

City Employees Receive Wage Hike at E. Tawas

East Tawas Council set up a new wage schedule for hourly and salaried employees at its meeting Monday night. In addition to increasing wages, a new vacation and sick leave policy was established.

Lewis Besancon, office manager, received a \$20 per month increase

in salary, while \$25 per month increases were granted to City Superintendent Paul Robert, Chief of Police Harry Pelton and Patrolman George Duff.

City laborers received a five-cent-an-hour pay increase, with time and a half on seven holidays.

These wage increases were effective January 1.

Salaried and hourly employees are to receive an one week vacation after one year of employment and two weeks after four years on the job.

Salaried employees are to receive one week of sick leave and one additional week's leave each year up to four years. At the end of four years, salaried employees would be eligible for four weeks of sick leave. Work of the absent employee would be maintained by others in the city office.

Another benefit received by city employees is that the city pays cost of Blue Cross insurance for each individual.

In other business, the council authorized hiring of a new employee to act as working foreman under Superintendent Robert.

City Attorney J. Richard Newman is to write a letter to the state park manager and department headquarters requesting a change in parking regulations at the foot of Newman Street.

The city maintains that parking of trailers in front of the registration office causes a traffic problem during busy months.

Councilmen also objected to the conservation department's parking policy near the community building. Autos which do not have one of the state's park permits affixed to the windshield are ticketed in the parking lot.

F. G. Berzhinski Died Tuesday; East Tawas JP

Frank G. Berzhinski, 78, justice of the peace at East Tawas, died Tuesday morning at Tawas Hospital. He had been in ill health for some time and had entered the hospital Saturday.

Funeral services will be held at St. Joseph's Catholic Church, East Tawas, Friday morning, 10 o'clock. The Rev. Fr. Henry Eichholt will officiate and burial will be in the church cemetery. Rosary service will be at Jacques Funeral Home Thursday, 8:00 p. m.

Born October 19, 1883, in Germany, he came to this country at the age of 1 1/2 years with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank Berzhinski.

He spent two different periods of employment with the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company, the last from 1922 until 1929 as an accountant in the office at Tawas City.

He married the former Celia Tobin, also a former employee of the railroad company, on November 22, 1928.

Employed by the United States Forest Service during the early 1930s, he later established the Merchants Credit Bureau at East Tawas. During World War II, he was a member of the Iosco Selective Service Board.

The Berzhinskis then moved to Bay City. He was employed by the United States Department of Labor and later for the Office of Price Administration from 1943 until 1947.

Prior to his retirement, he had worked five years for the F. M. Pigott Company at Bay City.

Mr. and Mrs. Berzhinski returned to East Tawas about three years ago. Voters of that community elected Mr. Berzhinski to the office of justice of the peace last April.

He was a member of St. Joseph's Church, and its Holy Name Society. He was also a member of Bay City and Tawas Councils of the Knights of Columbus.

Besides his wife, he is survived by one son, Sgt. James D. Berzhinski of Fort Detrick, Maryland; one daughter, Mrs. Carroll Whitney of San Diego, California; two grandchildren; two great grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Joseph St. Aubin of Tawas City and Mrs. Clarence Newcombe of Bay City.

Senator Escaped Serious Injury

State Sen. Harold B. Hughes, 50, escaped with minor injuries in an automobile crash at the height of a windswept snowstorm Friday night.

Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers said that the mishap occurred on M-55 about four miles west of Tawas City at 10:40 p. m. Hughes, a Clare resident, was treated for minor bruises and cuts and released from Tawas Hospital.

Authorities said the accident involved another auto being towed from a ditch by a wrecker. Hughes was quoted as saying he thought the wrecker, stopped in the middle of the road, was a snowplow.

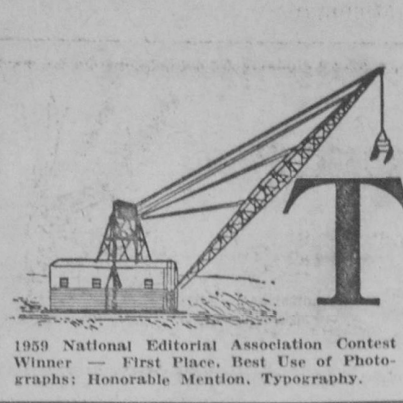
Hughes told police he swerved to the right of the wrecker and smashed into the auto being pulled from the ditch.

Hale Girl Reigned Over 24th Winter Carnival

Carol Alderton, Hale Area High School junior, was crowned 24th annual Silver Valley queen Sunday afternoon at the winter sports park nine miles west of the Tawas.

The 16-year-old brunette received her crown from Bob Reynolds, Detroit radio station sports announcer, who has been officiating at the coronation of winter sports queens here since 1953.

Members of the Silver Valley

queen's court include Sharon Siller, Tawas Area High; Judy Carpenter, Whittemore-Prescott Area, and Lynn Baker, Oscoda Area. All but Miss Baker were homecoming queens for their respective schools. Oscoda Area seniors named their candidate last week.

Carol and her court were introduced from a woodland stage near the park's ski area chalet by Reynolds and Walter Rowley of Mt. Pleasant. About 500 persons were on hand to watch the ceremony while an additional 1,000 or more made use of the area's ski runs, toboggan slides and other facilities.

Judges for the Silver Valley queen selection were Virgil O'Dell, WNEM-Television sports announcer; Ken Barnes, Clare, and Samuel Fair, Valley Steel Casting Company, Bay City.

Winter sports activities over the week-end started with the traditional fish fry Friday night for about 200 residents of Northeastern Michigan. This affair was held at the Holland Hotel.

Activities Saturday and Sunday included exhibitions by members of the Silver Valley Ski Patrol and archery demonstrations.

Although snow conditions were poor Sunday because of mild weather, all winter sports facilities were in operation. One of the most popular with visitors were bobsled rides offered by Art Thorne of Trails End Dude Ranch.

L. G. (Ladd) McKay said Sunday that plans for the 25th annual winter sports carnival next year were already under discussion.

It is hoped that the committee may see its way clear to expand the carnival week-end program. Invitations are to be sent to persons who have officiated at the crowning of Silver Valley queens in past years.

He said that a special program committee would be organized sometime during the next few weeks.

The winter sports chairman also announced that the Silver Valley ski area would be open Friday night for "moonlight" skiing. Facilities will be in operation from 5 to 10 o'clock. The ski area chalet will be open for hot snacks.

A rope on the intermediate tow, which parted late Sunday afternoon, is expected to be replaced sometime this week.

Another up-coming event is the third annual winter sports car week-end February 17-18 at Long Lake. This is to be sponsored by the Hale Lions Club and Huron Sports Car Club. Included in the program will be a snow gymkhana and an ice run. Trophies will be awarded.

Building Permits and Election Booths ---Signs of Spring?

The first two building permits issued during 1962 were read at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council by Supt. Reginald Bulbitz.

Applications approved since January 1 were as follows: Arnold Kuerbitz, 228 Second Street, replace three windows, \$150; Keith McComb, 716 Lake Street, make 12 by 19 addition, \$1,000.

In other business, the council amended its recent resolution applying for urban planning assistance under the federal housing act.

A \$258 inspection charge was not included in the original application. The city's share of this inspection fee, \$86, brings its cost to \$5,668. Remainder of the \$17,003 total cost would be borne by the federal government.

Acting on the request of City Clerk Walter Nelson, the council authorized purchase of new collapsible voting booths for the city hall. Cost of two four-section booths would be approximately \$200.

Nelson, who said it was the first time he had ever made such a request to the council, complained that the old wooden booths were a disgrace to the city.

In addition to the booths being in a rickety condition and liable to collapse while voters were in them, Nelson maintained that entirely too much time was spent in assembling them for each election.

National Gypsum to Appeal Judge's Intervention Ruling

National Gypsum Company is to appeal an Iosco Circuit Court ruling which allowed intervention of 10 plaintiffs in current damage claim litigation against its Port Gypsum installation.

A statement of proceedings and facts in regard to the application for an appeal to the state supreme court was settled Monday.

Trial on this suit had been scheduled for later this month but, due to the proposed supreme court appeal and other factors, it has been postponed indefinitely.

The appeal by National is based on Judge Allan C. Miller's order authorizing so-called "Sternberg plaintiffs" to enter the suit.

The company maintains that these petitioners have the right of court action, but not in the same relationship as original plaintiffs.

Judge Miller told attorneys present that would be helpful to "keep moving" on the case, but he could see no need to proceed too rapidly because of this appeal.

Late Law Professor Wills \$500,000 to Education

Biggest charity gift in Lapeer County history was revealed last week with the filing of the will of the late John R. Rood. Nearly all of his estate, which is valued at almost \$500,000, was left to create a John R. Rood fund.

The Rood estate consists of two apartment houses in Detroit, land in Lapeer City and Lapeer Township, 1,400 acres near Tawas City and stock.

The income from the fund will be used for two broad purposes:

1. A study of ways to "get goods from the producer to the consumer at less cost."
2. Diffusion of "general education on the subject of political science."

The ex-law professor and scion of a pioneer Lapeer family died December 23 at the age of 93. The 2,300-word will was written by Rood himself and dated April 16, 1945.

For many years, Rood divided his time living at his ranch on Townline Road and at Lapeer. In addition to the raising of cattle, hogs and sheep, he devoted much of his time spent at the ranch in writing. He was author of several law texts which are still in use and considered an authority on

This new contract establishes the fire chief, acting chief or mayor as the persons responsible for calling on aid from either city's fire department when needed.

In case of a commercial or industrial fire, the acting chief is to notify the other city's fire department immediately.

When there is a fire alarm in outlying townships served by the two cities, the department not making the run would be notified of that fire and would act on a stand-by basis to answer calls in either city.

A fixed charge of \$50 per call was established to cover cost of payroll in case of assistance. An accounting is to be made each September on such calls.

In addition to this contract, East Tawas signed an agreement Monday night to furnish fire protection to Baldwin Township.

Recognized by MSU-

Iosco Farmer Tops in NEM

According to indexes compiled recently by farm specialists of Michigan State University, an Iosco County farmer continues to lead growers in a seven-county area of Northeastern Michigan for top crop yields.

Waldo J. Curry, Tawas Township dairy farmer, received recognition Thursday night at Kellogg Center on the MSU campus. With a crop index of 158.100, Curry topped other farmers in Iosco, Arenac, Ogemaw, Gladwin, Isabella, Clare, Midland and Bay Counties.

Curry was unable to take time off from his busy schedule to accept this recognition at MSU. He was represented at the Michigan Farmer's Week banquet by his son, Robert, a freshman at MSU. Robert works on his father's farm during the summer months.

According to County Agent Marvin Davenport, yields on the Curry farm during the past year are as follows: Hay, 3 1/2 tons per acre; corn silage, 12 tons per acre; oats, 52 bushel per acre.

This was the third year in succession that Curry had led Area Nine farmers.

With hay being the "king" of all crops in the Iosco County area, yields from the Curry farm were amazingly high. The average for other farms in the county is 1.57 tons of hay per acre.

"This record has been achieved by excellent management of hay fields," states Davenport. He said that the same results could be obtained by farmers who follow similar practices.

With a herd of 30 registered Holstein cows, Curry feeds his dairy cattle from a dry lot. His farm is located in M-55.

Fields on this farm yield three hay crops each year. Using a chopper, the first crop is cut in the spring while still green and fed directly to cattle. The field is immediately fertilized using a grain drill.

A second crop, which gets the full benefit of this fertilization, is ready by July. This is top quality hay and not as coarse as the first crop. A third crop is ready to be chopped by early September.

Davenport said that because of the good growing weather for hay, this area is particularly suited for beef and dairy cattle production.

"I hope other farmers in this area will study management practices at the Curry farm," said Davenport. "Beef and dairy cattle raisers can receive a great deal of benefit from this system."

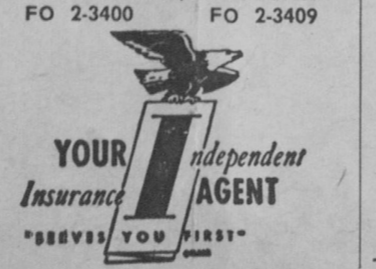

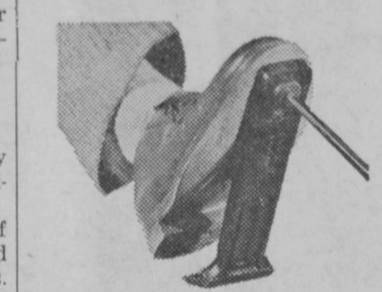

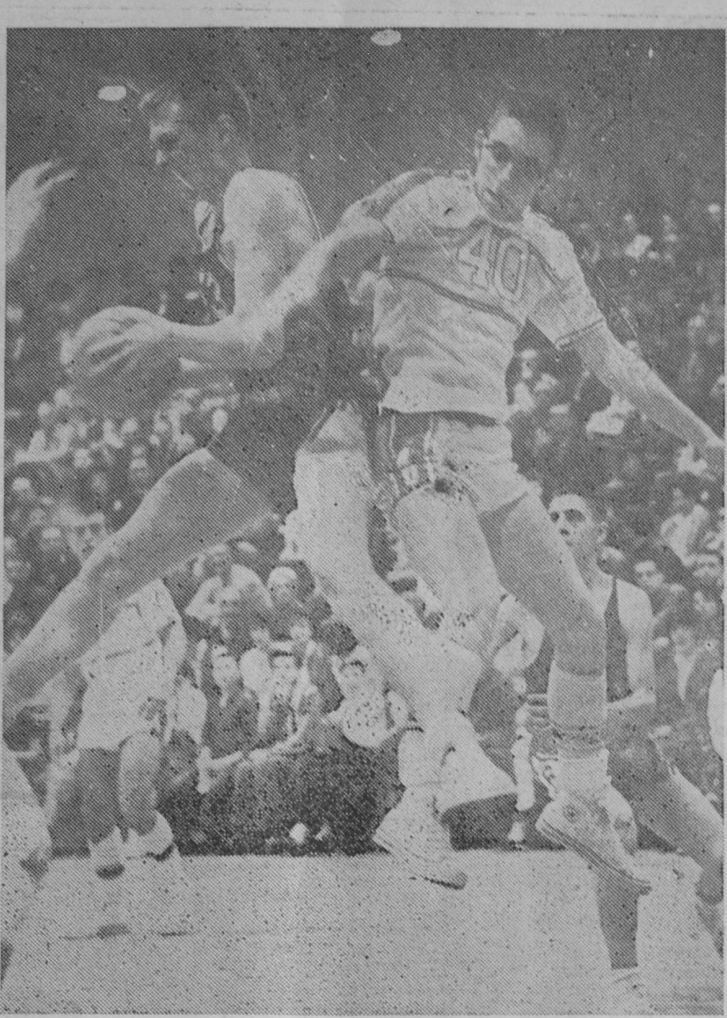
Roscommon's quintet had three players who hit in double figures and the number 13 was not unlucky for their cause. Haight, Johnson and Cornett each meshed 13 points.

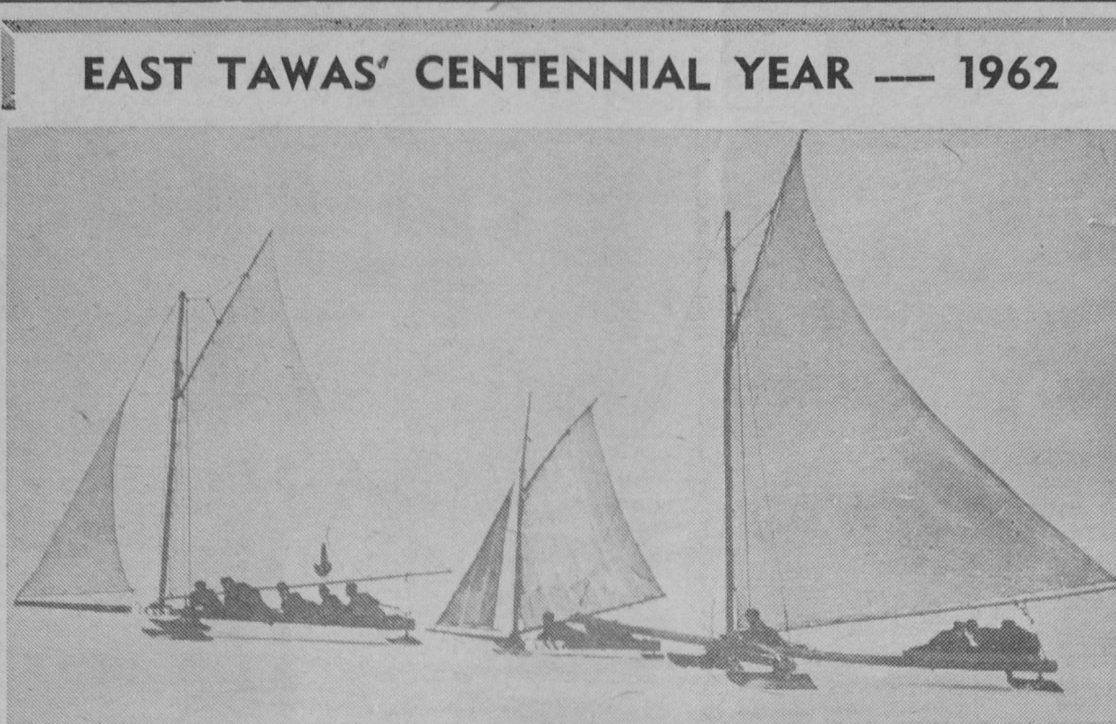

Ice Boating Once Popular

Ice boating, once one of the most popular wintertime sports in the Tawas area, is now only a memory to older residents of the community.

This picture was snapped during the heyday of Tawas Bay ice boats in the early 1900s. (The arrow points to the late Albert Mallon, who furnished this picture to the Herald about 10 years ago.)

Differing from their streamlined counterparts of modern times, these ice boats had a pair of runners on the bow and tiller at the stern. Old-timers still insist that this is the safest design.

During the height of this sport, there were probably 50 or more ice boats in this area, but by the mid-1930s, enthusiasm had waned. As far as it is known, there is only one ice boat remaining today.

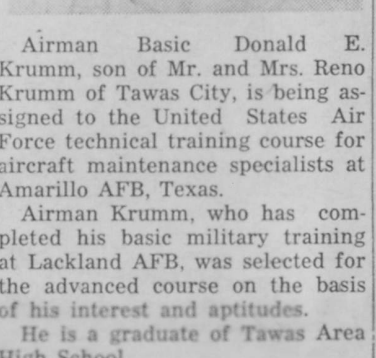
This exciting sport was not limited to the younger set as some of the most enthusiastic devotees were family men. Most of the ice boats were manufactured by the individual owner, purchased from someone who had built a new craft, or a group of people would pool their resources and build a boat.

Angle iron runners were fashioned at the Grise Blacksmith Shop at East Tawas or by employees of the railroad shops. Oak was used extensively in the construction.

Equipping an ice boat was a fairly expensive proposition, especially for sails, and this probably was one of the reasons why the sport disappeared during the "depression." Another reason may be that ice conditions of today do not compare with those of 40 or 50 years ago, mainly because of a change in prevailing winds.

However, there is still plenty of good sailing ice on Tawas Bay most winters and only the right "spark" is needed to revive this thrilling sport.

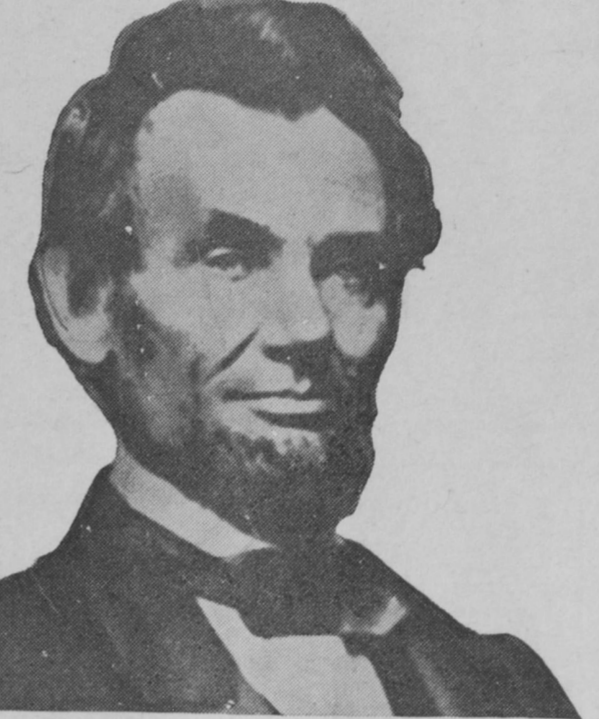

Busy Birthday



WASHINGTON, D.C.—Feb. 12—President Abraham Lincoln today observed his 53rd birthday with a routine day in the White House. The chief executive, who left his Springfield, Ill. home just a year ago to take over the reins of the troubled nation, conferred with military and civilian aides, following a harrowing work schedule in effect since beginning of hostilities with Confederate States.

South to Abandon Many Kentucky Posts

NASHVILLE, Tenn.—Feb. 9—Confederate General Albert Sidney Johnston has ordered a full-scale retreat of Southern forces from the southwestern sector of Kentucky.

News of Johnston's decision followed mounting reports of abject hardship, low morale and generally dismal conditions on the part of Confederate forces still within the troubled border state.

Brig. Gen. U. S. Grant, operating out of his headquarters at Cairo, Ill., has launched a series of successful forays on Southern forces in Kentucky and Tennessee.

GRANT's major success to date was capture earlier this week of strategic Fort Henry, conquered after a history-making assault by a flotilla of river warships.

Gen. Lloyd Tilghman left the fortress to Union attackers after riverboats under command of Grant and Flag Officer Andrew H. Foote poured tons of hot iron into the Confederates three days ago. Southern losses: five killed, 11 wounded, five missing, at least 78 captured.

The lot of Confederate troops in Kentucky has been a sorry one since the beginning of hostilities. It has been a cruel winter.

Confederate Brig. Gen. Humphrey Marshall, assigned late last year to command of troops at Prestonburg, reported that he found his men sorely wanting in clothing, food and arms.

One regiment, Marshall advised, included 350 men without shoes; there were only 100 blankets for the 700 men in another group; arms were, in the most part, what the men had brought from their homes.

courage and practiced in public affairs, the effects of the long ballot, the effects of various taxes on general welfare and the advantage of direct legislation."

He did not further explain those items.

Trustee of the estate and administrator of the fund is his only son, Royal D. Rood of Detroit. Upon his death, the fund is to be administered by Michigan State University. If MSU does not want the job, it goes to Olivet College.

Present income from the property is not known but is expected to yield \$20,000 to \$25,000 per year if conservatively invested.

Other bequests in the will were small.

People who attended his funeral and who also went to the grave-side services will each get \$10 "as a slight testimonial of my appreciation of their friendship."

His son was left his books and directed to receive "reasonable compensation" for his administration of the trust fund.

In one paragraph, he explained why he left nothing to organized charity:

"Having observed that acceptance of charity is pampering to the recipients and that all public established charities inevitably tend to become private rackets operated for the benefit of perpetuating management, I forego any attempt in that direction."
