In this county, issuing of driver's licenses and testing program is handled by the sheriff's department.

"I am a firm believer in driver education in high school," states Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell. "You can always tell the difference between those youngsters who have taken driver education and those who have not."

The sheriff said that people who have not received such training are usually afraid of criticism during their driver's test, or they are "jumpy and jerky" behind the wheel. "Those who have taken the training in high school do everything right when taking the driver's tests-older people have their own way of driving and it is not always the best way," said the sheriff.

According to McIntosh, a member of the driver education faculty, about 65 percent of the youngsters taking the course have no previous driving experience. "We take them right from the very nervous beginning, they practice under actual driving conditions and are competent drivers when the course is completed."

Sheriff Warns

Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell said Monday that it has been brought to his attention that there may be some confusion regarding operation of motor scooters on highways.

"Youngsters who have reached the age of 15 years and have completed driver education in high school are eligible to receive a permit for operation of a motor scooter," said the sheriff.

He said that many parents had been allowing youngsters under 15 years of age who have not completed driver training instruction to operate these vehicles. He warns that this is contrary to state law.

AIRLINES LOOK FOR SMALL-TOWN GIRL

Have you dreamed of visiting San Francisco, New York and Los Angeles in the same week? Or of talking to a celebrity while whisking through the sky at 600 miles per hour?

That's the job of an airline stewardess — one of the most exciting careers open to young women. Most of us have admired these girls, trim and poised in their attractive uniforms. Do these girls come from big cities, have spe-

cial backgrounds? No, sirl United Air Lines — the nation's largest — hires a high percentage of its girls from small Midwestern towns. No college education or special training is necessary to be a stewardess — although college and public contact work are valuable. Then came introduction to her actual in-fligh duties. A life-size model of a modern jetliner complete with seats and cabin equipment — it used in this phase of instruction. Trainees take turns serving meals and practicing in-flight procedures using classmates as model passengers. While the curriculum is busy, there is time each day and on weekends for relaxation. The

Jo Ann receives expert makeup assistance from appearance counselor during stewardess training. Appearance counselors help each girl bring out her best features through make-up and hair-styling. "A small town girl makes an excellent stewardess", says one major airline official. Let's take a small town girl who did just that . . . became an airline stewardess — pretty, blue-eyed Jo Ann Katzfey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius Katzfey of Hales Corners, Wisconsin. Jo Ann isn't sure when she first got the idea she wanted to be an airline stewardess, but she knew by the time she graduated from Greendale, Wisconsin, high school the idea was in her mind.

In fact, when she first applied for a stewardess job she was only 19 — too young to be accepted. She took another job in Hales Corners.

When Jo Ann reached 21 she reapplied to be a stewardess and was accepted after passing the tests and following an interview. From the day she was accepted Jo Ann's life has been busy and exciting. Jo Ann took the 4%-week United Air Lines

Jo Ann took the 4½-week United Air Lines stewardess training course in Chicago. She shared a dormitory suite with three other girls during training and was assigned to a class of 20 for instruction. The girls in her class became her close friends.

In class she studied company history and policies, the routes she would be flying and the type of aircraft her airline flies. assignment — Chicago. She soon moved to a new apartment near O'Hare International Airport with two other girls who were classmates.

Average pay for a starting stewardess is \$380 a month, plus expense allowances. Flight time is limited to 85 hours a month and no more than eight hours of duty a day. This allows eight days a month off, though they may be split up.

How about the chance to meet that certain man? Although there is a high marriage rate a stewardess usually gets married within two years—Jo Ann says the hours and duties are not the best for dating. Stewardesses claim more of them marry the "boy back home" than men they meet on the airplane.

Jo Ann says it isn't as difficult to become a stewardess as many girls think. United's qualifications call for a prospective stewardess to be 20 but not yet 26 years of age and a high school graduate. Height and weight restrictions are five feet-two inches and 105 pounds, minimum, to five feet-eight and 140 pounds maximum.

Appearance is important, but a girl needn't be a beauty queen. Most important, Jo Ann says, a girl should "like people and have a warm and pleasing disposition". The airline is often judged on the basis of its stewardesses.

2. Coney island sauce: finely chop several onions and add enough catsup to moisten well; add prepared mustard to suit taste.


3. Savory sauerkraut: add several tablespoons of brown sugar to a can of sauerkraut. Add a few cara-way seeds, too, if you'd like.







An adequate cost accounting system for every major operation on your farm will make it possible to eliminate those "sleeper" enterprises. It may be easier to do than you think.

The average commercial family farm today represents a large capital investment and produces a large dollar volume of crops and livestock each year — yet most farmers do relatively little cost accounting, or business analysis, and they keep only minimum financial records.

In fact, a large majority of farmers keep records only for income tax purposes. The net income reported on the farm return seldom reflects the actual net income of the farm business. Most farm tax returns are computed on the cash basis and do not reflect inventory changes. Certain methods of handling farm income and costs prevent the farm tax return from furnishing a true net income, or a breakdown as to where the income is derived.

The information needed for income tax will furnish you a base from which cost accounting can be launched. However, the type of your farming operation and interest will determine what additional information will be useful.

Keep Details to a Minimum

In cost accounting and farm business analysis only the really important information should be obtained. Too much detail increases the time and work involved and may defeat the purpose. What is important will vary by type of farm and the interest of the operator. You Probably Want to Know

"How much money is my farm business making?" and "Am I increasing my net worth?" To get a true net income statement,

tory changes, capital gain of livestock, fast depreciation allowances on machinery or buildings, other unusual items and home- used produce.

A net worth statement is the balance of the assets and liabilities of the business — and when compared to previous years, measures financial progress for the period. An annual determination of net income and net worth should only be the first step in any analysis. In further analyzing the total farm business, measurements of volume of business and level of efficiency are important in identifying your strong and weak points. Here are some factors that indicate your volume of business:

Gross profits (sales, less feed and livestock purchases, plus or minus feed and livestock inventory changes.) Value of crops produced.

Total livestock increase and livestock returns over feed costs.

Crop acres and livestock numbers.

Some of the factors that indicate efficiency are: Livestock returns per \$100 feed fed.

Gross value of crops per crop or rotated acre. Machine and power cost per crop acre.

Crop yields per acre.

Gross profits per dollar of expenses.

Pigs weaned per litter, dairy income per cow, poultry income per hen.

Gross profits, crop production and livestock increase per man.

To complete the above factors, you should keep a record of receipts and expenditures, depreciation, inventories, crop production and livestock production. Much of this information is required to complete your income tax schedule so the additional time spent to get the extra figures will not be large. The benefits from the complete information can be large.

Some additional information on crops you'll find useful is: Fertilizer costs per acre.

Labor used per acre.

Fuel costs per acre.

Machine and power costs per acre. Gross and net returns per acre.

For your livestock operation figure:

Livestock returns per \$100 feed fed.

Pounds of grain, supplement and roughage per unit of production.

Feed or other costs per unit of production. Labor used per unit of production. Profit per unit of production. To get this detailed information involves additional detail

To get this detailed information involves additional detail of cost and returns which increases the time devoted to farm accounts. Most farms raise several different crops and classes of livestock, so an allocation of resources used for each becomes necessary. Since feed is usually the largest livestock cost item, a breakdown of feed used by each class of livestock can be very helpful.

Some short cuts are possible. If there are only two classes of livestock on the farm, it is necessary only to determine the total feed disappearance for the farm and one class of livestock. The other class of livestock will have consumed the residual. This method is helpful when it is easy to keep feed records on one of the classes of livestock but not on the other.

The Pay Off Let's examine how keeping a complete set of farm records can pay off. First you'll save on income tax by having a complete record of expenditures. Secondly, you'll have adequate information to analyze the strong and weak points of your farm business.

An example of the latter is pointed up in the experiences of young Iowa farmer who rented a good farm on a crop share. After five years he purchased a smaller farm on contract and moved to this farm. His crop yields were good and he had an efficient livestock enterprise. However, he found that there never seemed to be adequate money for payments on the farm, living expenses and operating expenses. An analysis of his farm business confirmed that he was getting high production per acre but his total volume of business was below average and his fixed costs were high in relation to production. The farm was too-small and he limited the livestock program to the feed he raised. Since this farmer was a good operator he had an oppor-tunity to rent some additional land. He also expanded his livestock enterprise and dropped one of the high labor enterprises. He was able to maintain good crop yields, and even though livestock efficiency dropped slightly, the additional volume more than offset the difference and net income increased. It was necessary to add only a small amount of machinery and equipment and fixed costs per acre dropped. Low Cost Electronic Data Processing Coming Agricultural colleges in many states have developed record books which will assist farmers with the record-keeping task. Most of these books also suggest methods of analyzing the information. Summaries of analysis of other farms are often available from the same source for comparison purposes.

provements will be made and costs reduced. This could make electronic farm accounting available to all farmers at a reasonable cost within 5 to 10 years. Electronic machines will not do the bookkeeping for the farmer but once he has recorded the information it can be processed rapidly and considerable detail furnished him to analyze his business and for income tax purposes. Since some state colleges and commercial firms are now doing electronic farm accounting, farmers may want to look into the possibilities.

Once complete information is obtained on a farm business it also becomes possible to use electronic machines to compute optimum farming plans using different assumptions about prices, costs or other items. Electronic machines can assist the farm operator in analyzing his farm business and organizing it to maximize income. The information obtained from farm records or machines is no better than the original information. Accuracy and completeness are essential in any system of farm accounting.

Information obtained from farm records is not valuable unless properly interpreted and used when planning future operations of the farm.

Knowing why a farm business is highly profitable or unprofitable can be of equal importance. The more knowledge a manager has about his business, the better prepared he is to make wise decisions in the future.

Some agricultural colleges and commercial firms are now using electronic machines to assist farmers in farm accounting. At the present time it is being done mainly on a limited basis to gain experience and partly for research purposes.
