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## Announces Mail Standardization Program by P. O.

Postmaster Martin C. Kasischke of the United States Post Office, Tawas City, has announced that a mail standardization program by the Post Office Department will begin January 1, 1963.

Patrons, but most specifically, manufacturers of envelopes and mailer firms should start planning now for the changes in mailing procedures which will go into effect on January 1, 1963. These changes are the first step toward mail standardization, and will eliminate a major source of delay in mail processing the extremely small and odd kinds of mail which cause trouble in modern canceling machines and other postal mechanization equipment. Two of the new rulings are mandatory—two are recommended.

The two mandatory standards are:  
A. Pieces less than three inches in width (height) or 4 1/2 inches in length will not be mailable.  
B. Pieces having shapes other than rectangular (four right angles) will be non-mailable.

The two recommended standards are:  
A. Pieces having a ratio of height to length of less than one

to 1,414 (one to the square root of two) are not recommended.  
B. Pieces which are not sealed or secured on all four edges so that they may be handled by machines are not recommended.  
These new standards are being adopted so that progress can be made in the development of economical mail handling machinery. Mail processed by machines must be consecutively passed through automatic culling, facing, canceling and sorting devices at machine speeds. Each piece is repeatedly stacked, de-stacked, transported by roll and belt conveyors, free-fallen and gated. Envelopes, double post cards and self mailers with loose flaps and unsealed edges interleave with other mail and cause frequent jams in the equipment resulting in damaged mail and time-consuming delays.

2-Lt. Kenneth W. Thomas of Sterling has entered United States Air Force pilot training at Williams Air Force Base, Arizona. Lieutenant Thomas, who received his bachelor of science degree from Michigan State University, will fly the T-37 and the new supersonic T-38 jets during the year-long flying training course. He will also receive special academic and military training and will be awarded the silver wings of a pilot upon graduation.

The lieutenant is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard O. Thomas of Sterling. He and his wife, the former Sherrill A. Tennis, have one child.  
Army PFC Norman D. Harris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph G. Harris of Hale, recently participated in Fallex, a large-scale NATO exercise in Germany.  
Fallex is an annual exercise designed to test the over-all combat readiness and effectiveness of NATO forces in Europe.  
Harris is assigned as a clerk in Troop E of the Third Armored Cavalry Regiment's Second Reconnaissance Squadron in Kaiserslautern. He entered the army in September 1961 and completed basic combat training at Fort Knox, Kentucky.  
The 20-year-old soldier is a 1961 graduate of Hale Area High School.

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# Undefeated Season for TA Braves

Tawas Area Braves finished a perfect 1962 football season Friday night by shutting out the Sebewaing Indians, 47-0. Both schools had been undefeated going into the contest and both are conference champions.

The Indians, winner of the Thumb Class C Conference, found the Braves just too tough to handle. Tawas Area's defensive unit, led by Linebacker Randy DeWyse, who doubles as a guard on offense, stopped Sebewaing with only four first downs and 105 yards rushing and passing.

Tawas, on the other hand, struck hard and scored two touchdowns in the first half, saw three drives bog down deep in Indian territory and then hit paydirt five times in the second half.

As has been the case all season, this win was strictly a team effort on the part of Coach Herb Escott's squad. Sharp blocking and tackling coupled with hard running has given Tawas its first undefeated record in school history and a team which ranks with the best ever, if not the tops, among Northern Michigan schools.

In their eight games, the Braves have rolled up 329 points and held their opponents to a mere 13, which gives some evidence of the caliber of this team. With 11 seniors on its roster, Tawas actually has not had a good test of its strength this season.

The test was not to come in the final game. The plucky Indians had as their longest gain a 20-yard kickoff return by Halfback Ken Hessler to open the game. After picking up one first down, the Indians punted to Tawas' one-yard line. In eight plays, the Braves marched as far as Sebewaing's eight-yard line but the drive stopped there.

After getting nowhere, Sebewaing was forced to punt and the high kick went only five yards to the S-16. From there, Halfback Ernie Lixey, who ran well when he had the ball and faked perfectly without it, scored on the second play from scrimmage on a 15-yard jaunt. The try for extra point was no good.

Sebewaing then turned in its best sustained drive of the night,

picking up three first downs and moved the ball to the T-27. After losing two yards on a running play, Defensive Halfback Don Lear intercepted a pass thrown by Quarterback Roger Bachman. Taking over on the 26, the Braves moved to a touchdown in six plays. Quarterback Jim Mick connected with Halfback Jim Herriman on a picture pass play and the latter went 26 yards to score.

Herriman ran the PAT to give Tawas a 13-0 lead.

A second interception by Lear during Sebewaing's next series gave Tawas the ball. The Braves marched as far as the Indian 20-yard line but Mick fumbled and lost the ball on the 20. Sebewaing tried two passes, but Halfback Dale Harten intercepted for Tawas and the Braves again had the ball on the 18. The Braves fumbled away the pigskin on the first play and the clock ran out on the next play.

Tawas took Sebewaing's second half kickoff and marched to its third touchdown in five plays, Herriman going the final distance, on a 48-yard scamper. Lixey ran the PAT.

The next time Tawas got its hands on the ball, Herriman

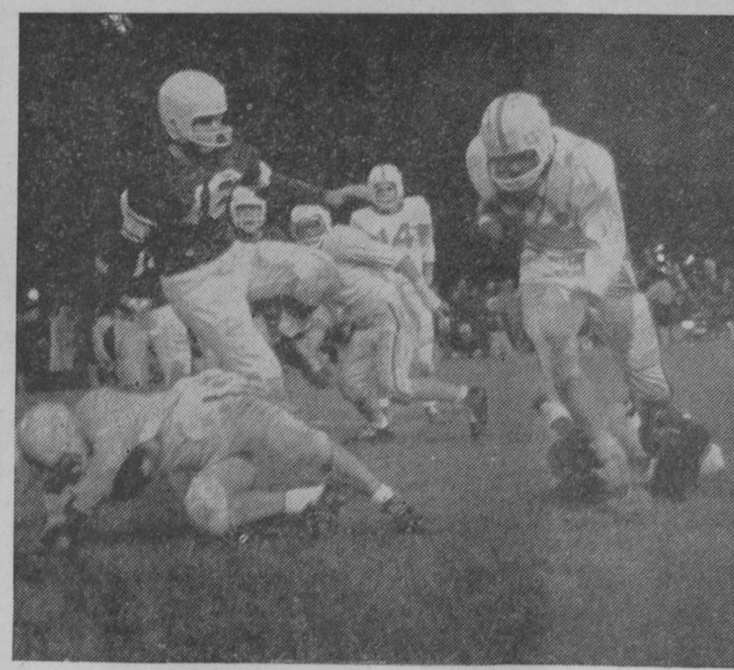
scored on a 39-yard run and Lixey ran the PAT.

Tawas' next score was set up on a beautiful 49-yard punt return by Lear, who moved the ball to the Sebewaing 26. Five plays later, Fullback Brian Helmer cracked over from three yards out and Mick passed to End Steve Ferguson for the PAT.

Later in the fourth quarter Herriman scored his fourth touchdown of the night on a 53-yard run. The attempt for PAT was no good.

With a lineup composed mostly of sophomores and juniors in the final minutes of play, Tawas scored after taking over on the S-40. The drive included a 30-yard scamper by Lear, who later scored from four yards out. Sophomore Halfback Dennis Lorenz scored the PAT.

Outstanding tackles during the night were turned in by DeWyse, Don Evans, Helmer, Bill Western, Tyler Cholger, Bob Erickson and Jerry Hosbach.

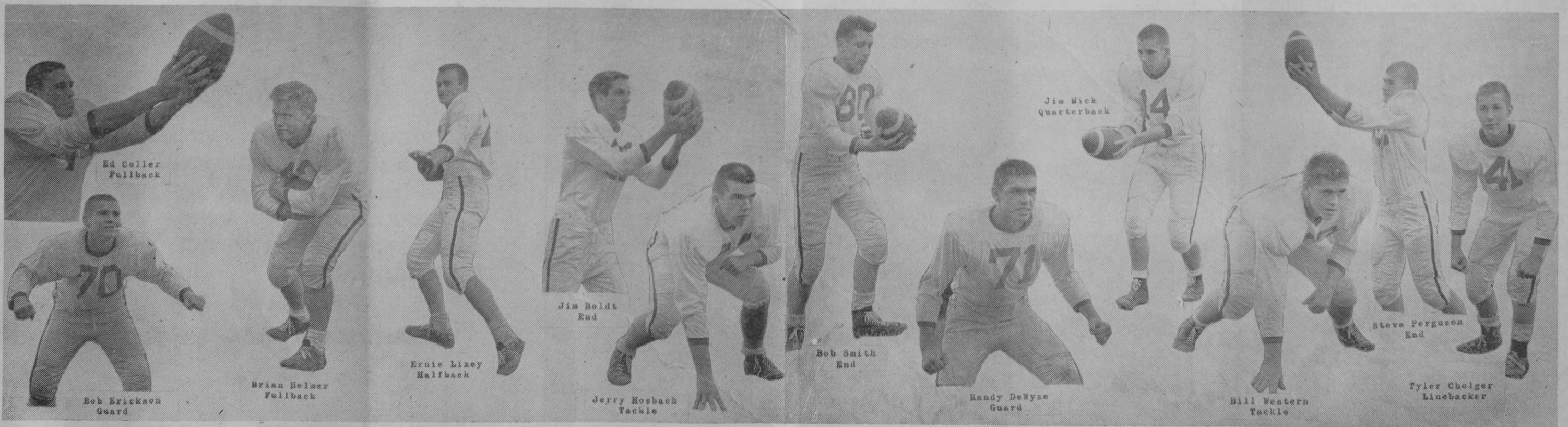

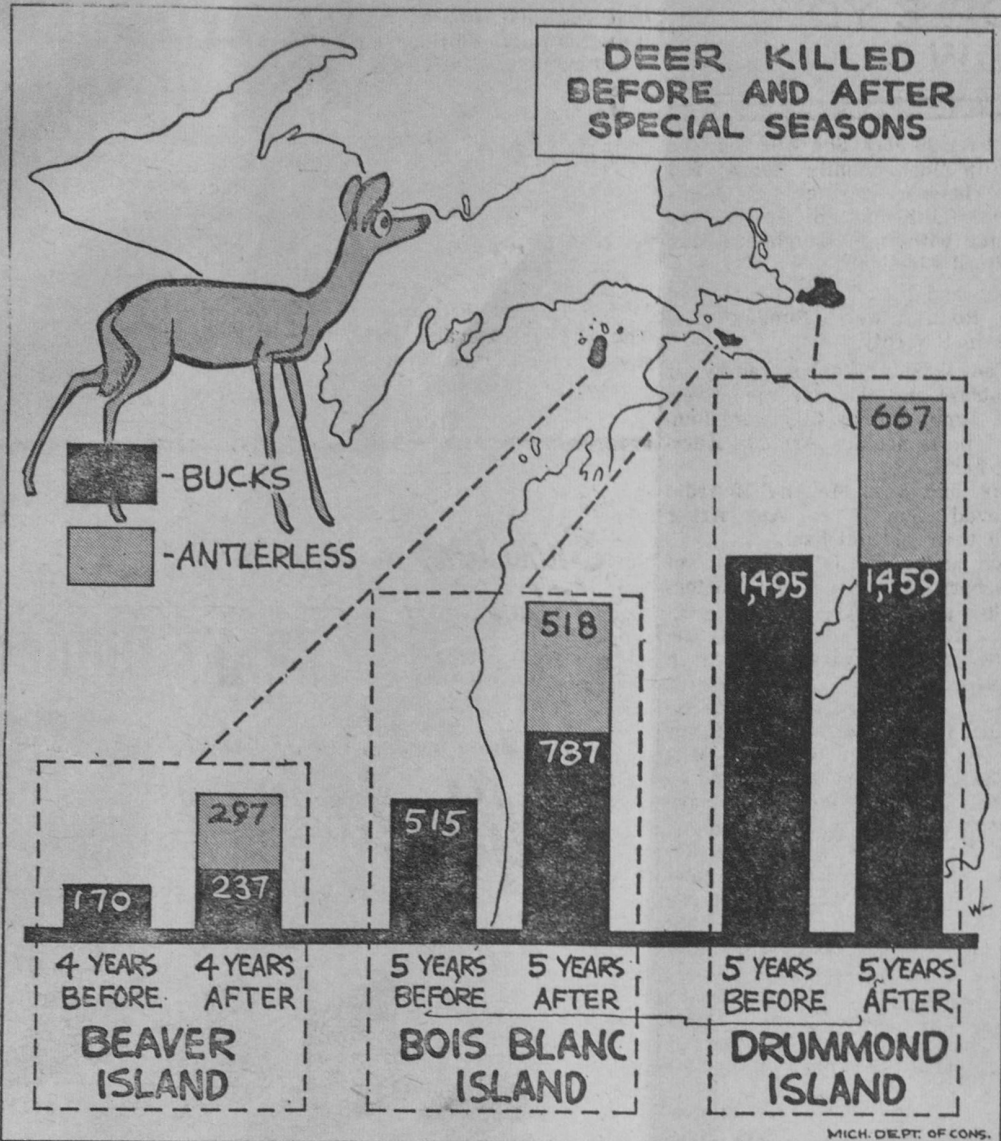

Hale Loses Final Game of Season to Oscoda JVs

Hale Area Eagles lost to the Oscoda JV last Saturday night and finished out their season with a record of three wins and five losses.

Hale took a 7-0 lead in the first quarter when Quarterback John Heilman went 45 yards on the first play from scrimmage and Barton Caverly went 40 yards for the touchdown. Heilman scored the PAT.

Oscoda scored a six-pointer in the first quarter and Heilman went 28 yards for a touchdown in the second. With Hale's try for extra point failing, Oscoda tied the game before halftime.

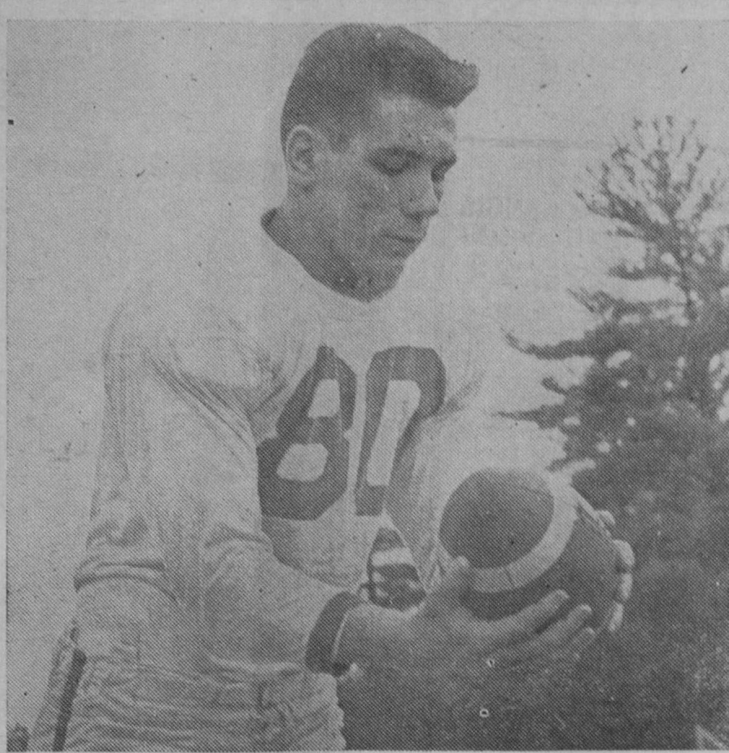
Speaks Before Home and School Group

Mrs. George Malenfant won the jack pot, with room awards going to the fifth and sixth grades.

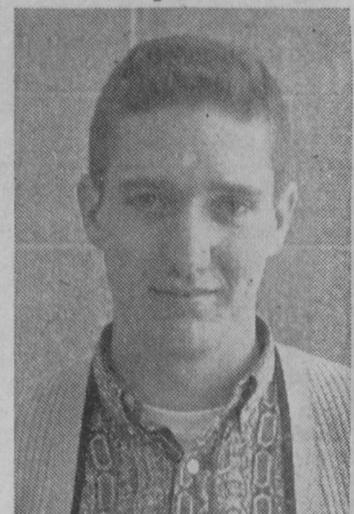
