Red Cross Blood Bank Needs Iosco's Support

Iosco County faces a new challenge if it is to maintain its status in the American Red Cross blood bank, which has been operating here since October 1, 1960.

Some 400 donors will be needed from the list of donors. The base recently signed an agreement with a private blood bank at Bay City.

Participation by the base in this program had always insured that Iosco County would meet its quota. Without this participation, the "slack" will have to be taken up by private citizens to guarantee Iosco's future status in the blood bank.

(Visit of the bloodmobile had been scheduled for January 31, but a delay was granted Monday in order to allow more time for organization.)

Last year, Tawas Hospital used 476 pints of blood from the blood bank. Of this amount, less than one-half was furnished by county donors while the remainder was donated by servicemen.

"One of the important reasons for Iosco to maintain its status in this program is that its service extends to Iosco residents wherever they may be," stated Louis Awalt, blood bank chairman.

"When the need for blood arises, all one has to do is place a request through the lo-

cal Red Cross. In the short time that Iosco has been a member, blood has been sent all over the United States," he stated.

Judge Allan C. Miller, chapter chairman, also pointed out that Blue Cross insurance does not cover the cost of blood.

"We cannot expect to remain in this program if we use 300 pints of blood and contribute only 75," said Judge Miller. "We need the complete cooperation of the entire county."

Importance of Iosco's continued participation was stressed at a meeting of committee workers last Wednesday night. One Iosco resident, who was hospitalized at a well-known out-of-state clinic, was in need of blood and had been charged \$60 a pint, had the blood not been replaced by the local Red Cross chapter.

Should the blood bank fail here, Tawas Hospital would be forced to require those who need blood to furnish live donors on a two pint for one exchange.

Blood can be given by all between the ages of 21 and 59 and can be given as many as five times in a year.

Volunteer workers are now soliciting blood donors from business, industry, civic clubs and churches throughout the county. Anyone who has not been contacted may call Mrs. Harold Grise, blood bank secretary, phone F0rest 2-2582, Tawas City, for an appointment.

"This could easily be the last visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile if Iosco County residents do not cooperate March 29," states Mr. Awalt.

Former POW Signs Seventh Enlistment

A survivor of Germany's infamous "Stalag 17" concentration camp, CM-Sgt. James X. McIlwain, was sworn in on his seventh enlistment by Col. William Marchesi, 40th Air Division director of material, January 12.

Sergeant McIlwain was one of the first SAC men assigned to Wurtsmith. With this enlistment, he now has his eyes set on the air force's 30-year retirement plan.

Of his present 21 years of active service, the eight stripster spent nearly two of them as a prisoner of war at "Stalag 17." This German POW camp was the subject of a popular novel which was later made into a film.

On November 3, 1943, while flying on his third mission as an engineering gunner in a B-17 with the 91st Bomb Group, his aircraft was shot down into the North Sea. He and one of his crew members went into the water quite close to each other and were in danger of drowning before being captured,

or as he terms it "rescued" by the Germans. At this point, Sergeant McIlwain was sent to the notorious "Stalag 17" where he remained along with approximately 4,000 other allied captives until their liberation on May 3, 1945, by American troops.

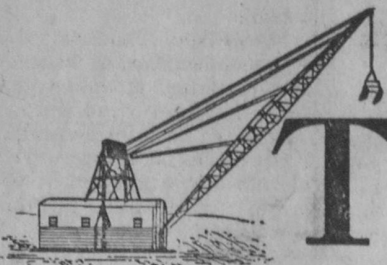
The 44-year-old NCO first entered the army in October 1935. He remained in the army until 1938 when he took his first break in service. He enlisted again in August of 1942, this time in the Army Air Corps. He was eventually sent to England where subsequent events caused him to fall into the hands of the Germans.

From 1945 to 1946, he took his second break in the service before returning to the air force in December 1946. From that time to December 1951, he was stationed at Bolling AFB, Washington, D. C. From Bolling, he went to Korea where he served as a flight chief

More than 30 busloads of youngsters are expected here this Sunday for the 16th annual East Detroit Lutheran Caravan to Silver Valley.

In charge of the group will be Bert H. Leidecker, who has been general chairman for the Lutheran caravan since 1946. Buses are scheduled to arrive here about 9:00 a. m. Sunday. After a day of fun at the winter sports park, they will leave for home about 4:30 p. m.

East Detroiters are to select and crown the Lutheran Silver Valley queen February 11 at St. Peter's Lutheran Church.

Also making their annual trek to Silver Valley this week-end will be students from Mackenzie High School, Detroit. Four busloads of youngsters are scheduled to arrive here Friday night. Boys will be housed at the Holland Hotel and girls at the Barnes Hotel.

Final plans for the 25th annual Silver Valley Winter Sports Carnival, February 2, 3 and 4, were made last Friday night. The winter sports committee and their wives held a pot-luck supper at the ski area chalet.

Lloyd G. (Ladd) McKay, committee chairman, reported that the insurance company which handles Silver Valley's liability is investigating the \$7,500 lawsuit which was filed last week. Attorneys for the insurance company are to

make an appearance in Iosco Circuit Court.

McKay said that in the 25 years Silver Valley has been operating, during which time approximately 200,000 persons have ridden on toboggan slides, this was the first time that the committee had ever been sued for damages.

A praecipe was filed with County Clerk George Prescott January 16 by Harold J. Stevens of Saginaw.

All facilities were in top operating condition at Silver Valley last week-end. Receipts at the winter sports park were the highest for any two-day period thus far this season. A committee spokesman said that with another good week-end, the park would be operating in the "black."

Winter Sports Week-End Set for Sport Cars

Third annual winter sports car week-end, sponsored by the Hale Lions Club and Huron Sports Car Club, will be held Saturday and Sunday at Hale. Events are open to all clubs and individuals.

Directions to the event may be obtained at a check point located at the four corners at Hale.

Twenty trophies will be presented to winners at the Timbers Steak House, South Branch, which will serve as event headquarters, Saturday evening and Sunday afternoon.

Classes will include sports cars over 1,600 cubic centimeters, sports cars under 1,600 cubic centimeters, economy cars, compact cars and ladies (all cars).

A snow gymkhana will be held Saturday and an ice run Sunday. Some 38 cars competed last year and about the same number are expected for this year's event.

Special Assessment District Discussed

Steps were taken Monday night toward the possible establishment of special assessment districts for financing construction of sanitary sewer mains in Tawas City's First Ward.

Tawas City Water Board authorized a study to be made on engineering and construction costs for sewers on Beech Street from Fir to Cedar Street, on Cedar Street to Maple Street and on German Street from Beech Street to M-55.

Two different requests had been received representing property owners in that area. One request was signed by Walter Schuhmacher, Ervin Galbraith, Charles Rouiller, Fred Westcott, Cecil A. Nelkie and Ray M. Buraway.

The water board authorized City Attorney Jerry Cotter to take the necessary legal steps for holding a public hearing on the proposed projects.

Supervisors Like Taxpayer's Letter

During the course of a year, Iosco County Board of Supervisors receives a considerable amount of correspondence. Some of the letters are from taxpayers and one of the most pleasant notes ever received was read during last week's two-day meetings.

"I recently received a receipt from the treasurer of Plainfield Township for taxes paid on some property I own there. She enclosed a little note informing me that the final tax on both the courthouse and jail bonds had been paid and included a picture of these facilities," stated Arthur Barnett of Arlington, Virginia.

"Although my taxes there are small, for I have not built on the property, this is the most pleasant note I have ever had from any taxing authority—federal, state or local—in my entire life.

"The fact of the matter is I don't think any governing body has ever taken the time to thank me as a taxpayer. From this, I get the feeling that you are mindful of the burdens on the taxpayer and are doing your best to be fiscally responsible. I also wish to commend you on your excellent sense of good public relations."

When tax statements were mailed last December, the board of supervisors furnished a supply of these printed "thank you" messages to each township treasurer to be included in the mailing.

Over printed on the picture of the county building and jail was a message to the effect that when 1961 taxes were paid, general obligation bonds to finance construction of these buildings would be retired.

A 12-man industrial development committee was organized last Wednesday by the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.

Appointed temporary chairman of the new committee was Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda.

Other members include Gordon Huck, C. S. Everett, George Blust, James Campbell, Richard Harwood, Stuart White, Earl Bielby, James Reynolds, A. Don Anderson, John Hosbach and Bruce Myles.

Members were named by Board Chairman Glenn Long. The committee represents every community in the county.

In other business last week, the board's coordinating zoning committee approved a new zoning ordinance for Burleigh Township. The proposed ordinance was submitted by Supervisor Theodore Bellville.

It was reported that Consumers Power Company had completed negotiations for a power line right-of-way to serve a new county airport.

A new agreement was made with Howard Becker for operation of Old Orchard Park. Becker is to be paid \$200 a month for his services and was allowed up to \$50 a month for minor repairs.

Whittemore Men Hurt in Auto Crash

Two Whittemore men were injured Friday night in a two-car collision 14 miles east of Muskegon on M-46.

In critical condition at a Muskegon hospital is David Mills, 39, who sustained internal injuries in the crash. He was a passenger in a car driven by Raymond Dorcey, who is also hospitalized. His condition was not listed as serious as Mills'.

The two men were on their way to Muskegon to pick up Dorcey's brother, Norman, an employee of Grabow Distributing Company. A car pulled out of a side road and was struck broadside by the Dorcey vehicle.

Mills was in surgery four hours Saturday night and was still listed in critical condition Monday morning. Driver of the other car involved had not regained consciousness.

County Spending Exceeds Yearly Receipts by \$866.21

Iosco County finances, which showed a deficit of \$1,480.73 December 31, 1960, remained virtually unchanged during the past year.

According to a report filed with the board of supervisors Thursday by Treasurer Grace L. Miller, Iosco had a debit balance of \$2,346.94 when books were closed December 31, 1961. This figure included the deficit from the previous year.

Taking into consideration that receipts and disbursements each totaled more than a quarter million dollars, Iosco actually came within \$866.21 of having a balanced yearly operational budget, not including the previous year's deficit.

Increased cost of operating local government was reflected, however, by comparing ledger sheets for the two years. And, only last October, the board gave final approval to a record high budget of \$284,182.65 for 1962.

A review of the 1961 report shows that receipts totaled \$266,893.24. Of this amount, \$194,121.22 was raised by taxation. Disbursements during the year totaled \$267,759.45.

These totals were approximately \$30,000 more than the previous year when receipts were \$235,400, including \$165,871.33 collected in taxes, and disbursements were \$237,486.35.

A good share of this increase was brought on by added expenditures of elections and circuit court. It also reflected a slight salary hike and additional services in some county offices.

One example shows that the county spent \$6,498.26 for elections last year, as compared to \$4,099.08 in 1960.

Disbursements for circuit court were \$10,795.83, as compared to \$8,982.31 in 1961. One reason for this increase was added number of jury trials. While the court spent \$532 for witness and jury per diem in 1960, this expenditure was upped to \$1,657.17 last year.

A breakdown of general fund disbursement for the various county offices, including total operational costs and salaries, is as follows:

Prosecuting attorney, \$8,376.60 in 1961, \$8,253.44 in 1960; register of deeds, \$11,601.27 in 1961, \$10,543.50 in 1960; probate judge, \$10,400.24 in 1961, \$8,865.47 in 1960; county clerk, \$13,581.07 in 1961, \$12,119.15 in 1960; county treasurer, \$16,297.98 in 1961, \$13,077.67 in 1960; courthouse and grounds, \$14,953.42 in 1961, showing a decrease from \$16,288.92 in 1960; board of supervisors, \$11,843.92 in 1961, \$9,876.90 in 1960; sheriff's department, \$37,608.72 in 1961, \$32,141.46 in 1960.

A particular bright spot in the budget analysis was in the county welfare department. During 1960, the Iosco expended \$19,700 for direct relief and \$32,600 for social welfare. Disbursements for direct relief in 1961 amounted to \$16,200 and \$26,000 was expended for social welfare.

The report from Director Edward Burgeson's office showed that welfare cases had increased, however, from 127 last January, serving 414 persons, to 344 and 1,205 persons in December.

One explanation given for this decrease in welfare expenditures was that the department had found work for many persons who were unemployed and were kept off the welfare rolls. Judging from the increased number of cases each month, the department will run into trouble this year if the employment picture in this area does not improve.

Another interesting aspect of the annual report was that \$2,514,454.89 had been handled by the county clerk and treasurer. This money was from county taxes, plus earmarked funds from the state and federal governments.

Of this amount, \$2,502,738.15 was disbursed to 46 different funds. Largest expenditure of earmarked money was \$1,007,314.41 to the primary school fund.

Record Year of Growth for F&M Bank

Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale, Rose City and Whittemore had another year of tremendous growth during 1961.

At the annual board of directors meeting Tuesday, it was reported that deposits were up 25 percent over 1960. Demand deposits increased from \$764,268.24 to \$934,837.66, while time and savings deposits were up from \$1,186,872.22 in 1960 to \$1,534,708.71.

Total assets were \$3,132,617.30, as compared to \$2,518,995.10 last year. Total deposits were \$2,854,799.62, as compared to \$2,287,550.21 last year.

Farmers and Merchants had the same dividends as the previous year, but earnings were up slightly.

At the annual election of officers, D. D. Pearsall was re-elected president and Carl Adams, vice president.

J. Morley Stevenson, who had been vice president and cashier, was named executive vice president.

Arnold H. Beyerlein, formerly assistant vice president and manager of the Rose City branch, was promoted to vice president and branch manager.

Richard E. Parkinson was promoted to cashier of the main office at Hale. Assistant cashiers named were Mrs. Irene Jordan, branch manager at Whittemore, and Richard L. Pfahl at the main office.

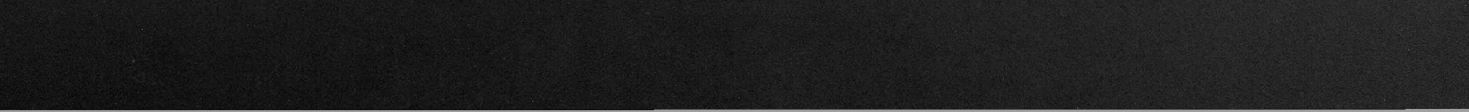
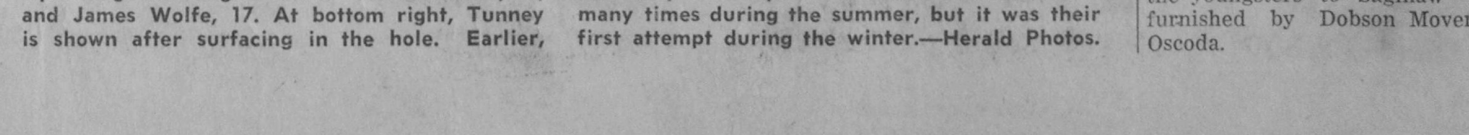
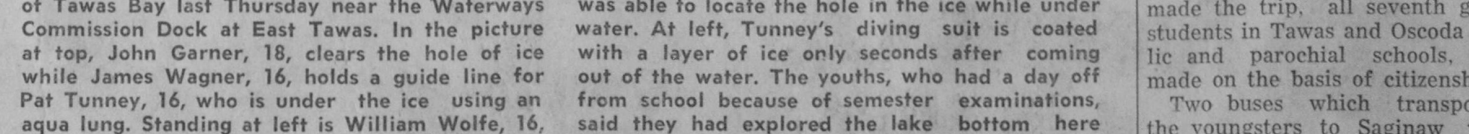
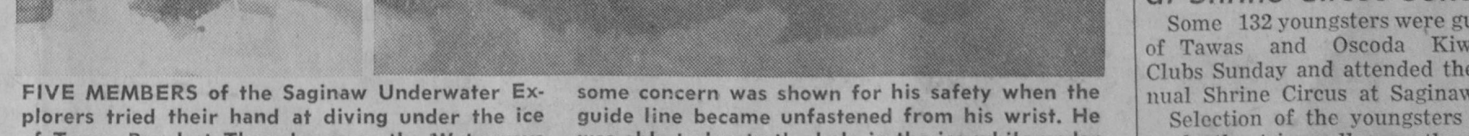

"Entertaining with Ease" will be the program February 21 when the members meet with Mrs. Richard Egli. Members are requested to bring their county government books to the meeting.

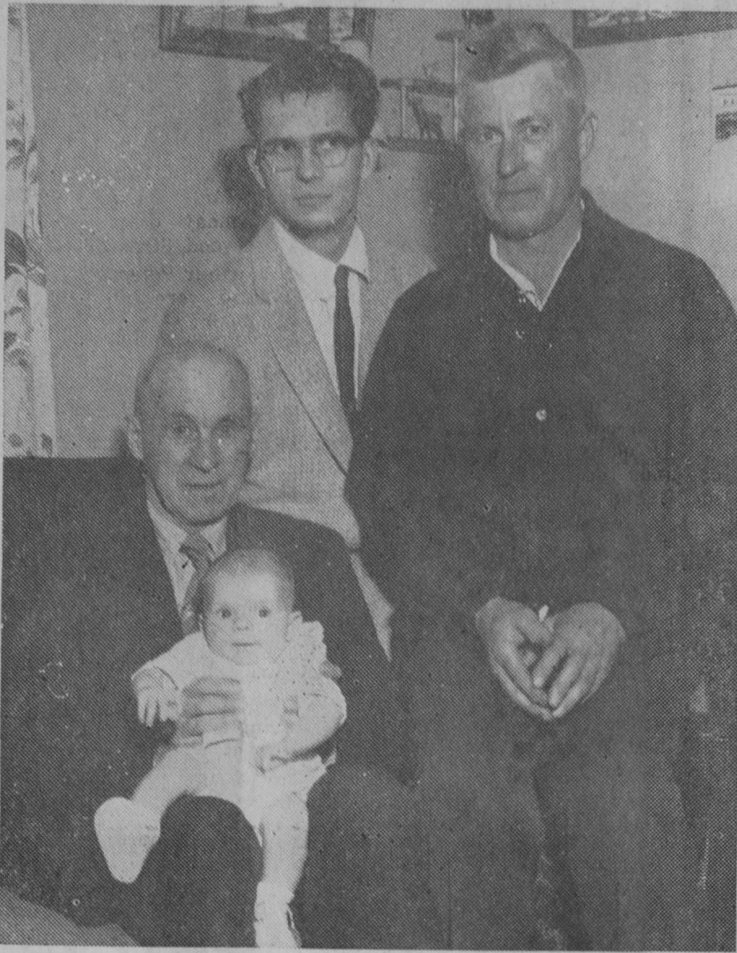

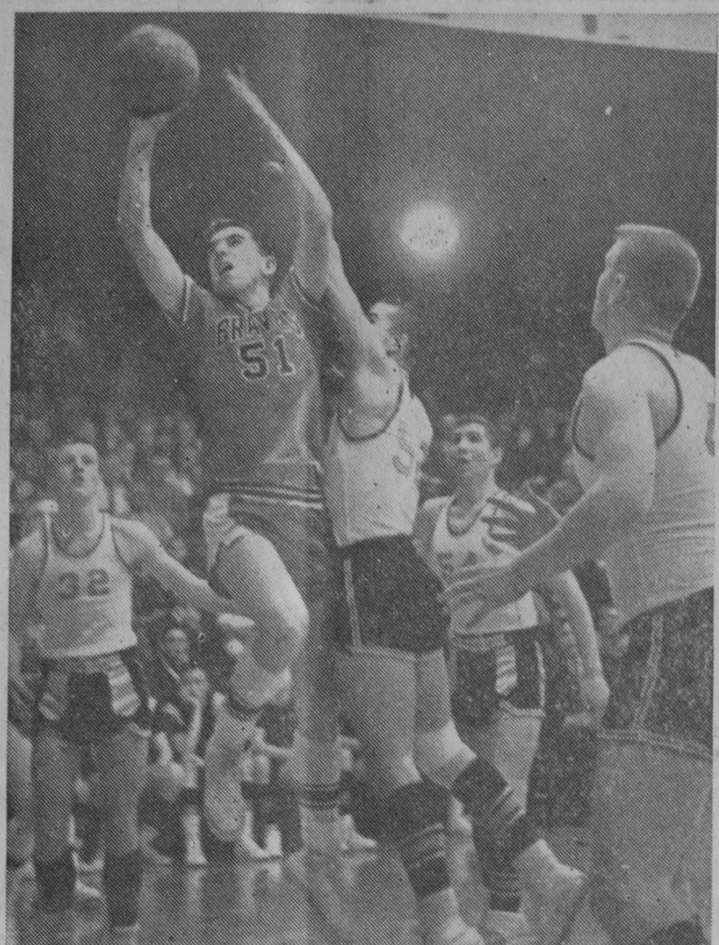
Led by Guard Charles Anschutz, who flipped in 21 points, the Junior Braves racked up their sixth straight win, 62-40, in as many games.

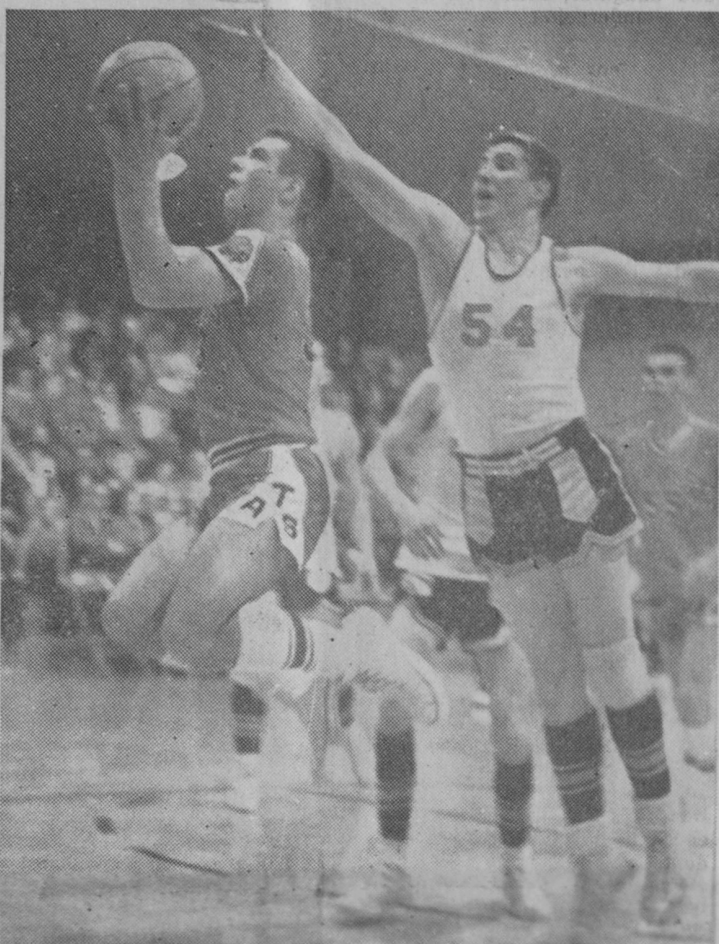

16 Violent Deaths Recorded in Iosco During Past Year

Sixteen violent deaths were recorded in Iosco County, according to a year-end report submitted to the Iosco County Board of Supervisors Wednesday by the sheriff's department.

Of this number, four persons died in a fire, four were victims of carbon monoxide poisoning, four died in traffic accidents and there were four drownings.

Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell reported that the jail had 455 inmates during the year. Of this number, 105 were incarcerated for felonies, 279 misdemeanors, 12 for investigation, 12 delinquent minors, 11 mental and 36 lodgers.

The sheriff's department issued 520 traffic summonses and received 4,829 complaints. A total of 4,325 drivers licenses were issued and 1,780 sets of fingerprints were taken.

The jail served 9,742 meals to prisoners.

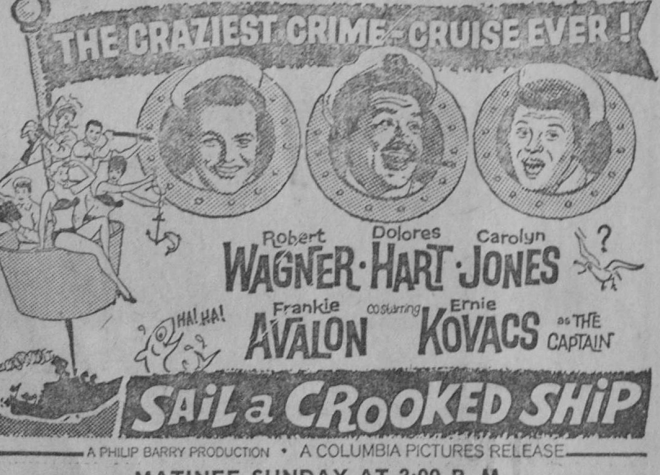

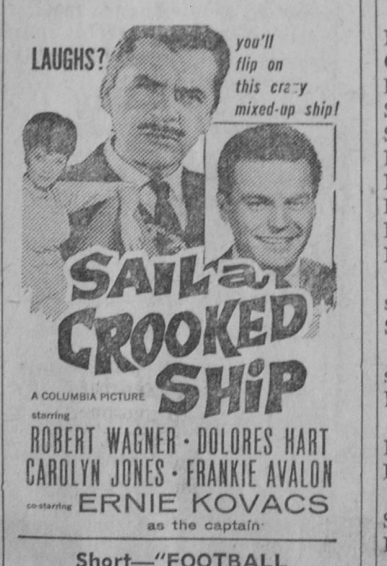
