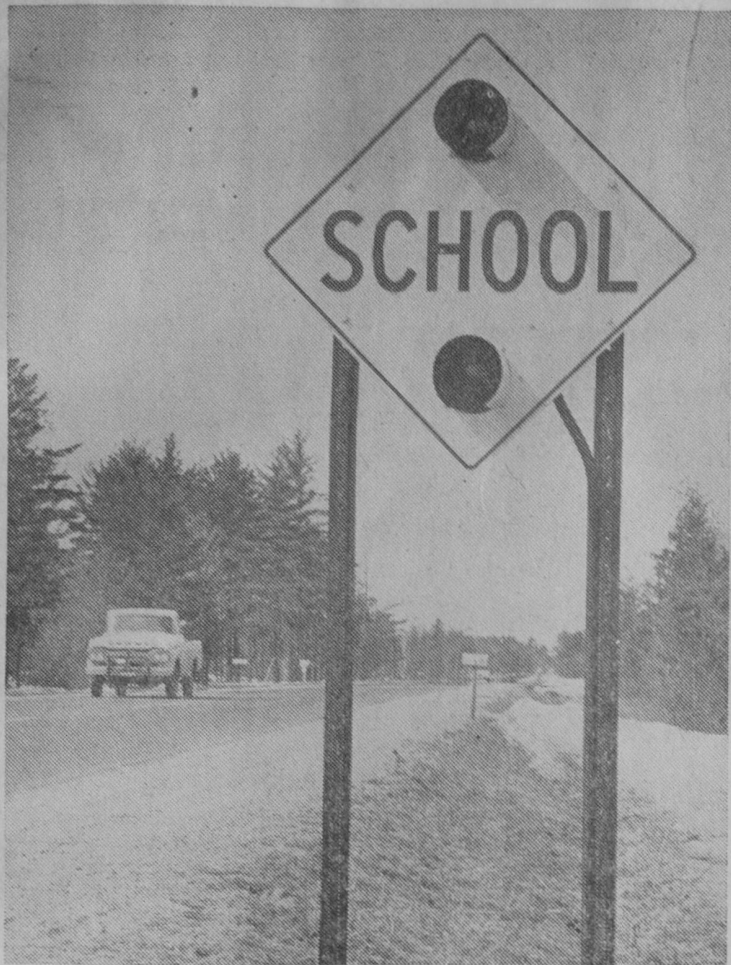

## School Board Approves Blinker Light Payment

Tawas Area Board of Education voted Monday night to share half the cost of erecting two new blinker school zone signs with the state highway department.

Located on M-55 near the high school, the two signs were erected last week by a state highway department crew. As of Monday, however, electrical power had not been connected to the signs because no authorization had been given by the school board to participate in the cost.

After discussing the proposed signs some months ago, the board of education tabled further action when it learned its share of the \$1,970.94 total cost would be \$985.50.

Because of state law, schools are not allowed to deal directly with the state highway department and must work through the local county road commission.

Through some misunderstanding, Frederick J. Eggan, district traffic engineer at Alpena, received the go-ahead on the two signs. Engineering was prepared and the signs erected.

Eggan said Monday morning that because of department policy, the signs would have to be removed if the school did not participate in the cost. This, he said, would result in a loss of about \$900 in labor costs.

Although funds are not presently available for participation, the board of education felt the blinker signs were excellent safety devices and assured that payment would be made as soon as money becomes available.

Each of the 36-inch signs, located at the east and west boundaries of the school property on highway right-of-way are equipped with alternating eight-inch

amber blinker units.

The blinkers are activated by automatic timers which can be controlled from the school building. Times for operation probably would be between 8:30 and 9:00 a. m. and 3:15 and 4:00 p. m. during school days, plus operation during special night events at school or at other times during a high concentration of traffic entering M-55.

Sgt. Frank Roti, commander of the state police post at East Tawas, last week termed the blinker signs as "the best safety devices which could be obtained for controlling main highway traffic near a school."

## Tawas School OK'd for NDEA Money

Tawas Area School has been approved for \$2,504.62 in federal funds under the National Defense Education Act. This grant is to be matched by \$2,724.35 in local money.

Principal Ernest Jordan Jr. told members of the board of education Monday night that the money would be used to purchase instruction equipment for science and mathematics in elementary grades; science, mathematics and language in the high school.

Jordan said that instructional equipment to be purchased would include such items as film strips, opaque projectors and material for a two-hour physics class to be offered next year.

In other business Monday night, the board authorized participation in the summer youth recreation program to the extent of \$300. The East Tawas Council allocated \$300 to the program last week and the Tawas City Council is to be invited to participate at its meeting next week.

This money would be used to hire a full-time athletic director during the summer months. Although volunteers will still be needed as coaches, managers and umpires in the youth baseball program, the director would coordinate these activities and would also carry out other phases of a recreation program.

Deloise (Dewey) Durant, who has been active in the Knothole League for many years and a member of the East Tawas Recreation Committee, said that more than 300 youngsters participated last year. "We want to make this an improving program for all youngsters in the area and a full-time director could help immensely," said Durant.

Supt. Reynold Mick reported that 150 students had expressed a desire to participate in the driver training education program to be offered this summer. Before the six-week course is completed, a total of 22,500 miles would be traveled in driver training cars.

Final action on the 1962-63 school budget is to be taken by the board of education April 9. The

## City Elections Next Monday

Voters of three Isosco County municipalities will go to the polls next Monday to name city officers for the coming year.

While there are no contests listed at Tawas City or Whittemore, several races have developed in the spring election at East Tawas.

The non-partisan election there

will have a race for mayor, three aldermen positions are at stake and there will be a "sticker" contest for justice of the peace.

Although excitement in this election has not yet reached the pitch of last year's balloting, a "hot" race is expected to develop for the mayor's chair, which also holds a seat on the county board of supervisors through city charter.

Incumbent Mayor C. V. Miller, who pulled an upset last spring over Elmer Werth to gain the position, is being opposed by veteran alderman and mayor pro-tem, Clarence McKenzie.

Opposing First Ward Alderman James G. Campbell, named by the council to fill a vacancy during the current term, will be Truman Barbier Jr. Second Ward Councilman Floyd Upton is opposed by Ralph Meyers and Edward Seifert Jr., incumbent Third Ward councilman, is being opposed by Claude Nash.

A three-way race has developed to fill the three-year vacancy of justice of the peace. The death of former JP Frank G. Berzhinski came after the deadline for filing and the names of candidates are not printed on ballots.

Announcing that they will be sticker candidates have been Mrs. Frank Berzhinski, widow of the late justice of the peace; A. J. Goulet, former JP who was defeated by Berzhinski last year, and E. F. Bailey.

Other city officers, Clerk Fred B. Lomas and Treasurer Grace Klenow, are unopposed.

## Tell Improvements at East Tawas During Past 12 Months

The 1961-62 political year at East Tawas is nearly completed and a report of the major activities of city government was announced this week.

During the past year, the council passed a health and food handling ordinance calling for licensing and inspection of all food handling establishments in the city. Also passed was a peddler's ordinance.

In addition to purchasing a new fire truck and equipment at a cost of \$22,695.13, the council entered into agreement with Tawas City for mutual fire protection. This enables each city to have the benefit of the combined fire fighting equipment of both communities.

Other fire department activities included the council's entering into a contract to provide Baldwin Township with fire protection, purchased a tank truck to carry 1,000 gallons of water, rebuilt the city garage entrance to accommodate three fire fighting units, reorganized the volunteer fire department, along with establishment of a firemen's training program.

The city replaced its dump truck and a new police car was purchased. The city's bookkeeping system was completely revised and it now has an accurate accounting of all city funds, back taxes, etc.

Street lighting on Newman Street in the state park was improved, streets were renamed to eliminate duplication and the department of public works now purchases its street gravel in

Voters of Tawas City will find only one column of candidates in next Monday's spring election. Republican candidates were named at caucuses in February while Democrats failed to name a slate for the first time in several years.

Candidates for city offices are as follows:

George Tuttle, mayor; Walter Nelson, clerk; John Hoshbach, treasurer.

Arthur Wegner, First Ward alderman; Clyde Evtll, Second Ward alderman; Howard Hatton, Third Ward alderman.

Clement Stephan, First Ward supervisor; Cecil Lamb, Second Ward supervisor; C. S. Everett, Third Ward supervisor.

Lamb is the lone change on the ballot from last year, although aldermen are elected for two-year terms. He was named by Republicans to succeed Fred Brabant, who announced his retirement at the caucus.

### Opinion Given on School Bus Loading

School buses loading or unloading passengers outside of villages and cities must be stopped on the roadway proper, according to a recent ruling from Attorney General Frank J. Kelley.

The opinion, No. 3635, was delivered in answer to the question of whether school buses receiving or discharging passengers outside of incorporated villages or cities must stop off the highway where possible and whether upon resuming motion the bus must remain off the roadway until traffic has dispersed to permit return.

According to the opinion the legislature intended that the school bus stop upon the highway itself in clear view of traffic traveling in either direction on the roadway. The roadway is considered any part that is open to use of the public for purposes of vehicular traffic, the entire surface of the roadway excluding the shoulder. School bus drivers, when receiving or discharging passengers outside of incorporated villages or cities, must bring the school bus to a stop on the roadway.

## Many Changes Set at Indian Museum

One of Isosco's principal tourist attractions is now in the process of being expanded and renovated for the coming season.

With opening scheduled for April 15, Allen Rhodes, owner of the Tawas Indian Museum located south of Tawas City, said this week that many new features are in store for visitors.

In addition to expanding the shop area where authentic Indian goods are sold, many new features are being added to the museum. Some of the new displays include tools, weapons and clothing of both plains and woodland Indians, along with an herb medicine display.

"We have spent considerable time during the past year collecting new items for the museum and it should be much more informative and educational than it has ever been before," said Rhodes.

Another new feature to be added later this year will be an Indian pow-wow with several performances to be given daily by Indians of the village. Some of the performers are veterans, having experience with the old Buffalo Bill shows.

In charge of the pow-wows will be James (Eagle) Shaffer, who has had considerable experience in this field and has traveled throughout Michigan and other Midwestern States.

A round enclosure of the stockade-type is to be constructed adjacent to the museum for the pow-wows. Eventually, the entire wooded area owned by Rhodes is to be brushed out and utilized in these authentic Indian dances.

Shaffer, who has worked for the Kansas City Museum and the North Dakota Historical Society doing archaeological work in the Dakotas, will be responsible for many of the exhibits in the museum here. He brings a vast

knowledge of American Indian history and lore.

Another addition this year will be a handcrafts shop where authentic Indian baskets and articles will be manufactured for sale to the public.

"We believe that this feature, alone, will add greatly to the museum as a tourist attraction," said Rhodes. "Visitors will be able to watch the Indians as they make these goods from black ash taken right from our own property."

Rhodes purchased the business last year from William Schetzen.

## Work Begun on Townline Road Contract

Preliminary work started Monday on reconstruction of 5.074 miles on Townline Road from US-23 to Chambers Road. Rodney Meade of the Isosco Road Commission is project engineer.

Contractor for this \$178,890.76 project is Walter Hutfiz Construction Company, Saginaw. Completion date is scheduled for September 1.

The Hutfiz company moved equipment to the site last Wednesday and brushing crews moved in Monday to start the work.

This road is being constructed through 50 percent participation by the federal government. Michigan is allocated money every year for federal aid secondary work and this, in turn, is allocated by the state highway department to various county road commissions, cities and villages. Isosco's appropriation amounts to approximately \$36,000 annually.

This project, in the planning stage for about 1½ years, is the last secondary road leading out of the Tawas area which has not been hard surfaced. Weather permitting, the road will be blacktopped this year.

The road will have a grade width of 30 feet and a finished surface of 22 feet, with ditches on each side.

A spokesman for the road commission, which has charge for supervision and engineering, said that the road would be closed to through traffic during construction. Residents were asked to use the nearest side road connecting with other highways in order to make their exit.

They met with some 1,000 Michigan FFA boys and leaders for the annual convention. Officers were elected for the coming year.



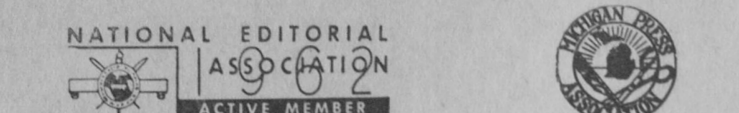

Dear Sir:  
It is important that it be brought to the attention of the people of this community, as has already been done by so many helpful organizations, the extreme need for continuation of support of the Red Cross blood bank program. In order to maintain our reserves of blood at Tawas Hospital for emergency use following accidents, treatment of shock following other severe injuries such as burns and for emergency use following the routine acute medical emergencies, it is imperative that the people of the community, the county and the surrounding area make every effort to provide blood so that this program may be maintained.

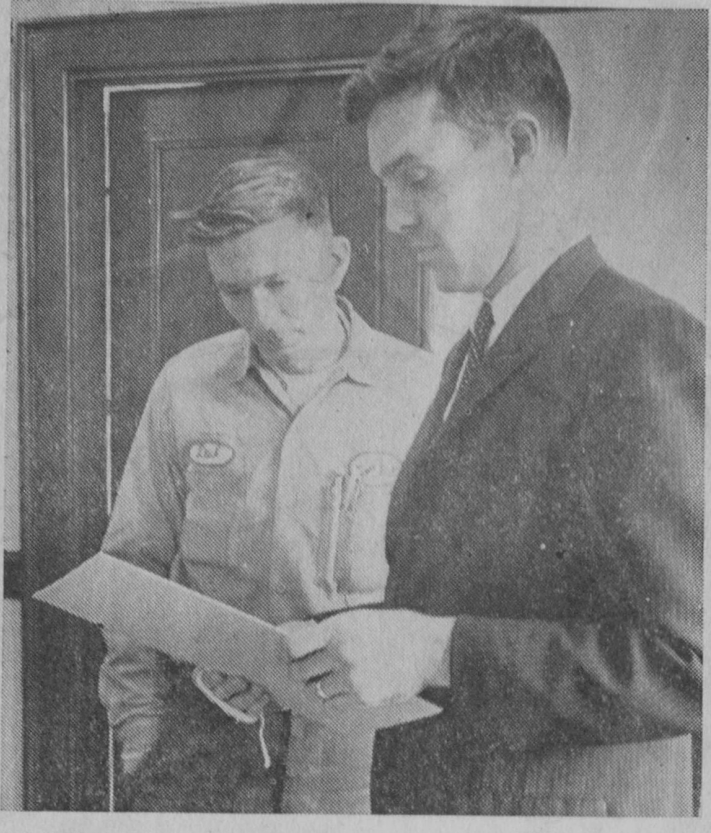

# FBI Nabs Oscoda Man On Charge Of Impersonation

An Oscoda man reported to have been enrolling women in an organization he called the "American Underground" is held under \$1,500 bond at Bay City.

Richard E. Smith, 27, was arrested last Wednesday at Oscoda by FBI agents. He is to be arraigned this week before Federal Judge Frank A. Picard after waiving hearing before United States Commissioner Clarence S. Pettit.

He is charged in a warrant authorized by United States Assistant District Attorney A. T. Lippert Jr. with pretending to be a federal officer.

According to arresting officers, Smith claimed his organization was formed for the purpose of training people to defend themselves against the Russians if they should invade this country.

At the time of his arrest, federal officers said Smith had succeeded in enrolling four young women from the Oscoda area.

In enrolling people in the "underground" group, Smith allegedly told them he had been employed by the FBI for the past four years.

He has also been operating a police patrol service for cabins in the Oscoda area.

Assisting in the investigation here was the Iosco County Sheriff's Department.

Conviction on the impersonation charge would bring a maximum fine of \$1,000 or a maximum prison term of three years or both.

According to a lengthy statement made to federal officers, Smith's "underground instruction" allegedly consisted mainly of "sex and judo."

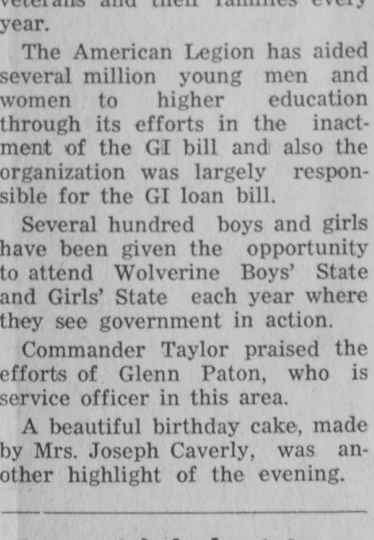

# April 16 is Deadline for SS Applications by Ministers

"April 16 is an important deadline for many of us, but especially for ministers who want social security credit for their earnings," said Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City social security office.

"Ministers who have not yet taken action and who do wish to participate in the social security program must indicate so by filing a waiver certificate with the local Internal Revenue Service office before April 16."

Mr. Ellifritz emphasized that the decision to participate in the social security program is up to the minister but that his office will be glad to answer any questions or furnish information which may be helpful in making this decision. A leaflet which explains how ministers can obtain social security coverage is available from the social security office, 1009 North Madison, Bay City. Ask for leaflet 33j.

"As of early last year, about 70 percent of the full-time ministers who are eligible for social security coverage have elected to have their earnings credited toward future old-age, survivors and disability insurance benefits," said Mr. Ellifritz, quoting a report of the Social Security Administration.

"Ministers who let the April 16 deadline go by without filing," said Mr. Ellifritz, "will not have a chance to participate in the social security program."

## SIXTH IN A SERIES— Ahoy, Skipper!

### CHARTS—YOUR NAUTICAL ROADMAP

The average motorist before he plans a trip—even to a nearby town very often refers to a road map to reassure himself of getting to destination safely, quickly and without unnecessary detours. But by comparison there are countless boat owners who think nothing of shoving off from their mooring without even a casual glance at a chart of the area in which they plan to cruise.

We suspect there are two main reasons for this. One is that the boat owner figures he will never be out of sight of land in case of trouble. The other appears that looking at a chart actually scares some people. This should not be the case because the information on a chart is relatively simple. In the next few paragraphs, perhaps we can take some of the apparent mystery out of the nautical chart.

First of all, the charts that we are most likely to use in this Great Lakes area are developed by the Corps of Engineers, United States Army. They are extremely accurate and to scale. Charts are dated at the time of issue so it is important not to depend on a chart that may be several years old and out of date. Each chart also carries a legend that explains many of the abbreviations used, also a scale of feet and miles.

friends. Lightly draw a line on the chart from your starting point to where you plan to go. Follow the line with your eye and if said line takes you where you are going without encountering areas of insufficient water or other dangerous conditions, you have got it made. Otherwise adjust the line to give you the safest journey and at the same time you will always know where you are. You are not going to be any saltier by dashing off heedlessly in the general direction of your destination. There may be shoal water in between.

Of course, if your cruise is of considerable length, other navigational aids such as your compass, speed indicator, clock, etc., will be necessary. How to apply their uses will be touched on at a later date, along with more explanation of the information found on your chart.

If you do not already have a chart or charts of your local area, it is suggested that you secure some. Even borrow a discarded chart from one of your boating friends. We will guarantee you will get a kick out of studying this chart in front of the old log fire. The spirit of adventure is sure to creep up on you and come next summer you will consider your chart as a most important piece of boating equipment. Perhaps you

### Pinkerton on Pan

WASHINGTON, D.C.—April 1—Criticism is mounting over detective Allan Pinkerton's operations of the North's intelligence service. Latest grumbles followed disclosure that defenses by which the South has held Bull Run, or Manassas, scene of the first battle of the conflict, were vastly overestimated. ### "It's Operation Saw" At New Madrid, Mo.

NEW MADRID, Mo.—April 2—Union military and naval leaders today expressed confidence that Island No. 10, strategic Mississippi River stronghold of the Confederates, would fall within 48 hours.

A fleet of riverboats headed by the Carondelet, under command of Flag Capt. Henry Walke, aided by troops of the battle-hardened 42d Illinois regiment under Col. George W. Roberts, is poised for an assault on the island.

The Carondelet has been outfitted to withstand the fire of the five gun emplacements on Island No. 10 and the four opposite the island on the mainland.

warfare, Union army engineers under Col. J. W. Bissell are engaged in sawing out trees blocking the channel above the island.

Some 600 men are involved in this tricky work, according to Col. Bissell. It involves cutting a canal through two miles of swampy marshland studded with trees, thus providing a safer method of approach to the island.

MEN ON RAFTS are using saw-logs to cut the trees at a minimum depth of four and a half feet below the surface.

Working in advance of them are other crews who "top" the trees to leave a minimum of eight feet above the surface; other crews are removing the timber as it falls.

A cemetery caretaker has been hired and many improvements made on the property, which is now nearly self-supporting. The council is presently in the process of annexing property owned by the city adjacent to the cemetery.

Supervisor L. S. Little recommended that the Iosco Road Commission again be asked to attend a meeting of the board and make known its projected work report for the coming year.

Iosco-Arenac Regional Library is to vacate its storage room in the county building this week. This room is to be taken over as a meeting place by the board of supervisors because of the large number of trials and conflicting days in the circuit court room.

The county has offered the Short house rent free to the library for six months. Labor will be furnished to assist in the move. This house, located adjacent to the county building, was purchased by the board some months ago.

Furniture for the board's new meeting room is being purchased by the building and grounds committee.

The board authorized purchase of 1,700 gallons of aviation gasoline for the new airport. Underground tanks were installed last fall.

An allocation of \$300 was made to the Oscoda Park Commission to improve parking facilities at Iosco Springs.
