East Tawas—

Centennial Starts Sunday; Make Final Plans Tonight

Less than one week remains before East Tawas' centennial celebration and last minute changes and additions to the week-long program have been completed by a hard-working committee.

The committee meets tonight (Wednesday) to discuss final arrangements. A dinner will be held, 6:30 p. m., at Lixey's Restaurant.

Although the centennial observance will not get under way officially until Sunday, June 24, several events are listed for the preceding day.

Saturday morning will mark the start of the Lumberjack Rally from the Holland Hotel, sponsored by the Huron Sports Car Club.

This will also be the date for the East Tawas High School alumni dinner, 6:30 p. m., to be held at the Holland Hotel. Master of ceremonies for this event will be Seth Thompson.

A street dance will follow at 9:30 p. m. on Newman Street between State and Lincoln.

Official opening of the centennial celebration will be held from 8:30 to 10:00 a. m. Sunday. A flag raising ceremony and sunrise church service will be conducted at the state park.

The afternoon program will include the annual Tawas River Canoe Race for junior and senior divisions.

Centennial Parade May be Largest in Area History

A parade of 83 units, believed to be the largest in Tawas history, is scheduled Saturday, June 30, during the East Tawas' centennial celebration.

Roy McMurray, parade chairman, said that eight high school bands are scheduled to march along the route. Besides the Tawas Area marching band, there will be units from Mesick, Kingsley, Harrison, Sandusky, Montrose, Arenac Eastern and Clare.

Assisting as block marshals are Arthur Dillon, Val Fallu, T. M. O'Loughlin, Harry Sherbine, Edward Seifert Jr., Jay Platte, Dale Butterfield, Deloise (Dewey) Durant, Percy Scott.

Float assembly time will be 1:00 p. m. and the parade will start at 2 o'clock. Units will be assembled on Washington Street with the parade route turning down Newman Street to the US-23 intersection. From there, the parade will proceed for two miles to the Mathews Street intersection in Tawas City where it will disperse.

In the line of march will be the following marching units and floats:

Colors and American Legion color guard, Louis Braddock (Spanish-American War veteran),

Largo Boy Scouts, cub scouts, Mesick Band, East Tawas Fire Department, Ladies Literary Club, Tawas City Baptist Church, Tawas City Garden Club, Kroger Company, Standard Oil Company, King's Market, Schaaf Lumber, Barber Gas and Oil.

United States Forest Service, Tawas and Bay City Shrines, Betty Kubiak Dancing School.

In addition, there will be many old-time automobiles, horse-drawn buggies and several equestrian units.

An area near the East Tawas bridge has been set aside for possible additions to the parade.

Move Approved for Park Office

Eight building applications were approved during the past week by the East Tawas Department of Public Works, including one submitted by the Michigan Department of Conservation.

William Kusey, park manager at East Tawas, requested permission to move the department's office building on Newman Street to a site near the Community Building.

Such a move had been requested by the city council several months ago and a decision on the matter was reached last week by conservation department officials.

Flag-Raising

Participating in flag-raising ceremonies Sunday morning officially opening East Tawas' centennial observance will be two life members of Audie Johnson Post, American Legion.

They are Jay Platte, who will raise the flag, assisted by Arthur Dillon. Also assisting will be Deloise (Dewey) Durant, past commander of the post.

In addition, a color guard from Wurtsmith Air Force Base will take part in the ceremonies. Edward J. Rima, band director at Tawas Area High School, will play the bugle call, "To the Colors."

Those participating will leave the Legion Hall at 8:15 o'clock, marching down Newman Street to the Community Building. The colors will be raised at 8:30 o'clock.

Other activities on Sunday, which has been designated veteran's day, include Huron Sports Car Club events. Tawas Bay Yacht Club sailboat regatta (which starts from the state dock), coffee hours at various churches and a concert by Tawas Area High School Band, 7:00 to

8:30 p. m., on the lawn of East Tawas school unit.

Monday activities will see an old-timers' dinner at the Holland Hotel starting at 6:30 p. m. Knott-hole baseball games will be at the athletic field.

A full slate of activities has been scheduled for Tuesday. Designated as children's day, there will be games from 10:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 to 4:00 p. m. A pageant will be presented at the East Tawas Community Building starting at 8:00 p. m., to be followed by a street dance on Newman Street between State and Lincoln.

Wednesday is Railroad Day and the Detroit and Mackinac Railway will again offer excursion train rides. Starting at the site of the old depot across from the Holland Hotel, the trains will make round trips between National City (White Rock Quarry spur) and East Tawas. The trips will be held from 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m.

Stuart White, traffic manager of the D&M, said Tuesday that six passenger cars would be used in the train. The round trip will take about 1 1/2 hours.

Other activity slated Wednesday will be a pie eating contest at 4:00 p. m.

Thursday has been set aside as merchants' day and there will be children's water games at the state park starting at 10:00 a. m. and running through 3:30 p. m., with 1 1/2 hours off at noon. Wilber Church Women will hold a supper at 6:00 p. m. at the church and merchants will have a jack pot at 8:30 p. m.

Docking of the USS Amherst at 4:00 p. m. Friday will mark the start of navy day activities. The ship will be met at the state park by the high school band and an official welcoming delegation.

Friday activities also include a fish fry at Eagles Hall on US-23, a donkey ball game at the athletic field starting at 8:00 p. m. and the large District Boy Scout pow-wow, starting at 9:30 p. m. at the athletic field.

Recent changes in the centennial program include judging of beards and costumes, now slated for Friday, June 29, 5:00 p. m., at the corner of Newman and Westover Streets, and a children's wheel and pet parade to be held at 10:30 a. m. Saturday, June 30. This parade will be on Newman Street.

Highlight of Saturday's program, and the top feature of the entire celebration, will be a giant parade from 2:00 to 4:00 p. m. Tawas Community Chorus will again present its centennial concert at 7:30 p. m. To be staged at the Community Building this production received many favorable (See CENTENNIAL, page 8.)

Canoe Race Set Sunday on River

Ninth annual Tawas River Canoe Race will be a featured attraction during next week's centennial observance at East Tawas.

Races for both junior and senior divisions will be held Sunday, June 24, starting at Groves Landing at Tawas Lake.

Both divisions will paddle from the starting point to Cliff's Landing and then back down the Tawas River to the US-23 bridge. The race will end there for junior contestants but senior paddlers will continue on along the shoreline of Tawas Bay to the waterways commission dock at East Tawas.

Starting time for the junior race is 1:30 p. m. while senior paddlers will shove off at 2:00 p. m.

These races are sponsored by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce. Committee in charge includes Chairman Arthur Wuggazer, Hugo

Wojahn and Howard Silverthorn. There are many vantage points along the Tawas River from which spectators may watch the race. The six bridges along the route are expected to be filled with onlookers, while others will follow the race along the entire course.

This race traces its origination back to Tawas City's centennial observance in 1954 when it was one of the featured attractions. It has continued every year since then.

Wind Toppled Trees in Harrisville Area

Two barres were toppled and trees uprooted Monday evening when a twister-type gale swept through a rural area seven miles north of Harrisville. The storm left a path one-half mile long and about 100 yards wide.

Sheriff Martin Gerrish of Alcona County reported that there were no injuries due to the storm. Believed to have been a tornado, the storm moved out into Lake Huron after its brief stay on shore.

Two Hale Couples on Tour of Europe

Two Hale couples are among more than 300 Michiganians who are attending the convention this week of Lions International at Nice, France.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Morley Stevenson and Mr. and Mrs. Earl Bielby left Monday for New York City where they joined their Lions Club members and their wives on their way by chartered air liners to France.

Following the three-day convention, the Stevensons and Bielbys will spend four weeks in Europe on a tour arranged by the international group. Among the countries visited will be England, France, Switzerland, Germany, Austria and Italy.

Stevenson, executive vice president of Farmers and Merchants State Bank, plans to take movies and color slides of the trip and will show them at meetings of area Lions Clubs on their return in July.

East Shore Asphalt Wins Contract for TC Street Work

East Shore Asphalt Paving Company, Oscoda, was low bidder on seal-coating more than a mile of city streets in Tawas City. Three bids were opened Monday night by the city council.

The Oscoda firm's bid of \$2,990.71 was \$51.92 lower than the next lowest bid of Yockey Construction Company of Alpena, \$3,042.63. Third bid, \$3,348.06, was entered by Alcona Asphalt Paving Company, Harrisville.

The council authorized acceptance of the low bid. Work is to be completed between July 15 and 30.

The council's street committee is to investigate two requests for street work which were read at Monday night's meeting.

Tawas Area Board of Education has asked the city to raise the level of Eighth Avenue east of the new elementary unit. This is a dead-end street and considerably lower than the school site.

The other letter came from Hugo Wojahn, who requested that Fir Street from Maple to Beech be opened for one block.

Both of these requests are to be investigated by the street committee Thursday afternoon.

The council approved a request from Alderman Cecil Cable for participation with the Tawas City Businessmen's Association in constructing a float for the East Tawas Centennial parade. The city is to furnish \$100 for materials while businessmen are to furnish the labor. In charge of construction is Walter Champin.

Baptists Held Dual Dedication Sunday

Combined service dedicating a new educational unit and 75th anniversary observance of First Baptist Church, Tawas City, was held Sunday afternoon.

Service of dedication for the new educational unit was held starting at 3 o'clock. Principal speaker was the Rev. Charles Mercer, former pastor of the Tawas City church, who is now pastor of Mayville Baptist Church.

Scripture reading during the service was by the Rev. Grant Lapham, pastor of Hemlock and Reno Baptist Churches. A dedicatory prayer was given by James Boomer, deacon, while a greeting on behalf of the community was extended by Mayor George Tuttle.

Plans for the educational unit, completed this year, were begun under the leadership of Mr. Mercer in May 1960. Later that year, he resigned to accept new pastorate at Mayville. On September 11, 1960, the Rev. Alfred P. Miller, present pastor, began his duties here and the project was completed under his guidance.

An anniversary-dedication banquet was held Sunday evening. This was followed by a song fest, recognitions and an address by Dr. Arthur Farrell, executive secretary of the Michigan Baptist Convention.

The Tawas City Baptist Church was organized March 7, 1887, with

52 members. Records of the congregation do not indicate when the church was constructed, but it is believed to have been built in the late 1880s.



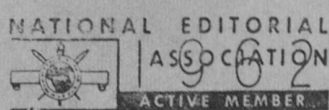

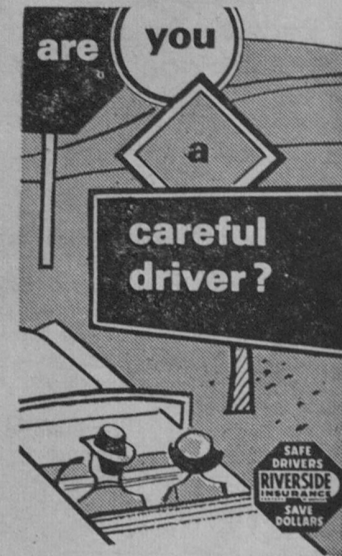
Extension Group and 4-Hers Enjoy Meeting at Bass Lake

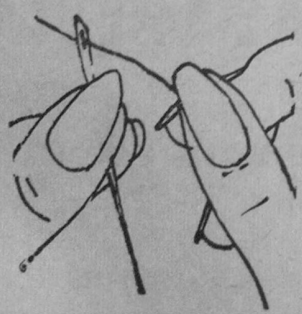

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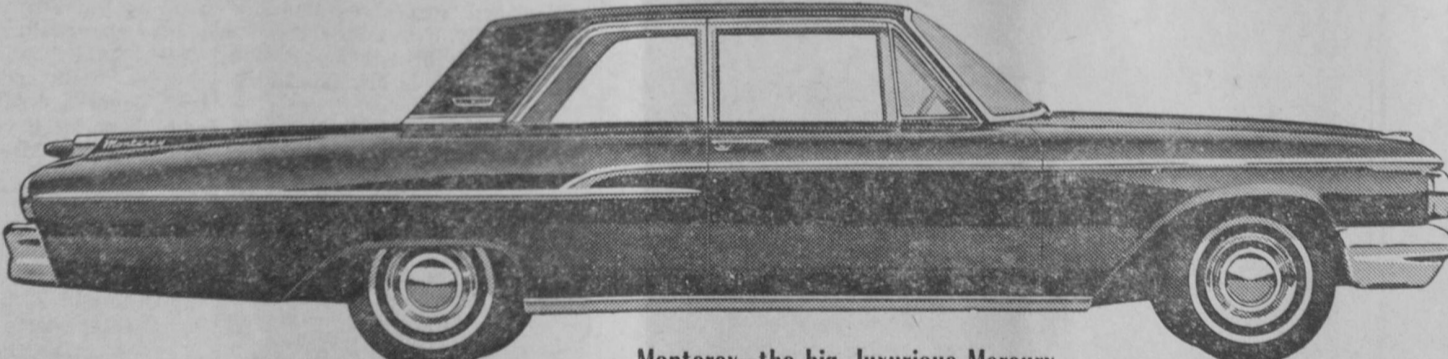

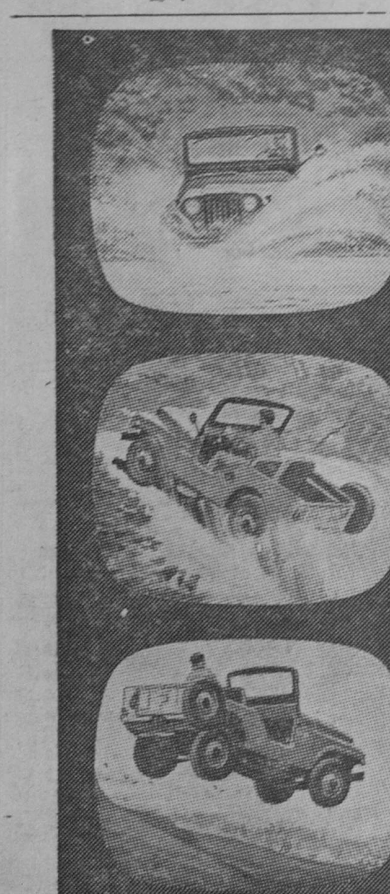

Explain Benefits to Tourist Industry from State Committees

"It's great to see Michigan is first in something and other states are copying us."

Speaking was State Sen. Thomas F. Schweigert, Petoskey, chairman of the tourist industry relations committee of the Michigan Senate. He was one of the two key leaders in the state legislature who spoke during the two-day session of the East Michigan Tourist Association's board of directors.

Schweigert told EMTA directors, holding their annual summer meeting at the Holland Hotel, that the state had taken the lead in organizing tourist industry relations in its legislature.

Organized last year, the senate and house groups, first standing committees to be organized in the legislature in 27 years, are believed to be a first in the nation. Other states have taken Michigan's lead and are making plans to organize similar legislative groups.

Both Schweigert and State Rep. Walter G. Nakkula, Gladwin, who chairmans the house committee, said that the two groups had made solid accomplishments in the state legislature during the recent session. They hope to bring about in a very short time, an increase in the state's economy through tourism.

Among legislation fostered by

the groups were creation of four new state parks, establishment of state highway department information centers at the several entrances into Michigan and pushed legislation calling for improvement of ski area safety facilities.

They said that additional work would be needed on the current highway sign problem and in the area of private trailer parks, where there are conflicting federal and state regulations. They also stressed need for developing present state parks.

Schweigert said that continued work of the two committees during the interim between sessions had been assured by appropriation of funds.

"We are hopeful that the committee will exist for many years to come," said Nakkula. "We want all members of the legislature to understand problems of Michigan tourism."

He said that the two committees were not organized to see how much money could be expended. "However, if tourist travel falls flat in Michigan, the economy of this state will do likewise," stated Nakkula.

"Since organization of the two committees, you no longer whisper tourism in the legislative chambers at Lansing," he declared. "When two committees make recommendations, everyone seems to pay attention."

Others who gave brief reports included Emil Buchholz, president of EMTA; James Hall, secretary-manager; and Robert Furlong, di-

rector of the Michigan Tourist Council. Another guest of the group was State Rep. James P. Mielock of Whittemore.

The EMTA's board of directors held a dinner meeting Thursday night and wound up its summer session Friday morning with business meetings at the Holland. The group then toured points of interest in the area, including Lumbermen's Monument and made a trip on the AuSable River Queen.
