

# Hickman Named to Principal Post

Alfred B. Hickman, former principal at the Alabaster unit of Tawas Area Schools, has been hired as teaching principal in the new Tawas City elementary unit.

This action was taken Monday night at the regular meeting of the Tawas Area Board of Education.

Hickman will work directly under Miss Clara Bolen, elementary supervisor, who will divide her time between the East Tawas and Tawas City units.

With this promotion, Hickman is to receive an annual salary increase of \$400, bringing his total salary to \$6,155.

Some concern was expressed by Miss Bolen Monday night as to the availability of the new elementary unit by the start of the

school term. She said that if the building was not completed by that time, it would result in a disruption of classroom schedules.

The board of education is to investigate the matter.

Moving into the new elementary unit will be one section of the fourth grade, all students in the fifth, sixth and seventh grades. The eighth grade will remain at the senior high school building and there will be one section of fourth grade at the East Tawas unit.

Teachers moving to the unit from the high school building are Lyle Berry, John Alexander and Mrs. Eber Wetzell. Moving from the Alabaster unit are Paul Youngs, Mrs. Waldo Leslie, Mrs. John Coyle and Mrs. Austin McGuire.

Mrs. John Weible, a new teacher in the system this year, will become a fifth grade teacher at the new unit.

The old elementary unit, which will be attached to the new building, will continue to have a kindergarten, first, second and third grade section.

The fifth and sixth grade sections are being moved to the new unit from the old Alabaster unit, which is to be discontinued.

## Death Caused by Heart Attack

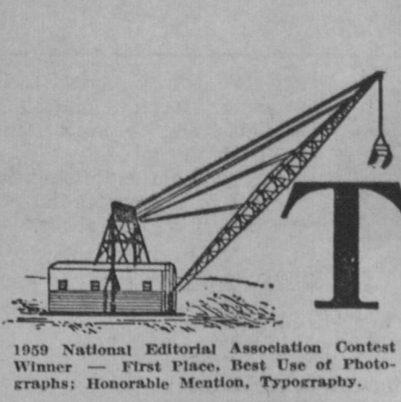
Cause of death of a 38-year-old scuba diver on June 30 was due to a heart attack, according to Coroner E. D. Jacques.

Investigation was conducted by Robert Foster of the Oscoda Township Police Department.

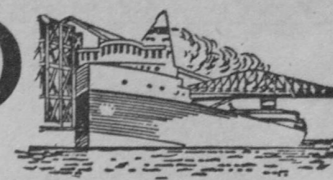
## Judge Travels

## County Has 10,378 School Aged People

County School Superintendent William F. Tracy was busy Monday making final tabulations on the 1962 census of school-aged children in Iosco County.

The report was to have been submitted Tuesday to the state superintendent of public instruction. State primary money for the four school districts in the county is based on this count.

According to the report, there is a total of 10,378 persons between the ages of one and 20 years in Iosco County. This represents an increase of 740 over the previous year.

Of the 9,638 total last year, some 5,882 were actually enrolled in county schools. This figure represents the highest average of students attending school for any county in the state, based on percentage of population.

Census totals for 1962 are as follows:

Tawas Area School District, 3,085, a decrease of 141; Whittemore-Prescott Area, 1,372, an increase of 23; Hale Area, 678, a decrease of 45; Oscoda Area, 5,253, an increase of 778.

Another report made public Monday by Tracy revealed that the four Iosco school districts have a total state equalized valuation of \$68,109,510. All four of these districts include townships and cities of Iosco County and portions of adjoining counties.

Total valuations, as assessed by supervisors and then state equalized, upon which taxes are based, are as follows:

Hale Area, including Plainfield Township and portions of Grant, Reno, Hill and Logan Townships: \$4,357,960 assessed, \$8,789,821 state equalized.

Oscoda Area, including Ausable, Oscoda and Greenbush Townships and portions of Wilber, Gastin and Mikado Townships: \$10,109,136 assessed, \$22,944,624 state equalized.

Tawas Area, including Alabaster, Baldwin and Tawas Townships, the Cities of Tawas City and East Tawas and portions of Grant, Sherman, Wilber and Whitney

Townships: \$12,615,245 assessed, \$25,722,894 state equalized.

Whittemore - Prescott Area, including City of Whittemore, Burleigh Township and portions of Reno, Sherman, Turner, Clayton, Mason, Richland, Mills and Logan Townships, \$5,552,344 assessed, \$10,852,171 state equalized.

Before coming to Whittemore-Prescott at the start of the 1956-57 term, Manwaring had been principal at Perry for three years.

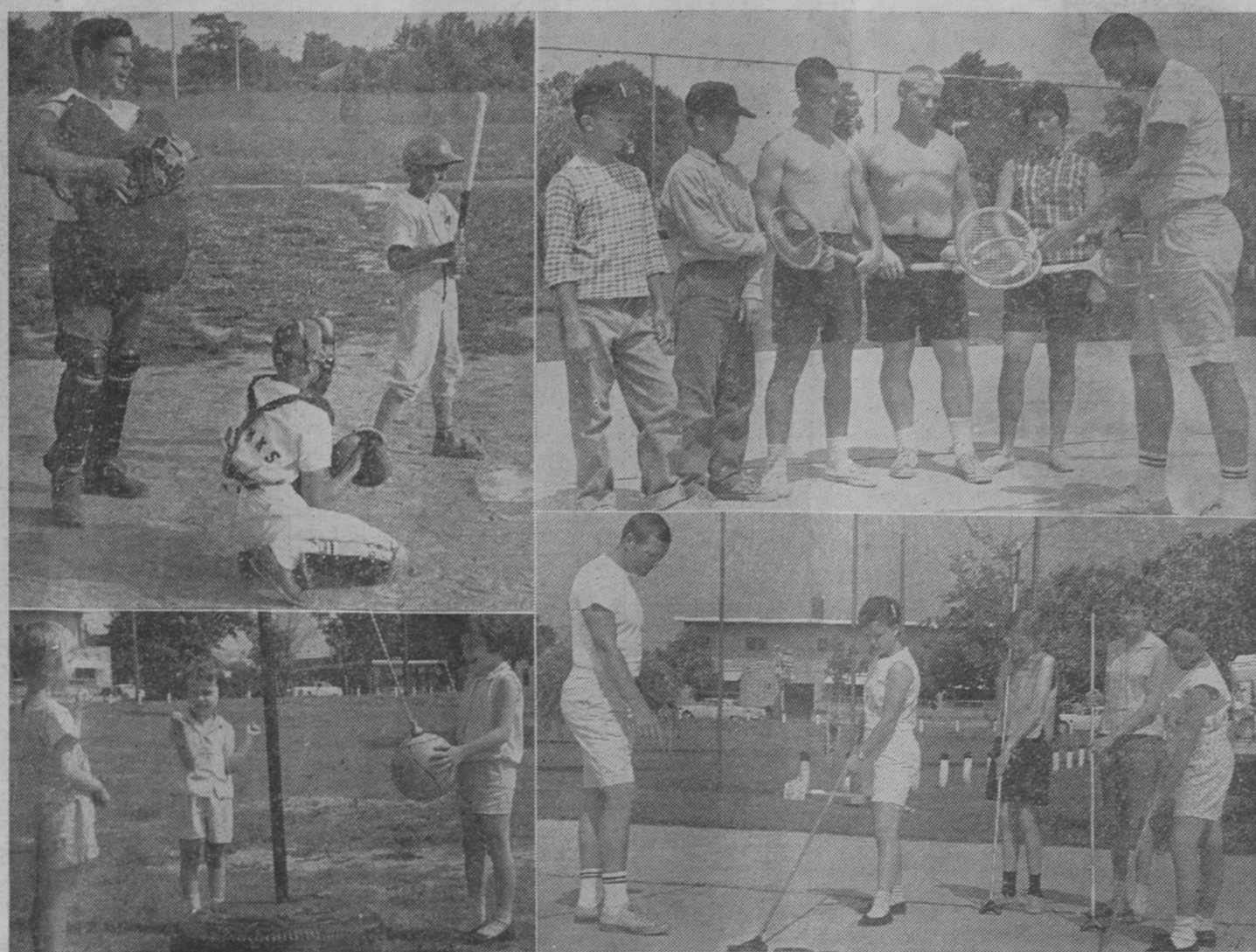
## W. Look Re-elected School Board Prexy

The board adopted a resolution relative to borrowing funds on anticipated tax revenue to pay cost of the Tawas City elementary unit.

Yet to be approved by the Municipal Finance Commission is the board's request to borrow \$66,000 on 1962 anticipated taxes and \$58,000 on 1963 taxes, the money being raised by the special tax levy approved by voters last year.

## Seek More Participation in Youth Recreation Program

Nearly 400 youngsters are taking part in the Tawas area's new summer program of organized recreation which was launched June 4 and is scheduled to run through August 1.

However, according to Director Lyle Berry, the majority of these youngsters are participating in the summer baseball program and a very small number are turning out for organized play at the Tawas City Park and East Tawas athletic field.

Berry said that many more youngsters should take advantage of the tennis instruction which is being given at these two sites, along with the daily organized recreational program.

Schedule for the youth recreational program is as follows: Monday and Wednesday, East Tawas, 10:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon;

Tuesday and Thursday, Tawas City, 10:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon; tennis, 1:00 to 4:00 p. m., supervised play.

Friday morning, 9 o'clock to 12:00 noon, supervised play at Tawas City; Friday afternoon supervised play at East Tawas.

This program is being financed jointly by the City of Tawas City, the City of East Tawas and the

Tawas Area Board of Education.

In addition to this program, Berry has responsibility for directing the junior baseball program. Nearly 300 boys are participating in the three baseball leagues, Knothole, Pony and nine-year-old.

This is the first year that the Tawas area has had a complete summer recreational program under charge of a paid director.

## Play Opens on New 'Back Nine' at Tawas Golf and Country Club

Play has commenced on the new "back nine" of Tawas Golf and Country Club, located on Monument Road west of the Tawas.

Although not expected to be in top-flight playing condition until next season, golfers have been enjoying this beautiful tree-studded course for the past two weeks.

Work on the new nine holes, as well as revamping and reconstruction of the front nine, was started last year by owner, Alvin Zaharias.

The new course, with a total of 2,690 yards, is 582 yards longer than the 2,908-yard course which has been in operation here for the past 37 years.

Zaharias has planned this new course to take advantage of the many trees on the property and two greens are situated in an apple orchard. Most of the fairways are long and narrow with fringes of trees and water courses along the edges to make them more sporty.

The new course boasts two of the longest fairways in Michigan, the 725-yard par six No. 13 and 775-yard par six No. 18. Both of these fairways have "doglegs" to the right.

Two of the prettiest greens are the 145-yard 14th hole and 300-yard 16th, which are situated back-to-back in the orchard. Another sporty hole is the 375-yard No. 17, with a tree-lined fairway which turns to the left.

A complete watering system was installed this spring on the new course, taking advantage of Sims Creek which separates the two nines.

Remodeling of the clubhouse this year includes construction of a glass wall separating the dining area from the bar, complete air conditioning and a basement locker room with outside entrance.

With the number of golfing enthusiasts growing each year, this 18-hole course situated in a summer tourist area is receiving a heavier play each year. The new back nine will improve as foot traffic increases.

Zaharias' plans for next year include complete revamping of the original nine-hole course and work has already been commenced on the new greens. A large patio with practice putting green in front of the clubhouse is also to be completed.

## Tawas Teachers Taking Extra Classes Get Salary Hike

Tawas Area Board of Education voted Monday night to raise the pay of three teachers who have a full schedule of six academic classes per day.

Receiving an extra \$150 annually will be John Forsten, mathematics; Miss Marilyn Westrich, commercial, and Richard Ferguson, language.

The normal class load for teachers is five periods a day. Regular salary schedule for teaching six classes had been \$300 and the salary will now be \$450.

In other business, it was the suggestion of Miss Clara Bolen, elementary supervisor, that the board of education investigate the possibility of combining water bills from the City of Tawas City as a means of lowering rates.

The board authorized purchase of 70 chair-desks, authorized obtaining information on prices for purchase of portable wire cage and baskets for storing equipment in gym classes and authorized advertising for bids on the purchase of 10 file cabinets for the Tawas City elementary unit.

The board reviewed a list of 16 bus drivers to be hired for the coming school term. No action was taken on the matter. A move to require that the age of bus drivers not be above 65 years failed by a 4-3 vote. Dr. Earl Hasty, district health director, is to be contacted to see if he will administer physical examinations to all bus drivers.

Purchase of geometry workbooks under the TEMAC program was approved by the board. This is the same program which proved to be a success in the teaching of algebra to junior high students last year.

## Demonstrate Wildlife Pond Construction Today

Iosco County landowners interested in constructing ponds for wildlife—ducks, fish—have an opportunity to view the construction of such a pond using high explosives.

A demonstration is to be held Wednesday morning (today) at the Albert Zubeck property in Section 24, Tawas Township. Starting at 9 o'clock, visitors are invited to watch procedures for laying out an area for pond blasting.

At 10 o'clock, the one-third acre pond will be blasted using dynamite and ammonium nitrate. Shortly after the blast, there will be a discussion of results by Willard Cutler, Michigan State University agricultural engineer.

This is to be followed by an explanation by Zubeck of how to grow trout in a farm pond.

The Zubeck property is located 1½ miles from the M-55-US-23 intersection. Tour signs will direct interested persons to the proper location, turning right at the Mobilgas station on M-55, north one-half mile and east one-half mile.

This program is being conducted under direction of Marvin Davenport, county extension director, in cooperation with the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Soil Conservation Service and the United States Forest Service.

Representatives of these groups met Tuesday with area vocational agricultural instructors. A demonstration of blasting wildlife ponds was held at the Tuttle Marsh. In charge of blasting were Robert Reanser, vocational agricultural instructor at Tawas Area High School, and Robert Radtke of the forest service's Cadillac office.

"We are attempting to set up better areas for the propagation of ducks and fish through blasting these shallow ponds in areas that cannot be used for anything else," stated Davenport.

He emphasized that the program today was open to the public and urged all interested persons to attend.

## Two Autos Burn in Freak Fires

Fire, believed to have been caused by a faulty ignition system, completely destroyed an automobile owned by Gerald Potts, Tawas City, early Sunday morning.

By the time the fire was noticed and the Tawas City Volunteer Fire Department called to the scene, the auto's interior had been completely gutted.

Fire of a similar nature destroyed an auto owned by Edgar Schlicker, Wilber Township, on Friday.

## Swim Classes Start July 16 in Tawas

Nearly 150 youngsters and adults have registered in the American Red Cross-sponsored swimming program to be held in the Tawas area this summer. This program is held in cooperation with city councils of Tawas City and East Tawas.

Registration for the swimming lessons were held Friday and Saturday, but Instructor Douglas Evans said this week that late registrations would be taken up to the start of the classes.

Late registrations will also be taken for those youngsters presently enrolled in summer camps.

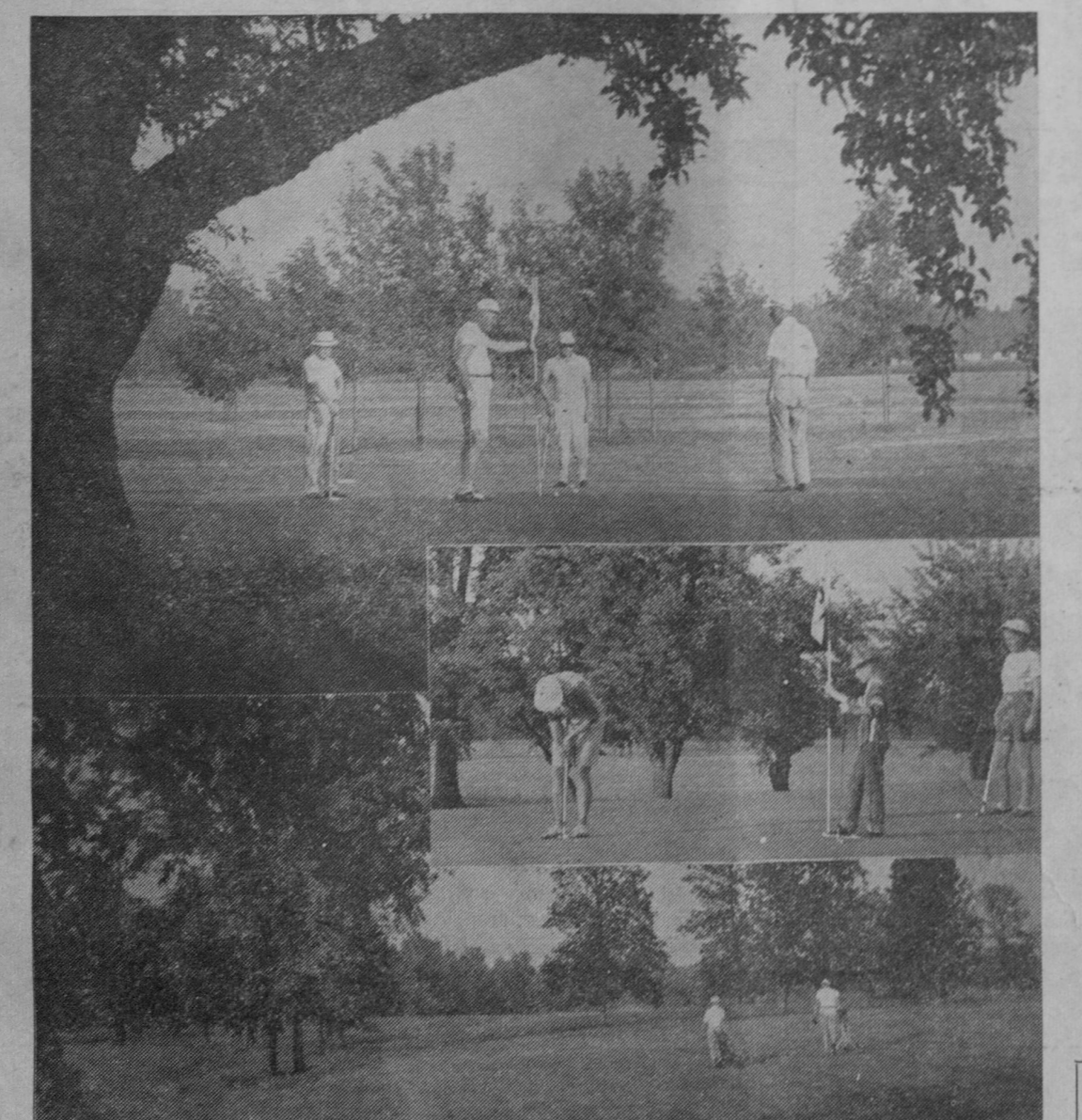
Regular swimming classes are slated to start the week of July 16. Weekly class schedule is as follows: Tawas City: Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday—9:00-9:30 a. m., intermediate and swimmers; 9:30-10:00 a. m., beginner; 10:00-10:30 a. m., adult class.

East Tawas: Thursday, Friday, Saturday—9:00-9:30 a. m., intermediate and swimmer; 9:30-10:00 a. m., beginner; 10:00-10:30 a. m., adults; 10:30-11:00 a. m., advanced beginners.

Any adult or teen-ager wishing to take life-saving instruction, help as a water safety aide or swimmer's aide should contact Evans.

Mothers who would like to assist with the swimming program may sign as a water safety aide, if they hold a lifesaving certificate, or they may assist as a swimming aide if they do not hold a certificate.

Evans said that mothers of the youngsters would assist with instruction in both the beginner and advanced beginner groups. A seven-week life saving instruction course started at East Tawas on Monday. Also starting Monday was swimming aide instruction.



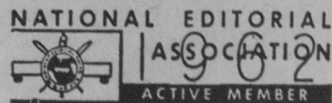

### 1962 Official Mich. Highway Map is Ready for Public

The 1962 Official Michigan State Highway Map is off the press, the state highway department reports. State Highway

Commissioner John C. Mackie said nearly 2,000 changes have been made on the map since last year, mainly the result of 238 miles of new freeway that were open to traffic in Michigan during 1961.

In addition, detailed strip maps of the state's major freeways are on the map for the first time this year. They show location and design of freeway interchanges.

Highest priority has been given to distribution of maps to nearly 25,000 individuals who have written in recent weeks asking for a copy of the map. At the same time, bulk shipments have gone out to tourist associations, chambers of commerce, hotels, oil companies, travel bureaus and others.

"The average Michigan motorist will drive nearly 10,000 miles this year—most of it on highways in this state," Mackie said. "The wise driver will have a copy of the new map handy because of the many changes that have occurred on the state's highway system during the last year."

### Hear Report on New Lutheran Church Formation

A report on the formation of the new Lutheran Church in America was given members of the Grace Lutheran Church Sunday by the Rev. William Lindholm, who attended the constituting convention held at Cobo Hall, Detroit, recently. The convention theme was "One Lord, One Faith."

Pastor Lindholm told his congregation that one of the most significant events in the history of American Protestantism occurred when four Lutheran synods, long divided by language and national heritage, voted to form the largest Lutheran Church in America with over 3,200,000 members in 6,200 congregations. In so doing, the church became the sixth largest Protestant body in the United States.

Pastor Lindholm said that one of the highlights of the convention for him was when Dr. John Behnken, retiring president of the Missouri Synod, addressed the convention and was given three standing ovations when he declared that the office of the president of the Missouri Synod was dedicated to the union of all Lutheran churches in America. It was also announced that the Missouri Synod had approved the first step in cooperation with the other two Lutheran synods in forming the National Lutheran Association, an agency through which the three Lutheran synods would work and continue theological discussions.

Grace Lutheran Church of East Tawas will no longer be known as belonging to the Augustana Synod but will now be known as a congregation of the Lutheran Church in America (LCA). Charles Nash of East Tawas was the lay delegate to the Detroit convention.

### Will Attend District Missionary League Convention

Mrs. Daniel McGuire, Mrs. O. J. Westcott and Mrs. Arnold Guilford of Zion Lutheran Church, Tawas City, will attend the ninth biennial Michigan District Convention of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League to be held July 17, 18 and 19 at Shaw Hall, Michigan State University, East Lansing. The latter two are delegates of their local society. Approximately 1,000 women from the state are expected to attend.

An auxiliary of the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod, the league is an international organization which has a membership in Michigan of 260 societies and over 14,600 members. Missionary inspiration, education and service are its objectives.

The mite box offerings of members for the past two years provided funds in the amount of \$32,000 for student aid for girls, district missions and foreign missions in addition to approximately \$11,000 for international projects to be selected at the convention.

The convention speaker will be Mrs. H. H. Koppelman of St. Louis, Missouri, who toured the foreign mission field with her husband in his capacity as executive secretary of missions.

Mrs. Erwin F. Wiese of Detroit is president of the Michigan District and Mrs. McGuire is the Timberline Zone president. Convention co-chairmen are Mrs. Albert Ruhlger of Dexter and Mrs. Richard Deierlein of Detroit.

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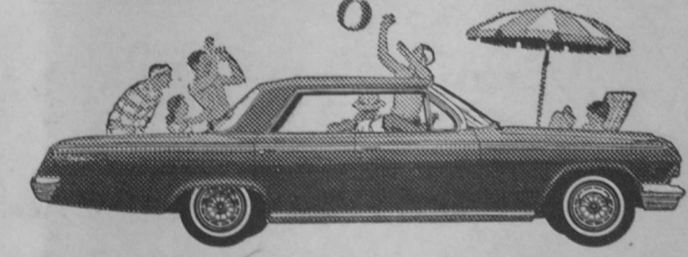

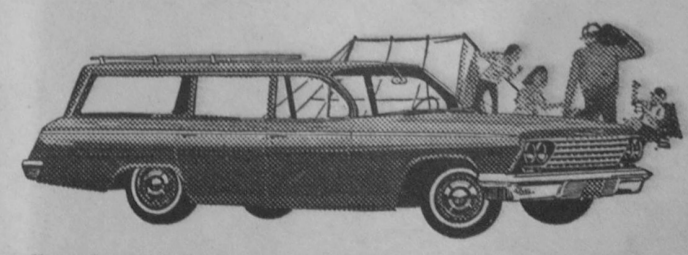

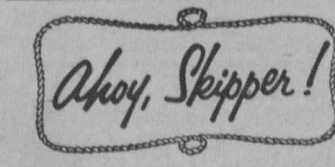

ROUGH WEATHER HANDLING

When displayed, the small craft warning pennant is usually flying six to eight hours before and after bad weather is forecast. In spite of this warning, small boat operators often venture farther out on open water than common sense dictates and

such action can cause some anxious moments if the boat and occupants may be caught in a storm. To lessen chances of the boat capsizing or swamping, speed should be reduced. This prevents excessive pounding of the boat and will be more comfortable for the passengers. There will also be less chance of losing control of the boat. Cross the waves at an angle, even drop anchor if it becomes too uncomfortable or dangerous. The next important thing to do is to have everyone put on life preservers or jackets. As a mat-

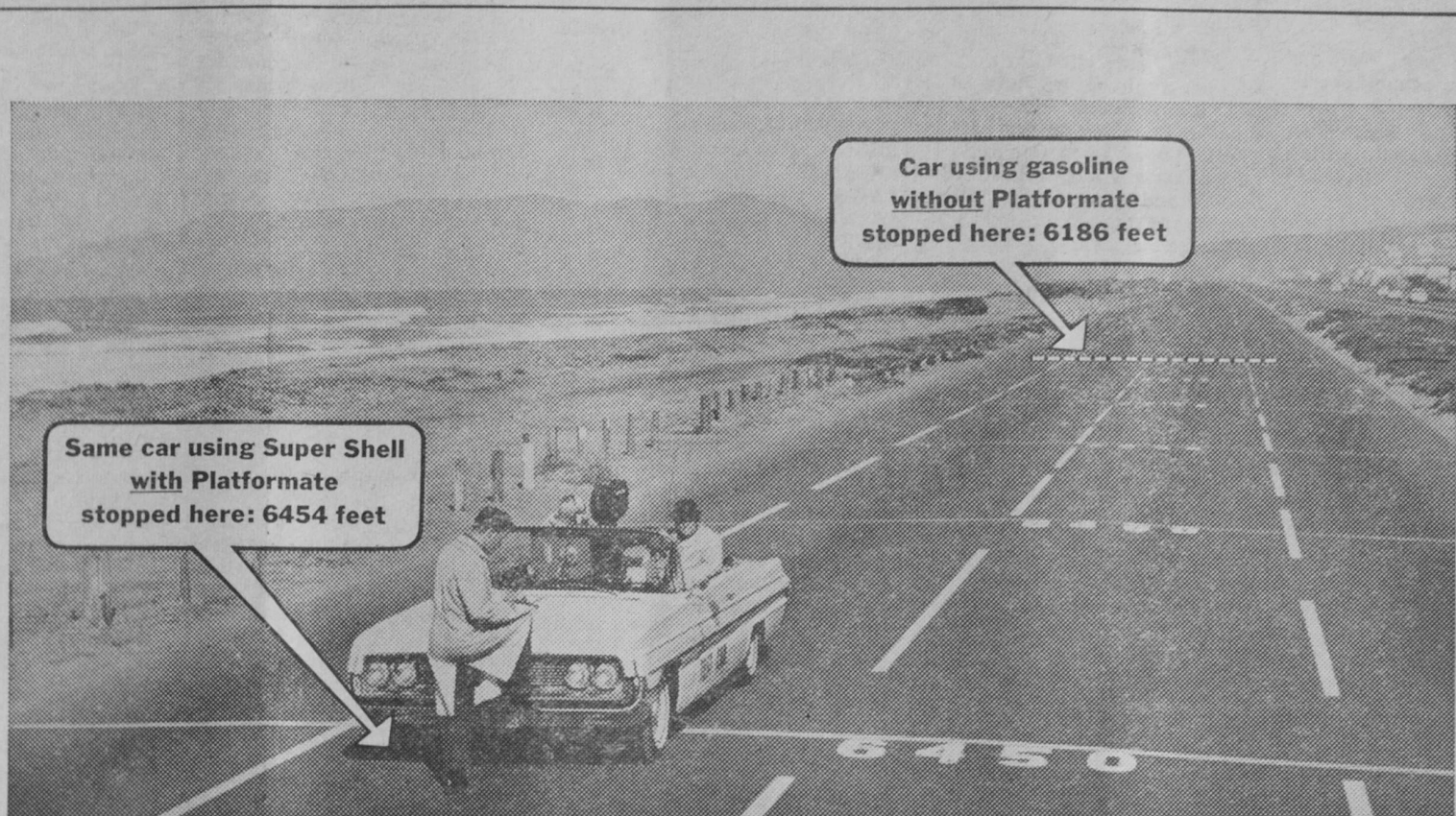
ter of fact where younger children may be involved, they should wear life jackets at all times when aboard a boat. And grown-ups should put on jackets at the first sign of bad weather. No one should be embarrassed at wearing a life preserver or jacket. If the water becomes exceedingly rough and there appears danger of capsizing, another recommendation is that all the occupants of the boat sit on the bottom. This will lower the center of gravity. If the occupants of a small boat are unfortunate enough to be in-

involved in a capsizing, an important rule of safety is "stay with the boat." Most boats will float even when completely awash and will in many cases actually support a number of adults. Do not attempt to swim ashore unless it is near and the swimmer has on a life jacket. Desirably only the best swimmer should attempt this because it is generally safer to stay with the boat.

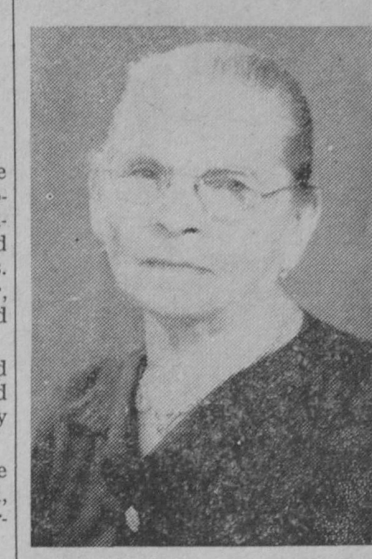

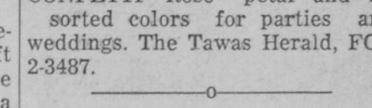

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## Awards to Help Young People Further Education

A \$50,000 awards program honoring outstanding scholarship projects has been announced by the General Federation of Women's Clubs and Shell Oil Company. The awards will go to women's clubs that do most to help young people further their education.

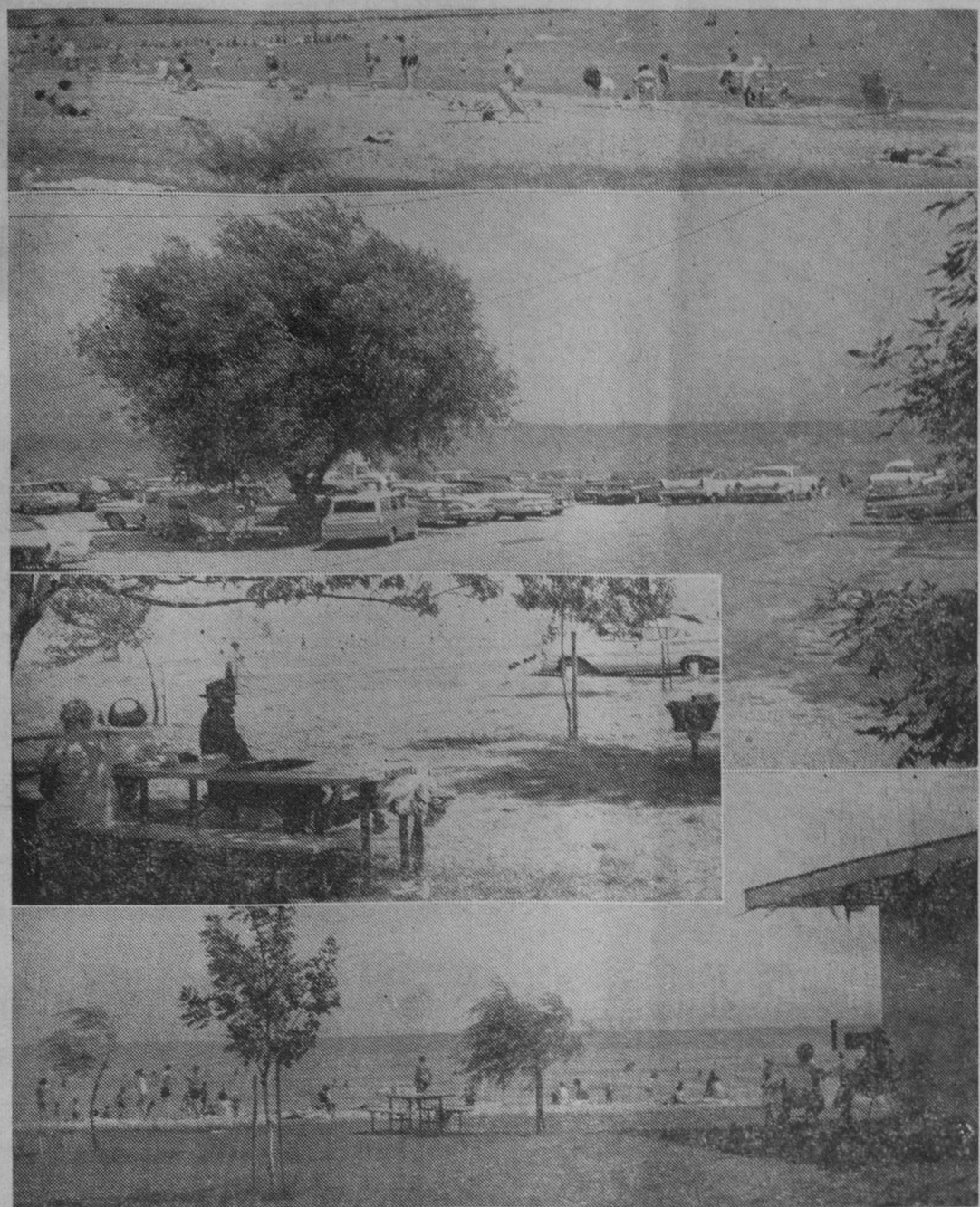

### Park Crammed With Picnickers...

Facilities at Tawas City Park have been used extensively by area residents and tourists during the past several weeks.

The park was particularly crammed Sunday with picnickers, bathers and fishermen. The 460-foot-long pier in Tawas Bay has been used by perch fishermen throughout the spring.

Only eight years ago, this city-owned property was an unimproved area filled with cattails and stagnant water.

Starting with organization of the Tawas City Park Board in July of 1954, nearly \$25,000 was spent on improvements in a span

of two years. Additional expenditures have been made since then. Included were raising the park level by two feet, reconstruction of the dock, construction of a new bathroom, lighting, tennis and shuffleboard courts, parking lot, sewer and water facilities, picnic tables and grills and the planting last year of 45 trees.

Only recently, Chester Parker, caretaker, was commended for his work at the park by the Tawas City Council and Tawas City Businessmen's Association.

Last week, it was reported to the city council that there may be a possibility of obtaining an old wooden waycar (caboose) from the Detroit and Mackinac Railway to be used as a museum at the park.

No details were announced, but it was said that a meeting of the park board is to be held in the near future to discuss this matter and other improvements at the park.

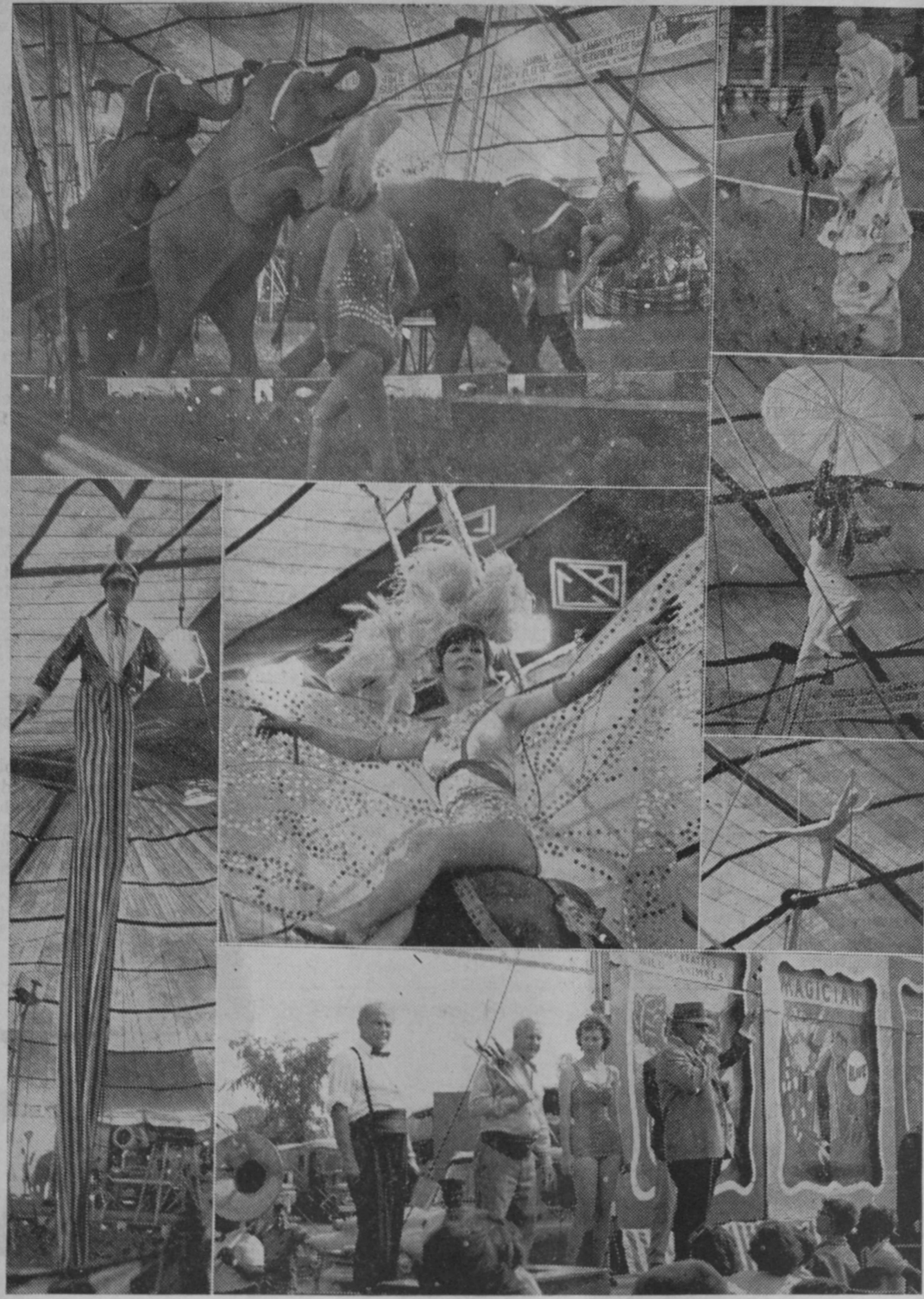

## Ways to Good Outdoor Eating



There's no better place or time to eat fish than in the out-of-doors right after you've caught them. And here's a few ways to prepare the day's catch for eating. First, the cleaning part. Use a heavy, sharp knife, grasping the fish firmly by the tail and work from tail to head in scraping off scales. You might prefer to leave the head and tails on small fish, or large fish that are to be served whole. Slit the underside from gills to vent to remove the insides. Rub the inside of the body cavity with salt to clean. Fins may be removed easily by slitting flesh at each side, grasping the rear of each fin and pulling toward the head. Now for your choice of cooking. A real treat in good eating can be had by frying freshly caught fish. How about trying hush puppies fried in fat after the fish are cooked? To make 'em, mix 2 cups corn meal, 1 cup milk or water, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons baking powder, and 1 finely diced onion. Shape into balls and fry until well browned. Overnight campers may savor a breakfast of baked trout. For this meal, remove the heads in cleaning and season inside and out with salt and pepper. Roll the fish separately in waxed paper and fold ends, then wrap each in a separate trench, cover with one inch of earth, and build your campfire above. Don't remove and unwrap until breakfast is served.—Mich. Dept. of Conservation

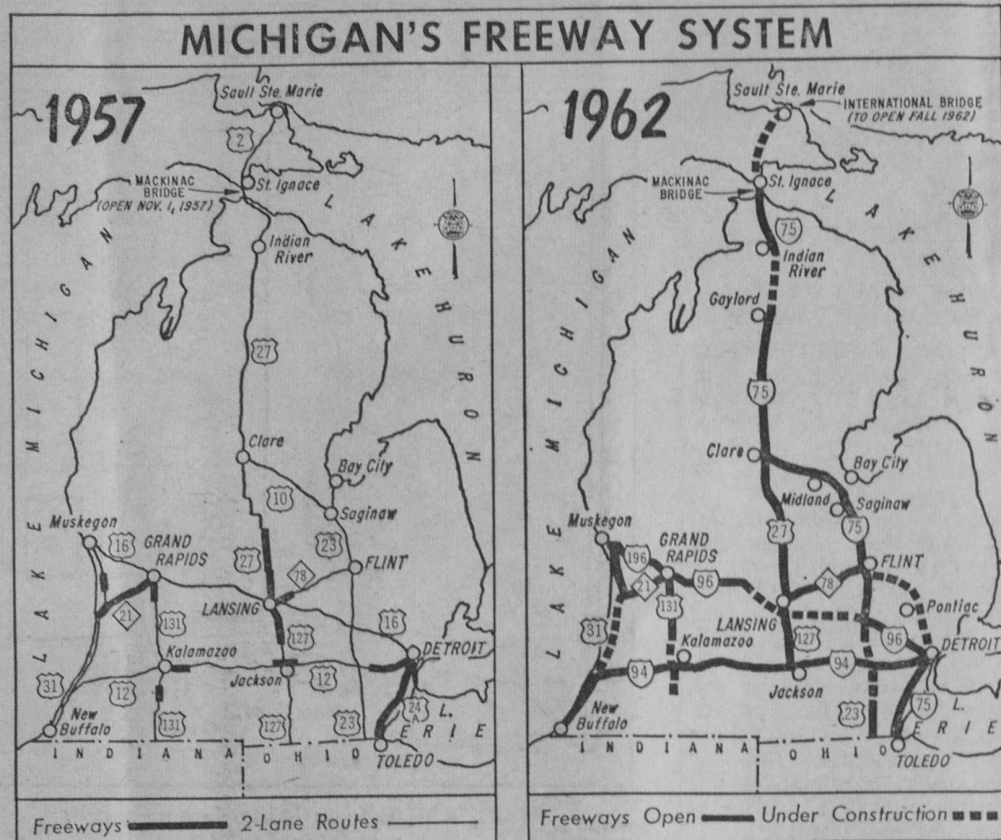

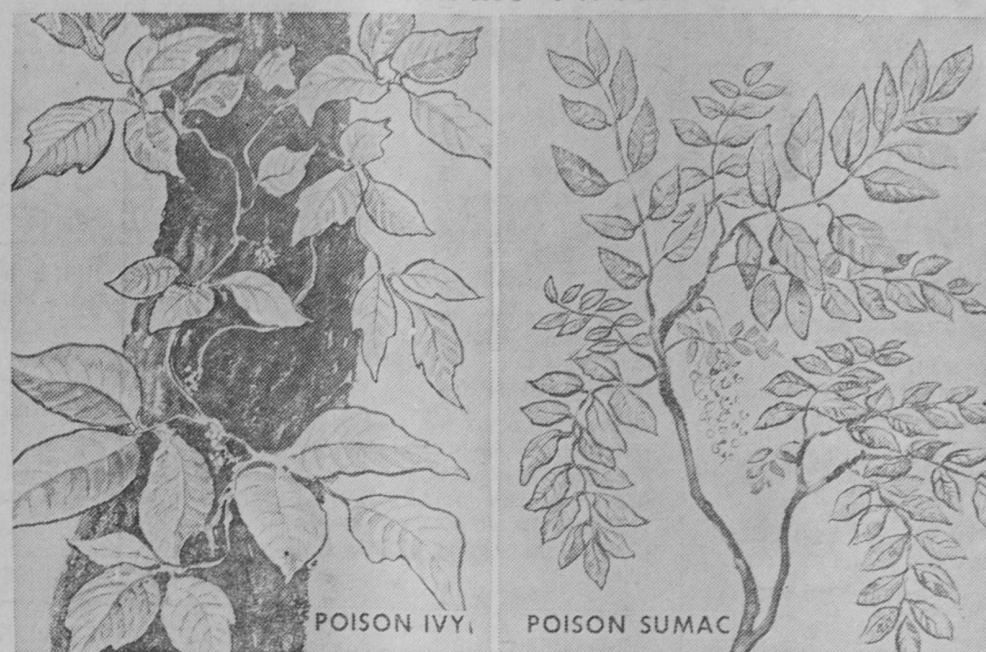
## Workshop to Hold Open House

Director Donald J. Wagner announced today that members of the community and area teachers are invited to attend an open house display of individual projects and available resources planned by members of the Oscoda Area Community Resources Workshop at the high school on Friday, July 13, from 1:00 to 3:00 p. m.

The open house will be the culmination of four weeks of study on the part of 24 area teachers relative to the types of community resources available for educational reference. Displays will be set up in the homemaking room of the high school, and workshop members and administrators will be available to discuss and explain the various types of information and materials collected. The primary objective of the course has been to catalogue and promote to the teachers of the area local resources and resource personnel which could be utilized in the general education of the children of this area.

Many of the workshop group have prepared study units containing these resources, and plan to introduce them to their classes during the coming year. The utilization of these vast, often untapped, stores of information can provide tremendous impact on the lives of children who have never been exposed to such areas of education.

### Troublesome Twosome



These two plants look innocent enough amidst Michigan's outdoor greenery, but don't be fooled. Their leaves and stems are covered with itchy trouble for unwary vacationers. Most common of these two is poison ivy which grows in roadside patches, small open ground clusters, and in mats on a forest floor. Being a climber, it may coil inconspicuously around trees and bushes and even rise to heights above your head. Its color varies from spring's pale green to summer's dark green, to fall's reds and oranges. Poison sumac is found in swampy places, chiefly around small lakes or swales, or along streams. If you come in direct contact with either plant, treat your trouble immediately. Wash the exposed area with a strong soap, being careful not to smear other parts of your body with oil which has rubbed off from the plants. If it seems necessary, apply some form of drying lotion. Avoid greasy and oily ointments for fear of spreading the poison. Don't hesitate to see a doctor if you aren't satisfied with the progress of your own treatment.
