Heavy Deer Harvest as Hunters Flock Into Area

The 1962 deer season should go down on record as one of the best in recent years, not only for hunters who flocked into the area but also for area businessmen. Weather conditions during the first four days of hunting ranged from bright, sunny skies on Thursday and Sunday to rain and snow on Friday and Saturday. Among the first hunters to report filling licenses here were Melvin Timreck of Baldwin Township, Guy Lickfelt of Tawas City, Mrs. James DeWyse of Tawas City, Edgar J. Greenwood,

75 years old of Tawas City, shot a five-point buck on opening day. As predicted by veteran hunters and local conservation authorities, this year's deer kill will run considerably higher in this area than the 1961 season. Spot checks around the county all so indicate that the average weight of deer taken has been slightly heavier than last year. Western Iosco County saw a particularly high concentration of deer hunters, more so than in recent years, while the Tawas and Oscoda area saw slightly larger numbers of hunters this year.

Auto Crashes Keep T. Hospital Busy During Deer Season

Six auto accidents during the past week sent 12 persons to the hospital for treatment of injuries. Frank Smith, 63, Sherman Township, was treated for face and leg injuries Thursday afternoon when he rolled his automobile on M-55 just south of the Hemlock Road Baptist Church. Officers said that Smith may have suffered a slight stroke or black-out just prior to the accident. He was rushed to Tawas Hospital by Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell, who came along shortly after the crash. Two airmen from Wurtsmith Air Force Base were treated for injuries received in a crash Thursday night on US-23, 2.3 miles north of East Tawas. Treated at the base hospital were Burl D. Putnam, 27, and Joseph D. Coley, 26. Putnam's car was involved in a crash with an auto driven by Fred H. Rhode of East Tawas.

Traffic on M-65 was particularly high Sunday morning as hunters were returning to the downstate area. Business places at Hale, including restaurants and service stations, were jammed with hunters. Traffic on US-23 was not as heavy as during the early 1950s, but was considerably more than the past two years. A drive through public hunting lands around Hale and then east to Sand Lake on opening day indicated that a large majority of the visiting hunters were sticking close to the roads. Most of these hunters saw few deer, if any, while others who moved in to the brush, checked signs of deer feeding areas on public land prior to the season or hunted on private land had better luck.

Iosco County escaped the first four days with no firearms accidents, in spite of the large number of "road hunters." Another unusual feature this season was that there were no "lost" hunters requiring assistance from area law enforcement agencies.

Iosco County Schools Receive Primary Money

One Hunter Dead, Another Hurt Seriously

Shooters Still Unknown in Area Gunfire Accidents

Although Iosco County escaped mishap, gunfire during the first two days of deer hunting caused the death of one hunter in Alcona County and another hunter was seriously injured in Arenac County. Both shootings took place in townships adjoining Iosco.

Investigation continues into the two shootings, but state police and sheriffs departments of the two counties have little hope of learning the identity of the persons who fired the blasts.

A 35-year-old Pontiac man, Dallas Williams, 756 St. Clair Street, became the area's first hunting fatality of the 1962 season when he was shot and killed on opening day.

Williams, who was hunting with his 14-year-old son, David, and brother-in-law, Alvin Redmond, was first reported missing Thursday afternoon in Curtis Township, Alcona County.

His body was found Friday morning by Redmond and Dwayne Barnes of Curtisville. Investigating officers said that Williams had been shot through the back. The bullet passed through his body in the left side of his neck. The bullet was found in his insulated underwear.

A deer had been killed only a short distance from where his body was found and police believe that it was this hunter who fired the fatal shot. Williams had been sitting along a runway. Investigating officers were state police from East Tawas and Alcona County Coroner Albert Tinette.

Dale R. Wright, 22, Au Gres, is still in critical condition at Tawas Hospital after being shot late Friday afternoon by an unknown hunter in Whitney Township.

Hunting with his brother, Donald, Wright was struck in the abdomen by a high-powered rifle slug. The bullet lodged in his spine. Investigating officers questioned eight other hunters who had been in the vicinity of Wright when he was shot.

Elementary Unit Open House Saw Good Attendance

Approximately 300 parents and other area residents attended Monday night's open house at the new Tawas City Elementary Unit.

The program was sponsored by the Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association. Following a short business meeting, those attending had the opportunity to meet teachers in classrooms of the new unit and inspect facilities which were completed recently. This program featured the local observance of American Education Week.

Clyde Soper, P-TA president, had charge of the business meeting and Mrs. C. B. Cox was program chairman.

Son of E. Tawas Couple Killed in UP Auto Crash

Donald Porter, 34, of Jackson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Morse Porter of East Tawas, was killed early Saturday morning in an auto crash near L'Anse in the Upper Peninsula.

He and his cousin, Royden G. Ellico, 30, of L'Anse, were on their way deer hunting when their car swerved on a curve and crashed with a truck.

Born June 6, 1928, he was employed at Jackson by Consumers Power Company.

He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church, Jackson, and Jackson Moose Lodge No. 156.

Survivors include his wife, Jacquelin; two sons, Wayne and Randall; a daughter, Penny, all at home; his parents, and one brother, Henry of Detroit.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, November 20, at Case Chapel, Saginaw. The Rev. James Martin of Jackson officiated with burial in Oakwood Cemetery.

C of C Directors to be Named in Vote by Mail

Ballots were mailed last week to members of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce for election of seven new directors. Ballots are to be returned before December 1.

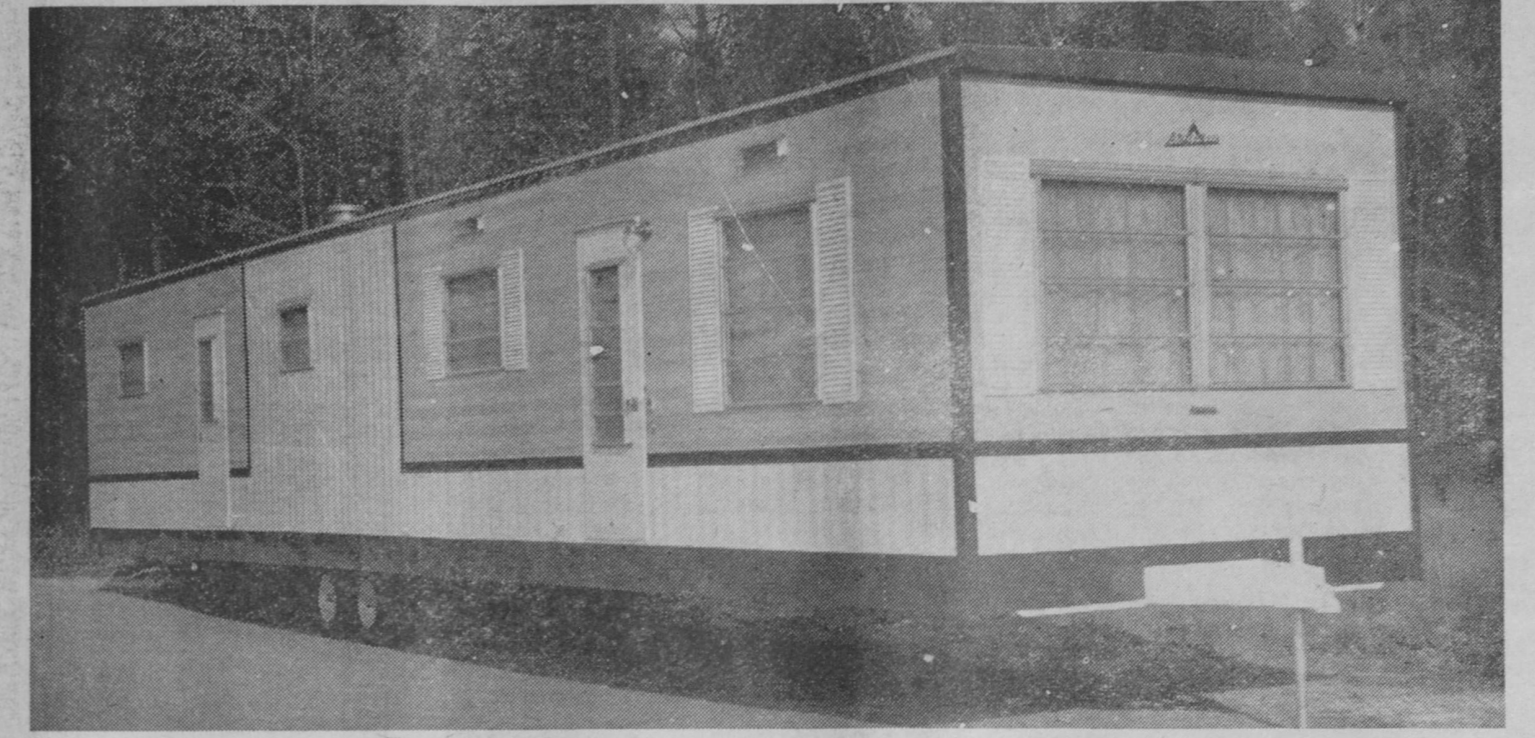

In addition to these candidates, other names may be written in on the ballot but not more than seven names may be listed.

Chamber President Roy J. McMurray said that one of the upcoming projects would be rebuilding shanties for Perchville, the ice fishing village on Tawas Bay.

Perchville has brought considerable publicity to the Tawas area since it was first conceived in 1950 and offers additional recreation to visitors who might like to fish rather than to take part in other winter sports.

Anderson Introduces 1963 Models Well Received at First Public Show in Florida

First public showing of Anderson Coach Company's new 1963 model homes was held November 7-11 at St. Petersburg, Florida. This show is one of the largest in the United States and the 250 models displayed by the various manufacturing firms represented a total value of \$1,500,000.

"The new Anderson received a very enthusiastic reception from dealers, the general public and current Anderson owners," said Donald Miller, Anderson Coach sales manager.

"One of the acid tests in the introduction of any new model is the reception shown by current Anderson owners . . . they compare quality of the new models with those produced in the past," stated Miller.

One of the big changes in the 1963 Anderson is a 15 percent reduction in price. This substantial savings to buyers was affected by elimination of certain "plush" items, but the bulk of the price reduction is based on an anticipated increase in volume due to production efficiency.

Although the 1963 models are to sell for less money, Anderson has the same premium construction, with full insulation, glued construction, improved heating system and the same interiors which have been the mark of quality in the mobile home field. Unlike past practices where Andersons were custom built only, the new models have been standardized. This means that

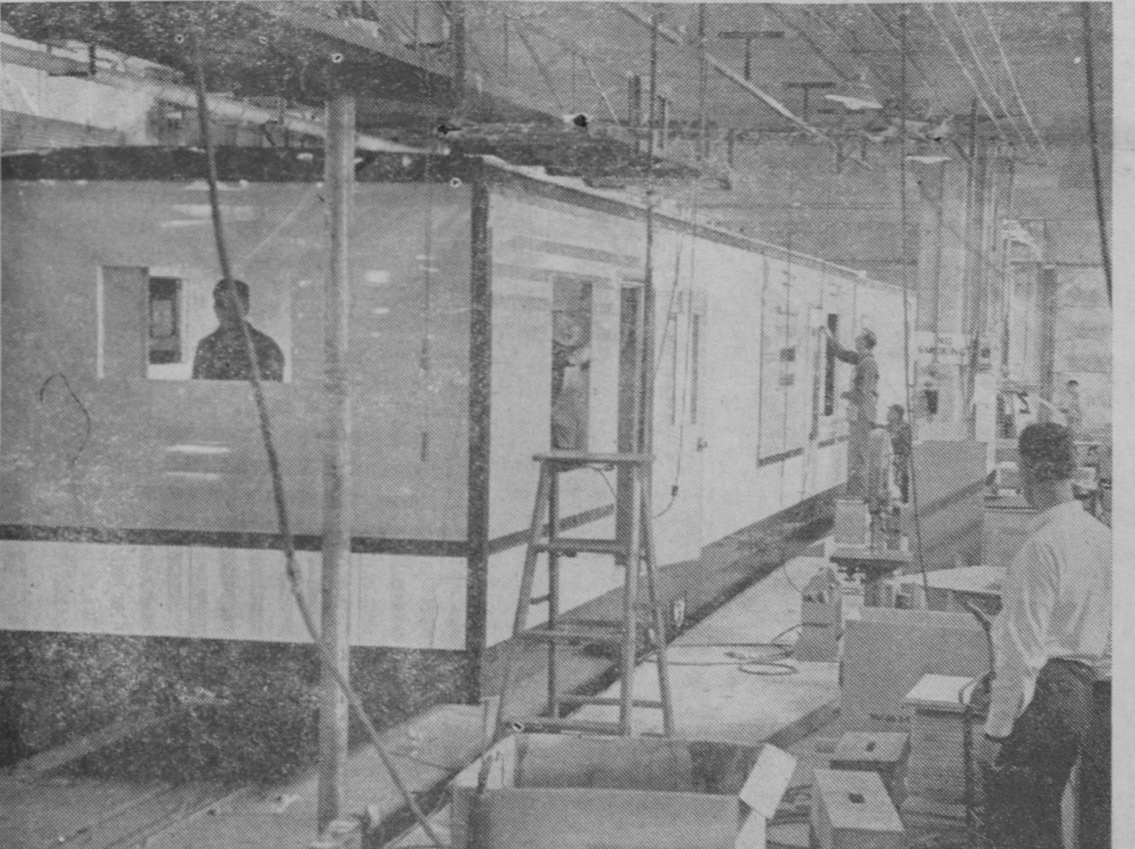
there is faster service to dealers around the country. Anderson is now building and maintaining a limited yard stock for immediate delivery.

"This is a new concept for the company in the more competitive mobile home industry," said Miller. "Anderson feels that it must continue to increase its volume and continue to decrease the

price on coaches without loss of quality." Orville Stiehl, general manager, said that one of the biggest changes in the new model was the use of flat metal on exteriors to simplify lines. The firm's plant in Baldwin Township is now producing seven mobile homes a week.

Anderson, which had operated

a plant at East Tawas since 1947, consolidated its operation at the Baldwin Township plant last year. The line was recently re-arranged for constant supervision. A company spokesman said last week that production may slow down over the next month while sales take hold on the new models. Dealers lots are now saturated with the 1963 mobile homes.

Slander Suit Started by Ex-Hale Banker

A \$250,000 slander suit has been filed by J. Morley Stevenson, former Hale bank executive, against Deuell D. Pearsall, president and director of Farmers and Merchants State Bank.

Stevenson had been employed by Farmers and Merchants from April of 1958 to July 18, 1962, in the capacity of executive vice president and cashier.

His declaration filed November 7 in Iosco Circuit Court stated that on July 18, Pearsall presided at a meeting of the bank's board of directors at which time his resignation was demanded.

Stevenson alleges that the bank president communicated a false and malicious slander to Dale Sellers, a vice president of the Manufacturers National Bank of Detroit. It is claimed that communication was intended to injure the reputation of Stevenson with the Detroit bank and thereby to injure his opportunity to remain in the banking business.

Stevenson charges that he has sustained damages as follows: Injury to feelings, \$50,000; injury to reputation, \$50,000; injury to business and occupation and loss of future earnings in banking business, \$100,000; punitive damages, \$50,000.

Reno Taxidermist Collects for Science

Norman O. Sibley, Reno Township taxidermist, is now in the process of preparing several additions to his museum of natural history located at Taft.

Sibley's collection of more than 300 mounted birds and animals is an important attraction for summer visitors in Iosco's inland lake country. Each year, his museum is visited by nature classes from 4-H, YMCA and other youth camps in the area, along with many adult groups.

A taxidermist for nearly 30 years, Sibley's collection includes birds and animals from Michigan and many parts of western United States.

Sibley is licensed by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, Michigan and Florida Conservation Departments as a bird collector. His bird specimens are used for scientific study by biology students at Michigan State University.

He has also been a licensed bird bander since 1929. Anyone who finds a banded bird in this area should inform Sibley and he will forward the information to the federal agency.

Sibley will soon leave for Florida where he will spend the winter collecting birds for Michigan State University. He is a member of the National Audubon Society, Florida and Michigan Audubon groups and is a nature counselor for the Michigan organization.

He recently acquired a collection of antique guns, which should prove to be a valuable addition to his museum.

Another nature project of Sibley's is the tagging of monarch butterflies. Working in cooperation with Dr. Frederick Urquhart of Toronto University, Sibley tagged more than 995 Monarchs during the past summer.

Last year, Sibley had tags returned from the States of Pennsylvania, Ohio, New York and Mississippi. Information gained from the tags is being used in research into the migration trends of these insects. He is author of several articles published by the Michigan Department of Conservation concerning his studies.

Kiwanis Launches RIAL Worship Program in Iosco

The Rev. Ralph A. Edwards, chairman of the committee on support of churches for the Tawas Kiwanis Club, announced today that the 14th annual Religion in American Life (RIAL) worship attendance program was launched last week. The program is aimed at getting more Americans to recognize their opportunities and obligations to worship God. At present, one out of every three people is not a member of any religious fellowship.

Mr. Edwards indicated that East Tawas is one of hundreds of communities across the nation which will conduct a worship attendance program. All media will be used in seeking to reach the more than 19 million families now outside the churches and synagogues.

RIAL is an organization directed by 75 laymen from all faiths. Twenty-eight national religious groups and 24 national service organizations support and promote the worship attendance program. In addition, American business and industry through the advertising council contribute well over 10 million dollars worth of free time and space to advertise the RIAL worship program.

Tawas Kiwanis is distributing prayer cards in restaurants, sponsoring newspaper advertising, distributing promotion materials to all the churches and furnishing a movie trailer to the local theater. Mr. Edwards said, "Too many people are living on a mediocre level. Faith in God can lift their lives to a higher plane. That is what we hope will happen to the people of the Tawas area during our program."

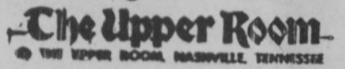

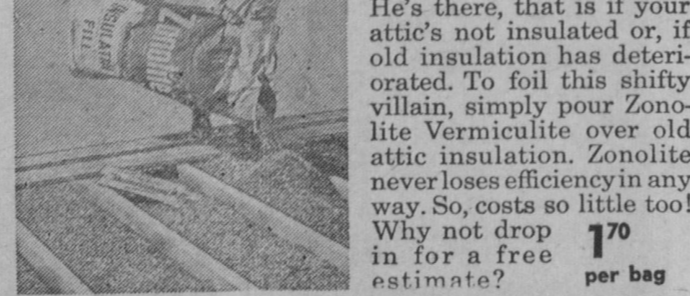

An easy-to-make fall dessert specially designed for changeable weather is new "Chocolate Apricot Pudding." Serve it warm from the oven, or chilled if the temperature rises. This nourishing combination of cream-filled chocolate cookies, strained apricots (straight from the baby food shelf), lemon rind, milk, eggs and sugar is a wholesome dessert for the pigtailers and little league players and a rich surprise for your favorite dinner guests. Here's how to make it:

- Chocolate Apricot Pudding
40 Hydrox cookies
3 egg yolks
2 jars strained apricots, 4 1/2-ounces each
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
2 cups milk, scalded*
3 egg whites
6 tablespoons sugar

Break cookies into 6 to 8 pieces each and distribute evenly into 8 six-ounce glass custard cups. Beat egg yolks, blend in strained apricots and lemon rind; gradually stir in scalded milk, mixing well. (To scald milk, place in top of double boiler over hot water and heat until tiny bubbles appear around edge.) Pour mixture evenly over broken cookies. Place cups in baking pan. Fill pan with warm water to a depth of about 1 1/2 inches around custard cups. Place in moderate oven, 350° F., and bake for about 15 to 20 minutes or until almost firm. Remove from oven and pile on meringue, (touching sides of cups all around) made by beating egg whites until stiff but not dry, gradually adding sugar and beating until stiff peaks are formed. Return to oven for about another 10 minutes or until meringue is golden. Remove from pan. Serve warm or cool with additional Hydrox cookies. Yield: 8 servings.

Shape into 1 inch balls and place about 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Press flat with fork dipped in flour. Press peanut halves in center of each cookie. Bake in 375° F. (moderate) oven until cookies are lightly browned, about 10 minutes. Makes 6 dozen (2 1/2 inch) cookies.

- Chocolate Milk
1 pint milk
2 tablespoons Bosco Syrup

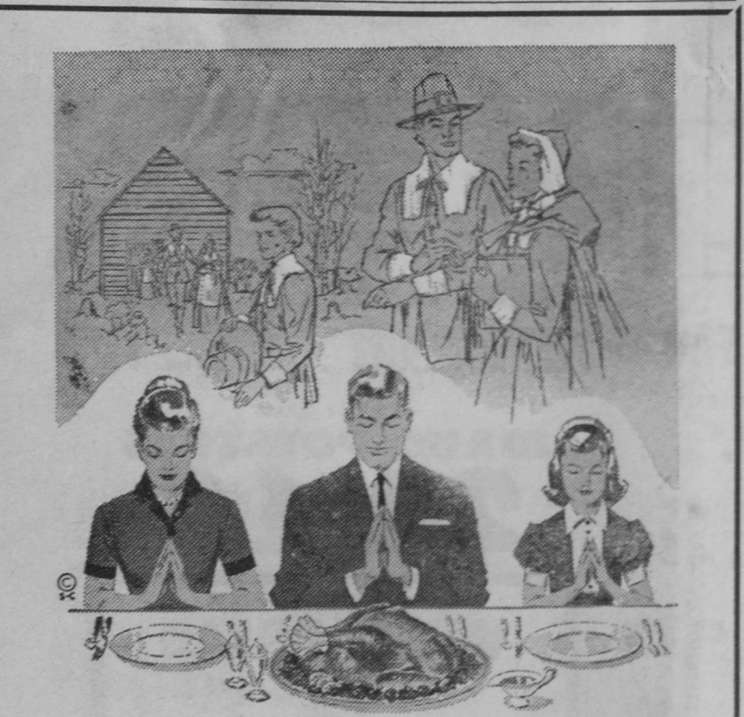

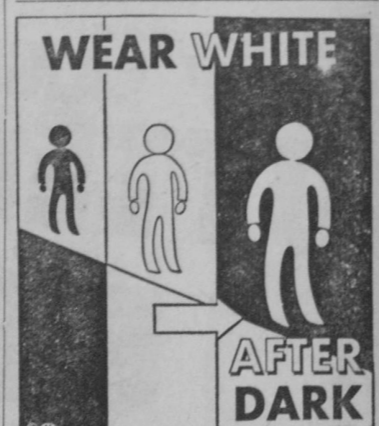

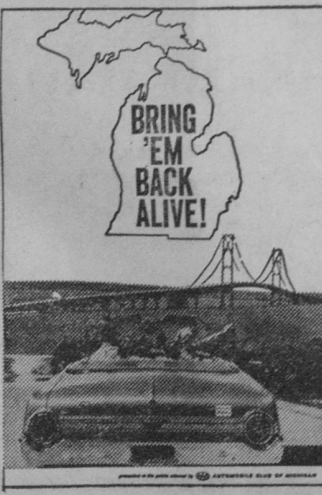

Christmas Tree Industry Grows To Big Business

The growing, cutting, and marketing of Christmas trees has grown, within the last 20 years, into an important industry. This year, for instance, approximately 45 million trees will be harvested. Forest areas no longer supply enough quality trees to meet growing demands. Many farmers, in all sections of the country, grow Christmas trees as a supplementary crop. The demand has required that the industry become more mechanized, especially in the Northwest where millions of trees are harvested each year.

Big Business
Trees are stacked by the thousands in collection yards. Conveyor belts carry them directly into railroad freight cars for shipment to all sections of the nation. A spokesman for the Christmas tree industry reports there is a trend toward nursery-raised trees. Big picture windows are partly responsible. Home owners want neighbors and friends to see trees that are symmetrical or unusual. Also, there is a great demand for very small trees. They are for trailer dwellers.

Popular Size
The most popular size of tree is from five to seven feet. This is due, in most part, to the passing of high ceiling rooms and modern home construction. Commercially grown Christmas trees have been shipped from the United States to many distant lands. There seems to be a growing demand for them in Hawaii, Mexico and Cuba.

Baked Chicken Served with Peas in Squash

These days nothing is what it seems—you can make a party dish from a few simple ingredients. The recipe here, for Golden Chicken, can be included in this category; it is made with an onion soup mix. The chicken stands in a marinade made with the soup, then is baked in the oven. It turns a beautiful golden brown, and has a rich onion flavored gravy made from the marinade. Peas in squash make an ideal accompaniment, along with sliced tomatoes on lettuce.

Golden Chicken

1 envelope Knorr golden onion soup
1 cup water
1/4 cup corn oil

2 tablespoons vinegar
1 (3 pound) broiler-fryer chicken
1 tablespoon corn starch

Empty soup mix into saucepan. Gradually stir in 1 cup water. Bring mixture to boil, stirring occasionally. Reduce heat; partially cover and simmer 5 minutes. Remove from heat; cool. Stir in corn oil and vinegar. Cut chicken into serving pieces and put into bowl. Spoon cooled sauce over chicken; cover. Let marinate in refrigerator at least 5 hours. Remove chicken from marinade and arrange in small roasting pan. Spoon a little marinade over chicken reserving remainder for gravy. Bake chicken in 350° F. (moderate) oven until tender, about 1 hour.

Remove chicken from pan; keep warm. Add all but 1/4 cup reserved marinade to pan gravy. Blend 1 tablespoon corn starch with the 1/4 cup marinade; stir into mixture in pan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until gravy thickens slightly and boils. Serve gravy over chicken. Makes 4 servings.
