

Wounded Hunter Dies; Area's Second Fatality

A 22-year-old Whitney Township man, Dale Wright, died Friday of a gunshot wound received on the second day of deer hunting season.

He had been transferred to University Hospital, Ann Arbor, after receiving initial treatment

at Tawas Hospital. Surgeons recovered a shotgun slug from his body at Ann Arbor.

This was the area's second hunting fatality. On opening day, Dallas Williams of Pontiac was shot and killed in Curtis Township, Alcona County.

Wright had been hunting with his brother, Donald, just before dusk in Section 25, Whitney Township, near the Isosco County line. Donald told state police troopers who investigated that he heard a flurry of gunfire, turned and saw his brother tumble to the ground and heard his call for help.

The slug entered the lower abdomen and severed an artery before lodging next to the spine. He was rushed to Tawas Hospital where he underwent immediate surgery.

He had remained in critical condition over the week-end and surgeons could not perform another operation until the youth had gained strength. Although still listed as critical, reports early last week indicated he was gaining strength and was doing as well as could be hoped.

Donald believed that his brother had been struck by a high-powered rifle slug. State police said last week there were a number of hunters in the area at the time and the majority were using shotguns.

Funeral services were held Monday at the AuGres Methodist Church. The Rev. Herbert Thompson officiated and burial was in Whitney-Sims Cemetery.

He was born September 2, 1940, at AuGres and was married April 1, 1960, to Betty Jean Micklyn, who survives him.

He was a farmer and member of Delano Methodist Church.

Braves Eye Season Opener

All preseason dope sheets point to a big year for the West Branch Orioles, with its entire squad returning from last year. Coach John Janisch should have another one of those tough teams for which West Branch was noted only a few years back.

League Champion Standish-

sterling has faced a rebuilding job similar to Tawas, but has a large corps of returning veterans and should be listed as a top contender. Oscoda is another top contender and Pinconning, the NBC's darkhorse, has its best squad in years.

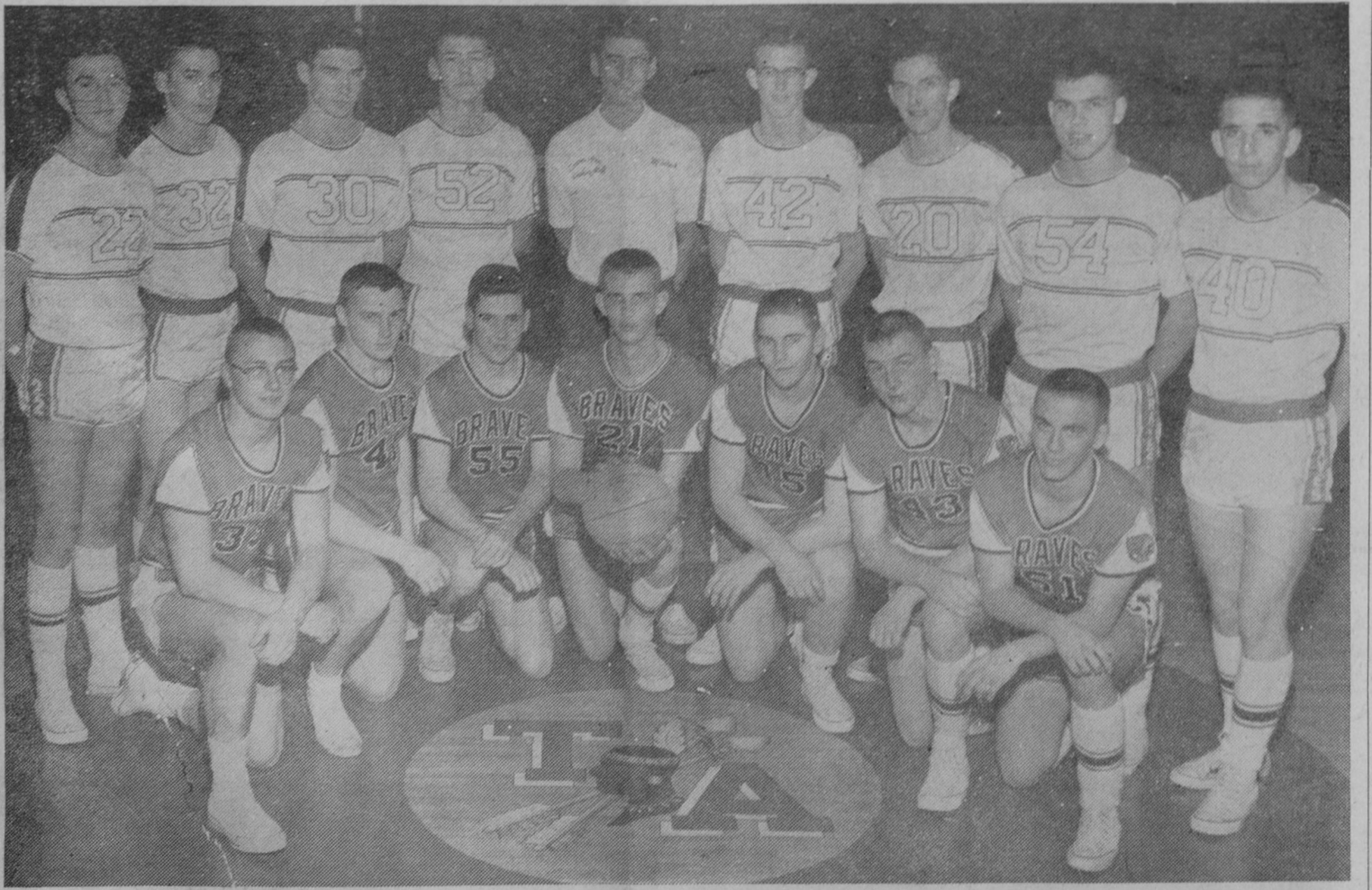
This is the kind of competition the Braves will face starting next week and the other five schools will be seeking revenge for gridiron losses to the Braves during the past season.

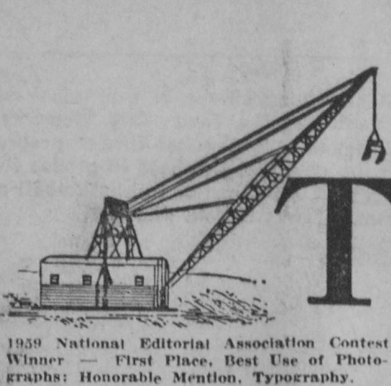

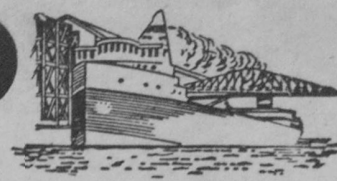

Judge Grants Change of Venue in Lawsuit

Damages of \$468,750 Sought Against Isosco Co.

Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller granted a change of venue Monday in a \$468,750 damage suit against the Isosco County Road Commission.

Trial had been set for Tuesday of this week to hear a suit being brought by Augusta O. Hall of Saginaw, special administrator of the estate of her husband, Hilmer J., who was killed July 1, 1961, during construction on the Indian Lake-Sand Lake Road.

Jury trial has now been set to be heard before Arenac County Circuit Judge Dennis O'Keefe at Standish.

Hall was killed when he was struck by a road commission grader, which was in the process of improving and widening the road. There are no known eye witnesses to the tragedy.

Attorneys claim the road grader was operated in a careless and negligent manner. The road commission's answer claims that the death was the result of Hall's own carelessness and negligence in going into a place of "obvious and conspicuous danger in willful disregard of his own safety."

Last Monday, attorneys for the road commission entered a motion to amend its answer filed last October 17, claiming governmental immunity under existing statutes. Judge Miller did not rule on this, but granted a request for a jury trial.

When the trial by jury was granted, attorneys for Mrs. Hall asked for a change of venue, citing the following reasons at Monday's hearing:

1. "Because the issues and facts of said cause cannot be determined without prejudice by a jury composed of taxpayers of the county."

(The motion said that such a jury impaneled for trial of the cause would of necessity be taxpayers of the county, all of whom would be extremely conscious of any effect a substantial judgment

Chamber May Switch Time of Reg. Meetings

In an effort to promote attendance at meetings of its board of directors, Tawas Chamber of Commerce will hold a noon luncheon on Wednesday, December 12.

Lucy Toska, chamber office secretary, reports that returns are coming in slowly on the election to name new members of the board of directors. By Monday of this week, only 37 out of 138 ballots mailed out last week had been returned.

She also reports that total membership in the chamber is somewhat lower than last year at this time. As of this week, some 118 members had been signed as compared to 128 during November 1961. On December 31, closing date for last year's drive, there were 151 members.

Five business places returned questionnaires stating interest in furnishing shanties for the rebuilding of Perchville. Percy Scott, Perchville caretaker, reports that all of the shanties which were used last year and in storage were destroyed recently by vandals.

Colbaths Seek Re-Trial on \$26,000 Judgment

Attorneys for Maurice and Earl R. Colbath, co-owners of Colbath Fisheries at AuSable, have moved for a new trial, notwithstanding verdict by the jury, on a \$26,000 judgment recently awarded against them in Isosco Circuit Court.

Circuit Court Judge Allan C. Miller heard arguments on the new trial and reserved his decision to a later date.

On October 24, a circuit court jury awarded the judgment to George V. Bennett of Mt. Clemens. This was the largest amount ever awarded to one plaintiff in the local court.

Bennett was a passenger on a motorcycle operated by Leo Brunner which was involved in a collision with a rack truck driven by Earl R. Colbath. The crash occurred at Oscoda May 10, 1961.

Bennett, a sawmill hand at the time of the accident, had asked for a judgment of \$200,000 claiming payment for past and future medical and hospital bills, past and future loss of earnings, past, present and future pain and suffering.

Attorneys for the Colbaths, in seeking a new trial, claim that a plea of guilty by Earl R. Colbath to a traffic summons should not have been brought out before the jury under cross examination.

They also claim that Maurice Colbath should have been dismissed from the suit, arguing that Earl R. Colbath was the only

Wounded

A 28-year-old Bloomfield Hills hunter was treated at Tawas Hospital Sunday for an injury received in a freak hunting accident on the 11th day of deer hunting season. John B. McKenzie had been hunting in Mitchell Township, Alcona County, and was in the process of unloading his rifle at camp.

He ejected a shell into a barbecue pit and it exploded. A piece of the casing lodged in his right eye.

The accident was investigated by state police from East Tawas.

New Clubhouse Nears Completion

A dream of several years standing will soon be realized by members of the Isosco Sportsmen's Club. To be completed sometime during the next month is the organization's new clubhouse on US-23 near the city limits of East Tawas.

Of rustic wood frame construction, the 26 by 40-foot building is located on a 5½-acre wooded site purchased about four years ago by the club.

Ground was broken last July 15 for the new building when Elmer Vipond turned over the first shovel of earth. Watching the ceremony were President Albert Duquette and Vice President Carl Woolhiser.

Construction of the new building is being financed by a stock sale among club members. The club's board of directors authorized issuance of \$2,500 worth of stock certificates, to be redeemable when the club is financially able to call in the certificates.

Vipond, holding 50 \$10 shares, purchased the largest block of stock to date. The board of directors hopes to interest more club members in purchasing stock in order that obligations might be met in time.

Plans had been made to hold the November 28 meeting in the new clubhouse, but installation of plumbing has not been completed as yet. Instead, tonight's meeting

will be held at the East Tawas Elementary Unit at 8:00 p. m.

A dedication dinner is planned for the new building in December.

The building has been constructed entirely with donated labor and some of the building materials have been contributed. One of the club's greatest needs at present is to secure enough folding chairs for its meetings.

Peter Lichtfuss has been general construction foreman on the project, with the able assistance of Roland E. (Bud) Fahselt and several other members.

"The building will soon be put to good use when our junior conservation group is reactivated," said Duquette. "We have been unable to hold meetings of the junior group since last spring because of the large amount of time devoted to completing the clubhouse."

Duquette said the new building would be an ideal meeting place for this group. The property contains many different species of trees for nature study and the club plans to develop a small outdoor firearms range for use of the junior group.

"With the reactivation of this junior group, I don't know of a better time for a club member to purchase a share of stock in this new building in the name of his son," commented Duquette.



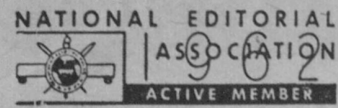
NEW HOME of the Isosco Sportsmen's Club is pictured above. The building is located on US-23 near the city limits of East Tawas. It is con-

To the impressionable youngster, good books open the door to adventure, travel, mystery, to endless hours of entertainment, recreation and education.

Books are easy to select and give. All one must know is the age, reading ability and capacity, and interests of the youngster for whom the gift is intended. While books are ageless, youngsters are not; they have their own individual likes and dislikes and a book on a subject in which they are not interested would be as useless to them as a shirt four sizes too big. The same is true if the subject matter of the book is "too old" or "too young." There is no such thing as a book for youngsters "6 to 16." The age span is too wide and the diversity of interests will be even wider.

Buy Wisely

Some well-intending persons buy books or book sets for the school-age as gifts for infants, thinking they are purchasing a "lasting" gift. Actually, they are wasting their money. If the books are not torn or misplaced by the time the child is old enough to read and appreciate them, most likely the information contained in the books is outdated.

Books for youngsters are written for a select age group—not for a select age. At 13, two boys may have entirely different reading tastes—as well as reading abilities.

Books make excellent gifts for persons of all ages. But, like a glove or a shoe, they must "fit" the recipient if they are to be fully appreciated.

 8. Don't leave tree lights burning when away from home.
 9. Inspect tree often to see if lights are drying out needles. If they have, change the position of the lights.
 10. Take the tree down when the needles start falling.

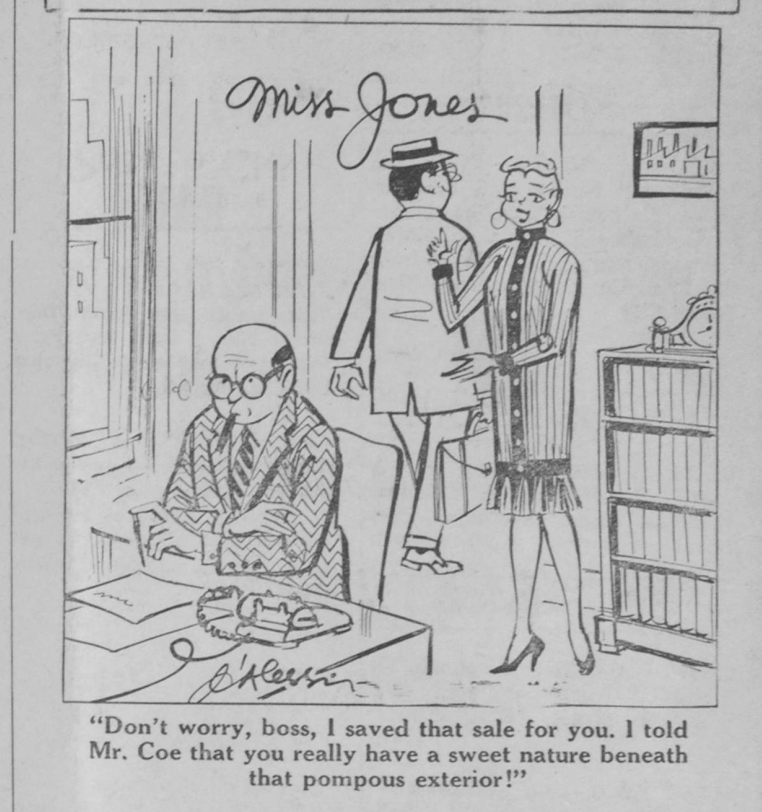

2. Because the defendant has employed an Iosco County public official, Judge of Probate H. Read Smith, as chief counsel, who by reason of his wide acquaintance in the county and the elective office he now holds would be detrimental and prejudicial to plaintiff's case if tried before a jury and because of his respected public position as a judge handling matters of great personal importance to many of the citizens of Iosco County.

Attorneys for the plaintiff also claimed it would be more convenient for the great majority of the witnesses to attend the trial of the cause in Arenac County instead of the more distant jurisdiction in Iosco.
