A 31-year-old Whitney Township man, Thomas Hibner, died early Sunday morning when his trailer home was demolished by fire north of Au Gres. He lived alone.

Investigating officers said that three friends of Hibner returned to their home about 2:00 a. m. and found the trailer in flames. The trio broke out a window in the trailer in an attempt to rescue Hibner, but flames forced them back. They told officers they could not see Hibner or hear any movement inside.

One of the men told state police that the victim had trouble with his space heater the day previous.

TA Gym Classes are Body Builders

Taking a cue from a recent article in a national magazine, Tawas Area High School has increased the scope of physical training in its junior high and ninth grade gym classes.

In addition, boys in the freshman class are undergoing a complete physical testing and measurement program in order that comparisons may be made at the end of the semester.

Bill McIntosh and Lyle Berry, faculty members, believe that results of this increased attention to physical conditioning will be revealing by the end of the school term.

In addition to the usual calisthenics, much emphasis is being placed on such exercises as chin-ups, rope climbs, push-ups, wall scaling and running.

A new innovation was recently added to the program. This is a peg board which is a real test of strength. Standing at the base of the board with a wooden peg in each hand, the participant works his way up to a height of seven feet by inserting the pegs into holes spaced about six inches apart. He then lowers himself in the same manner.

Only three boys in the freshmen class were able to pull themselves to the top of the board when the unit was first installed. By last Friday, some 16 boys could perform the chore.

"Such exercises improves coordination and strength," said McIntosh. "In recent years, there has been considerable criticism of the physical condition of American youths, as compared to that of European youths."

"Much of this 'softness' can be attributed to our way of life—we do very little walking today. As a consequence, most youths do not get the proper exercise."

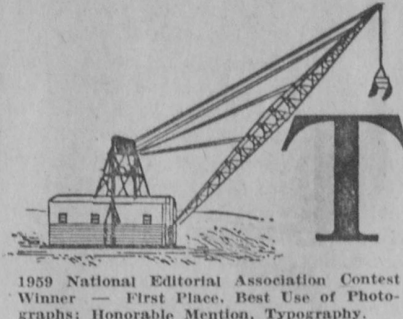
Both McIntosh and Berry said that considerable interest was being shown in the program, especially through the testing of freshmen. "They want to see how they can improve themselves, individually," was their comment.

In addition to this program, football coaches are also conducting a special weight-lifting program to tone muscles of baseball, track and football participants during the off-season. These sessions are held after school.

Special exercises are being used to develop neck muscles of football participants as a means of injury prevention. Nationally recognized methods developed by Ohio State University are being utilized.

No Change in Teachers' Salaries, Says TA Board

Salaries of Tawas Area teachers will remain at the same level as last year, according to action taken by the board of education Monday night.

Supt. Reynold Mick was directed to issue contracts to teachers on the same basis as the 1961-62 salary schedule.

Reason for the status quo on salaries, said the board, was that no additional funds were available for the school program and this meant it was impossible to raise the base pay.

Starting salary for a beginning teacher is \$4,100. The maximum that a teacher with a bachelor degree can receive at Tawas Area is \$9,450.

According to the schedule, teachers receive an additional \$150 annually for the next three years of teaching and increments of \$100 each for the next nine years.

Also, a teacher working toward a master degree receives \$10 an hour for the first 20 hours. Upon completion of work toward a master degree, a teacher receives an additional \$400 annually.

This would mean that the maximum salary a teacher with a master degree could receive would be \$6,050.

However, some teachers receive additional compensation for certain types of instruction and extra duties of coaching and special classes.

Some 18 teachers in the 52-member faculty have now reached the maximum amount of salary they can receive under this schedule. Eleven of the teachers are in the elementary grades.

Mr. Mick said that contracts would be ready to hand out to teachers in early March. First contracts offered were those of Ernest Jordan Jr., high school principal, and Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal. This action was taken following an executive session of the board.

In other business, the school is to enter into the necessary contracts for leasing driver-training cars during the summer months.

It was announced that the East Tawas elementary unit had passed the recent inspection of the Michigan State Police Fire Marshal Division.

Participation by the school band in the annual band day pro-

gram next fall at Ann Arbor was approved.

Representatives of Tawas Bay Insurance Agency, Iosco Insurance Agency and Myles Insurance Agency attended the meeting and discussed insurance on buildings which are to be renewed April 1. New policies are to include extended coverage on the buildings.

TC Supervisor to Retire; GOP Held Caucuses

Republican ward caucuses last Saturday night saw only one important change slated for the April 2 spring election. Approximately 41 persons from Tawas City's three wards attended caucuses and city convention at the city hall.

However, the Democratic Party did not hold caucuses this year and the April 2 election will be the first time in several years that there will not be two columns of candidates listed on ballots.

The one change saw veteran Second Ward supervisor, Fred Brabant, retiring from office. Brabant nominated Cecil Lamb for that office and he was endorsed by Second Ward electors.

Lamb announced that he would resign from the Tawas City Planning Commission in order to accept the nomination.

Only one other race developed during the night. This was in the First Ward where incumbent alderman, Arthur Wegner, defeated another nominee, Fred Cain, 10-7. The city convention again named Mayor George Tuttle as the Republican standard bearer. Also renamed were Clerk Walter Nelson and Treasurer John Hosbach.

Aldermen nominated were: Wegner, First Ward; Clyde Evril, Second Ward; Howard Hatton, Third Ward.

Supervisors named were: Clement Stephan, First Ward; Lamb, Second Ward; C. S. Everett, Third Ward.

Banker Slated to Speak at Tawas High School

Gerald Phelan, assistant manager of the Michigan Bankers Association, will speak before an assembly at Tawas Area High School Wednesday, March 7.

Phelan is in charge of the public information services of the MBA. He is speaking on the subject, "Your Local Bank—Financial Heart of the Community," a presentation illustrated with flip-charts and dramatized with the help of four volunteer students from the audience. He will also cover job opportunities in banking for high school graduates.

Ordinarily based at Lansing, Mr. Phelan is coming to the Tawas area from speaking engagements before high schools and service clubs in Alpena and Antrim Counties.

The program was arranged by Principal Ernest Jordan Jr. and Richard L. Harwood, vice president of Peoples State Bank of East Tawas.

From here, Mr. Phelan goes to Coldwater for talks before the Coldwater High School and the Coldwater Exchange Club.

Summer Resident is AMC Chairman

Named recently as board chairman of American Motors Corporation was Richard E. Cross of Detroit. The Crosses' second home is the Tawas Beach Club on Tawas Point.

Mrs. Cross was interviewed by a Detroit Free Press writer, Kathie Norman, and a feature story concerning the family's activities at Detroit and Tawas appeared last Thursday.

The Crosses joined Tawas Beach Club following World War II and they purchased the old dance pavilion as their cottage.

They are active members of the Tawas Bay Yacht Club and Mr. Cross, sailing the family's 26-foot Raven, is a frequent winner in yacht club races.

The new chief executive of AMC had been a director for eight years and a member of the six-

man policy committee for three years. He is senior partner in the law firm of Cross, Wrock, Miller, Vierson and Kelley.

Cross is a pilot although he does not now own a plane. During the summer months, he charts a plane to fly which he calls a "summer resort jitney service" between Detroit and East Tawas.

Their Tawas neighbors include Mrs. Lynn McNaughton, who is often visited by the John McNaughton family and the Benson Fords' children; Mr. and Mrs. John Watkins, and the Ard E. Richardson of Lansing and San Antonio, Texas.

Iosco Board Alarmed Over Billboard Policy

Iosco County Board of Supervisors has joined a state-wide movement which objects to the present policy of the Michigan State Highway Department of removing tourist guide signs and business identification signs from highway right-of-ways.

The Iosco board unanimously endorsed a resolution of the State Board of Supervisors during its one day session last week.

The resolution recommended that the highway department grant permits to any new or exist-

ing business for one identification sign along present and future highway right-of-ways.

Stating that signs which had been in place for a number of years had been ordered removed, the resolution pointed out there "is not a single case on record where such a tourist sign or highway identification sign had been the major contributing factor to a serious property damage or personal injury accident."

It has been the policy of the state highway department for the past 30 years to allow at least one identification sign per business within the highway right-of-way.

In many instances, the permission to have such signs was verbally implied by the state highway department's right-of-way purchasing agent. "These verbal commitments were a major factor in obtaining additional private property for highway purposes without resorting to condemnation proceedings," stated the resolution.

This fact, the resolution pointed out, saved the highway department thousands of dollars in legal and purchasing expenses for additional land obtained from private property owners.

Dusted Off for Centennial—

Old Photographic Plates See Light

Glass photographic plates which have not seen the light of day for 60 years or more are now being dusted off and assembled for use during the East Tawas Centennial.

Joseph Barkman, local lumber dealer who has spent years in collecting old pictures of area historical interest, is now sorting through several boxes of glass plates which were stored at his office in Tawas City.

These glass plates were exposed by A. G. Emery, who operated a studio at East Tawas.

Although Mr. Barkman has had photographic prints made from many of the glass plates in this collection over the years, the particular plates which he is now assembling are 4 1/4 by 6 1/2-inch cabinet size portraits of prominent Tawas residents. They have not been used since original prints were exposed.

Without question, this is the finest collection of historical material in the area. Mr. Emery was a master portrait photographer and the likenesses of prominent residents who sat before his camera should prove to be an interesting feature of the centennial museum.

Prints from these old photographic plates are now being made in the Herald's photographic department for Mr. Barkman.

These old photographic plates came into the possession of the Barkman family after the photographic studio was discontinued about 50 years ago. They were stored in a barn for many years.

Stored in wooden boxes which lacked tops, the plates collected a thick layer of dust and debris over the years. However, most of the plates were protected by individual envelopes which helped to preserve them.

While taking a break from his work of carefully sorting through hundreds of plates, Mr. Barkman said Friday that the centennial museum would be located at the Legion Hall on Newman Street. He will have charge of the exhibit.

"I don't know how much of this material I will be able to move from my office," he stated. "I would guess that several trucks could be kept busy for days."

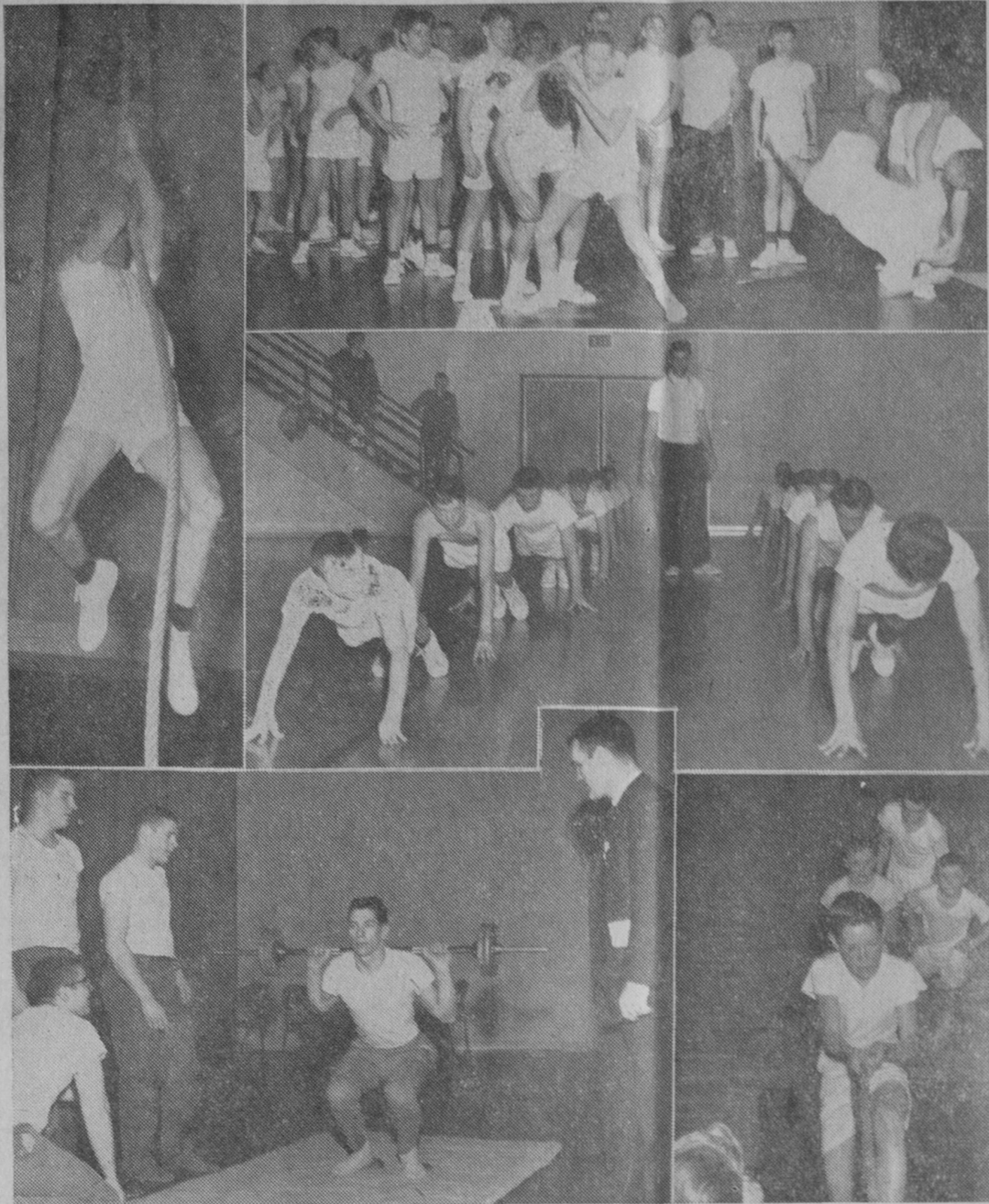

Mel Peters, discussion leader, led the school discussion and the report was filled out. It was agreed that children should be better disciplined in school.

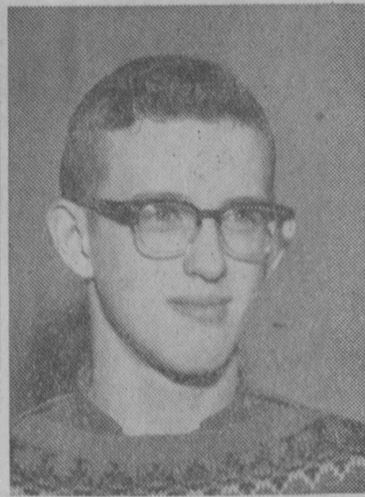

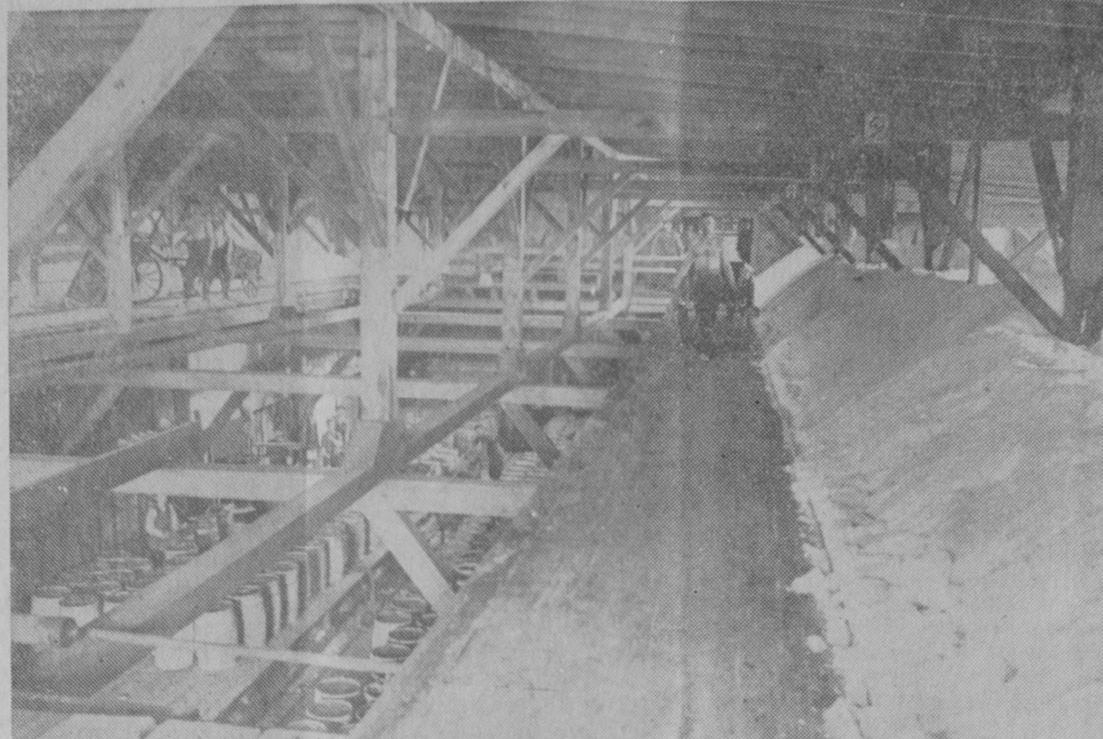

EAST TAWAS' CENTENNIAL YEAR ---- 1962



AN IMPORTANT BY-PRODUCT of the lumbering industry was the manufacture of salt. Before the days of modern refrigeration, large quantities of salt were used to preserve meat. The Tawas area had several salt blocks during that period of its history and one of the largest was owned by Holland and Emery Company at East Tawas. Fred Schmalzer of Saginaw was superintendent. This picture shows the interior of its mammoth building located on the site of the present-day community building. It contained five grainers, settlers and a packing house (shown above) which had a daily output of about 300 barrels of salt. The drill house was built over one of the best salt wells in the state. The firm had four brine tanks and a track ran from the block to a large shed on the commercial deck which had a holding capacity of about 8,000 barrels. The end of the lumbering era also spelled finish to the salt industry as slabwood used to fire boilers in the evaporating process was no longer available. The building was finally turned down after serving a long and useful life. —Joseph Barkman Collection.

or below. Incidentally, the stairway on a boat is a ladder. Be careful about asking someone out for a ride because nautically ride is to lie at anchor or ride out and weather safely a storm whether at anchor or not. If you are at anchor, the anchor line is called a rode. And the length of the anchor line or rode is called the scope. Sea room isn't your cabin on the boat but the fact that you are far enough away from land or other vessels for unrestricted maneuvering. Draft is compulsory entry into armed services but aboard ship it means the depth of a vessel in the water from the water line to the lowest part of the vessel. A board or plank in the side of a boat is called a strake. The one nearest the keel or backbone of a boat is called the garboard strake and the one nearest the deck is the sheer-strake. Steerage way is the slowest speed at which a boat will steer. Steady is an order to hold a vessel on the course she is maintaining. And a trick is seaman's language for a period of duty at the helm or wheel. The man at the wheel is often called the pilot but a sky pilot aboard ship is the chaplain. The wheel may also mean propeller, confusing, isn't it? If that is not enough, the pitch of the propeller is the angle of the blades indicating the theoretical distance the boat moves for one revolution of the propeller. But a vessel can also pitch in heavy weather. Pitchpole means when a boat is thrown end over end in rough water. If a vessel is swamped by a following sea, it is said to have broached. Now that you have some idea of nautical language, would you rather take up Spanish?

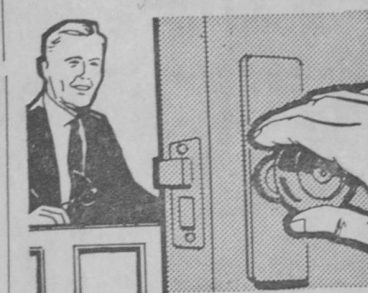
Four-Cent Stamp Commemorating Orbital Flight Issued

A four-cent stamp commemorating the first orbital flight of a United States astronaut was issued on February 20, simultaneously with the completion of the flight, according to Postmaster Martin C. Kasischke. The stamp portrays a capsule in space with a portion of the earth in the lower left corner of the design. The wording, "4c U. S. Man In Space," is superimposed over the globe and the "Project Mercury" is across the bottom of the stamp. The four-cent Project Mercury commemorative stamp is 0.84 by 1.44 inches in dimension, arranged horizontally, printed on the Giori presses in blue and yellow on white paper and issued in panes of 50. An initial printing of 100 million has been authorized. This stamp was released at 300 of the larger post offices throughout the country immediately upon the successful conclusion of the flight. However, the official first day cancellation was at Cape Canaveral, Florida, a temporary station of the Cocoa, Florida, post office, established for the one day. Provision has been made for collectors to obtain envelopes bearing the new stamp with the cancellation, "Cape Canaveral, Florida," the date and hour of recovery of the capsule, and the wording, "First Day of Issue," from the Philatelic Sales Agency, Post Office Department, Washington 25, D. C., at one-cent above the face value of the stamps involved. Thus the cost of a cover bearing a single stamp will be five cents, a block of four 17 cents, etc. Orders to the Philatelic Sales Agency for these special covers must include no other issues and outer envelopes should be endorsed "4c Project Mercury Cover" to expedite service. 100 Years Ago This Week... in THE CIVIL WAR
(Events exactly 100 years ago this week in the Civil War— told in the language and style of today.)
Union Troops Occupy City of Nashville, Tenn.
NASHVILLE, Tenn.—Feb. 28—The bloodless occupation of this Southern metropolis was completed today, with Union troops under Brig. Gen. Don Carlos Buell in full command. The invaders poured into the undefended city as its 30,000 inhabitants watched dourly. Fresh from rousing victories at Fort Donelson and Fort Henry, some 70 miles northwest on the Cumberland and Tennessee rivers, the Union troops presented a smart, orderly appearance. The occupation ended days of unrest, rioting and looting in Nashville, one of the last Tennessee strongholds for the south. AS DID other cities, Nashville launched a big celebration two weeks ago after the false report that Southern forces had been victorious at Fort Donelson. Actually, the rebels lost 2,000 men there. When word of the fort's surrender hit town, the citizens began to flee in the belief that Brig. Gen. U. S. Grant was advancing swiftly. Southern defense forces pulled out at once, on order of Maj. Gen. William J. Hardee, their commander. Gov. Isham G. Harris and other state officials left for Memphis with a trainload of official papers. The hysteria reached its peak with survivors of the Fort Donelson rout, led by Brig. Gens. Gideon Pillow and John B. Floyd, arrived with terrifying stories of bloodthirsty Union troops in hot pursuit. Col. Nathan Bedford Forrest and his cavalry, also in retreat from Fort Donelson, finally re-

Second In Series—
Where a Knot is Something Else Again
NAUTICAL TERMINOLOGY
How often have you heard someone remark that the speed of a vessel was 15 knots and you politely nodded your head in agreement but confidentially wondered just how fast the boat actually was proceeding. A knot is the unit of speed equivalent to one nautical mile per hour. Thus when a vessel covers 15 nautical miles per hour her speed is 15 knots. A nautical mile is 1.15 statute miles. A statute mile is the common measure of highway travel. So when a boat is traveling 15 knots, it is proceeding at 17.25 statute miles per hour. We usually refer to the man who paints our house as the painter but nautically it means a line by which we tow or make fast a small boat. Aboard a boat we don't refer to a partition as a wall, it is a bulkhead. The inside sheathing or planking of the hull is called the ceiling. And when we weigh anchor, we lift it off the bottom, not put it on a scale to see how heavy it is. A fathom is a measure of length containing six feet. A fathometer is an electrical sound apparatus measuring the depth of the water. And a log is not a felled tree but a record book of the ship's activity. A holiday aboard ship is not a maritime vacation but a space unintentionally missed while painting or cleaning. The kitchen on your boat is known as the galley and of all things, the smokepipe is the Charlie Noble. Equipment for serving meals is called mess gear. If you are neat aboard ship, you stow your gear. On your boat you don't go upstairs or downstairs, you go above

NEW YORK, N.Y.—March 3—Extensive preparations were being made today for the departure from this port of the U.S.S. Monitor, the Union Navy's first ironclad man of war. The 172-foot vessel, launched five weeks ago after a whirlwind 16-week construction period, carries two 11-inch guns housed in armored turrets. It has a 41-foot beam and a 10-foot draft. Its construction was ordered after Union officials learned of Confederate plans to launch an ironclad as a blockade runner. The Southern ship, the Merrimack, is a former 3,500-ton, 40-gun Union frigate that was scuttled last Spring when Union forces were swept out of Norfolk. 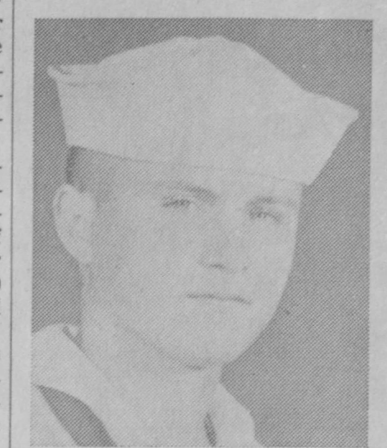

Following a 20-day visit to Perth, Australia, Martin sent several newspapers to his parents which gave an account of the submarine's visit to that port.

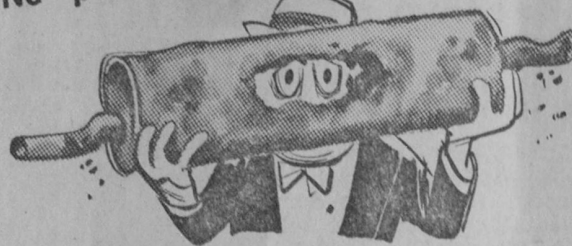

Supervisors Favor State Lottery; Concur With Lapeer County

Iosco County Board of Supervisors apparently favors a state lottery as a means of raising money to finance public education. By an eight to five roll call last Wednesday, the board concurred with a resolution from Lapeer County calling for deleting provisions in the state constitution which prohibits lotteries. The board's judiciary committee brought in a resolution which did not favor the resolution. However, the majority did not accept the committee's recommendation on the following roll call: No (voting against the committee's recommendation): Burdge Ashton, William Creamer, C. S. Everett, Edward Gerard, L. S. Little, Glenn Long, Henry Oates, William White; yes: Theodore Bellville, George Blust, Robert LaVoy, Charles Smith, George Webb. In other business, the board went on record as approving passage of House Bill No. 411, which would authorize the state department of conservation to sell submerged lands in Saginaw Bay to National Gypsum Company. This bill was introduced into the legislature by Rep. James P. Mielock of Whittemore. The board's resolution stated that passage of the bill would be in the best interest of Iosco County. The board saw a demonstration of an electric computer which, it was said, would greatly reduce the amount of time in computing fractional tax rates. Cost of the machine would be \$11,490. It has been tabled for further discussion. A summary on civil defense activities in the county during the past year was given by Francis Block, assistant director, and Undersheriff Leon Putnam, director.

Bloodmobile to Visit Iosco County In March

Final plans are now being made for the visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile in March. The unit is to be at Oscoda March 29 and at the St. Joseph Social Center, East Tawas, March 30.

At a meeting of Iosco Chapter last Tuesday night, appointment of Mrs. Robert Richardson as chairman of the blood drive for the Oscoda area was approved. Mrs. George Rose, fund drive chairman, announced that the annual drive for funds had been postponed until the week of May 1-8. First contribution to the Red Cross fund was received in the mail Monday from Emanuel Lutheran Ladies Aid Society of Tawas City. A \$5 check was mailed by Mrs. Arthur Ropert, treasurer. The chapter approved payment of expenses for Francis Block, who has been conducting first aid courses in the county through the joint cooperation of the civil defense unit. The committee is to investigate the possibility of renting office space at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce building. Plans were announced for the chapter's swimming instruction program next summer.

National Fallout Shelter Survey In Iosco March 8

The national fallout shelter survey program to identify existing structures offering potential value as public shelters is progressing at a sharply accelerated pace throughout Michigan. Preliminary identification and mapping of tentatively selected structures has been completed for the entire state. Architectural firm in charge of contacting property owners in Iosco County is J. and G. Davenport Company. This survey is to be made March 8. Phase I of the survey, which includes physical examination of buildings and the collection of structural information for computer evaluation, is proceeding rapidly toward a target completion date of April 30.

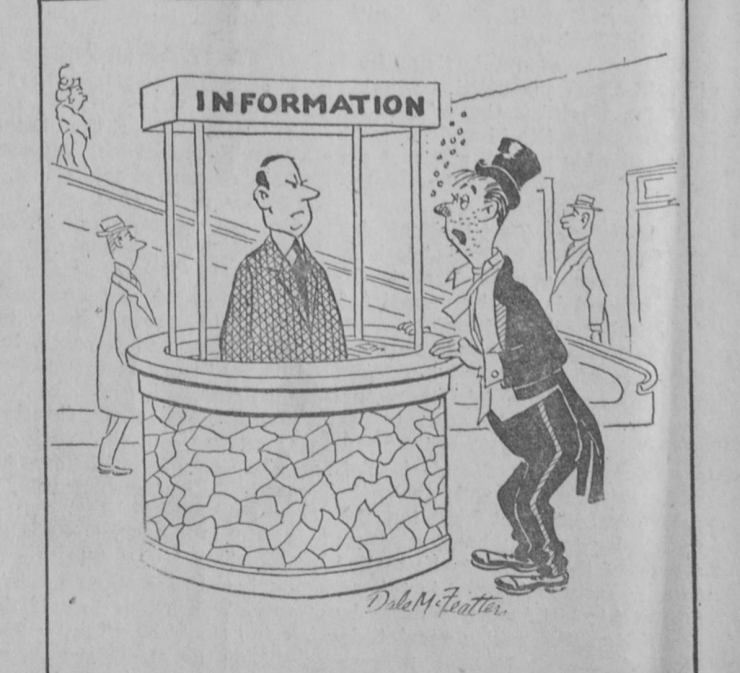
