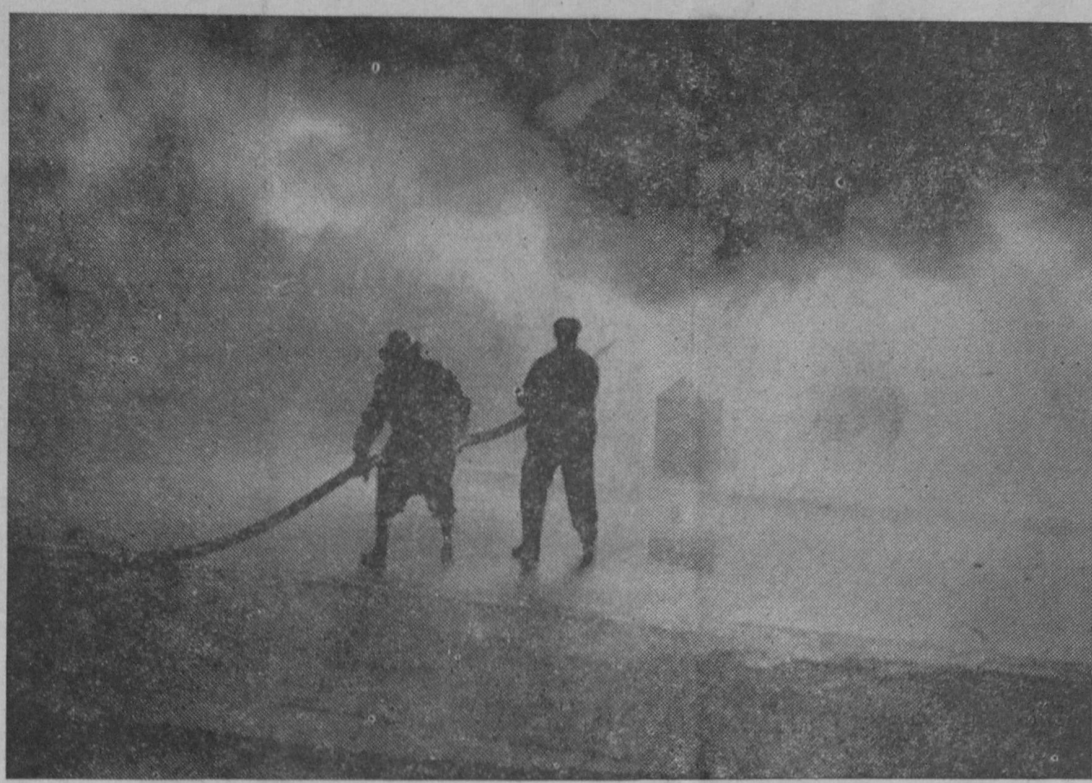
