ET Council OKs Docking as New City Patrolman

Donald Docking was hired Monday night to fill a city patrolman vacancy at East Tawas. His appointment by Mayor Clarence McKenzie was confirmed by the city council.

Docking, a Tawas City resident, was selected from a field of 14 applicants. The appointment was effective immediately and he took over his new job under Chief Harry Pelton starting Tuesday morning.

According to regulations relative to the hiring of city employees, Docking will be required to make his residence at East Tawas shortly.

He had been employed by the Dakin Security Service for the past four years. This firm provides plant protection at National Gypsum Company installations.

He replaces former city patrolman, George Duff, who resigned in order to operate the Tawas Taxi Service, which he purchased.

Bid of Edward Schanbeck for furnishing garbage disposal to the city was accepted by the council. Schanbeck's bid of \$4,500 was \$150 lower than the one other bid received, that of Thomas Bolen.

The five-year contract requires that the contractor furnish an enclosed packer-type truck body for the sanitary disposal.

Supt. Paul Roper presented a report on streets which are to be seal-coated this year. This work totals 3,890 feet and will cost \$2,753.85.

Included in the program are the following streets: West Franklin from Wilkinson to Ogemaw, 400 feet; Ogemaw from Washington to Franklin, 450 feet; West Washington from Ogemaw to Huron, 200 feet; Evans from Washington to Franklin, 450 feet; Green Road from Tawas Lake to Lakewood Drive, 660 feet; Wadsworth from Franklin to Woodlawn, 630 feet; West State from Sawyer to Church, shoulders only, 300 feet; an alley in Block 5, 400 feet.

Council OKs 6,000 Feet of Seal-Coat

A program calling for the re-sealing of nearly 6,000 feet of streets was approved Monday night by the Tawas City Council. Cost of the project would be approximately \$4,930.

On recommendation of its street committee, the council authorized Supt. Reginald Bublitz to receive bids for resealing the following streets:

Ninth Avenue from railroad tracks to Fourth Street, 1,600 feet; Seventh Avenue from Whittemore to First Street, 1,200 feet; Oak Street from US-23 to German Street, 1,200 feet; one block on Sixth Avenue between Whittemore and Second Street; Harris Avenue from the city limits to Second Street, 1,800 feet.

All of this construction would be double-seal. Bublitz is to report on bids at the next meeting.

Superintendent Bublitz was instructed to repair a cable across the Tawas City Park dock which would prevent unauthorized entry of trucks and cars on the structure.

A request of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association for the city to furnish \$200 toward construction of a float in East Tawas' centennial parade was tabled until the next meeting. The businessmen's association is to furnish labor for this project.

NO FIREWORKS!

Michigan State Police warn this week that it is unlawful to use fireworks (pyrotechnics) or have such explosives in possession.

It has come to the attention of local authorities that fireworks have been sold to several business places in the area.

Police warn that a state law, which only allows the use of sparklers up to 10 inches in length, will be rigidly enforced.

Farmers and Merchants Bank Holds Open House

A threat of rain failed to dampen a "holiday" atmosphere which prevailed at Hale Tuesday. Several hundred Iosco County residents attended the day-long open house event for the new Farmers and Merchants State Bank.

About 50 "early birds" were on hand at 9:00 a. m. to watch D. D. Pearsall, bank president, cut the ribbon to officially open the new main office.

Watching the ceremony, along with the visitors, were members of the board of directors and bank employees.

Visitors were conducted on guided tours through the new building by proud directors. The office had opened for business a week ago and all was in readiness for the program.

Although some minor work is yet to be completed (replacement of two ceiling light fixtures which were damaged in transit and the usual last minute corrections in a building program), those who attended the open house learned that the new building was all that it was said to be.

The new home of Farmers and Merchants is one of the most modern banking facilities in Northern Michigan, a fact which is particularly appreciated by residents of the Hale area.

One of the most striking features of the new building is a large mural, showing hunting and fishing scenes, which hangs above teller windows. This is the focal point of the bank and is lighted at night.

Other features include an attractive private office for J. Morley Stevenson, executive vice president; a spacious work area for the bookkeeping department, which is fully carpeted; well-lighted lobby, and the convenience of rear entrance parking for customers.

Tawas Cityman to Study in Vienna

Kenneth J. Myles, who graduated this week from Central Michigan University, is one of 57 students registered for the Hope College Vienna Summer School program in Vienna, Austria.

This group sails from New York on the MS Aurelia on June 9 and will return by air from Brussels, Belgium, on August 30, according to Dr. Paul Fried, director of the program.

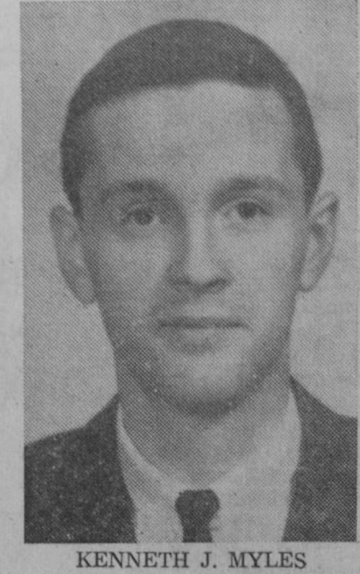

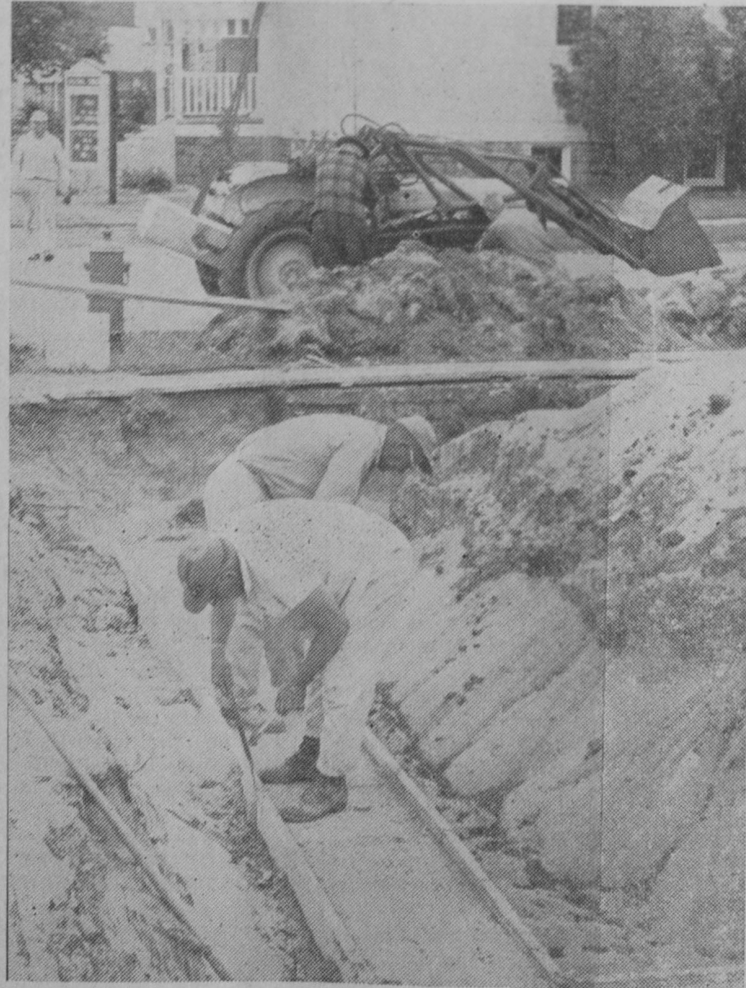
The spiritual source of intelligence and creativity will be brought out Sunday at Christian Science church services.

To outboard owners who are in the majority, we suggest the following organized approach to spring fitting out.

Supervisors' Proceedings

MAY SESSION

May 16, 1962

Pursuant to April adjournment, the Isosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by the chairman who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Ashton, Bellville, Blust, Creamer, DeRosia, Everett, Gerard, Lamb, LaVoy, Little, Long, McKenzie, Oates, Smith, Stephan, Webb, White. Absent: Lixey, Pollard.

Mr. Vance addressed the board about the purchase of a new addressograph machine for the treasurer's office. The matter was referred to the finance committee.

Communications were read and referred to the proper committees by the chairman.

Mr. Smith stated that the judiciary committee was in the process of replying to Congressman Cederberg regarding Wurtsmith Air Force Base housing controversy.

Mr. Everett addressed the board stating that he believed that public relations between the county and Wurtsmith Air Force Base should be improved and more effort should be exerted on both sides.

Committees were ordered to their respective duties, balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair.

The board was called to order at 11:30 a. m. at which time Mr. Davenport, county agricultural agent, explained the functions of the extension service. He also distributed a proposed tourist brochure to members of the board.

Mr. Smith read the following report of the judiciary committee: Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

We, the judiciary committee, do not concur with the Mackinac County Board of Supervisors of raising revenue for refinancing the Mackinac Bridge, by 1/4 cent per gallon of gas but would consider some other method of financing rather than increased tolls.

Upon motion by Smith supported by DeRosia, the report was unanimously accepted.

Upon motion supported and prevailing, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION
Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m.,

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Standard Gas - Oil Groceries - Ice Cream
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roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session and Mr. Pollard took his seat.

Rodney Meade of the Isosco County Road Commission appeared before the board asking what this board desired in particular in the comprehensive report in request from the commission.

Mr. Davenport again appeared before the board showing slides of pictures taken during a visit of the welfare committee to the Barry County Medical Facilities.

Mr. Oates read the following report of the aeronautics committee. Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

Your airport committee respectfully submits the following progress report on the new county airport.

1. On May 9, your committee met with Mr. Downey of the Michigan Department of Aeronautics; Mr. Smith of the Federal Aviation Agency; Mr. Peckman, our airport engineer; Mr. Woods, contractor for the airport construction; Mr. Roach, airport manager. The contractor's work was inspected and approved. At the same time, engineers from Consumers Power and Bell Telephone met with the committee and went over details of the electric and telephone service, and the survey line for the new road was inspected and details discussed with Mr. Cooke, surveyor.

2. At another meeting May 3, the committee met with Mr. Welch of the Alpena Flying Service and discussed details of the daily flight service to Detroit and Alpena. Also attending the meeting were Mr. MacMurray, president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce; Mr. Pugh, president of Tawas City Businessmen's Association; Mr. Watson, chairman of airport committee of chamber of commerce; Mr. Smith, Isosco County News; Mr. Thornton, The Tawas Herald; Mr. Roach, airport manager; Ralph Meyers; Charles Smith, Osceola supervisor. Mr. Welch stated that service would start June 4 and that he would furnish a used radio for the use of the airport for this year.

3. Consumers Power Company has started clearing ROW and expect to have a revised contract ready for acceptance shortly. Cost of the line will be approximately \$2,660 as compared to an original estimate of \$2,950.

4. Bell Telephone Company has agreed to lay a temporary line along the ROW of the new road, so that service can be installed within the next two or three weeks.

5. The committee has watched closely the condition of the sod on the landing strip and can report that the grass is rapidly improving.

6. The agreement with Mr. Roach, airport manager, has been completed. On the advice of the prosecuting attorney, the agreement is on an oral basis. Mr. Roach has been bonded for \$500.

7. The committee has examined hangar plans, and has secured some cost estimates and hope to soon have some proposals to make on hangar construction.

Mr. Oates read the following report of the aeronautics committee. Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

Your airport committee has received from the Michigan Department of Aeronautics a revised master plan for future development of the Isosco County Airport.

The revisions consists of relocating the future N-S runway slightly to the north, so that the entire length of the runway will be visible from the administration building. The only other change is that locations of parking lot, access roads, hangar areas and tie down areas is now shown. These changes may possibly require future purchase of approximately 20 acres.

Your airport committee recommends the approval of this revised plan.

In the first place, our intentions were not against the 300 low cost housing units. As we had assumed by your statement in the Bay City Times that they had already been allocated. (Dated April 15, 1962).

Now it was our wish that there be no other housing projects at Wurtsmith Air Force Base after the 300 additional housing, unless a dire need be had.

We were informed by Colonel Kunkel that Colonel Lacombe did not have any of the above information concerning housing on the base at Oscoda. Therefore, we are now satisfied with the answer that Colonel Lacombe gave us at our meeting with him on Friday, the 13th of April.

Hoping that this clarifies this committee's position on this matter, and any further communications be sent to the board of supervisors rather than to an individual or other groups in the county, not concerned with county government.

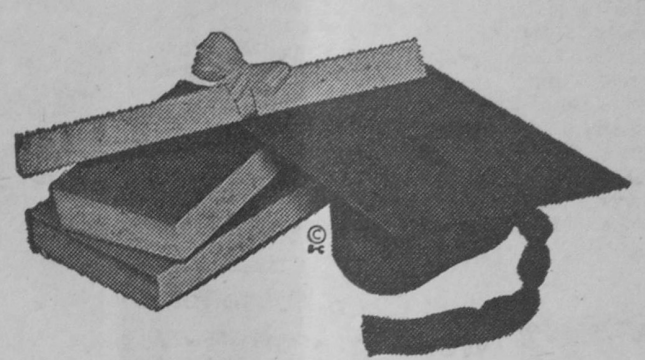

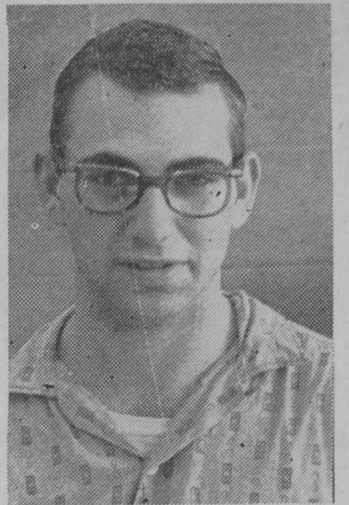

 Hope College utilizes facilities of the Institute of European Studies. Students live in private homes, eat the noon meal together and are given a weekly refund for their supper. They are free to plan their own leisure time and most of the week-ends.

Prior to the opening of the summer session, students take part in a three-week study tour which includes meetings with European leaders and students, visits to universities, museums and factories and attendance at musical performances.

Main emphasis during the 1962 study tour will be on the examination of the growing European Economic Community and the Common Market.

The cultural program of the tour will highlight attendance at an opera in the famous Paris Opera House, participation in the Holland Festival in Amsterdam, a two-day stay at one of Germany's oldest universities in Freiburg and finally a visit at the Cini Foundation for Renaissance Art and Music in Venice, Italy.

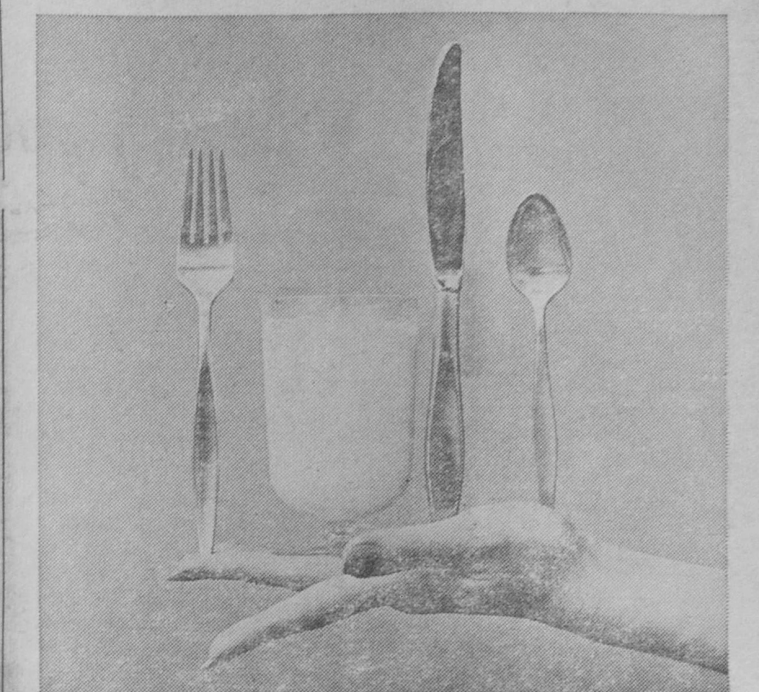

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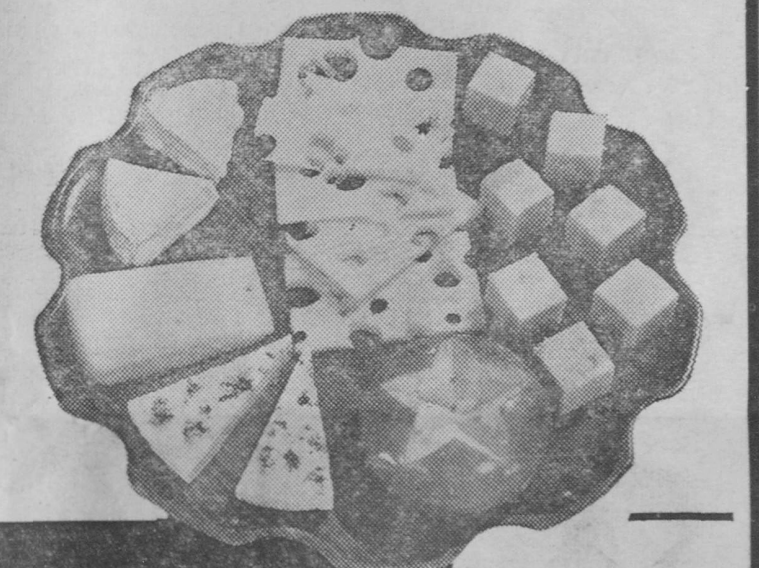
