

# Reorganized Boy Scouts Now Called Iargo District

A new boy scout district composed of Iosco and the eastern half of Ogemaw County was created last week at a special meeting of Paul Bunyan Council. The session was held at the Iosco County Building, Tawas City.

During the meeting, presided over by Judge Allan C. Miller, district chairman, the annual report of six operating committees was given by Wesley Quandt, district executive of West Branch.

Division of the Timberland District, as set forth at the annual meeting a few weeks ago, was recommended by Chaplain (Capt.) James Hays of Wurtsmith Air Force Base. This action was ratified by a vote of those attending.

After much discussion, it was decided to rename this new district the "Iargo District," an Indian name which means many waters. The Iargo Springs near the AuSable River is a well known landmark in this area.

Officers recommended by the nominating committee, under the leadership of Harold Gould of East Tawas, were unanimously approved for the new district as follows:

Judge Miller, district chairman; Lt. Col. Barry Young, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, vice chairman;

Richard Powers, East Tawas, district commissioner.

Other members of the district committee who attended were Maj. George Stokes and Robert Korte Sr., both of Oscoda; Orval J. Fuerst of Whittemore, and John Austin of East Tawas.

## Station Operator is Severely Burned as Flames Ignite Shirt

An East Tawas service station operator is in Tawas Hospital for treatment of second and third degree burns which he sustained when flames ignited his gasoline-soaked shirt Saturday afternoon.

Joseph Heenan, operator of the Gulf service station at 617 West Bay, received third degree burns to the right hand and second degree burns to the body and right arm.

Heenan and his son, Donald, were "unfreezing" a gasoline line on a customer's car and gasoline accidentally sprayed on Mr. Heenan's shirt. After reconnecting the fuel line, the engine apparently backfired. The carburetor burst into flames and ignited gasoline on Mr. Heenan's shirt.

Donald pulled his father away from the burning auto and received third degree burns to the hands in an unsuccessful attempt to rip off the elder man's shirt.

Joseph Nichols of Detroit, owner of the car, removed his overcoat and threw it over Mr. Heenan extinguishing the flames. He was rushed to Tawas Hospital where he is expected to be hospitalized for at least three weeks.

## Snow Plow Clears Runway for Inspectors

A snow gymkhana will be held Saturday and an ice run on Sunday. Trophies will be awarded for first and second places. Event headquarters will be the Timbers Steak House at South Branch.

The class system will be used for all events, including sports over 1,600 cubic centimeters, sports under 1,600 cubic centimeters, economy, compact and ladies.

Back in the winter of 1960, a group of people wished to put the Hale-South Branch area on the map as a place for winter fun. Along with ice fishing, hunting and the usual winter sports activities, something different was wanted.

One of the members of this group owned a sports car and he suggested a winter sports car week-end. Thus was the start of a new annual event.

Original sponsoring organization was the Hale Lions Club, which ran the event for the first two years. This year, the Huron Sports Car Club joins the Lions in presenting the event.

"We hope to have a large field of entries from not only the local area, but Southern Michigan and other states just south of us," stated a committee member.

This type of event is fun, safe, challenging and different. Suggested special equipment for drivers is protective under garments, a snow shovel, overshoes and the usual sub-artic apparel.

A check-point is to be located at the blinker light in Hale where drivers will receive directions to the event locations. The February 17 activities will start at 11:00 a. m. and run most of the afternoon, while the following day's event will start at 12:00 p. m.

**Gen. Humfeld Due for Second Star**

Brig. Gen. Harold E. Humfeld, commander of SAC's 40th Air Division with headquarters at Wurtsmith, was nominated January 18 by the president for appointment to the grade of major general.

The promotion is another milestone in the long and active career of General Humfeld.

Active in the military service since 1938, General Humfeld has accumulated more than 8,000 flying hours and the list of aircraft he has flown includes all of the well-known workhorses of the air force.

General Humfeld holds graduate certificates from each of four service schools, including Command and Staff School, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas; the Air Staff School, Orlando, Florida; and the Air Command and Staff School at the Air University, Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama.

In addition, he holds an AB degree in international law from the University of California.

During World War II, General Humfeld commanded the 72nd Air Service Group in Tinian in the Mariana Islands. It is interesting to note, in connection with his present command, that the general once worked for Gen. Paul E. Wurtsmith, after whom Michigan's finest base is named.

General Humfeld's present command is the largest in area and number of units in Second Air Force. The four wings included in the 40th Air Division represent fully one-third of the striking power of Second Air Force.

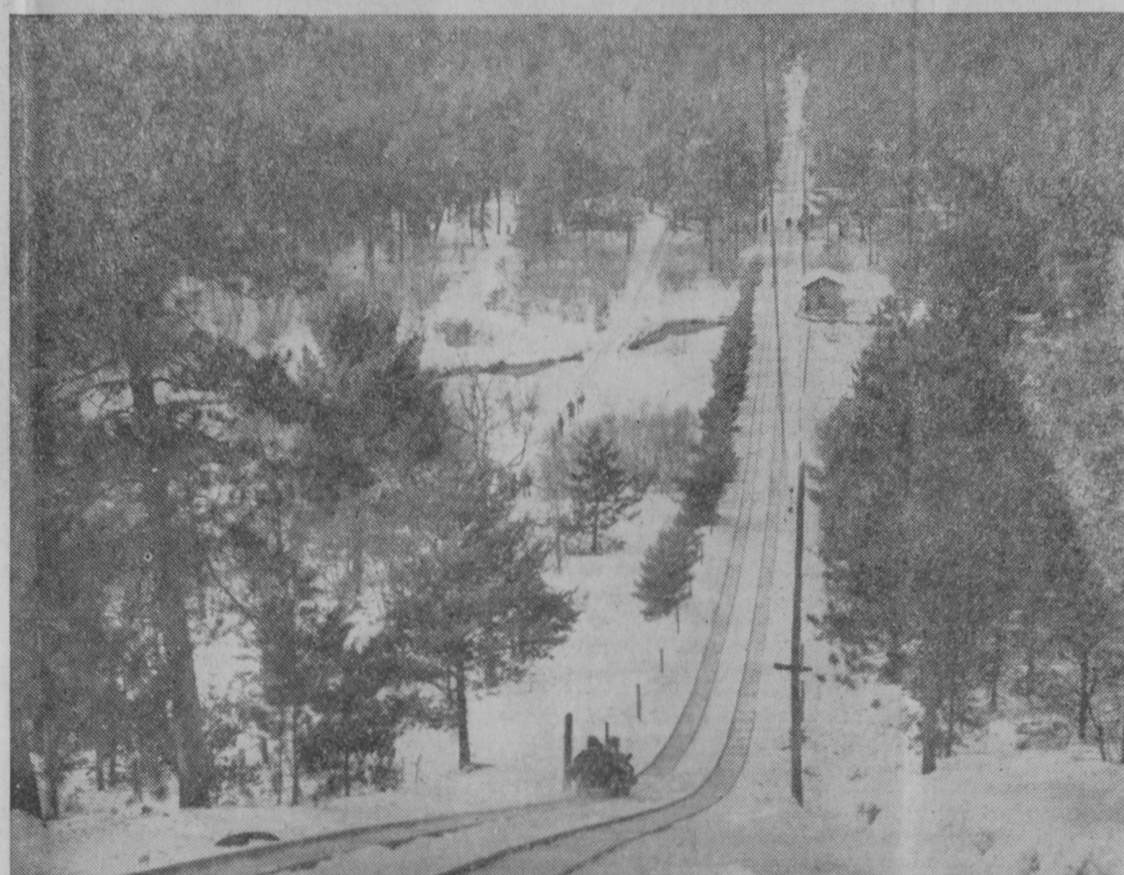

## Crowning of Queen, Ski Exhibitions are Features

Crowning a new winter sports queen, the annual fish fry, skiing exhibitions and fun in the snow will feature scheduled activities during the annual Silver Valley Winter Sports Carnival this week-end.

Much of the fanfare of previous carnivals will be missing, as has been the case during the past two years, but more activities are slated to take place at the winter sports park.

Silver Valley observes the 25th year of its founding during 1962 and the silver anniversary carnival will be held next winter.

Chairman L. G. (Ladd) McKay said that, although weather conditions were far from perfect for last week-end's visit of East Detroit Lutherans and Mackenzie High School students, a new fall of snow this week had brightened the outlook.

Opening this year's carnival will be the annual perch fry Friday night at the Holland Hotel. In charge of arrangements are Kenneth Conn, O. E. Ostrander and Stanley Humphrey.

The 6:30 p. m. cocktail hour will be preceded by Bob Reynolds' annual winter sports broadcast from the Tawasites. This will be the only social event slated during the carnival as the banquet was dropped two years ago.

The perch fry has been a traditional get-together for North-eastern Michigan residents since it was first inaugurated about seven years ago. Reservations for couples may be made by calling the Holland Hotel.

Saturday's activities start at 9:00 a. m. when the ski area opens at the winter sports park. Toboggan slides are to start operating at 12 o'clock noon.

Program during the afternoon will include an exhibition by the Silver Valley Ski Patrol and an archery demonstration by members of the Iosco Archer's Club at 3:00 p. m.

It was announced Monday that the teen-ager's dance slated for Saturday night had been canceled. The ski patrol had planned to hold a dance at Tawas Area High School, but youngsters will enjoy dancing following Friday night's basketball game, instead.

Starting time for Sunday's program is slated for 2:00 p. m. when the first of two skiing exhibitions will be given. In charge will be Charles Lemon.

Contestants for the winter sports queen selection will be introduced in front of the ski area chalet at 2:15 by Reynolds. This will be followed by another 15-minute ski exhibition and the queen will be crowned at 2:45.

Competing for winter sports queen will be the homecoming queens of three of Iosco's schools. Representing Tawas Area High will be Sharon Siller, Judy Carpenter will represent Whittemore-Prescott Area; Carol Alderton, Hale Area. Oscoda Area was to name its candidate Tuesday afternoon.

"Every resident should be willing to be a blood donor or a donor recruiter," stressed Judge Allan C. Miller at a recent meeting of the Quota Club of Iosco County. Judge Miller spoke on the quota system being offered for meeting the requirements of Iosco County's blood needs.

The countywide blood bank, through which county residents furnish blood to fellow residents in need, has been in force since October 1, 1960. It is hoped that each club and organization will accept a quota of five or 10 donors and recruit each time the mobile unit visits the county. The next stop of the unit here will be March 29.

## Silver Valley Has 'Birthday' in 1962

Another winter sports season is well under way and one of Northern Michigan's most famous winter playgrounds, Silver Valley, observes its 25th anniversary during 1962.

This winter playground, located among the pine-covered slopes of Huron National Forest, has survived two wars, distress of financial bouts and several seasons when the lack of snow threatened to—or did—curtail activities.

But, through the continued interest of an ever-changing committee of winter sports devotees, Silver Valley has remained on the scene to bring outdoor winter fun to thousands.

It all started back in the winter of 1937 when a group of 18 or 20 businessmen met with representatives of the United States Forest Service at East Tawas. Something had to be done to "liven up" the town during the winter season.

A survey trip through the Huron National Forest led to the selection of a site along Silver Creek for development of winter sports facilities which whole families could enjoy.

Lacking funds, save those raised through popular subscriptions, winter sports dances and other benefit events, the winter sports committee worked with the forest service staff and CCC boys from Camp Silver Creek to construct the first toboggan run with snow-packed slides.

Plenty of work on the part of the CCC boys, forest service staff and members of the community went into getting the winter sports area ready for its first season. Volunteers joined in to help carry snow and form the trough for a toboggan run. Water, carried from Silver Creek, was poured from sprinkling cans to freeze an icy surface on the toboggan trough; an ice rink was constructed, along with ski runs and a tin pan slide.

Two months after the winter sports committee was organized, the area was ready to open in January 1938. Fred J. Adams, first general chairman and holder of that post for five successive years, named the new winter sports area "Silver Valley" from the name of the creek which courses through the picturesque forested valley.

During its first season, the valley entertained between 1,500 and 2,000 winter visitors. A more than capacity crowd of 600 jammed the Community Building to see Queen Senia Loffman crowned by Detroit radio commentator, Jimmy Stevenson.

Silver Valley was now on its way. A lusty infant developed into a real winter park the following year when timber was cut to furnish lumber for building two wooden toboggan slides. The ice rink was improved and more ski runs were developed.

The second winter sports queen, Josephine Cieciak of East Tawas, received her crown in gala ceremonies at the second annual Silver Valley ball. Stevenson was assisted by Charlie Gehring and Barney McCosky, both of the Detroit Tigers, and a mid-winter thaw failed to dampen the spirit of 5,000 winter sports fans.

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## Valley Commended

Silver Valley Winter Sports Committee was commended last week by representatives of the United States Forest Service following an inspection of the winter sports park.

Inspectors were particularly impressed with cleanliness and neatness of the area and its buildings. They said that, of the three parks on federal forest land in Michigan, Silver Valley had the best "housekeeping" job.

All safety devices on ski tows in the park passed with flying colors.

## Bateson-Catsman Trial Resumes; Busy Month

Circuit court hearing on a suit brought by Catsman Company of Flint against J. W. Bateson Construction Company of Dallas, Texas, resumed Tuesday morning before Judge Allan C. Miller.

After hearing testimony for two weeks, the trial was adjourned for one week to allow other matters to come before the court.

The Flint firm charges Bateson with fraudulent conspiracy to obtain subcontracts for the completion of Caphart housing units at Wurtsmith and Kincheloe Air Force Bases.

Catsman was a subcontractor of Bateson, which had the general contract to construct 618 housing units at Wurtsmith. The Flint firm seeks to rescind the contract.

During the two previous weeks of trial, one witness for the plaintiffs testified four days, while another was on the stand for three days. There were as many as 10 attorneys in the courtroom at one time.

February will also see the start of another lengthy trial here when damage claims against National Gypsum Company's Port Gypsum installation are aired before Judge Miller.

Litigation over the installation goes back as far as 1957 and, when the case was remanded here from the state supreme court, the flood of damage claims has now reached approximately \$630,000.

Earlier this month, attorneys for the gypsum company asked the court to make a judicial determination concerning the legality of this construction.

Declaring that National Gypsum had acted lawfully in carrying out construction of the multi-million-dollar dock south of Tawas City, attorneys questioned the constitutionality of an act which gave control of submerged bottom lands to the state department of conservation.

This may mean that the case will land back in the supreme court.

senger cars, 1,385 commercial, 92 farm vehicles, 1,203 trailers, 70 trailer coaches, 114 motorcycles and 163 municipally-owned vehicles.

In reviewing the state department's year-end statistics, Hare said, "We have tallied up the number of motor vehicles we licensed during the 1961 tab year and came up with a total of 3,758,010, which is only 68,242 more than the 3,689,768 we licensed in 1960."

Hare pointed out that 2,923,373 passenger cars were registered, up 44,148 above the 1960 total of 2,879,225. Farm vehicles increased by only 200 vehicles to 37,815.

"Boat trailers and other personally-owned units probably had much to do with the increase in trailer registrations," Hare pointed out. In 1961, 335,750 were registered compared to 1960's 322,512 registrations.

Also included in the total registration figure were 26,524 trailer coaches, 27,662 motorcycles, 366,609 commercial vehicles and 40,677 municipals.

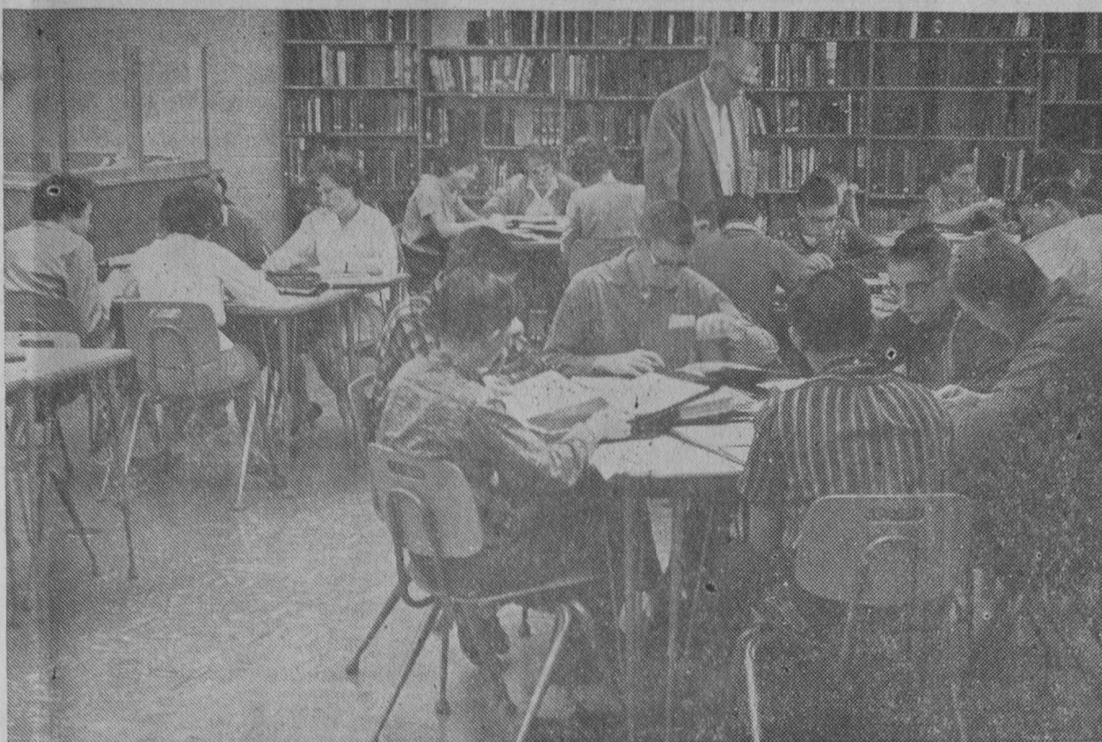

## 'Ask for Statement,' Advises SS Manager

Self-employed persons who have been reporting their earnings for social security would do well to ask for a statement of their official records, Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City Social Security office, advises.

"Social security records are as accurate as the returns they are based on," he explained, "but we have found that a great many of the social security reports do not show the taxpayer's account number and in some instances even the address is omitted. These incomplete reports are held in a suspense file and not credited to the taxpayer's social security account until they can be properly identified."

The importance of making sure that the earnings from self-employment have been properly credited arises from the fact that each such report covers a full year.

or four "quarters of coverage." And since eligibility for all benefits—retirement, survivors and disability—is based on having enough "quarters of coverage" to be insured, the omission of four such credits can be serious.

If you are a self-employed person, you must report your earnings for social security if you net \$400 or more in a taxable year. For this, you will receive credit for four quarters of coverage.

Post card forms to be used in obtaining a statement of the earnings credited to your social security account are available at any social security office.

A representative of the Social Security Administration will be in Tawas City at the Iosco County Building Thursday, February 8, 10:30 a. m., to take claims and give information in regard to social security.

## Grocers Prosper As Independents

All independent food store merchants are not being squeezed out by the chains. On the contrary, many are prospering.

This was demonstrated last year when about 1,000 independent food store operators gathered for a two-day convention sponsored by the Independent Grocers' Alliance in the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel.

The meeting was the first of four being sponsored by the IGA for its more than 5,000 retail food members in 44 states and seven Canadian provinces. The events mark the 35th anniversary of the group, which is said to be the largest voluntary food store chain in the world. Similar meetings will be held in New Orleans, Chicago and San Francisco.

**Many Services Available**  
A voluntary food group is created or sponsored by wholesalers who seek to line up steady customers among independent retailers. In return for a pledge to buy nearly all of their inventories from these wholesalers, the retailers are given rock-bottom prices. In addition, they obtain from groups such as the IGA many services ranging from national advertising to how to construct or rebuild a store.

Such groups should not be confused with cooperative chains, in which the retail members jointly set up a wholesaler to buy for them and then split the profits. These organizations also are prospering and the two groups combined now do a greater percentage of the grocery business than the corporate chains.

IGA estimates that affiliated independents are now doing 47 percent of the grocery business, while chains account for 39 percent and unaffiliated independents 14 percent.

IGA was organized in 1926—the idea of J. Frank Grimes, who was joined in the venture by William W. Thompson and Louis G. Groebe. All three were partners in the William W. Thompson Company, certified public accountants. It was while working on the books of the nation's largest wholesale grocers that Mr. Grimes came to the conclusion that something must be done to halt the rapid slide into limbo of the independent retailer.

The first retailer meeting was held in Poughkeepsie, New York, where 69 independent store owners, serviced by William T. Reynolds and Company, became charter members of the IGA. By 1927, the new organization had opened up territories in 17 states, including New York. It has grown ever

since. International headquarters have remained in Chicago, where the staff has become one of the most respected merchandising groups in the food industry.

As a member of the group, the operator of a country store doing a business of \$5,000 a week can buy his merchandise on the same low-price basis as the proprietor of a giant urban supermarket. In addition, the small merchant has full access to all the information provided by IGA headquarters on matters such as advertising, accounting and management procedures, store layout and perishable department operations—the same assistance that is available to a corporate chain store manager.

In 1952, Don R. Grimes, son of the founder, was named president of IGA. He had had 23 years of experience in the food business before that time. After graduating from the University of Illinois, the son worked for a large Chicago food wholesaler and with the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company before joining the voluntary group. In that organization, he worked in nearly all divisions before becoming president.

His formula for success in the retail food store business, he said, was a simple one—"Give the shopping public the very best in quality products at competitive prices, then deliver something extra in the way of friendliness, store personality and community services."

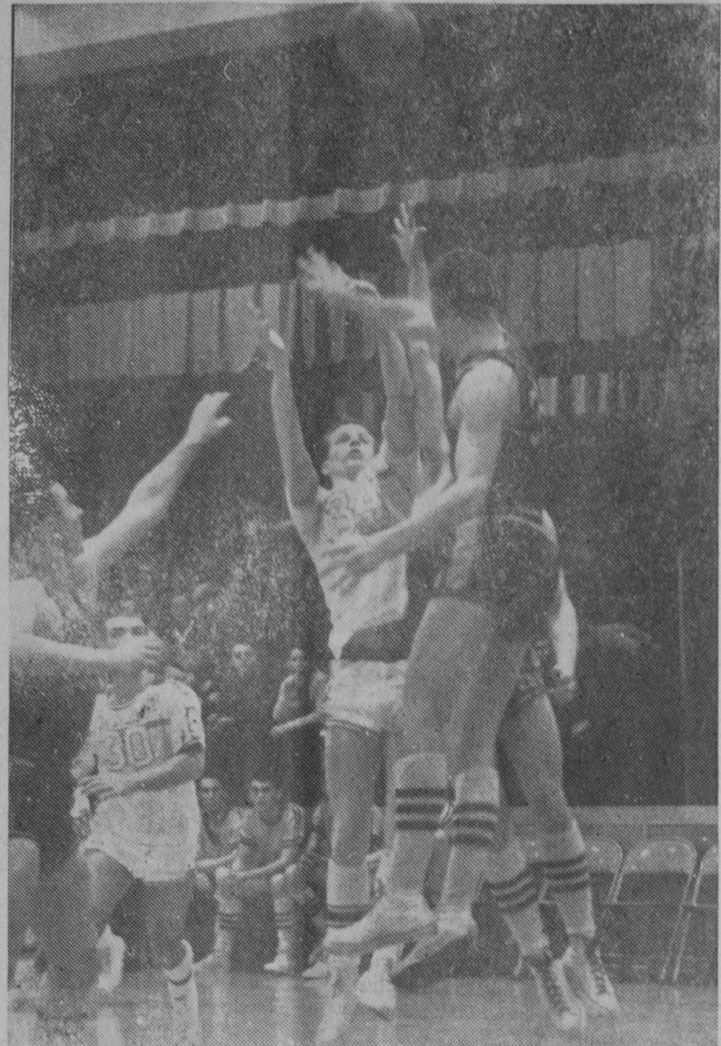
The Spartans held on to the lead the rest of the first quarter, but Partlo's lone field goal of the game put the Cards in front, 14-13, as the second quarter started.

## Food Costs Less Than 50 Years Ago, Says Gifford

Food actually costs less today than it did 50 years ago. And what is more, the money saved could buy in the neighborhood of \$1,000 worth of appliances or other home furnishings during a year.

H. A. Gifford, vice president of the Kroger Detroit division of the Kroger Company which operates some 101 supermarkets in the Eastern Michigan area, makes this startling comment and then proceeds to prove his point.

"Direct price comparisons do not mean much," Mr. Gifford declares. "They are a little like the man who says he could have bought a choice building lot back in 1933 for \$250, but unfortunately he didn't even have \$2.50."

Food prices in 1912 sound fabulously low when compared to 1962 prices but the illusion fades when you compare the "real" cost, the number of working hours needed to purchase those items.

Today's average factory wage in the United States, according to the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics, is \$95.82 for a 40-hour week. On the average, food takes 20 percent of our salary today and if eating the same foods as 1912, it would take even less.

If 45 percent of an individual's income was spent just for food as back in 1912, the weekly food bill in 1962 would total a whopping \$43.12, so in effect, \$23.96 each week is saved.

"Food today is even more of a

bargain than it appears from this quick look," Mr. Gifford added, pointing out the many services "built in" today's foods.

Many hours of shopping and preparation time are saved by the prewashing, pretrimming, peeling, cutting and packaging that is taken for granted today.

Frozen foods, refrigeration and modern transportation in particular have contributed toward changing eating habits, Mr. Gifford said.

One of the big factors in holding down food costs has been the development of mass distribution to match the benefits of mass production. Each year, food retailers have increased services and conveniences for customers and at the same time continued to operate under a surprisingly small net profit. Average net profit for retail food chains, for example, is just about a penny per dollar of sales.

Americans are not only eating better today at lower cost in terms of working hours required to earn the food, Mr. Gifford said, but they lead the world in that respect. A quart of milk, for example, "costs" seven minutes working time in the United States, 14 in England and 33 in Russia. It takes an American 3.2 minutes to earn enough to buy a pound of sugar while the Russians must work one hour and a quarter to buy this amount.

## Union Gunboats Smash Key Rebel Fortress

### Soaring Saga of Seafaring Sung To a Twisting Tennessee Tune

PADUCAH, Ky.—Feb. 6—Fort Henry, a key Southern defense point just across the Tennessee-Kentucky border, was surrendered to the Union today after a history-making assault by a flotilla of river warships.

Some 2,600 men abandoned the battered Tennessee river fortress as troops commanded by Brig. Gen. Ulysses S. Grant approached.

But the heroes of the victory—and Gen. Grant was quick to point this out—were the Navy crewmen commanded by Flag Officer Andrew H. Foote.

FROM THEIR guns in the four ironclads and three wooden gunboats that made up the force, these men had relentlessly peppered the fort while under fierce return fire.

Aboard the ironclad "Essex," 32 men fell dead or wounded when a shell-pierced boiler blew up.

Another of the ironclads, "Carondelet," was hit solidly 30 times. Yet its guns kept firing.

With the other ironclads "Cincinnati" and "St. Louis," and the gunboats "Tyler," "Lexington" and "Conestoga," Flag Officer Foote left Cairo, Ill., four days ago.

Each of the ironclads was armed with six 32-pound guns, three 8-inch guns, four rifled Army 42-pounders and a 12-pound boat howitzer.

THE FORT, in its vantage point high on the river bank, defended itself with 11 heavy guns.

After hours of deadly accurate exchange of fire, Gen. Lloyd Tilghman, commander of the bastion, struck his flag. By this time the bulk of the garrison had fled, presumably for Ft. Donelson, 12 miles away.

Defenders of Ft. Henry listed their casualties at five killed, 11 wounded, five missing and 78 captured.

When Grant and his staff arrived at 3 p.m., he was specific in his praise for Flag Officer Foote and the crewmen. Commander Henry Walke of the Carondelet was named temporary commander of the fort.

Congressman Cederberg said final selection is on a strictly competitive basis and the young men in each group, determined by academy officials as having made the highest mark in the examination, will receive the appointment.

This year the 10th District has two vacancies at the military academy, West Point, for which four district youths will compete for each vacancy; one vacancy at the naval academy, Annapolis, for which six youths will compete; one vacancy at the air force academy, Colorado Springs, for which 11 competitors have been named, and four boys are nominated for the merchant marine academy, Kings Point, New York, to compete on a state-wide basis to fill Michigan's quota.

(Continued from page 1.) 000 visitors who joined the fun at the winter playground.

That winter, attendance jumped to 23,745 and, by the start of the fourth season, activities at Silver Valley continued to expand. Bernice Gearhart was chosen winter sports queen in 1940.

Then came December 7 and Pearl Harbor. Although some 24,000 persons visited Silver Valley that winter, activities were soon to be sharply curtailed. Leta Clement was named winter sports queen in the last prewar carnival.

The years of disuse saw toboggan runs crumble and bridges rot. Following the close of the war, the winter sports committee found itself faced with a major rehabilitation of the park and between \$2,000 and \$3,000 was raised in the Tawas to start the rebuilding job.

A crew of returned veterans was hired to rebuild and operate the facilities for the 1946 season and work bees were again organized to assist. When the first week in February again rolled around, Silver Valley was once again ready to host winter sports activities and Donna Moore reigned as fifth winter sports queen, with Ben Wright of the Michigan Tourist Council officiating at her coronation.

W. D. (Mike) Nunn took over as general chairman in 1947 and Patricia Bolen was crowned queen by Tony Weitzel, Detroit radio announcer.

The following year, Betty Cooper was crowned 1948 winter sports queen by Mark Beltaire, Detroit Free Press columnist. Among those serving on the committee were Nathan Barkman, Earl Beament and Victor Marzinski, who have since deceased.

The year 1949 saw the start of Van Patrick's tenure at crowning Silver Valley queens. With Stanley Humphrey as general chairman and Weitzel looking on, the Detroit radio announcer placed the crown on the head of Golda Schultz. As an added attraction, there was a boxing show at the East Tawas Recreation.

Chief Blue Cloud of the Indian reservation near Mikado was called upon to perform some of his special medicine in 1950. Taking a cue from 1941, when Blue Cloud built a ceremonial fire and was successful in his "prayers" for snow, mild weather again threatened to cancel out activities 11 years later. The chief meant business, but the snow turned into rain and spoiled the coronation of Joyce Michaus as Silver Valley queen.

The next two years moved swiftly along. Patrick was still around to crown Shirley Wellna in 1951 and Ruth Nash in 1952. Cecil Cable was followed as general chairman by Nathan Barkman in 1952.

There was no winter sports queen in 1953, the first year of John Pinter's tenure as general chairman. Instead, Diz Trout of the Detroit Tigers and Bob Reynolds, Detroit radio commentator, were on hand to officiate at the ceremonies for the winter sports prince and princess, Robert Price and Sue Fortune. This was also the first year for new steel toboggan slides which were installed the previous summer.

Reynolds has officiated at every Silver Valley carnival since that time, with the exception of 1958 when Ted Malone crowned Janice Schroeder. Reynolds crowned Barbara Young in 1955, Judy Stanton in 1956, Linda Hudson in 1957, Charlotte Bachman in 1959 and Joanne Mayer last year. No winter sports queen was selected in 1960.

In addition to Pinter's general chairmanship in 1953, 1954, 1955 and in 1957, George Baldwin served in 1956. Donald Watson in 1958 and L. G. (Ladd) McKay took over the helm in 1959 and has continued since that time.

Many improvements have been made at the winter sports park in the past several years, the most notable ones being construction of a new ski area chalet, new ski slopes and tows.

Any profit which remains after the yearly operation continues to go into these improvements and today Silver Valley is still the "family playground," the original idea of the founders back in 1937.
