

Mock Trial Gives Realistic Insight

Students of Tawas Area High School have a much better understanding of courts and law following an one-hour program conducted at an assembly Monday in observance of Michigan Law Day.

A mock trial was conducted in the high school auditorium Monday afternoon in which students participated as witnesses and jurors.

A note of realism was added when court was conducted by Isoco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller. Also participating were Isoco Prosecuting Attorney William McCready, Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell, Isoco County Clerk George Prescott, Attorney Herbert Hertzler and Miss Bessie Brown, circuit court stenographer.

A skit was conducted by students in which a "crime" was committed before the audience. Following the arrest by Sheriff O'Farrell, the defendant was brought to

trial and eye witnesses to the crime were obtained from the audience.

A panel of jurors was also drawn, each being questioned by the court, prosecutor and defendant's attorney in the same manner as an actual court trial.

Witnesses were interrogated on the stand by the prosecuting attorney, with cross-examination by Attorney Hertzler.

Following the trial, Judge Miller charged the jury, which then retired for deliberation and announcement of its final verdict.

Students participating in the skit and as eye witnesses were Brian Helmer, Robert Smith, William Hatton and Richard White.

Principal Ernest Jordan Jr. said that the trial proved to be very realistic and that students had the opportunity to gain a much better understanding of law and the courts.

Thunder Showers Relieve Danger in Wooded Areas

Thunder showers over the weekend and on Monday came as a welcome relief to forestry department officials and volunteer fire departments.

This area has experienced an extremely dry spring and fire conditions were becoming very dangerous before the advent of rain.

All Isoco County volunteer fire departments, forestry and conservation department crews have been called out on grass and brush fires during the past two weeks.

In spite of warnings issued last week, some area residents touched off grass fires and the inevitable result was that fire fighters were called to the rescue.

Although no appreciable amount of damage occurred to property, considerable acreage of grass and brush land was burned over during the dry weather. Operational expenses of the volunteer fire departments, however, have been costly to taxpayers.

A. J. Bopp Dies; Area Industrialist

A. J. Bopp, co-founder of Bopp-Busch Manufacturing Company at AuGres, died in Detroit Thursday.

Mr. Bopp was stricken late Wednesday by a cerebral hemorrhage from which he did not recover.

He was born May 11, 1889, and was active in the steel and manufacturing business from 1904 to the present time.

He formed the Bopp Steel Corporation at Detroit in 1930 and headed that organization until it was sold to the Sharon Steel Corporation in 1946.

Along with Chester C. Busch, he founded the Bopp-Busch Manufacturing Company in December 1947, and took an active interest in the AuGres business until he died.

He is survived by his wife, Eva (Braun); three daughters, Mrs. Chester C. Busch, East Tawas, Mrs. Frank G. Murphy and Mrs. Judson Decker, both of the Detroit area; and 12 grandchildren.

Services were held Monday morning at Gesu Catholic Church, Detroit.

Zion Congregation's

Dream Culminated at Dedication

Culminating several years of planning, the congregation of Zion Lutheran Church witnessed dedication ceremonies Sunday for its new \$85,000 Christian Day School adjoining the Tawas City church.

Completed during the past winter, the building committee

started its fund-raising campaign to finance construction about three years ago. Final approval to proceed with construction was given the congregation in March 1961 and ground was broken last fall.

Joining in this day marking final realization of a long-

dreamed-of project were many former members of the congregation, who returned to Tawas City for the special dedication and thanksgiving program.

Delivering the dedicatory sermon Sunday morning was the Rev. Elmer E. Bickel, former pastor who directed original planning

for the building campaign. He is now pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, Merritt Township, Bay City.

This service was followed by a ribbon cutting ceremony at the entrance of the new school building. The crowd witnessing this ceremony, in addition to the Zion congregation, was swelled by members of Emanuel Lutheran Church and many other Tawas area residents.

While members of the church board stood nearby, Arthur Ziehl, supervisor of construction, cut the yellow ribbon stretched across the entrance and then handed keys to the new school to Arthur Wuggazer, chairman of the congregation.

After doors were unlocked by Wuggazer, the Rev. Walter C. Pieper, present pastor, delivered the rite of dedication.

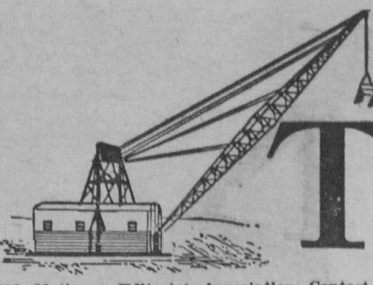
Before sitting down to a noon meal served by the church ladies aid, the congregation and visitors had an opportunity to inspect the new school facilities, which includes two classrooms, a 32 by 65 multipurpose room, office, restrooms and kitchen.

Program in the afternoon included a festival of worship with sermon of thanksgiving by the Rev. Walter A. Pieper, father of the present pastor. He is pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church, Ludington.

An American flag was presented to the school by the Auxiliary of Isoco County Post No. 5678, Veterans of Foreign Wars. Lunch was served following the afternoon program in the fellowship hall of the school.

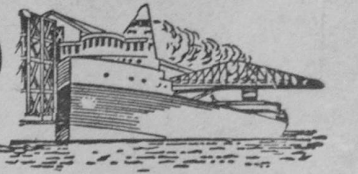

Wurtsmith Council Pushes Housing Appropriation

Wurtsmith Air Force Base Community Council of area civilian advisors has thrown its support behind plans for more on-base housing facilities.

This action came last Friday night following a special meeting of the advisory council held at the base.

By vote of the Northeastern Michigan representatives attending, the group will push for congressional approval of 300 new units to add to its base "city" of 1,055 Capehart and other type homes.

During its April session, the

Isoco County Board of Supervisors wrote Rep. Elford A. Cedberg to enlist his aid in "discouraging further building of housing units on federally-owned property within Isoco County."

It was the opinion of the board of supervisors that such housing should be on privately-owned property subject to taxation. The letter said that further on-base housing has tended to discourage construction of housing by private owners and that approximately 75 privately-owned homes in the Isoco area were now available for rental, but vacant.

Two Teachers Sign Contracts; Faculty Set for Next Year

Two teachers returned signed contracts during the past week to complete the list of Tawas Area High School's faculty for the next school year.

At Monday night's meeting of the board of education, Supt. Reynold Mick reported that three teachers were still to be hired in the elementary grades.

TA School May Have Auto Safety Check

Possibility of conducting a safety check of automobiles using the parking lot at Tawas Area High School is now being considered, according to a report by Principal Ernest Jordan Jr.

Jordan told members of the board of education Monday night that a safety check had not been conducted at the school during the past several years and that one was needed.

He said that the safety check would be held during school hours, although automobiles owned by individuals would be checked during study hall periods.

The board gave its approval of such a plan and indicated that automobiles which do not receive approval during the inspection should not be allowed in the parking lot until mechanical corrections are made.

National Gets Easement Across Submerged Land

Through passage of recent legislation, National Gypsum Company has received an easement across state-owned submerged land of Saginaw Bay to insure continued operation of its Port Gypsum lake loading facilities south of Tawas City.

In signing House Bill No. 411, which became Public Act 84 of 1962, Gov. John B. Swainson said last Thursday that he was "happy to sign a bill which encouraged industry in the state."

The firm originally sought a quitclaim deed to the property it is using on Lake Huron but state officials said Great Lakes bottom lands were included in the property being used and deed would not be legal.

The bill required the land to revert to the state if National Gypsum abandons the pier and docking facilities. The measure required National Gypsum to pay the state \$2,500 for the easement.

This bill was introduced last February in the Michigan House of Representatives by Rep. James P. Mielock, Whittemore.

It met opposition there from property owners near the dock, who are currently suing the company for damages to their property allegedly caused by the installation. A number have suits pending in Isoco County Circuit Court.

After successful passage of the bill in the house, the measure was introduced in the senate by Sen. Harold B. Hughes, Gladwin, and approved.

This exclusive easement to National Gypsum Company is similar to those granted by the state to other industrial firms which have lake loading installations.

When he introduced the bill about three months ago, Mielock said that the company needs to have title to the property in order to conduct its loading operations properly.

Mielock stated Monday that he had received considerable assistance in gaining approval of the

measure through letters received from area union representatives and from resolutions passed by various governing bodies in the county.

Swimming Program is Red Cross Service

Waterfront activities, including swimming instruction, were one of the highlights of Isoco Red Cross services during the past year. Plans are to expand these activities this year and contribute to the fund drive this week which will assist in carrying out these projects.

Water safety in an area like Isoco County, where rivers and inland lakes are plentiful and widely used, plays a significant role. Every year, lives are lost in water accidents and skill in swimming is good insurance.

Some 173 persons qualified for certificates in last summer's swimming program. Certificates were issued to 47 beginners, 41 advanced beginners, 30 intermediates, eight swimmers, nine advanced swimmers, 22 junior lifesaving and one senior lifesaving, one water safety and 14 water safety aides.

In addition, eight have since qualified for junior lifesaving certificates and there are currently 121 in swimming classes, 14 in the survival swimming class and 12 in senior lifesaving classes.

These figures were provided by John Washburn, water safety chairman, whose activities in Oscoda are combined with those of Douglas Evans in the Tawas.

Eight persons finished the standard first aid class conducted by Washburn and there are now eight in the advanced first aid and instructor classes.

Evans will again conduct the waterfront activities in the Tawas this summer.

Isoco Tax Sale Opened; 150 Parcels on Block

Some 25 persons attended the annual tax sale which opened Tuesday morning at the Isoco County Building. The sale is being conducted by Mrs. Grace L. Miller, county treasurer.

A total of 150 property descriptions, upon which taxes have not been paid for 1959 and prior years, are being offered for sale. At the first reading Tuesday morning, 109 descriptions were sold to bidders and a second reading was held Tuesday afternoon.

Final reading of the tax descriptions and sale to bidder is slated this morning (Wednesday).

Some 500 descriptions had been listed in the February schedule, but taxes were paid on much of this property prior to the deadline.

The sale was delayed about 20 minutes Tuesday morning while a final check of tax records was made by the county treasurer.

About \$3,000 in taxes was paid Monday and this property was deleted from the sale.

Successful bidders at the tax sale received a certificate of purchase. (See TAX SALE, page 8.)

The fifth annual spring concert of the chorus, this year's program is devoted to the upcoming observance of the East Tawas Centennial, slated for June 24-30.

During Friday night's program, on stage action will commence the start of the centennial observance. Favorite songs of 100 years ago will be presented by the chorus, including the most famous of all Civil War songs, "The Battle Hymn of the Republic."

Also to be presented will be a selection of Stephen Foster melodies and choice secular pieces. A modern touch will be added with songs from Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Oklahoma."

The "Four Tones," a quartet composed of Richard Ferguson, David Featheringill, Max Beach and Robert Richter, will present several selections.

Director of the 30-member chorus is Paul Youngs, a member of the Tawas Area School faculty. Ferguson, also a member of the school faculty here, will be accompanied.

Iosco County-Gypsum Producing Center of the Nation

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Serves Aboard Navy Assault Ship, USS Thetis Bay

Richard F. Schafer, radioman seaman, United States Navy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Godfred Schafer of Hale, is serving aboard the amphibious assault ship, USS Thetis Bay, observed by Pres. John F. Kennedy during a two-day visit April 13 and 14 to the Atlantic Fleet at Norfolk, Virginia.

Following the presidential visit, the ship headed for Vieques, Puerto Rico, to take part in a three week joint navy-marine corps maneuver involving more than 40,000 sailors and marines aboard some 83 Atlantic Fleet ships to be climaxed with an assault on Vieques.

The president, accompanied by Vice Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson, members of the Washington diplomatic corps and United States congressmen, arrived at Norfolk the afternoon of April 13. After a brief cruise in the fleet ballistic missile submarine, USS Thomas A. Edison, the presidential party boarded the tactical command ship, USS Northampton, to observe night air operations by the attack aircraft carrier, USS Enterprise and the USS Forrestal.

The next morning, the president received full honors in a review of the second fleet, and, following an anti-submarine warfare exercise and an aerial firepower demonstration by the Enterprise and Forrestal, his party observed amphibious assault landings using both landing craft and helicopters on Onslow Beach, North Carolina.

The presidential party returned to Washington late Saturday afternoon.

Army Sergeant First Class Richard L. Lee, son of Lyman L. Lee, East Tawas, recently participated with other personnel from the 47th Ordnance Group in Ordeix I, a two-week command post exercise in Germany.

All Seventh United States Army ordnance units participated in the exercise which was designed to test the ability of these units to provide ordnance support for Seventh Army combat units under simulated combat conditions.

Sergeant Lee, a mechanic in the group's 569th Company in Ludwigsburg, entered the army in 1946 and arrived overseas in January 1961 on this tour of duty.

He is a 1945 graduate of East Tawas High School.

S-Sgt. Gene M. Bellow, son of Mr. and Mrs. Orville M. Bellow, Whittemore, is participating in Operation Dominic, the joint department of defense-atomic energy commission nuclear test series being conducted in the Pacific.

Sergeant Bellow, an aircraft loadmaster permanently assigned to Kirtland AFB, New Mexico, is on temporary duty for the tests. A graduate of Whittemore High School, he entered the service in August 1954. The sergeant and his wife, the former Ada D. Atherton of Stockton, California, have two children.

Donald M. Ashmore, airman, United States Navy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Ashmore, Tawas City, was graduated April 4 from the Aviation Structural Mechanics School at the Naval Air Technical Training Center, Memphis, Tennessee.

The nine-week school covers the fundamentals of electricity and aviation supply, theory of flight, plane handling, aircraft painting and the repair of internal structures.

Pre-requisites for the school include the two-week Aviation Familiarization School and the four-week Mechanical Fundamental School, both at Memphis.

John Pimlott, 29, son of Mrs. Elsie Duncan, Oscoda, recently was promoted to specialist four in Germany while serving with the 28th Artillery.

A survey recorder in the artillery's Battery C, Specialist Pimlott entered the army in September 1960 and was stationed at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, before arriving overseas in March 1961. He completed basic training at Fort Ord, California.

Announce Dates for Spring Kindergarten Registration at W-P

John H. Halbert, superintendent of Whitemore-Prescott Area Schools, announced that the spring kindergarten registration will be held Monday, May 7. The registration will be from 9:00 to 11:30 a. m. at the Prescott Elementary School and in the afternoon from 1 to 3:30 o'clock at the Whitemore Elementary School. Elizabeth Janish, kindergarten teacher, will be on hand to discuss enrollment with the parents.

At Prescott, the county health department will administer shots to children in need of them. A clinic to give shots to Whitemore kindergarten enrollees will be held after school is out.

Before entering school, the state law now requires that children be immunized for whooping cough, diphtheria, tetanus, smallpox and poliomyelitis. The only exception is in case one's religion does not allow shots to be given.

There will not be a session of kindergarten on May 7 since the teacher will be conducting registrations.

IDENTIFICATION NAME TAGS STILL AVAILABLE

Anyone interested in ordering identification tags may still do so. These tags are very valuable and contain important information which may help to save a life. The following information is stamped on a metal tag: Person's name, next of kin, address, health condition (diabetic, cardiac or other), religion, blood type if known, and allergies (sulfa, penicillin, tetanus or any other). These tags come with a chain and can be worn around the neck, as a bracelet, or carried without the chain in purse or wallet.

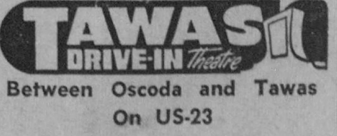

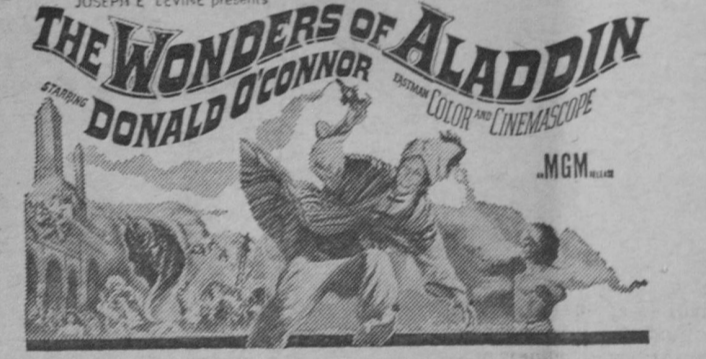
