

# Open House Next Tuesday for Hale's New Bank Building

Open house for the new Hale office of Farmers and Merchants State Bank will be held Tuesday, June 5. Ribbon cutting ceremonies are scheduled that morning at 9 o'clock. Officers and directors of the bank extend an invitation to all area residents to attend.

Final work on preparing the bank for its initial opening Monday was completed over the weekend by Gregory Construction Company, general contractor, and the several sub-contractor firms.

Friday, May 25, marked the last day of business in the bank's former location in the Ira Scofield Building. Farmers and Merchants

first opened its office there February 14, 1952.

From a small beginning 10 years ago, Farmers and Merchants had outgrown its original location and construction on a new building was started last year.

From an original capital of \$75,000 in 1952, the bank now has footings of more than \$3,000,000. As an example of this growth, deposits have increased 300 percent in the past four years.

Designed by S. R. Bragg of the Ann Arbor architectural firm of S. R. Bragg and Associates, the new structure is located on a large corner lot of 177 by 268 feet. The building is set back with a spacious area for lawn in front and a large parking lot at the rear. Drive to the parking area has been arranged to serve a drive-in window and night depository.

Entering the main entrances, the visitor will pass through a glass vestibule and enter the public lobby which has a cathedral-type ceiling. Redwood beams are exposed and the ceiling is unique in that its structural material provides not only a finished surface with acoustical and insulating qualities, but also serves as a structural roof.

The outside or front wall is all glass with one side wall of light red brick and the other of walnut paneling. The far side of the room contains the tellers' cages with a mural above.

Bank counters and other furnishings of contemporary design are set off by light colored travertine terrazzo floor. The executive office is also located on the front and has two glass walls. Its location allows the officers to have visual observation of the work areas, both entrances and the vault door, as well as being close to the public lobby.

The money vault is located at the south end of the lobby and ac-



commodates money storage chests and safe deposit boxes. A decorative grille prevents unauthorized entry to the vault during working hours.

Adjoining the vault are coupon booths for the use of the bank's safe deposit customers.

Ample office space is provided for other officers and the bookkeeping department, a board of directors room serves for conference and also as an overflow area for the bookkeeping department.

Lounge and rest rooms provide facilities for lunches, coffee breaks and employee comfort. Air-conditioning equipment is located in a small basement room.

The 30 by six-foot mural, containing hunting and fishing scenes, is the focal point within the building as well as from the exterior. Floodlighting from a light trough allows this picture to be seen easily both day and night.

Members of the board of directors include D. D. Pearsall, president; J. Morley Stevenson, executive vice president; Carl Adams, vice president; E. S. Herzog, John A. Mortenson, Earl Bielby, Fred Holzheuer, E. H. Taubert and Arnold H. Beyerlein, who is vice president and branch manager at Rose City.

## Students Conduct Auto Safety Check

First annual safety check of automobiles at Tawas Area High School found 20 vehicles failing to pass an inspection by qualified mechanics.

Not all of the automobiles which failed the inspection on one or more check points belonged to students. According to Principal Ernest Jordan, two of the rejected vehicles belonged to members of the faculty.

Conducted by members of the Tawas Key Club, some 60 vehicles were checked in a matter of two hours. Cooperating were mechanics from Ottawa Equipment Company and William Look and Sons Garage.

Among the 10 points checked for safety on each automobile were brakes, front lights-turn signals, rear lights, steering, tires, exhaust system, glass windshield wiper and washer, rearview mirrors and horn.

The safety check was conducted at the request of Michigan State Police and authorized by the board of education.

"This safety check is to be an annual project at the high school said Principal Jordan. "It will be conducted each fall and automobiles which do not pass the inspection will not be allowed to enter the parking lot."

## Tentative Schedule Set for ET Centennial Week

A tentative program for East Tawas Centennial Week, June 24-30, was prepared last Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the centennial committee.

During the session, Mayor Clarence McKenzie was named program chairman for the event.

In addition to the regular program of activities, a committee dinner is to be held Wednesday, June 20, at Lixey's Restaurant where final plans for the observance will be mapped.

Registration will be at the American Legion Hall from June 23 through June 29. This will also be the site for the centennial museum from Monday, June 25, through June 30. The museum will be under direction of Joseph Barkman.

Actual start of the observance will be preceded by the Lumberjack Rally of Huron Sports Car Club, an East Tawas High School alumni dinner at the Holland Hotel and a street dance, all to take place Saturday, June 23.

Opening of centennial week, Sunday, June 24, has been designated as veteran's day. This will include flag raising and sunrise church services at the state park, the annual Tawas River Canoe race, sports car events, Tawas Bay Yacht Club sailing regatta, coffee hour at various churches and band concert at the state park.

Monday will be old-timer's day, with a Knothole League baseball game and old-timer's dinner already slated.

Children's day will be Tuesday, with games, pageant at the community building and street dances.

Wednesday, June 27, will be railroad day. The Detroit and Mackinac Railway will offer train rides starting at the Holland Hotel.

Merchant's day has been set for Thursday, with water games for the children, at the state park, baseball game, Wilber Church Women's supper and merchants' jack pot.

## Old Logs Being Salvaged; Slated as Centennial Display

Pine and hardwood logs, which have been mired on the bottom of Tawas Bay for 60 years or more, are now being raised and brought to shore for use during East Tawas' centennial observance.

In charge of this project for the centennial committee is Arthur G. Leitz, Michigan Department of Conservation. The logs are to be piled near the historical marker in the state park and will be used in the parade.

Four logs, including one which is 32 feet in length, were hauled to shore Monday morning by a city crew under direction of Supt. Paul Roper.

The logs had been located Sunday morning offshore from the Lewis Farrand, local skin diver. They were brought to light for the first time in many years by using a set of tongs, a long rope and power from a fish boat owned by Clarence Greenwood and James Frank.

Although water-soaked during the long years of emersion in Tawas Bay, these logs are still in sound condition. Action of the water has removed all bark and two show signs of water erosion, but several still show the marks of original owners.

Herbert Farrand, 80, accompanied his son, Lewis, and Conservation Officer Leitz during Sunday's search for logs. Many years ago, he had been in the business of salvaging logs from the bay.

He said that several docks were located along the shore in the vicinity of the present-day Tawas Beach Road. Logs would be dumped into booms from railroad trains or would be towed here in huge rafts.

Many of these logs apparently sank to the bottom and were never recovered. Leitz estimates that there are probably a 100 or more still on the lake bottom.

The men are now searching for one mammoth log which was spotted by ice fishermen last winter.

WILLIAM TRACY last year from the University of Michigan. During his five years here, Tracy has been a social studies instructor in high school and during the past year was the junior high school principal. He also served one year as assistant football coach and one year as athletic director.

At Monday night's meeting of the Tawas Area Board of Education, Tracy was released from his 1962-63 contract to teach here in order to accept his new position.

Tracy, his wife, Carol, and their three children reside at 205 Huron Street, East Tawas.

Ron Brinkman, outstanding trackman at Hale Area High School, placed third in the 180-lb hurdles at the state meet Saturday. His time of 20.7 seconds was two seconds off the new state record set Saturday for class D schools.

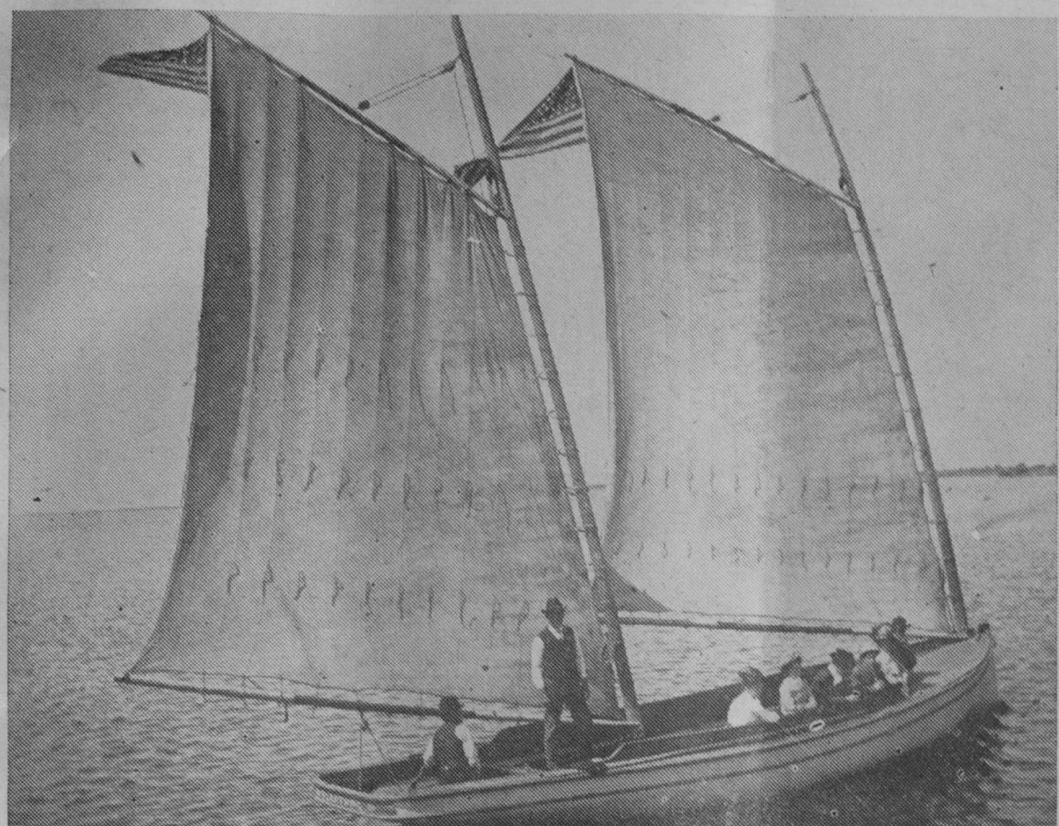

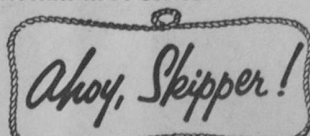

Fifteenth in A Series—



The boatman's protection against explosion and fire can well begin at the moment he is about to refuel his boat. Carelessness on the part of the boat owner is often exhibited when he ties up at the fuel dock, so the following suggestions are worth great consideration.

When fueling, mooring lines should be properly secured. The engine should be shut off. Any and all open flame, such as the galley stove should be extinguished. All electric motor driven equipment should be stopped. Cabin ports, windshield, hatches and doors should be closed. And most important—no smoking.

Check the fuel in the tank by gauge or by a graduated rule or stick to determine approximately how many gallons of fuel are required. This prevents over-filling and fuel running over the deck or in the bilge. Fuel running through the gasoline fill hose causes static electricity, therefore, it is most important that the nozzle of the gas hose be grounded by holding it against the metal filler pipe of the fuel tank all during the filling operation. If any fuel is spilled on the deck by over-filling, flush it off the overboard with water.

Before starting the engine again, open all ports, hatches, etc. and run your bilge blower. Even open the engine hatch and check for any evidence of fuel leakage in the bilge. Do not be in a rush to get away from the gas dock, the station operator is just as interested not to blow up his place of business as you should be in preventing fire or explosion aboard your boat.

Outboarders with portable tanks should fill and mix their fuel and oil ashore and not in their boat. In the case of the smaller motors with integral fuel tank, never attempt to fill while the engine is running. In fact, let it cool a little after running and before filling. And the no smoking rule applies to outboarders as well as inboarders.

## Create a Dreamy Bedroom Decor

One double bed size sheet contains approximately seven square yards of cotton muslin or percale, according to the National Cotton Council. Here are easy sewing instructions by Lady Pepperell for the dust ruffle:

First, measure the distance from the floor to the top of your box springs. Then cut strips this depth from the sheets, with the stripes running vertically.

Join the strips end to end until you get two pieces approximately 48 inches long. Lay the pieces flat, face to face, and mark off scallops one-half inch from the bottom. The scallops should be nine inches wide, with a 12-inch space between. (This space allows

for 22 or 23 scalloped box pleats. The amount depends on whether your box springs have round or square corners.)

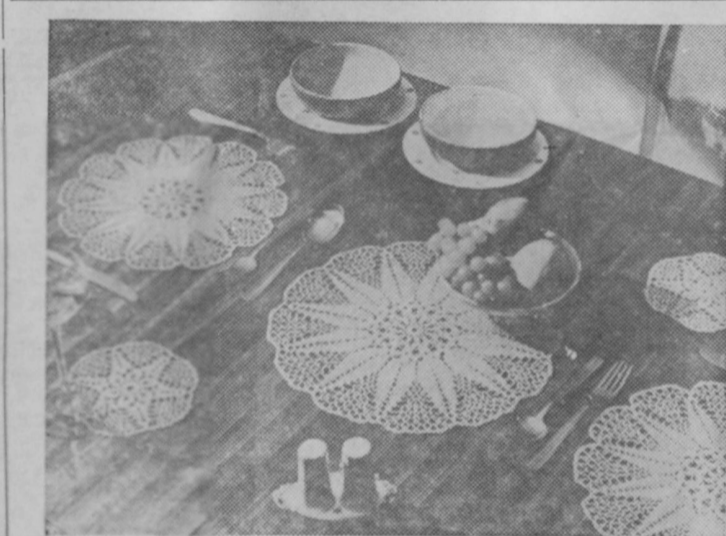
Stitch on marked line, trim excess, reverse, press out, and stitch the straight top together. Then fold each pleat to meet and stitch across top again.

Cut a plain muslin sheet the size of the top of the box springs, plus an one-half inch drop all around for attaching the ruffle. Attach the six center pleats to the 48-inch end, corner to corner. Then attach the sides and stitch.

For the back canopy, measure off the width from post to post and follow the same directions. For matching curtains, make simple drawbacks with a scalloped valance. Use ball fringe in a contrasting shade of brown for a smart finishing touch to the canopy and valance.

# Telephone Lineman Wins Vail Medal for Saving Child's Life

George Pozniak, 27-year-old telephone installer for Michigan Bell Telephone Company, received awards for heroism at a luncheon ceremony at the Wabun Wednesday, May 23.

He was presented the Bronze Vail Medal for his act of valor by Kenneth J. Boekloof of Detroit, vice president and comptroller of the company.

Looking on was two-year-old Ewell Morrison, who was accompanied by his parents, Al and Mrs. Robert Morrison of Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

The youngest of their three sons, Ewell (called Jo-Jo by his family) might not have been alive today if it had not been for Pozniak's actions last September 9.

That Saturday afternoon was bright and warm. Children on AuSable Drive, Oscoda Township, were playing in the sun. So were Jo-Jo and his brothers—in the water of a laundry tub.

Pozniak and a fellow worker, Ronald M. Slaven, were working as a two-man team atop a telephone pole near the Morrison home. They were there on temporary duty from Detroit to help complete a large volume of installation work going on in the area.

Suddenly the telephone men heard shouts of "Help me! Help me!"

They saw Mrs. Morrison running from her yard at 4793 AuSable Drive. Her baby was in her arms.

Descending the pole, the men reached her and saw Jo-Jo, unconscious and already turning blue—an apparent victim of drowning.

Pozniak immediately began to administer mouth-to-mouth rescue breathing. After several minutes, the child gasped for breath, then lapsed back into unconsciousness.

More minutes passed and Pozniak's efforts were successful—the child began breathing normally.

In the meantime, Slaven was helping to care for the child's mother who by then was in a state of near-shock. He asked neighbors, drawn to the scene, to call for help.

The Oscoda-AuSable Volunteer Fire Department was summoned and soon both mother and son were taken to the base hospital.

"The child had turned blue and looked like he was dead," said one report. About what Mr. Pozniak did, a physician said, "In my opinion, the first aid and resuscitation measures taken on the Morrison child undoubtedly saved this child's life."

Several members of Pozniak's family from Detroit were present for the ceremony. Pozniak, who has been with Michigan Bell nearly 10 years, has taken the company's standard first aid course and the more recent rescue breathing instruction.

He is an organizer and officer of a Hamtramck diving club and teaches first aid and scuba diving to members.

The Theodore N. Vail awards include a cash award of \$250, a lapel pin replica of the medal and citations. They were established as a memorial to Vail, a former president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, to perpetuate his ideal of responsibility for public service.

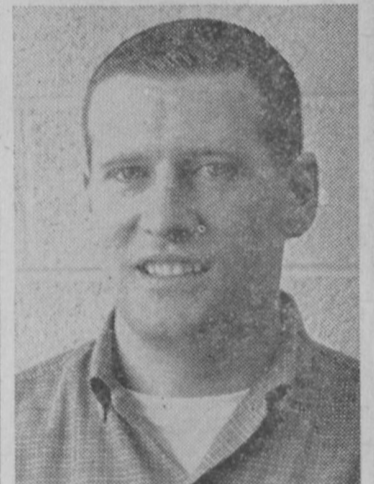
