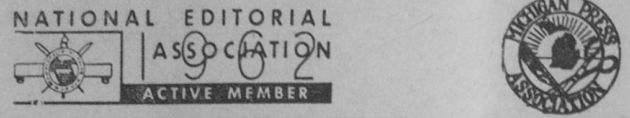

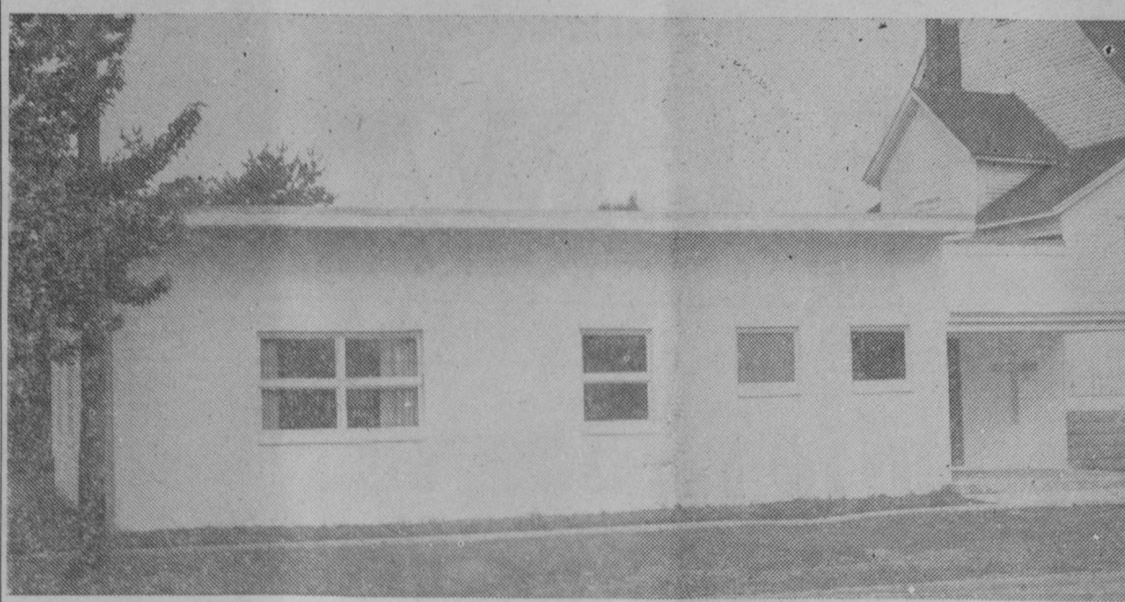

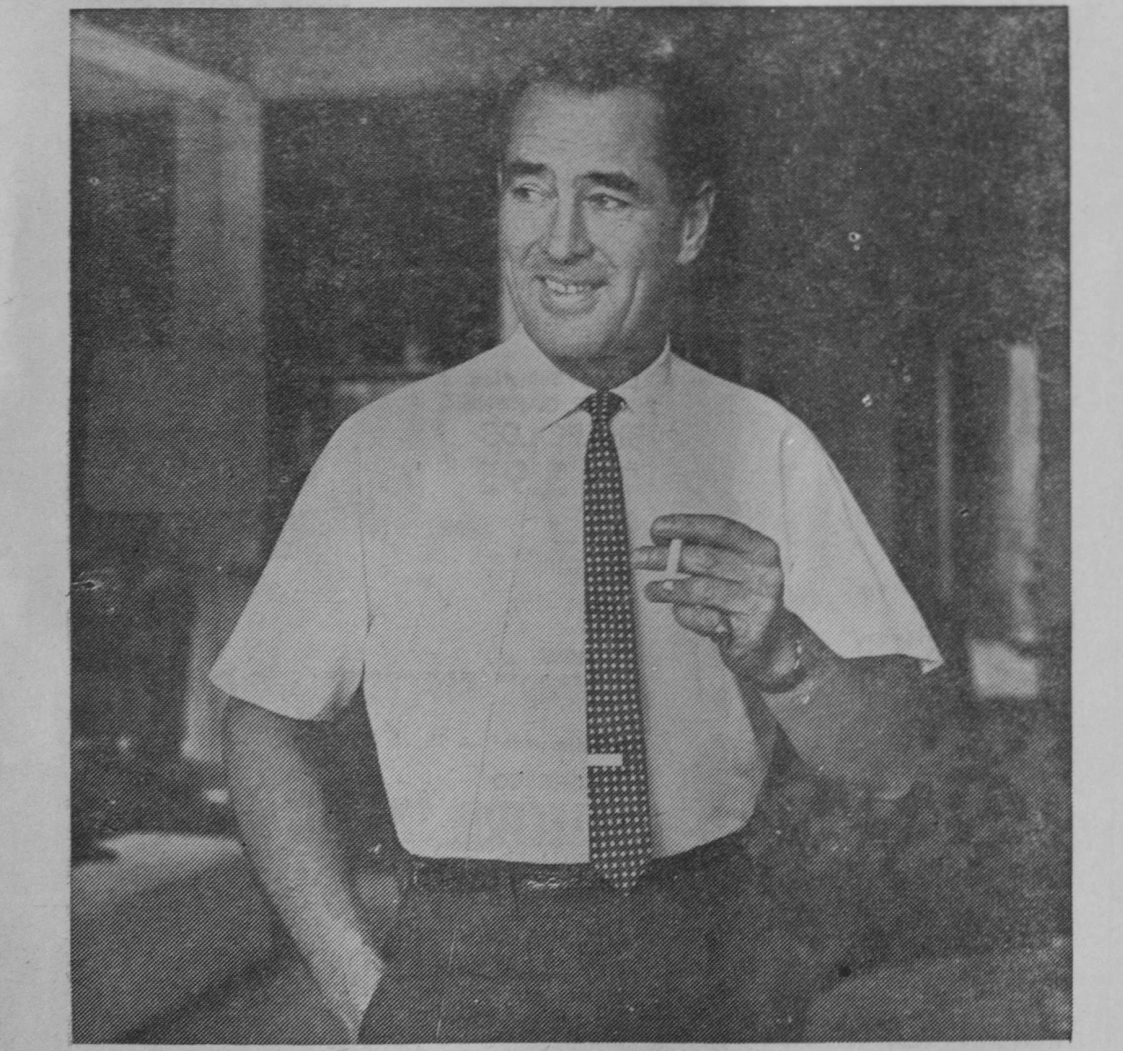

June 30 is Important Date for Disabled Under Social Security

June 30 is an important date for the disabled, Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City Social Security Office, said today. Protection against severe disability is a relatively new feature of the social security program. Fifty million working people under social security now have this protection against complete loss of earnings. Anyone who has been disabled for more than a year may lose all of his rights to cash disability benefits if he does not apply for benefits before June 30. One out of every three disability applicants risk the loss of some disability insurance benefits because he waits more than 18 months before applying. Mr. Ellifritz advises those people who have been disabled more than six months to check with their social security office. A representative of the Social Security Administration will be in Tawas City at the Iosco County Building Thursday, June 14, 10:30-11:00 a. m. to 1:00 p. m.

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lights, signaling devices, approved fire extinguishers, carburetor flame arrestors on inboard engines, ventilation of engines and fuel compartments, proper installation of fuel tanks, galley stoves and general cleanliness and seaworthy condition of the vessel.

The coast guard and many state authorities honor the decal and will normally refrain from making an official inspection unless there is an obvious violation of the law.

If by any chance a boat does not meet the requirements to qualify for the award, no violation is issued to the owner nor is any

report made to any law enforcement agency. The check sheet is returned to the owner and it is his privilege to correct the deficiency at his convenience. When so done, any auxiliary will be happy to complete the examination and affix the decal.

Qualified inspector examiners are usually available on week-ends at many of the marinas and launching ramps. If none are available at that time, it is suggested that you leave word with the marina operator or the officer in charge of the launching ramp. He usually has information on how to

locate the nearest auxiliary qualified to perform the courtesy motorboat examination.

9. Sluggish battery. If your engine turns over more slowly than usual when you start up, a weak battery is probably the trouble. But it could be something else. Better check it.

10. Oil-streaked sidewalls. Check the sides of your tires you seldom see—the sides facing in. Look for signs of leaking fluid on the tire walls. Could be a leaking brake cylinder, or faulty oil seals on the rear wheels. Both can be serious.

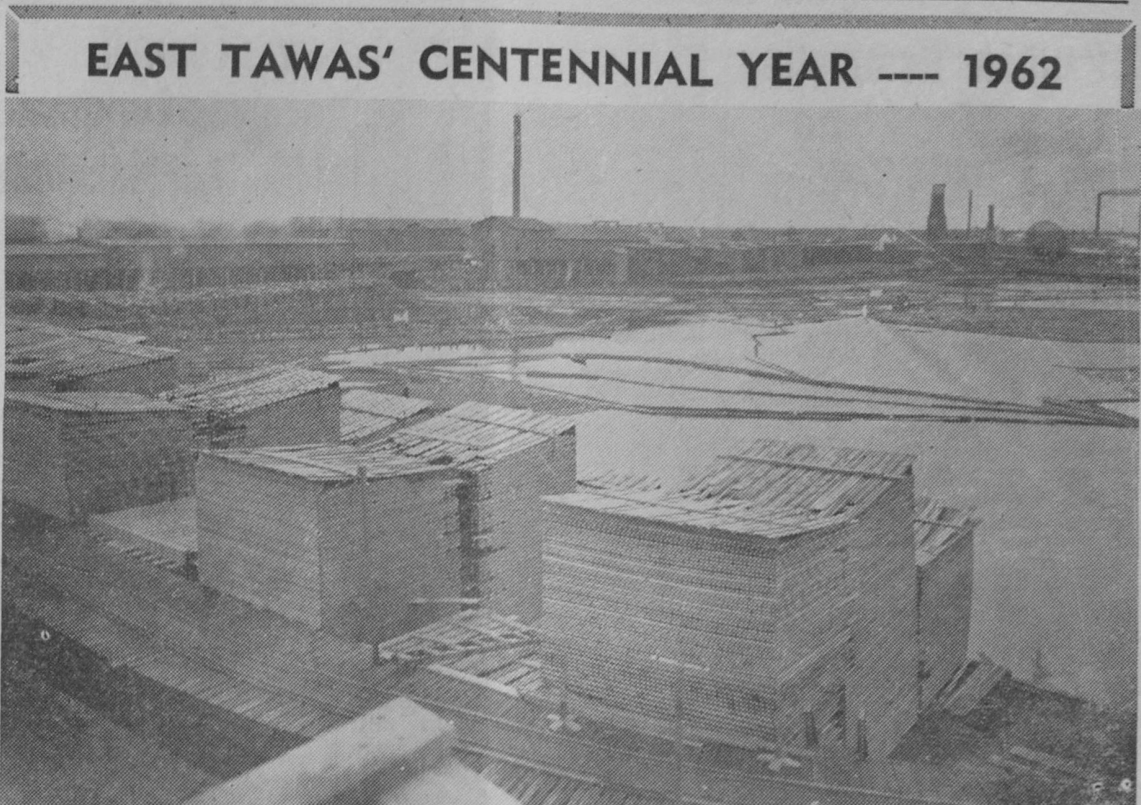

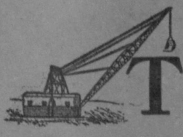

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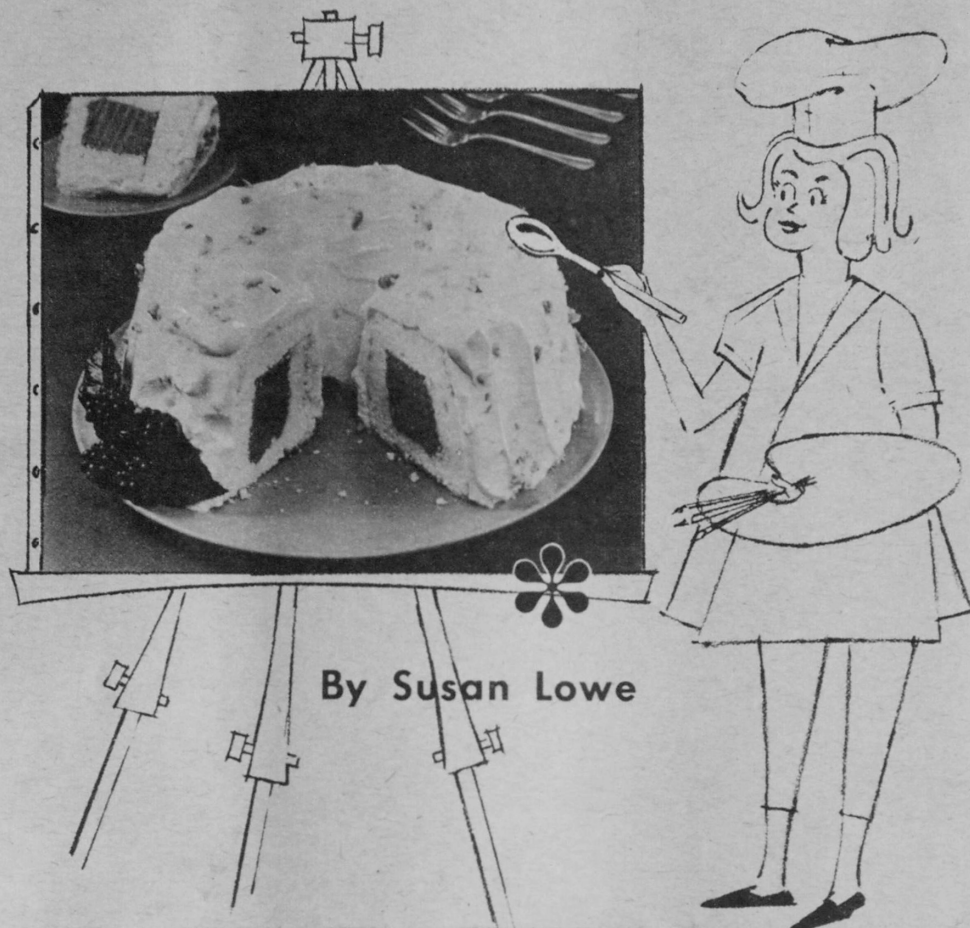
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Specialty Scenes

from your kitchen



By Susan Lowe

Just as each famous restaurant or eating place has special foods for which it is renowned, so each hostess has certain dishes for which she has built a reputation. The dish need not necessarily be exotic — just something with extra special appeal.

And it need not be a dessert although we find desserts dominating the specialty scene. The specialty can be, and often is, the main course, possibly a tuna dish . . . some new and interesting way of serving chicken . . . an omelet crowned with a wreath of fresh fruits now in season. Broccoli served with almond sauce is another dish that wins favor.

Again the specialty may be something as simple as muffins — add blueberries to the batter . . . tuck a spoonful of orange marmalade into the top of each muffin before you slide it into the oven . . . or include pineapple in your recipe and you've a delightful surprise for family and friends.

BLACKBERRY BAVARIAN CAKE

1 9-inch angel food cake	1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 package blackberry gelatin	¼ cup sugar
1 cup boiling water	1 cup heavy cream, whipped
3 eggs, separated	Chopped pecans
½ teaspoon salt	

Cut a 1-inch layer from top of cake. Remove center of cake leaving a 1-inch shell at bottom, outside edge and inside edge. (Save portion removed and serve later with a fruit or custard sauce.) Dissolve blackberry gelatin in boiling water. Beat egg yolks until light. Slowly add hot dissolved gelatin, stirring constantly. Add salt and lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Meanwhile, beat egg whites until foamy; gradually add sugar and beat until stiff. Fold into thickened gelatin. Pour into prepared cake shell. Cover with top cake layer. Frost immediately, or just before serving, with whipped cream. Sprinkle with chopped pecans. Chill about 3 hours before serving. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

SOUTHERN BAKED JAMBALAYA SALAD

Preheated 375° oven	
2 parboiled green peppers, drained and halved	1 cup cubed Cheddar cheese
2 firm tomatoes	1 teaspoon salt
1 4½-ounce can shrimp, jumbo pack	Dash of pepper
1 cup cooked rice	¼ teaspoon tarragon
	Pinch of tumeric (optional)

Hollow out tomatoes, leaving ½-inch rim; dice the tomato pulp. Mix shrimp, rice, cheese, salt, pepper, tarragon, tumeric and diced tomato. Fill green pepper halves and tomatoes, place in buttered casserole. Pour on cheese-soup mixture (see below). Bake 10 minutes. Garnish each "salad" with whole shrimp and parsley. Six servings.

Sauce:

Heat together 1 can shrimp soup, condensed, and 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese until cheese melts. Note: Green Pepper Jambalayas can be frozen.



BROCCOLI WITH ALMOND SAUCE

4 tablespoons butter	2 egg yolks
2½ tablespoons flour	2 tablespoons lemon juice
1¼ cups milk	1½ pounds broccoli or cauliflower
¼ teaspoon salt	½ cup roasted blanched almonds
Dash cayenne pepper	

Melt 2 tablespoons butter and blend in flour. Add milk, salt and cayenne and cook and stir until mixture boils and is thickened. Beat egg yolks lightly. Stir a little of hot sauce into yolks, then combine with remaining sauce. Cook and stir over very low heat 3 or 4 minutes longer, but do not allow to boil. Stir in remaining butter, 1 tablespoon at a time. Slowly stir in lemon juice. Pour over hot cooked broccoli or cauliflower and sprinkle with almonds. Makes 5 to 6 servings.





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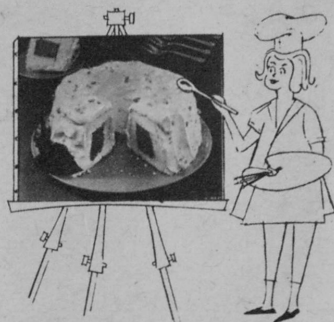
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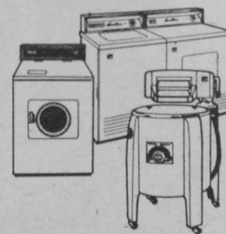

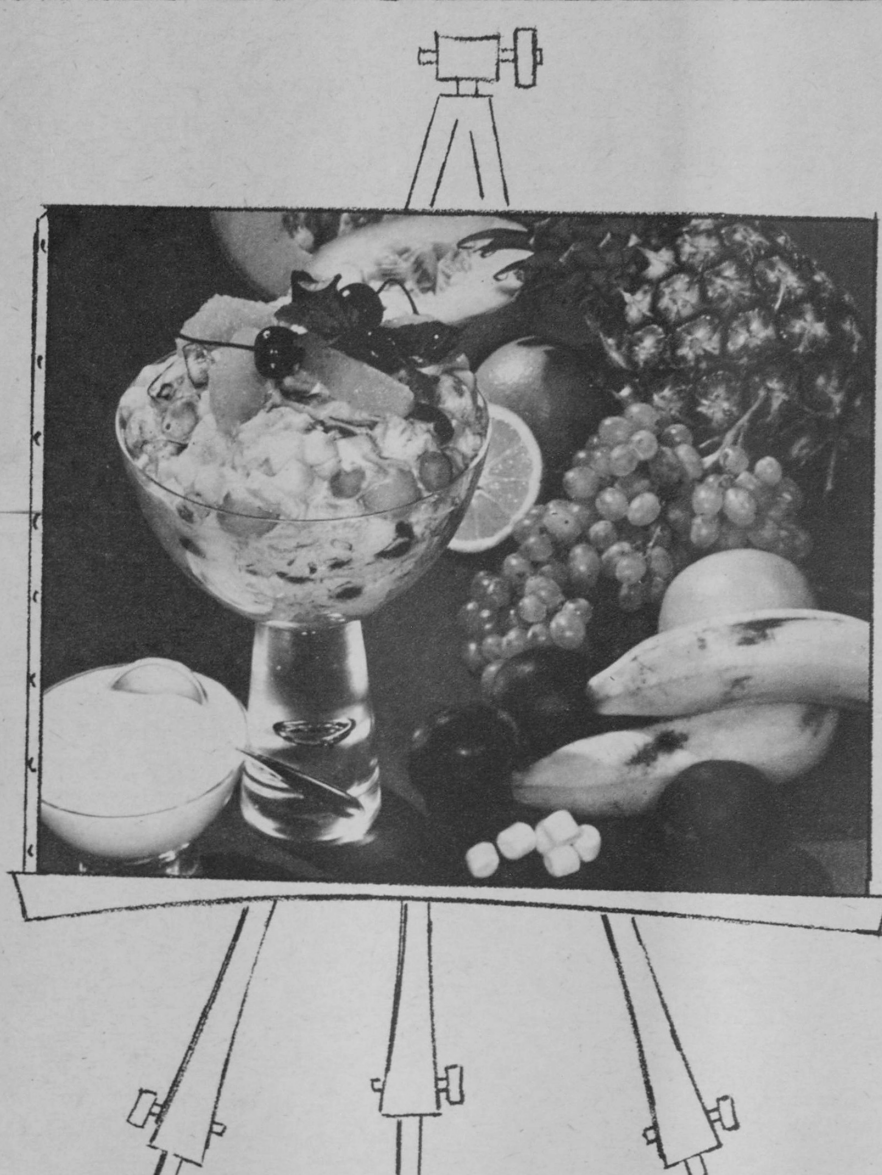

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HILLYLAND?

MINNESOTA FARMER MAKES THOSE

HILLS

By Perry Galvin

Cemetery Road threads its way for 13 miles in the rich agricultural heart of southwest Minnesota.

The hills, rolling as a country club, create differing reactions. "Oh" and "Ah," says the motorist, appreciative of the lush and scenic countryside. "Ach," reacts the knowing farmer, depreciative of the hills for the farm problems they create.

In the foreground against this Cemetery Road backdrop near New Ulm, a German city of 11,000, is a farmer with a successful livelihood—Orlin Mack. Mack, 39, farms a mile from the cemetery. For 18 years he has farmed successfully this hill land on which he was born and raised and which he inherited from his father. Of the 218 acres, only 155 can be cultivated. Of those 155, 75 percent is hilly and Class 2 land or worse as set by Soil Conservation Service land profile standards.

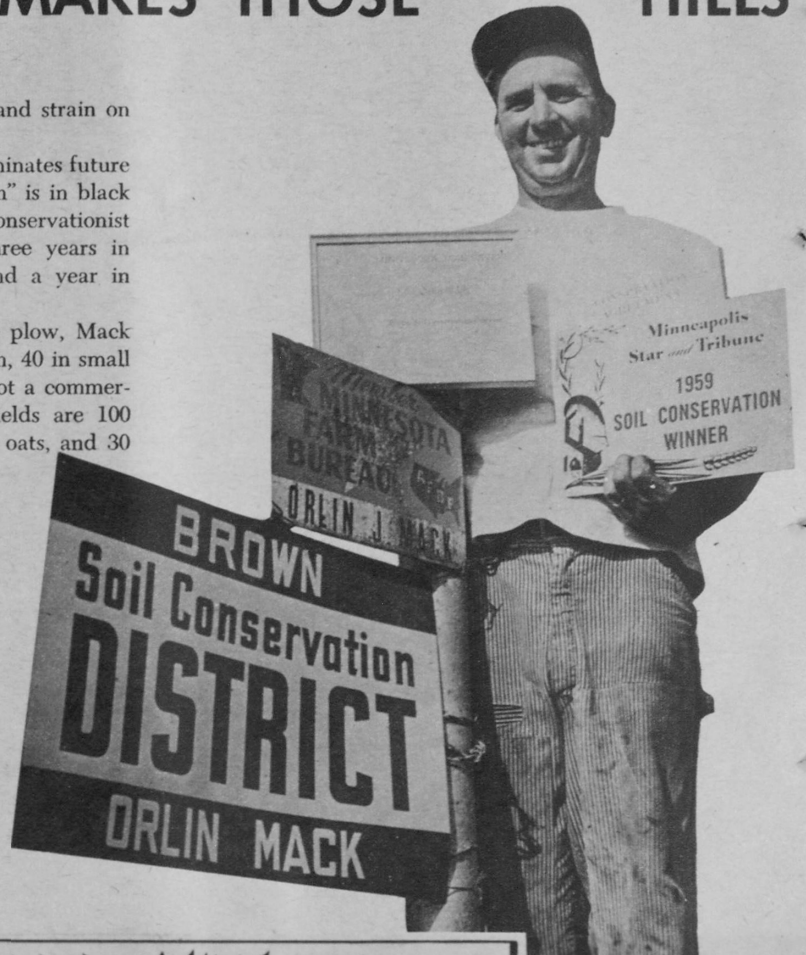
Despite those natural obstacles, Mack was succeeding three years ago with productive annual yields.

And then he turned to strip cropping. This meant instead of going up and down over the hills, he would ascend them gradually sideways. The three-fold advantages for Mack were automatic crop rotation,

later planting and less stress and strain on machinery.

Automatic crop rotation eliminates future head work. The "six-year plan" is in black and white in Mack's soil conservation manual. Rotation plan is three years in alfalfa, two years in corn and a year in small grains of wheat or oats.

Of his 155 acres under the plow, Mack has 45 each in alfalfa and corn, 40 in small grains and 25 in soybeans. Not a commercial fertilizer user, Mack's yields are 100 bushels per acre corn, 80 for oats, and 30

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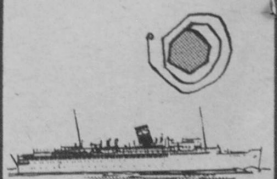

to 35 bushels for both soybeans and wheat.

Not a cash-crop farmer, Mack enriches his land through his strip crop rotation plan—three of six years in alfalfa, which feeds and pastures his 24 registered Guerneys.

Majority of his income comes from dairying and marketing 125 hogs annually. He markets wheat and soybeans through a local New Ulm elevator of which he is a director, but all oats and corn are fed back into his dairying and hog operations.

Mack feels the production cost saving of manure rather than commercial fertilizer enriches his bank balance as well as his land.

Mack recommends strip cropping for any size farm, although three years ago before heeding the advice of the Soil Conservation Service conservationist, he thought his 155 acres too small for this type of farming.

Strip cropping by Mack on his light soil permits late planting, not before May 20, which avoids hot, dry spells when corn is tasseling in early August and in want of moisture. Strips are 84 feet wide and vary in length from two to eight acres.

Mack's success with strip cropping plus other soil conservation practices awarded him with selection as Brown County Soil Conservation District's outstanding farmer his first year in the program.

His acreage is rampant with sod waterways, which course rain water into his two-acre farm pond carved out of a natural water basin. After ridding the basin of trees, a construction company built the pond in two months.

At the end of a ravine cutting through crop land, the pond stops soil erosion, waters livestock and provides a 12-foot deep home for fish. Cost was \$3,600, of which the federal government paid \$2,500. On his farm Orlin Mack feels it was money well invested.



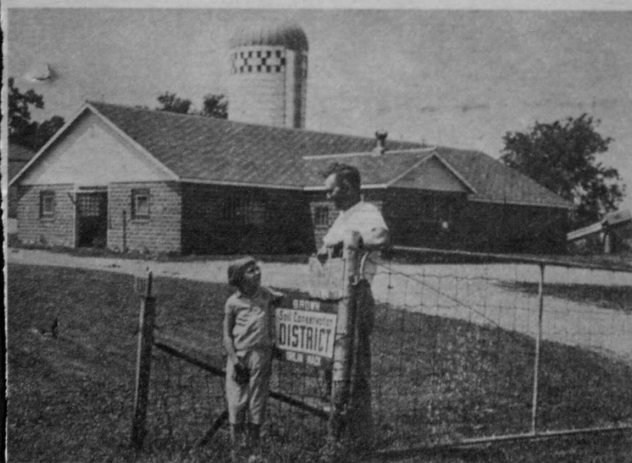
FARM POND shows Mack and daughter Wendy, 7. It covers two acres and is 12 feet deep. The pond is used for watering livestock and preventing soil erosion.



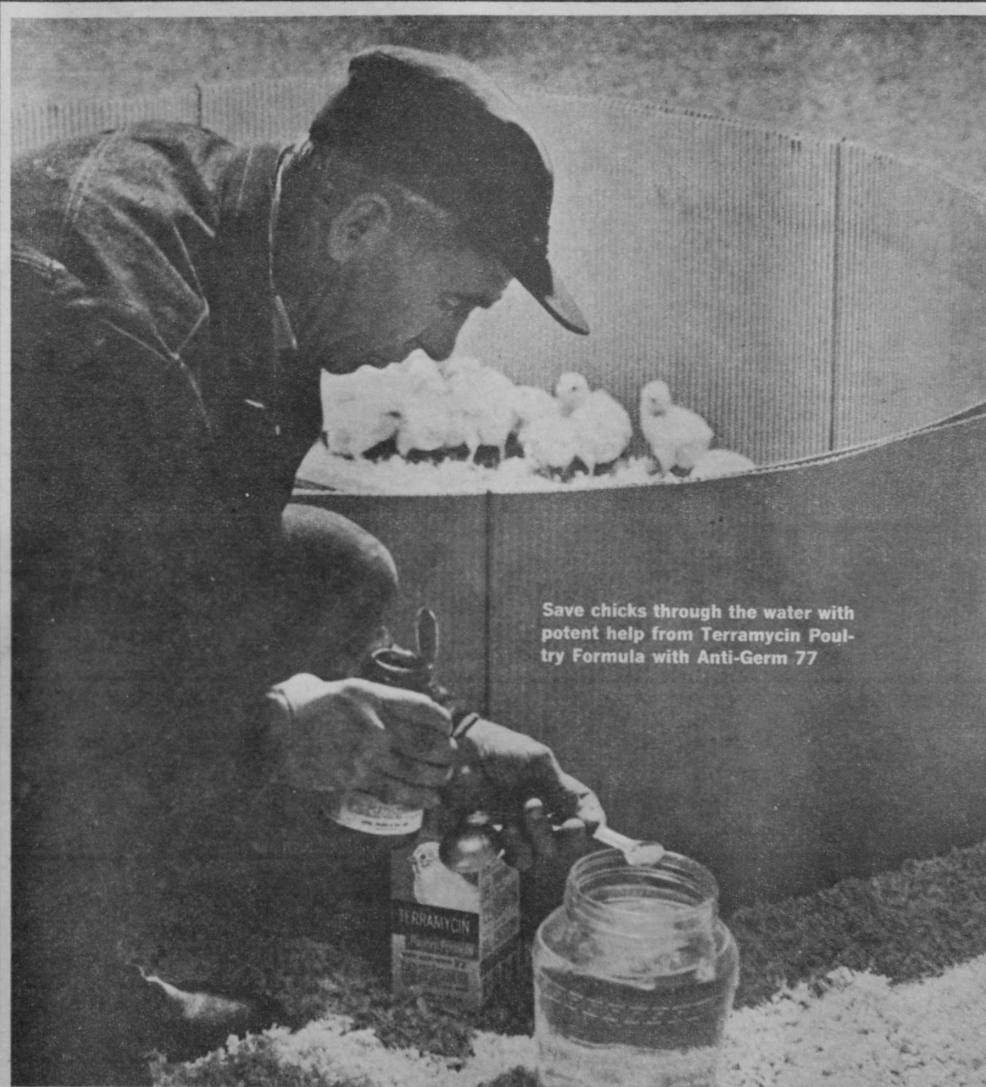
