

EAST TAWAS' CENTENNIAL YEAR --- 1962

RIDING THE HIGH IRON over this wooden bridge which spanned the Rifle River at Omer is a locomotive and train of coaches of the Detroit, Bay City and Alpena Railroad Company, forerunner of the present-day Detroit and Mackinac. This bridge was completed in 1883 and its design was patterned after railroad bridge engineering developed during the Civil War. It was 75 feet above low water mark and was considered the highest railroad bridge in Michigan. Its total length was 986 feet, with two truss spans of 100 and 150 feet, being a combination of wood and iron. The rest of the length consisted of trestle work, containing more than a

half a million feet of sawed timber and 100,000 feet of hewn timber. It cost approximately \$30, 000 and white pine used in its construction had grown along the banks of the Rifle, which is jammed with logs in the above picture. In 1883, Gen. Russell A. Alger extended the railroad north to Oscoda and south to Alger on the Michigan Central. Passenger traffic opened December 3, 1883, and the first through train included a flat car loaded with type and equipment of The Tawas Herald, which began publishing the next month.-Joseph Barkman Col-





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
