## Record Number of Lightnings Here for Michigan District Championship

Henry Cawthra of Detroit's Crescent Sail Yacht Club, two-time national champion, won his sixth Michigan District Lightning championship last week-end, by taking four first place heats in sailboat races on Tawas Bay.

A record entry of 50 sailboats in the one-design Lightning class forced race officials to split the field in two divisions. L. G. McKay Jr. of East Tawas was race chairman.

The regatta was hosted by Tawas Bay Yacht Club, which provided meals and entertainment for more than 200 persons during the three days of racing. Commodore Charles Kurtzrock was master of ceremonies at a banquet held Saturday night at the clubhouse.

Cawthra and nine others will move on to the national championships scheduled at Buffalo, New York, in early September.

Two local boats qualified for the nationals. Herm Nickels of Lake Penton, whose home club is TBVC, won fourth place with 113 points. Bill and Ed McKinley of Saginaw and East Tawas were eighth place in standing with 97 points.

Trailing the leader in point standings were Charles Grant, CSYC, second place, 118 points; Dr. Leo Wassenberger, Pontiac Yacht Club, third, 114; Jim Kohls, CSYC, fifth, 106; James Coggan, Gull Lake, sixth, 104; Robert Knop, CSYC, seventh, 98; Charles Ellery, CSYC, 95; David Nickels, Lake Penton, 94.

Friday's two heats were marred in the afternoon by rain squalls but Saturday and Sunday's competition over the 10-mile course, twice around triangular 1½-mile legs and a straightaway into the wind, were under almost perfect weather conditions.

## Colonel Carlton Assumes Command of Bomb Wing

Col. Paul K. Carlton, 40, officially assumed command of the 379th Bombardment Wing of the 40th Air Division during change-of-command ceremonies held Friday afternoon at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda.

Carlton, a veteran of 20 years of service and holder of both the Legion of Merit and Silver Star, succeeds Col. John H. Kunkel Jr., who was recently reassigned to a new position at air force headquarters, Washington, D. C.

Ceremonies marking the com-

mand change included a review of the Wurtsmith-based personnel by Carlton and Maj. Gen. Harold E. Humfeld, commander of SAC's 40th Air Division, who maintains his headquarters at the Oscoda base.

Also on the reviewing stand were Col. Raymond J. Lacombe, actual commander of the base, along with four commendation medal winners from the enlisted ranks.

Even the weather cooperated in the welcoming program. Heavy rains which deluged the area earlier in the day held off until five minutes after the last base marching unit had wheeled off the concrete flight line past the reviewing stand.

## Tawas 'Watermen' Singing in the Rain

"What a difference the rain makes!"

This is a little tune now being sung by the Tawas City Water Department and Supt. Reginald Blublitz.

Water consumption in this city set a new record between July 16-20, but rain showers over the week-end eased the situation as water usage dropped more than 100,000 gallons a day.

Last week, water consumption reached a new high of 369,000 gallons a day. Probably brought on by an increased use of water on lawns, daily usage showed a steady increase from July 4-10 when the daily average was 333,166 gallons per day. Between July 10-12, the daily consumption jumped to 348,000 gallons.

By Monday morning, after several downpours over the week-end, daily usage had dropped to 252,000 gallons.

Under a long-term contract with the City of East Tawas, this community purchases its water supply from its sister city's filtration plant.

Blublitz reported Monday night to the water department that a six-inch main running from the filtration plant to Tawas City's pumping station on US-23 could not keep up with the demand at times.

Concern was expressed by the water board that water pressure dropped to 20 pounds in city mains here during one point of the dry spell.

East Tawas was having its own troubles, however. During the period July 4-10, the filtration plant produced 7,212,800 gallons of chlorinated water, East Tawas using it at the rate of 888,966 gallons per day and Tawas City's figure being 333,166.

The main difference between the usage figures is probably due to the fact that Tawas City meters its water to all customers, while only a small percentage of East Tawas users are metered.

A large group of Detroit area industrialists and businessmen toured Wurtsmith and were given SAC briefings in a day-long program keyed to the change-of-command event.

The base civilian advisory community council, wives and other guests feted the new wing commander and his wife at a buffet dinner and dance at the officer's open mess Friday night.

The United States Air Force's "Strolling Strings," recent performers at the White House, entertained at the dinner and also during a noon luncheon. Music for dancing was provided by the Second Air Force Band from Barksdale Air Force Base, Louisiana.

The new wing commander enlisted in the army at the age of 20, received his commission at 21 and was promoted successively until reaching his permanent rank as colonel in December 1960.

At one time, he served as aide and personal pilot to Air Force General Curtis LeMay, then commanding general of the Strategic Air Command.

## No Vote on Senate; Primary Still Set

A school of instruction is scheduled tonight (Wednesday) to acquaint election inspectors of various Isosco County voting precincts with procedures to be used in the August 7 primary election.

The meeting is to be held at the county building, reports County Clerk George Prescott. A representative of the secretary of state's office is to handle the instruction.

The primary election will go on as scheduled, although names of candidates for state senator will probably be stricken from the ballot.

Ballots had already been printed when a ruling of the state supreme court changed the election picture.

The Michigan Legislature convened yesterday facing an August 20 deadline to reapportion state senatorial districts now ruled unconstitutional by the state supreme court.

Under the court ruling, an at-large election will be held unless the legislature provides a redistricting plan insuring that no district is more than twice as large as any other district.

Clerk Prescott, who dropped plans for running for this area's senate seat earlier this year, said Monday that he may be a candidate under the redistricting plan.

## 445th FIS Gets New Commander

Lt. Col. William E. Shelton, presently operations officer for the 49th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, Rome, New York, is scheduled to arrive Thursday to take over as commander of the 445th FIS at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda.

Shelton replaces Lt. Col. Sam Wilkerson, whose plane crashed in Lake Superior June 28. He and his radar operator were both declared dead after investigation of the crash.

## Three Escape Injury in Baldwin Plane Crash

A Southfield man, his 15-year-old son and another passenger escaped serious injury when their plane crashed late Friday afternoon in a farm field three miles west of the Tawas.

Treated at Tawas Hospital for minor injuries were Arthur S. Friend, 44; his son, Daniel W., and Richard Neil Olree, 27.

The crash occurred north of Anderson Road on the George Roach farm.

Friend told investigating police officers that he attempted to land his plane in the field be-

cause of an approaching rain squall.

The plane circled the field once and then started to land. Just as the nose wheel touched the ground, Friend spotted a fence directly in the plane's path. He attempted to take the plane off the ground again but its nose wheel dug into the ground and broke off.

Flipping over on its back, the plane skidded 82 feet on the ground before coming to a stop.

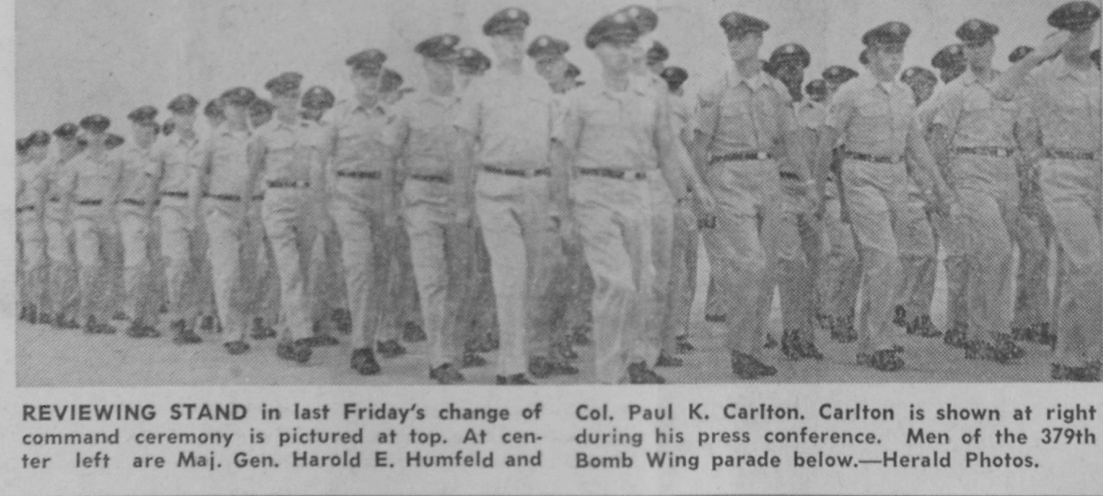
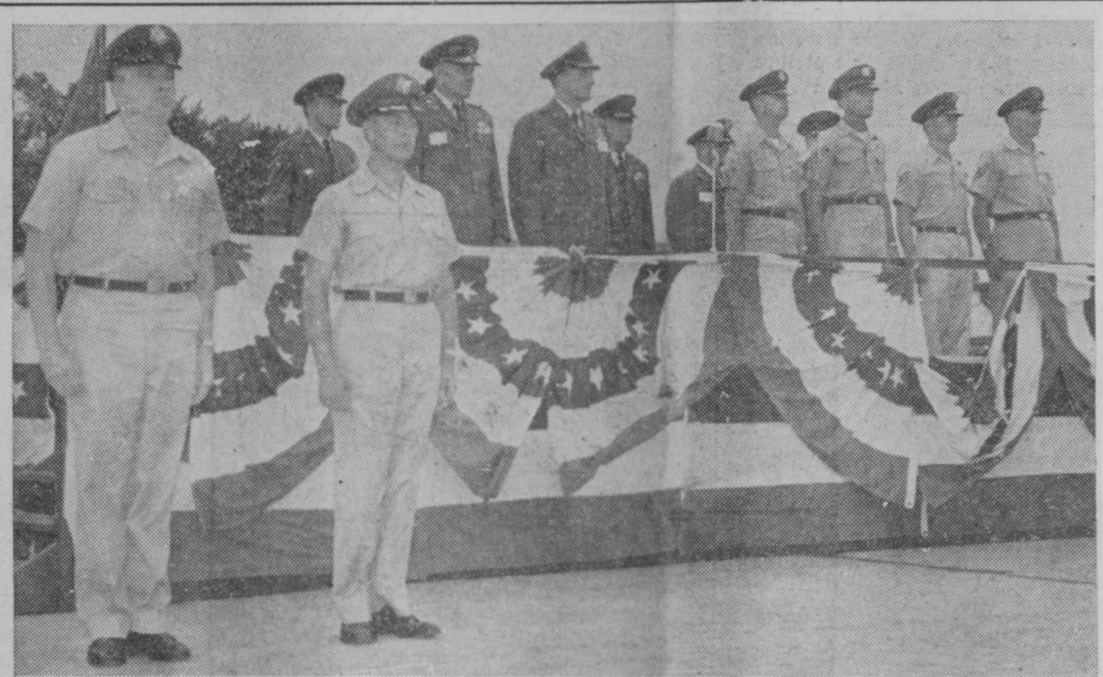
The three were taken to the hospital by Kenneth Alstrom, who had witnessed the crash.

## Negotiation Tactics Condemned—

# Judge Denies Dismissal in Catsman-Bateson Lawsuit

A motion to dismiss an extremely complex lawsuit involving construction of Capehart housing units at Wurtsmith Air Force Base has been denied by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Attorneys for J. W. Bateson Company, prime contractor for constructing 618 housing units at the Strategic Air Command's installation in Isosco County, had asked the court to dismiss with prejudice a million-dollar lawsuit against the Dallas, Texas, firm.

The suit was started November 18, 1960, by Catsman Company of Flint, which was subcontractor in the housing project. Now under consideration by the court is Catsman's third amended bill of complaint.

The Michigan firm started a suit in chancery alleging fraud and conspiracy to defraud against Bateson. Catsman's original bill of complaint claimed that Bateson had obtained subcontracts so low as to threaten subcontractors with imminent insolvency. Its bill also stated that as a direct consequence of a conspiracy and fraudulent misrepresentation, it had lost \$668,737 on contracts at Wurtsmith and Kincheloe AFB.

Judge Miller ruled last week that, although at this status of the case the plaintiff had not established fraud, it has established an equitable claim for relief.

On Monday of this week, attorneys for Bateson filed a motion asking the court to transfer Catsman's cause of action to the law side of the court for further proceedings. This was also denied.

"The complex claims between the parties—in the nature of an accounting, the mutual account of equitable relief, the fact that fraud did exist even though waived, the cross claims of the parties and the inadequacies of the legal remedy in this complex situation—justify a retention of the case in equity to proceed to determine the complete controversy and adjudication between the parties," said Judge Miller in his ruling last week.

The proofs as to fraud in the case, noted briefly by Judge Miller, were as follows:

That J. T. Hubbell, negotiating for Bateson Company, misrepresented the costs, working conditions and experiences of J. W. Bateson as a Capehart-type builder and that these representations were relied upon by Catsman Company and others.

"And further, that Hubbell procured a white Bonneville Pontiac convertible 'under the table' from one member of the co-venturers, Greenfield Poured Walls, apparently to insure cooperation on the project."

Judge Miller said that testimony is that the Greenfield bid was upped \$5,000 so that the convertible could be purchased. Catsman Company's representative and negotiator, Royce Downey, arranged for this purchase and his wife made delivery of the vehicle.

"All parties to the contract suffered because of the efforts of Royce Downey—self-styled vice president, but at least general manager of the Detroit division and negotiator—with knowledge of his principles in this transaction; and J. T. Hubbell—negotiator 'ala mode' for J. W. Bateson Company—to outdo each other. The tactics of each are condemned," said the judge.

Judge Miller said "it was the Greenfield contract that got Catsman Company in deep water, undoubtedly because Greenfield thought that it was going to literally 'get away with murder' on the specifications."

"They had bought off the man they thought would be in charge of the project, but it turned out differently. J. T. Hubbell was not the project manager, although he did appear on the project once or twice.

"The specifications were not ignored on the job and did not yield to production methods, but rather were insisted upon with typical federal government-type of exactness. As a result, Greenfield was promptly placed in default and new negotiations ensued.

"Certainly if litigation had then ensued, Catsman Company would have been in a position to assert rescission or any of the appropriate remedies for fraud," declared Judge Miller.

He said a new chapter was (See LAWSUIT, page 12.)

Work is to start in mid-August on seeding fairways and greens. There will be no parallel fairways and the championship-type greens will average 5,500 square feet of playing area.

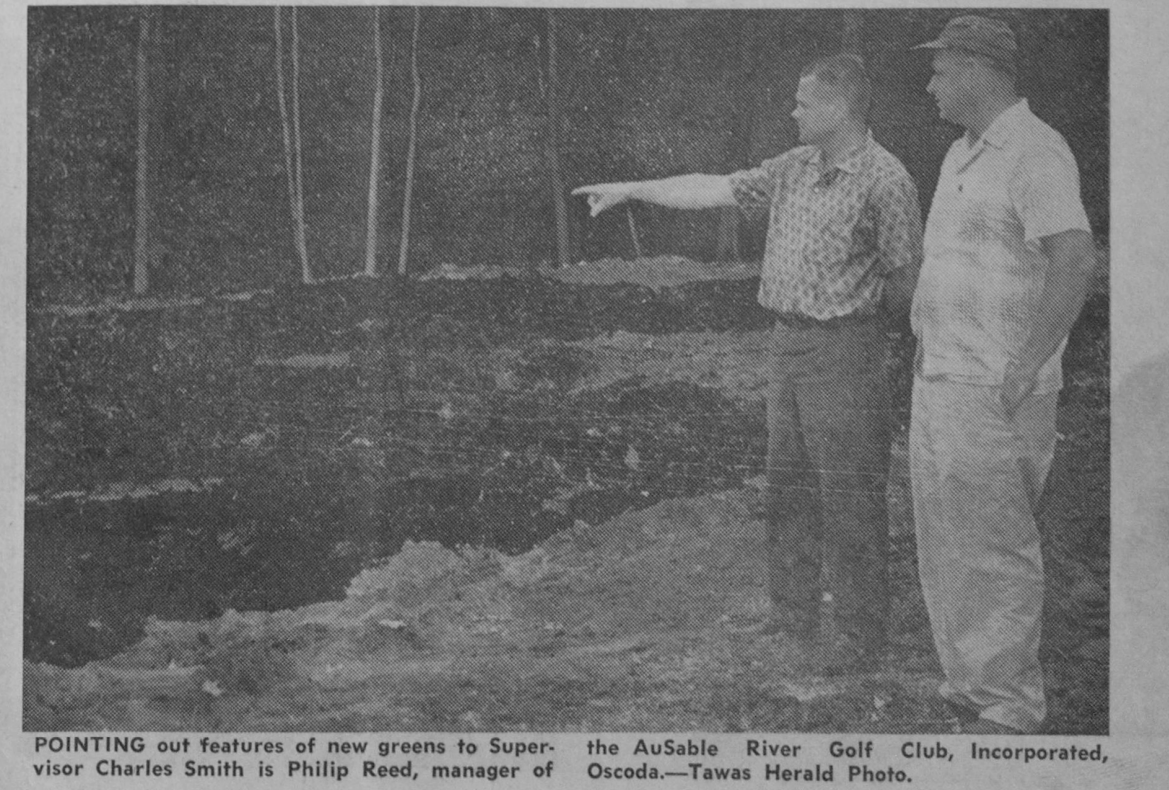

## New Golf Course Under Construction at Oscoda

Work is now under way on a new 18-hole, \$150,000 golf course at Oscoda.

Representatives of AuSable River Golf Club, Incorporated, reported Friday that the new layout, complete with 40 by 80-foot clubhouse, is to be ready June 1 of next year.

The Oscoda area has been without golfing facilities for more than 20 years. The old nine-hole course was discontinued during the early days of World War II and top soil was removed for use at the air base.

Several years ago, a group of area golfing enthusiasts decided to study the possibility of building a new course and on January 8, 1961, a corporation was formed to finance the venture through sale of stock.

Under direction of Manager Philip Reed, some 203 acres west of US-23 near the Capehart housing area are now being cleared. Shabluk Trucking Company, Saginaw, is contractor for the construction.

The well-wooded property is semi-developed and borders the AuSable River. VanEltan Creek also courses its way through the property.

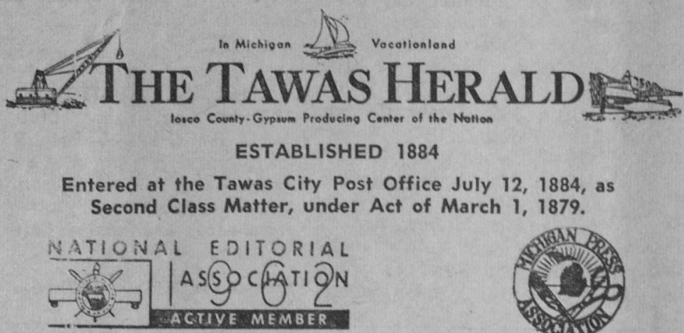

### Money Decides Where Children Go To College

The size of the contents of dad's wallet continues to have a lot to do with where his children will attend college these days and generally it is turning out to be the school nearest home.

This trend started in the post-war years and has continued to grow along with the price of living. It is clearly evident in a study recently made by the Michigan Council of State College Presidents.

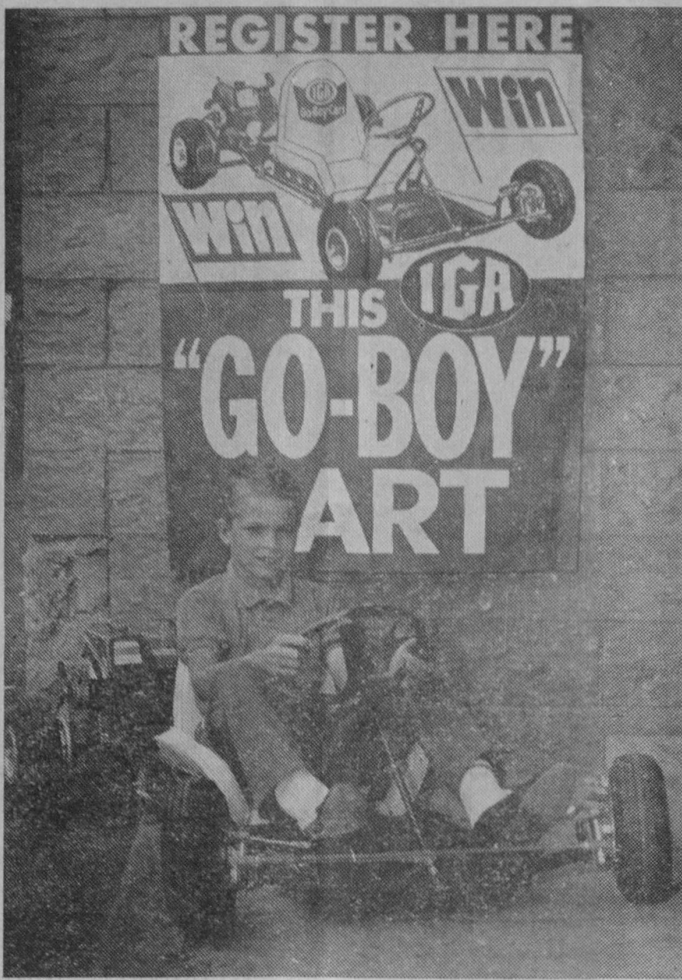
According to the report, Iosco County's 112 students were enrolled in the following colleges: University of Michigan, 12; Michigan State University, 31; Wayne

State University, four; Western Michigan University, two; Eastern Michigan University, five; Central Michigan University, 42; Michigan College of Mining and Technology, eight; Ferris Institute, seven; Northern Michigan College, one.

Purpose of the study was to determine the present degree of relationship between place of residence of Michigan's 83,564 students attending the state's 10 tax-supported institutions of public higher education and the location of these colleges and universities. The 1961 fall enrollment figures were used.

During the first two years, all of Michigan's public higher education institutions offer the conventional basic courses preparatory to selecting a specialty later on. The choice of specialty determines to a large extent where the student will enroll.

Many of the professional schools and colleges at Michigan's public higher education institutions rank among the best in the country. Including the 16 community junior colleges now operating, Michigan ranks second only to California among the 50 states in the size of its system of public higher education.

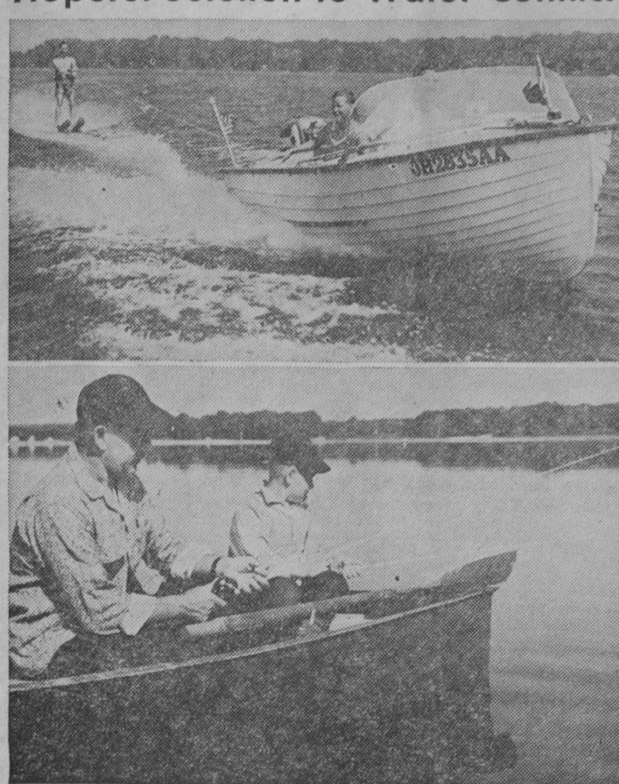

### Hopeful Solution to Water Conflict



For lack of adequate controls, Michigan's boating boom has churned more and more friction between water-use groups, weakened public safety, and generally left recreationists puzzled about their rights on the state's waterways in recent years. Promising to turn the tide on this uneasy situation is a new law going into effect August 1. It sets up a Boating Control Committee composed of one member each from the Secretary of State's office, the Michigan Waterways Commission, and the Conservation Department; with the Michigan Sheriffs Association serving in an advisory capacity. At the request of local governing boards, this three-man committee will hold public hearings and be authorized to establish boat speed limits, regulate the size and horsepower of boat motors, restrict use of motorboats, and adopt whatever other regulations seem necessary to protect public safety on any particular body of water. Such regulations will require final approval by local governing units. Under the new law, the state will provide, on a 2-1 matching basis, up to \$20,000 per county each year for enforcement work and equipment.

#### ATTENDS PRECOLLEGE WORKSHOP AT FERRIS

### BOATMAN IN DISTRESS

An ancient law of the sea provides that nearby vessels stand by and extend aid to those in distress. And common courtesy dictates that today's small boater be ready and willing to help a fellow boatman who may indicate the need for assistance afloat.

Many distress signals have been recognized over the years, for example, flying the National Ensign upside down, continued and insistent blasts on the horn, sending up a flare or smoke signal, waving some part of wearing apparel or even beating rapidly on the metal minnow bucket.

Frequently, however, such signals are interpreted only as a friendly greeting, the shennanigans of a slightly inebriated load of boaters, or as in the case of the upside-down ensign, just carelessness in hoisting the flag. In the hope to minimize ignoring

the distressed boatman's call for help, a recently devised method is being publicized.

When help is needed and the craft involved is not submerged, the person requesting help stands erect with both arms extended horizontally and sideways. The arms are then moved up and down allowing the hands to move in an arc of 12 inches or more above the shoulders to 12 inches or more below the shoulders.

When approaching a craft needing assistance, it is well, especially if there is wind or a sea running, to approach slowly from downwind. In this way, there is less chance of colliding with the disabled boat and permits better steering control and handling of your own boat.

In towing another boat if there is question that your deck cleats will not stand the strain, secure the line to some heavy member of your boat such as an engine bed timber.

If impossible to lend assistance, acknowledge the request for help and advise you will send help as soon as possible. Above all, do not ignore a call for help.

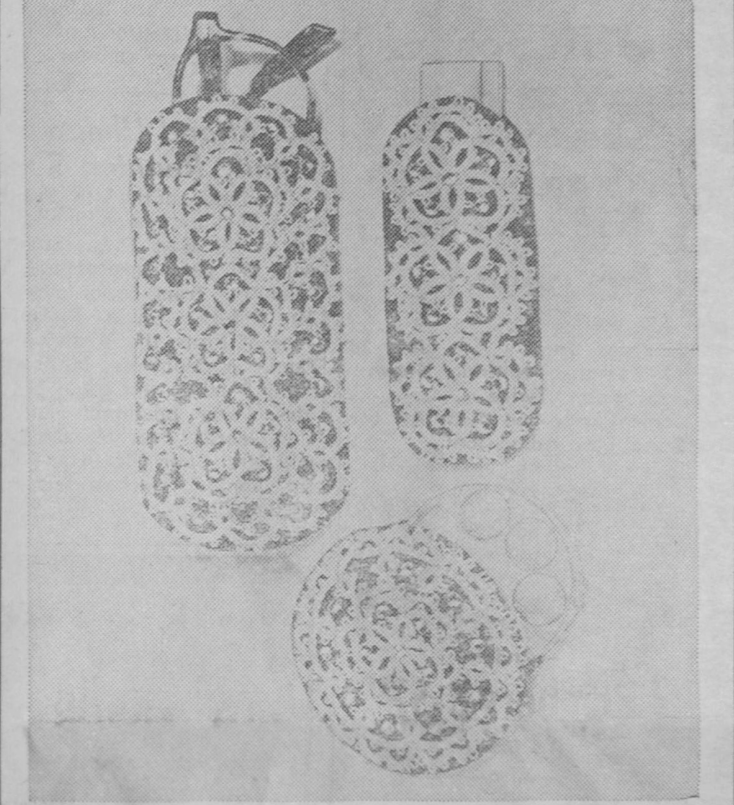
