# Work Begun on Townline **Road Contract**

Preliminary work started Monday on reconstruction of 5.074 miles on Townline Road from US-23 to Chambers Road. Rodney Meade of the Iosco Road Commission is project engineer.

Contractor for this \$178,890.76 project is Walter Hutfliz Construction Company, Saginaw. Completion date is scheduled for September 1

The Hutfilz company moved equipment to the site last Wednesday and brushing crews moved in Monday to start the work.

This road is being constructed through 50 percent participation by the federal government. Michigan is allocated money every year for federal aid secondary work and this, in turn, is allocated by the state highway department to various county road commissions, cities and villages. Iosco's appropriation amounts to approx-

imately \$36,000 annually. This project, in the planning stage for about 11/2 years, is the last secondary road leading out of the Tawases which has not been hard surfaced. Weather permitting, the road will be blacktopped this year.

The road will have a grade width of 30 feet and a finished sur-face of 22 feet, with ditches on each side.

A spokesman for the road commission, which has charge for supervision and engineering, said that the road would be closed to through traffic during construction. Residents were asked to use the nearest side road connecting with other highways in order to make their exit.

# Tawas Student Wins in **State FFA Speech Meet**

Dennis Cross, 17-year-old Tawas Area High School junior, won a gold award and prize of \$100 at the 34th annual convention of the Michigan Association of Future Farmers of America held last week at East Lansing.

Winning first place in the state public speaking contest, Cross' theme, "Mightier than Missiles," was judged tops among the eight regions of Michigan.

He recently won the regional public speaking contest at Gladwin and became eligible to enter at the state level.

Cross is now eligible to compete in regional contests at a national level prior to the FFA's convention next October at Kansas City.

Regional representatives in the state speaking contest, besides Cross, came from Hillsdale, Gaines, Lapeer, Cedar Springs, Felch, Fennville and Pellston.

Dennis is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Cross of Wilber Township.

Accompanying him to East Lansing were Gary Mallon and James Peters, who were delegates from the Tawas chapter, along with Robert Reasner, faculty advisor.

They met with some 1,000 Michigan FFA boys and leaders for the annual convention. Officers were elected for the coming year.





NEW MADRID, Mo.-April 2-Union military and naval leaders today expressed confidence that Island No. 10, strategic Mississippi River stronghold of the Confederates, would fall within 48 hours.



They moved to East Tawas from Garden City in 1946. He was employed as a mechanic at United States Gypsum Plant before his retirement three years ago.






