

Damage Caused by New Ice Melters

Traditionally used ice-melting salts will not harm air-entrained quality concrete, but some new types of chemical ice-melters may cause surface damage to concrete driveways and sidewalks.

That is the warning issued to home owners by Portland Cement Association engineers. According to J. Gardner Mar-

tin, Michigan district engineer for the association, the use of sodium chloride and calcium chloride for snow and ice removal has become accepted practice. It is recognized that excessive use of these salts may cause some surface scaling non-air-entrained concrete. They have no adverse effect on air-entrained concrete.

Last year, however, several new types of ice-melting chemicals using large quantities of ammonium sulphate or ammonium nitrate were marketed and tests have shown these substances to be extremely corrosive to even best-quality, air-entrained

Martin said a few simple rules can be used in the selection of de-icers that will not harm adequately cured air-entrained concrete. They are:

1. Do not use any de-icer on concrete surfaces until you know its chemical composition. Contents normally are shown on the

2. Do not use de-icers contain ing ammonium sulphate or ammonium nitrate on any concrete surface.

The Portland Cement Association recommends if ice removing chemicals must be used that only sodium chloride or calcium chloride be used on concrete surfaces. They will melt snow and ice, even in the coldest weather, without any harmful effect to air-entrained concrete.

Years of experience on thousands of miles of adequatelycured, air-entrained concrete pavements have proved conclusively that sodium chloride or calcium chloride will not cause surface scaling or other surface deterioration on such pavements, Martin declared.

While the newly - developed ammonium salts do effectively melt ice and snow, tests have demonstrated their seriously harmful effect on concrete.



To the impressionable youngster, good books open the door to adventure, travel, mystery, to endless hours of entertainment, recreation and education,



Books for youngsters are written for a select age group—not for a select age. At 13, two boys may have entirely different reading tastes-as well as reading abili-

Books make excellent gifts for persons of all ages. But, like a glove or a shoe, they must "fit" the recipient if they are to be fully appreciated.

TREE SAFETY TIPS

Because Christmas trees are potential fire hazards, here are a few tips that will help prevent a fire in your home: 1. Keep your tree outdoors until you are ready to put it

2. Wait until just before Christmas to put up your tree. 3. Place tree so it does not block doorways.

4. Place tree away from radiators and heaters, and certainly away from fireplaces. 5. Stand tree in water to re-

tard drying. 6. Use fireproof decorations of glass and metal.

7. Carefully check your Christmas lights and discard sets with frayed wiring. Don't use lighted candles.

8. Don't leave tree lights burning when away from home. 9. Inspect tree often to see if lights are drying out needles. If they have, change the posi-

tion of the lights. 10. Take the tree down when the needles start falling.
