## Centennial Plans are Under Study

By proclamation of Mayor C. V. Miller, 1962 is Centennial Year at East Tawas. This observance is to be culminated by a week-long celebration, June 24-30.

General chairman for planning and directing the observance is Miss Edna Otis, a native of Baldwin Township and a graduate of East Tawas High School.

To the former newspaperwoman, who is unofficially recognized as the area's historian, there is nothing new in directing a centennial observance. She had charge of Iosco County's 100th birthday celebration in 1957.

Always interested in local history and author of several books and historical articles pertaining to this area, Miss Otis will utilize her knowledge to prepare a pageant which will be a feature of the celebration.

This pageant will trace the history of the community, from its founding by Henry P. Smith, Daniel A. VanValkenburgh and Luther Westover, to the present day.

Some committees have been appointed to assist with arrangements and others are to be named soon.

"I hope that every organization and business place will begin making plans for the parade," states Miss Otis. "Many people from Tawas City have offered to help and their participation will be greatly appreciated."

Some of the centennial features presently being planned include a dinner meeting for former students of East Tawas High School, a get-together for old-time residents, a firemen's ball and games for children.

The committee is attempting to arrange for train rides on the Detroit and Mackinac Railway. This was an important feature of the Iosco County Centennial five years ago and many children had their first train ride at that time.

## Snowfall Brings Perfect Conditions to S. Valley

"Old Man Winter" rolled into Northeastern Michigan during the past week, bringing with it perfect weather for outdoor sports activities at the Silver Valley Winter Sports Park in Huron National Forest.

The winter sports park was opened to the public over the New Year's holiday and large numbers of skiers used slopes, despite rather poor snow conditions.

Several snow storms brought the park into tip-top condition over the week-end and just in time for the visit of the area's first out-state high school group.

Two bus loads of youngsters from Redford High School were here Saturday and Sunday and one of the two steel toboggan slides was placed into operation, along with all ski slopes.

Robert Brookbank, manager of the ski area chalet, said that many improvements had been made at the chalet over the past year through countless hours of donated labor on the part of interested skiing enthusiasts.

Audie Johnson Post, American Legion, has made several improvements to its concession stand in the chalet, which includes installation of a hot water heater and a French fryer.

Plans are now being prepared for the annual Silver Valley Winter Sports Carnival which will be held February 2, 3 and 4, reports L. G. McKay Jr., committee chairman.

In the meantime, the valley will be host to several large groups, including the East Detroit Luther, a Caravan, the Walther League, Mackenzie High School and the Luther League of Lansing.

The committee is also to investigate the possibility of holding harness races. Although the area does not have a track, a suitable location may be found to hold horse races for the enjoyment of visitors.

Sailboat races on Tawas Bay, which have a long history here, will be one of the centennial features.

Other events presently being planned include an old-timers' baseball game, with participation by former East Tawas and Tawas City baseball players; an ox roast

Decision on closing of a portion of Grabow Road is to be made next April. A hearing had been held on the proposed closing December 28.

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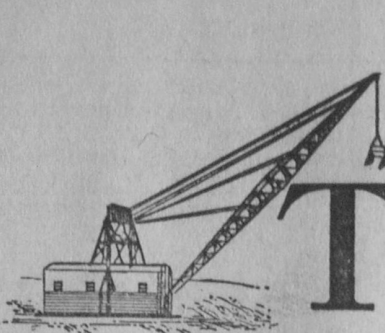

## City Hires Consultant to Aid Master Plan Development

On recommendation of its new planning commission, the City of Tawas has retained Vilcan-Leman and Associates, Incorporated, Southfield, to assist in development of a long-range master plan for the community.

Development of such a plan would require about two years of study by Vilcan-Leman, the planning commission and council.

This action came about at a special joint meeting of the city council and planning commission Monday night. Representing the Southfield planning firm was Charles F. Leman.

Tawas City's share of the \$16,745 total cost of the plan would be \$5,581, or one-third of the cost.

The remainder would be furnished through a federal grant. Application is now to be made with the state, which handles federal monies in this program. Once federal and state approval is received, expected in about three to four months, the city would be required to remit its share if it wishes to continue in the program. Until that time, there is no obligation on the city's part.

Hugo J. Keiser Jr., chairman of the recently organized planning commission, stated that members of that group were unanimous in the choice of Vilcan-Leman, a firm recognized throughout the state in the planning field.

Stating that some investigation had been made toward adoption

of a master plan for the city even prior to establishment of the commission, Keiser said that the group had moved ahead as rapidly as possible and had now reached the point where services of a professional consultant were needed.

Explaining that his firm had worked with 43 communities in Michigan, ranging in size from cities as large as Bay City to as small as 1,000 in population, Leman explained that development

of a master plan guides growth and development of a community over a 20-year period.

Although the major growth in the nation's population boom is centered in large cities, small communities also face many

problems caused by increased population. This master plan program is designed to help the community grow in the proper direction.

To undertake such a program, the planning firm would work with the commission and council in an advisory capacity. The end product of this work would be development of a master plan and adoption of new ordinances which would guide Tawas City's growth in the proper direction.

First step toward development of a master plan, explained Leman, would be preparation of accurate maps of the city and adjoining area to show present

buildings, roads, streets, utilities, parks, industrial and business

sites. This would be accomplished through an aerial topographical survey, which is included in the total cost of the project. An aerial mapping firm would come in and map every existing use of land in a 17-mile "area of influence," including residential, business and industrial locations.

An essential element in the operation of a city is to have accurate maps showing elevations of existing utilities and for extension of water and sewer mains. This, alone, would be well worth the city's cost of the project, said Leman.

Next step would be for Vilcan-Leman to make a block by block analysis of housing conditions.

Based on past population history, the firm would then make a projection on future growth, determining space needs for schools, industry, business, housing and parks.

The firm would also analyze the local street system and determine which streets could be opened to new development and perhaps close others. It would lay out a recommended system of streets as well as to cite streets which should be improved.

An analysis would be made to determine if the city park property is being used properly and determine if the city hall, fire department and department of public works are adequately serving

## Retention of Blood Bank is New Challenge to Iosco

Iosco County faces a new challenge if it is to maintain its status in the American Red Cross blood bank, which has been operating here a little more than a year.

Wurtsmith Air Force Base no longer supports the local blood bank, having signed an agreement recently with a private blood bank at Bay City.

Last year, Tawas Hospital used 360 pints of blood from the blood bank. Of this amount, about one-half was furnished by county donors while the remainder was donated by servicemen.

Wurtsmith's departure from the blood bank will have little effect on total usage, as only 60 pints of blood were utilized at the hospital by service-connected patients.

Based on population, however, the county will have to furnish more donors than it did in the

past in order to receive benefits from the blood bank.

Next visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile is scheduled January 31 at St. Joseph Social Center, East Tawas.

A general meeting of Iosco County Chapter will be held January 17, 8:00 p. m., at the county building, Judge Allan C. Miller, county chairman, said that plans for the bloodmobile visit would be made at that time.

## Auto Hits Phone Booth; Driver Dies

Cause of death of a 64-year-old Detroit man, whose auto plowed into a telephone booth in front of the city hall Sunday and then struck a car in the parking lot, was attributed to a heart attack.

Frank Martin Schultz was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident by Coroner E. D. Jacques. The body was then taken to Tawas Hospital.

Schultz, traveling south on US-23, had just passed the Whittemore Street intersection when his car veered over the curb and sidewalk.

The auto demolished the telephone booth and continued on to smash into the side of a vehicle owned by James Lansky, which was in a parking lot in front of the city hall.

A registered nurse who was following the Schultz vehicle stopped at the scene to give the victim artificial respiration. Schultz did not respond to the treatment.

Witnesses to the crash told police that the victim was slumped over in the car seat prior to the crash.

## More Damage Claims Filed Against National

Ten petitions of intervention were filed in the "Port Gypsum" lawsuit prior to the January 5 deadline set recently by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

An additional \$230,000 in damage claims were filed against National Gypsum Company by these petitioners. About \$400,000 in claims had been filed earlier by original plaintiffs in the case.

Entering claims for alleged damages to their property were Edgar H. Pares, \$25,000; Ethel A. Susman-Averil J. Weinberg, \$20,000; Harold O. Schultz, \$25,000; Arthur J. Capstraw, \$27,000; Merl L. Geweniser, \$30,000; Albert F. Pigott, \$20,000; John L. McArdle, \$15,000; Roger Lee Stephenson, \$15,000; Harvey L. Gerlach, \$28,000; Maynard T. Ray, \$25,000.

This lawsuit is scheduled to be tried before Judge Miller starting February 20.

Plaintiffs base their case on a Michigan Supreme Court decision which remanded the case to Iosco Circuit Court. The reversal sub-

jected the gypsum company to payment of such claims as plaintiffs may be able to prove concerning damages caused by the company's lake loading installation south of Tawas City.

The Alabaster gypsum quarry is the largest in the United States.

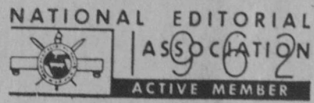

### Michigan Shows 1961 Traffic Death Reduction

Showing a traffic death reduction for the first time in three years, Michigan ended 1961 with a road toll of 1,542, which is 3.4 percent less, or a saving of 54 lives, compared with 1,596 fatalities in 1960, according to Michigan State Police provisional records.

Contributing to the decrease was December's total of 119, which was 22 percent, or 34 fewer than 163 in the same month a year ago. It was the lowest December toll in 17 years or since 120 in 1945.

December was the seventh month and the fourth in a row to record a reduction in deaths compared with corresponding months in 1960. Other months with decreases were January, June, July,

September, October and November. August with 165 deaths had the highest monthly toll of the year, while February was low with 98.

Reports of delayed deaths will slightly increase the totals for December and the year.

The 1961 reduction was achieved even though there were reported increases of one percent in the number of licensed drivers and registered motor vehicles, compared with 1960. Estimated travel was down only three-tenths of one percent with 31.7 billion miles and the death rate of 5.0 per 100 million vehicle miles was unchanged.

Michigan's annual average for the last 28 years, or since record keeping began in 1933, was 1,581 deaths. December's average for the last 28 years was 154.

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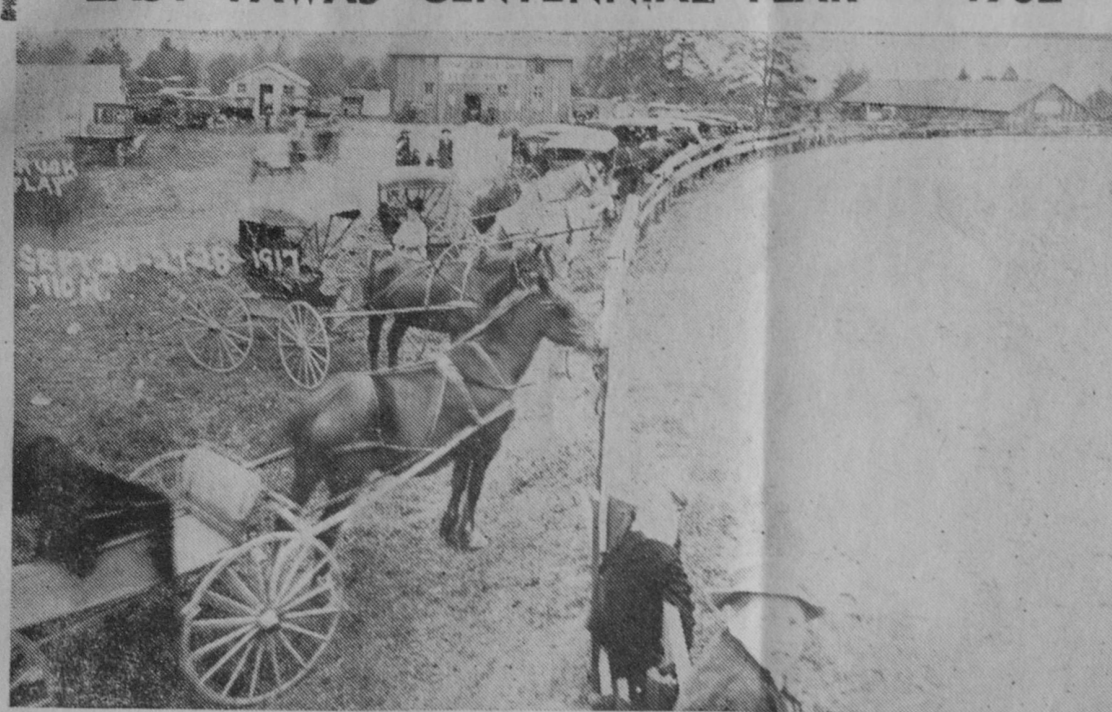
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### EAST TAWAS' CENTENNIAL YEAR — 1962

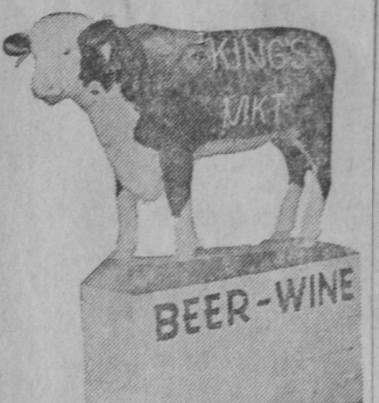

# Supervisors' Proceedings

**December 13, 1961**

Mr. Wilkusi, recently resigned from this group, presented a master plan for Old Orchard Park completed while he was an active member of the conservation committee.

He stated that he thought the board did the best they could in presenting this issue to the people and that he for one would rest easier because an effort was made to help the old people of our county.

(Continued from page 1.) present needs and those of the future.

Once this program is completed, the firm would analyze the city's business and industry. With the business district strung out along Tawas Bay, Leman said there is little foot traffic and

more than adequate parking facilities would have to be provided. A system of off-street parking would be programmed.

One of the items to be considered would be investigation into the possible elimination of parking along US-23, as reported recently by state officials. This was but one of the things which emphasized need for a master plan.

The planning consultants would meet with the state highway department and work out this problem.

Vilican-Leman would provide a staged development plan for the downtown business district, including a method of financing off-street parking. It would indicate areas where business expansion should take place and renovation

of old business area. Particular attention would be paid to development of industrial sites. The planning firm would assist in determining what types of industry could be brought here.

Once all phases of this program are analyzed, they would be brought together and made into a master plan for the city, portraying all recommendations toward the city's growth for the next 20 years.

"Once you have this master plan, you can determine how to bring about the recommendations," said Leman. "We are outsiders... all we can do is to bring you our technical service. We cannot tell you what type of a city it is to be, all we can do is to assist and guide you."

Leman said that some 200 communities in Michigan had made application for participation in the federal program.

During development of the master plan, the city's planning commission, which acts as the council's guiding agency, would meet with various groups and residents of the city to determine their thinking. A planning questionnaire would be sent to about 10 percent of the residents to get a cross section of their viewpoints.

Even though the master plan would be developed to guide the growth of the city for 20 years, planning and ordinances would have to be brought up to date from time to time. Once a master plan is an accomplished fact, however, this work can be done by the planning commission.
